Headmaster's Speech Day Address 1998

Chairman, Your Grace, Dr Shepherd, Governors, Distinguished Guests, Ladies, Gentlemen and Boys.

I extend a very warm welcome to you all to Speech Day in the 140th year of this School. I wish to welcome you all; boys, teachers, other staff, Old Boys, parents of boys, friends and supporters of the School; and I wish to thank you for your efforts and your various contributions to the life and to the vitality of Hale School in 1998.

Some time ago, we adopted a prayer of St Ignatius of Loyola as our own, as our Hale School prayer:

Teach us, good Lord, to serve thee as thou deservest:

To give and not to count the cost; To fight and not to heed the wounds; To toil and not to seek for rest; To labor and not to ask for any reward; Save that of knowing that we do thy will; Through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The thoughts expressed here are at the core of a good independent school that builds well a community, and values highly the genuine contributors, each according to their talents, and the personal qualities such as decency, honesty, willingness and concern for others that they bring to the life of the School.

Just recently I read a lovely story about a little girl who was suffering from a rare blood disease. She needed a blood transfusion from her five-year-old brother, who had miraculously survived the same disease and had developed the antibodies to combat the illness. The doctor sat her little brother down and explained the situation to him, asking him if he would be willing to give his blood to his older sister. He hesitated for a very brief moment before taking a deep breath and saying: "Yes, I'll do it to save Lisa."

As the transfusion progressed, the little boy lay in bed next to his sister and smiled as he saw the colour returning to her cheeks. Then he himself grew pale and his smile faded. He looked up at the Doctor and asked with a trembling voice: "Will I start to die straight away?" Being young, the boy had misunderstood the doctor; he thought he was going to have to give her all his blood, and, of course, his life.

A wonderful example of "to give and not to count the cost", and of "giving to anyone who asks". And I can think of many examples in our Hale community, from students, a Captain of School, teachers, non-teaching staff, parents, a Chairman, Governors, where these attitudes and actions of giving freely, joyfully and without reserve are acted out spontaneously.

All of this is greatly appreciated, and as Headmaster of the School, I salute and thank you all.

Before I begin on the main part of the text of my Speech Day address I would like to quote to you in full the speech of a very famous man, made on an occasion such as this.

The man was Field Marshall Montgomery, deputy Chief-of-Staff for all Allied forces for the D Day invasion of Europe in 1944: "Now boys", his address began, "I've got a great deal to say to you, but it won't take very long. Speak the truth. Do your best. Take personal responsibility; don't blame others. Don't dawdle; get on with it." He then sat down.

Brief, direct and full of wisdom.

The well being of any society is largely dependent upon the manner in which the children are raised; the manner in which they are nurtured and the manner in which their attitudes, beliefs and values are rooted and developed.

As we approach the twenty first century the two institutions which are best placed to teach attitudes and values are the Family and the School.


Children need love, time, stability and firm handling. The attitudes and values that truly sustain us as people and sustain our communities need to be learned. These attitudes and values need to be taught. It is the responsibility of parents, and then, in their turn, teachers in schools, as adults in situ, to teach these values. No amount of discussion or rationalization can absolve adults, in particular parents, and then teachers, of their responsibility to teach well, with wisdom, love and firmness, the attitudes and values we as people and as communities need.

The partnership between the parents and the School, based upon shared values, understanding and support, is a fundamental necessity.

There is an awakening of the need for those of us who are in situ to teach values better and more directly.

The Curriculum Council's recent publication of the Curriculum Framework's Statement, with its set of core shared values, has coincided with our intention to squarely address the need for schools to give far more attention to the ethical, values and spiritual dimensions of life. To this end we have appointed Mr. Patrick Wallas to a new position in the School, Coordinator of Values Education.

In October I was fortunate enough to attend the Headmasters' Conference in England, the central theme of which was "Educating Into Goodness". It is a theme that encapsulates a vision towards which all independent schools should aspire. It is our duty to inspire our students to develop for themselves a set of values which will sustain them on their

journey through life; values like compassion, honesty and integrity; values which will help them to feel good about themselves and their place in this world; values which will lead them into "goodness" and into being citizens of substance for the well being of their community.

It is appropriate, of course, that we rejoice in our many achievements as a community. Our academic, sporting, musical, dramatic and other successes should be celebrated as some of the fruits of a liberal and nourishing education. But there are yet more profound ways to succeed in a community such as ours. We can all succeed on a daily basis simply by making others the beneficiaries of our best, personal qualities; by being cheerful, supportive and helpful, by treating each other and ourselves with respect; by being discreetly and unwaveringly kind to each other; by being disciples of the truth and by being true and loyal friends. Being a true and loyal friend can often be difficult and uncomfortable. It can mean not covering up for friends when they do wrong, when they are untruthful or unkind. Covering up or allowing a friend to do wrong is often done under the excuse of sympathy or friendship, but this is selfdeception. People who stand by as friends go and do wrong are actually afraid of the tension, or the rejection they will feel if they confront the wrong. We need to be braver than this. And if we are to succeed in living a life that embodies honorable values and endearing personal qualities, though we might not receive certificates or trophies, we will receive something more lasting - a real sense of profound purpose and that peace of mind which leads to true fulfillment. Such success, like so many of our goals, does not

come easily. It requires character and courage. And it requires, above all, the will, the involvement and commitment of our entire School community.

Society as a whole needs to grasp fully that the family and the school are of the utmost importance for the future, as they are in a prime position to develop the attitudes and the values of our children. The family and the School rely on society's attitudes, its will and its actions.

Unfortunately, today we have cause to be concerned about schools, about the future of the teaching profession, about attitudes to authority, about lack of respect and about lack of personal responsibility.

Respect should be in place as a basic tenet of our culture; respect for all others, respect for self, respect for property. Respect should be there; hard lost, not hard won. There is a very big difference. Respecting one's elders, respect for authority, respect for the well developed view of others, respect for parents and their position and role should be in place as a matter of course; again to be hard lost rather than hard earned. Filial piety has been a cornerstone of many societies; it being loving and respectful dutifulness to parents.

In addition to respect, another equally vital

ingredient of our society is responsibility, personal responsibility. Too often, we are too concerned with our rights and too little with our responsibilities. Being personally responsible is essential for a meaningful life. To deflect personal responsibility and not to confront the issue at hand is to delude ourselves and to deny ourselves opportunities to learn and to grow.

Communities that fully comprehend the importance of the development of desirable attitudes and values and who give priority to the welfare of their children give high priority to education and hence a naturally high status for teachers. Presently, our society seems to be too little aware that there are few more vital roles in the whole tapestry of our lives than those of parenting and teaching.

Within our society there is a great need for there to be the will to review, for a reordering of priorities and for strong and wise leadership.

Schools are well placed to take a lead in all of this. They need to be empowered to lead and they must be worthy of this leadership role. Those in schools should play a prophetic role in reminding society of the values and visions that we as humans should have. Society should encourage and support us in this role. Our business in schools is to sharpen the intellect, to feed the imagination, to awaken the senses, to instill a sense of movement towards a more noble way of life, to open paths for the spirit, to teach values and to practice concern and respect for each other.

Schools must have a deeper purpose than academic success. They should be concerned more with dispositions and orientations than with mere attainment. The virtues and values that are to be aspired to should infuse a school as a community and the scholarship that is being encouraged.

The challenge for us in this School is to move forward together as a vibrant, questioning and above all compassionate community, united in our quest for wisdom and goodness. And for us to discover and rejoice in the most lasting success of all the knowledge that we are part of something that is greater by far than the sum of its parts, a community built on mutual respect, trust and genuine concern and love for each other.

Again, I thank you all for your various contributions to the life and energy of Hale School in 1998. I wish you all a very happy and meaningful Christmas and a wonderful New Year.

1998 has been a year of much activity within the school, as you are all aware, and Hale School has achieved many successes. Rather than recount to you these successes, it is perhaps more appropriate on this day to talk about the experiences of the Year 12s who are about to leave Hale School and venture out into a world where there are no teachers or Heads of House or councillors to show them the way. Their story deserves to be told.

In 1987, thirteen of the current Year 12s began their lives at Hale School under the tuition of Mrs Hills. These boys, many of whom have remained friends throughout their time at Hale, have experienced all that this school has to offer. They were here during Australia's Bicentenary in 1988, which coincided with the retirement of Dr Tregonning after 23 years as Headmaster and the appointment of Mr Inverarity. This is probably the most defining moment in the lives of these young men at Hale, for the new Headmaster brought with him great dreams of what this school could become. His new ideas and broad vision over the past ten years have led to many changes in the school environment, such that as Hale moves into the new millennium, it has probably never been better placed to assist in the growth and development of young males, to provide them with a balanced education and to give them opportunities to do whatever they want with their lives.

Since 1987, many others have joined these original thirteen. The first big intake at Hale is, of course in Year 5, and so, in 1991, the size of this year group increased substantially. It was a particularly exciting time in the Junior School. During this year, the new building was being completed, with new classrooms for years I to 3, and for the two Year 5 classes. While the new building was being completed however, the Year 5s became one of the first, and certainly the last, to be taught in the confined space of the Junior School Boarding House, Brine House. This was far from a negative experience, as it meant that friends were quickly made, and that new boys rapidly adapted to their new surroundings. It became evident to all that mateship would play a very important part in their time at Hale.

During this period, there were a number of other significant developments in the Junior School. For the first time, Hale embraced the advancing technology age, buying an entire set of Acorn computers, which meant that at the Junior School boys soon had supervised access to technology which has changed the face of the world as we know it. It was also around this time that Music at Hale School began to take greater shape.

Adrian Barone-Scott introduced more and more boys to Music, and, when he left, the gap was filled by Mrs Kerry Kegie, who has done an outstanding job of heading Junior School music, such that boys who now have come through the Junior School have some experience on at least one musical instrument.

This is the opportune time to talk about two men who have arrived shortly after each other in 1993, who together had an even greater influence on music at Hale. At the beginning of the year, Andrew Bushell took over as Director of Music at this school. An Englishman who knew what could be achieved in musical terms at a school, having spent time in some of the best music schools in England, he brought many ideas as to how to restructure music at Hale School. Hale finally became serious about teaching music as a classroom subject, a concept which five years earlier would've been far too ridiculous to even consider and realised that there was so much more to music than just producing an abundance of concert band players and having them play each week at assembly.

The other man who played a significant role in the transformation of music at Hale was Phil Venables, who arrived here in the middle of 1993. He brought with him a wealth of practical experience in teaching and performance, and together with Mr Bushell, set about laying the foundations for the phenomenal development of Music at Hale which had seen it grow from a peripheral activity within the school to one which now holds great prominence, with nearly half the boys at Hale involved in someway with music. There are now four concert bands, two orchestras, a barbershop quartet, a choir, and half a dozen other ensembles. The links between the Hale Music Department and the St Mary's Music Departments are strong, with the many joint ensembles making it possible to achieve the outstanding success that we have seen over the past few years.

The Year 12s have played an enormous part in this remarkable growth. While not wishing to single out any boys in particular, it would be wrong not to mention this year's Captain of Music, Simon Fisenden, and also Courtenay Greig and Andrew Pilcher, who were all awarded Honours in music, which is the highest award this school can bestow. They have led a group of young men who have dedicated an enormous amount of time over five years in the Senior School and have seen both the Hale St Mary's Concert Band and the Hale St Mary's Orchestra achieve phenomenal results. On behalf of our year group I take this opportunity to wish the music department continued success and hope that the new Performing Arts Centre offers potential for further growth.

Moving back to the story of today's graduates, 1993 saw another intake of boys, with an increase from two classes to three. Most of the boys will have great memories of that year, for whether they were involved in Pedal Prix, or went on the ski trip to New Zealand, or were part of the various Junior School sporting teams, or spent involved with Drama, Music and Art, it was an outstanding year, and many of the boys will testify that returning to the Junior School a few weeks ago was a fantastic experience.

In 1994, the dives of our group changed significantly. As the population of our year doubled, all of the boys were thrust into the intimidating atmosphere of the Senior School. At the time there were not the pastoral care structures which will be here for next year's Year 8s, and it was a particularly frightening time for some, especially boarders. It was however, a very exciting time with the opening of the Peter Wright Technology Centre which has enabled Hale to, over the past five years, move with the times and offer a large number of technological-based subjects. During this time, we have seen further technological development, with the connections of most classrooms to the school's computer network and all boys now having internet access to compliment the library's fantastic resources.

