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Editorial

In today's society, the educational system is playing an increasingly important and much wider role. A vital part, and undoubtedly the basis of this system, is the School. The value of the educational system must lie in its ability to equip the individual for life in the outside world.

We live in an age of furious pace and great technological progress and inevitably, with this, comes change. Many educational institutions have tried to resist change but this is not possible if they are to meet the needs of industry, the economy and society. With unemployment rife, and the increasing problem of securing work, individuals are seeking some advantage which will impress employers. As a result, we are being educated to continually escalating standards. As our standards become higher, there is a tendency to place less emphasis on the basic requirements of our education, the three 'R's. It is evident that we must first have a sound grounding before we proceed to the more specialised subjects and teachings.

Some external standards are necessary in secondary education, to give both employers and tertiary institutions an opportunity to gauge individuals academically. For those who are not academically capable of reaching these standards there should be some alternatives. It is not

sufficient for schools to simply educate the intelligent and pass them on to a university or similar institution where a degree or diploma is obtained. In Australia today, many degrees and diplomas are becoming rapidly useless as many of those who obtain them are unable to find employment in the field in which they have been educated. We are now witnessing a widening gap between the unskilled worker and the professional. Surely with such a wide gap to fill we need a diversification in our schools to prepare students for a much larger variety of occupations. Job satisfaction and pride should be available not only to those of high intelligence, but also to those who are prepared to apply themselves to other occupations.

Fortunately, the majority of schools are awakening to the present situation and are starting to take steps to restructure their courses. Schools are now encouraging students to choose a wide range of subjects and are thus levelling some of the academic mountains that have dominated educational horizons.

In many ways an individual's education resembles a jig-saw puzzle, where the pieces must fit together before the final product emerges. Schools should be a rewarding experience in learning and achievement and this can be attained if the educational system is structured to meet the needs of the individual. With greater diversification of subjects and tailoring of classes to fit student requirements, it is possible to create a new spirit and to give school more meaning.


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Headmaster's Report

May I preface my remarks by paying tribute to Mr. Q.R. Stow, the Chairman of the Board of Governors, who is still convalescing from an illness, but whose imminent full recovery is assured. Hale has been most fortunate to have had at its helm such a sagacious and conscientious Chairman, who has done wonders for the School in so many ways. It typifies the strength of independent schools, when a man of such prominence and under such pressure of work, can enthusiastically remain involved. All of us will welcome him back next year.

The School welcomes with pleasure the Chief Justice, Sir Francis Burt, as its guest this evening. Sir Francis is linked through his family to this School in many ways, not least by illustrious forebears who once were boys here and who then from high positions of state served not merely the School but the colony as well. An example I commend to you all. Lady Burt also has a very strong Hale association. She was one of those lovely West Perth girls who made dancing lessons when I was at Hale so delightful, and it was heartbreaking when, as the sister of two brothers who were my schoolboy friends at Hale who indeed I had assidiously favoured with by football and other favours, she went off and married an Old Guildfordian. Her late father, Brigadier Lloyd, was the Colonel of the West Australian Battalion that fought at Tobruk, Many Old Haleians were in that Battalion, so too Bishop MacDonald, of our Board of Governors; and the Tobruk Trophy, one of our school trophies, was presented to us by the Colonel's widow, a dear and gracious lady who although unable to be present nevertheless I am sure shares our pleasure in welcoming her daughter and husband here tonight.

In the final outcome, Chief Justices and others of that profession judge characters rather than events. We do well, as parents and educators often obsessed with events — such as passing examinations or winning at sport — to remember that this is not of the essence of our task with those in our charge, but that as both parents and educators, our purpose supremely is to develop character.

Sir Francis has fought through a war, in which highly qualified doctors carried out lethal experiments on people of another race, in which trained engineers gassed old women and children and high school graduates, bashed the brains out of the skulls of their innocent concentration camp victims. They all received an "education" in which character development was ignored: and I fear that it is still half forgotten as an educational, indeed, as the educational objective here today.

