

"Some things are never clear"

It appears conventional in the editorials of school magazines either to praise the school or to relate world events to school events or, in exceptional years, to write about the school's sporting achievements. 1965 has been a good year for Hale—we won the swimming, tennis and rugby—but this would hardly justify my making this editorial a eulogy of sporting achievements. The first two choices, I feel, have been dealt with sufficiently by past editors, who could possibly accuse me of plagiarism if I pursued either of these two lines of thought. Hence, I have decided to be rather unorthodox and select one facet of school life on which I can enlarge. I have chosen the subject of "schoolmasters and schoolboys."

After graduating through the school from L4, where every master is met with trepidation by everyone, to 5A, where few, if any, masters are feared, I feel that I am now in a position to put in writing some of the thoughts which have come to me during my later years at school. I do not wish to offend, and if anything I write may sound like advice, I can only say that such presumption is quite unintentional.

Having to face a room full of hobbledehoys, anyone of whom is likely to seize upon the slightest slip as an opportunity to rouse


a puerile and all too eager outburst from the whole class, makes me consider that being a schoolmaster is not necessarily an enviable occupation. He dare not have any peculiar mannerisms nor engage in battology. The physiognomy and somatype with which he is endowed are not permitted to deviate from the mean; his caparison must be that of the present vogue, not even that of a hemi-decade ago. Double-breasted suits, table-cloth ties, twenty-two-inch trouser cuffs and the like are definitely eccentric by the conventions of present day youth. If he does ablude in any way he cannot fail to notice the clandestine jibes of his factious class.

Tennyson coined the veritable simile "as cruel as a schoolboy"; for schoolboys intrinsically display egoistic hedonism, especially at the expense of those in suzerainty of them. Individually they approach tolerability, but collectively they constitute a menagerie that derides anything it espies.

And yet many retired schoolmasters are octo- or nonagenarians retaining mens sana as well as corpore sano. What is the explanation for this seeming paradox? Perhaps the lengthy school holidays allow the master time to recuperate between terms. But then there are the masters who are as unscathed at the end of term as they are at the beginning; in fact, some are never unduly oppressed by their class and always appear to have it in complete control. How do they achieve this very difficult subdual? It appears that the master's first day decides his fate for as long as he remains at the school. It is at this time that he proves whether he is the master in deed as well as in name, someone to be respected and feared, or whether he is too passive to control the anarchy which the boys wish to introduce into his lessons.


Most masters, I assume, attempt to be as liked and as respected as possible, whilst maintaining discipline in class. Many succeed in this objective but some do not receive all the respect they deserve, possibly because they sacrifice some respect in favour of popularity. Then, strict discipline is not always maintained and some boys take complete advantage of the situation and reduce most periods to chaos. Few boys are able to grasp that the master is an ally and not an enemy if treated with deference. One of his major functions is to help students to pass their examinations. Obviously he cannot succeed to any great extent if every period he teaches is debased to a farce. No one should condemn a few schoolboy pranks, but the master must be given some opportunity to demonstrate what teaching ability he has.

After reflection, I come to the conclusion that schoolmastering is a true vocation requiring qualities with which not all are endowed, and demanding a degree of dedication which few of us might be prepared to give.

FIRST TERM

School began on Tuesday, 9th February, and the Headmaster welcomed all boys back to the school.

J. G. Scott was appointed Captain of the School, T. R. Hantke Vice-Captain; and the following were announced as Prefects: J. Bird, P. Eakins, C. I. R. Prince, A. D. Self, I. W. Smith, L. A. Underdown. The Prefects were inducted by Mr. Prince. (V. W. Wright was inducted later in the year).

Sporting activities for first term were soon under way, and the following Sports Captains were appointed: Rowing—L. A. Underdown; Cricket—K. Campbell; Swimming—T. R. Hantke.

The first cricket match of the season was played on the 10th February against the Governor's XI, and on the 6th March, Darlot Cup matches commenced.

Old Boys' Day, on March 1, was well attended as usual. The Old Boys competed against the School in swimming, tennis and cricket. A. Irvine won the bat presented for the best score made against the Old Boys.

The School broke up for the Easter holidays on 15th April, and returned on 20th April.

Staff Changes

"I could be worse employed"

The following members of the teaching staff left at the end of 1964: Messrs. G. M. Bennett, R. L. Juniper, R. G. Quade-Smith, J. E. Smart, M. F. Stallard, P. Stocker and A. Veth.