Other significant developments during these past five years at Hale School have included the complete overhaul of Administration, development of the Science Classroom and the recently completed Arts Centre. It is the last development which is perhaps the most significant. Along with the music and drama, art under the leadership of Ms Mary Pfister has advanced enormously at Hale in recent times. While Hale has always had a reputation for developing outstanding artists, with names like Pericles, and Zeck coming to mind, the growth of the Student Art Exhibitions in the past few years and the outstanding facilities available now to art students mean that now more than at any other time, Hale Art is going through a boom period. It is part of the cultural revolution that is sweeping the school, a revolution of which the current year 12 group has played a significant part. Gone are the days when a boy's exploits on Craig oval were the only means by which his success outside the classroom could be measured. There is, however, still progress to be made in creating a true cultural environment at Hale School.

This continues through to drama. In third term we saw the world premiere of *Moondyne Joe*, a play, jointly written by Mr Rutter and Mr Edgar which received much press coverage and good audiences. This continues on at Hale a school tradition of performing plays written by staff at the school, with the plays of Mr Hopkins in the 1980's being the most recent examples. While none of this years graduates were members of the cast of Moondyne Joe, a number were part of the play's orchestra. Over the past five years this group has been a large part of the enormous expansion of drama at Hale, which has seen in addition to yearly and sometimes twice-yearly school plays, house plays, mime troupe, circus skills, magic and significant developments in the technical side of stage performance due to increased numbers in these areas, the Drama Department now finds that the back stages of the hall are simply not an adequate facility, and it will greatly benefit from the new Performing Arts Centre.

Mock Trial and Debating too have been greatly boosted over the past five years through the involvement of some of the graduates. The number of debating teams is at an all time high, and while there is still some way to catch up with the contemporaries, like Christ Church, this is a positive sign. Similarly, Mock Trial, for the first time has grown to these teams, with the most senior team competing in the final on this coming Monday. This team, comprised of graduating year 12s, has set a new bench mark for Mock Trial at Hale, and this will hopefully lead to growth in this field. The same group of boys have seen the establishment of organised public speaking at Hale for the first time, and their involvement had seen this underestimated activity grow slowly, but surely.

While I have painted the picture of the way that the current Year 12s have significantly contributed to the increasing and promising cultural life of the School, they have also participated in bodh academic and sporting spheres. This year has seen Tennis retain the Corr Cup. Soccer again take out the Soccer Cup and Swimming return the Tregonning Cup to Hale after a five year absence. The Year 12s have played important leadership roles in these teams, and have over their five Years at Hale upheld the Hale spirit, which dictates that while games are played hard, we must always attempt to play fairly and show great sportsmanship. It is important that those who follow maintain this, for it is a feature of the School of which we should all be proud.

Similarly over their time at Hale the Year 12s have shown that classroom studies are exceedingly important, and there are some outstanding scholars who have lead the group in this regard. It is disappointing for some however, that during this time at Hale, our education has been somewhat delineated. Unlike those who now follow us, our schooling choices were relatively narrow ones and have not perhaps provided for the breadth of education desired by some. Maria Montessori once said: "And if education is always to be conceived along the same antiquated lines of a mere transmission of knowledge, there is little to be hoped from in the better of man's future. For what is the use of transmitting knowledge if the individual total development lags behind?"

One of the many criticisms of the Tertiary Entrance System here in WA is that it doesn't allow students to get a so- called "balanced education". I believe Hale School has taken the right steps to trying to provide this type of education, and certainly those who graduate in four or five years time will benefit from the changes made since this graduating group entered Year 8. Of perhaps greatest value in the foreseeable future is the Values Education, which the Headmaster will discuss, and the Outdoor Education that now occurs in all years from 8-11 which was not available to our class.

This only a minor disappointment however in the sea of enjoyment which Hale has brought to the members of the Year 12 group. For each boy, their time at Hale has meant different things, that I truly believe that the Hale motto of "Duty," which means duty to yourself, duty to your family and friends, duty to the School and duty to the Lord our God, will stick with them for the rest of their lives. I take time to thank the teaching and the non-teaching staff for creating the opportunities that have been so readily taken by Hale students in past years. The majority of boys are extremely grateful for the opportunities which have been presented to them, and many of them will continue to be active within the School community for years to come.

Shakespeare wrote in sonnet 60:

"Like as the waves make towards a pebbled shore, so do our minutes hasten to their end."

Today the Year 12s will leave the Memorial Hall for the last time and head off in different directions. A few boys soon leave to go overseas, others to University, some will go to TAFE, while a small number will go directly into the workforce. Despite the fact that the boys have arrived at Hale and will leave Hale at varying stages in their lives, those here today all share one common achievement, and that is that they have completed Year 12 successfully and will graduate today from Hale School. I would like to thank this year's Prefects for their outstanding leadership, and salute the departing Year 12s, wishing all the best of luck for the future.

Chapel

1979 was memorable as the Year of the Three Popes. On a much reduced scale 1998 was for Hale the Year of the Two Chaplains. The Pengelley and Smith families met up for a few days in Somerset in July, hastily trying to remember last minute instructions about the eccentricities of their respective cars, houses, schools and, of course, Chapels. This may or may not have been a good thing as the Pengelley's with six more weeks holiday in fearful anticipation of how starchy an Anglo-Catholic, Co-Educational, English boarding school might be and the Smiths winging anxiously to Perth wondering if the Chaplain (an unenthusiastic swimmer at the best of times) really was expected to take over the water polo team. Things could only improve after that and for both families they certainly have.

In the jargon of the times, a Chaplain must be an enabler, as much as a parish priest. Personalities come and go, but the spiritual life of the School is dependent upon many other factors. Chapel life at Hale is obviously vibrant. The building itself is attractive, adaptable, and cared for by a devoted band of students' mothers. Its position on the fringe of the School campus has been wisely supplemented by the Oratory, another attractive space for quiet contemplation in the very heart of the School. Both have been used extensively throughout the School year for many different types of Service, ranging from the weekly Service for the Junior School, to the regular Chapels for Year Groups and the Boarders. In addition there have been special Services performed to mark important occasions in the Church and School calendars, where key events such as the Valedictory Service for the Year 12s, the Welcoming Service for the new Year 8s, the Induction Service for new prefects, and even a fun-day Service have been celebrated.

Beyond the current students, many Old Boys have returned to the chapel for reunions, to get married, to see their children and grandchildren baptised and sadly to attend the funeral service of much loved contemporaries.

Outside the building the Year 12s planted their tree and walked quietly to key points of the School where we had moments of silence to remember our individual journeys through our Hale years. Many joined us with St. Mary's at the Cathedral for the Advent Carol Service.


The core of Christian worship, however, does not lie in the occasional Services, but in the regular Eucharists attended by a loyal band of staff, students and parents in the Chapel and in the Oratory, following Christ's instructions to his friends "to do this in remembrance of me".

Beyond formal worship there also lies another key to Hale, and indeed, to any School, and that is the sense of community. which of course was the original meaning of "Church". I read recently that the remains of the wartime pilot and philosopher Antoine de Saint-Expury have just been discovered with his plane. In his greatest book, "Wind, Sand and Stars", he wrote, "we forget that there is no hope of joy except in human relations. If I summon up these memories that have left me with an endearing savour, if I draw up the balance sheet of the hours of my life that have truly counted, surely I found only those that no wealth could have procured me. True riches cannot be bought."

Christ has been present in Hale this year in so many different ways. The wisdom and steady hand of John Inverarity; the kindness and good humour of the Heads of House and Boarding Staff; and the countless little pieces of encouragement and direction in the classrooms, playing-fields and outdoor activities by so many conscientious members of staff throughout the School, As I write this in the Chaplain's office I can hear quite clearly the infectious laugh of Karyn Chan as she teaches a group of budding musicians next door. This speaks to me far more of the Good News from Nazareth, than many erudite sermons I have heard.

A Chaplain may never know what spiritual seeds planted in the School will ever germinate. He lives in hope. We are all on a Pilgrimage and those passing through Hale into an insecure and troubled world, hopefully will benefit from the rich nourishment that the School has so generously afforded them.

In a City of London Church I visited earlier this year are the words:




"Oh God, make the door of this house wide enough to receive all who need human love and fellowship; narrow enough to shut out all envy, pride and strife. Make his threshold smooth enough to be no stumbling-block to children nor to straying feet, but rugged and strong enough to turn back the tempter's power. Museum and Archives

In the Hale School Museum we do not subscribe to the popular conception that a museum has to be a static display of dummies and artifacts which are lifeless and not altogether relevant to the modern world. History can be very much a part of the present – at the cutting edge of contemporary thought. The Hale Museum/ Archives, we feel, should be a springboard, not a lifeless, cobweb-encrusted collection of inanimate objects.

This year we have included a PowerPoint program in the body of the museum. A computer generated visual and audio display entitled "Past into Present" sets out the long and rich history of the School and its past scholars. Already it has brought home to many that out heritage is as visible today as it was a century ago. One of many Haleians featured is the story of Rhodes Scholar, Phipps Turnbull, who consciously gave his life for his country and his friends in Gallipoli on August 7, 1915. As a follow up exercise the students have been taken to the memorial drive in Kings Park -Turnbull's Plaque (and others) has been pointed out and the story told in that poignant May Drive setting.

It has been a privilege to work with the Roberts family to collect memorabilia to prepare a display for the commemoration of the life of Kim Roberts DFC who was killed on the evening of D-Day 1944 while flying his Lancaster aircraft in support of Allied ground operations in France. A photographic copy of the display was arranged and in early April 1998 the Head of the Language Department, Ms. Fraize, escorted Hale students, Ben Spagnolo and Julian Gray, down to the village of Auvers in the Normandy region of France. They then presented this gift to the Mayor and Council of the village where Kim's memorial has been erected in the tiny churchyard, not far from where the aircraft crashed. It is hoped that it is the start of many visits by Haleians to that region to cement the liaison now established.

After eighteen months of research we have managed to track down all the Haleians who have been a recipient of an Order of Australia since the inception of the awards in the 1970s. Eighteen Haleians are now included on the board and we have included biographies of their lives and careers in our archival records for the benefit of generations to come. The career of Bob Becher was a revelation to our chemistry department and is now being featured by that department in their program.

Over the last three or four years we have had an association with the Stirling Council through their heritage listing program. One of our suggestions was that a plaque be placed in the pavement walkway overlooking Scarborough/Brighton beach to commemorate the work of writer Tom Hungerford, who wrote the short-story collection "Tales from a Suburban Road", a work studied by Hale literature students. In October, Tom was a guest of the School and spoke to the Year 11s about his life and his thoughts on the modern world in which the youth of today will grow up. The School has indicated to the Council its willingness to contribute to the manufacture and appropriate placement of the plaque.

In keeping with our policy of being a resource for the general community, the Hale School Archives has agreed to play host to the very valuable records of one of Australia's most famous army battalions, the 2/16th, which has a long and illustrious history reaching back to the landing at Gallipoli and includes the defense of the Kokoda Track in 1942. Many Haleians have served in its ranks and we are very pleased to be associated with them and be the guardians of their heritage. Members of the 2/16th Battalion Executive, Keith Norrish and Allen Gittos visited us in November, inspected our facilities and then spoke to a Year 10 history group of their experiences in the Middle East Theatre in 1941 and then their involvement on the Kokoda Track in 1942.

Earlier in the year Selwyn Clark DFC, a Haleian and grandfather of current student Andrew Pilcher and subsequent donor to the museum (his RAAF uniform), spoke to another History group about his career before the outbreak of war, then of his time as a fighter pilot in England and Russia flying Spitfires and Hurricanes. Finally he spoke of his transfer to the South-West Pacific theatre and a tour of duty with the famous no 76 squadron RAAF flying Kittyhawks against the Japanese until 1945.

The old Havelock Street Hale School has now been converted into a Constitution Centre by the state government. We were



pleased to act as historical consultants and to supply artifacts for some of their displays. It has been rewarding to have groups of currents Hale students tour the facility where so much of our past had been generated.

Research students in education, history and architecture from tertiary institutions around Perth continue to use our archive facility. When each thesis is finished we are the recipients of another addition to the history of the School and the heritage of the state. On a daily basis we operate as a public relations facility for the School and the heritage of the state. We play host to numerous Old Boys and visiting groups of prospective parents and students.

