Debate over the rights and limits of the individual is becoming more mportant as the world staggers into the 70s. So-called civil liberty is being encroached upon from several political and social directions.

The ever-increasing amount of power being taken over by bureaucracy forms a threat to the individual in that, sooner or later, everything we buy, see, do or say will be licensed, subject to rules and bound by regulations. Many government policies, right or wrong, from all colours of the political spectrum, are an infringement on individuality and private rights. One only has to look at the Fuel Bill and National Health Bill for examples of this.

With a pile of laws which is continually growing, the individual is being forced into a conformity with society which may restrict that individual's actions and beliefs. Some conformity is necessary, as no modern civilisation can exist without rules, moral code and a loyal population, but worry remains about the extent to which society interferes with the citizen.

Too much reliance on society results in the individuals in that society being reduced to automatons, with no private impulse to achieve or create. To quote an example, though for no political motive—U.S.S.R. has boundless natural resources, but a relatively low standard of living because of a lack of creative drive and opportunism on behalf of the owners of industry to capitalise on profitable chances.

On the other hand, a country which leaves too much to the individual never becomes a civilisation at all. Everyone chases his own ideals, with the result that there can be no legal or moral framework to the nation, and no unity.

A middle course must be steered—the individual cannot be stifled by society due to his uniqueness, but he has much to repay

society in order to maintain law and order and to finance government policies to aid the private citizen.

As bureaucracy takes from the individual to give to society, so must a reverse process be begun to maintained balance. In modern society, technology has accomplished part of this aim. Inventions such as television, radio and the gramaphone keep people away from society, replacing the visit to the pub or the bridge night. The fear is that as technological progress slows, governmental control will meet with no obstacle, and may impinge upon religion, free speech or movement, and create 1984.

This applies at school. Individuality is tied down to a certain extent, and every student is required to give a reasonable amount to society, whether it be in House Sport or in prefectship. Uniforms, laws and dicipline create an aura of conformity among students and anyone who becomes nonconformist, through wearng the wrong shoes, top button undone or overlength hair, is quickly jumped on. If the culprit is not immediately corrected, others may follow his example, with a resultant loss in respect for the rules, and a breakdown in school spirit. Law and order hangs on such a slender thread that if too much individuality is permitted, the system will disintegrate. On the other hand, if we are to give all to society and nothing for ourselves, why are we born separate and individual to begin with?

In spite of all the prejudice, mention must be made of some monumental efforts on the part of certain people in the school to help us. Our genuine gratitude is conveyed to Mrs Elliott and Mrs Cook, who undertook most of the typing and provided a great amount of information for the committee, without a murmur of defiance, and to the office staff in general. Mr Chadwick is to be thanked for his patience and assistance in collation of all the sport results. To the rest of the school we ask for support in future publications.

Publication was in the capable presses of Robfod Print, and Mr Arthur Ford deserves a round of thanks for retaining his sanity towards the end of the year, and for a wonderful job done. Mr Foss deserves mention for being available for any artwork, and for consultation on the cover design, which changed colour this year.

Best wishes are expressed to Mr Ford, and it is hoped he makes a speedy recovery from his illness.

# The presence of our visitor, the Archbishop of Perth, is an awesome reminder to us of how old we are. I speak for the School of course, which traces its beginnings (just as the diocese of Perth) back to Matthew Blagden Hale, the first Anglican bishop of this newly established colony. He came here in 1858, and established this school the same year.

There are many associated today with Hale School—the Rosenthals, McLartys, Fleays, Mitchells—who trace their links back to the Bishop (the great-grandfather of my own daughters, Henry Park, was at the School in the Cloisters, for example), and so it is an ancient Institution that welcomes Bishop

Hale's successor, 116 years later.

His presence is welcome also in as much as it provides us all with the opportunity to reflect, if briefly, on what is the central aim of our enterprise. Were our guest of honour a politician one could be excused perhaps if one dealt with the rocky path of Government-School relations that one now has to walk; an educationalist of note as our guest could provoke some critical comments perhaps on the educational inflation now rampant, where courses are puffed up in colleges, Tertiary institutions emptied for nearly half the year, and moonlighting practised by lecturers who rarely see their students, yet call for more and more public money. The presence of the Archbishop however, invited us all not to consider the means of education or its ills, but its central purpose, the reason for it all.

For the justification of a school like Hale one goes back not a mere century or so but to those who began nearly everything

(Christianity excepted) of which the modern world makes its boast, the Greeks. They were the first real educators of our western world, the first to separate education from instruction, the first to regard education as a means of moulding human character in accordance with an ideal, and to regard education as the making of men, not training men to make things. The complete man was the goal of the Greeks education, as it is—

or should be-still today.

We are uncomfortably aware of our failings when we contemplate the ideal, for our complete man is a moral man, one whose actions are linked by a high morality, of self-control and purpose. We struggle always towards this goal, dreaming an impossible dream (as does the Church). We are sustained in our struggle and undaunted despite our failures, by our constant association with the young. They also stand in goodness upon nothing, because we educators have failed to harmonise the real with the ideal.

In this agnostic world we educators (and here I speak of parents and the community generally, and the Church, as well as the School itself), we educators have failed to provide a meaningful link or bond that would unite the varied elements of a complete man. We educate the boy in a multitude of manners, his mind, his body and his spirit all being affected and influenced; but we have failed, far more than the Greeks, infinitely more than the Jews, to provide that religious essence, that all-pervading sense of righteousness that makes a man, that brings him into obedience with moral law. We have failed and yet we blame those in our care for our failures and see not the reflected image of ourselves.

