# Editorial.

As we appear at the conclusion of this term, we leave behind us the three busiest months in the School year. Our own sports took place a fortnight after term began and were very successful; then the Annual Show absorbed the attention of the agricultural aspirants; and a week later came the Inter-School Sports. Our hopes were high, as we had practised more than in previous years, but in most events we were completely outclassed. Then followed the stress of the final preparations for the Adelaide Examinations, intermingled with diligent practice at cricket. The nightmare of the examinations at length over, the Cup matches and the Inter-School shooting and swimming were hastened on, owing to a desire to have everything completed by the first week in December. With our old-time cricket reputation to keep up, we were very keen on winning the Alcock Cup, especially as we had the lead by one match. It was a severe blow to lose our captain (Montgomerv i.). who was the best all round player in the team ; the eleven was rather on the small side ; there were several good bats in it, but the fielding was poor on the whole. Granted an element of chance in all matches, yet we ought not to throw our chance away by weak fielding. The School has a reputation for good fielding, which all must endeavour to maintain. That there is plenty of enthusiasm is evidenced by the fact that on many occasions practice has been held in the early mornings before breakfast. Only let the material available be well trained and coached, and we feel sure the School is still capable of maintaining its former proud position at cricket.

And here we would like to call the attention of all Old Boys to the stirring appeal made to them by the Headmaster on the occasion of the annual Prize-giving. Our three rivals have obtained new and up-to-date buildings by means of borrowed capital. Cannot the Old Boys of P.H.S. have as much faith in their own old School, and let it have the required capital to establish it permanently, an asset alike to State and City ?

Our middle page is occupied by a School Song, which we hope may find favour with all to whom the School is dear. We owe a debt of

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gratitude to Mr. William Stephens, who has composed the music for us, and in doing so has not been anxious, like so many composers, merely to make a display of his technical resources, but has remembered the sort of occasion on which such a song as this will be sung, by voices which are not always those of a trained choir. He has, therefore, given us a broad, open melody, in a simple key, free from difficult intervals, and restricted so severely in range as to be within the reach of any voice. It is written in march time, and the accompaniment is easy for the player, and helpful throughout to the voices. With all these merits, it will, we trust, be sung lustily and with a good courage, and be welcomed as a means of giving articulate expression to the deep affection in which many of us hold the School. In a song like this we can let ourselves go, perhaps more than would seem quite proper in speech or ordinary talk, and we can shew clearly that in word and deed we are always mindful of the motto: --

## Speech Day.

On 18th August the prizes were presented to the successful boys by His Excellency the Governor. As the new uniforms had not arrived, the Cadet Corps was not able to turn out. There were on the platform His Excellency Sir Gerald Strickland, the Head Master and Masters of the School, the Board of Governors, and the Examiners. Reports were read by Mr. C. S. Hutchison, B.A., examiner in Greek, Latin and French; the Rev. C. H. D. Grimes, M.A., examiner in Mathematics; and Mr. A. Sanderson, B.A., examiner in English. The Head Master then spoke, referring with regret to the deaths of Mr. Stevenson and Mr. A. G. O. Pain, who were both connected with the School, the former being Sports Master for many years and the latter examiner in Classics. Old Boys in England were doing very well. Mr. Faulkner also touched on the urgent need for new school buildings. He said that Old Boys in the North were very rich, and he would like to tell them that new buildings were badly wanted. At present they had to compete against people who could raise £30,000 for buildings. In conclusion, he said that with the help of the Old Boys, parents, and the Government, the School could be put on a good foundation, but as long as possible the Masters would strive to make the School successful. Mr. Battye then spoke, referring to the state of the School buildings. and expressing his regret that the City Council did not condemn them, thus making somebody take some action which he thought would be for the good of the School.

The prizes were then distributed by His Excellency, who said in the course of his speech that the High School was a stepping stone to the English Universities. Although a University of Western Australia would be a great boon, he thought that it should in no way serve to

break away from those of England. His Excellency also endorsed the remarks of the Head Master with regard to the Old Boys' duty towards their School. Concluding, he said he hoped that the prize-winners and their relatives would do all in their power to assist in securing new buildings to carry on the good work which was being done at present by the School. A vote of thanks was then accorded His Excellency, after which the gymnasium display was given.

