Editorial

The happiest days of our life?

To a student, the cliche that schooldays are the best days of a person's life is probably the least believable phrase in history - maybe ranking higher than "One day you'll look back at this and laugh" - when you are stuck hanging half-way up a forty metre cliff! School is not exactly the most exciting place to spend the best part of twelve years.

One of the main areas of complaint is the relevancy of the material a student is required to study. Who really needs to know the date of the French Revolution? Is differential calculus truly necessary for a student planning to avoid any mathematics more taxing than counting sheep? At this level of examination, there seems to be no point to education in Years 11 and 12 at all and definitely no point in studying any Arts subject, unless one decides to become a scholar.

In answer, a parallel must be drawn. In Year 10, there was a boy who wished to study Commerce at University and was shocked to find that one requirement to enter that course was Physics, a totally unrelated subject, which he had dropped after Year 8. The reason for this pre-requisite was the fact that Physics is one of the more difficult subjects which tests the mind of the student and anyone without the level of intelligence to pass Physics, would not do well in the Commerce course. In a way, that is what Years 11 and 12 are for. They are to test the mind of the student and, by that testing, increase his ability to solve problems logically, argue points cogently and express his ideas in a better way. The Sciences promote logic and the experimental method, while the Arts allow a degree of self expression to arise under expert coaching. One may not enjoy the experience and even find it extremely boring, but anyone staying on past their Junior will, one day, look back with a thankful laugh that they had opted to advance themselves in this wav

As for School being the happiest time of someone's life, a student could look at it in another way. Since five years of age, he has had two sets of people looking after his educational and moral development - his parents and his School community. These people have taught the student almost everything he knows and this is a tremendous responsibility resting on parents and the teaching profession, who must ensure, especially in the younger years, that this development occurs in the right direction. Never again will a child or young adult be protected to the extent parents and School protect him, often a sharp shock in University, when he does what School never allowed and suffers for it.

Finally, to understand the truth of the phrase, you must remember that life is, in the end, as boring and restricting as School. Instead of getting up in the morning and going to boring classes, for all but a lucky few, it is going to a boring office day after day. Unfortunately the shine of childhood is gone. There is no longer a game of basketball or football to amuse during lunchbreak, or a Band rehearsal during Physics. However, the final proof of any theory is visible proof and a Hall full of Old Boys proudly exclaiming their happiest days is proof enough.

A note about this edition of the Cygnet. It may be smaller than last year's edition, but there are still 365 days in a year and still an entire year of Hale's 133 year history recorded within. Treasure your Cygnets, of any size, as they will be your memories in years to come.

Editorial

For 133 years Hale School has been educating, in the finest possible way, young men from all over the State. The institution has thoroughly prepared its students for tertiary education and produced countless leaders of our community, from farmers to doctors, from scientists to Premiers. Academically, Hale has certainly established a time-honoured tradition of excellence. However, there is more to life at Hale School than the hours spent in the classroom. While these are undeniably vital, ultimately preparing students for the T.E.E. and higher education, I believe the greater benefits of Hale are derived from the multitude of extra curricular activities, both sporting and cultural, offered to students.

A so-called "well-rounded" education should be balanced - a mixture of humanities and scientific disciplines. However, I think a student's education is not complete unless he engages in other School activities, outside schoolwork.

There are many boys at Hale who feel they "escape" by doing the bare minimum - simply plodding through the institution only concerning themselves with their classes and a bit of sport in Years 8 and 9. This is the easy way out and such boys generally have an unrewarding time at School. It is much more preferable to participate in as many School and House activities as possible - only then can a boy say he has had a "well-rounded" education.

It is indisputable that Hale offers an extremely broad spectrum of School clubs, societies and teams from which every single boy can find his forte. Sport at Hale will always be strong, from cricket to tennis, squash to rugby and all the others in between. There is certainly ample scope for boys to represent the School in their chosen game or to play for their House. The recent growth and development of various cultural clubs and societies has been most encouraging. Debating, Drama, Bridge, Chess, Music, The Creative Writers' Circle and others, all make strong contributions to School life. Again, I make note of the large number of clubs facilitating any talents or interests boys may have. I feel all students should make a concerted effort to join a cultural society at Hale, as well as to strive for success on the sporting field. The benefits of participation are numerous and there are many reasons why the young men of Hale should aim to participate in as many School activities as possible.

The first is the fostering of a School spirit. Playing for the School on the sporting field, or acting in a School Play, both make a student proud to be at Hale. Representing Hale unites boys and makes them feel a part of a team and, in a way, a part of each other, in that they are all working for a common goal - to perform for the School - whether it be swimming, the open relay on Inters' night or speaking in a Year 8 debate. A communal atmosphere, where everyone is working for the good of Hale, would result from increased participation. School pride and spirit would increase markedly. I stress, it doesn't matter on what "level" one performs - so long as boys all strive to put in to Hale, School spirit will rise.


Secondly, I believe it is the "duty" of Haleians to put back into the School, by lending their talents to teams or societies. Hale provides its students with a magnificent education, professional pastoral care and helps us to make lifelong friends. It is only fitting that boys reciprocate by attempting to help out the School - be it making up the numbers in a Chess team or running for the P.S.A. Athletics.

Finally, come the "selfish" reasons. There are numerous ways in which getting involved in their School can benefit students. obvious is that by getting involved, boys learn new skills and further old ones - such as learning to play an instrument or improving one's tennis game. Another benefit is that representing or helping out the School is extremely personally rewarding; I know that the Cygnet Committee is well pleased with the culmination of their hard efforts this year. The last personal benefit of participating in as many School activities as possible, is that after a young man leaves School, all he is left with is old report cards and memories. I should imagine that the Old Boys who did as much as possible for Hale are the most satisfied and content. They can reflect on the many opportunities laid down on a platter before them and how they took full advantage of them. They have had a truly "well-rounded" education.

The trends are certainly encouraging - debating numbers are at a high level, an ample quantity of boys auditioned for various Drama productions and most sporting teams are brimming with willing players. However, there is still room for improvement. It is to the young men of Hale that I now speak: There are more sports teams and more cultural clubs and societies operating at Hale than ever before. It is up to you to derive full benefit from these opportunities. By not participating in your School, you do not escape, you miss out; you suffer and the School is that little bit poorer for your lack of interest. Five years in Senior School is not long. Take full advantage of your chances and, in the words of John Keats, "Seize the day".

I am sure that the boys of Hale are ready to take up the challenge. Let us hope that next year brings the dawn of a new pattern at Hale - increased student involvement in School activities, both sporting and cultural. 1992 could truly become the "year of participation". Hale would only flourish because of it.

Headmaster's Speech Night Address — 1990

Mr. Chairman, Air Marshal Sir Valston Hancock and Lady Hancock, Governors, Bishop Kyme, Ladies and Gentlemen. It is with pleasure that I present the Headmaster's Annual Report of Hale School in its 133rd year.

I wish to begin by referring to the Valedictory occasions for our Year Twelves staged early in November. On Thursday the 1st, there was the Leavers' Luncheon at which the Chairman, Mr. Cruickshank, addressed the boys most eloquently and appropriately on the enduring values espoused by Hale School. He was followed by Gavin Barugh who delivered a fine Valedictory Oration. On the Friday, we had a lovely Chapel Service for the boys and their parents. In the congregation were two of Bishop Hale's grandchildren, Mrs. Theo Peacey and Mr. Edward Hale, both out from different parts of England and each unaware of the other's visit. This added greatly to the occasion. A morning tea followed, at which there was a ceremony where the boys were symbolically exited from the School and welcomed as life members of the Old Haleians' Association, as they were presented with Old Boys' ties. The boys left with great dignity and with a real sense of occasion. Happy and fulfilling times at Hale were fittingly acknowledged.

I found the whole process to be a very moving experience. It was a set of appropriate events in which the elements of a Hale School education came together and the fruits of the School's efforts stood before us; young men with their heads up, their shoulders back, a smile on their faces, a twinkle in their eyes, respectful and yet not dependent, well prepared for their final exams and for life beyond School; ready and anxious to get on with it.

I admit to feeling a glow of satisfaction that in the end, with the products of our School, it seemed that much had fallen into place. It gave great encouragement to us to press on with our efforts to cultivate an ordered and civilised environment in which talents can blossom and deeper values can be transmitted and inculcated. Through their growing affection for and loyalty to their School, the boys learn that membership of a community involves demands and discipline, so that the pursuit of individual advantage is tempered and civilised by a concern for the common good.

