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Editorial

1989. What a year it has been.

For Australia it was again year one, the first year after the highly publicised and much celebrated bicentenary, the beginning of yet another century of Australian culture and economic development.

3500 km westward from the diplomatic centre of our nation, on the peak of Hale Road, lies Hale School, overlooking the ocean to the west and the city of Perth to the east. The year is 1989, but for many who have only recently become involved with our school, it would seem to be year 0001.

As everyone around Perth knows, 1988 saw the retirement of Dr Tregonning, the end of another great chapter in the history of Hale School. Coming back after the summer holidays early this year we were met by Mr Inverarity, the newly appointed headmaster, who had recently returned from England. With him comes a new decade, and hopefully his stint at Hale will continue well into the next century.

Mr Inverarity's influence is keenly felt by all boys, and everyone appreciates his genuine interest in everything and everyone as he moves around the school grounds, here giving a short cricket lesson, there encouraging good sportmanship. Mr Inverarity's great reputation in sport may have led some individuals to think that whilst Hale's sporting activities would flourish, the academic aspect may suffer. However, the Headmaster has shown that his qualities in the classroom well equal those on the sporting field.

Hale School is renowned for its sporting and academic achievements and in recent years it has continued to excel in both areas with the change of helmsman this has not changed in the least. In fact, Mr Inverarity has provided an important link between sport and academic education and encourages comradeship and fair play in all areas, an aspect which is of great importance and remains one of the aims of this institution.

With the new headmaster came a new outdoor adventure programme. To maintain this activity for all Year 11 students after the decision had been made by the Board of Governors not

to return to Wittenoom a new area in the peninsula of Exmouth was selected. Here, all 1989 Year 11 boys were treated to the inaugural North West Cape Programme, a fantastic 12-day stint in Learmonth. During these two weeks a variety of outdoor activities were run. From bush walking, camping, canoeing to abseiling and caving, this camp, expertly organised by "Adventure Out", enabled the participants to experience life to its fullest in the northern landscape.

Right from the word go, during the 1500 km bus trip up to Learmonth, students and teachers of differing backgrounds were mixed together and had to 'stick together' for the remainder of the camp in a region unfamiliar to everyone. This resulted in not only new friends being made among peers, but also boys and teachers being brought face to face with each other in an environment new and strange to both. The outcome of this confrontation is a 'special' friendship where each has learned to value the other as an individual. Whether it resulted from the combined navigational efforts during the outings or the relaxed evenings around the camp fire, the comradeship and spirit amongst all was tremendous. Happily this spirit has continued and I hope will remain with us all for the rest of our time at Hale.

Mr Inverarity, in his first year at the reins of such a renowned school as Hale, has started off in the manner in which Doc Tregonning finished — with sheer determination to succeed in his efforts to secure Hale School's position as premier school and with a genuine interest in the school and the welfare of its students. Today's society is a society where problems being solved with money and evasiveness are often the norm. However, Mr Inverarity has shown the commitment which he so often presented on the cricket pitch and the commitment which is required to keep up the standard of all-round performances, tolerance towards others, fair play and pursuit of academic worth. Commitment to curricular and cocurricular life flourishes at Hale.

As cricket followers used to chant during the late 70's, "let's go, in'forever'rarity". May Hale continue to prosper under your leadership.

School Captain's Report

The end of the 1989 school year is drawing closer. Within another hour the year twelves of Hale as well as some others will be saying their last goodbyes to a fine institution. Tonight is the end of the first part of our education. It is now our responsibility to make full use of the opportunities so far given to us at this school. From a personal view, my time spent at Hale has been one of the most rewarding periods of my life. The knowledge and experience as well as the many valued friendships which have been made will be treasured by us all for ever.

This year saw the changing of the guard at Hale school, that being a change in Headmasters. After a distinguished 22 years at the helm of Hale, Doctor Tregonning gracefully retired at the end of 1988 bringing to a close an era in Hale's history. Immediately, our newly appointed Headmaster, Mr John Inverarity took the reins and set about establishing himself in the Hale community. His ability to communicate with people both young and old amongst many other attributes has helped him make a wonderful debut. So far Mr Inverarity you have 'batted' superbly and set the foundations for what I have no doubt in saying, will be a very successful innings.

Hale is an educational institution but our efforts are not limited to academic pursuits. Through various sports, students and staff alike are able to combine their talents.

The 1st V Basketball team led by Clive Pickford showed a great deal of determination to go through the season undefeated. The facilities of the new gymnasium meant that the teams skills could be used to their full potential. Congratulations on bringing home Hale's sixth successive Blackwood Cup. Special mention must be made of Elliott Bruton who was awarded honours for three years of dedicated service and brilliant play in the Hale 1st V, a fine achievement.

The 1st XI Cricketers led by Mark Foster had a somewhat mixed season. They finished in second position behind Wesley. Four batsmen scored in excess of 200 runs each. Mark Foster, Adam Mallabone, Paul Major and Jason Norrish. Norrish scored 376 runs at an average of 125 for Darlot. The last person to perform this well at Hale was Geoff Marsh the current Australian Cricketer.

The 1st VIII Tennis team had a relatively good year to finish equal second. The side showed great determination and won 4 out of 6 matches. Jason Marinko led the team as both captain and top seed.

The Rowers performed well and in the lead up regattas they showed a lot of promise for the final race, the Head of the River. Captained and stroked by Michael Roe they rowed well to finish third, just a bow ball behind Scotch.

Staying on water sports the swimming team, captained by Stuart Blackwell performed well at the Inters to be placed 3rd. They trained with a lot of enthusiasm and this showed through in all of the other meets and especially in the fiercely contested school championships. With some top swimmers in the younger age groups Hale swimming looks promising for future years.

The Hale 1st XVIII captained by Dale Warren had a very hard fought and eventually successful season. Considering that in year 8 this side only won one game this success was remarkable and only brought about by sheer hard work and dedication. We managed to share the Alcock Cup with Aquinas and Scotch in a unique three way tie.

