Opening of Junior School


The School Year started on a high note with the opening of the new Junior School on the first morning of Term. About 150 parents and friends and the whole School were present to see Dr. Guy Henn, M.L.A., open the building after brief proceedings in which M. Stow, as Chairman of the Board, and the Headmaster spoke.

After Dr. Henn had cut a tape with the scissors used to open the main School and the Memorial Hall, and had declared the building open, the 20 most junior boys marched into a class room for the first lesson. This lesson was taken by Miss D. Green, who started her preparatory class in 1919 and retired in 1954 after 36 years service. Miss Green's pupils on this occasion included any Old Boys present who had at some stage been taught by her and her control of a most difficult class room proved that she had lost none of her old fire. She presented a very carefully thought out lesson on the origin and significance of the School Badge.

Staff Changes

The following members of the Teaching Staff left at the end of 1962: Messrs. S. Braga, to whom reference is made in the Headmaster's Speech Night report; Mr. A. Kalotas and Major W. S. Sutherland, who were teaching part-time only; and Mr. J. Van Hattem, who has joined the staff of the Perth Technical School, to teach Cartography. Mr. T. D. Hoar had leave of absence from the end of second term to take up a year's appointment at Charterhouse.

New appointments have been those of Messrs. C. J. Ashman, R. D. McMath, A. R. Taylor and B. Towers, all also referred to in The Headmaster's report; and Mr. R. N. Keet, who has taken various subjects in first, second and third years.

At the beginning of third term we were joined by Mr. P. E. M. Holmes, M.A. (Oxon.) who, after 6 years in the Royal Navy, taught at Geelong Grammar School and served as House-master of the Junior Boarding House at Clifton College Preparatory School. Speech Night

Speech Night, unusually early because of the Games, was held on Wednesday, 21st November, in the Memorial Hall. The proceedings opened with the National Anthem and prayer offered by the School Chaplain. The Captain of School's Report followed after which the Headmaster delivered his Report, a résumé of which is given below. The prizes and trophies were then presented by His Grace the Archbishop of Perth, the evening concluding with a vote of thanks to His Grace followed by his Benediction.

Headmaster's Report

THE HEADMASTER opened his report with a reference to the impending Commonwealth Games, using the metaphor of a distance race: the School had now settled down to the hard grind of the race after the freshness of the early laps of the moving into the new school. The race had still a great many laps to go.

The year had begun with the opening of the Old Boys' Memorial Hall—and the rest of the year had proved its all-round usefulness, and again he offered his thanks to everyone concerned. As well the Old Boys had provided 600 chairs, enough to seat the whole school. The Hall had also served—and served with due appreciation—as a School Chapel for the Boarders. The Hall again proved its worth, from the point of view both of accoustics and stage effects, with the production of the "Pirates of Penzance". Nine Masters and 120 boys were involved as well as many Mothers. The Junior School Play and Concert associated with it were an equally great success and helped to lay the foundations of a School Orchestra. The Hall was thus proving a real cultural centre.

The new Swimming Pool was opened in October by Air Marshal Sir Valston Hancock, K.B.E., C.B., D.F.C., Chief of Air Staff, when a carnival was held to which seven local Primary Schools were invited. The Pool had been of great value for

recreation and serious training and again the School owed the Old Boys a tremendous debt. Other gifts, individual and collective, had left us with a great feeling of gratitude.

The Junior School was to be opened in 1963, enabling a larger intake into Senior School and giving the Junior School an entity of its own while definitely remaining a part of the whole Hale School.

Of future developments, a further Boarding House was possible in 1965 and a worthy Chapel was an urgent need.

On the Academic side the 1961 Public Examination results had been very satisfactory both in Junior and Leaving and we gained 9 Commonwealth Scholarships. For next year we have planned a Non-Academic 4th Year course, containing English, and Mathematics and a general syllabus directed to the needs of boys taking up farming or a business career. It includes Agricultural Science, Woodwork, Technical Drawing, Economics and Accountancy, and Staff were working enthusiastically to make it profitable for all boys to stay at school until nearly 17.