## MR. R. A. SHOLL'S GAMES' CHALLENGE CUP.

The Annual Ball was held as usual in St. Mary's Hall, Colin Street, in the evening. It was a great success, under the painstaking care of the honorary secretaries E. M. Riley and R. J. Lodge, who were greatly assisted by a committee of ladies, consisting of Mrs. Ewing and Mrs. McDougal (presidents), and Mesdames Faulkner, Clifton, Riley, Hillman, Jenkins, Harrison, Anthoness, Makeham, Mathews, McDonald, Leschen, McMillan, Davy. Many other ladies very kindly assisted in decorating the hall, which was exquisite. There were just over 200 people present, the majority of whom participated in dancing. The floor and music were good and a most enjoyable evening was spent, and all were very sorry when the programme was finished—about 2 o'clock. We are grateful to the members of the Association who subscribed for the ball, and also the Headmaster, who very kindly again gave the hall. A most delicate supper was provided by the ladies.

## Mandurah Trip.

After the success of last year's trip to Rottnest, everyone in the sixth was very keen to go again with Mr. Noake for a fortnight's reading party. We had hoped to go to Rottnest again, but unfortunately improvements were being carried out there, and no quarters were available. We only heard this a couple of days before the term ended, and so rather than abandon the trip Mr. Noake telegraphed to Mandurah and we secured a cottage. We left on Monday morning, August 21, a party of 10: — Mr. Noake, Riley i., Riley ii., Leschen, Goadby, McDonald, Makeham, McCullough, Montgomery ii., and Davies-Moore. Montgomery i. was unable to come owing to his having hurt his knee again, and Thomas was a week late, as he had dental affairs to be attended to. Arrived at Pinjarrah, we met Mr. Lowe and his pupil (Victor Barber), and after lunch we left in a family coach for Mandurah. The report of the cottage was very discouraging, but we ventured its

enough. The marsh gas came up very heavily, and we all crowded indoors with fires going all the time. We were up early next morning and after a dip and some breakfast. Mr. Noake went to try and find another cottage. He succeeded in getting a four-roomed cottage owned by Whittaker Bros., and we crossed over the river to our new quarters in the afternoon. Forthwith a mighty stench warned us of the presence of a deceased bullock. It was not hard to find the corpse. It was very hard to approach, and everyone found they had urgent desire for a bathe. However, Squirtoes set it burning, and after tea we all stoked up plentifully. About ten that night Fritz was missing, so was a boat. A search was made and he was discovered at eleven-thirty, snugly fishing (?) under the bridge. Half the family had gone to bed : the rest made cocoa and made a good poise, and then we went and danced around the cull till 1.30 a m. On Wednesday we wasted a lot of time, and did not begin work till ten o'clock, only two hours work being done. We went for a good swim and annoved cook by being late for dinner. In the afternoon all went fishing and boating, except a couple who went to Peel Inlet on the bikes. On Thursday a full three hours work was done, and the afternoon was spent visiting Mr. Slee and rowing down to the bar. Fishing was futile except in Mr. Slee's pet nook. ## Sports.

Our Annual Sports were held at the Association Ground on Thursday, October 5; the weather was good and the sports were a great success. The handicapping was even, resulting in some close finishes. Owing to the sudden departure of Mr. Lowe for his home in Victoria, we could not arrange to go our Annual Tour to the Eastern Districts. The Headmaster said it would be very inconvenient only to have three masters left at School, so he thought it best to cancel it this year. We are sorry to disappoint our kind friends in the country, but we hope the Tour will take place as usual next year.

During the holidays the School ground was grassed between the east fence and the turf wicket. The grass is growing well and will be firm enough to play on next term. The number of boys on the roll is 101. Four new boys came this term :-Brimage, Butcher, House, and Peet. House is a boarder.

K. Lefroy has been away for the term on his father's station in the Nor'-West.

A. H. Scott has been absent owing to ill-health.

W. Lowe has gone down to Balingup for six months.

Last term ten boys left:-Lodge i., Curthoys, Draper, Jacoby, Rogers, Randell i., Wardell-Johnson, Rose, Ziegler, Hayward.

Lodge i. entered the School February, 1908. He was in the cricket and football elevens, being captain of the football this year; he was stroke of the second crew and ran in the Inter-School Sports. He was elected prefect by the boys in February and by the Headmaster in May of this year, and was head boarder for 18 months. He has now gone up to Roebourne, where he is working in Dalgety's.

Curthoys has gone to work in the Treasury.

Rose is also going into the Public Service.

Draper has gone to Mr. Field's Preparatory School in North Wales He writes to say he is quite happy there.

