EDITORIAL

Australians have a national characteristic which entails a rather lackadaisical approach to life. So ours is a country relatively free from the elaborate social etiquette of some foreign nation, the tendency is for informality and the typical Australian feels that exaggerated politeness is obsequiousness and *savoir faire* is for the other chap to know. Australian society does, however, demand that common courtesy be instilled into the make-up of the individual, and people without some smattering of civility are very soon outcasts.

A sad feature of Australians might be the error that many make in assuming that good conduct and bearing are signs of affection and priggishness. Following the erring minority is too common in all levels of society and this attitude, especially amongst teenagers, contributes to the reputation we have for brashness. If, in adolescence—the formative period of life—one gets the idea that correctness is worthy of mockery, one has a hopelessly narrow view of life. No one denies that ruggedness and masculinity are qualities that every boy longs for, but vulgarity and gaucheness, masquerading as these qualities, are quickly detected by those who are manly. Courage is not bravado, nor genius commonsense; politeness is not effeminate.

Do the scoffers know that, by slinging off, they are, perhaps, showing the same signs of affectation and are resorting to the same humbug which they so loudly disclaim? Do they know, also, that great self-discipline is required to adhere to the principal of universal common courtesy and that, by their own boorishness in sniggering, they show a decided lack of it and an even greater scarcity of commonsense and personal integrity. The mocking will continue until people have been educated to appreciate courtesy; to understand the implications of the word and to observe the prominent place it occupies in the constitution of sound character.

This type of education begins with home life and continues in the school. Today both must work together in an effort to raise the present standard of social conduct; the home produces the raw material and the basic training; the school is the refinery. At school the boy becomes man; it is here that he will see life in its proper perspective; it is here that his character is moulded to face the world and it is from here that he learns to appreciate his place in society. He should leave school a Man. The prime ingredients of manliness are integrity, self discipline and courtesy.

Old Boys' Day


THIS YEAR OLD BOYS' DAY was on Monday, 2nd March.

About 190 Old Boys attended the roll call in the Memorial Hall, and, as usual, the day was a great success.

During the assembly, Dr. G. Lilburne and Mr. P. Atkins presented a portrait of Mr. Newbery to the Old Boys' Association.

Later in the day the traditional cricket match was played, the school defeating the Old Boys.

Howard Gwynne later received the bat for making the highest score against the Old Boys. There was also a most successful swimming meeting between the school and the Old Boys, with honours being about equally divided.



FIRST TERM

School Began on Tuesday, 11th February and at assembly the Headmaster welcomed all boys to the school. B. C. A. Strickland was announced Captain of the School and the following were announced as Prefects: G. E. Taylor, K. J. Minson, P. J. Pearson and R. L. Gray. A number of new masters were introduced to the school. The boys were sorry to learn of Mr. Marshall's illness and wished him a speedy recovery.

The first term sporting activities were soon commenced and the first cricket match of the season was played on February 19th against the Governor's XI and the first Darlot Cup match was played against Christ Church on the 29th.

The prefects were inducted by Mr. Stow. The following additional prefects were announced: R. W. Liddell, A. C. Watson, J. H. Gwynne, R. H. Rose and M. C. Bennett.

Old Boys' Day on March 2nd was well attended. Old Boys competed against the School in hockey, swimming, tennis and cricket. J. H. Gwynne won the cricket bat presented for the highest score against the Old Boys.

During the following week, the cricket team played the Incogniti and the Junior School Swimming Sports were held.

On the 7th March, Hale redeemed its cricketing reputation by greatly extending Aquinas. R. H. Rose scored a century for which Mr. Stow later presented him with a bat.

On the 14th March, Hale performed the unique feat of wining every cricket and tennis fixture against Scotch College. The Interschool Swimming was held at Beatty Park on the 14th. Hale came third—a most creditable perfomance.

The school was sorry to hear of Mr. Holmes's illness and welcomed a new master, Mr. Taylor.

The School Swimming Sports were held on the afternoon of the 25th March and were won by Buntine House.

On the 26th March, the school broke up for the Easter weekend. On the 4th April the Darlot Cup match against Wesley ended in an amazing tie. The Wesley Rowing Regatta was held in the morning. On the 7th April, Brian Booth on his way to England with the Australian Cricket Team spoke at assembly.

The House Cup final was won by Haynes House on the 8th April.

The school now turned its attention to Rowing. On the 17th April Mr. Little presented the megaphones to the coxswains. On the 18th, in bad conditions, the Hale crew gained fourth place.

On the nights of the 1st, 2nd and 4th of May, the Music Society presented "H.M.S. Pinafore" by Gilbert and Sullivan in the school hall. The performances were of high quality.

At Assembly on June 4th the school was addressed by Dr. Paul White, whose work in the primitive parts of Africa has earned him the name of "The Jungle Doctor."

The boys of the school were glad when Mr. E. R. Prince arrived from Kenya to join the science department at the school. His classes now settled down to some solid work.

On July 6th the school was honoured by the attendance at assembly of Mr. C. Veryard, an Old Boy of the school who had recently become Lord Mayor of Perth.

