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Editorials

As almost every person associated with Hale should know, this year, Australia's bicentenary, sees the retirement of Hale's long serving headmaster, Doctor Tregonning. The bicentenary has seen Australians looking back on what has been achieved since the humble beginnings of 1788. Hale should similarly use the occasion of the headmaster's retirement, to look back on what Hale has achieved and maintained since 1967.

The retention of the Junior Certificate examinations at the end of Year 10 has Hale standing alone. Hale declined to use the Achievement Certificate or the Unit Curriculum. This school has attained an outstanding percentage of tertiary positions, which can in part be attributed to this retention of the goals of hard work leading to competitive examinations. In turn, this retention can be attributed to Doctor Tregonning because he was a strong supporter of the idea. With this good basis, these percentages should be upheld in future years.

In addition to seeking academic excellence, Hale encourages participation in a wide variety of other activities requiring co-operation and enthusiasm. Sport at Hale is strongly encouraged and this has led to a good standing in the PSA competition. The last few years have seen the resurgence of Hale as a real force in athletics. This coincides with creditable placings in almost every sporting field from squash to cross country. Debating, chess, drama and music and art have also been a vital part of life at Hale.

Sporting achievements are the showcase for all the PSA schools. Hale's proficiency, together with other factors can be related to the forward bookings into the 21st century and waitings lists until 1997. Despite this obvious demand, numbers remain small which allows a close school community. The P and F Ladies Auxiliary, the recently established Hale Foundation and the Old Boys are all key factors in Hale's strength.

In retrospect, it can be concluded that Doctor Tregonning shouldn't have any qualms about the school he is leaving. This is because the traditions that are so important in the history of Hale School will remain. The school has maintained its excellent standing in Western Australia and Australia. Captain of School, Shane Cassey summed up the retirement of the headmaster thus:

"Doctor Tregonning's retirement sees the end of another chapter in the history of Hale School," but what a chapter it has been. Many Australians look back with pride at 200 years of settlement in Australia's Bicentenary Year, 1988. A small percentage of these Australians, the young and the old of Hale School, may well do the same by looking back at 130 years of Hale School.

As these 130 years have passed, Hale has encountered many different eras, and 1988 brings to a close the Dr K.G. Tregonning era. Twenty two years is no mean feat as a headmaster and Hale will be saddened by the loss of a man with so many outstanding qualifications and credentials.

Australia, the "no worries, she'll be right mate, have a 4X," country has strived for perfection since the day it was settled, 26th of January, 1788, by Captain Arthur Phillip. From the very first convicts to the children born in our birthday year, most Australians have set goals at the highest of achievements, perfection. Even though most Australians endeavour to reach this goal, only a very select few have achieved perfection in their line of life. People such as the great Sir Donald Bradman, master of batting in the cricketing world, are those who have been able to achieve the highest level in their field, but bear in mind there are only a few. Many Australians aim for these goals but not all of them are able to "guide the ball between the two big sticks," but there is the fighting spirit in most Australians to have a go.

So too has Hale strived for perfection since the day it was founded back in 1858 by Mathew Blagden Hale. From Mr L.S. Elliott, the first student at Hale in 1858 to the boys destined to attend Hale in coming years, there has, and always will be, that fight to try and achieve, not only in the classroom (academically) but also on the sporting field. Hale being the smallest school in numbers in the whole of the P.S.A. provides plenty of scope for the development of comradeship between both students and staff. This comradeship builds the grit and determination shown by all involved with Hale.

Hale has produced many great people with high ideals in their chosen fields, from state premiers, of whom Hale has proudly produced six, to test cricketers and doctors (a field for which Hale is renowned for producing prominent members).

So as the years pass and Australia starts the countdown towards its tri-centenary in the year 2088, I sincerely hope that the people involved with Hale in another 100 years can be as proud of the high level Haleians reach and are as aware of the Duty they owe to their school and country.

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Captain of School's Report

The strong school spirit that has been a tradition of Hale school since its foundation in 1858 was once again evident in 1988. All boys have combined well over the year, and this has allowed for the optimum level of performance in all school activities to be achieved.

Dr Tregonning, who has been an integral part of Hale school over the last 22 years, will be retiring at the end of 1988. This brings to an end an era in Hale school history and the beginning of a new one. Dr Tregonning has worked tirelessly over the years to make Hale prosper and become the great school that it is. I know everyone will join me in wishing him and Mrs Tregonning a happy retirement.

The beginning of this year saw the appointment of the successor to Dr Tregonning in Mr John Inverarity. His outstanding qualities will be a benefit to Hale School, and Hale will no doubt prosper under his leadership.

The Hale school tradition is exemplified at Old Boys Day. This year saw a record number of Old Boys attending. This interest displayed by former students is a benefit to the present students to know that they are being watched and supported.

An important part of Hale school is the combination of both scholastic and sporting activities. First term is dominated by sporting activities, which allow boys to strike up friendships with others, which will be beneficial for the terms to come.

The 1st V Basketballers continued to show Hale supremacy in that sport. The closest any team came to them over the season was 35 points. They easily won the Blackwood Cup for the 5th consecutive year and with the talented younger players in the team all looks set for a successful future.

As always the swimmers showed grit and determination to give an outstanding display at the Inters. However, a strong Christchurch team proved too strong and Hale finished a very creditable second. This second place in the swimming was to be an ominous sign of things to come.

The 1st XI cricket team, led by century maker Justin Williams, was to go down in the last game by 2 runs. This loss robbed them of any chance of winning the Darlot Cup and they were forced to settle for second place. The 1st VIII tennis team, without the stars of the previous years, was to display an enormous amount of determination to also finish in equal 2nd place. In the last game of the season against the favourites of the competition Wesley, they had a tremendous victory and the contribution of the younger players in that win makes next year's season look promising.

The 1st VIII rowers produced good early form and were considered to be in the top three. Unfortunately their form fell away at the end of the season and they finished 5th at the Head of the River Regatta. The rowers show what dedication is all about by their many early morning training sessions. T.

Hale again had mixed fortunes in the winter sports conducted over terms two and three.

The 1st XVIII football side was the dominant team early in the competition and was looking for a win, but a reversal of form after the vacation break in the middle of the season was to see them lose the last four games. Even with this they finished in equal second place.

The Cross-Country team were the big improvers this year, finishing in 4th place. With the many younger runners coming up, cross-country at Hale, is looking for bigger and better things.

The 1st XV Rugby side had a disappointing season which saw them win only one game and finish in seventh place. The team faced much larger sides and had no answer to this.

Soccer in its second year at Hale made a dramatic improvement and with greater numbers and support next year will be able to compete competitively against the first teams of the other schools.

Athletics is the major sport from the end of term three and into term four. Hale has been rapidly improving over previous years and everyone was looking forward to that elusive 1st place. However, in one of the closest competitions on record the Hale team displayed nerves at the business end of the day and made a couple of costly errors in the relays which saw them finish in third place.

