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EDITORIAL

At the time of going to press, the talk of the town will be the Empire Games. Perth is still regarded somewhat as a town at the moment, but we hope that it will rise from its present status to become one of the recognized cities of the Commonwealth, let alone the world. There is an air of expectancy as Perth awaits the rising tide of its visitors but, once the tide has swept in, will they really enhance our development by returning home with good reports?

Yet while this activity continues generally around us, we at Hale School cannot help but notice the tremendous development which has taken place more intimately around us. With our move to Wembley Downs, the past two years have seen one of the oldest public schools in Australia transformed into one of the newest. But we have not been contented to rest on our laurels at this stage. The face of even a new school such as ours began to change almost immediately as the Old Boys' Memorial Hall went up, and more recently, the new Junior School wing was added, and of course, our new swimming pool opened and in use. However, how can we, the boys of the School, best use these facilities? Once again the question of School Spirit arises, but we will depart slightly from the accepted definition, which involves schoolboys cheering fanatically for the School teams and grudgingly turning up to mid-term matches, to offer this thought. We want a spirit whereby the boys of the School will learn to be co-operative and appreciate just what they have at their feet, not simply to use them as though the amenities were only for them, but to think of the other boys who will come after them. This means letting the other fellow do whatever foolish things he wishes to do, while holding oneself in restraint, which applies very aptly to Interschool meetings. The Honour of the School is always at stake, for however much boys may try to bluff it off, adults do take note of a school's conduct in public.

As the plans for the School become further implemented, an air of expectancy, blended with an air of doubt, surrounds it. Will the boys of the School realize how much they have had laid before them, or will they just take it all and give no return in appreciation? We at Hale School, just like the State as a whole, have reached a stage where our future development will depend on how many people realize our potential, which is why we started talking of the Empire Games.

FIRST TERM, 1962

CHOOL

SCHOOL BEGAN ON THE 6TH FEBRUARY—a week earlier this year. This day marked the first assembly in the new Old Boys' Memorial Hall, which was opened on Sunday, February 4th. The House Prefects were then announced, from whom the School Prefects would be chosen at a later date. The school welcomed several new masters as well as a great number of new boys.

As usual, sporting activities began immediately and after only a short while P. L. Bandy was appointed Captain of Cricket for 1962 and N. M. Staines was appointed Stroke of the First Eight.

On the 22nd February the following boys were appointed as School Prefects: W. J. Garland, D. J. Gray, J. S. Readhead, T. H. Sharp, N. M. Staines, J. B. Stawell, R. J. Stewart, D. R. Stow, A. M. Trethowan, J. M. Williams.

The First XI played its first Darlot Cup match on the 23rd and 24th February against Guildford and, although both sides played well, the opposing team won.

February the 23rd saw another interesting School Swimming Sports, resulting in a win for Buntine House.

On March 1st, T. H. Sharp was appointed Captain of the School.

On March 2nd and 3rd the First XI played and defeated Wesley College.

Old Boys' Day this year was held on March 5th and was the first one in their new Memorial Hall. As usual, the cricket match between the First XI and Old Boys XI followed the Assembly.

The Inter-School Swimming Sports were held at Guildford on Saturday, March 10th. Hale finished fourth. Congratulations must go to Guildford, who were once again winners.

On the day before the Swimming Sports, J. G. Barker was appointed Captain of Swimming.

On 17th March we held our Annual Rowing Regatta and Hale rowed most favourably against the other Schools.

That same week-end the First XI played Christ Church, but unfortunately were defeated.

The Wesley Regatta was held on March 24th, but Hale did not fare so well this time.

The First XI was defeated in its Darlot Cup match with Aquinas on March 23rd and 24th. However, we were the only School not defeated outright by the strong Aquinas team.

On Friday, 13th April, the Rowers' Assembly was held. Mr. Little presented the coxes with their megaphones and gave the crews and the School a most encouraging speech.