Those joining the staff at the beginning of this year were Mr. D. Chadwick, the notable State sportsman, to teach Maths. in the Lower and Middle School and Physical Training; Mr. B. Loftus to take over the Art department from Mr. Juniper; Mr. F. Pyke to be our Guidance Officer, Mr. Loveland to teach English in the Middle School, Mr. J. Sanders to teach English in the Middle and Senior School, Mr. M. Watt to take over the German classes; Mr. Cox to teach commerce and Mr. D. Stones to teach Music and English.

On Mr. Marshall's departure in May for his well-earned long service leave, Mrs. E. Wright (who left at the end of second term) and Miss L. Rourke joined the staff to teach the French classes. During the year, Messrs. Moore and Sorenson taught Lower and Middle School Science classes on a part-time basis. The school was sorry to lose its Bursar, Brig. L. Rush, when he returned to England. He has been replaced by Mr. Burr.

We wish the new members of staff a pleasant stay at Hale School and for those who have left us we wish success in their future.

Old Boys' Day

Old Boys' Day of 1st March was, as usual, well attended. 183 Old Boys were present for Roll Call, and 161 remained for Old Boys' meetings. The annual cricket match resulted in a narrow win for the Old Boys, and Anthony Irvine must be congratulated on winning the Old Boys' bat, with a fine score of 48 not out. The swimming—an innovation of a couple of years ago—was continued, and the most exciting race was between the Old Boys and their sons, this resulting in a dead-heat. However, the School open team proved too strong for the Old Boys in the other relay. An enjoyable day was rounded off by the customary keg of ginger beer.

Speech Night

Speech Night, 1964, was held on the 7th December in the quadrangle before the Memorial Hall. The proceedings opened with the "National Anthem", followed by a prayer offered by the School Chaplain. The Captain of the School gave his report, after which came the Headmaster's Report. The prizes and trophies were presented by His Excellency The Governor, Sir Douglas Kendrew. The formal proceedings were concluded with a vote of thanks and the Benediction. Afterwards parents were invited to inspect displays of art and woodwork in the art room and the Memorial Hall.

Headmaster's Report

The Headmaster commenced his report by welcoming His Excellency the Governor, Sir Douglas Kendrew, to his first Speech Night at Hale School.

He then made mention of the various staff changes during the year, and particularly commented on the good work of Mr. Shields as Sportsmaster.

The Headmaster continued to say: "I also wish to record my appreciation of the Captain of the School and the other prefects, who have given me unqualified and united support. I believe that their sense of responsibility and their tenacity in the execution of their duty have substantially raised the status of Prefect in the School. I know that comparisons are odious, and perhaps psychologically unwise, but I cannot resist saying to whoever may be next year's Prefects, that if you will do for the School what this year's Prefects have done, we shall be a fortunate school indeed. The good year we have had outside the classroom, in sport, cadets and other fields, reflects the good lead, not only of the Prefects but also of the other seniors of the School."

As an example of this, the Headmaster cited the excellent production of "H.M.S. Pinafore", on which many boys and masters worked, and also regretted that Mr. Bennett was to leave at the end of the year.

Academic work had continued at a satisfactory level and the previous year's Public Examination results had been overall the best for many years. The Headmaster then referred to the growing discrepancy between educational trends in the community, and the outmoded Public Examination System, and said it would be far better to have the first major examination at the end of Fourth Year, but that, until the cost of a further year of schooling could be met by this State, some form of external examination was necessary at the end of the third year.


Nevertheless, the present form of the Junior Certificate examination seemed totally outmoded. The Headmaster pointed out that the boy with a Junior Certificate to show, because he passed any five subjects, might well be far worse prepared for higher education than the boy passing only English, Mathematics and Physics. He said that, because of this system, the parent of a boy who has passed the Junior Certificate expects his boy to go on to Fourth Year, taking any course of his choosing, and that each year a small number of boys left at Fourth Year with a sense of disillusionment and failure, simply because they had selected the wrong subjects.

Sincere appreciation was expressed for the work of Mr. Quade-Smith, who had done so much to set up the well developed Testing and Guidance Organization. It was the school, with its knowledge of a boy's academic performances, ability, and personality, that could best help parents with advice on vocational matters, and on whether a boy's progress was satisfactory with regard to his ability. The Headmaster appealed to parents to give due weight to the advice given by the school on these matters.

Reference was made to the Sixth Form, a small group of boys who, having passed their Leaving Certificate, returned for a year of general development, broader education and, where necessary, the completion of further examination requirements. This was the first year there had been such a group, and the year had been a great success, not only for the boys, but also for the school.

The development of the Junior School had continued most satisfactorily, and numbers were rising steadily. The Headmaster felt that this reflected the satisfaction of the parents with their boys' education, and that the Junior School provided a better allround education than any State School could hope to give.