This has been a list of successes of the first teams, but these successes would not have been possible without participation by all boys in a wide variety of sports. At Hale School there are many extra curricula activities students can participate in. The idea of participation is very important for the success of any school.

Early in second term approximately 140 boys took part in the annual school play. "The Bishop's School", the story of Hale School from 1858 to 1872, was superbly written and produced by Mr Hopkins. The play allowed boys to display artistic talents which may never have been discovered without this opportunity. Along with the actors were the band in the pit and the backstage crew who all combined to produce a magnificent play.

Hale again took an active part in the Red Cross Appeal in first term. Hale has been a great supporter of the Red Cross and this year raised approximately \$7000.

An activity at Hale that has been gaining continued support is debating. The talented first team achieved the best result of a Hale team since 1981 in the W.A.D.L. Schools Competition. With the likes of Frank Tenji to come, Hale debating is in for some more exciting seasons.

A very dedicated group of chess players were to represent Hale successfully this year with them winning the State Allegro Schools Cup. Hale has some very talented chess players such as Jason Field, who is the State under eighteen champion at 15 years of age, and Frank Tenji who is the State under sixteen champion.

In the last week of second term a group of year twelve students went to Rottnest for the reafforestation programme undertaken by Hale for many years. Some 2000 trees were planted and other activities undertaken in the hope that the Rottnest landscape will benefit.

The Wittenoom excursion continued for year elevens again this year. This two weeks is character building for all boys which is beneficial for their later lives. Wittenoom's success depends very much on those involved in organising it and in particular Mr Sonntag, who was the resident master this year.

The foremost social event of the Hale calendar for years ten, eleven and twelve would be the Prefect's Dance. This occurred in third term and was a successful evening enjoyed by all. Special thanks to the Prefects for their work in organising the event.

This year Hale students participated in many trips both interstate and overseas. The rowers in early second term went to Hong Kong for an international regatta; The 1st XVIII football side, accompanied by St Mary's hockey and netball teams went to Melbourne to compete against St Leonards of Melbourne and Scotch of Adelaide in the Interstate Carnival. As always this was a great success and enjoyed by all. A group of French students went to France for four weeks and this trip will greatly assist their French studies. A trip to Expo in Brisbane was organised for any students wishing to participate by Mr Alderson during the last vacation of the year.

House sport which continues throughout the whole year is vital for comradeship among the prospective members of each house. Haynes won the Cock House Cup for the second successive year and also won the House Debating Competition. Parry was successful in the House Chess Competition.

The Hale School Gym, which is nearing completion, was the major construction project this year. The translating of the idea of the gym into reality has been the work of Dr Tregonning. He has also been responsible for the raising of funds through the Foundation. The gym will be a great asset to Hale School and will be beneficial to all students in the future.

The work of the Masters and administration staff is one reason behind the success of Hale School.

Participation by staff in all activities leads to a strong relationship between staff and students which enhances school life and individual development.

In concluding I would like to thank Dr Tregonning, staff and in particular Mr MacMillan for their support and help over the year. The students of Hale must be congratulated on their efforts this year and in particular the prefects. To the year twelves I would like to wish them every success in the future, and to those returning in 1989, have an enjoyable time in your years remaining at Hale

Dr. K.G. Tregonning

Although Kennedy Gordon Tregonning is not the longest serving Headmaster at Hale School, he has certainly had an influence on more young Haleians than any other Headmaster. The longest serving headmaster was Mr Faulkner who was at the school from 1889 to 1944. Dr Tregonning took up the position on the 1st February, 1967, some six years after the school moved from West Perth to Wembley Downs.


The most important decision for the future a governing body of a school makes is the appointment of a headmaster and the school is indebted to the Governors responsible for appointing Dr Tregonning.

From the time he arrived, the school has made great progress in our education system and we are all very proud of its reputation today. As board chairman for the last five years I have worked closely with him and while the Governors are responsible, under the Hale School Act 1876-1958, for the school and to determine broad policy, it is the Headmaster who will make or break a school during his term of office.

Dr Tregonning has lived the past twenty two years totally for Hale School and its boys. I know that he would be prepared to walk over burning coals to help any one of them. I have seen him elated whenever boys have done well and more than concerned or worried whenever they are in trouble or have not made the grade.

Among his many talents and attributes I have also been conscious of his outstanding contribution to education, the calibre of the teaching staff he has attracted and his firm approach to discipline within the school, tempered by sensitivity and a deep affection for the students. He has certainly not shirked making difficult decisions when necessary.

I am reminded of the observation by G.E. Stuart at the end of Dr Tregonning's first year at Hale when he wrote:—

"Dr Tregonning, with his quiet and unassuming manner, has earned rather than commanded a great deal of respect from the boys, and holds a position in their regard of which any headmaster would be proud".

In this regard nothing has changed over the years and the board members, parents, staff and students are very much indebted to him and at the end of the year we wish him and Mrs Tregonning many happy years together and our thanks for a job well done.

Dr K.G. Tregonning MBE 1967-1988

When Dr Ken Tegonning became Headmaster of Hale School in 1967 it was a case of a Haleian returning to Hale. We had known of Dr Tregonning's academic and sporting achievements when he was at Hale, we knew he had served in the RAAF, had obtained an Arts degree at the Adelaide University and had later lectured there in History. He had gone on to Oxford where he obtained a Bachelor of Literature and later had a degree of Doctor of Philosophy conferred upon him. We knew he was coming to us from the University of Singapore where he had been the Raffles Professor of History but we knew nothing really of the man. At his first Assembly in 1967, a silence fell over 600 boys as the new Headmaster was introduced to the school. Unused to his new role he looked uneasy and somewhat shy at the sight of such an audience. He began by telling an amusing story and soon the Hall was echoing with laughter. The ice was broken and from that day onwards the school has been a most friendly and happy place.

The years from 1961 (our first at Wembley Downs) to 1966 were not easy ones and since 1967 Dr Tregonning has steered the Hale ship into calmer waters. He has kept the school small (the smallest in the PSA) but he has created a most comprehensive place of learning. At the risk of praising ourselves, the Headmaster has gathered fine staff about him. Talented and dedicated, the staff have been fine contributors to this many sided school and they have been encouraged by Dr Tregonning to get on with it, to initiate, to implement. Their ideas have been utilised by the Headmaster and they have been keen to work for Dr Tregonning and for the betterment of the school. The Headmaster has maintained the conservative nature of the school and the traditional curriculum has been emphasised. Hale boys still sit the Junior Exam and through the years of the achievement certificate, Hale pressed on teaching for example Physics and Chemistry (rather than Science) and History and Geography (not Social Science) to our year nines and tens. As well as demanding academic excellence (and results have been first class) Dr Tregonning has been tremendously interested in the less able and has inspired all boys to do their best. The creation of a very strong House system would probably be the Headmaster's greatest achievement. A sense of belonging not only to Hale but also to one's House (seen in House sport, chess, debating, drama and charity collections) provided a link between students, Housemasters and Headmaster which is one of the strengths of the school. The magnificently exciting and unique Wittenoom adventure is for many the highlight of their school days. Set up by the Headmaster in 1970, Wittenoom remains great outdoor education, a superb two weeks in the Hamersley ranges.