The Headmaster then referred in appreciative terms to the loyal support of the Staff. He especially mentioned Mr. Braga, who was leaving and who had worked so hard to bring the Library up to its fine present state. New staff joining the School in 1963 were Mr. C. J. Ashman, to take charge of English; Mr. B. Towers, Mr. R. D. McMath, Mr. A.R. Taylor. Mr. L. Drake was passing on the control of the Army Cadet Unit—after 31 years, an Australian record when his war service was taken into account. Mr. Wheeler would take over his command in 1963.

Mr. L. Craig, Chairman of the Board of Governors throughout the planning and building of the new school, had felt it was time to pass on the Chairmanship to someone else and he welcomed Mr. Q. R. Stow as his successor. The Headmaster felt he was most fortunate in having such a kind and helpful Chairman under whom to begin his service. It was most satisfying that Mr. Craig was remaining on the Board to give further of his vast and wise experience. The Board had also lost the services of Mr. R. I. Ainslie, who resigned in July. His clear thinking and resolute determination had made him a wonderful right hand to Mr. Craig. He thanked him for his 13 years service to the Board. His successor, Mr. E. F. Downing, had already shown the same spirit of service given by his colleagues and predecessors.

His Grace the Archbishop was also closing his association with the school after maintaining the closest of interests. Besides

expressing appreciation of his interest, the Headmaster wished him a long and happy retirement.

The Parents and Friends' Association had continued its active support, especially in assuming responsibility for the structural work undertaken in connection with the Scoreboard donated by Mrs. Gordon Duce in memory of her son Peter. This was to be in use for the first Cup Match in 1963. The Association had wisely moved to retain interest of Parents and Friends by introducing Life Membership.

He thanked those Masters who had been in charge of Sports, Clubs and Societies especially Mr. Mill, coach of the 1st XVIII, and Mr. Altorfer, who had looked after the swimming

through the trying Crawley days.

He paid a tribute to the Community at Wembley Downs, especially the Nursing Sisters, Sisters Woods and Gill. He thanked Sister Woods, who was retiring, for her 7 years devotion to the boys. The Matron, Mr. Potter (Head Groundsman) and Bursar had all controlled their departments in a most satisfactory way.

He then stressed the vital need for cooperation between Home and School, paying a tribute to the burden the House Masters carried in providing a valuable link.

In concluding, the Headmaster reverted to his opening metaphor and the self discipline of the athlete. In our modern civilisation we had to contend with softness. Things were easy for modern youth. The various disciplines of school life could help tremendously without smothering personality or stifling initiative.

Captain of School's Report

Your Grace, Governors of the School, Headmaster, Members of Staff, Ladies and Gentlemen, and Boys of the School,—

This year the School Prefects were appointed somewhat later than last year, with the result that it took many boys quite a time to succumb to any sort of Prefectorial discipline. In general, our Boarding Houses provide a notable lesson to the other Houses, with their good bearing before and in Assembly.

Assembly was held this year in the Old Boys' Memorial Hall, and the School especially appreciated the chairs that were installed later in the year.

Yet, my main duty tonight is to detail our sporting activity for the year and offer encouragement to the supporters of the School as to our future success.

Our Cricket Team this year figured in some exciting matches and succeeded twice in defeating teams which finished higher on the list in the competition. However, although fifth place only could be gained, this team, well led, showed a spirit which stood the School's name in good stead. There were several young players in the team and they should develop into a strong team in the near future.

This year, the Rowing Coaches had to gamble on boating a light, if experienced crew, and thought it reasonable as in April light, following conditions usually prevail. However, we faced quite a stiff head wind and we came sixth. The other light crew of the race was an example to us, but our crew was somewhat dispirited by the conditions. On the brighter side, we have heavier boys with some experience now, and they should form a powerful combination next year, a minor success having been recently gained. The spirit throughout the season was high, and the School provided great support on the day, and we did manage to take off the inaugural Fifth Crew's event.