We have forgotten (and I fear implement never) the advice of Jesus concerning those who teach the young. "Causes of stumbling are bound to arise; but woe betide the man through whom they come. It would be better for him to be thrown into the sea with a millstone around his neck than to cause one of these little ones to stumble." It would do us all good to reflect upon this.

It is more distressing to admit our repeated failure to reach the central goal of our mission, not teachers, and it is in nearly all a matter of pride. The challenge to educate the complete man is accepted, whereas the teacher, by definition, is merely the technician teaching men to do or make things. Yet too many of us relapse into this latter role, lose sight of the ideal and in our daily details settle for subject instruction. It has always been thus, I fear—in the Church as in the school—to see the part and not the whole, yet we can but persevere, groping (as did the Greeks in various ways, the Jews, and all who came after), yet seeing education in its essence as the way whereby was shaped moral man, complete and living as in the eyes of God.

We are, as was Bishop Hale 116 years ago, in the direct tradition of the Judaic-Christian ideal, where every boy is regarded as an individual, but is forbidden to regard himself as an end; where moral purposes beyond individual desires are accepted; where compulsion and discipline are accepted as justfied n Christian ethics; where again serious intent on the part of the student, and pastoral care on the part of the master, are seen as central reasons for our togetherness. may not sound much like your son struggling with second year maths, but believe me it is what should lift us from being a training establishment to what can in truth be called a school.

Dr Arnold of Rugby School, in the last century, was one of those that re-established the school which stressed the links between learning and a code of behaviour, both based on Christianity. The aims of a true school as he put it in a famous trilogy were, "First religious and moral principles, secondly gentlemanly behaviour, thirdly, intellectual ability."

Turning from the general to the particular, you have heard from Lance White of some of our activities and I report briefly that Hale has had a good year in 1974. There have of course been problems, you cannot hold 750 boys together without them, and there have been injustices known and unknown-meted out to your son and his neighbour, but we have tried to eliminate them and we hope that our system of pastoral supervision has helped. The School owes a great debt of thanks to its senior masters in this regard, particularly the Deputy Headmaster, Mr T. D. For many years a highly-respected boarding Housemaster, who stepped down from Loton House last year, he has been involved most deeply in the complex details of the school's affairs. He more than any one other individual has seen to it that this

is more than most an efficient school; and if that phrase sounds rather cold, it is not intended so, for efficiency is at the heart of all practical and fruitful concerns.

As Confucius said, "Order is heaven's first law"; it is also one of the characteristics of a good school, where discipline marches amicably with school spirit, where purpose replaces panic.

And at the risk of being invidious, I would thank also Mr Mill, whose Junior School break-up was held this morning. I am always very suspicious when I go there for they all seem so very happy, no-one seems scared of me and to try and create a headmaster's traditional image seems beyond me. One boy asked me for a "whirly" the other day, and I think all that I could do would be to borrow a visitor's vestments. That might scare them. For I remember once in the Singapore Cathedral with my youngest daughter, and the Archbishop progressed up the aisle and she turned in awe and said, "Is that God?". "No dear", I said, "He merely works for him". In his own way, so too does Mr Mill, although I doubt if he would ever admit it.

Next year we face very considerable problems. In a country where no goal beyond preservation of oneself is apparent (and where even that goal seems to be escaping the government) it is becoming necessary to 'hunker down', in the American sense. And yet in nearly every way the qualities of Hale that give it a distinctive edge, involve cost. It is for you to ask whether you are getting value for money; whether the continuity of the institution and its staff, whether the involvement of that staff in your son's activities and studies, be it Wittenoom or cadets. Maths or Biology; whether our traditional commitment to hard scholarship and discipline, to compulsion and care, is worth it or not.

These are the constants at Hale, and if they making this School an anachronism, of little worth, we will soon know. We are surrounded by a pervasive atmosphere of permissiveness, where it is wrong to try and test and examine and we are almost alone in endeavouring to impose some sort of challenge and drive. No school can rise far above its environment and if this is not for you, then we will wither on the vine. We offer an alternate form of education, and there are those who see this as an anacronism, and would eliminate us. We may feel lonely at times, but we are not deterred. Our determination is reinforced by your support.

We say goodbye to Mr David Orr, of Junior School, off to England, and we thank also Mr Miller, who joined us only this year. Otherwise the 50 staff remain the same. Many boys now leave, most of whom are the fifth year, who will have bettered, I hope, their 1973 counterparts where 88% qualified for tertiary studies, with six of the twelve Exhibitions open to all the State going to Hale boys. Some fourth and third year boys are also

Some fourth and third year boys are also leaving, with our regrets and best wishes, the School however will be some 20-30 bigger next year, with over double the number in the Junior School boarding house. If the new boys are anything like their predecessors, it certainly won't be dull.

We are expanding slightly, and will have five streams in our First year, not four, but we are not lowering our standards at all, and indeed our expansion makes it possible for virtually every class or set in the entire school to be under 30 pupils; indeed most will be under 28 or 25.

The loyal servants of the school—Matron, the Bursar, the Sister, the Mrs Cooks, and the office staff, as well as the groundstaff with Mr McKenna—press on regardless and are at your service, but they too have our thanks and appreciation. I am sorry we have not lined them up for a Cygnet photograph, along with the hard-working ladies of the Clothing Exchange and the P. & F. committee. In the middle we might put Mr Truscott, our Wittenoom man; for all deserve our thanks. So too, if one can speak respectfully these days of one's employers the Board of Governors, and you.