Dr Tregonning has built the school up enormously. Guided by astute Boards of Governors, he has seen built in his time the Chapel, the Newbury science wing, many extensions to the Junior School, a new library, N and L block classrooms, a Music Centre, Fitness Centre, Computing Centre, extensions to the Hall for drama, new tennis courts, more recently superb Boarding House extensions and now the fast finishing Gymnasium. As well as improving our facilities, Dr Tregonning has been vitally interested in all aspects of the sporting and cultural side of Hale. Way back in 1967 he told his secretary not to book appointments for him on Wednesday and Friday afternoons. On these days he and his trusty dogs walked the school grounds, watching, barracking and encouraging. In his time Hale teams have done very well (the eighteen Inters swimming victories stand out) and he takes great pride that all teams are coached by our staff - there are no outside coaches. His support of music, drama, chess, debating, Rottnest reafforestation, cadets in earlier times, Cygnet and indeed all activities, has been tremendous and boys recognise his genuine interest in their efforts.

The Headmaster's contact with, and the gentle bringing together of all the many folk in the Hale community has been cleverly done. His relations with the Board, the Old Boys, the P & F and Ladies Auxiliary and office, ancillary, maintenance and ground staff, has been very important. His quiet friendly approach has made Hale a happy school and all of us have responded to his dry wit and his humour. Over the years the quality of the Hale boys, their manner, their friendliness and the way they present themselves is a tribute to Dr Tregonning. He has disciplined with love, he has had to punish some but he has been very fair and most compassionate. In his quiet way he ensured that no boy, boarder or day boy, was denied his opportunity at Hale when financial difficulties arose.

This year the Foundation has been his major interest. The Headmaster has worked extremely

hard to guarantee the independence and financial future of Hale and, though he will not be at the helm, he will see the benefits when we welcome him back in the years to come. The enormous value of the Foundation has not only been the money raised but also the bringing together of all parts of the Hale family. Just as independence is the key to the future, so is Dr Tregonning an independent man. On many issues he has gone it alone, and while occasionally he has had his critics, no one can doubt his love of Hale, nor his belief in Hale and its students. A record number of Old Boys paid tribute to him on Old Boys' Day and at the recent Old Boys' Dinner. In the same way he has engendered pride in the school by demanding boys look him in the eye and give a firm handshake when receiving an award. He may look back at his time at Hale with the same feeling of achievement.

Throughout his Headmastership Dr Tregonning has received the support of his wife Judy and the school has benefited from Mrs Tregonning's contribution in so many ways. A whole generation of boys have seen the best possible example of a husband and wife team working together for the common good of a community that is more like an extended family. We all wish Doctor and Mrs Tregonning everything they would wish themselves in the years to come. At the excellent 'Boys leaving school' Chapel service (where he too was also a leaver), Dr Tregonning spoke of the happy and sad aspects of leaving. Like many who leave school, the Headmaster will miss Hale and in the words of the song from the school play, we say 'Goodbye, good friend, Goodbye'. Often schoolboys cleverly capture complex thoughts and emotions in simple statements and so we can only echo their chant of 'Well done Doc!'

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Interview with Dr Tregonning

Q. How long has your family been associated with Hale and how did this come about?

A. A cousin of mine, Jeff Leyland, came to Hale in 1929 while my two brothers and I were attending Christ Church Primary School. My eldest brother, was the first Tregonning to attend Hale. This followed the move by my father, a doctor, from Claremont to West Perth where Hale was situated in 1933. My father returned to Claremont but my elder brother stayed on at Hale and my twin brother and I went on to Hale after finishing at Christ Church in 1936.

Q. How was your school life and did you ever think you would become Headmaster at Hale?

A. It could have been a lot better. My father died as I was finishing primary school. This led to my mother withdrawing into herself and leaving me with no grown-up guidance. In addition teachers at Hale at the time were mainly survivors of the Great Depression. Then in 1939 many left for World War II. The school had no established house system or available pastoral care which I could have greatly benefitted from.

When I left school I had no definite idea of what I wanted to do except that I did not want to be a doctor as my father and brothers were. I vaguely wanted to be a writer and liked History. I also enjoyed my sport, as did my twin brother. He was captain of cricket and football and I was the captain of swimming and athletics. My eldest brother was an outstanding sportsman as well. He captained the State hockey team and I was captain of the State rugby team when we were all at Adelaide University after the war. This showed our love for sport, but as far as hard work was concerned, that came later.

Becoming headmaster of Hale was not in my wildest dreams and I had never thought of it. I had not even thought of teaching after attending Adelaide University where I obtained a first class honours degree in History and Political Science. My first job was as a reporter for the 'West Australian' before I accepted a scholarship to Oxford University.

Q. How did your taking up of the position of headmaster come about?

A. I was a Professor of History at the University of Singapore where I had been living for fourteen years, and I thought it was time to come back to Australia with my wife and five growing daughters. It just so happened that I received a letter from a friend suggesting that I apply for the Hale headmastership. The position had become available following the resignation of my predecessor under rather controversial circumstances at the end of 1965. I saw this as a chance to return to Australia and so I did. I think I was very lucky to be appointed as I didn't know a great deal about schoolteaching.

Q. How does Hale School in 1988 compare with the one you left as a student and also when you started as headmaster?

A. Hale in West Perth only had 300 students and we had no playing fields of our own when I was there. A solitary boarding house existed containing 40 boarders and the school buildings were very small with only one science 'Laboratory'. Despite this the school had great spirit. We only played Australian Rules Football in winter, with cricket, swimming, rowing in summer and athletics in 3rd term. I think that when I came here as headmaster in 1967 I was very fortunate because there were three or four staff who had taught me as a boy and they helped me a lot. I recalled all the things that I had thought were weaknesses of the school as a boy and I tried to strengthen it for boys who had problems like myself. There were many objectives I tried to achieve and I worked to a five year plan which I extended each year.

Q. What have been your proudest moments as headmaster of Hale? What will you probably remember in years to come?

A. I have had so many delights over the last 22 years that I have spent here. I think the introduction of the Wittenoom programme was one of the most exciting projects that I have undertaken. The programme originated from my idea of searching for an educationally valuable adventure camp that allowed the boys to mix with staff. Mr Lang Hancock mentioned to me that he was disappointed with the lack of field work experience that geology graduates he was employing had. He suggested sending Hale year 11 geology students to Wittenoom and I expanded this to a wider usefulness to all year 11s. Wittenoom has been running since 1970, for 19 years. I wish all of one Year could go "bush" for a whole year, but as it is, Wittenoom has been great to all.