In the 1999 Archives/Museum will be the core resource for a new history course at the School, Western Australian Heritage, which will tell the story of this state through the many Haleians who have been educated at the School and have gone on to play an important part in the development of the state and the nation. Our considerable bevy of Rhode Scholars, politicians, community leaders, military leaders, writers and poets will all feature strongly. It is also planned that next year a presentation based on our existing PowerPoint program, Past Into Present, will be placed on the Internet for the benefit of the international community.

As the year 2000 approaches we look forward to carrying the rich and varied heritage of this great institution forward into the new millennium.




KRYSTIE HANNAH joins us in the capacity of Art teacher this year, and comes to us from Newman College in Churchlands.

BRUCE RUTHVEN


Head of Mathematics






Once again, towards the end of Term One, Faulkner, along with Loton and Wilson House, were out collecting donations for this year's Red Shield Appeal. The






of the night was seeing Mr Henderson blitz the field in his event.









Community Involvement

Music has played a greater part in the lives of Hale School students in 1998 than ever before. Not only has there been an increase in numbers, but also the level of proficiency in both solo and group endeavours. Several group endeavours have again been achieved in conjunction with St Mary's Anglican Girls' School, our respective departments combining to form some of the strongest concert bands, orchestras, and choirs in Western Australia.

Now boasting a staff of Christopher Goff, Karyn Chan and over 30 itinerant staff, the Department, led by Philip Venables, is flourishing to such a degree that the plans are on the table for a new Performing Arts Centre to be built next year.

The musical year now traditionally begins in the fourth term, with the departure of year twelve students from the programme. Term Four in 1997 saw the fusion of three combined concert bands, two combined string orchestras, and another version of the acclaimed Hale St Mary's Choir, challenged to surpass the preceding year in terms of quality and excellence in musicianship.

TERM ONE

The first major concert to be undertaken in 1998 was the annual "Music Under The Stars", now in its fourth year. This is the second occasion that the concert has been held at the Quarry Amphitheatre, City Beach. When the concert was first held (in the Hale School Quadrangle) in 1995, it featured only two groups — the Hale St Mary's Concert Band, and the Hale School Barbershop Group. In 1998, the Quarry was sold out over a month in advance.

Within the heavy schedule of rehearsals which had to be undertaken to stage such an event of quality music, the Hale St Mary's Bands and Orchestras featuring at "Music Under The Stars" enjoyed a weekend at the "Lakeside" Camp, Baldivis — the intermediate concert band and orchestra on the weekend of 21-22 February, and the Hale St Mary's Concert Band and Hale St Mary's Orchestra a fortnight later. All groups that attended the annual camps found the weekend a careful mix of relaxation and rehearsal, the two seldom coinciding as the concert date of Sunday 29 March drew nearer!

MUSIC UNDER THE STARS was a musical showcase, not only in terms of the high quality of music prowess displayed, but also in terms of patronage, and the support for the event which led to a situation of many unable to secure tickets. The tireless efforts of the Hale St Mary's Fundraising Committee, led by Mike Garner were appreciated in the construction and organisation of the concert.

The committee was able to acquire the services of renowned jazz guitarist Ray Walker, who was the special guest of the concert. With over 30 years' experience, he has contributed to over 1000 recording sessions, and appears regularly with the Western Australian Symphony Orchestra.





DRAMA REPORT '98

Once again it was a year of fresh challenges met with a great deal of enthusiasm, energetic teamwork, and, even though it may sound pompous, considerable skill.

Our first challenge was to help the Western Australian Magicians' Society raise funds for the National Magic Convention to be held in Perth in 1999. To do so we staged a revue night of dance, magic, mime and circus. Many in the audience were performers themselves and they were agreeably surprised by the professional manner in which the night was managed. They were particularly impressed by the night juggling routine presented by Tom Stanimirovic, Andrew Blackburn and Barton Magnus and the solo magic performance presented by Glen Panarese. The night raised about \$1,500 for the Convention.

House Drama was slow to get started this year and this was reflected in a drop in the quality of the performances. In some houses, lines were not known and concentration was erratic. On the positive side, three out of the ten plays were written by current or ex-students and they were of a quite good standard. This is something I am very happy to encourage and a cash prize will probably be offered for next year's best student written play.

In term three we presented the musical Moondyne Joe. Two years in the making it combined the historical research done by Bill Edgar with text and lyrics which I wrote based on that research. Most of the lyrics were written in doggerel verse which Stephanie Nicholls cleverly put to music. The musical direction was under the ever capable baton of Phil Venables and choreography by Michelle Babicci. The evocative sets, sound and lighting was created by Adrian Arnold, who decided to have his appendix out the weekend before the show opened. Fortunately we were able to call on the services of an ex student, Ryan Varley, who calmly took over and managed the technical aspects of a show he had had no experience with. The audience response was overwhelmingly positive and the general consensus was that the show needed to be seen by a wider audience than the Hale St Mary's parents. Staff from Fremantle Prison who saw the show, would like it to be staged in the large courtyard there, so we are looking at ways that this might be achieved. One thing is certain we will need the support of a generous sponsor or sponsors for this to happen.

This year we welcomed a second teacher into the Drama Department, Justin Beckett, an ex student of Hale, who has specialized in Media Education. He has brought a much needed vitality to the department having established a media club, expanded the role of media in the Year 10 course and taken an interest in the Circus Club. He has also taught our first Year 11 Drama course and will, in 1999, pioneer the introduction of TEE Drama into Year 11. By 2000, Hale boys will be able to study theatre from Year 8 to Year 12. Justin will also direct a full length play, *Frankenstein* in the first term of next year so keep an eye on the newsletters for further details.

A great deal of work has been done on planning for the Performing Arts Centre. There is still considerable work to be done, finding innovative ways to create a centre with multiple uses, so the year ahead is going to be very exciting as this planning comes to a conclusion and building commences. We also have our eye on the year 2000 and special ways of celebrating this very special year. I certainly would welcome any suggestions readers might have about this.

The Circus, Magic, Theatre and Technicians Clubs have continued to prosper during the year with our Circus Troupe performing to considerable acclaim at a number of public events. This Public Performance Programme is to be greatly expanded next year through a grant from the Ladies' Auxiliary. This money and sponsorship from Peters and Brownes will enable us to convert an old ice cream servery van into a public performance van with its own lighting, sound and staging which can be set up at fetes and festivals or join in processions, etc.

Under Mr Heibner's guidance our Year 9 students have explored aboriginal culture, learning about the important traditional values, rituals and spiritual life of the people through their art.








After a nauseating ride, where many students saw their breakfast for the second time, a bus took them to their accommodation at Kingston Barracks.

That morning and early afternoon was spent in a number of workshops where the students were required to employ their writing, reading, speaking and listening skills in order to complete a range of exercises. Freddo frogs were abundant and this assisted in improving the student morale.

After dinner, the students were divided into groups and began preparation for short theatrical sketches, which were based on a single French phrase and an object. Some props used by the imaginative groups included a dress, a baby's bottle, lipstick, an eggbeater and a bunch of flowers.





The following morning, after a few more workshops, they embarked on a treasure hunt. This began at Thompson Bay and led them far and wide in search of coloured ribbons and questionnaires. Veteran French-speaking students who graduated from Hale last year, Charles Suttie and Duncan Purtill, must also be acknowledged for their efforts also. The French camp was most successful, and hopefully will be run for many years to come.

Alliance exam results

All Year 10, 11 and 12 French students were enrolled in the Alliance exams this year. Our boys were looking forward to measuring their French skills against their fellow students in the State. In 1998, about 1200 students were actually in competition for the first round of exams: reading, writing and listening tasks.

Once again, we were very pleased with the results. All students passed the exam, and a number of boys from each year group were placed in the top thirty in the state. The following boys were invited to compete in the final round, an individual interview, to determine the coveted top ten places in the state: the "veterans" Ben Spagnolo and Christian de Vietri in Year 12 (both students having made the finals in Years 10 and 11), Julian Gray, Anthony Phillips and Alexis Gervais in Year 11 (Alexis was not competing for the major prize due to his background in the language), and Mark Bowden, Lucas Joynt, Nicholas Vautier and Blake Johnson in Year 10.

The competition was fierce and the following boys secured top ten placings:

Ben Spagnolo (2nd) and Christian de Vietri (4th) in Year 12.

Blake Johnson(1st) and Nicholas Vautier (2nd) in Year 10.

As Hale boys have been winning the Year 10 first prize for the last few years (Ben Spagnolo in 1996 and Julian Gray in 1997), we are looking forward to putting our future Year 10's French talents to the test!

Congratulations to all boys who competed and particularly to our 1998 French Stars! Bravo!

English & Creative Writing

What if ...?

What if a student of English not only expressed his personal responses to a text in class – but also had the chance to discuss it with students across the country?

What if he not only brought a play to life in his own imagination – but could also see professionals perform it live and speak with them about their dramatisation?

What if he not only read a novel – but also had the opportunity to sit down and speak with the very author whose name is on the cover?

These are opportunities that can bring the study of English to life for a student, and they are some of the experiences that each Hale student has enjoyed this year. It has always been a policy of the Hale English Department to engage students in the appreciation of literature and personal expression. In 1998, the Department has continued to experiment with new and exciting ways to bring English to life for Hale boys, inside and outside of the classroom.

Hale English teachers have created many opportunities this year for their students to speak and work with the award-winning authors they have studied in class. Some students visited the Fremantle Children's Literature Centre for a discussion and creative writing workshop with award winning author Brian Caswell. Others listened to the ever-popular John Marsden in a presentation at John Curtin High School. The Hale School Archivist, Bill Edgar, helped to arrange a fascinating visit to the School by WA's own Tom Hungerford, and special thanks go to Alex Panarese for making sure that The Hale School Function Room served as the venue for a presentation by "His Majesty of Fantasy", Mr. Terry Pratchett. The boys also enjoyed meeting Isobelle Carmody, Australia's own award winning fantasy writer. She was an instant hit with the students in Years 8 - 10, as she described to them exactly how and why she writes.

Once again the English Department has worked closely with the Hale School Library this year to continue the impressive tradition of the "Authors in Residence Programme." Past visitors to the School have included John Marsden and illustrator Peter Gouldthorpe. This year, students of all ages were thrilled to listen to and work with the multi-talented novelist Margaret Clark. Whether she was working with Year 8s or Year 10s, this energetic woman challenged the boys' perceptions of what it is to be a "writer" and motivated them in formal presentations and informal creative writing workshops to express themselves in their own voices, for their own purposes.

These unique chances to speak and work with the acclaimed authors who appear on the Hale School booklist have proven to be very valuable indeed. Personal encounters with authors make a big difference to the way boys read. When they come face to face with an author, students recognise that literature is not simply "homework" but a personal performance and personal expression. Stories and the art of storytelling are made "real" in such encounters, and many of the boys see the acts of reading and writing in a new and challenging light.

Theatrical excursions and performances sponsored by the Hale English Department have also broadened the students' experience of literature this year. Once again, teachers have made the most of the many theatre opportunities available in this year's Perth Arts Festival, organising student outings to performances such as the highly acclaimed Cloudstreet. The Invisible Circle, and Titanic to name a few. Throughout the year, students also had the chance to enjoy performances such as Shakespeare's Henry IV, Willy Russell's Shirley Valentine, and John Marsden's So Much to Tell You. The popular Troubadour Theatre Group visited the School in Semester one with an innovative and entertaining dramatic celebration of Australian Poetry called "Hot Pies and Potato Crisps". They returned in Semester two to surprise Year 10 students with their own look at Shakespeare's "Macbeth" and brought "Flowers for Algernon" to life for Year 8's, who had studied the text in class prior to the performance. Each performance was followed by discussion sessions in which students could question the actors about staging, acting and interpretation of the text.

While English teachers continue to foster enthusiastic discussion of challenging texts in class, they have also made innovative use of internet technology this year so that students could join in discussions beyond the four walls of the classroom. In cooperation with the Hale School Library, Year 10 English Teachers involved their students in a nation-wide "Book-rap" on Shakespeare's tragedy "Macbeth". Over a number of weeks, students used their School e-mail programmes for crosscountry debate on some of the more controversial aspects of characters, events and themes in Shakespeare's bloody play.