With the new Baspo Grasse Hockey field the Hale 1st XI started the season with a great deal of enthusiasm. Led by Stuart Blackwell the team fought hard and came 5th in their competition. With this new facility the skill level at all age groups is destined to improve considerably.

Rugby at Hale has suffered in recent times due to a lack of numbers but all teams put up spirited performances especially the 1st XV led by Andrew Jones.

The big improvers in the past few years have been the Cross Country side. This year saw many gallant runs by the team and they were eventually placed second by one point to Christ Church. With many of the top runners being in the younger years I think that Hale can look forward to winning their first ever Cross Country Cup in the near future.

Soccer, since its inception as an official P.S.A. sport in 1987 has quietly grown in stature at Hale. This year saw our team transfered from 2nd division into 1st division after some fine performances in the first few rounds. Although the initial change was difficult the team got better and better and hopefully the team will go from strength to strength in the future years.

Although Squash isn't an official P.S.A. sport Hale does enter teams into the state school competition and we have always been strong. This year was no exception with both the U/16 and U/18 sides reaching the grand finals. The younger

side lost their final but the senior team narrowly beat Christ Church to win the state title. Having the facilities of the 4 new squash courts has certainly led to improved standards at school.

This year it was decided by the P.S.A. to hold the Interschool Athletics in third term. With this in mind training was intense with meets being organised for each Saturday leading up to the big event. All these competitions assured that an enjoyable athletics season was had by all. Many Stow Awards were achieved and some records were broken. At Perry Lakes Hale finished 4th. The team was well led by the open age group with the highlight of the day being the win of the relay team, which included the captains of athletics Jason Norrish and Paul Leuba as well as Dale. Warren and David Booth. The team must be commended for its endeavour and commitment in such a short season.

Although the top school teams get most of the attention it is in the house sport competition where the true spirit of sport at Hale comes out. Every Wednesday afternoon boys of all age groups compete in a wide variety of sport from T.Ball to Volleyball. Due to intense house rivalry a healthy competitive spirit is never lacking. This year Parry House was a dominating force, not only winning the football and athletics but also they took the Cock House Cup.

There are many extra curricula activities which the boys at Hale are able to be involved in. These include such past times as drama, debating and chess.

This years school play, "Fleance — A Classic Coincidence", was yet another play written and produced by Mr Jeff Hopkins and (as is now expected from drama at Hale) was one full of both class and professional performances. Rehearsals were conducted with enthusiasm especially when we had to compete with a stray cat thrown up from the band pit. With all age groups involved, the play draws together a wide cross section of the Hale family.

Another indoor activity undertaken at Hale is that of chess. With the likes of Jason Field (an Australian representative) and Frank Tenji leading the Hale Chess sides they had a successful year. Their stature showed through in first term when they won the state Allegro title.

Debating, certainly an asset in later life, is always well supported at Hale. With a large participation from all years it is very competitive. Two teams reached grand finals and many others performed well.

Adam Pinto's superb skill on the piano resulted

in his winning the Garland Music Prize for the second successive year. Another Hale achiever was Andrew Benness who gained 1st Prize in the I.B.M. competition for mathematics. Well done!

As usual Hale had boys involved with several charities, collecting for the Red Cross and The Salvation Army and this year saw the inception of the mobile Red Cross Blood Clinic coming to the school. All these activities are important as it involves boys in the wider community.

This year saw the year 11 outdoor program move to Exmouth. Here boys were involved in many different activities ranging from abseiling to caving. From the reports that I have heard this looks like becoming a very successful venture for Hale.

The social event of the year, the Prefects' Ball, was held on the 19th August and was a great success. There is a lot of organisation that goes into a night like this and there are numerous people who need to be thanked. Without the tireless efforts of Steve Varty and his kitchen staff, Mrs Hawkins and the rest of the Prefects' mothers and fathers and Mac, the night would not have gone ahead, I thank them all.

In passing I would like to make a comment on the boarding situation at Hale. I have been a boarder for five years and I have seen a marked improvement not only in the facilities but also in the cohesion between the boys of different ages. No longer is there a large gap in communication between such age groups as year 8 with year 12. The atmosphere created in boarding is a very inviting one, and hopefully with this in mind numbers will gradually grow to full capacity.

With the last paragraph I bring to a close my summary of the major events this year. A year at Hale for a young Halean is one full of activities and enjoyment and there is a long list of people that need to be thanked for their efforts in creating this enjoyment. At the risk of omitting someone, people such as the teachers, the office staff and the groundsmen must be commended and thanked for their involvement with the school in 1989.

Thanks to all the staff especially Mr Shearer (Director of Studies) whose tireless efforts in organising the school's curricula is ever so important. Also to Mr MacMillan, (Mac), as he is commonly known, not only for his job as Deputy but also as coach of 1st XVIII. Last but not least is Mr Inverarity our new Headmaster, he has settled in well and we thank you for your expertise and wisdom and the best of luck in the future.

Not only are the senior boys leaving but two

staff members also. Mr Kelley is leaving us to teach in England and Mr Welsh for Tasmania. We wish them luck in greener pastures.

With these thank yous in mind I will bring to a close my resume of Hale's academic year of 1989. I feel, knowing the young men that will be attending the school in 1990, that next year will be just as fulfilling. So farewell and thank you Hale School for everything and I wish you the best of luck for the many years to come.

There are sure to be many budding Doctors, Lawyers, Engineers, Plumbers or Farmers here today. Saying goodbye to this truly fine institution may be easy for some but difficult for many others. The security and good times it has provided will be missed in years to come. The friendships made during our years together at Hale should be maintained as should contact with the school. The memories will remain in our own minds even if in five years time, few at Hale will remember who any of us were or what we did.

I'm looking forward to my first Old Boys Day so I'm going to use the French "Au Revoir" which means goodbye till we meet again. But then perhaps the Australian expression is even more appropriate: "Thanks and I'll see you all later".