Another proud moment was being able to keep the Junior Exam rather than the system adopted by other schools, with the full support of the staff. The Junior provides a solid background to year 11 and 12 studies. I believe it leads to such a large university intake from Hale even though it is a bit soon to be asking students to choose subjects. But at least they do study real subjects, of some intellectual strength, and not the mish-mash offered elsewhere.

Also I am rather proud that hardly any staff member has left Hale to work at another School. Some have gone into business, or moved inter-State, and used Hale as a ladder, but only one or two have moved to another school. Quite a compliment. **Q.** Which subjects do you think should come to the fore in the near future?

A. Undoubtedly Asian languages should be introduced soon, particularly Japanese, as I think we are behind the times already. There will be an increasing use of computers in all subjects and they will be used as a tool like a pen is now. I wish we could offer a lot more, and allow a very wide choice. I feel compulsory subjects should be English Literature and Maths only.

Q. How well prepared is Hale to enter into the 21st century as a private school considering the present education system?

A. I have serious reservations about the present education system Australia suffers. However I think Hale is very strong with a great respect in the community. We have received forward bookings until 2003 and waiting lists until 1998. I think it makes you very humble to think what is expected of you. There is an ever increasing proportion of parents who want to send their children to private schools even though they themselves did not have a private education and some even teach in government schools. People are spending their money on an education and school fees rather than on cars and perhaps boats. It is not hard for private schools to exist with a terrific demand from people wanting to come in. I think we try and make boys into responsible adults, and this is what parents want.

Q. What do you plan to do in your retirement?

A. I haven't many ideas but I have been asked to write a book, about the fourteen exciting years I spent in Singapore for University Press; so I will do that to start with. I've also had some vague ideas of working in a political 'think tank', or a small research centre but I suppose I'll hang around here and watch a few games and perhaps write a bit more.

Q. What ambitions do you have remaining in life?

A. I would like to take up flying again but that is very expensive and my wife would probably stop me. I would like to be the oldest man to sail round the world by himself, but I will have to wait for a few years to do that. I still want to sail up the Swan River and put the Hale Flag on top of the Guildford Chapel, I've planned that for a long time. I would need a few supporters to get away with that . . . one day!

And I'd love to see Hale win the Inters again.

Headmaster's Address Speech Night December 1988

Your Grace, Mr Chairman and other Board members, Distinguished Guest, Ladies and Gentlemen.

This is the 75th anniversary of the University of WA and so it is of particular pleasure to welcome its Vice Chancellor, Professor Robert Smith. It gives Hale the opportunity to recall how 75 years ago Mr Gregg's early predecessor as chairman of the Board of Governors, Mr Hackett, his Grace's, Bishop Riley, and mine, Mr Faulkner, were three of those most involved in the establishment of that university. If Tom Meagher is here tonight, as he should be, his great grandfather, another great Old Haleian George Randall, was another, while Walter James, the Premier who gazetted 9,121 hectares of land for a future university, yet another.

So on this occasion, 130 years after Bishop Hale started his school and 75 years after the University of WA began, Professor Smith, may we both take some satisfaction at progress made, and hope for the sake of the young and curious who crowd our portals, that our successors will serve them well.

They face a daunting challenge. You have your own challenges, Professor Smith, and good luck to you. Here in the secondary field after numerous reports — Beazley and McGaw to name but two — grown men and women have fashioned a fiasco and given their blessing to mediocrity. To qualify for the university, a basic goal of this School, a most complicated exercise is needed. It is open to abuse, and where simplicity and clear objectives should be the aim, and where hard work should be encouraged, we struggle to satisfy conflicting objectives that should never have been brought together.

The Year 11-12 programme was designed to do two things. Keep all students at school; and enable them to qualify for tertiary studies. These two objectives are not compatible. **They should be separated.** Two widely different objectives can never be reached by going along the one road.

To give but one example. You are required to "study" six so called subjects for your secondary graduation; but you qualify for tertiary studies on the average of three. So of two students, one who scored 76, 76, 75; then 50, 45 and could not be bothered to sit the sixth subject, and one who scored 75, 75, 70, 70, 70 and 70; who qualified for Commerce at University of WA? The first. The

hard working conscientious student misses out while the slack student wins the reward.

Many of the "Non TEE subjects" so called that have been introduced in order to keep boys and girls at school are virtually anti-educational, mere child minding devices that we regard with contempt. The unit curriculum is full of them and we take no part in it. But they exercise a dangerous overall effect, of dragging down standards.

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The goal of keeping students longer has been achieved, but more learn a lot less. The goal of preparing them for tertiary studies has not been achieved. Gresham's Law prevails in education as elsewhere. This remains badly in need of review and revision; but rather than by yet another theorist, far better it be by educationalists with experience of the practical problems and dedicated to lifting standards to levels that are worthy of respect, and attainable by all who are prepared to work. This we may never see.

We send more boys to the UWA than any other single Institution. I hope we may continue to be proud of this achievement, but it is difficult to be proud of the mess education in Western Australia has created. With the spectre of a national curriculum creeping over the horizon from Canberra, an even worse scenario is appearing.

This is my 22nd and final Report to you, and you could excuse me perhaps if we surfed through the evening on a wave of nostalgia, but I much prefer to look to the future, while feeling happy that despite all the disappointments and even at times disillusionment that inevitably is part of this position, I have been with a team of staff that has produced, as *The Australian* called us recently, one of the finest schools in Australia; one with scarcely a vacancy this century.

It is a distinctive school with certain characteristics that stand out, united in pursuit of a few clear goals and objectives.

Our vision has been to try and create here a moral society, with boys and staff, working voluntarily for the common good. Inside that moral framework our major goal is to give boys a rich and rewarding collegiate life while preparing them for tertiary studies in particular. Almost alone in Australia we still study subjects in the Middle School as discrete disciplines, we have maintained our examination system, and we expect boys to react responsibly to our demands that they strive for the best in them, in work and in play.

Another word for responsibility is duty, and having this concept willingly accepted, could be seen as an ever continuing basic task of this School. Not teaching Maths, not winning football matches, not even moving on to higher studies, all of which we do well, but producing boys as responsible youths, morally sound and conscious of their social obligations: this is what a school such as Hale is all about, and this is why *duty* is its motto.

It shares that task with you, and indeed if we as Australians are to maintain our pride in our country and its institutions, then it is a national objective as well.

At the school level it is our task above all to produce boys who, (whatever their abilities and disabilities), have made the decision to work and live their lives responsibly. The far goal is one where the moral element of a school is such that a boy becomes so responsible, so close to Christ, that chapel and classroom are one. But to achieve that we need not just to know the School motto but to live it, and not just the boys, but all those involved with them. At Hale there would be 99.9 per cent of boys who very happily have accepted this responsible attitude to work and to life's commitments and who are a credit to all, but I fear the community acceptance is far less. An irresponsible community, or any section of it, gives us graft, corruption and a breakdown still at it worst seen outside Australia, but creepingly obvious here too.