As was the case last year, we came fourth in both the Swimming and the Athletics. Once again, our younger age groups performed most creditably, which provides encouragement for hope of future success here. Both these sports require great determination by the athletes, swimming training not being merely a refreshing dip. Once again, it was the various field events that let us down in Athletics, but we now have the facilities for these and can improve them.

Our Football Team, undoubtedly the smallest and youngest in the competition this year, acquitted themselves very well in the first round fixtures and showed tremendous spirit. The second round saw the team dogged with injuries and some of the team's spirit naturally disappeared. With many of the team returning, next year, should definitely see us obtain a position better than this year's fourth place.

The Rugby Team, once again the lightest team competing in this year's competition, deserves a special mention for its determination in defeating many larger teams. The team had quite a bit of experience as many of the boys have been playing since the introduction of Rugby as a sport three years ago. In coming third in their competition, the Rugby Team provides others with an excellent example of playing the game as it should be played, and not bothering about the size of the opposition.

Although the Hockey Eleven failed to win a game, they fought gamely in the face of experienced opposition, and the success of the Junior Hockey Teams this year was most encouraging.

In place of the Annual School Play this year, Mr. Bambach produced the Gilbert & Sullivan Opera "The Pirates of Penzance," which proved to be a huge success, and was repeated at the request of the Fund-Raising Committee for the Empire Games. As a result of the time taken with this production, and the year's timetable, both the Dramatic Society and the Debating Society were not very active during the year, the latter having only one inter-school debate.

The I.S.C.F. met nearly every Wednesday under the guidance of several of the members of the Staff. Cadet activities were also somewhat restricted this year, but earlier this term the Army went on bivouac and the A.T.C. celebrated the coming-of-age of their national Unit.

Our Charities contributions this year amounted to over £250. Again, the two Boarding Houses were well to the fore, contributing between a third and a half of the total. It is entirely up to the individual boy, but it is hoped that next year, day boys will be more generous.

Previous School Captains have stressed that it is ability and spirit that ensures success in sport. The first is rather obvious, but at the moment, several boys find it difficult to feel enthusiastically about supporting School teams regularly. Naturally enough, the day-boys regard the week-end as theirs, but within all School teams this year, there has been a good spirit. The School rallied this year on several occasions, but failed when it came to regularly supporting the Cricket and Football Teams. Many times our teams, showed what they could achieve with their own team spirit and the keen support of the School.

To succeed in Sport, which will build up the name of the School to even greater heights, we must have discipline within the School, this meaning co-operation. There is a great deal of truth in the rather hackneyed expression: "What you obtain out of a thing depends on what you put into it." If the younger boys of the School bear this in mind, while reaping rewards and satisfaction for themselves, they will be ever enhancing the name of our great School.



This year Mr. A. J. Macmillan took over the position of Coach. Some good pre-season training led us to be optimistic of results for the Alcock Cup — with what justification the Coach's criticism and the brief résumé of matches will show.

COACH'S RESUME

The domination of the undefeated Aquinas team was the feature of the 1963 Alcock Cup season. Scotch finished second in the competition, losing their two games to Aquinas, the second by one point. Hale's narrow loss to Scotch in the final game indicated that there is no good reason for Aquinas' huge wins over us. It also showed what can be done when all players really give all they can for the whole game. Hale eventually finished equal fourth, although Wesley, Guildford, Christ Church and even Scotch were evenly matched. Overall, I was fairly happy with the season, especially the ending. Winning games is a cruel way of judging success and to me a 2-point loss or a 5-point win are such close events that one really has no more right to be happy after the win than to be sad after the defeat. The quality of the football in all games and the attitudes and efforts of all players must be carefully considered in the final analysis.

The team was fit early in the season and yet played poorly against Guildford in the opening game. A magnificent final quarter against Wesley and a match winning first quarter against Christ Church enabled us to win exciting games. The Aquinas machine cut us to ribbons, assisted, I thought, by a resignation to defeat on our part. In the second round the Guildford mud had no appeal, Wesley won a most exciting game and we outplayed Christ Church. Aquinas were far too good again and then

the team finished the season off with easily its best performance. Scotch were struggling throughout against the Hale boys, who showed a real desire to win the ball and to help each other at all times. Much of the foot passing, handball and backing up was of a very high standard.