The crowded courts over which Sir Francis presides, and the weakness and slackness of this selfish indulgent society, suggests that what was standard once in Germany many not be that foreign either here in 1977 Australia.

It is hard to write a syllabus, or give space in the timetable for character. It is much easier to organize physics or football. I have been reading educational journals for many years now. I can not recall an article on character: yet a community full of qualified men and women but without strength of character or firmness of standards, is basically not as educated in the true sense of the word, as an illiterate community that is honest, strong in its ways and loving in its relationships.

Independent schools (and good Government schools when they have the chance) tackle this problem of character in many ways. Perhaps in this, the discipline of a school is one of the most important. There are two main aspects of this, as we try to operate it here. There are rules, at the beginning externally imposed and enforced. It is of increasing difficulty to enforce some of the school rules, for there are many over-protective parents who most unwisely try to shelter their son from the results of any misdemeanour, or who collaborate with him to hide or deny the offence; who indeed attack the school for trying to enforce its rules. School offences are minor mostly, it is not the event but the character that is affected, for a boy not educated here to a sense of discipline and control could one day go on to face Sir Francis; and not on a speech night either. And really, both school and parent have failed. But these would be the minority and the majority of parents and boys, would accept that a good school is one where there are standards that are enforced without fear or favour.

As well as rules, which gradually as a boy grows older become self-imposed rules, rules of conduct, work and attitude and service, a school also endeavours to develop character through its relationships. Again it is not part of any syllabus, but a good school endeavouring to educate humanely should always strive for a code in which respectful, understanding tolerant and sympathetic relationships flourish. Between staff and boys, this should always be and it should be reciprocated. And between staff as people and between boy and boy. Do unto others as you would they do unto you, as someone once said.

This in no way suggests that discipline should be slack, transgressors should be punished, but a code of fair and firm behaviour expeditiously enforced where necessary, and courteous realtionships between all is part of the character building a good school should provide.

The good relationship between staff and boys, and boys and boys, can be established, indeed must be established, in the classroom; but also in the numerous extra-curricular activities of a school. Indeed the educational value of sport or chess or music or hobbies of any kind is just that: that it helps character. And we at Hale also attach considerable importance to the development of

character by means of another dimension available to us, the adventure programme of Wittenoom.

All over Australia (if only at Hale in Western Australia) independent schools have established adventure outposts and such has been the value placed by others on what we are doing that I have been asked to convene a National Conference on their development next year.

We make much use of Wittenoom, but my enquiries throughout Australia make it clear that others do more, with not merely one year being involved (in our case Year 11) but the whole school. Of course we suffer from the far remoteness of Wittenoom, and whereas in Victoria for example many schools drive on Fridays or Mondays a mere 60 or 100 miles to wild coastline or rugged valley, here we are nearly 1,000 miles away. We need, for the challenge and shaping of our boys, an area remote but accessable, close enough to reach but in an area where adventure and environmental studies can be blended. We hope one day we will find this. Meanwhile we continue with Wittenoom.

We began Wittenoom in 1970, and I well recall flying up there in late 1969, when the opportunity to acquire a small house there first arose. Mr. L.V. Shields, then initiating highly successful biology field camps, went with me and on the flight back we hammered out the basis of what has been the standard programme ever since. Mr. Shields retires this year, after serving Hale most competently and enthusiastically in many capacities, at Havelock Street and Wembley Downs for a quarter of a century.

A school is greatly aided in its efforts at character development by the continuity of staff, indeed this is essential, and Mr. Shields personifies the stability and the dedication of such men who teach as much out of the classroom as in it. He has the best wishes of all at the school on his retirement.

These also go to another long serving staff member who retires this year, Mr. E.R. Prince. Scores of boys have dangled the red herring of "Tell us about Rhodesia Sir" in front of him since he joined us in 1964. But as Senior Science Master, Rowing Master, lover of music and until lately smoker of fat cigars, Mr. Prince has been another good servant of the School, and as is typical of all such masters giving far more than his contractual obligations required. So too Mr. Cyril Shaw, a Senior Maths man, ex R.A.F. and ex D.C.A., whose gentlemanly manner and courteous bearing to the boys almost invariably produced the best from them in return.