Technical innovations have been used to stretch and support student progress in many areas. Special thanks to the Parents and Friends Association for their support in establishing IDL, the individualised computer programme for students who need supportive work on particular spelling and reading skills. Thanks as well to Jane Walters for her help in implementing the programme and to parent volunteers for helping to staff it.

In his or her own way, every English teacher has done something extra to foster students' progress and to develop the English Curriculum at Hale. Elsewhere in Cygnet, you will see evidence of the many hours that members of the English Department contribute to the development of Language Arts throughout the School community. In his 21st year with the Hale Debating Club, Brian Goldsmith organised a successful year of debating along with Julian Dowse and Tim Parish, while Penny Leiper supervised the Hale Mock Trial Team and Lynn Nunn formed future diplomats with Public Speaking and the United Nations Youth Association. Lynn also offered an after school course to Year 12 boys who were keen to improve their reading and comprehension skills in general. If you were looking for Pat Hughes during lunch time this year, you wouldn't have bothered looking in the dining hall. You would have been more likely to find her offering extra Supportive English lessons to students in Room L5. These are only some of the ways teachers do more for students of English at Hale.

Quite simply it has been another exciting, dynamic year in the English Department, with teachers and students alike taking advantage of new educational approaches.

Mathematics

The number of Hale students actively involved in Mathematics continues to grow. This year there has been a keen interest shown in the competitions and enrichment activities available to students, with some significant achievements in a wide variety of activities.

Have Sum Fun

Of all the inter-school activities this is the one competition that Hale has made a strong claim to owning. This year was no exception. In the Junior division, Hale #1 finished in first place and Hale #2 finished in third place out of 35 teams from schools north of the river. The Hale #1 team of Terence Fuhr, Nicholas Tan, Peter McNamara, Phillip Edwards, Chris Pearce and Anthony Phillips achieved a perfect score of 32 out of 32, and the number two team with Adrian Walker, Peter Clay, Michael Bovell, Siong Lim, Tom Shaw and Tristen Huupponen was not far behind with 27 out of 32. For both teams this was an outstanding effort and they have set a standard that future teams will find difficult to follow.

The Senior teams did not fair as well. However, they were pleased with their final placing given the level of competition. The Hale #1 team of Paul Grgich, Neil Andrews, Michael Stokes, Liam O'Keeffe, Raymond Chow and Brad Harvey finished in eighth position and the "Nick John Six" finished in eleventh position out of thirty teams. Again this was a fine result given the quality of the opposing teams.

Mathematics Olympiad

This year, for the first time, the Junior Olympiad program was based on a team and individual approach. Hale entered four students into the competition; Tristen Huupponen, Johan Yin, Anthony Phillips and Phillip Edwards. The competition consisted of two sections; a three-hour individual section of nine questions and a team section for one hour on one question. Anthony Phillips finished in third position in the individual section and the Hale team finished second in the team section. This was an outstanding result in what is by far the most difficult mathematics competition that middle school students can enter.

In the Senior division of the competition only one student from Hale was invited to enter. Hale's entrant was Peter McNamara who sat the four-hour examination and received a Distinction with a score of 28 out of 35. This was a particularly good result for Peter as he is currently a Year 9 and almost all other students in the Senior division are Year 11 students. This result in fact capped off a very good year for Peter and confirmed that he is one of the best mathematicians to have attended Hale School. In May, Peter was invited to attend a special training camp in Sydney for those students with outstanding ability in mathematics. This was followed by Peter winning his third consecutive medal in the Australian Mathematics Competition (Westpac) in July, coupled with his Distinction in the international Tournament of The Towns. Peter was also one of twenty students to be invited to attend another training camp in Melbourne for possible team membership in the Australian Mathematics Olympiad team for next year. We wish Peter all the best for this preparation and can only marvel at his achievements so far.

Year 10 Mathematics Games Camp

This year Hale was represented by Chris Pearce, Anthony Klobas, Johan Yin and Andrew Hardegen. The competition this year was very strong and the Hale team did very well to finish eighth in what was a tough weekend of problem solving and strategy games. All members of the team enjoyed the experience and our congratulations are extended to the four students involved.

1997 Maths Challenge and Enrichment

The Australian Mathematics Trust runs an for wide program Australian mathematically talented students in Years 7-10. The program is designed to challenge. motivate and encourage students to develop an interest in mathematics not normally covered in the standard mathematics courses. This year Hale entered 26 students in the Challenge stage and 13 in the Enrichment stage. Both stages showed strong performances across the year groups with Peter McNamara, Phillip Edwards, Antony Moser, Terence Fuhr, Philip Georgiou and Nicholas Tan achieving a High Distinction in the Enrichment stage. Those students who have been able to complete both stages have enjoyed the work and there is now a distinct sense of intellectual achievement and reward in completing what were difficult problems. I would like to thank Mr. Shaw for his excellent work with the Year 8 group and Ms Denham for her outstanding work with the Year 9 group.

Design & Technology

This year the Design and Technology Department initiated a number of innovations in the key areas of Graphics and Systems Technology.

Graphics Technology

The Design and Technology Department offered for the first time Graphics Technology D286 in Year 11. Hale School was one of six schools in the state to pilot this new course.

The course is a natural progression for those students undertaking design and technology courses in Years 8, 9 and 10, who then wish at upper school to concentrate on designing products in a variety of graphic and digital formats. The emphasis is for students to graphically communicate their ideas through the production of line and marker drawings and the manipulation of computer generated material. Products are regarded as preproduction prototypes.

Work from this year's group has been of an excellent standard, with much of their work exhibited throughout the School. The group's first major project was to design and model a new range of torches. Many exciting and innovative designs were produced, with work from Owen Leach and Luke Cream being of a particularly high standard.

The design brief asked for a final presentation drawing as well as a model of the torch. Under the guidance of our 'Graphic Artist in Residence' Mr. Jeffery Seah, the students produced some excellent work.

LOWER SCHOOL GRAPHICS


Mr. Seah was also involved in an intensive graphics program for Years 8, 9 and 10 Design and Technology students, and Years 11 and 12 Applied Technology students. The courses concentrated on upgrading student skills in all aspects of graphic communication, with particular emphasis on the production of final presentation drawings in grey and coloured markers.

The program was a great success and ranges of students' work are exhibited in Design Suites 1 and 2.

Systems Technology

This year the School entered into a partnership with the Advanced Manufacturing Technology Centre (AMTC) for the delivery of the National Training Module NM33-Fluid Power Control (Pneumatics) to our Year 12 Systems Technology students.

The course was delivered in approximately 36 hours, with 20 hours at AMTC and the remainder at Hale. The students traveled to



Year 10 Systems - Mechatronics

AMTC each Friday afternoon, Term 2 for study in advance pneumatic circuits such as cascade, sequential and Electro control of pneumatic systems. The course was completed with some work undertaken controlling systems with Programmable Logic Controllers PLC's.

All students passed the course, and now have a valuable National Training Module credit for those entering TAFE next year in addition to their grade for the Systems Technology E 281 course.

PLC'S FOR 1999

In a development towards the end of the year, the Design and Technology Department took advantage of an initiative by GE Fanuc and their agents in Perth, Motherwell Bridge, to supply miniature PLC's into schools for the cost of the software licence only. This not only represents a substantial saving to Hale School but also means that students can now be taken to a higher level in systems control.

A Program of Study will be written for Year 12 students next year as part of their Systems Technology course which will incorporate the use of the PLC's for automatic control of various pneumatic, mechanical and Electromechanical systems. The students will write programs, which are then 'down-loaded' onto the PLC for remote or automatic control of the system. The PLC's and programming language are of an industrial standard and contact with them will raise the students' awareness and programming skills to this level.

MECHATRONICS AT YEAR 10

This year 'Mechatronics' was introduced into the Year 10 Design and Technology curriculum. The course integrates the technologies of Pneumatics, Electronics, Mechanisms and Computer Control. The Program of Study is based on the students writing programs to control a 'Production

Line' that includes the following 'machine centres';

- Component Dispenser
- Conveyer
- Rotating table
- Robotic Arm

Initially the students program the operation of each machine centre, and the final aspect of the course is to program the Production Line for automatic operation. The course is structured for individual and group work and provides a good grounding for those students continuing into Year 11 Systems Technology.

Applied Technology

Applied Technology students again showed their enterprising and community spirit this year with some particularly interesting projects.

Design & Technology

Year 12 students again designed and made some excellent furniture. Michael West took great care to design and make an outdoor chair, made from jarrah and assembled with knock-down fittings. Trevor Piggott researched the legal requirements for the design of a gun cabinet. The specifications for such an item are of course quite stringent, detailing type and thickness of material to be used, locking systems, and fabrication processes. Trevor's' cabinet was skillfully made and satisfied all legal requirements.

The Design and Technology Centre was also used by other Year 11 and 12 students not undertaking DT courses. They came at lunch and after school to work on an array of projects for home and personal use. The boys are most welcome and many produce some excellent pieces of work. Chris Piesse recycled a 100 year old wool press to make a beautiful coffee table. It is a fine example of what can be made from re-cycled materials.






Collage examples of Years 8-12 Graphics Technology





Chemistry

Science

Science Talent Search

The Science Talent Search is the statewide science competition organised by the Science Teachers' Association of Western Australia. The competition involves students proposing a question worthy of scientific investigation, planning and carrying out that investigation, and then reporting their results. Being the premier science competition in this state, nearly 1000 entries were submitted in this year's competition.

This year, Hale School entered five investigations into the Science Talent search. The high standard of the Hale entries into the competition was recognised by all the judges (all practicing secondary science teachers) who awarded a first, a second and third place, as well as two merit awards. Singe 1995 Hale School students have produced a total of fourteen prize-winning entries in this competition.

Scott Murray's outstanding project on the fat content of different kinds of chips was awarded first place in the chemistry division. Second place winners David Scanlan and Remi Cousin produced an interesting (and illuminating) study of the amounts of caffeine present in different cola soft drinks. Andrew Harrington investigated the rates of corrosion of different metals, and how to prevent iron from rusting. For his excellent work, Andrew was awarded third place in the Chemistry division.

Merit awards for a very high standard of work were awarded to Bryce Crage (Biology), as well as to Peter McNamara and Kenta McGrath (Chemistry). Bryce's investigation into the acid tolerance of plants produced some fairly surprising results. Peter and Kenta also made their own soaps, and tested their effectiveness against shop bought soaps, with good results.

The boys worked hard on their experiments

for three hours each Saturday morning, or Thursday night, with the assistance of Mrs. Janet Krueger (Chemistry dept. technician), Greg and Mark Kelman (veterinary students and STAR tutors from Murdoch University) and Janette Head.

Janette Head

Vermiculture

Established in 1997, this project group has undertaken a study of earthworms as environmentally friendly waste decomposers. A large new worm bed, capable of housing nearly one million worms, was purchased this year with funding from the Parents & Friends Association, joining the existing, (much smaller) "wormstead". The worm farms consume much of the food preparation waste from the dining hall, as well as shredded paper from the copy room.

Boys from Years 8 - 10 in all houses are responsible for feeding and watering the worms daily and for extracting worm castings and effluent for use as fertiliser around the grounds. The students are planning how to investigate the effectiveness of worm products as fertiliser, compared to other commercially available fertilisers. They are also preparing to expand the study with special bins placed around the School to collect large amounts of recyclable food waste produced by the students each day.





Behind the banner, the Hale swimming team entered Beatty Park with a touch of confidence and a heap of determination to



Rowing

On behalf of the rowers who will benefit from this fundraiser, I would like to sincerely thank the parents who organised and contributed to the evening and all those who bought tickets and supported the occasion. Similarly, the Rowing Dinner was a memorable evening for all parents, Old Boys and rowers who attended.

1998 was a hard season for Hale rowing, both mentally and physically, for all that participated. Congratulations must go to all rowers and their similarly dedicated parents on a well completed season. Without substantial personal commitment, there would be little reward for our rowers. Each boy should be proud of his efforts. Sincere thanks to Mr Sam McKinney, Master in Charge of Rowing, and to all those who contributed in so many ways to the season of 1998. Best of luck to all future Hale rowers.

During the holidays, three mornings of training were also held. These were well supported with 30 to 50 boys present.







If it were possible to single out a highlight in a season filled with memorable moments, it would have to be the second game against





With extra time spent on getting fully fit before the season commences, this group of rugby players will continue to enjoy the game. Best wishes to everyone next year.