July the 8th was the date of the annual football and hockey matches between the Old Boys and the boys of the school. The 1st XI defeated the Old Boys.

Meanwhile, the Clubs and Societies period was proving to be quite a success. It occasioned the formation of many new clubs. The Music Society was making particular use of it by inviting artists to visit the school during this period and to give recitals for the boys.

The Prefects' Dance was held on 18th July and proved to be a great success.

Bruce Bennett, the Rhodes Scholar for 1963, was present at assembly on August 7th, the eve of his departure for England.

Hale was host school for the annual Interschool Music Society evening this year. It was held in the Memorial Hall on 7th August. Six schools took part.

The sporting teams were completing a successful season. The 1st XVIII finished strongly in third position. The 1st XI had shown signs of improvement. The Rugby team was successful in winning its competition. The Headmaster of Scotch College, Dr. Keys, presented the Rugby Cup to the 1st XV at assembly on August 13th.

The Naval Cadet camp commenced on the 15th and the Army Cadet camp on the 17th August. School broke up on the 20th for the August holidays.

THIRD TERM

Third term began on September 9, and Athletics training soon began.

The Cadet Passing Out Parade was held on Saturday, 19th September, in rainy weather. The units were inspected by Colonel Howard.

In the Athletics meeting against Scotch College, Hale distinguished itself, thus giving an indication of probable success in the Inters. At the School Athletics championships held on 17th October, the large number of records broken encouraged the team. The high spirit of the team and a number of good performances resulted in Hale's coming second at the Inters. on October 24. With the end of Athletics came the beginning of Cricket training. The First XI acquitted themselves well by drawing with the Incognito XI with the honours in their favour.

The school year ended on 7th December with Speech Day.

Institution of a Sixth Form

This year was the first that the Sixth Form became official. To the four sixth formers, John Brighton, Roger Gray, Peter Pearson and Tony Watson, it proved an outstanding success.

Success came from many facets of school life. Academically, we found in our repeat year we would lessen our weakness, and improve our abilities. Although schoolwork was much the same, under the Headmaster's guidance, we undertook some new subjects. This was partly to relieve boredom, but mainly to develop a wider background necessary for our University interests. We felt more confident with our schoolwork, and were able to spend more time in sport and other school activities.

Although we did reasonably well in last year's Leaving Certificate Examinations, the repeat year has been invaluable to us. We now feel much more confident in tackling University courses. We feel it is much safer to repeat a year and build a better background than waste a year at University by not being able to cope with the work. To the Sixth Formers, this year has been one of the most vital school years in our lives.

Staff Changes

The following members of the Teaching Staff left at the end of 1963: Mr. R. H. Farthing, Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Haskett, Mr. M. Haydock, Mr. R. N. D. Keet and Mr. W. F. Longley.

Those joining the staff at the beginning of 1964 were Mr. W. F. McEwan, who took over the teaching of woodwork from Mr. Haskett; Mr. J. E. Smart, who teaches maths. and science in first and second year; and Mr. J. O. Chivers, who was with us for first and second terms only and taught maths. and science. There were also two new masters in Junior School: Mr. D. J. Coney and Mr. R. Harrison. Another new staff member, Mr. G. N. Taylor, came towards the end of first term, and, during his stay until the end of second term, he taught social studies subjects in several classes.

At the end of first term, Mr. D. A. Milne, who had for many years been head of the science department, left. He was replaced by Mr. E. R. Prince, who arrived from Kenya a few weeks later. During second term we were also without Mr. L. Drake, who was on long service leave and had gone on a trip to Europe.

At the beginning of third term there were two new masters: Mr. B. B. Gidney, teaching economics and history; and Mr. P. Stocker, teaching maths. and science. We were also glad at the return of Mr. T. Hoar, whose experience during his year's stay at Charterhouse we are sure will benefit the school.

To the new members of staff we wish happiness during their stay, and to those who have left we wish success for their future.

Headmaster's Report


The Headmaster opened his report by welcoming His Grace, The Archbishop of Perth, Archbishop Appleton, to his first Hale School speech night, and hoped that his association with the school would be a long and happy one.

He continued by expressing his gratitude to Bishop Freeth for his tireless work during the years he had been on the Board. Bishop Freeth had resigned from the Board after a long service. The Headmaster announced the appointment of the Dean of Perth, the Very Reverend James Payne, to the Board to replace Bishop Freeth.

The school year had started "with a bang" when the new Junior School was opened on the first morning by Dr. G. G. Henn, the local M.L.A.

The benefits of having a separate Junior School had quickly made themselves felt. The enrolments had risen to 106 and the enrolments for the next year had exceeded this figure. The Headmaster announced that during the course of 1964 an extra classroom would be built and that the Junior School would be extended down to Grade I in 1965.

He then mentioned the staff changes which had taken place during the year and officially said farewell to Mr. and Mrs. Haskett.

He went on to say: "I must once again express my thanks for the all-round co-operation of a great many people in the school community." Among the examples he mentioned were the Honour Boards from the Old School, which had been erected in the Memorial Hall by the Old Boys and the furniture in the Clubs and Societies' Room which had been provided by the Parents and Friends' Association.