These three men now leaving us had balance, as did Mrs. Cook, the dear lady who has loved the little boys in Brine House for so many years, and taught them right from wrong. She and her husband will be sadly missed. One hopes it is the

same balance they possessed that as part of character is acquired by the boys here. They may well have greater need of it than their predecessors, with youthful unemployment here to stay. We are initiating steps to help them, but the young of today perhaps more than ever need a firm character as well to help them, to keep them steady and to enable them to face knock-backs, and to keep trying. Australian men and women panicked when Darwin was bombed by the Japanese, and to our national shame ran away while Londoners battled on. I hope this "Pommie Disease" may be catching and that our youngsters will have the character to battle on too.

Not merely from those leaving has an example of character and service been given. The School is most grateful as well to the many staff still remaining and I must express my personal thanks to them all and in particular to Mr. T.D. Hoar, the Deputy Headmaster. His administration and involvement in so much has been most appreciated. And as we prepare for our largest boarder intake

ever, of over eighty new boys, I think our boarding housemasters also are entitled to a good holiday. But so indeed are we all.

Throughout the Western World there appears to be something of a lack of confidence about western values. Leaders everywhere seem to be apologising for past acts or present situations; Africa is all our fault, it seems, and Asia too, and in education as in everything else this lack of confidence in old values, this uncertainty about goals seems prevalent.

We at Hale, firmly rooted in the past and convinced of its validity — by far the best basis for continuing development and strength — need share none of that uncertainty or lack of confidence. We question our methods, we change, we cautiously innovate and we strive to win, but we keep before us our true goal which if I may express it in old world language, and cause no offence to the many to whom the adjective has meaning but not belief, is to produce Christian gentlemen.


Captain of School Report

Total involvement is the key to a successful stay at Hale School. Whether it be in the classroom or on the sporting field, if the student does not give one-hundred percent effort he will gain little in return. There are many who go through Hale with the attitude that they are there from nine to three-thirty and that is all. They had little to give or to gain from Hale. Oddly enough, when these boys leave school they realise how much Hale did mean to them or how much it could have meant. On the other hand, we have students who are enthusiastic about all aspects of the School community, be it academic, cultural, or sporting. These boys are the nucleus of a successful school and fortunately we have a good quota of them each year.

There is a tremendous student-master relationship at Hale. I feel the main reason for this is Wittenoom. Talking to students from other schools, it is obvious that they do not believe me when I say that the masters become just as involved in school activities as students. It is, though, a fact! This involvement of both student and master is the key factor in building up a strong 'school spirit'.

The main function of Hale is to give the students a sound basic education and on the academic side we have many fine students and every boy is encouraged to work hard. Two outstanding efforts in the academic field were achieved this year. Neil Taylor has won a scholarship to Germany for six months and Richard Goyder a scholarship to Canada or New Zealand for a year. The top section of our present fifth year should achieve some excellent results in the T.A.E.

There are a number of extra curricular activities at Hale. The Rifle Club, run by Mr. Somers-Vine, is increasing in numbers all the time with practice shoots being held at our mini range. Competition



against other schools started later in the year and the boys get tremendous satisfaction from this sport. The Photography Club remained as strong as ever. Our amateur photographers produced some excellent work, evidence of which is seen in the school magazine. The production of the Cygnet is one of the school's major undertakings. The work of Mr. Bairstow and his committee has resulted in another fine record of the year's activities. The Chess Club, run by Mr. Sonntag, is much stronger than in previous years. Of the three teams entered, the 'A' team won its competition and the 'B' and 'C' teams were both runners-up - a very good result for club members. Mr. Coney again ran debating and this year we had two Senior teams and one Junior. Debating is a most worthwhile exercise and it also allows students to participate in interschool activities. The Band must also be mentioned. Their music is now of a very high standard and the Band Leader, Mr. Harvey, is to be commended.