I wish to take this opportunity of paying tribute to the Year Twelves of 1990 for their leadership and efforts and the great contribution they have made to their School. Duncan Hogg, as their leader, has been an outstanding Captain of School and fulfilled his duties in the finest traditions of this office. He has worked tirelessly and with mature judgment and unfailing courtesy and good grace. The manner in which he has been so deeply involved and achieved at such a high level academically, has provided a shining example for others to follow.

I wish all those boys who are leaving Hale School the very best of good luck and God's speed. We look forward to your continued association with Hale in the years that lie ahead.

This year I have become involved with a State Government Advisory Committee on Juvenile Offenders. (It has given me much valuable background and insight for performing my duties as Headmaster of Hale School!) Many things are becoming very clear to me and to other committee members. Firstly, it is a community problem that is to be owned and addressed by every citizen; and secondly, the problem can be so much better overcome by pro-active rather than reactive means. Very nearly all the offenders are many of the following: little loved, dislocated, insecure, lacking in confidence and skills, spiritually inactive, and have unstructured lives, time on their hands, insufficient wholesome interests, low self esteem and have been handled badly by adults. To be an adult and to have responsibility for children is a privilege and one of life's most exciting challenges. It is the responsibility of those in authority, in institutions such as the family (especially), the Church, the School and the Club, to love, to re-locate, to structure, to skill, to keep busy with worthwhile pursuits, to develop self-esteem, to activate and nourish the spirit and to generate a love for life and people, and a confidence to cope within our young.

This constructive and pro-active approach that is needed in addressing the problems associated with juvenile offenders is in step with the attitudes we have and what we attempt to do in our schools. Education and bringing up young people is an all round process. It is about caring for, nurturing and guiding the young and equipping them with skills, values and attitudes that will take them through life as worthy, contributing and fulfilled citizens.

Good education is very much about good balance. Schools need to be constantly searching for better balance. A better balance of inputs, of outputs and of attitudes; balance between the amount of direct instruction and discovery learning, between the amount of academic work in class and out of class, between content and process, between academic demands and other demands, between committed time and free time, between sporting and cultural pursuits, between challenging demands and unrealistic expectations both with respect to studies and behaviour, between conformity and individuality, between maintaining standards and a firm moral line and being tolerant and forgiving.

We must not compromise on our standards or our values. We must search for the delicate balance between not being prepared to accept anti-social behaviour and attitudes but tolerating, respecting and encouraging individual differences. This balance achieved is a precious asset.

We are in danger in our schools of expecting our students to conform too much to a mould that is too narrow. It is a demanding challenge for us to attempt to create an environment that encourages wide ranging interests and flair, individuality, and an appreciation of those who are able to achieve in different ways.

A balance needs to be struck between the positive aspects of feeling a strong sense of belonging to a group or an institution and the negative and destructive aspects of this. We all have a yearning to belong. We must be careful, however, of the dangers of constraint of outlook and development of prejudice by yearning to belong too strongly to groups at the expense of having wider associations and understandings. There is a great need for schools to make their students aware that they belong, too, to a very large group, to humanity and to realise that their village is a global village. The time of the "nation-state" type of outlook with all of its associated bigotry, stereotyping and narrowness must draw to a close. The future belongs to an amity, a positive and dynamic interaction between people of different backgrounds and cultures that is based on the common quality of their humanity and of all being one of God's many people.

We need to take a balanced pride in who we are and what we belong to and be guarded against being flattered by the shallow accolades we or our institutions may win. We must be careful not to worship who we are. A civilised school, like a civilised community, is a detribulised one.

Much of Hale's best work is done still in the classrooms and the great majority of the boys are to be commended for their purposeful application to their studies and their achievements. Of particular note this year, have been some excellent results in State and national Mathematics and Science Competitions. In the Australian Mathematics Competition, we gained 110 distinctions and eight prizes (the prizes going to the top 0.3% in the State) and two of our Year 11 boys, Andrew Benness and Greg Wheatley, are among 72 selected for Australian Mathematical Olympiad trials. In the Australian National Chemistry Quiz, fifteen of our Year 10 boys were awarded High Distinctions and this was more than 10% of those awarded throughout the State.

We had 106 boys sit the TEE at the end of 1989 and 23 of these gained scores in excess of 400.

We are all much relieved that as from 1992, at least four subjects (rather than three) will be counted in calculating the final TEE score. Education has suffered and schools have been greatly frustrated by students playing the system and making a genuine effort in only three of their six subjects.

In 1991 we shall commence teaching Japanese at Years 6, 7 and 8 and out of the normal timetable to a group of especially keen Year 9 boys. We are fortunate to be gaining the services of Mr. Hiroshi Aoki, a charming Japanese man who has had much experience teaching Japanese in North America. A Curriculum Development Committee is leading a close examination of the curriculum, particularly at the lower secondary level and our proposed initative in Design and Technology Education is gathering momentum. Much work is being done on developing curricula for this, a design brief for a purpose built facility which we hope to have for 1993, and on exploring the means by which we can raise the funds for this venture.

Creativity, innovation and the capacity to work a concept right through to its operational stage will be of paramount importance in the Australian work force of tomorrow. A greater proportion of our school-leavers need to be attracted into the areas of science, engineering and technology and harness their stimulated and developed skills in inventiveness and problem-solving to situations that combine strong theoretical and practical elements. Design is a way of thinking; design capability, the exercise of creativity and problem solving. Technology is a way of doing; technological capability the purposeful utilisation and adaption of resources to the realisation of a solution. Together, they combine scientific and technological principles with design, creative and manual abilities.

There are challenges here that schools must accept. We wish to enable our boys to play a notable part in the creation of the wealth of the next century, not merely by imparting skills and techniques, but also by fostering an instinct for inquiry and a capacity for judgment and evaluation. Tomorrow's world will require discernment and restraint, too.

Mr. Pengelley was commissioned as Hale School Chaplain at a service led by the Archbishop, in February, and he and his family moved into the new Chaplain's residence near the Chapel in October. The School has become the richer for its revitalised worship, the steady development of its spiritual life and the energetic, sincere and clear leadership he has provided in this role.

The Junior School had its own Speech Night and Prize giving yesterday, but I wish to express my thanks in this forum to Mr. Weston and his staff for the excellent year the Junior School has enjoyed and the substantial development that has taken place there this year. It is very pleasing that the Performing Arts are assuming a higher profile.

1990 has seen the beginning of restructuring the Senior management level of the School. A broader and flatter structure has been started and will be completed when Mr. Roy Kelley returns to us from England next July and joins Mr. MacMillan, Mr. Shearer and Mr. Bean in a Senior School Management Team. Mr. MacMillan as Director of Day to Day Operations will continue to be responsible for the functioning operation of the School and his meticulous organisation and attention to detail, ensures that we operate in a remarkably calm and precise manner. He will also carry the responsibility of being my Deputy. Mr. Shearer and Mr. Bean will share the portfolio of Director of Studies. Mr. Shearer has particular responsibilities for Science, Technology, Heads of Departments and Academic Administration. Our Design Technology initiative is under his expert direction. Mr. Bean is to have particular responsibility for the Humanities and the Arts, for curriculum development and for fostering the cultural life of Hale School. His balanced outlook and wide ranging interests and abilities, make him ideally suited to this position. Mr. Kelley has accepted the newly created position of Director of Pastoral Care and Professional Development. The Executive of the School will include these four, plus the Bursar (Mr. Hatch), the Master-in-Charge of the Junior School (Mr. Weston) and the Director of Development (Mr. Panarese). His portfolio will include responsibility for induction of new staff and students, peer group support and behaviour management initiatives, pastoral care as a whole and professional development. We are looking forward to harnessing his talents when he returns to us enriched by eighteen months' experience at Sherborne, one of the leading Schools in England.

The strength of any school is, more than any other single factor, the collective strength of its staff and I wish to pay tribute to the very dedicated and highly skilled team that is the staff of this School. The boys are extremely fortunate to have such a talented, caring and hard working team serving them.