Archbishop Temple, headmaster of a great English public school and then of Canterbury, once said "the spiritual side of human nature, the capacity for friendship and devotion, is best trained by the life of membership in a society. No instruction or religious study can take the place of this. As the personality begins to develop it requires some society of which it may be a member, other than the home on the one side and the State on the other."

We have such a society, a community whose demands are accepted voluntarily and willingly by all who belong. Long may it work its magic.

Shane Cassey, our captain, has reported on the great days we have enjoyed together this year. May I interrupt by saying how very difficult it is to select a School Captain? 120 boys: who is to lead the School? Donald Bradman summed it up. Here is how he described Cassey and all his Hale predecessors. "When considering the stature of an athlete, or for that matter any person, I set great store on certain gualities which I believe to be essential in addition to skill. They are that the person conducts his life with dignity, with integrity, courage and perhaps most of all, with modesty. These virtues are totally compatible with pride, ambition and competitiveness." That's Shane to a T. I speak to you merely as the representative of this society, this School, of whom the most important people are the boys. I applied for this position when a professor of History, because I recalled my own happy days here and — an odd memory on which to base a career decision -I remembered as a prefect supervising the playtime of youngsters in the Junior School, and seeing them safe across the road at the end of the dav.

In all simplicity, as you mothers know, a boy is a beautiful thing, and to hold the hand of a trusting child, as I was privileged to do, is to walk with God. I have never forgotten that I am His servant, and have endeavoured always to live and to act as He would have us, in a most responsible way in all matters affecting your son.

As Tagore said:

I slept, and dreamt That life was joy. I awoke and saw That life was duty. I acted, and behold, Duty was joy.

And so we come to the end of another joyous and crowded year of fulfilment for so many. As the chairman has told you, great achievements were made, in buildings begun, projects initiated, and a much greater awareness of a Hale community created by the establishment of a Hale Founda;tion.

But one of the most exciting developments he has left for me to announce, and that is the establishment of the Dr John Boyd Craig Scholarship. This will — each year — be awarded to the Dux of Year 10 based on the Hale Junior Examination. It will pay his tuition fees for the next two years, years 11 and 12. Its object is to encourage academic excellence; and indeed it is a marvellous scholarship to strive for and win.

I would like to briefly mention each name segment in the Dr John Boyd Craig Scholarship; for each has significance.

"Doctor" because John was the first Craig to attend the University and qualify; "John", Captain of School in 1936; "Boyd", his mother's name, the mother who encouraged this country boy to try his hardest to matriculate and who herself as President of CWA and many other public ventures showed her sons the importance of service; and "Craig", one of Hale's great families, with so far four generations here, including Leslie who lost a leg at Gallipoli, a former chairman who secured this wonderful site and who negotiated with the government for the sale of Havelock Street and our move here.

Now may I thank all who have shared with me this year and the duties I have endeavoured to fulfil? I must thank the boys, in some incredulity, for their tolerance of me, and for all their great efforts. I must thank all the staff, for they are a school's greatest asset, and together we have shaped here a fine heritage, enlarged it to a wider usefulness and served well your sons.

But particularly I must mention the Deputy Headmaster, Mr Alastair Macmillan, Mr Mike Shearer the Director of Studies, and the eight Housemasters, Messrs Greenwell, Hopkins, Biddle, Lange, Colgate, Thomson, Kelly and Gray for their dedicated pastoral care of the 600 boys in their charge.

But none of the 60 odd staff are leaving, all have done a great job, and as they are giving me a farewell dinner on Monday I must thank them all; which I do, most sincerely.

There is one other I would wish to mention, so may I for the first time, publicly acknowledge the debt I owe over all these years to my wife?

I know no other mother who without sons of her own nevertheless through excitement and nervousness for 22 years has gone without dinner on the night of the Inters Swimming; nor do I know of another who has sat with her husband from 12 to 5.30 p.m. on a hard wooden bench at every Inters Athletics, and been as eager in every race as she has been. She has been the fiercest supporter and picked the gutsiest players - of so many Hale Saturday morning games, enjoyed every play in this Hall, remembers so many names; has consoled me in disappointments, tried to comfort me after those wrenching decisions that are forced on headmasters, encouraged me to stand up for what is right and proper and for what I believe in; kept the ideal of responsibility when others on whom I had counted had renegged or rejected it; and as well, no blind admirer, told me when she was sure I was wrong. She has given me a safe and secure home and brought up five loving daughters.


I fell in love with her when she was a 16 year old St Hilda's girl, in Year 11, and I was back from England after the war, discharged from the RAAF, and on holiday at Rottnest. I took her away from her happy home and her many friends, back to a lonely Oxford; and then Singapore, and after 14 exciting years there, here to Hale.

When I was courting her, to use a very old fashioned phrase, there was a popular musical, "South Pacific". Only you oldies will know it, but one of its songs still reminds me how it all began; and although a swan song, such as this last speech, is not intended to be a love song, I hear it still, for it runs "One enchanted evening, you may see your true love across a crowded room; then go to her side and make her your own, or all through your life you may dream all alone."

It was one enchanted evening, I did go to her side, and we have been together ever since.

It has been a wonderful life for me here at Hale, thanks to your sons who have kept me young and filled me with warmth — I hope I hold still the trusting hand of a child — and I leave you with many regrets, oh so many regrets of dreams not realised and hopes not achieved; but I go too so very happy that I will share my life with the woman who above all has made that life and whose contribution to the Hale of today, so little known, I here acknowledge.

Thank you, Goodbye.



1988 Valedictory Speech

Amost five years ago, most of you before me made your first, somewhat reluctant appearance at Hale School. After struggling through year eight, under the domineering eye of the 5th years, we all wondered if we would ever make it to where we are today.

The prefects and remaining 5th years are also to be congratulated for their conduct during the year. The T.E.E. is only just ahead, as our teachers constantly remind us, and I wish all the members of my year well for their exams, what little good it does them, and hopefully the results they desire will be received.

As the less pleasant memories of 5 years of cross country and athletics fade, we will find that we will remember Hale for its happier times and the friends we made. I hope that contact can be maintained, both with Hale and our peers in future times.

We will leave here tomorrow, to move on; and the initial joy that we feel will no doubt be tinged with a little sadness as we reflect on the truly happy times that we have had here.






According to the tradition that had been set, Hale met Scotch at Scotch on the second Saturday of the term. The times swum were relatively slow, due to a lack of training, although the competition was fierce. Hale emerged slightly on top after this event.

The team trained extremely hard over the next few weeks. During this time, Hale held a social meet with St Hilda's. This proved to be a very enjoyable evening, although the times were comparatively slow. The team next went to the beach for the "Trigg Iron Man Classic". This was held to give the swimmers a well earned break from hard training and to lift the spirit of the team. Paris Watt eventually won the event. A biathlon was also scheduled, which included a running and a swimming leg. The team even went to Beatty Park one morning to get used to the blocks and the atmosphere.