Sport this year was away to a typical start. Hale won the interschool swimming for the eleventh year in succession. The critics had written

us off, but on the night our competitors showed great fighting spirit and what a victory it was! Congratulations to the swimmers, to all the coaches, and especially to Mr. Hoad. Mention must also be made of captain, Danny Rechichi, who received honours for his wonderful swimming over the years.

The Tennis players were favourites for the Corr Cup. The team went through the season undefeated and also won the Slazenger Cup. Mr. Edgar, Mr. Bonner and all players are to be congratulated on their thoroughly professional efforts. The top sporting award of honours was again made, this time to Chris Johnstone, for his outstanding performances in tennis. The victory by the younger players in the Herbert Edwards' Cup augurs well for the future.

The acquisition of a new shell gave the Rowers great confidence and the incentive to train hard. The first eight won their race at the Hale Regatta and were a close third in the Head of the River. All rowers gave their best and they are most grateful to Mr. Truscott, all the coaches, and especially Mr. Roger Harrison, for their tireless efforts at the sheds.

The first eleven had a successful trip to Adelaide during January, winning four of its five games and having an excellent preparation for the home season. Mr. Macmillan and Dr. Lill are thanked for their efforts on tour. In the Darlot Cup we finished second, losing by the narrowest margin to Christ Church. The team very much appreciated the time and effort put in by Mr. Gidney. The U/16 A's were undefeated — another good sign for the future.

In May the football team travelled to Adelaide by train. This trip moulded the team into a close knit group and was a major factor in our wins against Geelong College, and Scotch College Adelaide, for the C.D. Fisher Plate. In the Alcock Cup we were third behind joint winners Aquinas and Christ Church. Thanks again go to Mr. Macmillan and Mr. Truscott for time spent on the team.

There was a Hockey revival this year. The first eleven's south-west tour gave them valuable experience and their winning form created great interest in the school. They finished a creditable third and congratulations are extended to Mr. Jordan and the players on their achievements. The undefeated second years guarantee a sound hockey future.

In Squash we entered four teams, the A's finishing second and the other three teams third. The numbers in this sport are growing and coach Mr. Edgar is hoping this sport continues to thrive. In Rugby, Hale were again dominant. In fact with one game to play we could not lose the cup. We could, though, tie with old rivals Scotch for the Brother Redmond Cup and we did, when they

were a little better in the final game. Congratulations to Mr. Pontin, Reverend Davis and all the players.

Athletics was disappointing. Our team was not up to the standard of Aquinas and the other schools and we had to be content with seventh. A number did well on the day, but insufficient depth and a general lack of running ability, apart for the distance events, cost us dearly. Christ Church's efforts in coming from seventh in 1976 to third in 1977 shows what can be done and Hale will need tremendous support from all boys next year. The team is most grateful to all coaches and especially to Mr. Biddle for all the time and effort put into training the team.



The 'total involvement' mentioned earlier has certainly been the Mr. Shields story. His dedication to his work and to us all shows what the school has meant to him. We wish a true Haleian all the very best in his retirement. We also farewell two other long serving masters. The important Physics teaching has been Mr. Prince's task since 1964, and since 1967, Mr. Shaw has taught the top stream of Maths students. Their work has been very much appreciated and we wish them long and happy retirements.

On behalf of all boys and especially those leaving Hale, I would like to thank the Headmaster and Staff for all they have done. We say a special thank you to our Housemasters for their help and guidance during the past five years. I also thank the fifth years and the Prefects for their support and wish them all the best for their futures. I hope those returning will be involved in the life of the school. Honest support of all the many school activities is essential if the school is to flourish.

We believe Hale is a good school. The facilities of the school are tremendous, but these are not everything. The friendliness of the school is significant. This makes Hale a successful, independent school, the sort of school we have enjoyed, the school to whom we owe a great debt — a debt we will never be able to repay, but will be conscious of forever.