The Headmaster then went on to say that the continued strong demand for boarding places had led to a firm decision by the Board of Governors to start work on the third Boarding House, this marking an important stage towards the completion

of the School's Master Development Plan. This decision to build had brought to the fore again the need of a School Chapel. The sum needed for this would probably be raised over the next five years. After these two buildings, only the Gymnasium and the permanent Junior Boarding House remained of the organial list of major buildings envisaged, but new Science Buildings were now necessary, and the School could be assisted in this project by the Commonwealth Government.

Commenting on the discipline of the School, the Headmaster said that the year had been freer than could usually be expected of unpleasant disciplinary problems, but that a few had failed to discipline themselves, and had become misfits. If, through his idleness or inability, schoolwork became a frustration for a boy, and sports and other hobbies provided no achievement, then other outlets became necessary.

In conclusion, the Headmaster said: "A Church School should, of course, be the one best able to bring about the complete change of outlook which alone can solve such a boy's problem. The Christian faith has always taught that human nature can be changed, and in the most fundamental way, by the operation of God's Holy Spirit. This is not to say that the entire personality is altered, but that the thought forms and behaviour patterns are so transformed that an effectively changed person results. While Christianity is not only for the boy who is in serious difficulties, it can meet his psychological needs by giving him a sense of belonging to the fellowship of Christ. It has been a source of some satisfaction that this year some of our boys have found their way out of the blind alley of self-pitying rebellion. It is my prayer that this School will help to prevent others even entering this dead-end and will, by the education it provides, keep them instead on the highway of disciplined self-expression in the service of God and the community.'

Captain of School's Report

Your Grace, Governors of the School, Headmaster, Members of Staff, Ladies and Gentlemen, and Boys of Hale:

The sporting achievements of 1964 have been the best for many years. The highlight of the year was the outstanding fighting spirit of the Rugby Teams. The First XV out-manoeuvred and out-played all their opposition teams, and were placed first in the overall competition. Their toughest match was against the Scotch First XV. There were boys out of the team owing to injury and at half time we were six points behind the strong Scotch team. In the final half, the forwards joined together and fought back to assist in winning the match for the School.

During the winter season, the First XVIII Football team also helped to raise the School's spirits. They finished in third position, after the final round had been completed. They fought out some interesting matches. The greatest win was against Wesley College, when the team combined to beat Wesley 19 goals 14 behinds to 3 goals 5 behinds. This was the greatest winning margin since 1927 and the most number of goals scored since 1940.

The Swimmers also had their share of success, and the team finished third in the Annual Swimming Inters. This result taught the boys who had not pulled together in training that team spirit is essential for gaining a victory.

The Hockey team, after many long, hard fought years, won their first match. The forwards played openly and at half time the team was leading Christ Church by 2 goals. When the final whistle had been blown, the school had run out victors 6 goals to nil.

Finally, on the sporting side, I would like to mention the great team work and fighting ability of the Athletic team. The pre-season training camp, held at Point Peron, helped the boys to combine in their efforts to win an Inters title and also to get them to a peak of condition. This camp proved its advantages and on the day the Hale team was the fittest on the track.

In the field of general school activities, Mr. Bambach, Mr. Bennett and the boys taking part in the opera "H.M.S. Pinafore", are to be congratulated on the high standard of entertainment which they provided to appreciative audiences.

The Army Cadets were second to none in their excellent marching performances at the Annual Camp's Marching-Out Parade.

The Navy Cadets also performed creditably and this year,

under Mr. McEwan, were a notably improved unit.

Finally, I would like to thank the Prefects for their solid support throughout the year, and, in anticipation, offer my congratulations to their successors in 1965, and wish the School generally the best of luck in all spheres of its activities next year.



Although not gifted in the field of sport, the teams this year often showed just what spirit and determination achieve. However, until every boy in every team shows a fanatical desire to


achieve success, the House will not see any dramatic change of fortune in House and School activities.

Of last year's Cup-winning XV only four returned this year and, without a great deal of confidence, we prepared to build a team. The boys were keen enough. They worked very hard to get fit and to learn the skills of the game and, well before the season began, the composition of the First XV became clear. The team was hardly changed for the entire season and developed excellent teamwork.

At first, the team did not look impressive. The forwards were neither tall nor particularly heavy and there was no dynamic fast player among them. Most of the backs were novices and half of them were not as fast as they should have been. Despite this, the First XV developed into the best side Hale has ever produced. The coach of another school expressed this well when he said, "This team is the most polished schoolboy rugby side I have seen in years".