The Leaving Certificate results at the end of last year had been particularly gratifying, almost half of the candidates matriculating successfully.

Reference was made to the 4th Year Non-Academic Course which had been a great success. Projects had included the construction of a sheep pen, a fowl house, and a machinery shed to house the equipment for the motor maintenance section of the course.

Another innovation had been the Careers Evening, which was designed to help boys in the senior school to obtain information about their chosen career. The Headmaster drew attention to the extensive nature of the vocational guidance tests that are given at school and the information which is available concerning the aptitude of a boy.

He remarked on the growing practice among banks and Insurance companies of asking to see the reports of a boy who is applying for a job. He said that, instead, a summary of marks and a Certificate of Character would be provided by the school.

With regard to extra-curricular activities, the Headmaster praised the Cadet Units who had had a successful year. He referred to the growing number of Clubs and Societies and to the introduction into the school of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme, and outlined the policy of the school, to give every boy an opportunity of contributing something of value by allowing each boy to belong to a limited number of clubs only, and to take part in only one official sport in a term.

"Having spoken in this way at some length of our responsibility to the average boy, let me, however, hasten to say that we must not lose sight of the boy who can excel, nor would I support the all too common tendency of the day to bring everyone down to the lowest common denominator. The Rockefeller Report on Education speaks of "The Pursuit of Excellence in the Context of Concern for All', and this seems to me to sum up very neatly the important balance a School needs to preserve between the two—"The Pursuit of Excellence in the Context of Concern for All'. One inescapable problem which arises out of this concern for all is the cost of the facilities required. The

Chairman has referred to the capital which has been invested in the School, and on the sheet enclosed with your Prize List you will see the way it has been spent. I have only one comment to add—In the breakdown of the way in which our School fees are used, there is only a small amount for Interest payments, and no provision at all for repayment of a capital outlay of over £1,000 per boy. Interest on this sum alone would add another £60 per annum to your fees bill, while repayment of the capital sum would make your fees at least £100 per annum greater than they now are."

The Headmaster went on to say that there are many parents who wish to send their children to Church schools, but are prevented from doing so by lack of finance. He realised that if State Aid was granted to such schools, there would be an increased demand for admission into Church schools. Furthermore, when the Government implemented its policy of providing 10,000 Scholarships for children in the final years of High School, there would be an increased pressure to admit boys at 4th Year level. He foresaw that this would endanger some of the things most valued in school life. He stated that he hoped that more Church schools would be built.

"Of course, there are those in the counsels of the various Protestant Churches who oppose the use of any further Church money for the foundation of Schools. They assert that the Christian influence of the Church Schools is negligible, because they have sold their souls to Education with barely a thin veneer of Christianity superimposed on it. Furthermore, they assert that for financial reasons much of the benefit from these Schools tends to go to non-Church members. One must admit that there is, unfortunately, some truth in this kind of statement. Often the impact of Christianity through a Church School has been slight compared with the emphasis placed on academic standard, discipline, sporting prowess and social prestige. But the solution is not perhaps as simple as it appears. As a Christian Headmaster, certainly I want a Christian School, but I find myself asking "What is a Christian School?" Some might answer that it is a place where there is a Chaplain to teach Christianity, and where Christian virtues reign and are encouraged; where honesty, purity, conscientiousness, courtesy and the rest are fostered, and those who do not conform to these standards are disciplined for their failure. And this is all good as far as it goes, but does it go far enough? Christianity, surely, is not merely a matter of behaviour or of classroom teaching; it involves also personal convictions, and the way in which convictions are developed is not simple. The life and influence of members of Staff, senior boys and the School community as a whole may be at least as important as any direct teaching which can be given.

"I, for one, believe that any School, which sets out to be a Christian School, cannot honour God if it is satisfied with anything less than the highest standards in everything—academic, sport; discipline and the rest. But also, I humbly suggest that as in this School we pursue excellence in these fields, we also have a concern to face each boy with the fact that these things alone do not make up the whole of life. The claims of the great Master, Christ, may be at first sight less tangible, but they are ignored at our peril, as perhaps we, in this age, are finding out. Finally, I suggest that if many outside the Church benefit from the School to the exclusion of some inside, perhaps we should accept a reminder from the Primate, who quoted William Temple as saying that 'the Church is the only Club in the world which exists for the benefit of non-Members'. Let us be glad for our School to serve all sorts and conditions of men."

Captain of School's Report

YOUR GRACE, GOVERNORS OF THE SCHOOL, HEADMASTER, MEMBERS OF STAFF, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN AND BOYS OF HALE:

I feel it would be dishonest to report to you tonight how unfortunate the school was in not winning every sporting contest this year. Similarly I feel it would be dishonest to tell you that next year will see Hale School dominating the sporting arenas. However, I will prophesy that the next couple of years will see a marked improvement in Hale's position as a sporting school.

In fact, the School's achievements in sport in 1963 were only mediocre—with the one major exception, the Athletics. In this sport the team showed remarkable spirit and determination and much of the credit must go to the Captain and Vice-Captain of the team and to the coaches. Their example stood out amongst the reluctance and apathy of many of the other school teams.