With one week to go until the Inters, the school championships took place in freezing conditions. This proved to have a telling effect on the times where no records were broken and only a few Hantke medals were awarded. On the same weekend the Quads were held, and Christchurch thrashed the other three teams. From that point, Hale knew they would have to perform extremely well to defeat Christchurch.

For the first time, the P.S.A. carnival was held on a Friday night. After being spurred on by "Rocky IV", the team met at Beatty Park. There was a tremendous atmosphere, and conditions for swimming were perfect. At the conclusion of the freestyle events Hale was in front, with some excellent swims for B. Hitchcock, C. Ryan, H. Tooste and J. Morphett who each won their freestyle events. However, Christchurch took over the lead during the breaststroke races and stayed in that position for the duration of the competition. The fight for second place then began in earnest. Even though Hale did not win a relay, the swimmers came in second or third in nearly every one. At the end of the night, Christchurch won by over 200 points. They were followed by Hale, Scotch and Aquinas (equal third), Wesley, Guildford and Trinity.

There was no P.S.A. records broken by any Hale swimmers, although some outstanding performances were registered. In the open 100 metres freestyle, Craig Ryan broke the school record in 55.9 seconds. He also swam the fastest 50 metres of any Hale student in the freestyle relay, clocking 24.3 seconds. Two school records were set in the U13 by Jason Morphett — he

A week later Hale competed in the statewide Pop Agnew Cup, In the 6 x 50 metre freestyle relay the team comprised C. Ryan, B. Hitchcock, R. Lucas, M. Knight, P. Watt, and H. Moffat and came a creditable third behind Christchurch and Scotch. This result may have been improved if the team had the services of one of our strong swimmers. The night turned out to be very successful for the Hale team and was enjoyed by everyone.

Inter-House Swimming Carnival

The annual Inter-House Swimming Carnival was held at the Hale swimming pool in superb conditions. Last year's victors, Haynes, once again proved their superiority over the rest of the field. They won four of the five trophies, including the G. N. Altorfer Cup, for overall points. Thanks must go to all officials, and to Mr Lange and his team. Congratulations are also due to the Haynes House year twelves, who went through unbeaten in every race (except the backstroke relay, which was lost this year) for five years straight. It was a great day enjoyed by all.



Basketball Report

This year saw Hale's finest season with the 1st V and both Year 8 teams finishing undefeated and the second, third and Year 10 V's each losing only one game. An indication of the success of Hale on the basketball court this year is that we managed to win 36 games out of the 44 played. The 1st V consisted of Varis Klimaitis (Capt.) Mathew Farr (V.Capt.), Basil Zempilis, Philip Haynes, Graeme Mussell, Clive Pickford, Lincoln Dye and Eliot Bruton.

Hale went through the first two fixtures against Christchurch and Trinity without losing a game, although the 2nd V gave their spectators some tense moments in their exciting 42-40 comeback win over Christchurch. Special note must be made of the 1st V's victory over a much weaker Trinity side, where they set a new PSA record of 147 points, breaking Hale's previous record of 107. This game was indicative of the 1st V's fast paced, fast break style of basketball.

The next week saw Hale play Guildford. The 1st V had their closest game of the season, winning by 35 points over the team which eventually finished second and highlighting Hale's dominance in the competition. This round also saw the Year 10 team lose its only game, however the game was played on the Hale outdoor courts in 40°C heat, making for difficult conditions.

In the 4th round Hale played Aquinas and once again all teams won. Here the 1st V won a physical game, achieving an impressive score of 87 on the outdoor Hale courts.

Hale's next opponent was Scotch, and this game saw a lack-lustre performance from the 1st V, with the team scoring its lowest total throughout the season. Interestingly this score of 67 points is equivalent to the 1987 1st V's highest score. When you consider, that this Hale side differed by only 2 players from last years, the vast improvement can be appreciated. One bright spot from this game was in Elliott Bruton breaking Marc Marinko's record of 106 points for a season. Elliott finished the season with 115 points, compiled in only 5 games — an impressive effort. This fixture against Scotch ended the 2nd V's undefeated run.

The 3rd V lost its only game in the last round of the season to Wesley. The 1st V meanwhile, secured the Blackwood Cup for the 6th consecutive year with a strong 40 point win over a physical Wesley team. At the conclusion of this game Elliott Bruton, Mathew Farr and Varis Klimaitis had all scored over 100 points. Only two players had previously achieved this feat.

The players would like to thank all coaches and spectators for their help and support in making this season the success that it was. With regards to future seasons, the proposed gymnasium is a much needed facility with only the current Blackwood Cup holders still playing outdoors. With the success of Middle School teams the future of Hale basketball looks to be in good hands.





Cricket

Christchurch.

Rowing Report

The 1988 rowing season commenced a week before the start of term with a rowing camp held from our boat shed in Matilda Bay. This was well attended by rowers from years ten to twelve. During the camp the 1st VIII was coached for two of its first six training sessions by Alan Morrow, a Canadian National rowing coach touring Western Australia helping both coaches and rowers from all levels. His advice was appreciated by both the rowers and coach Mr Bean.

Through the season crews trained some thirty to fifty times in the short period of nine weeks. Training was at 5.30am or 4.00pm and was a little under two hours long. This season the cancellation of the Trinity Regatta, a result of poor weather conditions, and the failure of Scotch and Guildford to hold regattas led to only four regattas in which to gain experience before the Head of the River. Last year there were seven lead up regattas.

The school season came to a close on March 26 when the Head of the River was held on the Narrows in moderate conditions. No Hale crew was outstanding with perhaps the best performance coming from the 2nd IV who gained a third place in a time faster than the existing record. The positions, however, do not indicate the dedication shown by the rowers and coaches.

The overall placings for the day in the C.A. Hamer Cup saw Aquinas win it with 991/2 points and Hale sixth with 50 points.

RESULTS 1st VIII

The 1st VIII were an unlucky fourth in the Christ Church Regatta over the long and winding 5km course down the Canning River. The crew had only been rowing for little over one minute when a yacht sailed into the boat costing a valuable 30 seconds and damaging the shell. The boats were seperated, but the lost time could never be made up in such a closely contented race. At the Aquinas Regatta Christ Church won the 2000m race in 6 min. 37 sec., Scotch were a close second with Hale charging through the field in the last 750m overtaking Guildford and Aquinas to come third just a canvas behind Scotch.

The Wesley Regatta saw Hale overtake Christ Church and Wesley at the 850m and lead the field to the 1450m mark where Christ Church surged through to win in a time of 6 min. 33 sec. Aquinas were second with Hale just behind them in third place.

After an excellent morning tea, thanks to all the mothers involved, Hale found themselves left behind in the last lead up regatta of the season, the Hale Regatta. A strong Aquinas crew powered out from the field and won on the glassy water in the time of 6 min. 17 sec. with Scotch second, Christ Church third, Guildford fourth, Hale fifth and Wesley sixth.