Our First VIII managed only sixth position in the Head of the River, but raced their best under most unfavourable conditions. Congratulations must go to the strong Guildford and Aquinas crews, which came first and second respectively.

The Rowers' Dance was held on the Saturday night of the 1st April and was acknowledged by everyone to be most enjoyable.

On Thursday, 19th April, the School broke up for the Easter weekend.

The term exams, which had begun on Wednesday 18th, were resumed on Tuesday and Wednesday after Easter.

On the 25th April, Bishop Riley conducted an Anzac Day Memorial Service in the Hall.

The Army and A.T.C. Cadets commenced their annual Cadet camp on Monday, 30th April, and the following day the Naval Cadets left for their camp.

On May 3rd, the School broke up for the annual May holidays.

SECOND TERM

Term commenced on the 22nd May and Football, Hockey and Rugby practices began immediately.

J. B. Stawell was appointed Captain of Football and, although in our first Alcock Cup Match the First XVIII was defeated by the strong Scotch team, we managed to secure our revenge by winning the next three matches against Guildford, Wesley and Christ Church respectively.

This term, House football began for the first time under the House system. There were two teams, a Junior and a Senior one, each of which fielded twelve men. Buntine House won the competition and Riley House was runner-up.

During the term the Headmaster announced the appointment of three new Prefects. They were P. L. Bandy, G. L. Thompson and R. S. Wilson.

The Captain of Hockey this year was R. J. Montgomery and the unsuccessful team played all its matches with great determination and spirit, and was in most cases only narrowly defeated.

• The Old Boys' Dinner this year was held on the night of Saturday the 16th June, followed the next day by the Old Boys' Church Service.

Our First XV Rugby team, led by D. B. Daniels, played with outstanding success this term, winning all but a few of its matches.

In the second round of the Alcock Cup Football matches our First XVIII met with little success and was defeated by all but Guildford.

On the 11th August the Prefects' Dance was held in the Old Boys' Memorial Hall. It was the gaily decorated Hall's first dance and proved to one of the most successful ever held. Johnny Regan and his band excelled in their usual style and it was not long before they swung into Charlestons, Can Cans, Twists and Cha Chas, adding even more to the exciting atmosphere.

The Lower School Play and School Concert was held on the 14th and 15th of August. It was the first time in some years that some of the School's musical talent was displayed. The whole show turned out to be most enjoyable and successful.

The 16th August marked the end of term and the beginning of two and a half weeks' holiday.

THIRD TERM

The term began on Tuesday, 4th September. On the following Saturday the Inter-House Athletic Sports were held at the School Oval. Faulkner House gained the most points, while J. B. Stawell was Open Champion.

The Athletic Squad smartly began their rigorous 5-week training programme, coached by Mr. Haydock and captained by J. B. Stawell.

The week-end of the 15th and 16th September marked the Cadets Bivouac at the Avon Valley. There was no Passing Out Parade this year, the bivouac being held in its place.

On Thursday, 20th September, His Grace the Archbishop visited the School and addressed the boys.

Later in the month P. Mallabone was appointed a Prefect.

The 5th Cadet Brigade Trophy Shoot was held on the 6th October, but unfortunately the Hale team did not prove too successful.

The Inter-School Athletic Sports were held on October 13th. A full account will be found elsewhere.


The School was very privileged to have Sir Valston E. Hancock open the Swimming Pool on October 6th. Sir Valston, a prominent Old Boy, is now chief of the Air Staff in Australia.

On Thursday, 25th October the Rev. David Sheppard, a member of the touring M.C.C. team, visited the School and gave a most inspiring address. The following Sunday evening he preached the sermon at the School's Evensong Service.

Both of these visits are recorded elsewhere.

On Tuesday, 31st October, we had the privilege of seeing the Australian Olympic Swimming Team in action in the School pool. The various sections of the School were given half-an-hour off to watch them at their training, between 9.30 and 11.30 a.m.