Rover Bandy and ruckman Strickland were the most skilful players in the team, while Williams and Sewell also played consistently. Negus was a stout back pocket player, Flood a great battler, Wardle a much improved footballer; while Viska, Reader, Jackson and Bolton were probably the best of the others. All players did well at times and particularly would I congratulate the second year footballers in Collins, Wormald and Hodsdon on their efforts. Not only were Jackson and Bolton good footballers, but they were also an excellent captain and vice-captain respectively. My thanks especially go to them.

What is the lesson of the season? I believe that we must overcome our attitude in regard to Aquinas. Aquinas are good and we should learn from their dedicated approach but we must not make them better than they actually are. They will play even better if we give them any opportunity to believe that they start with an advantage. Just as Scotch always unsettle Aquinas by putting them under pressure and covering all loose men, and just as we confidently took on and nearly downed Scotch ,so must we tackle Aquinas in relentless fashion. Players must learn to fight desperately against them, to play attacking football, never to relax but to help and encourage each other; in other words, to keep a spirit of success in their minds. This sort of approach must, of course, be seen in all games right through the season.

I have enjoyed the year. This was a good bunch of players who trained hard, who strove well on many occasions and at all times played a brand of football which could only be classed as sporting. In the hurly burly of the importance that is attached to success by the Public Schools this is refreshing. Good luck to those who are leaving and may those who return bring with them a firm conviction about their ability, determination to train and play hard with a spirit of success.



HALE SCHOOL v. CHRIST CHURCH GRAMMAR SCHOOL


The team had its first win when it defeated Christ Church, at Christ Church. All members played well and it was a well deserved win. The final result was:



taken over by Lieut. Wheeler, who was ably supported by Lieuts. Macmillan and Lovelady. The latter joined the Unit to offer valuable music experience to the members of the Band.

Resulting from the large number of Cadets from the A.T.C. there were only a few recruits in the true sense. A training syllabus was prepared and the separate platoons were immediately occupied in Basic and Advanced Training.

A new feature to the Unit this year was the formation of a Company Band. This was commanded by Lieut. Lovelady with Richard Fowler as the Band Major. Owing to lack of the necessary instruments the Band was unable to progress extensively in the field of music but noticeable progress was shown in their Drill and Musical Theory.

During the May holidays a Specialist Course Camp was held at Northam, in which the Unit was represented in Signals, Intelligence and 3in. Mortar.

Looking back on the term, we feel that an overall high grade of efficiency was attained by the Unit. It is on efficiency that we hope to maintain in the months to come.

SECOND TERM

As usual Parades resumed immediately term started. The high standard set by the Unit during First Term was easily equalled and by the time it embarked for Military Camp at Northam the enthusiasm and behaviour of all cadets was very commendable.

CAMP

This year the whole period of Camp was plagued by bad weather. The Unit was supposed to fire on the range the first day after arrival but shocking weather forced this to be abandoned. A "shoot" was finally arranged but the new type of targets contributed to the poor scores.

Once again this year a Bivouac was aarranged by the Regular Staff and the school Lieutenants. The area of the exercise had to be changed because of the severe flooding of the nearby rivers. The Platoons were broken into sections each controlled by an N.C.O. These sections set out on a route march and rendezvoused at a pre-determined tea spot. As darkness fell the Company was divided into Platoons and several Lantern Stalks were undertaken. Heavy rain and rugged conditions caused

injury to several cadets. As a result the remaining exercises were abandoned and a long slow march back to Barracks resulted.

The last day of camp was taken up with a marching-out parade. This year the Company was well back on the Parade Ground but, not to be denied, they were named as "best on parade". The marching was of an extremely high standard, upon which all the Regular Staff commented. To end the day the Signals Section won its competition, while the 3in. mortar was runner-up. Congratulations to Sgt. Hassell and his crew.