C.H. Shaw





Eric Royston Prince and his wife and family arrived at Fremantle from Kenya on Thursday 11th June, 1964, to take charge of the Science Department at Hale School, and the following Monday, he started by teaching the first period. He taught Physics "and Chemistry as a temporary measure until the end of the year", and continued to teach Chemistry for the next ten years. He was also Junior Certificate examiner in both Chemistry and Physics. He will be remembered by those whom he taught for his wide knowledge of his subject enlivened by example from his varied career in the U.K., Africa and Australia; in RADAR research, meteorology, and music. It is in this last sphere that he may be best remembered by most boys for his fine voice leading the staff and school in hymn singing at morning assembly. He played the part of the judge in "Trial by Jury" and helped with the production of the musical "Oliver". Other productions by Hale School in conjunction with the girls of Churchlands SHS and St. Mary's School were directed by him. Eric Prince showed his versatility in being master in charge of rowing from 1966-75 during which time the performance of the crews gradually improved; the 1st VIII being last in 1966 and first in 1971. For a time he also coached the 2nd VIII. His interest in sport however was not confined to the river and no Staff versus Boys Cricket Match would have been complete without him as umpire.

One would not expect an active man like Eric Prince to retire completely and he will be spending more time with the West Australian Arts Orchestra as Orchestra Manager. We wish him well and hope he will have much enjoyment using his many talents in this position.

Come 1978 and bees in the library cannot be so swiftly dealt with because the Master will have left; for Vic. Shields a man of many things to many men and boys is to retire at the end of this year after twenty five years on the Staff of Hale. Vic. came to Hale - the Old Hale, in 1952 to teach mainly Phys. Ed., in that well remembered gym in Havelock Street, but also taught History in which he majored at the University of W.A. Later Vic. moved in to build up the Biology Department for the shift to Wembley Downs, returning to University to qualify in Biological Science. He became the first Senior Master of Biology and will be well remembered by his students, many of them now medical practitioners, for the thoroughness and ever practical orientation of his teaching; his insistence upon clear observation and logical thinking. To know Vic. is to share his enthusiasm, to appreciate his fine attention to detail - for there is the enigma, Vic. Shields is a man of many, many talents and a true master of them all, a perfectionist in so many ways.

Many will know of his wide talents within Hale — the diverse academic interests just noted; architect and slavedriver of the Woodwork Room construction project and Havelock Street; adjutant of 10 Flight Air Training Corps R.A.A.F.; organiser and chef-delux of many "Biol Camps"; enthusiastic leader of countless Wittenoom Groups so characteristic of Vic. Not for him the drudgery of "town house" but out to Millstream to taste the raw, rugged magnificence of nature as it was meant to be known, almost primeval, untouched, unspoiled.

Fewer will know of his wider talents — outside Hale. Perhaps something of his fishing prowess has filtered through; for Vic. is renowned for pinpointing with uncanny accuracy where the fish are biting — and proving it by lining them in with amazing speed.

Born in Geraldton, Vic. passed his Leaving in the depression when "bits of paper" didn't carry much weight in the job stakes, so he became a miner in the Murchison; later going to the South Seas where among other accomplishments he is reputed to have become an explorer of some note. Top baseball umpire, boat builder, master builder, balletomane, market gardener, army medical corpsman, St. John Ambulance driver — these and many more have seen Vic. Shields play his part in the wider community for so long with dynamic enthusiasm and sincere dedication coupled with an eye for precision, be that through microscope or in measurement of a transom.

Hale in 1978 will miss more than a Senior Master of Biology — it will miss Vic. Shields and all that that means.

tralian Prayer Book. There is no sign yet of Hale having a female priest but there is considerable pressure being brought to bear on all clergy to use the new Prayer Book — and a new Australian Hymn Book has now been published as well.

It is still legal to use the 1662 services and there are sound arguments for continuing to do so, but it is important that our Chapel prepare boys for the type of worship they will find in their own parish churches. If the Australian Prayer Book gains general acceptance in Western Australia, Hale School will be obliged to use it and so this year could be the last in which the

beautiful language of the Book of Common Prayer and the Authorised Version of the Bible were the normal usage in Hale's Chapel.