## School Notes

First Term:

After the Christmas recess, the new year began with Dr Tregonning welcoming back the students, stressing the need for solid work and for the sportsmen to reach peak performance. Results of sport through the holidays were passed on to the school, and three new Masters, Messrs Brohman, Pontin and Sonntag, were introduced to the boys. On the following Monday the School Prefects were inducted, with Lance White becoming School Captain.

The swimming season began as soon as the guys pulled on bathers, and hard training was rewarded by a fantastic win at the Inters once again. Although training began before the start of the year, the rowing season proved unsuccessful-at the Head of the River only two crews, one of which was the 1st VIII, were placed. Berry Durston took over the job of coach yet again. After the Head of the River, the traditional Rowers' Dance moved headquarters to the Cygnet Rowing Hall, and the result was a wonderful success, with 125 couples attending. The cricket 1st XI persevered despite being depleted by departure of much of the 1973 team, and captained by "Jock" Clapin, they finished 5th in the Darlot Cup.

During May holidays Hale was host to a wildly successful Interstate Football Carnival with Scotch Adelaide and Geelong, which this year was dominated by Geelong.

Second Term:

The term started on 28th May. The first Wittenoom group left in the first week of June, beginning a very successful period without many injuries, although Fortescue Falls were renamed in honour of Brad Coventry. Resident Master was once again Mr Truscott, and his assistant was Mike Hoar. The 1st XVIII, although a very good team, were not as successful as the 1973 winners, finishing 3rd in the Alcock Cup. Rugby took an upturn with the 1st XV losing only one match and taking off the competition in a nail-biting finish.

The annual cross-country was strategically timed to begin as a blizzard arrived from the South Pole, but it did not deter Loton House, who ran off with the title. Old Boys' Winter Sports Day was conducted with teams in hockey, rugby and football, and with the Old Boys' winning all games.

The time-slot for the Prefects' Dance was moved to a Saturday after exams, and resulted in an increase of about 50 in attendance. The group this year was Sitting Bull, adding to the night's success.

Buntine proved successful in the Interhouse Football, though conceding the Hockey to Faulkner House. Towards the end of term, Cygnet announced a literary competition to stimulate writing in the school. This was very slow in getting off the ground, but when everyone realised there was money in it, response was much better.

1974 saw the Cadets become voluntary, as is explained in the Cadets report, and one effect was the abolition of the traditional march-out parade.

Third Term:

From the first day of term, athletes were under a rigorous programme in preparation for the Athletics Inters in October, and the training paid off in that Hale improved a place to finish 4th behind Aquinas.

Attendance at Old Boys' Day surpassed that of the prevous year and gave the organising committee an excuse to purchase a bigger keg for the booze-up at the pool, and for more steaks for the barbeque. This day also saw the return of Mr Vernon Murphy, Headmaster 1946-59, in an honorary capacity.

Old Boys' Day saw the end of the social round and the beginning of panic by the 5th years, as the end of the year arrived. Several reunion dinners were held by Wittenoom groups 6 and 9, naturally led by Messrs Macmillan and Greenwell.

The end of year brought a short reign of chaos as the 5th years left, but the situation was soon in hand.

The School was dismissed on 6th December and on that evening Speech Night was held, which was also the day when the Cygnet Committee found out whether to commit suicide or not! Good wishes are expressed to the 5th years leaving (we hope) and to the 1st XI cricket, who are to travel to Adelaide in January.

#### SCHOOL ALTERATIONS --

Early in the year a new metalwork building was erected alongside the Newbury science blocks. This modernised the facilities available for the subject, and brought them up to the same area as the other school blocks. This last improvement offered easier access to the building and eased the tempers of masters who were constantly interrupted by boys trudging up from the old metalwork shed and arriving halfway through the next period.

In the sporting arena, expansion took place. New tennis courts appeared between the hockey fields to ease the pressure placed on the existing area near the swimming pool. New cricket practice nets replaced the old, increasing the number of nets and enabling more frequent, if more chaotic, practice for all teams.

At the tail-end of this year, alterations are to be made to the end classrooms of each block. At present, the end classrooms, A4, A8, B4 and B8, are considerably smaller than the other rooms to provide room for bags. In the alteration, the adjoining wall between these rooms and their immediate neighbours will be demolished and replaced by a sliding door. This will provide a potentially larger area for lectures and house-meetings. end rooms will be extended to normal size.

#### MATRICULATION REGULATIONS

1974 will be the last time that students in 5th year will be obliged to take both a Leaving and Matriculation examination for the one subject. The Unversity Senate has introduced a new tertiary admittance procedure to be implemented in 1975 and 1976.

Until now, a student has been required to pass a prerequisite number of exams at both Leaving and Matriculation level to gain entrance to tertiary institutions. The new system introduces one new exam to replace the old two, and in 1975 admittance to tertiary institutions will be based on an aggregate of marks from the student's five best subjects in the new exam.

The list of subjects approved for examination has been widened to include all subjects currently examinable at Leaving level. These "new" subjects are optional extras worth 40 marks, but only students studying both a Maths/Science subject and a humanities-social science are eligible to take the extra subject. This is an encouragement to students to broaden their education, as students taking advantage of the extra subject aim at a maximum possible aggregate of 540, as against the "specialiser" is possible 500 aggregate. This will not take effect in examination until 1976.

Students beginning 4th year in 1975 will be the first to try the new system. Students in 5th year next year will be judged by the transition system, taking one exam but not being affected by the new subject choice system.

Students can still be rejected through insufficient knowledge of English.