THIRD TERM

To complete the necessary parade hours it was decided that the Company would have a combined Marching-out Parade with the Navy, and afterwards a Bivouac about ten miles north of the city.

The Saluting Officer on Parade was Commander Starr and he commented upon the great exhibition of marching and behaviour shown by the Cadet units. Major Callender represented the Army at the Parade.

Once again shocking weather prevailed and the Bivouac area was diverted to "the bush" surrounding the school. The Police issued permission for the Unit to use blanks and flares on the exercise. The Platoon Sections spent all afternoon digging in and preparing for night attack and defence. It had been originally intended to sleep out but unsatisfactory conditions caused the whole Unit to sleep in moderate comfort in the school hall. The night attacks were a great success and by 11 p.m. all Cadets were in bed.

The planned "attack at dawn" never eventuated, thanks to heavy sleepers in the unit and as a result "rise and shine" was at 6.45 a.m. The whole morning was spent in Platoon tactics and the cleaning up of section areas and by 2 p.m. all stores had been handed back to a consistently efficient Q-Store. A short final parade was then held to conclude a very successful year for the Cadet Unit.

Many thanks go to W.O.II Petersen, without whom we doubt whether the Unit could have been the success it was this year.

Tobruk Trophy winner this year was Sgt. Wills, who showed a high grade of efficiency throughout the year.

The Marching-Out Parade was this year organised by the Navy. Thus Commodore W. B. Marks was the Reviewing Officer, and a Naval Band was present.


Of the four years that T. S. Cygnet has existed, this year would surpass all previous years in every aspect of the Naval Cadets.

Chapel Notes

Chapel services have again been conducted in the Hall. The singing improved from the previous year as boys were becoming acquainted with the increased repertoire of hymns. In second term two excellent Methodist Ladies' College teams outspoke Hale and provided those present with a fine example of debating.



Notes on Woodwork and Technical Drawing

The standard of workmanship in the Junior Models this year was very high indeed. The models were varied with the boys adding their own individual preferences to make the job more personal.

This year saw the 'Hale Boatyard' start into operation with no less than six canvas back canoes on the stocks. The canoes were from a design that was published in a boating magazine. They were of a compact 11 feet making them very easy things to manhandle and transport. By kind permission of the Headmaster two canoes were tested on the school pool to see how they would perform. Much to their owners' surprise the canoes behaved very well! The line-up in the photograph shows only 4 canoes, the other two were still in the final stages of completion. To add a safety note it is hoped that the canoe owners will invest in a suitable life jacket for use when canoeing.

Other items of work were a student's desk with cupboard, bookcases and coffee tables; whilst three boys were quite adventurous and tackled the making of a lounge chair. The glueing and cramping of the chairs provided some very interesting geometrical problems; however, the success can be determined from the finished articles.

Finishes on the models varied from clear gloss to white 'french' polish and again the success can be determined from the jobs.

Last year's exhibition of work proved very popular but the venue of the Art room was soon found to be inadequate. If Speech Night is held outside this year then the exhibition will be held in the Memorial Hall.

The non-academic course should have a mention. The boys in the group have turned out jobs by the dozen, one boy alone lays claim to having completed 13 jobs during the year. Again the range of work has been so great that it would be hard to single out any special items.

The technical drawing got off to a good start this year in a room that was properly equipped for the subject. Work showed an immediate improvement when the boys found that they were able to walk into class and have all their drawing instruments on hand. From rough estimates it seems that quite a number of ex. Junior technical drawing boys will wish to continue the subject on to Leaving, we wish them well.

On the whole it has been a rewarding and successful year for the boys taking woodwork and technical drawing; a high standard has been set which one hopes will spur others on to greater efforts.

The employment of a full-time librarian in the library this year has added much to the usefulness of the library. Boys were able to receive expert help both in the selection and use of books, and much more time was devoted to the library, for it was no longer a spare time occupation.

Many new books were added to the library this year, mainly to the Science, English and Geography sections .

The magazines continued to be the most popular articles in the library and such widely separated types as Bon-Jour, Das Rad, Illustrated London News, Sport Magazines and Scientific Journals were all present. The copies of the "Cygnet" which were bound late last year continued to be very popular.