To judge the effect of Chapel Service is not easy, but we can say that this year the boys did behave in exemplary fashion in Chapel, they joined in all their parts of the service with enthusiasm, appeared to listen with attention and absorbed enough to want to comment about the services in divinity lessons.

A good number of candidates cheerfully attended confirmation instruction and were confirmed by Bishop MacDonald on the 23rd of October, receiving their first Communion at the same service.

Charities

As one of the oldest educational institutions in Western Australia, Hale School, has always been aware of its responsibility towards the rest of the community. In fact, the School Motto "Duty" infers that an involvement in community services is as an essential a part of education as academic and sporting activities.

From the time the School moved to Wembley Downs in 1961 weekly collections of funds were made on a House basis. These collections accumulated under a central School Charities Commission, (consisting ofthe Deputy Headmaster and a representative from each house), and allocated to various worthy charitable organisations within the community. Generally it has been considered that children's organisations should have priority, but in recent years adult organisations have also been generously supported.

Originally, the collection of charities was based on an inter-house competition with the weekly totals being read out at assembly. This method of collection was quite successful but there was some disillusionment amongst members of the houses who were not made aware of the organisations benefiting from their contributions. Abuses in the methods of collecting funds also became apparent. Senior boys were intimidating younger students to obtain contributions, a practice which caused a lot of ill-feeling. The boarding houses were also felt to have an advantage because their donations were deducted directly from their pocket money accounts.

The system of inter-house competition was

finally abandoned at the request of housemasters after an unfortunate incident over the unauthorised publishing of a student magazine. Although the proceeds were to go to charities it was deemed that the material published was not in the best interests of the School and the magazine was recalled and destroyed. The competitive system was then discontinued and although the amounts collected decreased a much more relaxed atmosphere prevailed. Some houses established their own committees and this seemed to be a better arrangement involving more house members.

In recent years the policy of the School has been to encourage the giving of service to the community rather than just contributing financial support. A number of such projects were undertaken by the houses this year:

- Faulkner House's support of the Lucy Creeth Home for Crippled Children.
- Loton House's involvement with the Lions' Ring Around.
- Stirling House's raffle in support of the Blind Institute.
- Wilson House's support of the Profoundly Retarded Childrens Association.
- Parry House's work for the Arthritis Foundation and the manning of a stall at the Royal Show to raise funds.

It is hoped that the initiative and enthusiasm shown by Parry and Stirling will be an example and inspiration for other day houses in the years to come. The experience of working for charities is a rewarding one for any student.

Wittenoom

Hale Wittenoom 1977 began with preliminary setting up by an advance party consisting of Mr. C.P. Bairstow and Year 12 students Brett Audas, Norm Beecham and Tim Oldham. They did much good work organising equipment, establishing the bush camp and also participating in the annual 'Henley-on-Joffre Regatta' in Wittenoom Gorge. Their efforts were much appreciated. 

The group stayed in Wittenoom an extra day to break camp, pack stores away and tidy the town house at which they did a great iob.

My first thanks go to the assistant resident masters, Kim Riseborough and Peter Simpson. The smooth running of Hale Wittenoom depends much on their efforts and it is a great job that they do for the school. Hale Wittenoom would not function without the support of the staff at Wembley Downs and I particularly thank Dr. Tregonning, Mr. Hoar and Mr. Truscott in this

regard. Group masters are those upon whom the success of each group really depends and this year I was fortunate (as were the Year 11 boys) to have the great team of group masters that I did.

The school's appreciation is also extended to Hancock & Wright, Hamersley Iron, National Parks Board, E.G. & L. McGuire's Wittenoom Tourist Centre, Mr. & Mrs. Jim Hooson of Mulga Downs station, our caretaker Mr. Ted Godwin and his wife and to the people of Wittenoom generally.