The same day nine cricketers had the rare opportunity of fielding for a Test side, when they went to the W.A.C.A. and stopped, or tried to stop, not a few "hot" ones from the English Test team.



SWIMMING POOL

The Pool was officially opened for use on Saturday, 6th October, by an Old Boy, Air Marshal Sir Valston E. Hancock, K.B.E., C.B., D.F.C.

The opening was followed by a Carnival among our own and local Primary Schools, and a diving display by representatives of the West Australian Amateur Diving Association.

In view of the support given to the project by Old Boys of the School, it was appropriate that the first race should be won by David Lilburne, son of Dr. G. D. R. Lilburne, an Old Boy of considerable athletic prowess.

The Pool is of Olympic length, carrying eight lanes, 6ft. 3in. apart. Its dimensions are 165ft. 0in. x 54ft. 0in. and the depth slopes from 3ft. 6in. to 5ft. 6in., then dropping sharply to a depth of 11ft. 6in. at the diving boards, which are 1 metre and 3 metres above water level.

The pool is tiled with white non-absorbent ceramic mosaic tiles and the surrounding edge tiled with light blue ceramic tiles.

The entire water within the pool is treated chemically and filtered during a turn-over period of eight to ten hours.

Recessed steps obviate dangerous projections.

The pool is ideally situated in close proximity to the changing rooms, with a background of trees on the East side. There is a large paved area for sunbathing and some protection on the West is afforded by a substantial slope that has been planted with grass.

Apart from the improvement in swimming standards which must result, having the pool will revolutionise life in the hot months for Boarders in particular and make the lot of swimming coaches much easier and more productive of results.

The School's thanks go especially to those through whose initiative the pool followed so quickly on our moving to Wembley Downs.

VISIT OF REV. DAVID SHEPPARD

The School was delighted and honoured to have English Test Cricketer, Rev. David Sheppard, with us on three separate occasions during his visit to W.A.

First he came and gave some fifty or so keen young cricketers some hints on how to play the game and spared them a very generous amount of his time batting to their bowling. Perhaps it is needless to say that he was not bowled.

Then he talked to the whole school at Assembly, not on cricket, and the hushed silence that immediately followed this talk was probably a greater tribute to his transparent sincerity than the clapping that soon broke out.

Finally he preached at the Boarders' Sunday Night service in the Memorial Hall, when some six of his team mates sat among us at Evensong.

A number of Parents and Friends were present and afterwards he met some of the Prefects at the Headmaster's House. We were glad to welcome also a representation from Guildford Grammar School.

Though we cannot be so unpatriotic as to wish that the Rev. Sheppard's team wins the Test Series, we shall, now we feel we know him so well, be not a little sympathetic when he goes in to bat against us.

Speech Night

SPEECH NIGHT WAS HELD ON MONDAY, DECEMBER 11TH, on what has come to be known as the Chapel Green, in front of the administration block. The School was privileged in having as Guest of Honour, THE HON. DAVID BRAND, M.L.A., PREMIER OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA. After the National Anthem had been played, the School Chaplain said the Opening Prayer. Then followed the Captain of School's Report and the Headmaster's Report. The Premier then presented the scholastic prizes and sports trophies.

At the conclusion of the evening, a vote of thanks to the Premier was given by the Chairman of the Board of Governors and Benediction was said by Bishop Freeth.

Headmaster's Report

"YOUR GRACE, MR. PREMIER, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, BOYS OF THE SCHOOL,-

"It gives me much pleasure to present this, my second report as Headmaster of the School. I find that it seems a very long time since we met together for Speech Day last year, to say good-bye to the site at Havelock Street which had housed the School since 1914. I suppose that this, our first Speech Night at the new School at Wembley Downs, is of equal historical significance, and those of us who have attended it will, perhaps, with some sense of excitement, recall this, the first of what we trust will be a great many Speech Nights which this site and these buildings will witness."