The 89th Head of the River was won by Guildford in a time of 6 min. 18.4 secs. Scotch who had been fighting for the lead through the race were a close second with Aquinas further back in third place. Christ Church just beat Hale for fourth place with their two crews leading early on but being out classed by the crews in the middle lanes in the latter stages of the race. Wesley and Trinity finished further back in sixth and seventh places respectively.





Hong Kong Trip

This year saw Hale send 21 boys, three masters and two fathers to Hong Kong from April 17-25 to compete in the 10th annual Hong Kong Rowing Championships. The regatta attracted crews from all over Asia and several from Europe.

The 1st VIII settled down and rowed a steady race to come second in the International Schools Classic Eights race to a larger and stronger crew from Sydney Church of England Grammar who also won the Open Eights final. Caulfield Grammar were third with Hong Kong Island School in fourth place. The Sri Lankan crew withdrew at the last moment leaving only a field of four to compete for the title.

Hale also had three fours entered into the large field of some 12 crews. All three crews made it to the semifinals with only two crews qualifying for the four crew final. The fours found the 2000m races difficult and were beaten by larger crews from Sydney C.E.G.S. and Hong Kong Island School to be placed third and fourth.

The rowing course, 25km north of central Kowloon in the New Territories was on the polluted Shing Mun River. Once the rowers had become accustomed to its green colour, revolting smell and variety of floating and submerged objects the rowing was enjoyed by all. 

Hale lost to Aquinas 0-8







Two teams were entered in the Squash Rackets Association's inter-school competition. The No. 1 U/16 side of M. McCormick, M. Bredmeyer, J. Field, M. Casey and J. Howieson were successful — winning the division one section, defeating Christchurch 6-0 in the grand final.

The U/18 side, who lost their grand final to Guildford last year, were determined to go one better this year. 





The year eight competition was again held this year and a great deal of talent was revealed. The eventual winner was A. Kiddey from Haynes House.



Drama Report

"THE BISHOP'S SCHOOL"

Having now participated in four school plays, it always amazes me the way 50 pages of white paper come alive. A few months before the final performance, interested students attend a meeting in the music centre where they are handed the script and told to read it before auditions.

This year's play was titled "The Bishop's School, a History of Hale School 1858-1872". It was written as a tribute to Dr Tregonning in his final year and was an accurate and entertaining version of the first years of Hale School under Bishop Hale. It included the real worries of the time, list of the original students, a representation of each headmaster and of course the Bishop himself. The main theme was the "Triumph and Disaster" of the early years of the school.

All was not serious however. Mr Hopkins generously allowed himself some poetic licence to write into the plot a dash of humour. Thus was born the Perth Academy and Boarding School (though it may be noticed that the Academy's colours were the same as another noted private Perth school!). The members of the Academy were the traditional bad guys, although they did not trouble Hale (as this would have compromised the plot's accuracy).

This year we were fortunate in having experienced comedy actors on the cast. Stephen Darragh played the headmaster of the Academy (an ex draper!) hilariously, and gained drama colours for this performance as well as two previous comedy roles. He was accompanied by two other experienced performers — Rawden Pettitt as a slow witted draper's apprentice, and Matthew Warp.

On the more serious side of things we were again fortunate in having some experienced and talented actors. The most notable being Bazil Zempilas. This year he took up the main role of Bishop Hale, he gave a marvellous performance that earned him colours as well as the "Cartland Couture" award for Best Actor.

Other awards were given to two long-serving members of the Hale dramatic society. Michael Jorgenson had participated in four previous school plays and this year hammed it up in his role as Rooster Roach a housemaster at Hale. He was awarded colours as well as Sam McDonagh, who has now been a part of four consecutive school plays as a committeeman, bookmaker and member of the board. This year he finished his participation with a characterisation of Reverend Lynch the first headmaster of Hale School.

These parts did not constitute the whole play however. Small parts with one or even no lines were all taken seriously. Indeed the most spectacular parts of the play were when all these enthusiastic actors were on the stage together as in the songs "Dip in the Swan", "When You Go in You're in Till You're out" and the final "Duty".

If I have given the impression that acting is all there is to a School Play, nothing could be further from the truth. In the band 6 members gained colours — Simon Lowe for 2 years in the band and a year on stage, Alister Lilleyman for 5 years on the Clarinet, Robert Maitland for 4 years on the clarinet, Xavier Dhalluin for 3 years on the baritone horn, Paul Kelly for 4 on the trombone and John Viner also on the trombone.

Stage management was also an important factor and was executed with skill and speed. Colours were awarded to Wayne Burnett the student stage manager, and thanks must go to him and his team for the construction of the set as well as scene changes during the performances.

All this work would have been nothing without teacher guidance, however. This year Graham Lange organised the stage and set, as he has for two years. Mr Bill Van Oijen organised lighting and sound, assisted by C. Shortill, he organised the incredibly complicated sequences of microphone sound levels, light changes and special effects. Not only this but he managed to set up a television behind the stage so cast members could see what was going on.

Music was another major part of the event, and two people were involved in the development of this. Jeff Carroll composed and arranged the songs and incidental music. He also organised the singing of these songs which resulted in him giving up his time to coach during lunchtime sessions sometimes involving nearly the whole cast. The next person of note was Bernard Harvey who guided the band through the playing of all music with considerable panache and excellent results. Thanks must also be given to Heather Callendar who organised choreography in all the major chorus songs.

Finally but by no means the least important was Jeff Hopkins. His dedication to the play, enthusiasm, criticism and advice were very important. He conceived, wrote and directed the whole play, wrote the lyrics for the songs and is indisputably the driving force behind the Hale dramatic society.

Going to sleep seemed an impossible challenge, with the boat pitching from side to side. People were falling out of the $2\frac{1}{2}$ foot wide $5\frac{1}{2}$ foot long bunks.

On the fifth night we anchored outside the harbour at Geraldton. That was when we saw the first whale, about 20 metres off the bow. The next morning twenty people manned the yards as we motored into the harbour, and docked while being escorted by five dolphins. We all had two free hours, to do as we pleased in Geraldton. While we sent the women off with twenty loads of washing, the rest of us went straight to Hungry Jacks!

When we arrived back at the boat we each had about two bags of food and drink. At noon the public came on board to inspect the boat. We explained everything to the best of our knowledge and tried to look important. When most of the tickets were sold we went out for a cruise.

It took us two days to get back to Perth. In the gales we had to sail a delicate course through the

reefs which took some tight sailing. When we were through, the trainee who had the helm was shown the course he had steered. He almost fainted!



Rottnest Reafforestation '88

For the sixth time a group from Hale went to Rottnest to aid in reafforestation and sand dune erosion control. This year reafforestation began with the planting of seedlings during third and fourth term at the school. About 2,000 trees were successfully raised and more trees may have survived if the builders had not managed to turn off the water supply during the Easter holidays. These trees were then planted into pots during lunch-times by the rostered group. Only indigenous species were planted such as Acacia Rostillifera or Rottnest Ti-Tree.