Randell i. deserves praise for his work at the gym. last term. He has now gone to learn farming at Barton and is working very hard.

The parades this term have mostly been devoted to squad drill. Early in September we were promised that uniforms would be served out soon, and on the 26th we were marched from School out to the Drill Shed. After waiting half an hour for "arrangements," portions of uniforms were distributed to about half the company, but very few of the breeches fitted their allotted owners. It appears as if the tailors have a set size for boys by age, and that the uniforms are expected to "grow" along with their unhappy possessors. Those who can get into their uniform have, as we predicted, the appearance of being connected with the turf. The great fault lies in the pants, which

are too small at the knee to allow the foot to pass through, and yet higher up there is enough cloth for two pairs. The shirts are good, and comfortable. The belts and slings are good for 100 years' service; but the hat is hideous, and destroys any possibility of a company looking smart.

The Company is slowly getting smarter and, if all work hard, it will be efficient at the end of the military year. Both subalterns are leaving this term; the Captain is energetic as ever, and tries to instil a true British spirit into the Company. There are still some who contrive to provide more trouble than is necessary; let them abandon it for the sake of the more diligent members. The Junior Cadets have done nothing as yet in the way of drill, but they get plenty of physical training in the gymnasium.

## Cricket.

We have not been so successful at cricket as we had hoped. When term began we had only lost three members of the team which was unbeaten by any school at the end of last season, and we were leading for the Alcock Cup by two points. Our captain (A. B. Montgomery) had left. He was one of the best bowlers there has been at a Secondary School, and we missed him enormously; whilst in Lodge i. we lost a wicket-keeper who was fast improving into a first-class man. G.O. Montgomery was almost unanimously elected Captain, with Leschen as Vice-Captain. It looked as though there was plenty of good material from which to fill the three vacancies. Ogborne went behind the stumps and shaped well at first, but latterly has been very disappointing. At present, both behind the stumps and when batting he is over anxious : confidence will come with experience. Another promising wicketkeeper is Clarke; he was included in the team against S.C., but sprained his thumb before the match against C.E.G.S. For the rest Thomas, Loton, Cadd, Johns, Davies-Moore and Mathews were the most conspicuous at practice, and Thomas and Loton are both becoming good bats.

A great misfortune befell us a week before the Cup matches, when Montgomery i., in attempting a short run at C.T.C., wrenched his knee

again and became unable to play for the rest of this season. He was a promising captain, a steady bat and a good break bowler, and we deeply sympathise with him for his ill-luck.

#### CUP MATCHES.

At the end of last season we were leading for the Alcock Cup, having won three matches; C.B.C. had won two and S.C. one. This term we only won one Cup match—against C.E.G.S.—and that by a narrow margin. C.B.C. have won two and S.C. all three. Scotch College defeated us after a very even game, and then by a brilliant victory over C.B.C, brought all three schools level for the Alcock Cup. As the tour had been abandoned we were eager to play off; but C.B.C. wished to break up early on December 6, so by a curious arrangement, all three names will be engraved on the Cup.

Two of our matches were played on the east wicket of the W.A.C.A. ground, and this largely accounts for the poor scores on both sides. None of the Cup match wickets have been nearly as good as the wickets we practised on. We hope this state of affairs will not occur again.

On November 27 we played the first Cup match against C.B.C. Leschen won the toss and sent our opponents in on a fair wicket. Lefroy ii. got their first two wickets for 16, and then Appel was missed badly five times before he reached 20; and, backed up by Zowe, Rodriguez, Boor and LeCheminant, carried the total to 200, before he was caught by Loton. His score of 109 is the first century ever made against P.H.S. in a Cup match, and that through our bad fielding, For us the brunt of the bowling was borne by Leschen and the Lefrov brothers. Lefroy ii. is now a good swerve bowler, with plenty of sting ere he gets tired. The last C.B.C. wicket fell shortly before lunch, and Leschen and Lefroy i. went in ; the wicket was now crumbling and Leschen was caught off a bumping ball before lunch. In the afternoon further disaster came and five were out for 23, when a fine partnershipby Loton and Lefroy ii. carried the score to 80. The innings closed for 86. We followed on, hoping to force things; but Leschen and Lefroy i. were run out through mistakes, and Riley i. was caught on the boundary, five wickets being down for 20. Thomas and Montgomery ii. brought the total to 69 and Cadd added 18; but we could not save the innings defeat, being 23 runs short. Appel bowled well for C.B.C., getting eleven wickets for 41 runs in the two innings.