The ball would fly along the backline to John Turnbull and, if he was hemmed in, there would always be someone to

back him up. Jon Scott must have scored a dozen tries after handling the ball twice in thrilling quick-passing attacks.

The type of rugged game Hale played resulted in only one boy missing a game because of injury. Practically all the tries were scored by the backs, especially the wingers who were continually able to run with the ball.

This type of teamwork is thrilling to watch and brought great results—233 points scored in ten matches. Hale defence proved to be excellent. The backs swarmed up quickly and tackled low and the forwards ran themselves into the ground, providing a blanketing cover defence. This was shown by the fact that only 10 tries were scored against Hale in the ten games.

The fitness and teamwork necessary to play like this can only come from hard training, and the First XV were a delight to coach. They ran until they could not raise another step and did everything they were asked to do.

- JON SCOTT: Five-Eighth and Captain—played a captain's game throughout the season. He began the year as a five-eighth good enough to represent the State and by the end of the season was nothing less than brilliant.
- FRANK KUHN: Scrum-Half and Vice-Captain—the State Schoolboy's scrum-half, he played an efficient and aggressive style of game marred only by a tendency to try the blind side too often.
- BILL WANT: Lock Forward—gave everything he had. His lineout work and cover defence were big factors in our victories.
- JOHN TURNBULL: Winger—playing in his first season, proved to be a natural winger with speed, a swerve and sidestep and a deceptive change of pace. He averaged about three tries per match.
- COLIN RITCHIE: Winger—the finest tackler in the team. Although not very fast, he was so aggressive and safe that he was invaluable on the wing.
- CHRISTOPHER PRINCE, the 2nd Row Forward and KEVIN PRINCE, one Prop Forward—were great honest hard working forwards.
- DAVID BOYLE: Hooker-a fast forward, he played like a champion.
- TERRY BARR: Breakaway—in his first season of rugby developed remarkably quickly into a star breakaway, capable of filling in just about anywhere when called upon.
- PETER BRIGHTON: Outside Centre—overcame early nerves to become a fine centre with weight, pace and a beautiful kick. Peter usually shone in the second half of the match.
- COLIN GRIFFITH, a Prop Forward and STEPHEN BOSICH, a 2nd Row Forward—were a tough pair who, though new to the game, became ideal forwards—always right in the middle of the tight play.
- PETER DYSON: Breakaway—was a game, fast breakaway who did very well in his first season.

- TERRY MILL: Inside Centre—also playing his first season, his safe handling and fine kicking guaranteed his place in the backline and he was the perfect link between Scott and Brighton. His defence was a weakness but it improved markedly as the season progressed.
- PETER LUMMIS: Full-Back—very solid with a perfect low tackle. Although he had a ton of courage he was inclined to run straight into trouble.
- LESTER UNDERDOWN: Hooker—was the only reserve used and in his season proved just what a hard working trier can do.

In completing a great Rugby season for Hale School, the Second XV also won their competition, winning nine out of ten games and scoring no less than 201 points while conceding only 30.

Playing fast, open rugby, the Second XV were an exciting team. Special mention must be made of Jack Michael, who scored thirty tries; Geoff. Heitman, Guy Van Hazel, Murray Webster, Robert Ainslie and Tim Humphry, who would probably have made the First XV any other year. It was a pity for them that the Firsts were such a tight-knit team.

From the First XV:

We would like to thank Rev. R. E. Davis for his keen coaching of the First XV and the interest he showed in each boy. It was impossible for any boy not to give of his best after being associated with Rev. Davis and he really moulded us into a well-knit team. Mr. J. D. Bambach and Mr. Watt must also be congratulated on their great efforts in bringing the Second XV up to Premiership standards.

HALE SCHOOL v. AQUINAS COLLEGE


Played at Aquinas College, 5th June, 1965



INTER-HOUSE SPORTS AND SCHOOL CHAMPIONSHIPS

For a number of years masters connected with athletics at the school have wanted to hold the "Inter-House Sports" and "School Championships" as different meets. Before this year the two were integrated into the "School Sports", in which individuals qualified for finals, from which points were allotted to Houses according to the position obtained by each competitor. The main disadvantage of this system was that in many events certain houses were not represented, while other houses had three or four representatives. Another disadvantage was that only the better athletes qualified, and the parents of the less able boys were not able to see their sons compete, as they did so only on afternoons after school.

Last year Mr. Shields drew up plans to hold an "Inter-House Sports" on Saturday and "School Championships" on Tuesday. This year Mr. Towers, as sportsmaster, implemented this idea, conferring with Mr. Aitken and other officials as to dates, etc.