Hale Wittenoom 1977 was to me, successful and satisfying and a great tribute to the Year 11 boys whose enthusiasm for the program couldn't help but make it a success. They are a fine group who will disappoint me greatly if they do not make fine leaders of this school in 1978.





Mulga Downs — 14 miles! That's how far each group treked overland from Wittenoom town through bush to the cattle station quarters. This was a test of perseverence and bushmanship following no track but only relying on the accuracy of the group members with compasses. Perhaps group VII could use a little more proficiency as regards their compas work. This was the first time any group was required to show how well they could co-operate and perform on their own and without the guidance of the experienced resident master, Roger Gray.

After a week had been spent at Hale Base, the group was then transferred via the somewhat vaunted catwalk to the bush camp. Here the group members displayed their true qualities — responsibility, leadership, courage and mateship. 


JUNIOR SCHOOL EXCURSION

An inestimable bonus to the Junior Boarding House over the last 8 years has been the quiet strength of Mr. Cook. His sincerity and dignity have added immeasurably to the spirit and stability of the House.

Together Mr. and Mrs. Cook have given Brine House, and Hale School, a quality of service which is hard to define, although one was always aware that their actions were prompted by the highest sense of moral responsibility toward youngsters

whose ideals and principles were still very much in the embryo stage.

We extend our gratitude and thanks to Lin and Alex Cook and wish them a long and fulfilling retirement.






WINTER SOLITUDE





This year's Hale School swimming team went into the Inters Carnival with the knowledge that they were about to face their toughest competition for the past eleven years. It was widely held because of last year's close results that Scotch would wrest the laurels from Hale. Everybody, however, had failed to appreciate that the vastly improved Wesley team would also be a force to contend with and they managed to take very valuable points from the Scotch team, leaving Hale supreme.

Our Captain, Danny Rechichi, was narrowly beaten (for the first time in his long Inters career) in the blue ribbon 100 metres freestyle event. Richard Whiting, however, clearly won the second division and Hale won both divisions of the U/13 and U/15 freestyle events finishing the freestyle section with a narrow lead of seven points over

Scotch.

Breastroke has traditionally been Hale's weakest stroke and although we didn't have any outstanding swimmers we managed to improve our place results and maintain our seven points lead. It had been expected that at this stage we would have been behind Scotch so the improvement of Hale breastrokers was a contributing factor in our eventual success.

The breastroke events saw Hale gain four firsts, two seconds and four thirds and thus increase our lead to twenty six points. With another four firsts, four seconds and four thirds in the butterfly events, reasonable success in the relays would ensure us victory.

The open 200 metres saw our U/16 champion. David Agnew swim his best race ever to finish first in the second division, whilst Danny Rechichi was narrowly beaten in the first division. We were able to go into the relays with an almost unbeat-

able lead of 45 points over Wesley.

Hale was content to swim into third place in both medley relays and concentrated all our strength in the freestyle relays. In doing so we became the first School ever to win the five freestyle relays. Hale won its 11th successive Inters by a margin of 84 points from Scotch, closely followed by the much improved Wesley team.

Congratulations to all swimmers and thanks to Mr. Hoad and all the coaches for another

successful swimming year.

In this year, Rechichi recorded four 1st Division wins (48 points), one 1st Division second (9 points), and was a member of the winning relay (20 points) making a total of 77 points, a record number.

1977 OPEN

In this year, he recorded one 1st Division win (12 points), four 1st Division seconds (36 points), and was a member of the winning relay (20 points) contributing a total of 68 points.

Because of his versatility in four strokes, he has been the most prolific points scorer ever for Hale School, and certainly since 1967 has scored more points for a school over five years than any other swimmer from any other school. The worst place he ever achieved was a second in a first division event.

During his stay at Hale School, he set two relay records and six interschool records (still standing).



The HALE 1st XI returned from Adelaide winning four of the five games played. There was tremendous team spirit and we were determined to retain the Darlot Cup.