Headmaster's Report, Hale School, 1989.

Your Grace, Chairman, Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen. It is with pleasure and a profound sense of being part of a long and great tradition that I deliver my first Headmaster's Annual Report of Hale School

in its 132nd year.

I wish to begin by saying how pleased and privileged I feel to have joined this fine School in this capacity. I have found the School to be in excellent heart and wish to record my recognition and deepest appreciation of the outstanding efforts and achievements of my predecessor, Dr Tregonning. Further, I wish to express my sincere thanks to the entire Hale community, the Chairman and his Board, the Staff, both teaching and non teaching, the parents, the Old Boys and the boys for the welcome and friendliness that has been extended to me and to my family.

In this very exciting and rapidly changing world where all too little remains stable, schools are being expected more and more to be cores of consistency and centres of support and community. Independent schools such as Hale are well able to meet these challenges for it is essentially along the lines of what they have been doing for scores of years and doing very well. The sense of identity, of belonging, of there being a set of values and a developed presence of the spiritual have always been prominent in the independent school ethos but one can now detect a heightened search and demand for these things.

We are becoming ever more aware of the swelling of support for the proposed new Roman Catholic University in Fremantle; Notre Dame, Australia. It is all about scholarship within a moral, a well defined set of values framework; a Christian framework. It will teach the law and

business and it will link it to ethics.

What we teach is of crucial importance, not only the facts, the content, but more especially the thinking skills and the intellectual development that takes place with the grappling with this content. It is, however, the attitudes that are acquired and the all round personal growth that takes place that is of the greatest importance. It is the context within which the School's prime function of teaching the content

of academic subjects takes place that provides us with our most demanding challenge.

Treat students firmly and fairly, with justice and respect, and, with time, they will learn all about justice and respect. Treat them with love and care within a set of values and a lively spiritual environment and they will be inclined to learn to love and operate with good judgement and well based integrity. There is an obligation for our schools to justify their ethos and nature by their products. If we make claims to "educate the whole person" then our boys must rise above cleverness to wisdom, above good nature to courtesy, above athleticism to sportsmanship, must go beyond ockerism to sensibility and beyond a code of manliness to a set of values. a balance and depth of understanding arrived at through genuine spiritual and moral activity and

Today we are witnessing a disenchantment with the shallowness, the rootlessness, of many of the attitudes and associations people have. There is a searching for something more substantial and independent schools are well placed to respond and we need to respond to

this exciting challenge.

Mr Richard Pengelley is to become the Chaplain of Hale School next year. He is a fine Christian man who has a natural rapport with the boys and with his energy and commitment we look forward to him doing profound and exciting work in his new role. We offer him our

prayers and every support.

There are great challenges in curriculum development, too. Hale is strongly committed to the benefits of a true liberal education whilst fully appreciating that students, with their wide range of abilities, have differing needs. The Australian economy is in a great deal of trouble at the moment and changed attitudes and skills are desperately needed. Too few of our most able young people are going into science, engineering and technology and we give insufficient recognition to the fact that our economic future lies very much with the brain economy; with research, innovation and development.

The great challenge for our schools is to develop the minds of our students within a context that will well serve the needs of Australia. There is much to be argued for the careful integration of the elements of a traditional liberal education with the initiative developing aspects of invention and design in a setting of high technology. In the 1990s our students need to be stretched in the principal disciplines of English Literature, Mathematics, Science and

History and be exposed to and fascinated by the process of conceptualizing, planning, designing, constructing, making operational and evaluating within a high technology setting. It would be exciting if Hale School could take a lead here and give the chance to all of its boys to be fascinated by and drawn to the challenging world of design, engineering and manufacturing. Our great hope is to have a major Craft, Design and Technology facility within a couple of years and take a lead in education in Australia in this way. A great deal of expertise and financial support will be required for this.

A school's most precious asset is its teaching staff and in this respect Hale School is richly blessed. I am grateful, indeed, for the tremendous efforts of the staff and the great support they have given me as I have searched to come to know Hale School. I thank them all; The Deputy Headmaster, Mr Macmillan, for his extraordinary devotion to Hale School and his outstanding organisation of the School; the Director of Studies, Mr Shearer, for his clarity of thought and decisive judgement; the Housemasters for the expert and cheerful manner in which they shoulder the pastoral care load of the School; the Heads of Departments for their academic leadership which results in the classrooms of Hale School being so well ordered and effective; the Sportsmaster, Mr Chadwick, for making the sporting side of the School blend so well and effectively with the overall fabric that is Hale School; and the many Assistant masters who bear their loads so willingly and well. The staff work professionally, with a good sense of humour and they relate extremely well with the boys. Fortunate boys, and I salute their teachers.

Even though this occasion is the Senior School Speech Night and the Junior School had their own separate Speech Night earlier this week I wish to make a special reference to the Junior School. It has been a year of excitement and development in the Junior School and I wish to express my heartfelt thanks to Mr Holmes for the outstanding manner in which he discharged his duties as Acting Master-in-Charge during the First Semester, to Mr Weston for the energy and initiative he has shown since becoming Master-in-Charge last July, and to the entire Junior School staff for making 1989 such an excellent year. During the year we said goodbye to Mrs Hills, Mr White and Mr Cornwell, (and now Mrs Brayshaw), thanked them for their outstanding contributions and welcomed Mrs Farris, Mr Peirce and Mr Tremayne.