In the "Inter-House Sports" there were a number of divisions for each race, and each house had one representative in each division. In this way, virtually every boy had the thrill of competing for his house.

Despite prior criticism the meet ran like clockwork, and all the officials must be complimented on their fine organisation. The Sports should take this form for many years to come.

Faulkner House lived up to its reputation by winning again; this, with the other boarding house, Wilson, coming second showed that depth in numbers and house spirit are the basis of success in these sports.

COACH'S REPORT

"The important thing in the Olympic Games Is not to win, but to take part.

The important thing in life Is not the triumph, but the struggle.

The essential thing Is not to have conquered, but to have fought well."

-Baron Pierre de Coubertin.

That we are not Olympic-standard athletes, competing in an Olympic Games, has never prevented us from adhering to the above principles.

Taking part. In 1963 we came out of the depths to register third place in the Inters. Last year it was 2nd place (and, on positions, our best effort since 1952), while this year, with virtually the same number of points as last year, we took fourth placing.

A successful Inters.? Perhaps. A successful athletic year? Yes, most definitely. Contrary to remarks which appear later (but hopefully constructive) this was our most successful year -cross country relay win, and an overall grand spirit and approach to both volume and intensity of training, particularly at the camp, and later at school training sessions. From the crosscountry season and its events through to the Inters. it was a story of individuals taking part, training and striving together in companionship and hard work to become members of a team.


In the early hours of the morning they slip quietly away, to return almost one hour later; sometimes soaked through by rain, sometimes dishevelled by fierce winds, often systematically flexing and extending fingers numbed by intense cold, yet with glowing faces shining under perspiration. They are now almost













legendary figures in the surrounding districts, and by their rhythmic, meteoric beat ye shall know them—the cross country, middle distance runners.

Old Boys' Day at the Pt. Peron Apex camp? No, but seemingly becoming that way at the Athletics camp (Sept. 10th. 12th). Miming the motions of culinary experts were E .D. Fethers, R. L. Gray and R. W. Liddell. Fortunately they were under the supervision of chief cookie, Mr. Shields. Assisting on the training side were D. E. Barton and B. C. A. Strickland. Both the senior boys and the weather played their parts extremely well—the camp was a beauty!

Taking part by providing strong support for our many ventures were parents. Their assistance in time-keeping at cross-country events and on Inter-House day and championship day and in providing transport to and from the Athletics camp, to mention just a few of their deeds, was most appreciated.

Inter-House Day, inter-house togetherness, for everyone took part. On occasions we needed fourteen stopwatches in use with the simultaneous running of 100 and 220 yard events. There were a staggering number of events with every boy competing in both 100 and 220 yard events, plus competing in a field event, a middle distance event, an obstacle race (Under 14, 15 only) and shuttle relays, as required and nominated by his House. The kudos for a tremendous day belongs to Mr. Shields, the originator of the scheme, Mr. Towers, who put it into practice, and the House-masters.

One of the most pleasing features of the Inters was the increasing numbers of former athletes visiting our changerooms. Your interest in and encouragement to, the athletes, will always remain most welcome.

The struggle — fought well.

On their third time of trying they both 'made' the Inters. team. What better examples of perseverance and determination' R. J. Fitzgerald, prevented from running in the 1963 and 1964 Inters. teams by injuries (although in both those years a school cross-country competitor), finally managed to overcome misfortune and for this year's Inters. team was named vice-captain. S. H. Wells was simply not fast enough on the track to qualify for the team in 1963 and 1964, whereas in cross-country events and in long distances he was extremely good. This rags-to-riches story ends with a 'doff of the hat' to his new Under 17 Mile record of 4:38.0.

Success? Attitude!

At the Athletics camp the boys put into practice a basic athletic truth—"There is no gain without pain." What was hard work and agony last year was smugly easy this year. Inspired by P. S. Blizard and R. J. Fitzgerald, the boys "reduced mountains to molehills." A 'cream puff' has more than one definition. The camp athletes will tell you of one only—a pastry piece for ladies' luncheons. We had no other at the camp. They will also tell you that hard work, the struggle, poses no real problem; that pain is 'mind' over matter'.

Highlights of the season: M. N. Wheat and D. J. Mill powering through the one lap event; the vastly improved performances through hard work of K. J. de Gruchy, S. H. Wells, G. L. McPhee, and L. B. Craig; I. W. Smith winning the second division Open 880 and Mile in a controlled and powerful manner that will not be easily forgotten; the Open team (D. J. Mill, P. J. Dyson, R. J. Fitzgerald, P. S. Blizard) winning the State 4 x 1 mile cross-country relay; the great sporting ability and wonderful competitive drive of M. N. Wheat—from the School 2 mile cross-country championship, through the School track and field championships, to cap it off at the Inters.