The Year 8 team finished 3rd overall, but such is the closeness between the top teams, that it is not unrealistic for this team to aim

The defeat was only a narrow one which is a testament to the courageous effort made by the debaters, especially William May, who despite having a cold and having trouble being heard, spoke strongly. The following debate saw definite development in the team, Matthew spoke thoughtfully and William's voice improved, resulting in a win over traditional opposition, St. Mary's. The season continued well as John Young began to "put it together" as the season advanced and the team, with later assistance from David Gibson, finished the qualifying rounds with three victories and two losses. Their preparation techniques had improved markedly, as had their confidence as speakers.

The first debate for the Year 8 team based at St. Mary's Anglican School for Girls was on Tuesday the 28th of April. The team consisted of members with varying degrees of experience in debating. Team preparation for the team was generally enthusiastic, however it took some time for the degree of organization required, both in planning and executing the debate, to become second

nature to the participants. The team's season began on a low note with a loss to St. Mary's on the topic "That Australia needs its own culture", their inexperience letting them down. A most encouraging performance in the next debate on a difficult topic at this level, "That ecologically sustainable development is a myth", instilled confidence in the team (Ryan White, Robert Securo and John Zorbas) in the future. The team won only two of their five debates but the knowledge gained was invaluable and this season must be seen as a learning experience for 1999 and beyond.

The Year 8 team, consisting of Nick Maricic, Daniel Spagnolo, Jon Benwell and Philip Georgiou, based at Penrhos College, enjoyed considerable success throughout the season winning three of the five debates and losing the other two by only one point. Developing convincing arguments around topics such as the need for a universal language, the need for Australia to be more like other Asian nations, and that we watch too much TV, all members demonstrated the potential to succeed in future years and can be pleased with their promising entry into the debating arena.

The Year 8 debaters at Christ Church comprised of Edward Bayford, Peter Clay, Terence Fuhr, Sean Jelinek, Edward Mendelson and Paulo Testi all developed their confidence as new debaters and featured in many exciting debates losing two by only one point and winning another by a similarly narrow margin. The boys worked well in

various teams allowing all in the squad to take part in debates over the five rounds. The confidence they gained saw them making significant improvements in all the important aspects of debating by the end of the year.

The junior team at Perth College had a rather inconsistent season, due in part to their inability to field consistently similar personnel. This problem applied as much to the preparation of the team arguments and it proved difficult to adequately plan for a debate when - it seemed - rarely were the five members of the squad available at any one time for lunchtime meetings. In the debates themselves, Tameem Khader tried very hard and improved to a large extent over the year. Andrew Harrington and Bryce Crage applied themselves well and Scott Murray performed the "rescue act" as third speaker of the team on several occasions. This team's finest moment came in the last debate of the season when they had a meritorious win over Perth College on the topic "That independents harm the political process" and in a narrow loss to Swan View I on the topic "That we should spend more on the arts"

The junior team at St. Mary's had high expectations, after appearing in the finals for the previous two years and participating in the grand final at Year 8 level. The team, drawn from squad members Steven Cameron, Chris Bailey, Chris Pearce, James Holborn and Tom Shaw debated several demanding topics such as "That human rights should bow to progress" and "That the engineering of genes should be left to Levi's" with distinction. Two extremely close decisions (one point results are agonizing) meant that the team did not reach the finals this year, despite strong debating.

The third junior team was fortunate to have

many competent debaters who worked well as a team, leading to close results in all debates including three convincing wins. Bradley Redenbach, Chris Rice, Anthony Phillips and Jai Patel spoke with conviction on topics as varied as the limitation of freedom of speech and the interference of the West in Middle East politics. They developed skills in argument style, which improved throughout the year, and in preparation.

The junior squad at Christ church comprised Year 10 students David Dembo, Simon Dawkins, Brett McClarty and Martin Sawtell. The team had a successful year finishing only one win away from the finals. All boys demonstrated improved understanding of debating method and argument and debated with great confidence and purpose.

The first senior team had a majority of inexperienced debaters, and the impromptu section of the competition put their relatively new preparation skills to the test, as did the senior format including points of information. The team, with experienced debater Julian Gray leading the way, put up a spirited fight taking the negative of the topic "That we should stop persecuting the Iraqis", before conceding to the superior skills of the girls from St. Mary's 2. Other topics covered included the nation's responsibility to the Aboriginal people and ecological sustainability, which tested the knowledge of the various team members. A considerable learning curve had been seen before the end of the round-robin season.

The second senior team of Andrew Lodder, Tim Beckett, Adam Bolton, Jeremy Forsyth, Matthew Cornell and Simon Ayling was the most successful WADL team in the School this year, progressing all the way to the WADL quarter-finals. After a very successful qualifying round in which several inexperienced debaters in Jeremy and Simon were given the opportunity to prove their abilities, the team progressed to the first elimination round. Here they met St. Mary's and in a hotly contested debate finished with a comfortable win. Andrew Lodder topscored in the debate and Tim Beckett continued an in-form season, while Simon Ayling proved a solid first speaker. The next round was against eventual winners Christ Church, who counted state debaters in their side. This resulted in a narrow defeat after a split decision from the three adjudicators. Well done to this Year 11 team who have all been awarded symbols for their efforts. Their return as a formidable Year 12 team is eagerly awaited in 1999.

The senior team at Perth College: Ben Spagnolo (Captain of Debating Society), Tim Clay, Tristan Quarles and Matthew Jones, performed at a very high level throughout the season, winning four of their five qualifying debates and progressing to the finals, having topped their division. The first

two debates were on prepared topics, the second of the two presented what seemed like an almost impossible task for the affirmative team on the topic "That population should be controlled by legislation". Hale was allocated the affirmative side of the topic and although the "through legislation" wording presented a problem, Hale's controlled, planned and coordinated delivery saw them through against St. Mary's (A sweet victory indeed). The three impromptu debates which followed concluded the qualifying rounds and despite being very keenly contested Hale's further development of co-ordination and points of information skills held them in good stead. The team won the next two debates and lost a disappointing debate to Swan View SHS 1. The team advanced to the finals and came up against our sister school St. Mary's. The team was handicapped by the absence of two members who were unavoidably lost to a Mock Trial-final being conducted on the same night. In the debate Julian Grigor participated very strongly and Hale was only narrowly defeated, the WADL season coming to a close and having been an enjoyable and successful one.

CONSTITUTIONAL DEBATE

In June a debate took place between senior students from St. Mary's and Hale School, in connection with studies in Law and Government and a general interest in Constitutional matters on the part of the students. The topic for the debate was "That the power to levy income taxes should be extended to the states". This debate took place in the debating chamber of the newly refurbished Constitutional Centre - the old Hale School - a venue which is very well suited to such exercises. Ben Spagnolo officiated from the large, ornate and almost imperial chair-person's "throne" in a thought-provoking debate from the six students who composed both teams. In a high-quality debate Hale was victorious and a handsome tome was presented to the Hale School library dealing with the constitutional development of Western Australia. It is hoped that the "Constitutional debate" will become an annual event on the debating calendar.

AHISA

The AHISA debating competition began in the third-term. Perth College again hosted this competition, which was to take the form of five rounds with no finals. Hale's number of team entries was down on the number entered in the WADL competition, but all teams performed creditably, building on their experiences over the season. This competition is run this year in groups from Years 8-10.

Disappointingly, there was no Year 8 team in this competition. The Year 9 team was, however, an enthusiastic group and contained a new member in Vivek Evanki who committed himself fully. Their season began with a victory over Santa Maria I on the topic "that casinos should fund the government." The members of the team had done a considerable amount of research, and this paid off, the 'new chum' came up well.

During this debating season the team debated in areas such as land rights, media sensationalism and the crime rate, and technology's role in our lives. Anthony Phillips did a fine job of leading the team and Bryce Crage was ever-dependable.

The remarkable degree of involvement of boys in so many aspects of School life impinged on the performance of the Year 10 team. Sporting and music commitments clashed with debating on a number of occasions. As a result of this, the team members were happy to win two of five debates. The final debate of the season was unique in the experience of all team members. Halfway through the first speaker's delivery there was a widespread power failure in Mt Lawley and Perth College was reduced to largely emergency lighting. Many teams abandoned, or rescheduled their debates, but Hale School and Santa Maria College continued, the only problem being the lack of a venue. The debate ended up being contested under the lights at the entrance to PC, being observed, albeit briefly, by the considerable passing traffic! Hale narrowly lost the debate but the experience will long remain with all that participated. The highlight of the team's season came when Chris Pearce, Chris Bailey and Tom Shaw defeated a strong PLC team on the topic "that media rules the world."

The senior division saw three teams being fielded. Over the season the seniors contested five impromptu (unseen topic) debates, and became quite proficient at preparing in one hour. All debates witnessed by this observer – even the final round in the half-dark – illustrated how well the young people in Years 11 and 12 could cope with the demands of the situation.

The Year 11 team, in which Andrew Lodder – who had also been a very successful public speaker during the year – and Tim Beckett were vital members, won four of five, but one was on a forfeit, and Scotch won the division. The second Year 11 team, in which Paul Varne built on the improvement he had shown in the WADL season at St Mary's, and Adrian Lee showed the benefit of his experience, won three of five, CCGS 3 winning the division.

The Year 12 senior team comprising Ben Spagnolo, Tim Clay, Tristan Quarles, Hugo Leath and Julian Grigor completed their final debating season as students at Hale with confidence and skill. Along with CCGS 2 they won four of five debates – some by significant margins – and thus were awarded trophies for topping (equal) their division.

Among the impromptu topics debated were "That the milk of human kindness has turned sour," and one that aroused a considerable degree of mirth "That teaching is a noble profession." The team continued on from its WADL success and only at the last hurdle did it falter. The penultimate debate, against St Marks, attracted an audience which filled the classroom and the cut and thrust of well thought out argument, punctuated by amusing comments and points of information, was a highlight of the season. Similarly so was Hale's argument on the topic "that teaching is a noble profession." This was a very satisfying year's debating from a team of responsible, committed young men.

Public Speaking

This year, Hale has been well represented in a wide variety of public speaking competitions, and we have achieved some very good results. There were two State winners - Andrew Lodder in Year 11, and Ben Spagnolo in Year 12. Andrew won the state final of the Rotary Four Way Public Speaking competition, speaking on the "Global Expansion of Community Service" in relation to the Rotary Four Way test. Ben won the State final of the Royal Commonwealth Society Speech and Leadership Award. Congratulations to these two boys, who have been awarded Colours for their achievement.

We also had two boys who made it through to the State final rounds of their respective competitions. Tim Clay, Year 12, was in the Australia-Britain Society Plain English Speaking competition final, having spoken very convincingly in the preliminary rounds of the competition to reach the final round. Tim has been awarded a symbol for his excellent performance in this prestigious competition. Hugo Leith, Year 12, made it through to the final of the Apex Public Speaking competition.

The Public Speaking club grew in numbers this year and we hope to see a further increase in coming years. The experience gained by the boys was invaluable and all participants in this activity vastly improved

Mock Trial

Hale was able to field three full teams in the 1998 Mock Trial Competition run by the Francis Burt Låw Education Centre. Although success varied between teams, all who participated found the experience enjoyable and rewarding. Team One was composed mainly of Year 12s, while Teams Two and Three comprised a number of experienced Year 11s and 12s, and some Year 10s new to the competition.

Round I saw Hale prosecuting on a matter of theft, namely that of a packet of batteries. Teams One and Two were victorious over Ocean Reef Senior High School One and Mount Lawley Senior High School respectively, with Tim Scholz and Andrew Lodder making successful débuts as advocates for Team Two. Lack of experience rather than enthusiasm resulted in Team Three's defeat to a very polished St. Hilda's team, despite the best efforts of counsel Gareth Smith and Davinder Sandhu.

Hale defended a Mr. John Sam in a motor vehicle collision dispute in Round II at the beginning of second term. The matter itself was complicated by the inclusion of a Traffic Collision Report, which conflicted on key details with the evidence brought by witnesses on both sides. Team One persuaded the magistrate of the existence of contributory negligence, and succeeded in out-performing a very professional Iona team by only one point. Adam Paikos and Julian Gray appeared as counsel for Team Two, with witnesses Jeremy Forsyth and Paul Sharp, but were unsuccessful against Helena College. Team Three unfortunately lost to the Mount Lawley squad that Team Two had beaten in Round I.