The number of science books has increased steadily. There are, besides the books on the school course, many books dealing with subjects beyond the school Curriculum, which include topics such as Space, Rockets, Paleontology, Archaeology, and Psychology, which are all read avidly.

Many critics' books on the authors such as Hopkins, Shaw and Dickens have been purchased to enable boys to have a wider scope for English criticism.

Geography and History still remain, apart from English, the largest section of the library, and many expensive, amply illustrated books have been added to these sections.

As fiction is an essential for a library the section has grown tremendously, particularly owing to the acquisition of the mobile library mentioned in last year's "Cygnet".

A double check system has provided an almost fool-proof system of tracking down a book—not always to the borrower's advantage!

The large number of books together with comfortable seating arrangements and bright light and heaters in winter make

the Hale Library one of the best school libraries one could wish for.





This has been a year in which activities have been limited to some extent by the lack of finance. Our sincere thanks are due to all those who have helped by their voluntary effort, to those who have made material donations to help defray the cost of our functions, and to all those Parents and Friends who have encouraged us by their support. We look forward to a continuance of this support in 1964, and would remind parents of boys leaving the school that they may maintain their link with the School and the Association through the facility of Association Life Membership.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

For your information and approval, I present to you the Annual Report of the Association for the year 1963.

Committee

The Committee has held the usual monthly meetings, and several special meetings, which have all been well attended. The consistent attendance of past presidents at these meetings has provided encouragement to the Committee, and also a source of much valuable experience in Association affairs. We also owe our thanks to Mr. Prince for his attendance and assistance at all times.

The usual sub-committees were appointed early in the year and they have all carried out their allotted duties efficiently and enthusiastically. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Committee for its support throughout my term of office.

For the past year the Committee has been meeting in the Old Boys Room in the Memorial Hall and I think all members have been quick to see the advantages of having our own accommodation.

Finance

The Association has Life Membership investments totalling £3,800 and increased income from this source has helped improve the general financial situation. The detailed financial report will be presented by the Treasurer at the Annual General Meeting; but it can be reported that the number of subscriptions received has improved since last year. This situation is still not satisfactory, however, and I would appeal to all Old Boys to forward their subscriptions promptly in the new year. In 1964 we will be carrying the added financial responsibility of a scholarship offering full school fees.

Membership

The present membership is 1,007 consisting of 460 Annual Members and 547 Life Members. (The Annual Membership figure includes 146 who are one year in arrears).

While the Association has maintained its membership of one thousand Old Boys (first attained in the Centenary Year), this figure should be considerably higher due to the increasing number of boys leaving the school each year. Your Committee hopes that all Old Boys will join the Association and also point out the advantages of membership to their sons and relatives as they leave School.

Social Activities

Old Boys' Day, the Annual Golf Match and Buffet, the Rowing Day Launch, and the Football Match were held as usual and all proved very popular. The Launch used to view the Rowing was in fact overloaded and certainly a larger boat will be required next year.

The Public Schools Association Ball catered for record numbers this year, while the Association's Annual Dinner was one of the happiest and most successful functions held for some time. The Country Dinner held in Katanning was also a great success and Brien Taylor is to be congratulated on his great work.

Mike Beach and his Social Sub-Committee deserve special thanks for the long hours of work that resulted in their many successes this year.

Sport

Once again this year we have won the Old Boys Boat Race, the "Inters." Relay and the combined Old Boys Golf Shields. These continued sporting successes have provided enjoyment and satisfaction for both the competitors and the Association generally.

Cygnet Hall

Once again the Sub-Committee has worked hard to increase bookings and keep expenses to a minimum. In the face of stiff competition, the operation of this Hall at a profit is becoming increasingly difficult, thus Old Boys are asked to help by using these excellent facilities whenever possible.

"The Cygnet"

The School has again made available some 900 copies of "The Cygnet" in return for merely a token donation towards their cost. Many of the families receiving more than one copy of this magazine may feel that the extra copies are unnecessary. The Committee would be glad to hear from anyone in this position as some wastage could be avoided.