A feature of 1990 has been the calibre of and the contribution made by those who have joined the staff this year. There have

been fifteen of them. Miss Houston as a Curriculum Support Teacher, Mr. Cecins in Manual Arts, Messrs. Rutter, Polk and Waughray in English, Messrs. Lowe and Henderson in Economics and Accounting, Messrs. Scott and Ryan in Geography, Mr. Giles in Chemistry and Mr. Ashby in Physical Education. Added to these are Messrs. Dawkins, White, Barone-Scott and Marshall in the Junior School. They form a fine team of newcomers and we look forward to each further establishing himself strongly in our School and enjoying a long and rewarding stay. The one exception is Mr. Ryan, who came to us from South Africa and will take up a very senior position with the Australian Business College next month. We have greatly enjoyed having him with us this year and wish him well in his new venture.

At the end of Term One we farewelled Mr. Pontin when he took up a position at Mercy College after seventeen years teaching at Hale School. His intelligent, well reasoned and provocative approach to education and to teaching kept all of us thinking and questioning and his contribution to Hale School is much appreciated.

Tonight we farewell two others. Each is to move east to a promotional position. Mr. Greenwell to St. Peter's in Adelaide where he will be Assistant to the Deputy Headmaster and Mr. Maetam who will go to be Head of Chemistry at Canterbury College near Brisbane.

Mr. Greenwell has been on the staff of Hale School for eighteen years and his service during this period has been outstanding. As a talented classroom teacher, as an enthusiastic and highly accomplished sports coach, as a compassionate and astute Riley House Master and much else too, his contribution to Hale School has been enormous and we realise what a wrench it will be for his family and him to leave us. Mr. Maetam joined Hale in 1986. His teaching of Chemistry and his coaching of cricket, football and athletics have been of the highest order and he has been a most willing and valuable member of staff. We wish them both every success with their promotions. We shall certainly miss them.

In September, Mr. Lock led a group of twelve boys on a tour to Leningrad and Moscow where they were guests of The Kontrast Youth Commercial Centre. The adventure proved to be a profound experience for all who went. Very happy times were had with the Russian hosts, friendships were formed, a very different culture was tasted and the realisation made, that for all of the different circumstances and backgrounds, people are people and respond warmly to the extended hand of friendship.

I am hopeful that this established link can be forged in the years that lie ahead. We look forward to welcoming a group of fourteen from Leningrad to Perth, and Hale, next month and having a second Hale School contingent going there next October. It is a unique opportunity.

The Year Elevens again went to Exmouth for their fortnight in the outdoors. The challenges, variety, balance and setting of the programme, that has been further developed and refined by Mr. Heibner and Mr. Gray, are providing a wonderful and memorable experience for the boys. The Exmouth tradition is building strongly.

This report would not be complete without reference to this year's Cygnet. It is one of the finest productions of its kind that I have seen and our thanks go to Mr. Hopkins for his extraordinary efforts and to the Cygnet Committee, led by Jeremy Rosenthal.

1990 has been another good year for Hale School and this is because so many different people from so many different areas have played their part and made such a willing contribution. Mr. Cruickshank and the Board of Governors, the teaching staff as I mentioned before, the 103 other employees of Hale School, too, the Old Boys' Association and its Committee, the Foundation and its many supporters. The Parents & Friends and Ladies' Auxiliary, parents — present, past and future — and, of course, the boys. My sincere and heartfelt thanks go to you all for being part of the institution named Hale School; and my best wishes for a joyful Christmas and a happy and fulfilling 1991. I am glad that the School year is at its end, but I guess that I shall be looking for the challenges for Hale School for 1991 by Monday, or maybe it will be by Monday week.

Captain of School's Term Reports

Term 1, 1991

The first term of 1991 has been extremely successful and achievements on the whole have been of the highest standard. In all areas, including academic, cultural and sporting abilities, Hale's enthusiasm and participation has been well rewarded.

The summer sports' season has been extremely fruitful and we can all look back on it now with a great deal of pride. The highlights of the season were, of course, the magnificent performances by our swimmers and rowers, who thoroughly deserved their victories after putting in months of dedicated training.

On the night, the swimmers, under the leadership of Tom Plant, combined brilliantly and swam solidly all evening to beat Christ Church and Wesley. The latter kept in touch with Hale in most events, but the Hale swimmers proved to be too consistent and pulled away from Wesley and Christ Church to win the Tregonning Cup. The winning margin was 46 points. It was a tremendous team effort, but I would like to make special mention of Rob Wiley, who did not lose an event in his age group and also Hamish Jooste, who swam up a year and virtually won all of his races. It was also pleasing to see such a large number of supporters and I'm sure the swimmers were helped immensely by their encouragement.

The First VIII rowers, stroked by Captain of Boats, Dave Porzig, went into the Head of the River as favourites. Although they did not start as well as they would have liked, they took the lead at the 500m mark and from there did not look back. Hale was able to maintain its lead to the finish line and won convincingly by a boat length from Guildford and Scotch (much to the delight of the Hale supporters). This year represents the first time that Hale has won both the swimming and the rowing in the same season, since 1983.



This statement may be unfair to the cricketers who went through the season undefeated. After being poised in a good position at the halfway point of the season, the First XI was unlucky not to win the Darlot Cup. A draw early in the season with the eventual winners, Wesley, and a tied match with Guildford, in which the middle and lower order batsmen brought the side tantalisingly close to victory, proved costly. In the final standings, Wesley won the Cup by 10 points from Hale, who finished an unlucky second.

The First V basketballers' hopes of winning the Blackwood Cup were crushed by losses to eventual winners, Guildford, and Aquinas in the last two games of the season. Captain Mark Heath led from the front by scoring over 100 points in the season, but the Hale team was unable to achieve a higher position than equal third with Christ Church.

In a trying season, the First VIII tennis team had only one win, against Guildford. Although the team line-up was of consistent ability, indicated by the success of the Second VIII, it was unable to match the many experienced State and tournament players representing the other Schools. As a result, the tennis team finished a gritty seventh.

Outside the sporting arena, Hale has also been very active academically and culturally. In debating, the Hale Senior W.A. Debating League team has encountered mixed fortunes, with one win against St. Mark's and a loss to Scotch. However, led by Jeremy Rosenthal, the Debating Society is very busy and has a record number of members taking part this year. Hale is also fielding Year 11 and Year 12 teams in the Mock Trial Competition this year. To date, the Year 11 team lost its first trial narrowly, whilst the Year 12 side won convincingly. On the 16th March, Hale hosted the Annual State Allegro Chess Competition in the Music Centre and although the results have not yet been established, the Hale players are confident of having done reasonably well.

Rehearsals have started in earnest for this year's School Play, "Roundhouse", which is a re-make of one of Mr. Hopkins' earlier works. Once again, many boys and staff will be involved in the cast and set work for the Play, which promises to be once again the cultural event of the year.

Term 2, 1991

In general, we have done well during the last two terms and it is obvious that those who have tried hard in the aspects of School life have had satisfying results. As I speak, a group of about twenty lucky Year 12s are enjoying themselves, despite the weather, at Rottnest in the Reafforestation programme. A full semester's hard work and preparation have gone into the programme and the planting of some 200 young trees has had an end result of reserving the beauty of this favourite holiday spot.

The first three Exmouth groups returned a few days ago and the whole experience up North will have benefited them greatly. I am sure that they have enjoyed the ten days of hiking, abseiling and rafting and that the groups to follow will enjoy the hardships as well. I also advise the Year 11s who are still waiting to go up, not to listen to what those who have returned say about some of the activities, since, more often than not, what they say is the truth!

The School play, "The Round House", which was written and directed by Mr Hopkins, began on the 29th May and was the highlight of Term 2. The 100 boys involved in the production did well to perform at their best throughout what was a hectic week for them, beginning with a preview for the rest of the School at assembly. The many boys who participated were led by Mark Hopkins who played the evil John Schoales, Martin Vinton who was Captain Kenealley and Scott Trudgian who acted the part of Just Johnny. Whilst on the topic of drama, I must mention the excellent production of "The Birds" by the Senior School Drama Club performed over the past two nights.

Hale was also involved in quite a few community events, including the Red Cross blood donations on the 4th and 5th of

June. Fund raising events included a collection by the boys of Riley House for Princess Margaret Hospital for Children two Sundays ago and a rather disappointing collection for the 40 hour famine. Mention must be made of the visit by Lady Burt on behalf of the Red Cross to award Hale for its fine money-raising effort in the door-knock in first term.