The side received a severe setback in the first game against Wesley. After dismissing Wesley for the modest total of 130, Hale could do no better and the match was tied. In the second game against the strong Christ Church side, Hale's bowlers could not penetrate the middle order and Christ Church reached the formidable total of 230. Hale's batting again proved to be brittle and we were dismissed for 161. It now looked as if the Darlot Cup was gone for 1977.

However, the side refused to give in, and their fightback deserves the highest praise. In the next game against Trinity, we made 281 and victory seemed inevitable. Trinity fought hard however, and it was only a fine diving slips catch by Home off the second last ball of the day, that finally brought us success. With the memory of last year's struggle against Guildford firmly entrenched in our minds, we were determined not to let this happen again. Christ Church had snatched an outright victory and denied us the Darlot Cup for the second year in succession by the narrowest of margins.

Thanks must go to all the players and to Mr. Gidney for his tireless efforts. Even though we didn't win the Cup the boys must be praised for their determination and tenacity. Thanks must also go to the mothers for their wonderful afternoon teas, and Mr. McKenna and the ground staff for their 'Test' like wickets.

In conclusion, I congratulate Christ Church on their win, a win which they thoroughly deserved being the only side to defeat us.





The airline strike helped produce probably Hale's finest Interstate win. The spirit of the group reached an all time high on the train trip to Adelaide and gave the team incredible desire and an eventual 14.5 to 11.15 victory over the talented and sizeable Geelong. Hale's ball getting ability, clever handball and short passing in this game, and in the annihilation of Scotch, was most impressive. Certainly the Carnival, tremendous, as usual, was a tribute to the Scotch organisers, the billets, the birds and the comradeship of everyone. May we be good enough to host yet another grand week in 1978 — the fourteenth Interstate.

Tennis extraordinaire, Chris Johnstone was the season's best player. His control of the ball at centre was remarkable and his many fine games influenced our destiny significantly. Ruck rover half forward David Tuckey's football was also quality and his good games coincided with our victories. The ruck twins Sandy Home and Brett Farmer played strongly throughout, kicked many goals and are assured of bright futures.

Others did well at times — John Storey a solid defender, Lowey, creative on a wing, Marsh and O'Meehan often productive, Foulkes and Bungey young and skilful. There were others too, but somehow we lacked the depth and the consistency to win all games. Even so, only Christ Church conquered us. The first Scotch game was disappointing and the Aquinas one extraordinarily unlucky, but we had system and team-work in other games. Against Christ Church we needed our Geelong approach, we needed the ball, the team-work, the runners, the feeling!

My thanks again go to many - to Messrs. Chadwick, Smith and Bairstow for coaching help, to doven of timekeepers, Fred Spencer, to tolerant runner Basil Zempilas, to Robert Turrell an excellent goal umpire, and to our youthful boundary umpires. In my time we have never had a finer lot of parents - their support, encouragement, involvement and humour made it a happy team. The Gepps, Homes, Tuckeys, McLartys, Farmers, Johnstones, Storeys, Marshs, O'Meehans, Foulkes and all the others made it a year to remember. The work of Mr. Truscott, unobtrusive as usual, was supreme - he "managed" everything. My thanks, too, go to all players, and there were many, for their efforts in creating a meaningful unit. Special praise to Tim, Sandy, Tuck, Johno and Brett for their football, their ideas and their help. Tim Gepp (unluckily hampered by injury) led the team well

and cared for all aspects of our football, indeed of all aspects of Hale.

This report ends on a sad note. We record the deaths of two great friends of Hale football. The late Ed Davies, as a coach and later manager of Geelong College, made a vast contribution to the His vital association with ideals of Interstate. the boys and staffs of Geelong, Scotch and Hale lasted ten years and we will greatly miss his influence and friendship. Jim O'Connoll's death in September shocked us all. Jim was our champion masseur for the past five years. Goodness knows how many he treated - his knowledge of injuries was amazing and his ready wit and advice so much appreciated. Jim loved his association with Hale and we have lost a great helper and a real friend. Dedication of the years ahead if Hale football is to remain near the top.







A barbecue was held, to cap off a great day and everyone hobbled home declaring they would be there next year.