#### CRAIG KINSMAN

In his period at Hale School Craig has achieved marvellous results in the examination hall and on the chess board.

When Craig, in 1969, entered the senior school he had won the full scholarship; and he was dux of his year every time. In last year's Leaving and Matriculation, Craig gained 7 distinctions and matriculated. He was awarded a general exhibition for topping the state results and also a B.H.P. medal and prize money of \$160.00 for maths 2 and 3 and Physics. Craig was then asked if he would accept a scholarship at the Australian National University in Canberra where he is now studying for a science degree majoring in Nuclear Physics.

In the recent Australian Junior Championfor Chess in Brisbane, Craig came equal second and was the state junior champion as well as captain of the Hale team and number one player.

Craig Kinsman has proved a fine ambassador, and Hale can be justly proud of this brilliant young man.

#### VERNON MURPHY REPORT

Mr Vernon Murphy, an ex-Headmaster of Hale, was kind enough to give us an interview while returning for Old Boys' Day.

#### CYGNET reports

When were you last at Hale, Mr Murphy?

My duties as Headmaster ended in 1959, but I returned for a short while in 1960 to help with the new school at Wembley Downs.

From a quick glance can you notice any changes in Hale boys?

Only the long hair, but I suppose that's a sign of the times. Take that away and they could be the students of my day.

What would you say was the function of a public school today?

The same as always; to give youth a better background for their working days and to encourage hard workers and good sportsmen. This, as well as our better facilities, is our main attraction over state schools.

Do you think that too much emphasis is placed on sport instead of arts and drama?

No, I think young people should exercise their limbs while they have the chance. Arts and drama do have their place at Hale, but after being in class for five days of the week the body should be exercised. A healthy body is necessary for a healthy mind.

Are you disappointed that the Labour Government has forced cadets to become voluntary?

Yes and no. If the school were bigger I would say "Yes", but Cadets is only valuable if you have a choice between Air, Army and Naval Cadets. One of the disadvantages of being a small school is not being able to do this. However, as it stands at the moment, the Cadet Force is an elite because of the volunteer element. Also it is a smaller unit and thus is more mobile.

How do you compare cadets, with sport?

As I see it, the main function of cadets is learning discipline, and I feel that doing disciplinary training is preferable to drill, mainly because it develops fitness and skills at the same time. Going back to the function of a public school, what are your views on Wittenoom?

It is a pity this opportunity has not been open to our students longer than this. Wittenoom makes us the envy of all other schools, providing a rare opportunity for boys to learn about life and get some practical experience while learning about the geography of our North. I would not mind going up there myself, even as a tourist.

Do you think that the Cygnet has improved much in the last decade?

Well, we never had interviews in my day. Perhaps the best thing you've done is to make the size of the pages larger, and I'm glad to hear you are going to do the same thing this year. It's good to see the transformation from a straight monologue and record book to a more readable and involved magazine, encompassing more interests every year.

What have you done since leaving Hale?

I went to New Guinea for a while, and was lucky enough to get a job with a medical school. Upon returning to Western Australia Dr Keyes offered me a job at Scotch College as careers officer, and I worked there until I retired.

Wittenoom '74 got under way in earnest as soon as the May holidays commenced with an advance part consisting of Mr Clune, Michael Hoar (this year's assistant resident master), and myself descending on Wittenoom on May 12th. This initial group was to be joined a few days later by Mr and Mrs Hoar and two members of their family who arrived on the Tuesday, having driven the Land Rover from Perth. Some time was spent in getting the house and its surrounds shipshape, no small job after nine months' growth and dirt had accumulated, and making a start on the setting up of the bush camp.

Later in the week the work force was supplemented with the arrival of Mr Macmillan, Andrew Prideaux, Gary Fletcher, Graham Dent and Ian Lilburne. This team busied themselves doing a paint job on the roof, further assisted the setting up of the bush camp and, as a community contribution, assisted the setting up of the "Henley on Joffre" course and facilities.

Towards the end of the holidays the advance party returned to Perth and all was in readiness for the commencement of Wittenoom proper.

The first group, led by veteran Wittenoom man Mr Poake, arrived on Sunday, June 2nd. A highlight of their fortnight was three days and two nights camping at Deep Reach near Millstream. An attempt was made on the Circular Pool "record" by Stuart Gee and although the old time of forty-five minutes was beaten, the new record was not to last.

Derek Reid's and Charlie Love's 84 descents off the town pool cliff was, however, to take some beating.

Group two arrived a week later under the direction of Mr J. Williams. Warwick Rose soon set about doing something to the Circular Pool record and managed one icy dip lasting some sixty minutes. Most of this group climbed the steep-sided Mt Bruce.

The Headmaster's group was next to arrive. This group succeeded in getting lost on the trek to Mulga Downs through failing to listen to all instructions. With the aid of Mr Hooson's aircraft, half the group was found just before sundown, the others a little later in the night some five miles past the homestead. During the Headmaster's stay, some thirty or so townspeople attended a party at the house. While at the bush camp Andrew Taylor and Andrew Klimaitis dis covered some aboriginal rock carvings on the wall of Hancock Gorge. Later, following the policy of groups returning to the town house by means other than a vehicle, this group set off on the Sunday to the head of Joffre Gorge, proceeded all he way down Joffre to Red Gorge, down Red to Wittenoom Gorge, stayed overnight at the Town Pool and walked the remaining seven miles to town early the next morning.

Mr Bohdan arrived with group four. Most of this group made the most of their opportunities, and a successful attempt was made on the descent of Knox Gorge to Red Gorge; a trip unequalled for scenery and excitement.