On the competitive side of things, Hale's start to the winter's sport season has been sound. The cross-country runners under the leadership of State runner. Damon Broom, have had a disappointing season so far, only winning one of their races. They have been hindered by the loss two of their best runners to Exmouth.

The footballers, led by Brenton Hantke, have won four games from their six. With good wins over Aquinas and Wesley, Hale is currently equal top with three other schools - Scotch, Wesley and Aquinas - who have also won four games.

The First XI soccer team, led by Dave Waddell and strongly supported by Julius Waters, Alan Gibson and Steven Papadopoulos, are in third position after the six games so far. They have won four games, lost one and have had one draw against the competition leaders, Trinity. This is an obvious improvement in Hale's performance in the soccer competition and things look encouraging for the rest of the season.

With only four PSA fixtures remaining in term three, all sides will be looking to come out of the holiday break with energy and determination to win the remaining games.

Last Sunday, the Old Haleians' winter sport day was held. Although competing with the Eagles Match for the presence of Old Boys, the day was a great success. The Old Boys got the better of their younger opponents in most of the sports, although the hockey players managed to obtain a creditable 2-all draw. The footballers, on the other hand, were comprehensively downed, although Peter Hollywell did well to stop his father from scoring too many times at full forward. The rugby players were defeated by 9 points and in the soccer, the rather incomplete Old Boys' side managed to win 3-2.

In a less physical side of competition, Hale has done well this term in chess, bridge, debating and the mock trials. Junior and senior teams are well placed in the Inter-School Chess Competition at this early stage. Meanwhile, in bridge, the Year 12 team has won once and lost once, whilst the Year 11 team has won their only game so far.

In debating, the mock trial team were knocked out in the second round after a promising start against Mirrabooka.

Last, but definitely not least, I would like to thank the mothers of the Ladies' Auxiliary for attending this assembly and for the support you give the School.

Term 3, 1991

Term 3 has flown by at the rate of knots. Although the term has passed quickly, the boys of Hale have had a rather hectic time, both in their cultural and sporting pursuits.

A cavalcade of sporting events dotted the Term 3 calender and these ranged from the conclusion of the winter sport season to the very short, but rewarding, athletics season. To be honest, the School lacked the successes of previous seasons, but it is fair to say that all of Hale's competitors tried their best and that is all that can be asked of them.

Captain Brenton Hantke, centreman Callan Castledine, backman Peter Holywell and ruckman Quentin White, all received Colours for excellent seasons.

The 1st XI hockey players played well to finish third in their respective competition. Captain Simon Barrett was outstanding throughout the season and was well supported by Kirk Wilks, Mike Babon and goalie, Adam Pinto.

The rugby players played their best season for many years and had the most success of the winter sports teams. They came a highly creditable second behind an unbeaten Trinity team. Earlier in the season, Hale won the State Sevens Rugby Competition, which shows the undoubted skill of the team. However, the season was not without drama. Tom Plant, the Captain of Rugby, had his leg broken in the last tackle of the match against Trinity and was unable to complete the season.

The soccer team was the biggest improver in winter sport this year. Led by Dave Waddell and ably backed up by Alan Gibson and Steven Papadopoulos, the team finished in third position.

In this year's Inter-School Athletics, Hale improved by two positions on last year's performance to finish fourth. Damon Broom has mentioned the individual performances of the day, but I would like to point out that it was a team effort to achieve the creditable position. Perhaps we would have reached third or second if the athletes had received the support they deserved, but I expect many of those who didn't turn up to support had prior engagements with the television and the Eagles.

As you have heard, a lot of sport was packed into a not so long term, but Hale students were also involved in other activities. This year's Prefects' Dance, held after the last sport fixture, proved to be extremely successful. More than 500 people attended the Egyptian evening and judging from what ballgoers have said, thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

The term also saw the end of the season for the Societies of the School. Niall Pigott and his fellow chess players enjoyed a reasonable amount of success in their State Competition. Both junior and senior teams finished fourth. A Years 8 and 9 competition was also played this term and Matthew Pudovskis of Riley House won that.

Hale also entered two teams, an A and a B side, in the Bridge Competition, which was run in similar fashion to that of the chess. In this competition, the Hale teams did well with the A team finishing third and the B team finishing fifth.

The Debating Society similarly have reached the end of their season. The senior team, under Jeremy Rosenthal, did not make it into the finals, but the Year 9's and 10's enjoyed some success. On the subject of debating, the Inter-House Debating final was held three weeks ago between Riley and Parry Houses. The young Riley House team of Chris Jones, David Leigh and Stephen Ford, managed to out talk Parry on the topic "That we should beat our swords into plough shears". The lack of support was the only downer in the debate and I hope that it will be better attended next year.

Mid-term, the Hale community was treated to seven plays performed by members of seven houses. The plays, besides being good for a laugh, were good, or bad, indicators depending on your point of view - of the level of acting ability in the School.

The Year 11 North West Cape Programme concluded this term, when the last groups returned from Exmouth. The experience included a lot of hiking, although the major differences from last year appeared to be that this year's Year 11's had it easy for the dreaded Mandu Mandu walk, which was spaced out over two days. Also a lot more time was spent out from the base camp, which was this year at Bullara Station, instead of the Air Force Base, as it was last year.

Looking forward into the fourth term, the main thing in the back of most people's minds, particularly Year 12's, is the exams. With T.E.E. looming ominously just five or so weeks after the start of term, the holidays look like being a good time to study up on the weaknesses alluded to by the trial examinations.

Once again, it's great to see the mothers supporting the School, as always, and also to see the Junior School here at assembly. I hope that you all enjoy your holidays.






"Our time at The Geelong College provided the security for settling in Australia," Mr Shaw said.

Mr Tom Mitchell


Tom Mitchell joined the Chemistry Staff of Hale at the Start of 1991.

Valedictory Speech

On first being asked to deliver this speech, I was left a little bemused: what was to be the content of my discussion? It was suggested that I should initially investigate previous speeches in order to gain some ideas, but in doing so, it dawned on me that I would be doing the class of 1991 a great injustice. For our year, Year 12 of 1991, is unique, just as each of other years have been. It was clear to me that this is the epilogue of the story of our lives at Hale School, whilst at the same time, a prologue to the ensuing new chapter of our lives; an address of marvellous memories and of exciting prospects.

Today marks the end of a most wonderful period of our lives and I say that, knowing full well that the past twelve years have not all been smooth sailing and, to use my earlier adjective, wonderful. Yet, though we now come to the end of one stage of our lives, conversely we are now beginning another: life after school. Strangely enough, it has been these past twelve years and, more importantly, the last five which have determined our destinies for life after school. Who would have thought of this, way back on the 3rd February, 1987 - the day when most of us came together for the very first time? Our presence, it seemed, was as significant as a single grain of sand on a long, sandy beach. For some the event was somewhat overawing: for others, merely a change of routine. If we could have turned the clock back some seven years prior to that day, when thirteen young boys arrived at school for the very first time, the differences weren't all that great. Simon Barrett, Cameron Blackwell, Glen Giles, Peter Kakulas, Gregan McFarlane, Brett Pateman, Adam Pinto, Dion Seragusana, Justin Sharbanee and myself, all deserve special mention for surviving the past twelve years without serious mishap and each can look forward to the future with great anticipation.

Whilst I will attempt to use as few cliches as possible, it is true that those first seven years positively flew by, and the past five have been no different. No doubt the longest term in our school careers was the inaugural one of our secondary life. I speak, of course, of Term 1, Year 8. It was a period of definite change and adjustment, especially for the boarders. Some of the stories which leaked from that sector of school society, be they true or not, certainly secured my fate of remaining a day boy for the full five years. And it was at this stage that those most important friendship bonds between boarders and day boys were being developed; the establishment of these is paramount in creating a year group's unity.

Term 1, 1987 was not only a time to meet new students, but also a time to encounter the new members of staff with which we had to contend. The sight of Mr. MacMillan in full flight against "those boys from the Junior School" was simply frightening; the Deputy Head was just one new face in many to which we soon became accustomed.