In the Senior School we farewelled Mr Staines and Mr Mumme during the year and tonight we farewell the Reverend Bryan Eccleston, Mr Roy Kelley and Mr Paul Welsh. The Reverend Eccleston retired from Guildford Grammar School at the end of 1987 and was good enough to come to Hale in an interim position for these two years. Sadly, he has not enjoyed the best of health for the second half of the year but he is a fine Christian gentleman and his contribution to Hale School has been far greater than he would imagine. Personally, I have valued his wise and patient counsel enormously and I shall miss him a great deal. We wish him health and happiness in his retirement. Mr Kelley is to leave us to go to Sherbourne School, Dorset, England which is an English Public School of the first order. It is a wonderful opportunity for him and his family and one fitting of an outstanding young schoolmaster. He has shown extraordinary maturity and judgement as Housemaster of Faulkner House and we hope that one day he might be able to return to us here at Hale. Mr Welsh is to go to Scotch Oakburn in Tasmania as their Head of Science. They have chosen wisely for he is a fine teacher and all round schoolmaster and we shall miss him greatly. Madame Margot has been with us for the last three terms replacing Mr Wapnah who has been on leave. She has taught well and added much to our Common Room and we thank her for her contribution.

I cannot let this opportunity pass, without expressing my thanks and appreciation to the Bursar, Mr Hatch, the Maintenance Foreman, Mr Truman, the Head Groundsman, Mr Moor. The Chef, Mr Varty and their staffs and my secretary Mrs Rosendale for their help and my acknowledgement to them all of the fine jobs they have done. Further, I wish to record my most sincere appreciation of the Parents and Friends and the Ladies Auxiliary for the enormous support they have given Hale School in 1989.

The School continues to perform very well academically. 97 of the 123 students who sat the Tertiary Entrance Exams at the end of 1988 qualified for tertiary studies and 82 enrolled. Twenty four students gained a tertiary entrance agregate in excess of 400. All of this reflects splendidly upon the teaching within the School and the manner in which the boys respond to it.

Early this year the Board of Governors sought expert opinion on the advisability of continuing to use Wittenoom or an adjacent area as a base for the Year Eleven outdoor programme. We were advised that whilst there was negligible danger of asbestos related diseases affecting any of our post or future participants in the programme it would be wise, in view of the current legal climate, to move well away from Wittenoom. The decision was made not to return to the spectacular country of the Hamersley Ranges which has a very special place in the memories of the many hundreds of Hale boys who have been there over the past nineteen years, and it was very sad that this was necessary. The programme was relocated to the Learmonth RAAF base near Exmouth and I am very pleased to be able to report that the venture proved to be a resounding success in all respects. It is our intention to return there again in 1990, and succeeding years. My grateful thanks go to Mr Gray and Mr Heibner for their willingness and ability to change and adapt at such very short notice.

This year saw the introduction of Parent/ Teacher evenings. Evenings were held for parents of Year Eight, Nine and Ten students and fruitful interaction which could only assist the educational process was the judgement of parents and teachers. A more comprehensive programme in this area is planned for next and succeeding years.

1989 has been a busy and an excellent year for Hale School. There has been much lively teaching and learning and much development and personal growth. I wish to pay tribute to the young men who are now leaving Hale. As a group they have made a fine contribution to their school. Adrian Webster has been outstanding as School Captain. A natural leader he has led by example and his integrity has matched his physical stature. Mark Foster has been a most able and reliable Deputy and he has complemented Adrian admirably. As a group the Year 12's have provided most commendable models for the younger boys and I wish them all good luck and God's speed as they leave Hale School as young men with their lives full of promise before them.

I wish all gathered here tonight and the entire Hale community a joyful Christmas and a happy and rewarding 1990.

Question: Where were you born?

Answer: Yes it was. During my secondary schooling I saw myself becoming a school master and I never really veered from that course. I thought I would like to combine teaching with some cricket and that is what I did.

Question: So when did you make the decision to concentrate on the profession of teaching in preference to cricket.

Answer: I always saw myself as a teacher

who played cricket rather than a cricketer who taught. In fact, I was spared the decision because whilst I played some international cricket and went on three overseas tours, I wasn't selected for any more, and therefore never had the option of making a career out of cricket. It really was a decision I didn't have to face as it was made for me. I stopped playing cricket only four years ago. In March 1985 I was still playing Sheffield Shield cricket for South Australia at the age of 41.

Question: Where did you teach before you came to Hale School as Headmaster?

Answer: My first teaching appointment was at Guildford Grammar School for two years in 1967-1968, although I spent most of 1968 in England with the Australian team. Due to difficulties with replacement teachers I left the independent school system to join the government department and taught at Applecross High School in 1969. I then went to Scotch from 1970-1978. During that time I went to England and taught for 18 months in 1976/1977 at Tonbridge School in Kent. In 1979 I went to Pembroke School in Adelaide as Deputy Head and I was there for 10 years before coming to Hale.

Question: Where else in England did you teach?

Answer: I've actually taught in England twice. Last year I was on an exchange from Pembroke at King's College School in Wimbledon.

Question: What were you thinking when you faced the school for the first in assembly?

Answer: It was an awkward position, having come from a school where I knew all the staff and all the students, to a situation where I looked out at a sea of faces and I knew nobody. It was a little unnerving realising that I was expected to make the decisions and to lead the school, yet I was less informed than anyone else about the school. Nevertheless, I realised that other people had been in a similar situation and coped and knew that I would receive a great deal of help and support from many very able people.

Question: You must have divided loyalties when Hale teams confront Scotch teams on the sports field. Where do your loyalties lie on such occasions?

Answer: I have been asked this question often and I think people exaggerate the issue. Scotch is obviously very dear to me, having both attended and taught at the school. I must admit that in the football season when they first ran out in the maroon jumpers that I used to wear with pride my stomach turned a bit. I don't know any of the Scotch boys now and knowing the Hale boys I feel strongly aligned to them. There is really no doubt where my loyalties lie. However, to me the most important thing is that there are good hard games with high levels of enthusiasm, comradeship and sportsmanship.

Question: What changes have you seen in PSA sport since the time when you once participated and now?

Answer: Things haven't changed a great deal. I've been very impressed with the attitude and the straight forward sport which goes on. Teams still play with great heart and commendable sportsmanship. Good spirit and high skill levels have been a feature of PSA sport for many years.

Question: Do you see any advantages in Hale's education system?

Answer: Yes, I do. I think in some ways standards in education have been eroded over the years. I see them being strongly preserved at Hale and I applaud this preservation of academic standards and rigor. We also have to recognise however, that there are more boys who stay on at school now who are not academically strong and we have to cater well for them too.