The Headmaster then continued, reviewing the change from the old to the new School and he paid tribute to the staff and boys alike and said that thanks to their co-operation, teaching had begun by the third day of First Term. He said that it had been their task to instil the soul of the old School into the new buildings. In further tribute to the staff, the Headmaster said that we were fortunate in having "— a group of men who have

a sense of what a great school should be and who have set to work to make this new School at Wembley Downs conform to that image, at times in spite of most frustrating situations."

He paid a special tribute to the Deputy Headmaster, Mr. Marshall, to Mr. Hoar and Mr. Milne, in charge of the Boarding Houses, and to the Chaplain. The Headmaster also said that the onerous tasks of the five day boy Housemasters had been well tackled, the aim of the new system being substantially achieved. This led the Headmaster to refer to staff changes for the coming year.

He expressed his regret at Mr. Kruse's having to leave to continue further studies and announced that his position as Housemaster of Riley would be filled by Mr. Wheeler. Leaving also would be Mr. Wall, Dr. Pusenjak and Mr. Davies, who had successfully established a small Naval Cadet Unit. Speaking of our gains, the Headmaster said that Mr. Quade-Smith, who had been Education Officer in the R.A.A.F., would take over Mr. Wall's former task of Guidance Officer. Into the Maths. and Science departments, the Headmaster said, were coming Mr. Van Hattem, who had served with distinction with the Royal Netherlands Navy; Mr. Farthing, a Sydney Science graduate and trained teacher; and Mr. Gardiner. Music appreciation classes would be taken over by Mr. Bennett, a graduate from the Sydney Conservatorium of Music and Sydney Teachers' College, who would also be able to teach secondary school subjects. Amongst his projects were assistance in the production of a Gilbert and Sullivan Opera, a Band for the Cadet Corps and a School Orchestra. Mention was made of Mr. Drake's pioneering effort in introducing Woodwork, in addition to his normal subjects, in the School curriculum. The Headmaster added that Mr. Haskett was on his way from England to join the staff to teach this subject. He thanked Mr. Barker from the Education Department, who had taken the extra classes in Technical Drawing, but who would now be leaving us.

The Headmaster then referred to the Lower School and pointed out the strenuous task Mr. Mill had had. He said that enrolments here were not quite as large as he had hoped and that this could be due to transport problems and prevailing economic conditions. Though admitting that the State primary education system was good, he wondered if parents saw the advantages offered by the small classes at Hale School. He also said that the School would be losing the services of Mrs. de Rouffignac, who had been with the School since 1949, and Mr. Fletcher, who felt the call of his Church to Missionary Service in New Guinea. The Headmaster said that the Missionary work in New

tion. He would be replaced by Mr. Lovelady, an Old Boy of the School, while Mrs. Haskett would replace Mrs. De Rouffignac. Mr. and Mrs. Haskett would be taking charge of the Junior Boarding House and would act "in loco parentis" to them.

Thanking the Bursar and his staff, the Headmaster went on to say that the fruits of their work could be seen in the satisfactory state of the domestic and administrative arrangements and in the state of the grounds, where incidentally something like 400 trees and shrubs had now been planted.

The Headmaster thanked the Parents and Friends' Association, which contributed £500 worth of books to the Library, now under heavy use. He also thanked Masters and friends outside the School who had helped coach teams. Special thanks were offered to Mr. Pat Trouchet, who was stepping down from the position of coach of the 1st VIII.

Reference was then made by the Headmaster to numerous building projects in the School. The first was the Old Boys' Memorial Hall, which, he said, was to be opened on February 4th, 1962, by His Excellency the Governor. Then the School gates donated by the Prefects, past and present, from dance profits were mentioned. The Olympic Swimming Pool, "a most generous gesture on the part of the Old Boys," it was hoped would be ready for the beginning of 1st Term, 1962.