Group five arrived early in July under the command of Mr Hoad. There was a slight deviation to the usual town programme when a trip to "Cowra", the Mulga Downs outpost, was arranged where shearing was in progress. David Weatherly shattered the Circular Pool record with a shivering sixty-five minutes. This group made their project a survey of the various pool temperatures around the area. Later on in the week during their settling in day at the camp an air drop was made of some forgotten gear by group four while on their scenic flight.

Mr Greeenwell's group six was next to make their appearance. Among this group's discoveries were a rare comedy talent in "George" Johnson and more cold, long, and deep pools along Red Gorge than expected. The latter discovery was made on their return to the town house with one inflatable raft between the group.

The geologists under the direction of Mr Sonntag comprised group seven. A study of the geology of the area was made and there was a visit to Marandoo, the base camp of the Hancock and Wright-Texas Gulf iron ore venture. Some of the lads on the Mulga Downs trek thought they were lost but fortunately came across the local baker cutting wood in the river bed. His directions proved accurate.

Group eight consisted of biologists and they were to spend their first week at beautiful Millstream station. The day before departing for here the group was taken by Sir Valston Hancock on an aerial inspection of Mt Tom Price and Marandoo in Mr Lang Hancock's turboprop "Aero Commander" aircraft. The Millstream project proved a success with some useful work being done and Mr Shields again being named "bush baker of the year". On their return from Millstream after a couple of days in town, the group completed the fortnight at the bush camp.

Group nine was the last group for the year.. They arrrived on August 6th, with Mr Macmillan. After a fortnight of the usual activities, the group had an extra three days in which to assist the general clean up and the dismantling of the bush camp. Members of this group proved splendid waiters and barmen when the school was host to some one hundred townspeople who attended a party held to say thank you and farewell. They also proved sound swimmers and climbers when the Knox descent was negotiated to Red Gorge, up Red to Joffre and up the Joffre dyke.

All too soon group nine departed and another year of Wittenoom had come to a close. Better weather and a better vehicle record made Wittenoom easier to administer than 1973 but the result was the same; an exciting

educational experience and a better understanding developed between masters and boys.

All boys who visited the town again did the School credit. The School also assisted the community and the environment in a number of ways including the setting up and cleaning up of the "Henley on Joffre", course, assisting the National Parks rangers where possible and helping prepare the race track for the annual meeting.

A number of Old Boys and friends of the School dropped in to see the School's facilities while passing through the town. Official visits were made by Mr and Mrs Ted Hantke (Mr Hantke a member of the Board) and the Bursar, Mr R. Burr.

Many people assisted the operation of Wittenoom in 1974. Thanks go to Michael Hoar, the assistant resident master; Hancock and Wright; the Hooson's of Mulga Downs; the Kennedys' of Millstream, E. G. and L. McGuires' Wittenoom Tourist Centre; Hamersly Iron; the National Parks Board and the entire Wittenoom community. Mr Hoar, Matron and Mrs Cook all worked hard at Wembley Downs and the work of these people and all those who comprised the May advance party is gratefully acknowledged.

I wish my successor the best of luck for 1975 and hope that his period in charge will be as enjoyable and satisfying as mine.

A swimming meeting was arranged with Scotch College involving Grades 1-4, in first term. In third term we returned the visit with an athletics meeting. The very junior grades do not have much opportnuity to compete against new faces and both occasions were enjoyed by all.

The tuckshop provided further money for the purchase of two clarinets for use by members of the J.S. Band. The band now has a full range of instruments that may be borrowed for practice purposes. Whilst on the subject of the band, boys in the school who show musical interest are encouraged to further their studies under the guidance of Mr Harvey. Music is further encouraged by having Mrs Gladstone teach singing to Grades 1-6. A keen choir has evolved from these music lessons indicating how interested the boys have become.

This year we had our first experience of student teachers in our school. Third year students now spend a full term in various schools and we benefited from having Mr Julian Vinciullo (an Old Boy) from Churchlands Teachers' College in first term and Miss Vicky Vine from Graylands in second term. We look forward to more new life and enthusiasm next year. During second term, an interchange of teaching ideas between independent schools was organised. We were able to see ideas in action in other schools and we had visitors at Hale to benefit from the special interests of our teachers.

Mr Mill gave notice that there would be an educational tour of Tasmania in the May holidays, suitable for Grades 5, 6, and 7 boys. Some thirty boys went on the tour accompanied by Mr and Mrs Mill and Mr Holmes. A most enjoyable and informative time was had by the tour members and on return to school, boys gave talks and showed photographic slides dealing with various aspects of Tasmania.

The Grade 7 classes also spent a few days on a farm at York watched over by Mr Mill, Mr Holmes and Mr Orr. They seemed to thoroughly enjoy the country life. grades went on several trips. Grade 6 accompanied by Mr Sweet and Miss Vine trekked over Reabold Hill in the cause of Science. Grade 5 visited the Grain Terminal at Fremantle and Grade 4 went to L. Bartlett's Grade 3 have visited plastic factory. Woolcombers Processing, the Peters Ice Cream factory and had a rather unsuccessful attempt to look into the workings of the airport. They also made the trip to the city to watch the Anzac march.

During second term we were pleased to see the installation of slatted seating outside the classrooms on the north side. The seats are under the verandah, and in inclement or very hot weather, the boys can sit and have their lunches. The seating was provided by the P. and F. and we are truly grateful. Yet more seating was to come from the P. and F. This was to be bench seating for use in the covered assembly room, so that a large number of boys could be seated satisfactorily to watch educational films and TV programmes for schools. It is now possible to seat 90 boys at a time and all are able to see the screen properly.