Question: Do you think that many of the second and third teams at Hale lack recognition in relation to the first teams?

Answer: The thing that I look for most in

sport is effort and attitude. Effort can be just as great in the 'minor' teams as in the first teams and it warms my heart to see tremendous effort from all these teams. However, we have to recognise talent where it exists. It doesn't matter whether it is music or academic or sporting. We seek excellence so we have to try to combine recognition of effort with the recognition of achievement in an absolute sense. I think this balance is something we need to always address and improve upon whenever we can.

Question: What do you see as the aims of an outdoor education programme such as the Exmouth Programme?

Answer: The principal one is that everybody involved has the opportunity to develop in another way and learn more about themselves and their neighbours. In Exmouth there was a challenging situation which you all survived and felt better for it and better about yourselves. Also, often a boy who is neither strong academically nor on the sporting field shows great strength in the outdoor situation. This often gives rise to a nice reversal of roles amongst a group of boys. And, of course, environmental awareness and sensitivity is a major aim, too.

Question: What do you think of the present relationship between boarders and day boys at Hale?

Answer: I think the relationship between all people should be cordial and good. There should be no barriers, especially artificial ones. House spirit and School spirit are very important but these do no need to cut across good relationships between people. All should make an effort to be friendly to all others. Boarders and day boys at Hale are members of the same school and all should make a real effort to get on with others at all times.

Question: Is that one reason for the idea of putting dayboys into the boarding houses such as Faulkner year 8?

Answer: Well, that is one reason, but the other is simply numbers. The number of dayboys is quite high while boarder numbers are relatively low. So if we are going to have meaningful house competitions then the numbers have to be roughly equivalent.

Question: Do you see any future development in language at Hale?

Answer: I think we should offer more languages and I hope increasing numbers of boys will opt for them. We were hoping to have Japanese taught here next year but unfortunately we were not able to find a satisfactory teacher.

Question: Do you see many differences in educational policy between Australian schools and those in England?

Answer: There is a great range of schools in Australia and an even greater range of schools in England. I taught at Tonbridge School and King's College School which are schools with selected entry. Their cleverest boys weren't any cleverer than ours but there was a higher concentration of them and a much reduced cross-section of ability. There was greater emphasis on languages, literature, history and science there with not nearly as much on the commercial side.

Question: Did your find a stronger sense of tradition in the schools of England than those of Australia?

Answer: There is certainly a great deal of tradition in schools such as Tonbridge which is 500 to 600 years old. However, the tradition in these schools forms less of a resisting force than it does in many schools in Australia. I would say that these schools in England are more open to change than schools are in Australia.

Question: What hopes do you have for Hale? Have you any personal aims you wish to achieve through Hale school?


Answer: Hale is a very fine school and I want it to remain that way. Any Headmaster of a school wants to see the school keep on improving and I want to see groups of boys continue to enter the school and grow and flourish having been challenged and extended by the school. I want this to be a disciplined and firm yet friendly and encouraging environment in which almost everyone will prosper and I look forward to Hale continuing and developing in this direction.

Question: Hale is the smallest PSA school. Do you think this will change in the future through a policy of Hale accepting more students?

Answer: Hale is a slightly smaller school than the others and I can see it growing a little but

within its present structure. We are certainly going to expand the Junior School, by having two extra classes. I think we will see more boys staying on in years 11 and 12. This trend has started already.

Question: Do you think that Hale as an independent boy's school will survive in a society in which co-educational schools are becoming more and more the norm?

Answer: I think we will see the preservation of all types of schools. I do think, however, that the move towards co-ed schools will continue and continue strongly.

Question: I know some PSA schools have co-ed Junior schools. Do you think this is likely to happen to Hale?

Answer: No, I do not. Being partially co-ed has little to commend it in my eyes.

Question: In your eyes does Hale have a strong relationship with St. Mary's?

Answer: I think it does and it seems to be growing steadily.

Question: Having been a test cricket player are you tempted to coach the first XI cricket team?

Answer: I enjoy coaching sport but have no real preference for particular age groups. At Pembroke I used to coach the year eight footballers because it proved a good way to meet the new boys.



Swimming — **1989**

The 1989 Interschool Swimming Carnival saw the Hale swimming squad end up in third position with 615 points, behind this year's victors Christchurch (814 pts) and the big improvers of 1989 Aquinas (646 pts).

The swimming season began on day one of the first term with some keen swimmers starting training that afternoon. The squad was soon enlarged by a big group of enthusiastic year 8's after time trials. The number of boys who turned up to training regularly was the largest for some years and hopefully this enthusiasm will continue into the future.

Instead of the traditional meet with Scotch on the second Saturday of term, Hale confronted last year's winners — Christchurch. The depth of their team indicated their chances of retaining the cup. A large amount of potential was shown by the younger Hale swimmers as they won most of their events.

Over the next few weeks the squad entered into a vital training period, where the hard slogging had to be done. During this time, Hale held a social meet with St Hilda's which was enjoyed thoroughly by all concerned. The times were relatively slow mainly because many boys had "things" on their mind other than swimming. On the Saturday of that week Hale was meant to have a swimming meet with Guildford, unfortunately they did not arrive due to the "bad" weather (or being scared?). The Hale swimmers, undeterred by the weather, decided to swim against each other. The following Thursday morning "Trog's Iron Man Classic" was held at Scarborough beach to give the team members a break from the normal training session.

On the Saturday before the Inters the annual school championships was held to determine the age group champions. Everyone tried their best knowing that the team would be chosen from the results of this event and Mr Hopkins added to the excitement of the races with his commentary extraordinaire. Two school records were set on the day by Jamie Morphett in the U/14 50m freestyle in a time of 27.8 seconds and in the U/14 100m freestyle in a time of 61.1 seconds. It should also be noted that Hamish Jooste came second to Jamie Morphett in both these races in times under the old records. On that night the Quads were held in which Christchurch dominated and showed once again they would be a force to be reckoned with.