It was then announced that a new Junior School was considered necessary and would be ready by the beginning of 1963. The present Junior School would be used for secondary classes, which would allow a reduction in class size from 35 to 32, a great step to the desired 30. Following on from this, the Headmaster referred to the rising fees. He mentioned that to overcome this, classes could be increased in size, and teaching salaries cut, both being very undesirable. He informed us that probate duty on endowments for building had been lifted, a small help. He said that in a country where so little is spent per head of population on education, Independent schools must show the courage to set their standards by those of the leading countries in education. Besides providing sure educational facilities and training boys so that they might earn money once they leave school, a far greater aim was to educate boys for life in the world today.

The Headmaster continued to say:

"We live in an age of change and many of the changes now taking place around us are necessary, but we are also seeing changes in society which strike at the very roots of our Christian civilisation. This School must never be merely reactionary, but, at the same time, we must stand firm for Christian principles which know no change, while re-thinking their application in each new situation that faces us." The need was expressed for a partnership between the School and the home in teaching the principles of living. He said that parents of high-school age children must not let them be too unrestricted. The control which is exercised should be gradually relaxed to the genuine friendship and partnership which parents can exercise with grown up children. Though a school may help—we hope •greatly—the home remains, and should remain, the supreme influence in a child's life.

In conclusion, I would extend the School's good wishes to all boys who are leaving, and to parents who are "leaving". We hope that you will all retain the keen interest which you have shown in the School, the boys through active membership of the Old Haleians' Association, and parents through the Parents and Friends' Association, remembering that, even though you may cease to be a parent of a boy in the School, you do not cease to come into the category of a friend."

Captain of School's Report

"Your Grace, Mr. Premier, Members of the Board of Governors, Headmaster, Ladies and Gentlemen,---

"The School year began with the extremely early appointment of the School Prefects and these began to exert their "prefectorial powers" from the very first morning of return to School. Undoubtedly this did not cater for the tastes of some who wished for a laxer and more congenial air to circulate for the first week, and for evermore.

"However, I will not bother you with the internal policies and breaches thereof, but will go on to that which, in the public eye, makes a School either strong or weak—SPORT. We redeemed ourselves in many fields this year, but when you are asked by some innocently serious person "Who won the cricket?" and you are forced to point out politely that "we did," you begin to realise that the only way to obtain public notice is either to use neon signs or win the Rowing, Swimming or Athletics.

"It is hard to gain your first wins, but the moral boost these wins give produces further wins and an uplift in spirit. "So we won the Cricket. The team followed a good Captain, who inspired winning by his sheer contempt of losing. Irvine undoubtedly won half our matches, but the team recovered some lacking enthusiasm and went ahead and carried on to accomplish possession of the Darlot Cup.

"The rowers found it hard to keep with the heavier and stronger crews of other schools and as a result managed to fill only fifth place. With no Rossers or Durstons coming up amongst the ranks, every boy must be prepared to exert himself to the full, for in no other sport does co-ordination mean so much. Trophies do NOT come on silver platters.

"The Swimming and Athletics can be grouped together: in both we came fourth, the step to second place in the Swimming being only ten points away. Our straight events in both sports are well above average, but our field events, backstroke and breaststroke leave us struggling to raise our position on the board.

"We finished third in the Football and I hope to see the remains of a very young team go on to win, if not next year, the year after. Football is not a soft sport and any thoughts of beautiful appearances and of "whether my hair is nicely combed" must be forgotten as you smash your way in to get THAT ball. It matters little what happens to the opposition, so long as you have only the ball in mind, and "may doctors help him who obstructs you."

"From this you may have begun to think that I place too much emphasis on sport, so I will pass on to some of our other activities.

"The best way to express yourself, for those not so adept at sport, is to take part in the school play and show yourself for two or three nights. Mr. Kruse produced the play, "The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial," held at Cygnet Hall, by way of an old method of having the stage centrally positioned. This brought the actors closer to the audience, and so emphasised realism.

"Debaters sometimes found themselves confronted with difficult subjects, but at all times they attempted to do their best. Theirs was not an altogether easy task, especially with the number of people attending varying so from debate to debate. Some very good debates were held, but unfortunately these were sometimes met with near silence from the rather small audience.