Athletics captain, Phil. Blizard, and vice-captain, Ray Fitzgerald, set fine personal examples of hard training and inspired other squad members to drive themselves on. Sincere thanks to you both for your most valuable assistance. Working with boys of the same calibre as the above, of whom there were many from all age groups (John Bird, Geoff. Gray, Peter Dyson, to mention just a few) made it a most enjoyable athletics season.

From Here, Where?

What is holding us back? Expecting, demanding too much? 'Silk purses from sow's ears'? Firstly, we pay, and most dearly, for putting our sporting events in tight compartments. The inseason training polishes the event, the off-season preparation lays the foundation for better performances. We are being leg-ironed by a type of self-throat-cutting "Jack system". Hurdles and other field events require considerable skill, which cannot be learnt in 3-4 weeks. Tracing the background to fast times by middle distance runners indicates the value of cross-country running and similar winter training.

With the overall standards creeping higher, year-round facilities have become a must. Aquinas have realised this and leave aside an oval, partly marked out, and with steeplechase facilities; they have, too, their recognised cross-country courses. We started the ball rolling with our cross-country teams, but then Aquinas stepped in and created new standards in this area. Just as our Inters. team for the past three years has been moulded

around distance runners, so has the Aquinian team. But steeple-chases, gads, what next?

Success? Attitude!

No team can be completely successful without wholehearted support. Right up to the death-knock some still resist by using a great catch phrase—"it isn't compulsory" (meaning training more than the minimum of twice a week). To relent one week before the Inters. is too late—you only get out of something what you have put into it. When an attitude such as this is shown by boys with ability and potential, then it dampens team spirit and more often than not affects teamwork. Relay practices suffer the most. Before climbing on the bandwaggon, contemplate the school motto—Duty. With the Inters. being advanced one week, next year, the position of athletics in the school reaches an even more precarious position. All aspects of the "Jack system" must be dispersed.

lifted personal best performances in a positive uniform manner to a peak on the night. HOUSE SWIMMING SPORTS

Since the pool was opened in October, 1961, by Air Marshall Sir Valston Hancock, K.B.E., C.B., D.F.C., the standard of swimming by full time swimmers has steadily improved at a faster rate than that of the field sportsman; who, with limited time outside his own game, competes untrained. The gulf between land and water reached its limit in 1964. No longer did talent without training prove profitable or satisfying. Real interest in the house sports outside the swimming squad had collapsed; the validity of calling it a House Competition could no longer be justified.

Recasting the 1965 competition to include "B" Division races succeeded in giving opportunity to field sportsmen to compete on equal terms with each other, enabling them to make a contribution to their house effort. The significance of the change was not fully appreciated initially, as evidenced by the diffidence of some senior boys toward entering the heats. Realisation came to them in the finals when they found themselves watching competitors they could beat collecting valuable points. With a close margin of 21 points separating first and second place, their contribution would have been decisive.

Providing time for 292 finalists as opposed to 146 in previous years meant that the Diving events had to be omitted. It was

with regret that we took this step but no other solution was possible.

Officials did a fine job keeping pace with the fast moving programme, in particular Mr. Wager and Mr. McMath who recorded the results and were left entirely breathless. 

- ZIMBULIS, R.—Third selector. A correct opening batsman, who often got out when apparently set. Best strokes, the straight drive and leg glance.
- JEFFERIS, D.—The most gifted player in all three departments, always entertaining to watch when batting though a bad caller. With greater use of flight he might have taken a lot of wickets. First class fielder with a beautiful throw.
- BENNETT, C.—A quiet and efficient wicket keeper and left hand batsman who suffers from a weakness on the leg stump, but should develop into a very good player.
- IRVINE, A.—A second year boy of great promise. He has nearly all the strokes and knows a lot about the game but there is a lot more to know.
- SHANTI, P.—After a lean patch early in first term, he regained confidence and batted very well. Has a sound defence, is a reliable fielder and useful change bowler.
- FALLICK, I.—A useful all-rounder who opened the innings well in the last two matches, and who bowls leg breaks and googlies with plenty of bite.
- RICHARDSON, L.—Very successful slow flighty off spinner in preliminary matches, who failed to entice batsmen out in Cup cricket mainly because he bowled enough bad balls to enable his opponent to wait.
- BOSICH, S.—A fastish slinger who, under Mr. Gidney's guidance, improved greatly and wreaked havoc in Second XI and House matches. May do very well this coming season.