In Rugby, Hockey, Football, Tennis, Cricket, Rowing and Swimming Hale finished fourth, fifth or sixth. The Swimmers showed marked improvement which is sure to continue in the next few years. The Hockey teams also continue to improve but a school boy prejudice about the manliness of this sport tends to stifle interest among many athletically-minded boys.

A lack of enthusiasm and dedication still prevails and I feel this comes from the school's failure to acquire the assistance of voluntary outside coaches and the deficiency in the emphasis placed on gaining a place in the school teams.

However, although triumphs were few in sport this year, the boys of the School achieved the most important benefit—they enjoyed their sport.

At this stage I would like to thank, on behalf of the school, one of the Masters who so effectively organised sport in the school that every boy was participating in organised sport every term. Mr. Shield's contribution to the efficient and comprehensive system of House and Interschool sport was a magnificent one.

Another aspect of school life which is just as important as sport was not mediocre.

The cultural life of the school has continued the expansion and progress begun since coming to Wembley Downs and 1963 has been a very successful year in this respect.

"His Excellency", the School play, the Junior School play, the School concert and the frequent interschool debates were all of a very high standard. The debates were an outstanding feature of the school life and were exceptionally well attended. Indeed on one occasion at a school with a larger enrolment than curs, our representatives out-numbered the hosts by about six to one.

The introduction of a comprehensive and interesting range of new clubs and societies has brought within the grasp of the pupils many new interests and hobbies. Now boys can participate in aero-modelling, archery, stamp collecting, chess and many other activities during a special period set aside for these things.

A new Gilbert and Sullivan Opera has begun rehearing for next year and the great interest shown in music is a hopeful sign for both the school and the community.

The Army and Navy Cadet Units were of a very high standard and at their camps and passing out parades brought great credit upon the school as well as winning awards.

Another very encouraging sign was the magnificent way in which the boys contributed to charity this year. The total contribution of over £400 was an achievement just as important as any sporting victory.

I feel I must make special mention of the boarders for, as is so often the case, their morale and support were very noticeable. Perhaps the whole school relies a little too much upon the boarders and takes their loyalty and hard-work too often for granted.

Personally I leave Hale School with two feelings in my heart. Firstly, sorrow at having to leave this place where I spent so much of my time and where I have been so happy, and then disappointment. Disappointment because so many of the boys of the school, and parents, spend more time in criticising and complaining about our school than they ever do in praising or supporting it.

Boys and parents say there is no school spirit; they come to the sporting fixtures and talk about how weak we are at sport. Not enough people connected with the school, and especially the boys, take a lead from many staff members and Old Boys and give every support and encouragement to the school. Not enough boys are proud of their school and are willing to wear the uniform properly; too many would rather run the place down than build it up. I'm told by much more experienced people than myself that this is a common characteristic of big institutions. If this is so, then we can only hope to achieve great school spirit and pride when everyone—Boys, Staff, Parents, Old Boys, and Friends—begins to give all possible support and encouragement to the school.

In attack the backline always looked dangerous. Any one of them had the ability to make a break and score, and they had the sense to vary their tactics so much that their opponents could not predict just where the break was going to come and how to counter it.

In line-outs and scrums the forwards did not excel, but no team could match them in loose play. Many tries were scored from an "up-and-under" kick and I pitied the opponent who caught the ball when our boys came crashing through.

The team worked hard at training and executed rehearsed manoeuvres during the matches with all the aplomb of veterans. It was a most satisfying season in every way.



ATHLETICS

Although Athletics is an individual sport, each member of the team must always work for the benefit of his team. The cross-country running in second term saw the emergence of a strong middle-distance group who were to become the backbone of Hale's "Inters." team. They gained good experience from the State and School cross-country championships. The results of these championships showed that Hale was a strength to be reckoned with on the middle distance track.

At the State cross-country relays (4 x 1 mile) we entered Under 14, Under 16 and Open teams. This was held on the 11th July and the Under 14 team finished fifth, with an average mile time of 6 min. 23.5 secs., the Under 16 team finished third, with the average mile time of 5 min. 34 secs., and the Open team finished second with the average mile time of 5 min. 20 secs. S. Hazlett ran the fastest time of all Under 16 runners and Bill Drewe ran the fastest Open mile of the day. The conditions at Perry Lakes for this meeting were very slushy and the extremely powerful winds did little to help the runners.

A month later the teams and individual cross-country State Championships were held; again at Perry Lakes. In the Under 16 division Hale came fourth with 42 points. Mel Wheat was the best Hale runner in this division. Hale finished second in the Under 16 division with 47 points. Harris and Hazlett ran well in coming third and seventh respectively. Again Hale came second in the Open division with 21 points and again Bill Drewe proved himself the best Open runner.

COACH'S REPORT

And so we came second at the Inters. This is a cold statistical position that yields no personality, no moments of drama or moments of humour, no moments of understanding, of the days of competition and comradeship, of the times when hard work seemed so futile and afterwards the feeling of well-being and the sense of responsibility and duty. Athletics is the pulse of the School; it is a personality and that personality has as many facets as there are individuals in the school.