In the August holidays, Mr Mill and Mr Holmes went to King's School Parramatta to attend the Bi-ennial Junior School Conference. They came back with reports on the latest trends in educational thinking and it was gratifying to note that we are keeping abreast of the latest ideas.

Dr Tregonning announced that sometime during 3rd term a Government surplus building would be delivered to the Junior School for use as an art complex. For this we are again indebted to the thoughtfulness of the P. and F. Although the Junior School has an Art Room it was often found by Mr Sweet to be inadequate when trying to cope with large art projects. When delivery day arrived, the boys watched fascinated as a low-loader with the building arrived, was manoeuvred into position and located on stumps. The building had hardly settled before Mr Sweet was at the drawing board putting down ideas to make the complex suitable to serve all the variations of art and craft that he has in mind for the coming year. There is no doubt that all boys will benefit greatly when the complex is completed.

Charities have not been neglected throughout the year and the boys can be relied upon to give generously to worthy causes. Several amounts have been collected but the most noteworthy effort was one of \$103.98 donated to the Save the Children's Fund (Western Australian Division). Letters of appreciation from organisations are always read out to the boys at ther morning assemblies.

The year will end with the staff saying farewell to Mr Orr who has decided to go to England to teach for a year. We have enjoyed having him as a colleague, and we know the boys also will miss him.

## Chapel Notes

The Chapel of St Mark can hardly be ignored, as it dominates the main entrance of the School and bears striking witness to the fact that Hale School, founded by Perth's first bishop, is a Christian school.

All that a building can do to establish the character of the School, St Mark's Chapel does well. Its arresting exterior stimulates interest and comment, and inside its quiet beauty encourages meditation and worship. During last year a fine stained glass window in Haleian shades of blue, in memory of the late Graeme Parker, was donated by his parents and those who enter the Chapel are surrounded by symbols of faith.

The most important aspect though, is that the Chapel is well used within the context of education at Hale School.

No building is used more by visitors than Hale's Chapel. Every year, some forty weddings take place there and many thousands of guests gain from the Chapel and its surroundings their first impression of the character of Hale. The growing Wembley Downs parish uses our Chapel for its services, thus establishing a valuable link between the School and the local community. Planning delays in the City Council have postponed the building of the Wembley Downs parish church so that the School Chapel will continue to be the local place of worship for another year.

Changes in the system of Chapel for day boys have evolved perhaps the best pattern of worship followed in the School. On Monday, Wednesday and Friday, normal assembly is held in the Hall and concludes with a short service. Tuesday is the Chaplain's morning when he is able to preach to the whole School. On Thursday, a hymn practice session which, after a rather traumatic start, has become accepted, is proving invaluable in improving the singing and in introducing new hymns. Each Day House visits the Chapel in turn during the lunch hour for a brief, intimate House Chapel service—a vast improvement on the earlier sardine-packed combined services. Perhaps the only fault in this system is that the day boys are still not being introduced to full-scale services in the style they will know in parish worship.

Boarders' services continue to follow the old pattern of 8 a.m. Holy Communion and p.m. Evensong. Despite the drastic experimentation in the Church outside, Hale is persevering with the old style rites. When the Church makes up its mind Hale will of course change, but in the meantime, the familiar services, beautified by a vastly improved Chapel Choir, are providing a pleasing religious experience.

With Mrs Gladstone as organist, the Choir is now singing an anthem every week and visiting singers and instrumentalists add variety to the music.



Against this background Stephen Arrow did well to swim in the "Inters" and came second.


The cross-country race saw farmer-boys follow the firebreaks as if they had ploughed them, and to perform well in the Arctic conditions.


in Junior hockey, but the Senior team under Wayne House lacked dedication.





### Debating

### Chess



### Army Cadets

## Squash

Hale entered three teams in the Junior Pennant Series run by the W.A. Squash Rackets Association-two under-17 and one under-15 side. 1974 saw the competition split into age groups for the first time.

The under-15 team, consisting of Allen, Barham, Barrymore, Cook and Micucci, did very well to finish 6th in their division and gained experience for the future.

The Hale B team of I. Roberts (captain), G. Guhl, S. Gee, and D. O'Shanassy played against opposition of a much higher standard, and their season was interrupted by Hale Wittenoom. Consequently they failed to have any influence on the composition of the final four.

The Hale A team faced the formidable task of living up to the reputation built by former school teams in gaining three successive pennant victories. The team of I. Clarke (captain), G. Johnson, P. Hearn, and K. Lewis were unlucky not to reach the final, losing the Preliminary final by a single point, losing only one match in qualifying rounds.

The captain of this team, Ian Clarke, who remained undefeated throughout the season, proved himself to be one of the best junior players in the State. Ian won the open division of the Coca-cola Junior squash tournament, and was victorious in both the open and under-17 divisions of the State Schoolboys championship.  $\operatorname{The}$ cola King" capped off a fine season by being selected in the State Junior team which competed in Adelaide.

Despite Hale's excellent record in squash, there has been little support from the school. The sport has been established for five years, in which time it has risen to the very top, but does not receive the same recognition as other sports. Interest must be generated in younger ranks if Hale is to continue as a power in this area. Perhaps the Sports Council could give consideration towards introducing awards for squash, in order to acknowledge the performances of the players.