As usual rowing commenced towards the end of third term last year. The prospective First VIII boys were trained in two pairs and one IV for ease of supervision and selective training. This arrangement was continued for the first few weeks of first term before we moved into the *Lee-Steere* to commence our training as an eight. Several changes were made at this stage and the First VIII began training six days a week with Mr. Little. We later moved into our racing shell the R. A. Little.

As usual with the influx of new oarsmen, much basic training had to be done; this task was carried out by John Little with the aid of several previous season's First VIII boys.

They must also have the unfailing support of the whole school and then, and only then, will we be in a position to capture the rowing honours not held by our school since 1950.

COACH'S RESUME

A monumental season! In 1965 Hale School Football scaled the heights and throughout the school teams had more success than for some years. The First XVIII had their best season since 1947. Scotch are to be congratulated on winning the Alcock Cup with 8 victories followed by Hale 7, Aquinas 6, Guildford 4½, Christ Church 3 and Wesley 1½. In my view Hale should have won that elusive Cup. Victories over Aquinas twice and Scotch once support this argument but then tragedy struck us at Wesley and Guildford.

A football camp in the May holidays and a *Trip* to Adelaide in August were unique innovations this years. A real football education was achieved at the Camp where the boys trained hard, discussed football and heard lectures from Keith Slater, Kevin Murray, Brian Sarre, Ern Henfrey as well as from Messrs. Towers, Chadwick and Pyke. My thanks go to them and especially to the Matron, Mr. Hoar and Mr. Towers for all they did in making the Camp so successful.

Camp benefit was obvious in our magnificent opening against Aquinas. Playing the best back up, run on, team football I have seen from a Hale School team the boys totally annihilated Aquinas in a way that made up a little for so many thrashings in the past. Then came Scotch. In a good game a more fanatical Scotch College defeated Hale by 16 points. At home Hale then won a tense struggle against Guildford. Wesley won their first and only game for two seasons in beating Hale the following week. A very fast Wesley played well but Hale returned to the unimpressive lack lustre stuff of yesteryear, except in the final quarter when they almost snatched the game out of the fire. Christ Church had defeated Wesley earlier in the season. This unpredictable game then saw a bitterly determined Hale team cane Christ Church by 93 points.

The second round opened with Hale and Aquinas staging a tremendous struggle at Hale under gale force conditions. The last quarter was fierce as Aquinas backs kept Hale out. Suddenly a goal came and then five more and Hale had thrashed Aquinas again. Aquinas supporters and historians were scratching their heads in amazement. The season's denouement came at Hale the next week where previously unbeaten Scotch were humbled by a spirited Hale side playing grand team footy.

This great victory was only Hale's second against Scotch College in the last 31 games. From that pinnacle of glory we then tumbled into the humiliation of defeat in the Guildford mud. Except for the last quarter, Hale's approach and effort was not good enough. Aquinas defeated Scotch in the last game of the season and therefore our defeat at Guildford cost us equal first in the competition. In the final two games Hale had to work hard to win against Wesley and Christ Church. The team also defeated the Old Boys by 12.15 to 9.12 and was in fact unbeaten in 9 games on the Hale oval.

The day after the Christ Church game a party of twenty-five players, Mr. Towers and myself boarded our Whispering T jet for Adelaide. What a great time was had by all! I must pay tribute to the Masters at Scotch College, Adelaide, their boys and especially their parents who billeted the Hale boys out. Geelong College, Scotch and Hale played games against each other in what is considered the first ever interstate Public Schools Football Carnival. The Hale side played good football in both games on a waterlogged and much smaller ground. Geelong College 9.12 defeated Hale School 5.7 after a good game and in the last match of the season the whole side galvanised themselves into action and crushed our hosts, Scotch College, by 12.4 to 6.4. This was one of the finest team displays of the season. The whole idea of the trip was a splendid one. It is challenging to

meet other schools both at football and socially, great to see new places and to take Hale School on tour. I hope the trips can become a permanent feature and in fact it seems certain that Geelong and Scotch will be in Perth in May, 1966 to play in another Carnival. I am sure Hale men, past and present, and Parents will treat our visitors royally.

Giant ruckman, the blonde bombshell, the captain Peter Eakins was again the best footballer. He does not know the meaning of defeat and his inspiration on and off the ground was brilliant. Ian Collins, David Mill and Dale Jefferis made up the best line in the team. Their creative football as a unit and individual skills often brought talented half forward Geoff. Hodsdon into the game. Vice-Captain Ray Tarik, rover Bill Valli and rugged defender Don Wormald were fine players throughout but it is both difficult and wrong to single out players. The team is everything and on the many good days all players did well, combining to produce unselfish teamwork. The men who handpass to a team mate in a better position or shepherd or talk or encourage don't always get the mentions. They are the uncrowned kings of football!