After a few challenges and a training session at Beatty Park in the last week, the day of the Inters eventually arrived. That afternoon the team in their "designer" T-shirts arrived at Beatty Park for the 84th Interschool Carnival. The atmosphere was once again fantastic and the conditions for swimming superb. Hale started off badly in the senior freestyle races but won both the U/13 and U/14 divisions courtesy of H. Jooste, J. Morphett, T. Pearson and D. Haunold. Thus Hale managed to hold third place after the freestyle events. Jamie Morphett in winning his freestyle race set a new school record of 27.6 seconds. Once again breaststroke was our strong point and we consistently gained places in the top three. Hale consequently moved up to equal second place after the breastroke.

After a dismal performance in the backstroke Hale fell back down to third. This position was retained for the rest of the night. During the butterfly events, Jamie Morphett set a new U/14 record of 29.9 seconds and he backed this up by winning the second division Open 200m freestyle. Hale did not win a relay but we still managed to hold onto third place. Nearly every swimmer recorded personal best times on the night and this was demonstrated by the 38 Hantke standard times achieved.

The team would like to thank many people but most importantly Mr Richard Pengelly who took over the role of head coach this year. His enthusiasm, hard work and devotion towards the team were greatly appreciated by all the swimmers. Thanks must also go to Mr Les Nunn who stood down as head coach last year and concentrated on training the year 8's, and to 'Old Boy' James Legge for his large amount of support at training and the Inters. Mr Varty must also be thanked for feeding the starving swimmers every morning after training. Finally thanks must go to the team captain, Stuart Blackwell, and his vice captains Luke Hawkins and Richard Lucas who all put in a lot of work in encouraging, organising and running the

The results of the Inters look very promising for the future with our juniors dominating the U/13 and U/14 age groups. With a very talented group of swimmers coming up from the Junior school next year the future of Hale school swimming looks to be on its way to the top once again.





promising start on the Friday afternoon scoring 3 for 211 with each of the top four batsman contributing. Major 29 and Foster 33 made good starts but could not capitalise on this, whereas Norrish made a whirlwind 56 and Mallabone a patient 86 n.o. In view of this commanding position, Hale was very unlucky to have play washed out on Saturday, caused by overnight rain seeping under the covers and soaking the pitch. A special mention must be made of Adam Mallabone who once again missed out on a "ton", this time because of the bad weather.

Aquinas.

After winning the toss for the first and only time of the season, we sent Aquinas in and had them in trouble at 4 for 80. Unfortunately Hale dropped several vital catches and allowed Aquinas to reach an impressive total of 8 for 298. This was, however, an attainable score on an extremely small ground with a fast outfield. Unfortunately the Hale batsmen failed to exploit these conditions and were never in the hunt, with wickets falling at regular intervals. Norrish and Webster provided some resistance, each scoring 38. A determined Dale Warren resolutely defied the strong Aquinas attack with Brad Kirby but by then it was too late and Hale crumbled to be all out for 153 — a dismal effort.

Scotch.

The final match of the season saw a memorable unbeaten century by Jason Norrish. After having a bye the previous week, Hale went into this match requiring a win to secure second place. Batting first on a docile pitch, Hale batted well on Friday afternoon to be well in excess of 200 by the close of play. Once again the first 4 batsmen made a start but Jason Norrish was the only one to go on with it, flaying the Scotch attack to all parts of the ground in a masterful innings. Hale ended up with 6-280 declared early on the Saturday morning allowing almost a full day to dismiss the Scotch line up. Our bowlers toiled with enthusiasm but wickets were hard to take and at 4 for 164 we looked to be in trouble. After an inspired spell of bowling by David Darragh and Adrain Webster, Hale broke the shackles and the last 6 wickets fell for the addition of only 29 runs. Darragh finished with 3 for 25 to be the pick of the bowlers.

The season ended on a high note as Hale secured second position, behind the disciplined Wesley team. Throughout the season a good time was had by all members of the team — which did not vary at all throughout the season. Finally


Tennis Report



Rowing Report

There was a tremendous feeling of comradeship amongst rowers, coaches and parents in the 1989 rowing season. Hard work, exciting regattas and enjoyment were equally mixed.

The 1989 rowing season saw the end of an era with the Head of the River Regatta being moved from the unpredictable Crawley Narrows course to the Canning River. It is now hoped the annual event will be held under more predictable conditions. The new location did not attract as many spectators or have the atmosphere of the old course but was well surrounded by vocal Hale supporters on the day.

Training began this year with the rowing camp held over the final week of the Christmas Holidays for boys in years ten to twelve. Through the season boys trained at 5.30am or 4.00pm for two hours four or five days a week with additional strength and ergometer work conducted around this. This year's school season was short, finishing on the 18th of March but comprised seven regattas. Results — 1st VIII

The first regatta of the season was the Christ Church long distance race held over the bending 5km Canning course. The Hale 1st VIII were in an excellent position with 2km remaining and leading by six seconds but they could not maintain it when Scotch lifted over the last 1.5km. Scotch won in the windy conditions in a time of 18min. 14sec. with Christ Church second (18min. 22 sec.) just two seconds ahead of Hale (18min. 24sec.).

At the Guildford - Aquinas Regatta all crews started evenly and it took some 200m before Scotch and Hale moved ahead of the field. Over the final 600m Scotch were able to slowly take a length from the tiring Hale crew and win in a time of 6min. 21sec. followed by Hale, Wesley and Aquinas.

The Wesley Regatta held in atrocious conditions saw a spectacular battle in the 1st XIII's race. Hale led through the start and were able to hold a half length lead for the first 700m but were hit badly by some waves allowing Scotch and Aquinas through. Scotch won in a time of 6min. 38sec. followed closely by Aquinas and Hale.

Due to various accidents and illnesses the Hale 1st XIII did not compete at the Trinity or Scotch regattas.