Brave souls. At the beginning of second term — marrow chilling, finger-freezing conditions. Later, the onslaught of gale-driven rains. This was the lot accepted by those training for cross-country and middle-distance, in the mornings between 6 and 7. The conditions were particularly adverse, but directly proportional was the increase in toughness, hardiness and determination. I really admire these "men" of athletics — their approach displays maturity and a sense of 'getting on with the job.'

Fitness, fitness for athletics was our quest; team spirit was our aim. Thus began the Athletics camp at the National Fitness area, Point Peron. Parents were splendidly co-operative in driving the boys to and from the camp. From Friday afternoon, 11th September to Sunday, 13th September it was a particularly pleasant combination of hard training, team games, food sampling, camp chores and 'spine-bashing' The camp organisers, Mr. Shields and myself, and our assistants, R. B. Gill, D. E. Barton (both Old Boys) and J. Skillen, were wonderfully surprised by the leadership, hard work and organisation displayed by the senior boys. These same qualities were often displayed during later training sessions at school. We achieved our camp aims. It could not have been otherwise when there was so much co-operation and comradeship. There must be more Athletics camps. But so much depends on the weather, and of the highest importance, the attitude of the senior boys.

How did we do it? Only five wins, yet we managed to amass our highest total under the present programme and finish second in the competition. The reasons were quite simple. More boys were supporting their school, creating a high level of competitiveness within the school. When there are three or more boys of the same ability competing for positions on the Hale team it does wonders for the over-all standard. The strength and team spirit of the school team is indicated by the depth and value of the team's reserves. This year we had the best of both. Altogether there were ten changes in the team on the Saturday. The most noticeable and unfortunate changes occurred when K. J. Minson could not compete.

The attitude of the school towards all phases of Athletics reflects most highly on the senior boys. Probably a good deal of the credit belongs to those of the previous year. However, there could not be any detracting from the value of the work and leadership of the Athletics captains—Bruce Strickland and Bill Drewe. To you both, sincere thanks—a fine job.

Highlights of season: The polish and competitive ability of the cross-country runners in State championship events; the ruthless 880's of P. S. Blizard, and the flowing smoothness of the lap-time calculating S. W. Hazlett; the sheer strength of D. J. Mill's middle-distance events; the vastly improved performances through hard work of M. H. Warren, A. C. Watson, E. D. Fethers and G. W. Harris; B. C. A. Strickland finishing only one point behind the Inters. champion boy (T. Brown, of Scotch); the forward surge in field events, particularly by the following: P. B. Skinner, W. G. Hodsdon, L. B. Craig, B. M. Shenn (all shot put), C. Ritchie, S. A. Bosich (both high jump) and R. Tarik (long jump). Consistency. Twenty-four second places at the Inters., then later at the Schoolboys and Schoolgirls championships on 7th November, the following: I. ROWING







Leeuwin, Petty Officers G. E. Taylor and W. A. James were appointed Sub-Lieutenants. Sub-Lieutenant P. J. Pearson, who returned to the unit after spending last year in the officers' ranks, brought the total of Cadet Sub-Lieutenants to three.

During both the Christmas and May holidays Cadets were given the opportunity of sailing in the Unit's 27 ft. Whaler or its 14 ft. Dinghy. Almost all the Cadets in the Unit have sailed in these boats at some time during their naval careers.

First term activities consisted of a rifle shoot on the minirange, rifle drill, theoretical and practical seamanship, and parade drill.

On the 1st March, seventeen members of the unit took part in the 1964 Colours Ceremony and Presentation of Trophies at H.M.A.S. Leeuwin. The unit received the trophy for the Most Improved Unit. Comments were passed on the exceptional bearing of the T.S. Cygnet Cadets at this parade.

Towards the end of the term, T.S. Cygnet moved its store from the old cramped store in the change rooms block to the larger room under the lecture theatre.

SECOND TERM

During second term much emphasis was placed on parade ground training. A large amount of the class work was accomplished by the use of films loaned to the Unit by H_•M.A.S. Leeuwin.

On 29th June the Unit visited the "H.M.A.S. Sydney", and stayed aboard for about an hour. The next day, the 1st July, Lieutenant B. McEwan assumed the position of C.O. from Lieutenant Commander R. G. Harris.

The annual inspection of the boatshed and unit headquarters was carried out on the dates of the 5th August and the 12th August, respectively. T. S. Cygnet was competing with four other units for the State Colours. The Inspecting Officer, Commander G. Beange, commented on the bearing and practical seamanship of the unit.

CAMP

The annual camp was conducted this year at Garden Island from Saturday, 15th August to Friday, 21st August. The main function of the camp was to instill as much practical seamanship in all cadets as possible. Two whalers were placed at our disposal, as well as a 45 ft. "workboat" from H.M.A.S. Leeuwin.

The weather was fine for most of the camp's duration, and considerable sailing, rowing, and other practical aspects of naval life were taught.

A night exercise was held on the Tuesday night, and because of the quick, disciplined action of the N.C.O.'s, Red Division won by a margin of a few seconds. A second exercise was to have been held the following night, but owing to a heavy fall of rain, it was abandoned. As an alternative, an exercise based on the deciphering of codes was conducted indoors.