All of a sudden Year 8 had gone and 1988 was beckoning. Year 9 was a new experience for all of us: no longer were we the "insignificant ones" as we watched a new fleet of first years enter the top flight. And no longer were the endless clouds of chalk dust surrounding Mr. Biddle's classroom new to us, or the two deadly straight lines of students outside N4 amusing. We had now become familiarised with Hale School life; and its characters. 1988 was also the year of the great Shane Cassey and his athletics captaincy. What a pity it was that we could not go one better than the previous year and take the Athletics Championship for the first time in almost fifty years. It is, unfortunately, a prize which has still managed to escape us. The "glory" of second year life was not to last, however, and it was not long before we arrived at what was the most important stage of our school careers to date: Year 10 and the Junior. 1989 was a change in many respects. Not only was more expected of us academically, but also on the sporting fields, as the opportunities for first team representation arose for those who were good enough. Also in 1989, we were graced by the arrival of a new Headmaster, Mr. Inverarity, following the retirement of Dr. Tregonning at the end of 1988. I, along with twenty-five or so others, was lucky enough to discover the true teaching qualities of our new Headmaster, first hand. Taking control of the Year 10A Mathematics class, Mr. Inverarity's wealth of knowledge was not only accurately taught, but also excellently displayed by his enigmatic descriptive powers, which enabled us to visualise the infamous parabola and trigonometric curves with ease. In the same year, we were introduced to the Deputy Head of the classroom (during times of the Headmaster's

absence) and he proved to be a man who never seemed to fulfil his one hundred thousand dollar promises, or ever clearly explain that mystifying zoo-train! In all seriousness, however, the high quality of teaching exhibited by our Head and Deputy Head is not restricted to those two alone; the whole teaching staff display similar qualities and it is a tribute to Hale School that such a high standard can be maintained throughout. Certainly the Class of 1991 owes much thanks to them.

1990 not only marked the start of a new decade, but also signalled the beginning of yet another stage in our school careers. Year 11 was definitely a new experience for all of us.

Obviously, the best memory of which we all should share from 1990 is, of course, the two week Exmouth camp. The expedition, then in its second year, was the greatest outdoor experience of which I have been a part and I'm sure I can speak for all in saying that it was an excursion which will be hard to forget. The fondest memory I have of those two weeks was the sight of a most courageous Paul Pudovskis overcoming his fear of heights by scaling the side of what was apparently, Charles Knife Ridge. My apologies to Paul for leading the group up the wrong cliff face!

It was not long, however, until Year 12 came along and well, here we are. It was hard to believe some nine months ago that we were officially "top dogs" of the school and it is even harder to believe how quickly we have arrived to this, our own Valedictory Day. Despite the year's rapidity, much has occurred over the last nine months of which we all can be proud. Taking out the swimming and the rowing was a fantastic result, not only for the school, but especially for those Year 12s who had worked so hard in either of these fields of sport. Yet though sport has been an integral part of our lives at Hale, the realisation of the academic challenge which lay ahead of us meant that 1991 was to be a most busy year. A busy year it certainly has been, and a most memorable one at that. Who could forget Mr. Hughes' recital of Gwen Harwood's poem "A Simple Story"? It was a piece of lyrical genius which even had his fellow members of the English Literature Department left gasping for air. Whoever said that their subject lacked humour? And how could I not mention this year's House Football Grand Final? I will try not to be critical, but it is true that Robert Campbell's action in the last seconds of that match was a piece of play that would have left his outspoken coach of the 1st XVIII screaming to the skies. Ironically, however, Robert was one of Riley's best performers on the day, and it was not long after this disappointment that he led the one point losers to victory in the Rugby Sevens.

It definitely has been a most active year, with a mixture of academic and sporting pursuits high on everyone's agenda. But if I have learned anything over the past five years, it must be the important link that has to be maintained between cultural and sporting activities. The best example of this came at perhaps the most crucial two weeks of our school lives; during the Trial TEE. Commitment to both examinations and to athletics was a practice which was handled well by all Year 12s. The school should be commended for encouraging this blend of both sport and studies, which, in most cases, will lead to greater success.

Tomorrow, we leave this outstanding institution - an institution which, perhaps, most of us have taken for granted - and then we step into the after-life. No longer will we be safe in the security of school; the TEE and the big wide world await us. I hope that the lessons of the past five years will not go unheeded, for memories of our lives at Hale should never be forgotten. I see in this room before me, many budding doctors, lawyers, engineers, scientists, mechanics, and even farmers.

May each of you here achieve your highest aspirations, remembering that it is up to the individual, and no one else, to achieve. Hale School has provided for all of us the greatest opportunity to achieve and I hope every one of us can leave this school with the knowledge that we all have done so, to the best of our abilities.

I wish all the members of the Class of 1991 the best of success in the ensuing TEE and in whatever you may attempt in the future. Leaving you on a note of sadness, yet contrastingly, with a tinge of happiness and excitement, I would like to thank Hale School, on behalf of all Year 12s, for the experiences that we all have shared.





During the summer months, the House was well represented in Hale's "first" teams. These include Ryan Stewart in Basketball, Danny Robinson and David Offer in Tennis.





As term three drew to a close and Stewart Johnson's finger began to grow back onto his hand after an unfortunate woodworking accident, the only major competitive fixture that





In this Competition, he finished first of the W.A. runners, when he came in eighteenth, just 18 seconds behind the winner and ahead of a further 232 runners. Damon's outstanding ability as a runner and his great determination in races is underscored by his quiet and unassuming manner. Damon has been an asset to Parry over his five years in the Senior division of the School.

It featured Niall Pigott and Martin Vinton heading a talented cast of Callan Castledine, Robert Shilkin, Tim Markham, Justin Sharbanee, Joss Pettitt and Keegan Crage. The play compared well to the other Houses and was enjoyed by all on the night.

Parry fielded an eager and equally talented team in the House Debating Competition. The combination of Niall Pigott, Glen Giles and Robert Shilkin looked destined to claim victory after comfortably beating their rivals to move straight into the finals. However, these wins proved academic when, in the final, they suffered a narrow loss at the hands of a younger Riley team.

While representatives from Parry tusselled in the cultural fields, the others chose the sports grounds as their battlefield. Unfortunately, the winter sports games did not see the same success as achieved in the hotter months. In the Football, Parry's Junior team competed well to come third. The Senior team was plagued by injuries and rarely was at full strength. They finished sixth, which meant that Parry finished a creditable fourth in the overall Football tally. The Hockey improved from last year to finish fifth, fractionally behind fourth and third place.

The Soccer had a sensational season and went beyond all expectations. Influential in this result was Alan Gibson, who received Colours for his efforts.

The pressure for the Cock House Cup mounted as the Athletics Carnival, the final event on the sporting calendar, would be the deciding factor in who would win the Cock House Cup. The Parry team single-handedly carried out their Housemaster's instructions: "....just beat Buntine!"

These words proved inspiring and at the end of the day, Parry ran away winners with Buntine second. Perhaps, fittingly, Brenton Hantke accepted the T.F. Hantke Cup from his grandfather in a poetic scenario.

Looking back, the records will succinctly say that Parry House was winner of the Cock House Cup in 1991. However, this does not capture the genuine House spirit and determination which was revived this year after floundering in the past. Much of the credit for this can be placed on the shoulders of Mr. Biddle, Brenton Hantke and the Year 12s as a unit.

Hopefully, next year the House will learn from previous losses and this year's victory and be able to reiterate the success.



Early in the year, the School Prefects for 1991 were inducted and it was great to see Rob Campbell as the new Captain of School. Rob is the first Riley House Captain of School since O.W. Walsh twenty years ago in 1971! Justin Quinlan was elected Captain of Riley House.

Summer sports for Riley, unfortunately, were not too successful. In the Inter-House Swimming Carnival, Riley achieved an overall fifth place. This was, however, not an indication of the whole House effort - there were some excellent swims from Josh Hodby and Zak Nelson. The team sports played this summer were largely enjoyed by all team members. The T Ball was captained by Daniel Harris and the Juniors played a hard season to finish in fifth place. Good games were played consistently by Matthew Grimsley, Ross Phillipson and Tim Mack. Their Senior counterparts, the baseballers, were most a Year 11 effort. 





Basketball



It was an impressive bowling and fielding effort, with the highlight being a five-wicket haul by Jock Wilberforce.

Our next game was against the highly talented Wesley side, played at their quick-paced pitch and outfield. The highlight of our impressive 300 plus total, was a brilliant century by Year 11 Robert Baker, who was finally dismissed for 111. Hale placed themselves in a winning position through consistent line and length bowling and good tight fielding, but we were unable to dismiss Wesley's tail-enders. This game was the best the team played all year and the drawn result did not reflect how well the team performed.