At the Hale Regatta the Hale 1st VIII led from the start never rating below 36 strokes per minute and looked like winning. The even fitter Aquinas crew, showing great determination, worked well over the final 500m to close the gap. With 100m to go and the crews level the crowd expected a thriller but one of the Hale rowers caught a "crab" and was thrown from the boat. Aquinas won in a time of 6min. 25sec. with Christ Church second. Scotch did not compete and Hale drifted over the line in fifth place with 7 rowers aboard.

The 90th Head of the River Regatta was rowed in hot and fairly still conditions. Hale, rating 42 strokes per minute were very fast from the start and led through the first 500m in 1min. 30 sec. The stronger Aquinas and Scotch crews moved to the lead with Aquinas winning by a length in a time of 6min. 19sec. Second place was almost a photo-finish. A great finishing burst from the Hale crew brought them to third just 0. 2sec. behind the second placed Scotch (6min. 23sec.). Christ Church were fourth (6min. 31sec.) followed by Guildford (6min. 34sec.), Wesley (6min. 36sec.) and Trinity (7min. 1sec.).

The Under 16 team of James Kenneison, Craig Berg, Doug Haines and Cliff Winby played well to reach their grand final. A fine performance by all four.





School Records '89'

Hale School went well in breaking so many records this year as there was such a short time period in which to attain perfection. There were 8 school records broken against the 13 last year. There were no P.S.A. records achieved by Hale, only 3 were attained at the Inters by all the schools.

U15 — D. Broom dominated this age group in middle distance records, starting at the Trinity meet. His 1500m he ran in 4min 27.1 seconds, beating last years record by 0.9 sec. He then ripped this time at the Inters to get a time of 4min 20.9 sec. Broom's most tremendous feat was his 3000m smashing the previous record at the School Championships by over 10 seconds then breaking this own record at the

Inters ending up with 9min 22.4sec.

U16 — In the 1500m at the Inter School Athletics M. Chadwich broke a long standing time of 4min 18.1sec set by M. Johnston in 1974, his time being 4min 17.6seconds. G. Davison and H. Grant being 9min 45.5sec. M. Kelly in Shot Put threw a tremendous 16m, smashing the 1986 record held by B. Barrows by 1.62m. In Discus he threw a distance of 50m breaking A. Webster's record of 49.77m in 1987, both these records were set at the School Championships.

Debating Report


In its 17th year at Hale, Debating yet again proved to be both a fulfilling and enjoyable experience for the 38 boys involved in both social and Inter-School Debating.



There was movement at the Memorial Hall, for the word had passed around that the auditions for this years school play "Fleance" were to be held. A group of dedicated and enthusiastic boys assembled in dark and mysterious conditions to try out for one of the many parts up for grabs. The night proved to be a long and exhausting one, but also a very rewarding one. Mr Inverarity joined us as well, however I think his ambitions didn't so much lie on stage rather than in watching us. The cast came together again when school commenced and now, as Mr Hopkins told us so often the hard work started. On Wednesday, 31st May, the first of three performances was presented in front of a paying audience of 380, consisting of ladies, gentlemen, children, teachers and boarders. As usual Mr Hopkins script was full of humour and not too hard to comprehend. Hubble (T. Berryman), Hubble (P. Berry), Doyle (G. Erskine) and Rubble (J. Purves), barristers, solicitors and financiers, want the site of the Empire Theatre for a major inner-city office development. The Empire, on the other hand, is celebrating its centenary and its owner Sir James Duncannon (T. Eyres) plans a special centenary production of Shakespeare's "Macbeth".

An estimated 1100 people came to see this year's school production, and listening to various people the play seemed to have been (once again) a great success. The show on Friday night before a capacity audience was probably the highlight of Hale's cultural year and thoroughly enjoyed by everyone involved. For many the play not only gave them the chance to display their theatrical talents but also to meet boys from other age groups as well as being confronted with teachers in a nonscholastic activity. As for my part I can only say that although school work surely suffered under all the rehearsals it was great to have been part of "Fleance". To finish off the drama season in an orderly fashion, a party was held at Matt Gebbie's (president of the Hale dramatic society 1989) house which was relished by everyone including Mr Hopkins, who disregarding our pleas, didn't jump into the pool.

There are many people who have to be commended on helping to make the play so successful: The Ladies Auxiliary headed by Mrs Gebbie for their terrific costumes, Mrs Hairsine and her bunch of girls (Asheley, Danielle, Kate, Louise, Marieka, Melissa and Melissa, Nina and Rene) for their make-up, Mr Raymond Long for composing the music and manning the keyboard, David Chapell and the members of the stage crew for opening and closing the curtains and the band for keeping up the musical standard of previous plays. Finally, many thanks to Messrs Biddle, Johnson, Harvey and Van Oijen and, in particular to Mr Hopkins for helping to make "Fleance - A Classic Coincidence" such a great play to watch and perform in.



Rottnest Reafforestation 1989

This year saw the seventh Hale reafforestation group go to Rottnest. Since 1983, 130 boys have been involved in the project, planting some 13,000 seedlings, with a 70% to 80% success rate. Other activities have included sand dune restoration, fencing and seed collection.

Ningaloo Fishing Trip

After completing a seventeen hour bus trip and quickly setting up camp we had our first taste of what Ningaloo had to offer, with a very eventful night's fishing. Three keen fishermen were the first to venture out to the reef, and in what were less than ideal conditions the group tangled with some excellent Spangled Emperor, and a variety of smaller fish. This night was to set the pace for the rest of the week.

The Ningaloo campsite, approximately 1300km north of Perth, was simply a small clearing in the dunes, with a lean-to which was to become the main eating area. Here the tents were erected. The party of 26, eleven of whom were Hale School students, was originally equipped with four boats. However, after a couple of days only two were operational and as a result all of the fishing was done inside the main Ningaloo reef.