"Our contributions to charity surpassed previous years, with keen rivalry existing between the two Boarding Houses. The day boy Houses, at times, did not enter into the spirit of things and consequently contributions from these sections were low. The tenacity with which some boys clung to their money was appalling. Nevertheless, we raised well over £200.

"Principally, you come to School to learn. This is an individual's responsibility, and the familiar cry of "in the long run it's up to you" from the masters should have reached through to the majority by the time "Junior" is reached. Then of course, you have the reverse case when the student works and has no play—hence Jack is a dull boy. The use of sport as a charactercreator is universal and has long been proved successful. So, for those that play too much—work a little more—and for those who work too much—play a little more.

"The point I have been trying to make is—If you go to School only because the Education Department specifies it, and if you come to this School only because father says so, then I suggest you think a little more constructively and really put something into your surroundings. Maybe they'll give something in exchange."





Barton broke the Under 17 Mile record with a time of 4 min. 59.5 secs.; W. Drewe claimed two records, the Under 16 Mile and 880 Yards with the times of 5 min. 7 secs. and 2 min. 7.5 secs. respectively; K. Minson set a new time of 55.5 secs. for the Under 16 440 Yards. Hantke was the only Under 15 record breaker, putting 37 ft. 8% in. In the Under 13 competition P. Evans broke the 75 Yards record with the time of 9.6 secs. and O'Halloran set a height of 4 ft. 4 in. in the Under 13 High Jump.

During the eliminations on the Wednesday preceding the sports Julian Stawell broke the Open 100 Yards record with a time of 10.1 secs.; B. Strickland broke the Under 17 120 Yards Hurdles record in 16.4 secs.; Paul Skinner was another recordbreaker, putting the Under 16 Shot 41 ft. 8½ in.; I. Collins set a new Under 14 75 Yards Hurdles record of 11.3 secs.

Interschool Sports

SATURDAY, 13th OCTOBER, 1962.

The Interschool Athletic Sports were again held at the W.A.C.A. grounds. It was a warm, cloudless day, with no breeze in the afternoon. It was not the weather on the day, but the weather of the preceding week which made the grass track slow, thus allowing only one track record and two field event records on the day.

Outstanding performances from the Hale team were given by Stawell in winning the Open 220 Yards and coming second in the 100 Yards. Alas, after the 100 Yards Julian had a recurrence of the leg injury from which he had suffered at a previous meeting, and he had no choice but to withdraw from the Open Hundred and Open Relay. But despite this set back the Open division fought on. Bill Drewe won the Under 17 Second Division Mile in a time faster than that of the First Division. 





SECOND TERM



OPERETTA — "THE PIRATES OF PENZANCE"

This year was an historic one for Hale in both the musical and dramatic life of the school. Our first operetta was produced before some 3,000 people over five nights and was the first production in the Old Haleians' Memorial Hall. The production was of "The Pirates of Penzance", by W. S. Gilbert and Arthur Sullivan, alternatively titled "The Slave of Duty", appropriately

enough as our school motto is "Duty". It was a real school effort, involving some 100 boys, 9 masters and 30 old boys, parents and friends.

The Women's Auxiliary of the VIIth British Empire and Commonwealth Games requested two repeat performances of the operetta to aid the Games Appeal. The boys gave up a part of their holidays to rehearse for these performances.

"Pirates", as the operetta was commonly called by the boys, was produced by Mr. J. D. Bambach, who had joined the staff last year, coming from Sydney where he had produced other "Gilbert and Sullivans" in schools.

The musical direction was shared by two masters. In 1961 Mr. A. S. Fletcher was musical director, but he left the staff at the end of the year to take up work as a missionary in Papua, New Guinea. This year the responsibility was taken over by Mr. G. M. Bennett, who had come from Sydney to join the staff as Music Master.

Many thanks to these masters for, without their untiring efforts, the successful production would not have been possible.

Our sincere thanks are also due to Peter Bandy, who gave up much valuable time to accompany the boys on the piano at all rehearsals as well as performances.