In 1974 Hale School won the Brother Redmond Cup, playing a new style of rugby, which Reverend Russell Davis brought back from England where he was representing Australia at the 150th anniversary cele-

brations of the origins of the game.

After playing well throughout the season with a high standard of teamwork, Hale lost only one game—to arch rivals Aquinas. However, the team thoroughly deserved to win the cup. Highlights of the season were the 60-0 defeat of Trinity with 10 members of the side scoring, the game against Guildford—which hung in the balance until the last minutes, and the selection of outstanding lock forward Stuart Anderson to play for Western Australia against the English Schoolboys.

Hale's forwards were an aggressive, hardworking pack that developed into the finest pack of forwards in the competition. The back line, although lacking weight, impressed with determined tackling and elusive run-

ning.

With most of the backline returning next year and some strong forwards developing, Hale should retain the Brother Redmond up and remain the number one Rugby school in the P.S.A.

Special mention must be made of Reverend Davis, whose knowledge and experience of the game helped the 1st XV greatly this season.

### COACH'S COMMENTS

Hale has won the Brother Redmond Cup five times in the eleven years since Rugby became a official Public Schools sport, but no win has been more meritorious than this year's.

With the standard of schoolboy Rugby improving every year and schools like Guildford and Aquinas fielding teams of formidable physique and driving aggression, any side must now be really good to win.

Hale's victorious side did contain some tall forwards but we had no efficient hooker, an over-all lack of speed and a collection of young, light backs.

It was with no great confidence that we approached the season—especially since some of the squad showed little initial enthusiasm for the demanding training and style of play I sought to introduce.

Following the Welsh pattern we hope to have our forwards running and handling like backs, our backs rucking and mauling like forwards and all players working in constant support. Modern continuous Rugby demands a high degree of fitness, skill and unselfishness.

All credit to the boys of the Firsts. They did learn and played some delightful Rugby. They scored some good tries after third and fourth phase moveemnts and went through most of the season before their line was crossed. In scoring 215 points they conceded only 24.

Hale's game depended on hard-working, ball-hungry forwards either winning possession or spoiling their opponents' possession. Our scrummaging was solid and we outpushed all other packs. Peter Syme developed into a match-winning hooker while "Lou" Anderson and John Stratton usually controlled the line-outs. In loose play breakaways John Gregg and Kim Riseborough were very quick to the ball and Hale were able to retain or win possession with a regularity our opponents found quite demoralising.

The Hale backs stood up flat and tackled well at set pieces with Richard Hood not only stopping his opposite number but frequently cleaning up with tireless cover defence.

Hale won against teams with more speed, and weight, through teamwork, sound tactics and hard work, and that is the best way to win.

# Athletics

Hale's prospects for this year's Athletics appeared rather grim as training commenced after second term vacation with a large number of our '73 Athletics team having left school. These losses not only occurred at the senior level but also left some of our under age groups a little light. However, after the first week, there were some 120 boys in training and it was very pleasing to see a large number of new faces on the track.

Once again our tight schedule included two twilight meets against Marist and a Saturday morning meet against Churchlands. These together with School Championship day and House Athletics day provided the necessary pre-Inters competition needed. Overall times for track events were not outstanding during these days—however, a great competition developed in the open middle distance group between A. J. Clapin, M. J. Styles and R. G. B. Hood producing some very exciting finishes.

Inters day saw some 82 athletics competing for Hale and with the thought of finishing worse than last year's 5th position,, everyone was keen to do their best. From the outset Aquinas again showed their dominance and moved well clear of the rest of the schools with Trinity and Guildford comfortably holding second and third positions. Midway through the afternoon the closeness of compettion between the other schools was indicated on the board with only 11 points separating 4th and 7th position, and it was quite possible that we could have finished in that unenviable 'wooden spoon" spot. All fears were dispelled with great running from our middle distance group who recorded two 1st's, three seconds and a third over the 1500 metres to leave us fairly safe in our welldeserved fourth position.

This result was very pleasing and due in a large degree to:

- (b) Sound leadership given by the captain, A. J. Clapin; and vice-captain P. W. Farmer.

- (c) Our best performance for some years in the long jump pit where we scored 64 points with no 'no jumps' recorded on the day.
- (d) An inspirational run by M. P. Johnston who broke the Inters 1500 metres Under-16 record (previosuly held by Hale's K. A. Grist) and inspired others to give above personal best performances.
- (e) The hard work and interest shown by all coaches.

Overall, the season produced an expected fourth place on Inters day with all who participated enjoying the competition and comradeship.

And so Hale School is back to normal, oh well nearly normal—we lost a lot of teachers after the uprising, and for some strange reason masters now carry with them black jacks and flick knives, and by the way that old master is dead—yes, hit him suddenly, poor chap; seems he was allergic to flour.

#### CAPTAIN OF SCHOOL'S REPORT 1972 -

My Lord Mayor,

Mr Stow, Chairman of the Board of Governors,

Dr Tregonning, Distinguished Guests, Masters, Ladies and Gentlemen, Boys,

Hale's sporting and cultural year has been one of ups and downs, one of great expectations followed by some disappointments. The year in general, however, has been one of gradual changes which follow with the changing times and standards. The School has found it too difficult to keep some old standards, when new ones surround us everywhere we look. Because of this, the hair length of students has changed with the times. students no longer take an active part in Anzac Day Services and the Cygnet takes on a slightly more permissive look. Also, I believe, the old barrier of Master/Pupil is slowly giving way to better things. Although these gradual changes appear popular with students, whether they are good or bad will only be seen through the passing of time. Althiugh the school is changing in general aspects, sport still plays a major role and is still giving, right or wrong, true or false or otherwise, an indication to the public the standards of the Independent School. Personally, like many others, I believe that judging a School on its sport is wrong, but the fact still remains.