To Haydon Dixon for his invaluable work as Ambulance man, to the many who donated trophies, to the boundary boys, to parents, friends and Old Boys for their great support, to Mr. Phillips for constant encouragement, to Mr. Towers for his magnificent work in all phases of football and especially to my two fellow selectors Peter Eakins and Ray Tarik go my thanks.

Football is a strange game. Form is variable, often unaccountable, both from an individual and team point of view and strange results can come. This partly explains why Hale failed to win. They had a great season producing in many games football of real quality, champagne stuff. Then suddenly all the magic disappeared and we'd lost the Cup. A relentless, assuming nothing, almost bitter approach is needed in every game for every moment of the game. Swans assumed, East Fremantle won. Players must always be stirred up, and excited no matter how hard or easy the opponent may seem, or how well or badly the team played the previous week, or how far ahead or behind the team is. After thrashing Scotch some players assumed Guildford would be easy. A fiery Hale School Nationalism must be always present and of course it often was. I mention all this only as a lesson for our future. If I sometimes became unnecessarily excited and even abusive it was only because of a burning desire for the Hale First XVIII to do itself justice. My desire is for football skills which produce play-on football, great comradeship and sportsmanship, teamwork and the Alcock Cup. 1965 saw all but the Cup. Can 1966 do the trick? At the end of my happiest ever football season at Hale I look forward hopefully to the future and sincerely thank all players for their endeavours this year.

HALE SCHOOL v. AQUINAS COLLEGE





The organisation of the competition was the same as last year in that all shooting was done over 300 yards. The targets consisted of different types of silhouette.



The Library this year has run smoothly because of Mr. McMath's unflagging interest and Mrs. Humphrey's ready assistance, for both which many boys are indebted.

Throughout the year the Library has been very busy with crowds of eager boys during morning and lunch breaks, thirsting either for knowledge or for a period of relaxation. Weekly borrowings vary between 250 and 300 books. Boys have been allowed to borrow books during the holidays and 300 were taken out during the August break. During this period the Library was open in the mornings, and boys availed themselves of this opportunity to study quietly or change their books.

Over 1,000 books have been added to the library this year, widening the scope of the school curriculum, and catering for hobbies and general interests. Among new additions are the attractive and useful series—Life Nature Library, Life Science Library, Life World Library and the New Illustrated Library of Science and Invention, also a beautiful production of The History of Christianity.

Mr. Brian Simpson continues to supply us with the "Illustrated London News", which is very popular. He and other Old Boys have also helped to swell the book stock.

The magazine section is the most popular part of the library, with "Life", "Surfabout", "World Sports", "Animals", "National Geographic" and farming magazines vying for first place in the popularity ratings of the 50 odd magazines to which we subscribe.

The only section of the library now sub-standard is the Foreign Languages section, but it is hoped to rectify this in the coming year.

A new system of Term Loans for Leaving students has been instituted by Mr. McMath, which has enabled senior boys to take supplementary text books for one term without the necessity of presenting them weekly for re-stamping. We have been able to do this as the library has multiple copies of a number of supplementary text books, and the boys have taken full advantage of this concession.

By and large the boys have been prompt in returning their library books and the atmosphere in the library has been busy and purposeful. Although small in size and often over-crowded, the library appears to be fulfilling a very useful service in the school and is a source of profit and pleasure to both students and staff.

Chapel Notes

This year has been the last of the old era. Next year Loton House will greatly increase the number of boarders and the erection of the Chapel will follow.

Our Chapel services have developed a happy familiar atmosphere, with the boys clearly feeling quite "at home" and taking a very active part. The singing has become a joy to hear and the three groups—Wilson, Faulkner and the Junior Boarding House—seem to merge into one united body in the fellowship of worship.

Murray Webster and Peter Ackland were the chapel prefects and handled their duties well.

Mr. R. McMath's being in residence at the School solved the problem of a pianist for Evensong. We are very grateful to him and to the boys who played when he was unavailable—John Craig, Brian Manning, and Michael and Timothy Davis.

The guest preachers proved most stimulating and we would like to thank our Headmaster and the Reverends K. Hall, B. Eccleston, M. Seymour, A. Grimshaw, L. Eyres, W. Riley, A. de Q. Robin, Canon A. Pierce and Bishop Riley. A missionary film was shown by the Reverend J. Eley, and Mr. A. Booth of the British and Foreign Bible Society showed a film on the work of his Society.

Bishop Macdonald conducted the Confirmation Service this year. History was made when three day-boys and one girl were