During the Camp many friendships were made between the cadets of T.S. Cygnet and the members of the Royal Australian Naval Reserve.

THIRD TERM

Naval activities in third term began with a visit by ten cadets to the British Aircraft Carrier, "H.M.S. Victorious." The cadets sailed with the "H.M.S. Victorious" from Fremantle to a position about a mile from the Harbour. They were then returned to the Harbour by the Pilot Boat, owing to operational

requirements of the carrier. The original intention had been to proceed to a point about 50 miles off the coast and to disembark the cadets by Wessex helicopters.

The only other activity in third term was the Marching Out Parade, which was conducted this year by the Army. T.S. Cygnet maintained a high standard of efficiency throughout the Parade, in spite of drizzling rain.

During the parade, three trophies were presented to Naval Cadets. They were:

- (1) The Vickridge Trophy presented to Leading Seaman Leonhardt.
- (2) The Garden Island Trophy presented to Leading Seaman Dixon.
- (3) The Douglas Brown Trophy presented to Able Seaman Roberts.

At the beginning of third term, the Unit was advised of the results of the Annual Inspection of Boats and Unit Headquarters. In the competition for the State Colours, T.S. Cygnet was placed second; one point behind T.S. Creswell, an Open Unit. Trophies for Practical Seamanship and for the Most Improved Unit were awarded to T.S. Cygnet.

Naturally, the news that T.S. Cygnet had been beaten by one point in the State Colours competition was a considerable disappointment. However, the Unit should pride itself on the fact that never before has it come so close to winning. Next year, with the continued interest of the Parents and Friends' Committee, and the advantage of having recently received new issues, T.S. Cygnet should have an excellent opportunity of winning the 1965 Colours.

Mr. Hoar's visit to Charterhouse

In August, 1963, Mr. T. D. Hoar left for the United Kingdom, accompanied by Mrs. Hoar and their four children.

So called "modern mathematics" is being introduced in the United Kingdom through the School Mathematics Project under Prof. Bryan Thwaites of the Southampton University. Texts on the new syllabus have been developed as the result of the collaboration of eight schools in the U.K. Senior mathematics staff in these schools are given time off to introduce the new material, train their staff and write texts. They continue to be paid by their own governing bodies and mathematicians are brought in from outside to do their work within the school. These people are paid by the Southampton University on a scholarship basis. Mr. Hoar's scholarship meant that he was allotted to Charterhouse at Godalming.

The new mathematics, Mr. Hoar said, proved to be interesting and valuable. Generally speaking, it is designed to make mathematics more realistic and places emphasis on the practical mathematics and the understanding of the basis of mathematics. The language and content are different from those of our traditional courses. Great emphasis is placed on the language of sets; much time is spent on the theory and use of the slide rule and Geometry is now learned through Transformations. Importance is placed on the Binary Number System and on Linear programming as an introduction to computing. The latter is the practical use of simultaneous equations and inequations. Statistics, probability and three dimensional geometry add to the usefulness of the course.

Hale will feel the benefit of Mr. Hoar's experience when the new mathematics course, which includes work on sets and inequalities, is introduced in the near future.

Charterhouse is situated some 35 miles from London and was founded in 1611. Today it has 600 boys (all boarders, who live in eleven self-contained houses) and a highly qualified staff of sixty. There is a wide variety of activities within the school; all of which go on at the same time so that each boy is engaged in some activity and the gifted boys do not do everything. The sports include soccer, rugby, hockey, cricket, tennis, fives, squash, fencing, athletics and sailing. Four musicians conduct classes in all spheres of music and there are two full-time art-masters. An active film society is in operation and every week guest speakers of world renown talk to the sixth forms on a variety of subjects. The sixth form (boys of 18-19 years) have their own club at which beer is served. The cadet corps is a combined unit under

the charge of a Lieutenant-Colonel and there are three army personnel working full-time at the school. They have their own equipment which includes two lorries, assault boats, and camping equipment sufficient for the whole unit.

Mr. Hoar was most impressed by the traditions and standards of Charterhouse. He commented on the excellent relationship between Masters and boys; friendly yet respectful. The numerous activities are interesting. Fifty mile hikes, trips to Wales and even to the Continent to see the Grand Prix were not uncommon. Adventure courses and social service groups provided some of the essentials of education.

The experience of the year was most valuable. Apart from attending the S.M.P. courses and instruction in the Cuisenaire method of teaching mathematics to primary children, Mr. Hoar visited many famous schools and universities. During the holiday periods, which were much more generous than our own, he and his family were able to see much of England, Scotland and Wales as well as part of the Continent. The hospitality and the friend-liness of the people never ceased to amaze. Mr. Hoar expressed gratitude for the wonderful opportunity that came his way.

Chess Club

The team finished second overall in the teams' championship.

Unfortunately, there were no inter-school matches this year.

Music Society

During first term the Music Society was occupied almost entirely with the production of the opera "H.M.S. Pinafore". At the beginning of Second Term, a new committee was elected. Activities during the Societies' hour in Second Term included a concert by *The Travellers*, a folk singing group at that time visiting Perth. On normal Society days the boys were divided into different groups including a Classical Music Group, a folk-singing group and a part-singing group.