On the Friday before we left, most of the group members were involved in preparing for the trip. One group packed the trees onto Mr John Barrymore's boat while another group went and arranged the supplies for the camp. The following day the trees and half the group went across to Rottnest in the morning with Mr Barrymore, which was a thoroughly enjoyable trip and greatly appreciated. The rest of the group played in sporting teams and then went to Rottnest by aeroplane with a thankful Mr Welsh, as he has an unequalled ability to become sea sick. The group who flew over arrived to find the first group had already been fixing fences for Mr Barrymore and unloading the trees.

Following afternoon tea we were introduced to our first activity which was brushing some sand dunes near Salmon Bay. Half the group was involved in cleaning up barbed wire and corrugated iron left by the army while the other half of the group collected brush which had been cut by the Rottnest Island Board. The journey by truck to collect brush proved to be slow since Mr Eyres had much difficulty in getting the truck into second gear, so we drove all the way in first until Mr Eyres discovered how to operate the gearstick.

Brushing took us several days, and once this was completed we proceeded to our next job of cleaning up after the summer holiday's vacationers. The 1987 group had built some fences at Pinkies Bay but vandals had torn these down and used them for fire wood. This was frustrating work, and it is due to the native quokka and thoughtless vandals that much conservationist work is difficult to conclude. When this clean up job was finished the party divided into two groups. One undertook more dune conservation work while the other group went and built quokka and tourist proof fences. That evening we stopped work early so that Mr Eyres could go fishing. Mr Eyres caught several small herring while Ben Hewitt told every one how to catch fish (although he caught none himself). 

For some, the next morning was the first day of school. The schools in France contain more students than Hale in a tiny fraction of the area, with no grass and a tiny paved courtyard.

The building was a maze of stairs and corridors — whenever we told the French students how big Hale was (and the number of sports fields) they always gasped with envy. They are also worse off in another way — school lessons run from 8 a.m. to 5 or 6 in the evening!

Apart from school and families, a big part of our stay in Angers was spent visiting various sites of interest nearby. We first visited the Chateau d'Angers (or Castle of Angers) where we encountered our first incomprehensible guide. There are two types of guide in France, the one who speaks at 100 kph about something really interesting and the slow one who talks about really boring things.

In the following week and a half we visited Cointreau (famous liqueur makers), Saumur (a very impressive castle on a hill overlooking the Loire river) as well as other chateaux. We wine tasted at Langlois-Chateau, after touring the storage caves, discovered French culture at a mushroom farm, saw an underground Troglodyte village, visited a tank museum and were shown around La Petite Marquise Chocolaterie — a chocolate factory in the town of Angers.

The ten days were soon over, and it was time to go to our new families in La Rochelle, with perhaps even stranger eating habits. We were now getting used to the French language — our comprehension was improving and we were picking up the useful day-to-day language not taught in class. School in La Rochelle was bigger, and better organised than Angers. We went to more French classes which was better for learning. After ten days here we said goodbye to our hosts and set off on the train to Paris. Our 3 days there at the conclusion of the trip were enjoyed by everyone. Using the metro to get from place to place we still found ourselves walking many kilometres. It was often hard to keep up with the athletic 'sportif' Monsieur Wapnah. At a phenomenal speed we toured all the famous sights and parts of Paris — the Seine River, Notre Dame, Sacre Coeur, the Latin Quarter, Montmartre, Le Louvre, Champs Elysees, la Place de la Concorde, la Tour Eiffel, La Jardin des Tuileries, la Place d' Opera and of course Versailles.

After 4 days at Expo we were exhausted and it was great to spend some time on Stradbroke Island relaxing on the beach and swimming in the fresh water lakes.


From Stradbroke Island we also visited Dreamworld where we had a lot of fun on the Thunderbolt roller coaster and the water slides.

OBITUARY Jeff Brandenburg (1968-1988)

Jeff Brandenburg was vice-captain of Wilson House and it was here that I was associated with him, if in a small way. To me, as an eager Year 8 in 1985, Jeff was an impressive figure. He led by example, with his outstanding sporting ability being admired by many. Jeff achieved a great deal during his five years (1981-1985) at Hale. He captained both the 1st XI cricket and the 1st XVIII football teams, a privilege which places him in an elite group of Haleans to achieve this double. He was awarded colours for cricket and honours for football together with places in the swimming and athletics teams.

His sporting career was continued with several football and cricket clubs both in Perth and country areas near his Lake King home. Ironically, Jeff was driving home after being presented with a 'Fairest and Best' award for football when a tragic accident claimed his life. This award typifies the way Jeff played his sport.

Jeff had a thoughtful nature which found expression through writing poetry. This talent was appreciated by many of his school mates, who sent verses written by Jeff to the girls they admired. More significantly, his poetry reveals Jeff's sensitive and caring qualities, which made him all the more rare as an individual.

During his time spent at Hale, Jeff made many friends as was seen by the response to his death in newspapers, and he was a popular figure in society. Jeff made a real mark on Hale and on all those, like myself, around him. I saw him as a person to really look up to and respect. A lot of people will miss Jeff. He was a real contributor and leader of people.

Old Haleians' Association President's Report

You will recall that last year the retiring president of the Old Haleian Association, Bob Glover, in his speech to you mentioned the importance of tradition.

This year I wish to again emphasise this, and also another aspect, esprit de corps.

It is 40 years since I left Hale and I can still clearly recall my old English teacher Mr Marshall saying, "If you are going to use a word, know what it means and be prepared to define it". So here is the definition of "tradition": "An opinion or custom handed down from one generation to another." Tradition does not happen, it is built up over many years and to be effective must remain constantly believed in. It is not repetition for repetition's sake.

A lot of my background is in the army and here tradition plays a big part in the moulding together of a unit as a team. The team works towards a common goal and each member takes his place.

Hale, although not regimented to the degree an army unit is, has nevertheless built up a tradition of leadership and service which is second to none. The students at the school today carry on this tradition and in an age when solid values seem to be eroded at every turn, you must be very mindful of the past and maintain the high values traditionally set by Hale. Esprit de corps, again bearing in mind Mr Marshall's exhortation, is defined by Webster's Dictionary as "the regard for the honour and interests of a body by those who belong to it."

In broad terms I suppose you could say 'school spirit'. If you do not care about the school you have no school spirit. However, if you do care about the school you will be concerned for it as a whole, you will see it as an entity and you will strive to be part of the team. A team, like a chain is only as good as its weakest link so your attitude should be to encourage and help one another so that there are no weak links. It is no use turning against those who may be weaker than yourself if they can't perform to your level — assist them, encourage them and work together.

Now, I have set these two things before you. Will you be able in forty years time to look back and say that, yes we have maintained the high tradition and excellent school spirit of our forbears.

You may well forget a lot of what has been said today, but be assured that these two things, tradition and esprit de corps, have been handed to you to hold high and work towards. For if you do not, then you have thrown away a priceless heritage.





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