The game versus Christ Church was played in extremely hot conditions. Batting first, Christ Church set us a reasonable total. Our batsmen struggled for most of the day and the ninth wicket fell with the scores level. It was fitting that our Captain, Robert Campbell, hit the winning runs, for he batted throughout the innings in the extreme weather conditions to score 138.

The fourth game versus Trinity, once again saw Hale's bowlers cheaply dismiss the opposition. Hale quickly set about building a considerable first innings lead. With an outright win being a possible result, our bowlers, unlike the first innings, struggled to take wickets. A first innings win was the final result.

The next game against Guildford, was the most exciting of the season and was one of fluctuating fortunes for both teams. Guildford batting first, thanks mainly to Chris Mason, reached 250. Lusty, late-order batting by Jock Wilberforce enabled Hale to get close to their total. There was immense pressure when we were nine down, with one run required. Unfortunately, an l.b.w. decision went in Guildford's favour and the match was tied.

The final game of the season was against Aquinas. Batting first, Hale scored a reasonable total. Kirk Wilks hit form late in the season with two half-centuries. Once again our bowlers performed admirably to dismiss Aquinas cheaply, the pick of the bowlers being Justin Riley and Jock Wilberforce. With an hour remaining, the Year 12s were told to enjoy their last Darlot innings for the School.

This was a perfect ending to an undefeated season, which saw four wins, one draw and one tie. Later that night at Mr. and Mrs. Campbell's residence at the end of season wind up, Mr. Chadwick summed up the season by saying:

"Throughout the season many boys showed considerable improvements and it was a credit to themselves to complete an undefeated season."

The highlights of the season were the centuries by Robert Campbell and Robert Baker, the consistency shown by all the bowlers and the stylish keeping of Lynton Beagley, who took numerous catches and several quick stumpings. The depth of cricket at Hale was obvious in the lower grades. The 2nd XI won the majority of their games and the 3rd XI went through the season undefeated. This, combined with the remaining "Firsts", could well lead to a victorious season next year.





Rowing

1991 was a superb year in the history of the Cygnet Rowing Club. Winning the Head of the River for the nineteenth time since the race began in 1899 was our crowning achievement, but the season was studded with memorable occasions.

The 1st VIII's triumph was the culmination of hard work, dedication and a committed belief in themselves on the part of the crew and their coach, Mr. Jack Fischer. The rowers were privileged to benefit from Mr. Fischer's knowledge and experience — he is a current world champion in the veteran class. Individually, there were no outstanding stars in the boat, but Mr. Fischer moulded an almost unbeatable crew. We are enormously grateful to Mr. Fischer for giving us so much of his time and expertise.

The 1991 season also saw the re-introduction of the Cygnet Rowing Club Dinner, held in the Dining Hall on the Wednesday night before the Head of the river. The present crews from Years 9 to 12 joined with 90 Old Boys, ranging from the senior member present, Mr. Frank Le Souef of the 1930 crew, to last year's 1st VIII. Altogether, over 180 rowers enjoyed an evening of renewing friendships and anticipating the Head of the River to come. The evening included a most enjoyable auction of rowing memorabilia salvaged from the Boat Shed. Our thanks to Mr. Don Berryman for being a highly amusing and most successful auctioneer.

1991 proved to be the "year of the new boats". We finally took possession of our "plastic fantastic" honeycomb sandwich construction racing shell with a double skin of kevlar carbon fibre. It is extremely light — about 30 kgs lighter than a conventional timber hull — and absolutely rigid. True to tradition, as happened in 1971 and 1983, the 1st VIII took out the Head of the River in a new boat. After the Hale Regatta, the boat was christened the "Pat Trouchet" by Mrs. Trouchet in honour of her husband, a great coach of the past. Thanks to some vigorous fund raising, the Cygnet Rowing Club managed to purchase another four, which will be used for House rowing. This new boat has been named the "Steve Varty" as a gesture of appreciation for Mr. Varty's interest in and support for the rowers.

One of the highlights of the 1991 fund raising was the wine tasting evening, organised by Mr. and Mrs. Samson. Goundrey Wines provided the wines for the evening and rowing mothers provided the accompanying snacks. The venue was the Cygnet Hall balcony, overlooking Matilda Bay, which on a warm, still summer's evening, provided a superb location for such an event. It was an enjoyable evening for all who attended, the bonus being that over \$2,000 was raised for Rowing Club funds.

A fund raising event with a difference proved to be the Long Row, in which the 1st and 2nd VIIIs participated. Most of the rowers were sponsored per kilometre by enthusiastic supporters and during the course of the morning's rowing, a total of approximately 50 kilometres was covered. The 2nd VIII are now the proud owners of a "cox box" speaker system as a result of this hard work.

The season did not, however, consist entirely of special events. The regular routine of demanding training began, as always, with our rowing camp, attended by some 60 boys, from January 20th to 26th. Once term began, for most crews, five practice sessions per week — usually at 5.30 a.m. — were the norm. Learning to endure the physical stress of a hard race was experienced on our set of three Concept II ergometers. The Year 8 rowers showed particular promise this year. In their debut regatta against Scotch in Freshwater Bay on March 15th, the Hale A8 and C8, both beat their Scotch counterparts by a length each and our B8 went down by just half a length. The future looks bright.

The 1991 Rosser Pairs Championship was held. Ten pairs competed and the winners were Michael Coote (Haynes) stroke, Andrew Fowler (Loton) bow with Mitchell Burges (Loton) Coxswain.

In conclusion, I would like to thank those many people who have given much time in helping and supporting the Rowing Club. Our thanks go to Mr. Don Wright (Boatman), Mr. Fischer, Mr. Goater, Mr. Kenny, Mr. Chappell, Mr. Bird, Mr. Berryman, Mr. Booth, Mr. Adams, Mr. Simpson, Mr. Arkle, Mr. Lowe, Mike Roe, John Silbert, Tim and Nick Flavel, David Booth and Grant Shillington. I would specifically like to mention Mr. Bean for his unstinting encouragement of all rowers and coaches. Finally, thanks to all those Old Boys who gave us such tremendous support at the Head of the River, even going so far as to hire the small plane which flew over with the message "Oh Hale — you Beaut — Go for it!"

The Hale 1st VIII began the 1991 season by winning the demanding 5km long distance race, the now traditional curtainraiser to the P.S.A. Rowing season. Rating 28 strokes per minute, Hale in this event began to develop the powerful long strokes consistently maintained under pressure, which were to become the best feature of our rowing. The time set was 16 minutes 46 seconds, a new course record, and we were comfortably clear of second-placed Guildford, 17 seconds astern.

For the next few weeks, consolidation of length in the water, with good technique and the further development of our endurance, was the order of training. Regattas were to be regarded as a relatively unimportant interruption in the programme.

In the first 2,000 metres race of the season at the Aquinas Regatta, Christ Church won — and we rowed steadily into third place. At the Scotch Regatta, rating only 27 over the full distance, we finished fourth, 5 seconds behind the winners from the host School.

The Wesley Regatta was a glorious day for Hale. Both the 1st and 2nd VIIIs won with apparent ease. The First's combination of fluent rhythm with full power and low rating, which generated plenty of run between strokes, gave us a comfortable win.

This win set our pattern for the rest of the season. At the Trinity Regatta we moved through the field to take the lead at the 1,000 metres mark. Rating 30 over the second 1,000 metres, untroubled by higher-rating rivals, we won by 3 seconds.

At the Hale Regatta, we won similarly by 10 seconds, rating 29 strokes per minute. Only Guildford presented a genuine danger. This was our first row in our brilliant new boat, the Sykes-built carbon fibre kevlar shell, some 30 kgs lighter than our conventional timber shell, bought in 1983. The new boat, the "Pat Trouchet" could not have had a better debut.

The Head of the River itself, was raced into a holding northeasterly breeze and incoming tide, so the time was slow — 5 minutes 56 seconds. We took the lead at the 1,000 metres mark and still rating only 30 strokes per minute, shook off the desperate attack of Guildford, who fought tenaciously to the line. The 1991 1st VIII had become the 19th Hale School crew to win the Head of the River since its inception in 1899.



Football

The team also sincerely thanks the Hantke's especially, the Castledine's and parents, for the tremendous endof-season party at the Hantke home. In Callen Castledine, Peter Holywell and Rob Campbell, we had three enthusiasts for Hale football and in Brenton Hantke, a top Captain, who always gave his best and led very much from the front. Finally, I thank all the players for battling on through a long and demanding season.