"The Old Haleian"

This magazine has continued to provide a ready means of giving notice of future and past activities, and I believe, has done a great deal to keep all Old Boys in touch with their association. The Sub-Committee responsible should be congratulated on maintaining the standard of this publication.

Scholarship

The Association's Scholarship Committee recently awarded an Old Boys Scholarship (to commence in 1964) to Eric Isaachsen. On behalf of the Association I express the hope that Eric's school days are happy and fruitful.

The Board of Governors

The Old Boys Selection Committee reappointed Dr. L. P. Gray for a further four years to the Board of Governors.

War Memorial Association

As the maintenance period is now complete, it is expected that the Architects will issue a final certificate for the War Memorial Hall in the near future. The War Memorial Association still wishes to complete its undertaking by paying for extra seating, honour boards and cupboards for the museum area.

I would appeal therefore to the few whose promises are still outstanding to forward their cheques immediately, thus enabling the Committee to finalise this matter.

Earlier in the year our Architects received well earned recognition for their outstanding work at two ceremonies held in the Hall. They were presented with the Bronze Medal and Diploma of the Royal Institute of British Architects for the building of outstanding merit in the metropolitan area of Perth over

the period 1959-61, and the Australian Architecture and Arts Award for 1962.

Hale School Endowment Fund

This fund is now functioning under a new committee and is actively encouraging Old Boys to make donations to the Fund. Gifts will help build a capital sum that will in turn produce income to assist the School.

In conclusion I thank you for the honour of serving as your President. My term of office has proved most interesting, and has afforded me a great deal of pleasure.

THE HALE SCHOOL ENDOWMENT FUND ASSOCIATION (INC.)

It will be of interest to all connected with Hale School, both at present and in the past, to know something of the operations of the Fund.

The Fund has been operating for 32 years. It was set up in 1932 by a number of Old Boys with the object of raising capital to endow the School—after the style of many English public schools and universities. The Constitution, which incidentally was drawn by Mr. (later Mr. Justice) Virtue, Q.C., in 1932, was arranged in such a way as to allow the receipt of bequests and gifts; to be administered for the benefit of the School by Trustees appointed by both the Board of Governors of Hale School and The Old Haleians' Association (Inc.).

The present Trustees are:-

Appointed by the Board of Governors:

Mr. G. R. Simpson and Mr. L. E. Fethers.

Appointed by The Old Haleians' Association-

Mr. W. L. Brine (Chairman), Mr. T. F. Hantke, Mr. R .V. Garland (Secretary).

A number of gifts have been made over the years to the Association but the main scheme was the payment by a number of Old Boys of premiums on life assurance policies taken out in 1932-1934 on the lives of boys then at the School. These were for a 30-year period and most of them have matured with bonuses. A gift of Government Bonds for £450 was received together with other donations.

The Trustees have now decided to support the Old Haleians' Association in the granting of scholarships to the Sons of deceased Old Boys whose guardians are experiencing hardship. For this purpose the interest earned will be used but the capital is to be retained intact in accordance with the objects of the Fund.

The present assets of the Fund held in cash and securities amount to over £4,000.

It is, of course, the aim of the Fund to receive capital sums to use towards the functioning and benefit of the School. There are cases in the United Kingdom of very large amounts being received for this purpose—as they have by other schools and universities in Australia.

Naturally, the Trustees are looking for ways of increasing the capital of the Fund in order to endow the School for its improvement and as security against the future.

It is hoped that all Old Boys will remember the School in their Wills; bequests are deductions for Estate Duty and Probate Tax purposes. A strong, financial reserve can be a powerful influence in the future for the preservation of Hale School as we have come to know in, and honour it, as a valuable institution in our country.

Enquiries about the Fund from any member of the Board of Governors or Trustees of the Fund would, of course, be welcome. Other Old Boys have thought they would rather give donations to the Fund while they can see the result. The machinery have come to know it, and honour it, as a valuable institution in the past has led to the present nucleus of capital.