The first day dawned bright and clear and small groups of students began taking the boats out early to exploit what were excellent fishing conditions. Most students chose to fish in close proximity to the reef where there seemed to be an endless supply of fish. Tight lines were enjoyed by all for the next seven days and there was constant traffic to and from the reef. Within a day of our arrival big fish were being brought back to the camp by nearly everyone who went out in a boat. The best of these fish was a Giant Trevally which tipped the scales at 50 pounds. This huge fish, although hooked on a heavy hand-line, stubbornly resisted arrest for well over a quarter of an hour. Finally it was pulled into the boat by an exhausted crew of four. The rest of the fish included many Golden Trevally in excess of the 10 kilo mark, and Long-Tom, a great fighting fish. An abundance of reef fish was also present. Well proportioned Spangled Emperor and various representatives of the cod family engulfed nearly everything we cared to try as bait.

Night fishing, not only in the dinghy but also from the beach brought some luck to those who persisted. However, most of the fish were caught in the morning when the tides were favourable.

Diving in the warm water was also a delight. The water was in places thick with masses of brightly coloured reef fish, but the occasional shark kept us on our toes. Many crayfish were also caught by the group. On one particular occasion a magnificent crayfish dinner was caught and here Mr Biddle had an unbeatable formula for bringing in his bag limit. Three very large crayfish each measuring nearly half a metre from tail to head were also caught and along with Tim Simpson's Giant Trevally caught earlier, were the catch of the week.

The news of cyclone Orson dampened the whole situation and it was finally decided that the group should leave a day early. Nevertheless most of the students left feeling satisfied that they had spent over a week in a superb diving and fishing spot.



Parents and Friends Association

The Hale Parents and Friends Association has enjoyed a very successful year, with a much expanded program of activities and fund-raising.

The system of sub-committees, introduced in 1988, is now working well. The sub-committees are Parent Liaison, Social, Education and Fund Raising. Each has a Chairman and 3-6 members, either from the elected P&F committee or coopted from the parent body. Six parents were co-opted to "support" the P&F committee this year. This gave the committee a broader base and provided better representation of the school body; almost every grade and year was represented on the committee.

Parent Liaison (Don Holywell) is concerned primarily with improving communications between parents and the school. The Resource Register was established during the year. Data from the questionaries have been compiled on computer, and are being used successfully as needs arise. We expect this to be used extensively in the future. The revamping of the Haleian, and the introduction of a fortnightly newsletter — both long-standing P&F aspirations — were welcome achievements.

The Education Sub-Committee (Brian Mutzig) is focussed on educational and programs of benefit to both parents and students. A stress management program for students is currently being reviewed. Through Anne Hairsine, the committee was able to assist the school in recruiting the new Music/Drama teacher for the Junior School.

The Social Sub-Committee (Glenys Pickford)

organised school picnics early in the year, and staged a very entertaining Jazz at Vespers, with the New Orleans Dixieland Jazz Band. The Quiz Night at Observation City was another success.

Fund-Raising (Trevor Greig) organised the very successful Disneyland raffle, raising over \$8000.00 The lucky winner was Robyn Read, of Kallaroo — a neighbour to the Prattini family. Special prize for most tickets sold went, with our thanks, to C. Cole.

The extra income has enabled the P&F to help the school in a great variety of ways in 1989. Over \$25,000 has been provided to the school. The Junior School had the lion's share of it this year: new computers, a new PA system, and a Fitness Track were installed, and funding has been provided for new musical instruments and equipment for the Outdoor Program. At the Senior School, the \$7500 pledged in 1987 to help computerise the Senior School Library was provided. A program to decorate the schoolrooms with prints of paintings and photographs has been initiated at the Headmaster's invitation, and should brighten 1990's walls. The P&F was also pleased to contribute to the installation of ramps at Memorial Hall and the S Block.

The P&F Committee thanks the parents who supported us during the year. A special thanks to the new Headmaster, John Inverarity, and the Junior School Master, Harry Weston. The new mood of innovation, co-operation and communication is appreciated and applauded. My personal thanks to the committee, both elected and co-opted.





Mr Roy Kelley leaves Hale at the end of 1989 after a distinguished career. He first became associated with the school in 1978 when he spent some weeks here as a student teacher. He took up a full-time teaching appointment in the following year and has served the school ever since with a commitment few can match.

It is indeed appropriate that, in the accompanying photograph, we see Mr Kelley next to a map which is clearly related to his beloved Geography teaching. But the map is not being used for what might be expected. Mr Kelley is, in fact, employing the map to brief the students of the complex manoeuvres involved with a year ten Geography excursion. Unfortunately, a local map was not available, so he had to make do with this one. None of the students, incidentally, noticed anything wrong with this — Mr Kelley has always said

that flexibility and imagination are very important for Geography students.

Many Faulkner House boarders of recent times agree that Mr Kelley himself shows considerable imagination — particularly when dreaming up punishments for boarding house misdemeanours.

Mr Kelley began his boarding house work in 1983 when he was relieving housemaster in Wilson House for two terms. Among many other things, he led Wilson to an historic win in the Cock House Cup and when the position became available in Faulkner House he became its housemaster and has now completed five very productive years looking after the Faulkner boarders. Always fair, firm and consistent, he has built up an excellent understanding with the boys in his charge and they will miss his leadership and guidance.

Mr Kelley has also made notable contributions to sport at Hale. As coach of the 2nd V basketball for many years, he has made a big impact. The players have clearly understood what is expected of them and with his astute coaching, he has led the 2nds to victory for many years.

One of the more tactically challenging jobs Mr Kelley has had at Hale has been that of manager of the first XVIII football. Here, he not only has had to organise boundary and goal umpires, runners, first aid and so on but also has had to contend with the problem of keeping the coach on the straight and narrow and vaguely sane.

Mr Kelley is to join the staff of Sherborne School in Dorset, England. Sherborne is an independent school where the 660 boys are all boarders so at least he should be well prepared.

We thank him for all he has done for Hale School, we wish him all the very best at his new school and we hope to see him back at Hale before too long.