The 2nd XVIII did not enjoy as much success as in other years. Again coached by Mr. Lange, its football was also inconsistent and the team, Captained by Andrew Fowler, won five and lost five. Mr. Hunn's 3rd XVIII played some fine games and lost some narrowly, for a four to six winning ratio. This team, Captained by Rennie Haslinger, is most grateful to Mr. Hunn and wishes him well in his future at Seton College. Mr. Campbell worked very hard with the 10A's and deserved better results. And so, is there a lesson for us all? As usual, there were plenty of examples of fine sportsmanship this year. As important, probably more so, remains the need for all players to demand the utmost of themselves during the whole season. In the modern (almost jargonistic) era, we often hear coaches/players claiming success because "we stuck to our game plan". To me this is often rubbish! Boris Becker may have done better against countryman Michael Stich at Wimbledon if he had indeed not stuck to his game plan. He should have changed from trying to blast his opponent off the court, to slowing the game right down.

As stated so often, football is on the day - a special day demands changing tactics or positions or beliefs or a different game plan from last week or last quarter. Players should be prepared as totally as possible for a variety of situations. Creating good skill habits, adopting the adage that perfect practice makes perfect, being double-sided in one's game (wrong-hand handball remains a most lethal weapon), emphasising the reflex aspects of football, being a so-called tagger, even if you are not one officially, being happy to play anywhere and to fight on in every quarter of every game as if there is no "tomorrow", are all crucially important. After the first six games, Hale had won four and lost two. We realised we had to win the remaining four fixtures to have any bearing in the deciding of the Hockey Cup. With this in mind, training was conducted throughout the term holidays. Training was of a high standard and well attended, due to the fierce competition between some seconds players trying for a likely position in the firsts. Also during the holidays, the 1st XI played the Oldboys. It was a very entertaining game with the end result being a 2-all draw.

Trinity ventured to Hale and both teams had high hopes of consolidating their chances for the Cup. The game itself was of a very high standard, despite the Nil-all scoreline at the end of seventy minutes. Our chances for a successful season were lost at the muddy Aquinas ground. Hale was the more dominant team, but could not convert numerous chances. On the other hand, Aquinas was able to take full advantage and score several breakaway goals. Aquinas won the game, 3-2.

Despite having no chance of winning the competition, Hale was determined to end the season well by winning the remaining two games. Our second last game was against the bottom side, Guildford, played at Hale. We started the game poorly and soon found ourselves one goal down, but started to control the game via the mid-field players and finished 3-1 winners. Hale's final game of the 1991 season was against arch rivals, Scotch, played at their grass playing fields. Scotch required a win or a draw to win the Hockey Cup outright. This was an added incentive for the team. It was obvious that Hale was the more determined side on the day and was rewarded with a 2-1 win. This game was the best the team performed all year and was a great way to end the season. With this win over Scotch, we prevented them from winning the Hockey Cup outright, for Trinity and Scotch were tied for first on 16 points each.

In three seasons of 1st XI hockey, Simon Barrett has played many fine games, but none better than his last game against Scotch. He totally dominated the game and was largely responsible for the team's victory. Simon Barrett and Cameron Blackwell showed great leadership and many times led by example throughout the season as Captain and Vice-Captain respectively. Kirk Wilks and Simon Barrett were rewarded for their outstanding seasons by being selected in the Combined P.S.A. team.

The 1st XI did not have the services of any State players, but still proved to be a strong unit with a large amount of talent and team spirit. The team was well led by seven Year 12's and strongly supported by four Year 11's and two Year 10's. Special mention must be made of the 2nd XI, coached by Mr. Gray, who went through the season undefeated and had many crushing wins. With the 2nd XI consisting of many skilful, promising Year 11's, plus the remaining "firsts", a successful 1992 season is a possibility. Overall, Hale hockey performed well and showed great sportsmanship throughout all years. All hockey players would like to thank their coaches and "stand-in coaches" of individual teams from the 2nd XI down to the Year 8's.

The 1st XI season was best summed up by Mr. Jordan's words: "The team was very talented, skilful and extremely well led, but luck and a couple of close results didn't go our way." Despite not winning the Hockey Cup this year, it is a credit to all members of the team that we finished third. It was a talented team which was determined enough to win. This was evident in our rewarding victory in the last game against Scotch.

The entire 1st XI would like to thank both coaches, Mr. Jordan and Mr. Tremayne, for their expertise throughout the season, which varied from hard fitness training through to enjoyable training routines. They kept a positive attitude at all forty or so training sessions. A special thanks must also be conveyed to Mrs. Barrett, Mrs. Jordan and all the parents who showed great hospitality and support at all Hale's home games.

Rugby

The re-establishment of Hale Rugby as a major force in the P.S.A. competition continued to be the focus of our efforts during 1991. Renewed emphasis was placed on both coaching and parental support and a strong feeling of a positive future for the rugby community became apparent towards the end of the season. Whether or not future successes do ensue will be determined by how this current enthusiasm is subsequently channelled. Although the total number of boys playing rugby increased slightly from 92 in 1990 to 96 in 1991, the desired target of 120 is still some distance off.

For 1991, the Rugby Club is very appreciative of the considerable assistance from the newly formed support group, Rugby Union Supporters of Hale (RUSH). This group, consisting of "old boys" and parents, although still in an embryonic stage, will hopefully become the driving force behind the re-emergence of Hale rugby in the future. The Rugby Club welcomes the patronage of the Headmaster, Mr. Inverarity.

A second support group, Hale's Angels, consisting of an enthusiastic group of "Golden Oldies" rugby players, also provided a much needed stimulant to the re-growth of Hale rugby. The driving force behind this group, which has its sights on the 1993 World Tournament in Dublin, Ireland, is Bill Bosworth. The new Club Headquarters, Rugby-by-the Lake, was obtained through Hale's Angels and we are very grateful for this fine asset.

Another matter of general interest was the circulation to every player of the Hale Rugby Manual. This document contains most of the game details and student expectations demanded by Hale rugby, to guide each player to a successful playing career whilst at Hale. It is intended that this Manual will be updated each year.

1st XV

Not since 1982 has the 1st XV had such a successful year. Although Trinity became the 1991 Brother Redmond Cup holders, Hale scored more game points than any of the seven P.S.A. teams. In analysing the distribution of points, some interesting factors emerge. Of the twenty-one students who played one or more games in the 1st XV, only six actually scored points. The strength of the backline is reflected in that five of the six scorers played as backs. However, rugby is coached as a team game and it is often just the man at the end of the line that capitalises upon the efforts of the others. Nevertheless, it is very pleasing to note that some 22 tries (13 in 1990) were scored in the ten P.S.A. games.

Apart from some forced absences due to the North-West outdoor programme, the forward pack remained unchanged throughout the season. The outcome was a pack that steadily developed stability and coherence and did not lower its colours to anyone. Chris Fraser, Mark Parker and Simon Tan developed into a powerful front row and provided a strong platform for the tall second row of Elliott Rowton and David Porzig. The loose forwards of Gavin McKay, Steven Baillie, Matthew Chalmers and Leith Place, also developed steadily over the season, with strong tackling being a particular feature of their overall play. Chris Trethowan (left School) and Stuart Dickins (injured), also played in the forwards during the early part of the season. The team was certainly weakened by their later absence.

Anthony Burke at half was the initiator of many probing attacks down the blindside, but, more importantly, his strong passes out to Stephen Srhoj at stand-off half gave the talented backs room to manoeuvre. Robert Barugh at inside-centre, was the top try scorer (9 of the 22) in the team. Many of these were opportunist, with his uncanny but exceptional running style defeating not just his opposite number, but also half the opposing team as well. The Captain of Rugby, Tom Plant, held down the most difficult job in the backs, as both an attacking player and the prime defending tackler. It was tragic that he broke his lower leg in a tryline melee that almost saw Hale snatch victory from the eventual champions, Trinity. The outside backs of Sam McManis, Robert Eastwood, Michael Leggo and Stephen Gracie, scored 6 tries between them. Until his back injury, Stephen Gracie possessed such blistering speed that he quickly racked up 5 tries before he had to withdraw from the team. Martin Lynn, at fullback and later at outside-centre, displayed a rugby maturity well beyond his age. His points record for the season was very impressive - 2 tries, 10 conversions and 13 penalty goals - with an overall total of 67. After Martin shifted to the backline following Tom Plant's injury, Paul Broomfield was blooded (literally) into the 1st XV. His great courage and excellent sense of timing are very encouraging for the 1992 season.