All in all, the production was of tremendous value for the boys who took part, and of great historical significance for the school as a whole. We are sure it will live for ever in the minds of all who were in the cast or saw it.



CRITIQUE

The production had a freshness and vitality which I think came from the sheer joy the cast had from performing it. All boys seemed to enter whole-heartedly into the spirit of the operetta. The choruses showed this very obviously and the result was that General Stanley's daughters had feminine charm and mannerisms as they skipped around the stage in their colourful Victorian costumes, the pirates looked tough but had tender hearts, and the policemen showed precision in drill, a superficially bold front and created the intended comic relief in Act II.

The staging, scenery, lighting, costuming and make-up were all very well done and created a total impression of colour and theatrical realism.

In true Gilbert and Sullivan tradition, the performances were led by an orchestra, the first of such scope in Hale's history, which added extra brightness and interest to the operetta as a whole.

The principal leads all sang and acted well. Frederic (M. Ryan) was continually placed on the spot where his honour was concerned, by his comrades, the Pirate King (R. J. Montgomery) and Samuel (D. H. Haselhurst). He was also persistently pursued by that beguiling Pirate wench, Ruth (B. A. R. Doncon). However, Fred's true love appeared as Mabel (R. I. Hartley), the daughter of a fast-talking but slightly befuddled Major-General (D. I. Freedman). Attempts to straighten out the mixup which ensued were begun by the slow, ponderous and balding Sergeant-of-Police (A M. Trethowan) but all to no avail. In the end, however, everything turned out all right. It always does in Gilbert and Sullivan.

Particular mention should be made of the very fine singing of Mabel and Ruth, the polished acting of the Major-General and Sergeant-of-Police, the animation and robustness of Samuel and the Pirate King, the confident handling of the difficult Frederic part, and the delightful Edith, Kate and Isabel.

The operetta was performed on April 26th, 27th, 28th and May 21st and 22nd.

An important requisition this year was the "Encyclopedia Americana." This magnificent set has already proved its worth in many fields, its articles on single countries being especially valuable. Its purchase was made possible by the grant of part of a bequest made to the school by the late A. Rich, Esq., an Old Haleian.

Last year, a circulating library was purchased cheaply, and work has been proceeding in sorting the books. Grimy, happy boarders have been taking teachests full of books from the "book mine" under the science buildings, where the old library has been kept, and have been distributing the books to the most appropriate sources—school library, the boarding houses and the Junior house.

Among the many improvements is a fine electric clock which has been placed on the west wall, but owing to mischievous fingers frequently turning it off, is duly being replaced by a battery-operated one. A notice board was installed for items of library interest and magazine racks were placed along the bench supplied to give easy access to the magazines and primarily to keep them in good condition.

It is regrettable that fines have had to be introduced to curb the increase in overdue books. This system is working perfectly but there has been no immediate decrease in overdue books.

This opportunity must be taken to thank the Head Librarian and his committee for their efficiency throughout the year.

A note for those who are leaving:

The ability to read a novel in a critical way and to choose a novel with discrimination is something which will be of great benefit to any boy, whether he continues his studies or not. As so many of our students will return to the farming life it is very important that they should develop the power to read sensibly and to be appreciative of worthwhile literature. It is one of the aims of the library activities to give this ability to the students of the School.

Chapel Notes

CHAPEL SERVICES this year have been conducted in the new School Hall. At first its vast and austere interior was found to be a real difficulty both in the music of the services and in the general atmosphere of worship, but soon familiarity and heartier singing solved this.

Until the third term the usual furniture-moving procedure had to be carried out, but at least dining-room tables and common-room desks did not have to be moved twice each weekend. Now, with comfortable seating installed in the Hall, Sunday services no longer mean dozens of man-hours (or boy-hours) of physical work.

Attendance at Communion each Sunday has been consistently good and the total number of acts of Communion within the School was considerably greater than last year. Both Houses are fortunate in having devoted resident Housemasters who provide a fine example of regularity of worship.