CRITIQUE

The singing and acting of both principals and chorus reached a high standard. There was evident in the performances a delightful sparkle, and a polish that reflected the hard work cast members had put in over several months of rehearsal.

G. J. Glover (Sir Joseph Porter, K.C.B.) showed himself to be a "natural" G. and S. artist in a most mature and convincing performance. D. T. Irvine (Captain Corcoran) had a fine stage presence and, through accomplished acting, exposed many of Gilbert's subtleties. G. H. Gwynne sang and acted with a great deal of sensitivity as Ralph Rackstraw. D. H. Haselhurst (as the misanthrope, Dick Deadeye) and R. I. Hartley (as Sir Joseph's favourite cousin, Hebe) showed the benefit of their previous experience as G. and S. principals (in "Pirates of Penzance", 1962) with clever character portrayal and clear, confident singing. The

fair Josephine, played by D. C. Atkinson, caught many an eye and delighted many an ear; in a word "Beautiful"! M. C. Bennett was a brisk, robust Boatswain, with a rich baritone voice. G. R. Cain, playing the most difficult part of Buttercup, handled the part courageously.

The so-called minor principals also performed most commendably. They were the two splendid mates to the Boatswain, R. W. Liddell and S. E. Dean; the Sergeant of Marines, G. E. Taylor (whose efficient, lusty orders nearly brought the house down!) Midshipmite W. L. Wallis (a pat on the back "for you little man"), and that quartette of ravishing beauties who won many a heart, T. K. Waldron (Agatha), A. T. Irvine (Catherine), R. A. Ledingham (Margaret) and G. J. Riley (Prudence).

The members of the male chorus moulded themselves into an imposing group of hearty, proud British tars who sang and acted with life and gusto. The "female" chorus, the sisters, cousins and aunts of Sir Joseph, looked really "rapturous" and sang "sweetly". Each "girl" wore a wig and dress which were styled and made to fit each individual's Victorian personality. The three marines, G. E. Taylor, D. J. Stickland and I. V. Wickens, were excellent in bearing and drill.

Charities Contributions

A lot of new books have been put into the library this year, but it's hard to take them out. A book-card, as well as a reader's card must now be filled in before a book is legally borrowed. Some fear that this is a double-check on who has what (which it is), but the big advantage is the time saved by the librarian when recording loans.

English (including fiction), Geography and History and Economics sections have been well filled out. All other subjects have had some additions, not forgetting "outside" interests, but Science and Maths still need much building up. The Science block libraries for Physics and Chemistry have been catalogued, classified and book-carded, with the help of Mr. Saveliev. He now controls borrowing there.

A library prefect, A. C. Watson, was appointed, but no committee was chosen this year. Boys have, however, been co-erced into helping with such forbidding work as sticking a book-pocket in every book in the library and cutting plastic covers.

The school library aims to tell everyone what he wants to know, but more than this: to surprise him with valuable unexpected "finds".

Encouraging signs are:

- —The windows display of new book jackets has attracted a big variety of comments and many enquiries.
- —Many more boys are learning their way around the reference section, especially the Encyclopaedias and the Dictionaries of Biography.
- —Most forms have some period in the library, usually for English, History or Economics.
- -Almost all boys have borrowed books.
- —Both boys and masters have suggested new books and periodicals.
- -The library is often crowded at lunch-hour.

- -The periodicals are very popular.
- —Some boys have made good use of the library for private study, especially after school.

Chapel Notes

The year began with a subdued atmosphere in our Chapel Services. We missed the leadership in singing and in attendance at Communion of the senior boys who left at the end of 1963.

Gradually things improved and the third term saw our worship somewhere near the high standard of last year. The only disappointing feature remaining was the fact that many senior boys were not providing the example of attendance at Communion we have come to expect.

With Mr. Bennett no longer a resident housemaster, the provision of a pianist for Evensong posed a real difficulty until Sister Green volunteered. We were most grateful for her really competent accompaniment—despite her self-doubts. Mr. Bennett returned to us for most of the third term. We will miss both these good friends at our services next year, and will be remembering them in our prayers.

At the Confirmation, Archbishop Appleton laid hands on twenty candidates. A fine crowd of parents and friends were present and of course we are always delighted to welcome visitors to our services.

A number of visiting preachers addressed us this year—Father Mark Haynes, S.S.M., the Reverend J. Mills, Archdeacon F. Guest, the Reverend David Martin, the Reverend Jeremy Harrold, the Reverend Normal Hall, the Reverend L. McIntyre, Canon K. Halley and the Reverend F. Eccleston. To them and to our Headmaster we are most grateful.

Owing to our accompanist difficulties little progress was made in our Chapel music, but we are working towards a Carol Service on the last Sunday of the third term and this is to be our most ambitious undertaking in church music.

The collections at Evensong were not good. Our expenses are not great and so this is not serious, but the boys could afford to be far more generous. From collections, £5/5/- was given to the Wollaston College Chapel Fund and £10/10/- to Hale School Chapel Building Fund. Thirty new kneelers were purchased.