In Round III, Hale prosecuted on what perhaps proved to be the most unlikely of a collection of unrealistic, and, at times ridiculous, cases faced this year. The matter involved a charge of assault brought against a parent who was alleged to have applied undue force to his child, and was based solely on the evidence of Nick 'Nosy' Parker who claimed to have heard a slapping sound and seen a red mark on the child's leg. Contentious discussion arose over the role of an ice-cream which Nosy Parker insisted the child had dropped during the course of the assault. Despite the somewhat banal and at times absurd evidence raised by Mr. Parker, strong performances by witnesses Sam Birmingham

and Matthew Jones, and counsel Ben Spagnolo and Hugo Leith, saw Team One victorious over St. Hilda's. Improved crossexamination techniques by barristers Julian Gray and Andrew Lodder were unfortunately not sufficient to secure victory against a second St. Hilda's team, who eventually reached the semi-finals of the competition. Team 3 stalwarts Russell Quinn and Gareth Smith once again took to the bar, this time against Ocean Reef Senior High School. Witnesses Ben Mogyorosy and Andrew Boyatzis, both new to the competition, performed well, but were outclassed by their more experienced Ocean Reef counterparts.

At the end of the compulsory rounds of competition, Team One remained undefeated and was the only Hale team to progress to the first of the elimination rounds. Facing a slightly more complex defense case involving a prosecution for assault occasioning bodily harm, and in the alternative, for common assault, counsel Ben Spagnolo and Hugo Leith once again demonstrated the benefits of experience, as both scored well for Opening and Closing submissions and for crossexamination. With witnesses Tom Wagner and Sam Birmingham, solicitor Anthony

Phillips and magistrate's clerk Matthew Lang on equal points with their Mercedes opponents, Hale relied on the performance of the advocates to win by nine points, and Team One progressed to Round V.

The case on which Hale prosecuted in Round V was a civil matter, and was rendered more intricate by a two-fold suit alleging breach of contract, or in the alternative, negligence on the part of the Wombat Municipal Council. Expertise was again demonstrated by barristers Ben Spagnolo and Hugo Leith, who, through clear submissions and successful objections, led Hale to victory over a very competent Presbyterian Ladies' College team. Matthew Jones and Tristan Quarles, respectively the cheated artist claiming damages, and the supremely self-confident art critic who enlightened us all as to the elements of surrealism in the pre-Raphaelite style of the work in question, portrayed their characters with acumen and subtle humour.

In the semi-final round against Santa Maria, held in the week prior to the commencement of the TEE, Hale undertook what was perhaps the most elaborate of this year's cases in defending builder Fred Brown on a civil claim for \$250 000 in the District Court. Both Hale witnesses performed superbly, with Tristan Quarles succeeding in memorizing a nine-page statement verbatim. Team counsel Ben Spagnolo and Hugo Leith, instructed by solicitor Anthony Phillips, skillfully dealt with exhibits, affidavits, statements of claim and an array of precedent to convince the judge of the validity of the defense's case, and to put Hale into the Grand Final of the competition. It is pleasing to note that the magistrate for Round VI was profuse in his praise for all members of the team in fulfilling their roles in the courtroom, but particularly of Hugo Leith, who, as second barrister, delivered a superb Closing Address which could serve as a model example of its type.

In the final Hale came against very strong competition in the form of an experienced and confident Guildford High School squad. In an intricate case, with an array of legal details, the Hale counsel and witnesses performed well. However, the performance by the Guildford team was nothing short of outstanding, as they showed a wealth of knowledge and legal skill to defeat the then undefeated Hale team. Great performances from all Hale competitors involved, could simply not match the Guildford display. Hale was narrowly defeated in a model example of Mock Trial skill which was indicative of what the competition aimed to achieve. Well done to this team who have performed better than any other Hale team in the competition's history to reach the grand-final.

United Nations Youth Association

Young Achievers Australia

This year, Hale School was represented by an intrepid group of Year 11 entrepreneurs in the Young Achievers Australia competition. Cosponsored by Hale School, Iona College and Bankwest, fourteen boys made the bus trip to the city to meet the nine girls from Iona College, and the business supervisors from Bankwest. Each Monday afternoon these enterprising young people would meet, on the forty second floor of the Bankwest tower, to develop the infra-structure of their company, select a name (Destinya) develop products then sell, sell, sell. The Managing director for Destinya was Faulkner boy, Ed McLarty. Other directors were Jarrad Bailey, (Marketing), Malcolm Guthrie; (Environment), Tom Davies; (Finance), Dane Rose, and later Matt Cornell directed Manufacturing.

Initially, the company elected to develop a

two-product attack on diversely opposing markets. The first product was sheep manure, appropriately named "Ewe-Poo". The second was facial make-up pots; lip gloss, glitters and face creams.

Shares were issued and capital raised to fund materials and advertising. It was choice!

So the profits of the company were quite healthy.

At the time of writing this report, the company is continuing to sell Ewe-Poo by the bag and trailer load, and will turn an increased dividend to their shareholders, just before liquidating their company in October.

Karate

Library

8-15 a.m.

The Library is open and the same early morning faces stream in to check their email and to collect the assignment work done at home last night and sent via email as an attachment to school. Many boys drop in quickly to return their overnight loans - others take the opportunity to borrow a new Ribit book; to browse the new titles: to complain the morning paper is not yet here; to print off the assignment needed for period one; to ask for help in using the scanner; to admire a friend's power point presentation; to pick up their reserved copy of John Marsden's latest book; or even to finish last night's maths homework - again due period one!

Period 1 bell

A Year 9 Literature Circle class and a Year 8 Biology group are at the door; a parent volunteer is shelving the returns and another couple are busily planning a display to promote boolean searching; the first Year 12 private study students sign in and there is a group from Year 10 Geography needing Teacher Librarian guidance; and another from Year 11 Commerce needing to check today's share prices online; a Year 9 English student wants to use the scanner and another is here to book the digital camera.

An exaggeration? Not at all.

Hale School Library is a busy place and its range of functions continues to widen. It is crowded at lunchtime and after school, and is enthusiastically used by both boarders and day boys through to 9pm on Wednesday evenings.

In 1998, minor structural changes have enabled the opening out of the computer area and the installation of more PCs. With additional notebook computers being available after hours, these struggle to cope with the ever increasing demands made upon them. The introduction of student email has also opened up a whole lot of new possibilities for boys.

Year 8 - 10 reading enrichment classes are supported by teacher librarians. In Year 8 Ribit encourages wide and frequent recreational reading and boys enjoy sharing their responses in a variety of ways. Year 9 boys come to Literature Circles prepared to work in with other students reading the same novel. Reading journals encourage reflection and higher level responses . Year 10 boys focus for a term at a time perhaps on an author or genre study, controversial issues in adolescent literature or reading on a particular theme.

All reading enrichment classes are closely linked to and an important part of the boys' English classes. They are supported by many opportunities to meet and talk with authors. In 1998 Hale's author in residence Margaret Clark spent a week sharing her experiences and her work with boys. (See relevant article) The visits to Hale School of authors Isabelle Carmody and Terry Pratchett provided further opportunities for boys, while others attended a writer's workshop with Brian Caswell and the launch of a John Marsden book.

A new display in the Library featuring "Grown up stuff" - adult fiction and non fiction titles - has been enthusiastically received by teachers and some parents. It is hoped to further promote this in 1999 as a means of creating a vital reading community that includes senior students despite all the pressures of the TEE.

How would this be achieved without the support of volunteer parents and senior students?

Information Literacy has been a major thrust in 1999. Subject classes coming to the library do so not just to cut and paste or to photocopy great swathes of data or to produce pretty looking web pages. Information Literacy outcomes have been identified in all learning areas of the National Curriculum Frameworks and a Hale School Information Literacy Skills Continuum developed. Teachers and Teacher Librarians work together to ensure that students have the opportunity to systematically develop and enhance their skills in locating, retrieving and presenting information. Information Literacy outcomes are embedded in all curricula and addressed by all teachers. The Library and the Teacher Librarians will continue to play a vital role in coordinating and supporting Information Literacy for all students.

The Hale Intranet, established late in 1997, has very effectively supported this promotion of Information Literacy. Assignment pages guide students though the Information Process, emphasizing particular skills and guiding students to resources. Students are encouraged to consider just what resources best meet their need - perhaps specially selected library books are more relevant than web pages from some unknown source. Links are provided to subscribed periodical databases, online encyclopaedias and to selected web pages. A Search screen encourages students to choose the appropriate online search tool for their particular need and guides them to appropriate search strategies. Other pages outline strategies to reduce the size of graphics, promote school events,the list goes on. We even have our first departmental and our first House page on the Intranet - the Language Department and Riley House.

Thanks for this development must go to the Student Information Technology Support Group (SITS) and to Teacher Librarian, Mrs Colleen Brady, who has taught us all so much about web authoring this year.

Series of web authoring classes for students, parents and staff have been overwhelmingly popular and will be offered again in 1999. Teacher Librarians have also offered a range of professional development sessions for teachers - searching the web; collaborative online projects; integrating Information Literacy into subject classes and sessions for parents on assisting boys with research at home and on strategies to discourage plagiarism.

5.30 pm (or thereabouts)

A bookseller is just leaving; a number of Junior School teachers are closing down their computers after a session developing web pages; there is a last minute panic to borrow books desperately needed tonight; a student is printing off the passwords so that he can access Ebsco's World Magazine Bank and Electric Library from his home computer; Mrs Davis is returning a novel loaned to her by a student; others are emailing scanned images home for tonight's homework and students are helping to close windows and lift keyboards ready for the cleaners.

The Library staff could not achieve all this without support. The efforts of parents who shelve, cover, imput data, create displays are greatly appreciated. Thanks must go too to the boys who assist at the circulation desk and to the Prefects who support library staff through hectic lunchtimes.

We look forward to what 1999 brings.

Author in Residence

Margaret Clark Interview

Cygnet: Good afternoon Margaret Clark. Could you tell us a little about where you're from?

MC: I'm from Geelong in Victoria I was born in Geelong in Victoria, and I still live there. I went to Manifold State School, and then Geelong High School, and from there I went to a teacher's college.

Cygnet: And when did you decide to become an author?

MC: Well when I was a kid I always did want to be an author and I used to write stories to win book prizes, or to win money so I could buy books, and I loved reading and I loved writing and I had penfriends...I just loved to write. I thought maybe I'd be an adult author, writing adult books but somehow or other I ended up writing children's books.

Cygnet: And what would you consider are your influences as an author?

MC: I've thought about this question a lot, because no-one in my family was a writer or an author, and I think I had the influence of grandparents who read to me a lot and a mother and father who had a great love of books, and also two maiden aunts who had never married who were university educated and were called in those days

"blue stocking" aunts and they read to me a lot, and I got the love of books from those people.

Cygnet: And what other authors do you particularly enjoy?

MC: I don't have a particularly favourite author, I read all sorts of things. I read very widely, so, if I have a choice, I may read nonfictional history, but I could equally enjoy Patrick Whiting, I could equally enjoy a woman's magazine, or equally Patricia Cornwall. It wouldn't worry me.

Cygnet: And when you write do you find that you target your books at a specific audience?

MC: There's several ways of doing it. Sometimes I have requests from publishers who are saying "Would you write a book for six to nine year olds of one thousand words and we need it in an adventure genre, are you interested?" and I think "Oh, yes I can do that". Or it may be an issue that I want to tackle, such as the book "No Fat Chicks" which is looking at a lot of stereotypical views which males and females both hold and I wanted to explore those issues, so that is clearly a book that is targeted at young adults or older teenagers.

Cygnet: So when you write a book, do you already have a fairly definite impression in your mind as to where it's going to end up?

MC: A fair impression of who I'm targeting, yes, because otherwise it wouldn't work. I think my advice to anyone who's thinking of writing is to get their target audience into their head.

Cygnet: And what do you plan to do in the future?

MC: In the future I will be writing more books, and interestingly because the publishing world is changing, I've actually sat down with one publisher, my major publisher at Random House and worked out a marketing plan for the next three years, which is a pretty radical thing for authors to do but I enjoy doing that because it gives me an overview of how many books I need to write. So it's not prescriptive in that if I get an idea for something I can't do it, it's not going to stifle my creativity, so what I'm needing to look at is maybe writing a teenage books that's in a humour genre, a genre and a couple of little kids books in adventure, and that helps me plan it in my head as a marketing exercise because being an author isn't just about being creative, it's also about planning and marketing as to how you're going to do the PR for each book.