Looking at Hale's sporting achievements; this year we see some success and some failure. In the swimming; the swimming team, under the tight coaching of Mr Poake. Reverend Davis and Mr Hoad, convincingly won the "Inters" competition for the sixth time in succession. This winning streak looks likely to continue, as the younger age groups are as strong as the senior ones. The swimmers also maanged to win the Law Shield for Lifesaving and this is the second year running that Hale has won this Shield.

At the Head of the River, however, Hale failed to win a race and were fourth in the main event of the day. This was disappointing, considering the great amount of time, effort and spirit the rowers put into their task.

In Tennis Hale continued to dominate School Boys' Tennis on a state-wide scale. The School returned the Inter-school Corr Cup and also retained the coveted state-wide trophies—the Slazenger Cup and Mursell Shield. It is worth mentioning in tennis that the number one player of the School, Dean Williams, of fourth year, was good enough to be selected for the State's Linton Cup team.

Cricket was another world to tennis, however, and the cricketers fared poorly to finish in last place. If attendances at matches are any indication to performances, however, it is no wonder the team fared poorly, as supporters were few and far between.

Unlike cricket, football was relatively well supported this year. This was largely due to the fact that the Annual Interstate Carnival between Scotch, Adelaide, Geelong College, Vicoria and Hale, was in Perth this year. The Carnival was its usual success but perhaps even more so this year, as Hale managed to win the competition convincingly. This led most to believe that Hale School had the Alcock Cup won as well. However, this was not to be the case, as the team finished equal third. The team lost three matches, one by four points and the others by just one goal away from the Cup.

The Rugby team continued to give a good account of itself, in both the tour of Sydney and its normal competition and finished third this year.

The Hockey players, however, could only manage sixth place in their competition.

Whilst on second term sport, it is worth mentioning that Hale entered two teams in a state-wide squash competition. The "A" team won the competition and thus opened the eyes of the School to the up and coming sport of squash. Teams will now be entered regularly in this squash competition, thus giving those wishing, a new sport.

Unlike all other sports, athletics seems to be a somewhat sore spot at Hale and this year's fourth place in the "Inters" just continued to indicate Hale's perhaps mediocre standards in athletics. There was, however, a little more enthusiam and interest this year, than is normal. All one can hope is that this may grow into something worthwhile and bring Hale's years of mediocre athletics to an end. It is worth noting that the last year Hale won the "Inters" athletics competition was when the present Headmaster, Dr Tregonning, was Captain of the team!

Moving on to the cultural side of the School, we see the highlight was Chess. With the recent world championships, chess has come under the attention of all and Hale's efforts in this field, were outstanding to say the least. With three state players in their midst, the two chess teams took all before them and easily won their competitions.

Debating also had some success. The senior team won two out of three debates in the W.A. Debating Federation Competition. The team was only defeated by the Brigidine team who eventually went on to win the overall competition. The debaters were usually the boarders; however the number of actual speakers in the school were few and only the first and second year students show real keenness to speak in debates regularly.

The School as per normal, took part in a stage production; this year in conjunction with P.L.C. It was good to see the number of boys taking part in the production, as usually most students of the school shun any form of this activity. The production was a musical comedy "La Belle Helene".

Going on to the music field, we see it was only an active minority that made use of the school's many instruments and good facilities. A band, nevertheless, was put together for the Cadet Marching-out Parade and it should be noted that it was comprised mainly of Junior School boys, who are most active in the music field. This leads me on to Cadets.

The Cadets took on a new scheme this year. With the abolition of the regular Monday afternoon parades, a new full day type of training came into existence. This method had some merit. However, due to the longer gap of time between parades, discipline was perhaps not what it could have been, nevertheless cadets still gave those doing it, valuable experience. This year's marching out parade still retained its high standard with His Excellency the Governor, inspecting. Also to be noted this year, is that the Cadet Dance was re-introduced to provide a wind-up of the Cadet Year.

Now that I have mentioned Sport, Culture and Cadets, I would like to mention some points I believe should not go unnoticed. For instance, some members of Hale's surprisingly active Interschool Christian Fellowship have been doing work at the Shenton Park Rehabilitation Hospital every Monday afternoon. Also Ralph James, dux of fourth year, last year, is now living in Northern France on a field scholarship, a feat not to be left unnoticed.

Also the School's morning Chapel Services were run purely by the house prefects this year and in one case, one student took the actual Service. As a result of this, Chapel was different every week and more interesting for most. Also it was not uncommon to hear all types of music coming from the Chapel each morning as House Prefects tried to convey their message in the form of records. This gave Chapel a more interesting outlook.

The boys of the school also did well to donate a much needed 1000 books to the Port Hedland Library and two students in fourth year, Ralph Gibson and Craig Kinsman were awarded Maths grants to study in the Eastern States during their coming holidays.

Also the Parents and Friends' Association bought a piece of Sculpture by John Worth to add to the artistic side of the School—it now rests outside the library.

To end, I would like to thank my fellow prefects for their support and efforts throughout the year, but more so, I would like to say the following:—

If Hale is to remain one of the better Independent Schools, it is up to those returning and them only, as the name of the School cannot and should not just rest on its buildings, its grounds and its past achieve-

ments. A good School is one that gives a good account of itself in all fields it undertakes, especially the academic field, but also, a good school is one that appears at ease both externally and internally.