Attendances at Communion continued at about the same level as last year, averaging thirty per service. Early in the year every Communion saw a few boys unable to see the service through. It was decided to shorten the service and to supply the boys beforehand with milk and biscuits to keep them going. These measures succeeded and will be continued. It is months since anyone has had to go out during the service and numbers attending have increased.


THE DESTRUCTION OF PERTH

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

I would like to present the Annual Report of the Old Haleians' Association for 1964.

The Office Bearers and Committee were as shown above. The only alteration occurring during the year was the election of E. V. Blackman to replace T. A. O'Keefe as Vice-President.

The Committee has met regularly at the Old Boys' Room in Cygnet Hall, and all meetings have been very well attended.

At the first meeting of the year, sub-committees were formed to handle the various activities of the Association. I will make further reference to these later.

Finance

The Finances of the Association have prospered during the year, and despite slightly heavy commitments with Scholarships, etc., we have been able to transfer more moneys to Life Membership Investments; and the Committee has approved the investment of these moneys in the Home Building Society. I will leave the financial details to the Treasurer, who will, no doubt, explain them more fully.

There is still a lag in the payment of subscriptions. Some members apparently feel embarrassed because they have allowed themselves to come into arrears. This can easily be overcome by the payment of a Life Membership, which saves the member the problem of repeatedly forwarding his subscription, and the Treasurer the even greater problem of arranging its collection. It is pleasing to note that an increasing number of Old Boys are using this method, and that in response to a letter to the parents of boys leaving school, a number have enrolled their sons as Life Members as a final school "payment".

It is hoped the day will arise when the interest from these accumulated funds will be sufficient for the financing of the Association, and allow more generous scholarship awards.

Membership.

During the year, nine members transferred to Life Membership, and ten new members joined initially as Life Members. However, I feel that there are still too many Old Haleians who are not members of the Association, and it behoves every one of us to encourage these old boys to renew their closer ties with the official body, The Old Haleians' Association.

Social Activities.

Under the Committee headed by K. S. Jones, the Social Committee worked extremely well in organising the usual functions. Despite this work, their efforts were only rewarded with moderate success. The launch at the Head of the River was unfortunately only filled to half capacity; however, those who did attend all agreed that it was a most enoyable day. We must see that there is a better response next year.

The Public Schools Association Ball was again a success. However, our own main functions, the Golf Day and the Annual Dinner were not as well attended as in previous years. This was most disappointing, as the Committee had had to overcome more than the usual number of difficulties before the fixtures could be arranged.

The Country Dinner held at Wongan Hills was well attended, and a most delightful weekend was had. Much credit must be given to the Robinsons, father and son, who combined so well with the Social Committee in the organisation.

Sport.

The Old Boys added to their excellent record in the sporting field by again winning the Old Boys' race at the Head of the River, and the Old Boys' Relay at the Inters.; as well as the Golf Shield for Combined W.A. Old Boys.

Cygnet Hall.

The Cygnet Hall Committee this year, under the direction of R. Newman, faced up to an extremely difficult situation. The development of Stomp type of dancing has caused such problems that they have had to refuse bookings of the Hall for this type of entertainment; and after consultation with the Board of Governors, who generously agreed to waive rents, it was decided that the Hall should not be let for regular public dances of any sort. From the financial point of view, this is most unfortunate, but essential for the good name of the School and of the Hall. It is to be hoped that Old Boys will remember this excellent facility when they are arranging either entertainment or business meetings.

"The Cygnet".

You will all have received a copy of "The Cygnet", and I am sure you will ask me to convey to the school our congratulations on its production, and to thank them for their very generous treatment of the Old Boys in regard to its supply.

"The Old Haleian".

Four copies of the Magazine have been produced this year, and John Deykin and his Committee are to be congratulated on maintaining the standard which has been set. Old Boys should remember that, although this publication has a limited circulation, it may well be an excellent medium for their advertising.

Scholarship.

The Headmaster has reported very favourably on the student to whom the Old Boys' Scholarship was awarded.

The Board of Governors.

During the year, the Old Boys' Selection Committee reappointed L. E. Fethers for a further four years to the Board of Governors.

War Memorial Association.

The active work of this Association should now have ceased; but, as there are still a number of promises that have not yet been honoured, the members have continued to serve. During the year, further additions to the Hall—Honour Boards and an upstairs carpet to deaden the noise—were supplied. The seats which were purchased last year, having been re-covered and painted by the boys of the school, were in use at this year's very excellent production of *H.M.S. Pinafore*.

There are several matters to which I would like to draw your attention. South Australia has almost formed its own "charter" of Old Haleians. These members meet regularly and show an interest in the School and Association that would be a credit to many who are more favourably situated geographically. I would personally like to congratulate these members, and hope that they may prove an inspiration to some of our other members who are marooned away from home.

It was pleasing to us all to see one who was so interested in the Association for so long elected to the highest civil office. We all congratulate the Lord Mayor, Charles Veryard, on his appointment.

Finally, I wish to thank all members of the Committee for the excellent work they have done throughout the year, and especially those past Presidents who regularly attend meetings and add their wealth of experience to the deliberations.

Gentlemen, I thank you all for the opportunity of serving as your President. It has been a most interesting and rewarding experience.