Cygnet: So you see your writing as a fairly commercial enterprise?

MC: For me, it is a commercial enterprise and I enjoy it. Another part for me though is that it is a creative enterprise. I can blend the two I can't write something if someone asked me to be prescriptive nor can I write about something I'm not interested in. So, for example, if you ask me to write a short story about a Turkish boy living in Afghanistan or something, I can't do it unless I go there or unless I've got a particularly passionate point of view that I want to do I can only write about what I know or what I've experienced. So that's the creative bit. The commercial bit is getting the biggest coverage I can for my particular book and in that way I suppose I'm looking at when I'm putting it out because the publishers often help me with that, like you don't put a book about summer out in the middle of winter, there's a whole lot of marketing things you have to learn. I see that as useful because it helps more people access my books.

Cygnet: Margaret Clark, thank you very much.



Student Technology Support Group

The Student Information Technology Support group (SITS) was established mid 1997 to support the institution of the Hale Intranet. This consisted of a small core group of senior boys highly experienced in web authoring and was coordinated by Mrs. Robin Wake, head of library.

Throughout 1998, Year 11 students Omar Hafez, Anthony Phillips and Michael Stokes have worked with teacher librarians Mrs. Colleen Brady and Mrs. Robin Wake to develop and maintain the Hale Intranet to reflect life at Hale, to provide a communication medium and to support the learning program of the School. It has been pleasing too to have the other boys express interests in developing their web authoring abilities or in contributing to the Intranet as photographers. Contributors include Andrew Goninon, Anthony Livanos, Tim Croft, Callum Poultney and Kunal Topandasani. SITS doesn't work like most clubs in the School. Meetings of the whole group are infrequent and most of our communication is by email. While web authoring packages Front Page and Hotdog Pro, supported by graphics software including Corel Draw, are available on the School network, the boys tend to work at home supporting one another by email. Often the demand for a new group of pages arises with little notice and these boys have generously accommodated these demands. They then email their pages to school and implement them in a working file on the network, ready to be loaded on the Hale Intranet itself.

Features of their work this year are many and include pages reflecting School events such as author in residence Margaret Clark's visit and the musical "Moondyne Joe"; creation of image maps such as the searching guide, which is the key resource locating tool in the School; cgi scripts, which actually mount a student's own server at home; assignments guiding the students through the information process; and the maintenance of links to useful sites. The ability of students in the SITS group to utilise the advanced capabilities of graphics software has greatly enhanced the appearance of the Hale Intranet.

In 1998 the Hale Intranet is recognised as an important element in life at Hale School. The SITS group has done a superb job both in establishing the Hale Intranet as a valued part of our School curricula and in interesting a growing number of boys in web authoring. Hopefully these boys will be part of the Hale Student Information Technology Group in future years.

Rottnest Re-Afforestation

On the cold and blustery morning of the 28th June 1998, a group of twenty Year 12's gathered at the E Shed Dock, Fremantle, for the beginning of the annual Re-afforestation Camp on Rottnest Island. The boys were well prepared for the task ahead of them, having spent one lunchtime a week since late 1997, learning and practising the skills they would be using on the island. We also looked forward, quite confidently, to having a large amount of free time for various leisure pursuits such as: surfing, fishing, riding, relaxing, all in the knowledge that we didn't have to go to school.

The day we arrived, a Sunday, was given to us to familiarise ourselves with the island. though most of us chose only to acquaint ourselves with the bakery and Red Rooster. The major method of transport on the island is by bicycle and for those of us who didn't bring our own, it was by rented bicycles. The chalets we stayed in were located in Geordie Bay, on the Western edge and a pleasant one-kilometre ride from the Thompson Settlement. The remainder of the first day was spent organising who was to sleep where and also, where the old boys who accompanied us were to stay. The island authorities had allowed us four chalets, two containing six beds and the others four. The old boys who made the trip with us were: Matthew Beckett, Brendon Tyrell and David Reed. Their enthusiasm, energy and humour served to make the trip that much more enjoyable.

On the second day we started the routine that was to be followed for the rest of the week.

We rose at a reasonable time in the morning, broke our fasts with a variety of cereals (a choice between Coco Pops and Corn Flakes) and toast before setting out on our bikes to where the rangers met us. The organiser of the trip concerning the Rottnest end of things, was Mr.Hansen, (known affectionately to us as Chaz) and the two rangers who helped out were Paul and Spike.

Despite the cold and unrelenting wind, we all settled down to the seemingly endless task of planting trees. Our enthusiasm was dulled by the enormity of the chore ahead of us. There were literally thousands of Rottnest Island Pines and Tea Trees waiting for us at the site. It appeared that Hale Boys had made quite a reputation on the island for consistent hard work. As a result, we felt the need to demonstrate this yet again and perhaps attempt to break last year's record. (Yet in each boy's mind the same thought rang out ' Is this all we're doing here?' ' Is this all we came here for?') But soon we settled down into the task at hand, and thoughts of lunch occupied our minds.

Lunch for the following days became quite a contentious issue. On the first day a select group of boys rode back to the chalets and prepared sandwiches for the rest of us. This might have turned out to be a valuable course in food preparation for some, had it not been for unfortunate incidents involving the strange creations of Adam Chazen, consisting of, at worst, Mustard and Peanut Butter and at best, Vegemite and Vegemite. It was then that we learned that there are some things you will never eat, no matter how hungry you think you are. After this it was decided that the Old Boys should be sent back to make the lunches instead, it would be much safer. This became the pattern for the next few days, with the morning consisting of planting trees and wishing the lunches would hurry up. We all felt we had learned something, especially about Rottnest Island Pine and perhaps a little about ourselves. On behalf of the group I would like to thank Mr. Kenny and the Old Boys who participated for organising, preparing and putting up with us for all that time. Also thanks on behalf of Mr. Hansen and the Rottnest Island Rangers, to Mr. Inverarity, for allowing and supporting this valuable community exercise.

Finally some light at the end of the tunnel. Having set out in 1996 to implement an Outdoor Education Program from Year 4 to Year 10, the structure is almost in place.

Much to the dismay of some stalwarts, whose comfort zone had been disrupted, some camps have been replaced, some swapped around and still other new ones developed, in a gargantuan effort to align them all in a sequenced educational process.

On reflection, the result at the end of the implementation period is pleasing. There will be a total of 34 camp groups in 1999. In an area which receives little to no feedback from students or parents, and which has no way of quantifying any success, it only takes one or two such students a year to reaffirm our strong beliefs in the importance of our existence.

Camp Report

As we drove up the long familiar road leading to the second most important place in my life, I thought of the long, hot, tiring weekend ahead.

We arrived at school at the normal time of 8.15 am, but instead of going into school through the back we had to drive through the front entrance and make two right turns to the Outdoor Education shed. As my mum pulled into the car park I felt a rush of anxiety as I saw my 18 companions with all their gear spread along the concrete driveway leading into the large metal shed, which holds a variety of camping







equipment. I slung the whole 14kg of my bag onto my shoulder and set off towards my friends who were standing in a circle around a concrete slab, which was probably the opening of some underground pipe network. We chatted briefly before I dropped my pack and went with mum to talk to Murray about my medical equipment. Murray was only one of four specially trained supervisors, but he was by far the biggest. After this, mum left and my friends and I sat ourselves down and in the two hours that followed we were introduced to the other professional supervisors, Jas, Alicia and Greg and we were taught how to pack properly.

Following this we started our long and hot journey to Lancelin, but before we knew it we had stopped, not at Lancelin but a mere 45 minutes up the road at Joondalup Shopping Centre. Greg told us we had a 50 minute break before we had to leave. Most





of us took advantage of the last fast food we would have for three and a half days – that's a whole 76 hours! I mean, we treated this as a matter of life or death, and for some of us it could have been, seeing we weren't first class chefs.

At 12:45pm, we headed off again and it was another 2 hours before we reached Lancelin, where we dropped off the boats, and then drove 15 minutes back down the road. Then for some stupid reason (well we all thought it was), we dropped off two of our instructors, Jas and Alicia, and our backpacks, and I'll tell you it was awkward to be carrying it for what felt like an hour and soon the weight of the large purple backpack started to bother me. My shoulders began to hurt as I felt the weight of the pack increasing as if someone was putting an extra kilogram of weight into it the further we went. The sand flies started biting and buzzing around and they became

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very annoying, very quickly. The sun's fiery heat pounded down on us and we started to cook. The soft sand track became treacherous as fatigue set in. The rotting dunes seemed endless and there was no sight of the end. My water began to run out and refilling the small blue bottle on the side of my pack wasn't going to happen as our short breaks weren't long enough to remove anything from our packs and put it back in.

At the end of our walk we were in the thick of the bush and only about 100 metres from the beach. The campsite was a small clearing that had been used as a turning point for vehicles. I sat down and absorbed the atmosphere. The beautiful soft white sand covered with sharp spinefex needles that covered the campsite in golden brown patches and looked very man-made. The ground was flat and the sides were sharp like garden grass that had been hacked with a whipper snipper. To my right was a clearly defined track leading to the beach and to my left there was another track, but this one resembled the campsite and directly behind me, a half-hidden track was emerging from the thick campsite and swerving back towards Lancelin.

From our semi-circle we agreed on three things. 1) Where the tents should go. 2) Where the cooking area should be and 3) Where the toilet should be, which seemed to be the most important thing. With my tent partner Remi, half of the group went off with Jas while the rest went with Alicia. This was the part where we learnt how to erect a tent. WOW! Jas soon showed us what to do and we all went away to try to put ours up. Remi and I were too slow and we couldn't figure out just how to fit our tent into our designated area. So we were shoved into the cooking area and the cooking area was moved up the track. We only had 30 minutes left before we had to start cooking, and we still hadn't managed to erect our tent properly. Boy does time fly where you're having fun!

The first night's meal was spaghetti bolognese and for one unlucky group they had just bolognese as they unfortunately dropped their spaghetti into the slops pit. Our group had the most food, the least people and the smallest tummies. We had the second, third and fourth smallest people on camp. Also one of us was a vegetarian, so that meant we had more meat for the other three also with the best cook on the camp – ME!

The meal was almost perfect except for the fact that we had only one pot to cook in and the spaghetti went cold while we were cooking the meat. After dinner, we cleaned up and headed for our tents to play cards, tell jokes between the tents, and, as we were totally exhausted, it wasn't long before we

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hit the old sleeping bag and had a good night's rest.

The next morning was hell. Firstly, I couldn't get my gear back into my backpack. It was like putting 3 litres of liquid into a 2 litre bottle and secondly, Remi and I had trouble taking down our tent. In fact, our cooking group helped us so that they could eat because if you didn't have your tent down by 7.30am, you couldn't eat. This leads on to my third and final, terrible event of the morning ... no brekkie! I was the only one who didn't manage to get breakfast. Remi managed to grab some biscuits while the other two in our group gulped down a hurried breakfast of powdered milk and weet-bix. At this point I promised myself that I would be much more organised as I was not going to miss breakfast again.

I slung my pack over my back and walked the supposedly short journey to the bus. It felt like forever. About a third of the way to the bus I cracked. I had no energy, no will and 10kg on my back and was lagging by 30-40 metres behind the rest of the group. Jas stopped and encouraged me to continue but I had thoroughly convinced myself that I couldn't carry on. Despite this, I did manage to carry on even though I felt glum as I was in the morning heat with a couple of thousand flies and a 20 minute walk to go along a sandy, hilly path. Somewhere in the bottom of my soul I found the energy I needed to press on and get to the bus.

When we arrived at our new destination, I got off the bus gloomily, got changed into my wetsuit and headed to the beach. The water glistened a blue-green as the morning sun shone. The calm, reefy waters showed little sign of action but the thunderous waves roaring out at sea gave the atmosphere tension and made the reef water seem like a luke warm reception.