Evensong has been made more interesting by the many visiting preachers who have addressed us—Fr. Laurence Eyres S.S.M., the Rev. D. McKenzie, W. Riley, A. C. Holland, C. A. Pierce, R. Bowyer and Canon J. Paice. The Rev. C. W. Chetwynd showed a film and addressed the boys on the work of the Missions to Seamen and we were honoured with a visit of the Reverend D. Sheppard of the M.C.C. team.

We must also express our gratitude to the Reverend L. W. Riley for donating a fine alms dish and to Mrs. Riley for making collection bags for the School.

Twenty-three boys were confirmed at the School's Confirmation by the Right Reverend C. L. Riley. It was good to see so many parents and friends at this Service.

Visitors are always welcome at our Chapel Services and it is our hope that, as time goes by, increasing numbers of Old Boys and parents will join us in worship.

From Chapel collections this year £5 was given to the Missions to Seamen, £15 to the Diocesan Board of Missions, covers were provided for the hassocks and two new burses and veils were purchased. Church furnishings are being kept to a minimum for the time being because of the unavoidable wear and tear from being stored away during the week and brought out for Sunday services.

Traditions do grow slowly, but 1962, we feel, saw a pleasing development in Hale's tradition of worship.

Interschool Christian Fellowship

"There will be an I.S.C.F. meeting in the Lecture Theatre at 1.10", is perhaps the only knowledge that most people of the school have of the Inter-School Christian Fellowship. As its name implies, the Inter-School Christian Fellowship is a fellowship between the schools, of people who are interested in Christian activities.

During the year the Bible Study has been the main type of meeting because of the importance of God's Word in the present day and age.

Highlights of the year's activities have been: Dr. Anderson's talk on his work in Pakistan, Dr. White's (the Jungle Doctor) work in central Tanganyika, a school camp at Easter at a farm near Chidlow for which we thank the Irvines, and the presentation of badges to eight boys who have attended regularly for a year and a term.

Camps have again featured in the I.S.C.F. calendar. During the summer months, boys from Hale went to Bunbury and Albany, and at August other boys went to Shark Bay and Narrogin.

All in all the I.S.C.F. this year has been placed on a firmer basis and we hope that the groundwork done this year will be built upon in the years to come.

Music

THIS YEAR, for the first time, a full-time Music Master was appointed to the staff. Mr. G. M. Bennett, who graduated from the Sydney Conservatorium and the Teachers' Training College and taught in the Eastern States before, arrived here in February of this year to take up his position on the staff before the commencement of first term. Almost as soon as he arrived, he began work on the musical direction of the "Pirates", Mr. Fletcher having left for New Guinea.

This year Mr. Bennett has held music appreciation classes in the Junior School in first and second year. A recorder group has been established in the Junior School and a second year choir which practises in the boys' spare time.

There is also a senior school choir made up of boys from fourth and fifth form who are interested in singing.

VIOLIN CLASSES

During second term Mr. Bennett started a class for the violin. Some of the instruments were supplied free by the school to enable boys to find out if they had an aptitude for the instrument before going to the expense of buying one of their own. In beginning these classes, an eye was also kept on the possibility of forming, at some future date, a school orchestra.

A school concert was held at the end of second term in conjunction with the Junior School Dramatic Society. It was not an ambitious effort but it went off well and showed that there was much untapped musical talent in the school.

CELEBRITY CONCERTS

In order to try to promote the interest of boys of the school in music, the school took a block booking for the A.B.C. Youth Concert season this year. This gave an opportunity for many boys to see a "live" symphony orchestra.

Another memorable occasion was the attendance by the School at a concert given by the London Philharmonic Orchestra under Sir Malcolm Sargent. Eighty boys attended this, and every one was thrilled by the experience of hearing a hundred piece orchestra of world class.

This has certainly been a most stimulating year for Hale School as far as music is concerned.