Murray showed us how to use the paddles and shortly after this I set out in a boat with Alex La Volpicella. We headed directly out into the small waves which were forming about 50 meters from the shore and proceeded from here to catch them. Alex soon began to nag at me as I was the weaker of us both, so I headed back to shore and within a minute the others were called in for lunch. Lunch consisted of a doit-yourself sandwich but we were kept to the following rules:

- · 1 piece of ham per sandwich
- · 1 piece of salami per sandwich
- 2 pieces of bread per sandwich
- · 1 piece of cheese per sandwich

We were also allowed as much tomato, lettuce, fruit chutney, mayonnaise or Philadelphia cheese as we liked. I had three







sandwiches, consisting of everything but the Philadelphia cheese and I can tell you now, lunch tastes absolutely fantastic when you haven't eaten any breakfast. After lunch we were given about an hour and a half to relax in the afternoon sun which gently warmed the ground I lay on. But it all went too quickly and before I knew it I was back in a kayak heading against the wind. The wind was strong and we were weak, a simple equation. We lost. We were blown back about 30 metres and then picked up by Murray in the speed boat and taken to our destination, a little island which was no more than a few rocks that rose above sea level.

I spent most of what was left of our time at sea on this island whilst some of the other pairs went surfing in the kayaks. The trip back was easy, we were just blown along.

Weary from the day's excitement, I made

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my way back to my stuff, changed into dry clothes and got on the bus. The rest of the day passed quite quickly. We had lamb and veggie's with rice for dinner, then played cards again till late then slept, and somewhere in between there we set up our tents. The next morning was much the same as the last with the exception of breakfast, which I managed to have.

The next day we were going to paddle out to a small island about 750 metres from our starting point. The wind was behind us so it was going to be much easier than the previous days toil up to the smaller island. I got on the bus and followed what now seemed a familiar routine. Up at Hale's property to collect the boats, then down the road and back towards the beach. From here we went up to the change rooms and got back into our wetsuits. Mine was still damp form the previous day and as I slip my arms into the cold, wet sleeves, a shiver ran down my spine. I ran into the sunlight to gather as much warmth as possible. I slowly made my way towards the kayaks in my soggy state.

Today I was to be paired with the second weakest person there. So it was going to be a harder journey to the island. We headed out into the water diagonally towards the island. We had a good start with the wind behind us but the swell was much higher than it seemed from the shore. The waves started picking us up and slamming us down as if it were a spoilt child picking us up and throwing us away just as quickly.


It's funny how much small things can annoy you when you're frustrated. The buckle strap of my helmet was rubbing against my chin creating a small red sore. My partner and I may not have been the strongest, but we were probably the smartest - we beat three other boats by using our brains. We determined the quickest route and this gave us an advantage. As I pulled the boat into shore, I caught a glimpse of a flock of birds flying overhead. We struggled to pull our boat onto the shore. From here we went across to the motor boat to get the food. The sandwich making kit was in a large blue esky and there was also a barrel of fruit. Sitting on the sand I ate an orange and took in the beautiful scenery of the island, and whilst playing noughts and crosses in the sand I saw a rather large flock of greyish looking birds flutter overhead. We were just minding our own business, not doing any harm, when they decided to ping us, or just Alex as it turned out.

Soon after this we set off on our walk. We went up the sandy bay which stretched all of 150 metres and then we strolled along a small reefy section, not knowing what was around the corner. At first glance it didn't look promising as there was a sheer wall of

rock which hung above us to the left. The walk, however, turned out to be a fascinating journey with its warm. turquoise lagoons and its soft welcoming seaweed and all the sea animals I had so carefully studied in Marine Biology earlier this year. It was a beautiful setting and was actually what I thought of as one of the better things in life. Later on we paddled back to shore and I was definitely looking forward to a good night's sleep.

Today was going to be different. We weren't going kayaking or going to do anything with our and boats. we certainly weren't going to sit on our butts or stand up all day and if you went face first you were going to end up with a face full of sand. Today, we were going Sand-Boarding. This

was absolutely fantastic and by far the best event. We trudged up the side of 25 foot dunes and raced down in less than 30 seconds. There were stacks, falls and injuries, but it didn't stop anyone from having a great time. I grabbed the board as my turn came and plummeted down one of the smaller slopes gaining speed quickly and had to dive off before hitting the harder sand at the bottom. The one thing I didn't like was walking all the way up the steep sides of the dunes and then after all the hard work having to give the board to someone else. This didn't deter me from having a good time though. Next time I got the board I was going to do the bigger slope up the dune a bit. This dune was not quite as steep but much longer and had a rocky bottom which once again deterred me from going all the way. Then I decided to go down the steeper slope and be the first to do it. I couldn't even see the bottom so I wasn't sure if it was going to be rocky or sandy. Unluckily for me it was a rocky finish and I had to bail. After all that, I looked back up the dune to see Remi 30ft away and awaiting his go. From then on we tried different styles of making our way to the bottom of the dunes. We went down face first, as tandems, and we even had some races.

Hale/MLC New Zealand Ski Trip

After a late Saturday night for some, the group of Hale boys and MLC girls assembled at the Perth Domestic airport for the beginning of the 1998 Hale/MLC Ski Trip, and another late night. Surprisingly, no one forgot their passports or anything else important, so, after almost an hour delay on the flight, our group walked out of Auckland airport to see our bus for the first time, we were not impressed. Luckily this was the Geraldton SHS bus, who we would be seeing quite a lot of. Our bus was the one behind theirs, holding a quite bit higher star rating.

The first day was spent getting from Auckland to Rotorua, where we were treated to a traditional Hangi meal for tea. and a fairly flash hotel. The whole trip down had been commentated over by our enthusiastic bus driver, John, who insisted on telling us the whole story of New Zealand. We were happy to get to bed that night. Dans la famille

It didn't take long to fit into the family and feel welcome. After the initial wave of questions such as "Do you ride kangaroos to school?", "Are there crocodiles in your pool?" and "Do you have cinema in Australia? There's this movie called Titanic..." we realized that home life in France was very similar to that in Australia, with the main exception being mealtime. The first thing we noticed about the meals was that at every meal the whole family would sit around the table as if at a restaurant. Tap water was never drunk, only the bought, bottled type.

Speaking French was not as difficult as expected. Everyone was always ready to help with grammar and a dictionary always came in handy.

À l'école

The next day was spent at school. We all went off with our respective host brothers and sisters to either école or lycée. This is one of the major contrasts between France and Australia, the schools. Not only do they have alternative school systems, times and such, but during school it is a lot different. Every morning at the school, everyone would shake hands in greeting, but another major distinction was that everyone got along fine. No bullying at all, and it wasn't because of harsh bullying rules or teachers cracking down on kids, but just because everyone respected everyone else. Perhaps Australian schools should take a few tips from French schools.

À Paris

Paris is beautiful to say the least. Most of us were taken on the tourist run by our families and it was breathtaking. The massive Tour Eiffel, the historic Arc de Triomphe, the stunning Chateau de Versailles and the expensive Champs Elysees. Normandie

After the week in Paris, we said farewell and headed off to Tours, a town southwest of Paris, by train. We met our second family, stayed with them for a few days and then our group of eight met up at the train station for our trip to Poitiers. After reaching Poitiers, we were taken by taxi to the Parc du Futuroscope. This theme park styled science exhibit is like a window into the future. Full of things like 3D surround cinemas, simulated roller coasters and many other weird and wonderful things to do. Most of these cinemas screened excellent movies, the whole group gained essential knowledge we never knew we needed about yachting and animal life.

After leaving the park, we went back and stayed at a small hotel in town. We spent the next day shopping and sampling local food, before returning to our families in Tours.

The Fourth Japan-Australia Student Exchange Program

The fourth Japan-Australia student exchange program took place from the 18th to the 28th August, 1998. We were pleased to welcome fifteen students, and four staff members from the Washimiya Board of Education, in Washimiya Town, Saitama Prefecture, Japan. Hale established a sister relationship to promote educational, cultural, athletic and other related activities for mutual exchange with Washimiya in 1992. Hale students who study Japanese have visited Washimiya Town for cultural exchange three times in the past seven years. Hale School families have also hosted students from Washimiya four times in the past eight years.

The Washimiya visitors, consisting of sixteen students and four staff members, arrived at Perth International Airport at 6:10am on the 18th August. The group was taken from the airport for a tour of the



city immediately after customs and quarantine clearance. They were tremendously impressed by the excellent views of Perth from Kings Park. After briefly visiting UWA, the Yacht Club and Barrack Street Jetty, they departed for Hay Street Mall. They visited Forest Plaza, the General Post Office, and the Perth Railway Station before stopping at the Museum and Art Gallery. Then the students left Perth City to feed the black swans at Lake Monger, and to look at the Indian Ocean along the West Coast Highway. Although it was a four hour tour, taken immediately after their ten hour flight from Japan, they enjoyed all the sights immensely. They also gained an overall picture of Perth in terms of geography, art, and history before arriving at Hale School for the special welcome assembly.

A brief meeting was arranged to introduce the host friends and the host families to the Japanese visitors after school in the Hale School foyer. They were all quite excited and some Hale students met with their host friends from previous tours to Japan. The Japanese visitors went home with their host families for their first night in Perth.

As part of the students' introduction to Australian culture, the Washimiya group attended lessons with their host friends at Hale School from the 19th to the 21st of August. They became a real part of the Hale community, attended different classes and even participated in the cross country.

One lunchtime was devoted to a cultural demonstration by the Washimiya students and many students from Hale became involved in activities such as calligraphy, paper folding, top spinning and picking up jelly beans with chopsticks. A demonstration of traditional Japanese folk dancing was given in full costume and some Hale students were even roped into participating in the fascinating display. Despite some difficulty in communicating, the Washimiya students made many friends and built a good reputation for themselves amongst the Hale students and staff.

A most successful and enjoyable barbecue picnic was held during the weekend of Sunday 23rd of August at the farm of Mr and Mrs McLarty by Lake Clifton. A great time was had by all and thanks must go to the McLarty family for their generosity. A separate three days stay in Barekup had been organised by the Washimiya visitors themselves in which they used to visit the local Aboriginal community to learn about their culture, experience different aspects of the Australian environment and to gain an understanding of Australians rural life.

The excursions and School activities continued in Perth from the 27th to the 28th of August. They visited Underwater World on the first day, preferring being underwater than outside in the pouring rain. On the next day they attended their last two periods at Hale School after which they visited Scitech and took their last look at Perth City.

The Sayonara party was held from 3:45 to 5:00 after school on the Friday, in the Hale School function room.. The students and the staff from Washimiya and Hale, the host families, and the volunteer helpers for the program all attended. The group performed a Japanese song with recorder accompaniment and most of the party joined in the traditional folk dance. Presentations were made to the group and each Japanese student delivered a speech which was very

impressive since they were done in English without help. They expressed their thanks to the Host families and said just how much they enjoyed their stay in Perth.

The program was a great success and it was a wonderful opportunity for Hale students to improve their language skills and experience Japanese culture. The school as a whole benefited from experiencing a different culture and in sharing the lives of people from other countries. Prize Winners

1998 TEE

The 1998 TEE results were outstandingly good, improving even further on the excellent 1997 results. Three students achieved General Exhibitions: Ben Spagnolo (TES 500.6, 3rd in the state overall), Nicholas John (TES 470.4, 23rd in the state) and Paul Isaachsen (TES 460.10, 33rd in the state). Subject Exhibitions (top of the state) were also achieved by Ben in Ancient History and French and by Nicholas, in English. Twelve Certificates of Distinction were awarded to Hale students: Ben Spagnolo (Ancient History, English Literature, French), Nicholas John (Chemistry, English), Tim Clay (Chemistry), Davinder Sandhu (English), Sam Birmingham (Geography), Jeffrey Allen (Physics), Courtenay Greig (Physics), Alexander Hardie (Physics), Brian Grayson (Discrete Mathematics).

Academic Honours were awarded to Ben Spagnolo, Nicholas John and Paul Isaachsen. Academic Colours were awarded to Davinder Sandhu, Sam Birmingham, Jeffrey Allen and Brian Grayson. All students mentioned above now hold Academic Honours or Colours.

131 students out of the 1998 Year 12 population of 157 were university bound, and gained a Tertiary Entrance Score. 26 were taking TAFE-bound courses with 3 or more CAF (non-TEE subjects) and 20 out

of this 26 undertook the structured-workbased learning programme called CareerLink, which involves industry placements and training one day per week.

Of the 131 TEE students, 24 gained scores over 400. This is 18% of the total compared to 5% gaining over 400 for the state as a whole. The mean TES of the 1998 cohort was 343.8, the highest for ten years. This compares to the state mean TES of approximately 296.5. 59 students, a very significant number of 1998 Year 12, scored over 350, which would give them entry to most university courses in WA.