2nd XV

It has always been difficult to develop team stability in the 2nd XV. Invariably, just as this is established, injuries to players in the 1st XV result in poaching from the 2nd XV. With this in mind, the 1991 2nd XV had a most successful season, much of this attributable to the careful coaching of ex-Zimbabwian, Lawrence Scott.

Of the squad of nineteen players, fourteen scored points for the team over the season. The most successful of these was Robert Eastwood, who was rewarded with three games in the 1st XV. Soccer

The 1991 season proved to be a very successful one for the Hale 1st XI, with the side obtaining third position in the Lawe-Davies Cup Competition. This position is particularly remarkable given the fact that this was only Hale's second season of fielding a 1st XI team. Mr. Bruce Blythe (one of Hale's Rent-a-Poms) coached the side extremely well in the first half of the season and his enthusiastic and knowledgeable approach had an immediate impact on an inexperienced team.

The season commenced with a 2-all draw with four-times Cup Champions, Trinity. This game gave an immediate indication of the improvement that Hale has made in the sport. This result was followed by a fine 2-0 win against a talented Aquinas side. Other wins against Scotch and Christ Church resulted in Hale finishing the first half of the season in second place in the Competition. Indeed, the only disappointment was a 1-2 loss to eventual Co-Competition winners, Wesley.

The second half of the season began with a new coach and another clash with Trinity. Hale eventually lost, 0-1, with the goal being scored just six minutes from the end of time. Hale absorbed tremendous defensive pressure in this game and the two central defenders, Alan Gibson and David Berg, were outstanding. Goalkeeper David Offer also made several fine saves. The next match against Aquinas produced a 1-4 loss, due to fifteen minutes of "lost" concentration and two crucial defensive errors. Highlighted in this game was the value of a competitive and tenacious midfield unit. Creative passing to the forwards, rather than successive long balls from the defence, produces results and Aquinas gave us a painful lesson. However, the 1st XI showed great resolve to bounce back with a 4-0 win against Guildford and the chastened midfielders led the way. A subdued, yet effective, win against Scotch in the last game completed a fine year for Hale.

The season record reads impressively: Played 10, won 6, drew 1, lost 3; 23 goals for, 12 goals against. 1st XI Captain, David Waddell, scored 8 goals and he proved a strong and effective forward all year. Alan Gibson was the best defender in the Competition and Hale's best player over the season. Steven Papadopoulos was the best passer of the ball in the team. All three have been awarded Colours for Soccer and their presence will be greatly missed next year. Added to this, of course, will be Mark Bredmeyer's determined forward play, Rome Chavapricha's profound enthusiasm, Julius Waters' skilful displays on a wing and David Offer's fast improving goalkeeping skills. I thank all of them for their considerable influence in raising the standard of Hale School Soccer.

Nevertheless, as the 1st XI contained four Year 10's who played regularly and the 2nd XI (which finished third in its Competition under the astute direction of Mr. Hughes) contained only one Year 12, Hale's Soccer future remains bright.

Finally, my sincere thanks go to all the coaches at Hale this year - Mr. Hughes, Mr. Shaw, Mr. Pengelley and Mr. Cecins - and, of course, to Mr. Lock, the Hale Manager and Master-in-Charge of Soccer. There has been a positive and cheerful atmosphere in all teams and the emphasis on enjoyment of the game is to be applauded. With the greater numbers that we now have and the greater depth that comes with it, the potential for Hale to become a force in the P.S.A. Soccer Competition is real.



The weekend prior to the P.S.A. meet was the annual two-way contest against Trinity. This year, because of problems with wet weather, the meet was transferred to Coker Park at Cannington. Coker Park is a synthetic track and so the move was extremely useful as a preparation for the Inters the following week. It is hoped that Hale will be able to use this venue again next year. The standard of the Trinity team was ominously obvious. Their throwers and distance people were extremely strong, while Hale held its own in the sprints, hurdles and jumps.

The final week of training is normally hectic, but this year the large number of injuries to key members of the Hale team made it even more so. Some relay teams were not finalised until the day of the meet, so widespread were the injuries.

A not-too-confident, and severely depleted, Hale team performed above expectations at the Inters to achieve a creditable fourth place. Not only was this result pleasing because of its unexpected nature and the improvement on 1990's sixth place, the dominance of Hale School's Under 14, 15 and 16 competitors promise a rosy future for athletics at Hale. All competitors tried hard and that in itself is something of which to be proud. However, some fine performances were achieved on the day. Adam Strong was outstanding in the Under 14 division. Oliver Foster led a strong charge in the Under 15 division with wins in the 100 and 200 metres and triple jump. Greg Scoble's and Michael Kelly's dominance of the throwing events were bonuses for Hale and Aaron Ford and Stuart Tangney both gained first places. Fine performances were turned in across all the events. Sprinters and hurdlers, middle distance runners and jumpers, all contributed valuable points to Hale's final tally. When the injury toll was taken into account and Hale's representatives were sometimes third stringers, the team is to be congratulated on an excellent performance.

So where to from 1991? The team has the potential to improve dramatically. Three areas need attention: A good pre-season is necessary if the high number of injuries is to be reduced; the skill levels in some of the technical events need to be improved and we must hope for continuing Year 8 intakes which possess the same high levels of athletic talent which has been evident in 1991

Finally, on behalf of the athletes, thanks must be extended to the coaches who gave so willingly of their time to prepare the team in such a short and hectic season and to the mothers who fed the officials at the various Carnivals. To all these people, thank vou!

Chess

The depth of talent in the Chess Club this year is reflected in the commendable achievements of Hale's teams at both Senior and Junior levels and in the State Allegro at the beginning of the year.

Again in first semester, Hale hosted the Junior State Allegro, held in the Music Centre. In a competition becoming more and more popular, over 130 players from the metropolitan area contested trophies in all age groups. While Hale had no outstanding performers on the day, both Max Bulloch and Aaron Kiddey finished a commendable equal third in their age group. For the rest of the players it provided a chance to show their skills at "speed chess", having the experience of practising with chess clocks during lunchtimes. These sessions were further complemented by the use of computers which provided players the opportunity to analyse their own games and pit themselves against a more unusual opponent.

In the Inter-School Competition, Hale entered two teams - a Senior team in the A division and a Junior team in the B division.

The A team had mixed fortunes in a tough competition dominated by the larger schools. The team consisted of Years 11 and 12 players - Niall Pigott, Michael Wiggins, Aaron Kiddey, Chris Roberts, Max Bulloch, Willie Ooi and Eric Ooi. The eventual placing of fourth reflected well the improved performance in the latter stages of the competition.

The B team, led by Captain Adam Wade, played consistently throughout the competition, often defeating much older teams and maintained a good chance of making the finals. However, two losses at the end of the season cost Hale its place. The final position of fourth does not reflect the determination of the younger players, nor the improvement shown by all members of the team.

Debating

Debating since the 1980s, under the auspices of Mr. Goldsmith, has been steadily growing in recognition, profile and student interest. So much so, that at the beginning of the new decade, in 1991, there was a record number of interschool debaters taking the floor for Hale.

Without a doubt, debating develops many useful skills in participants, all necessary in further life. Amongst these are confidence, clarity in speech, organisation of material, the ability to think on one's feet, working together as a team and obviously, adept public speaking skills. This, together with the fact that debates offer an opportunity to meet and mingle with students from other schools, helps to explain the Debating Society's recent surge in popularity.

The season started with a number of social debates against St. Mary's, P.L.C. and Perth College. The Juniors (Years 9 and 10) won two and lost one. The Seniors (Years 11 and 12) won three and lost one. These relaxed, informal debates helped the respective speakers hone their skills for the upcoming West Australian Debating League and Associated Heads of Independent Schools (Australia) Competitions.

During the course of the season, teams took the floor in each Year group, experiencing solid, if not outstanding, results.

The Year 8s, debating for the first time in their lives, performed well to record a two-two win loss record in the AHISA Competition. Having overcome their first year nerves, they should develop into a strong group of speakers. The large squad showed much promise.

In the WADL Competition, the Year 9s won two of five and in the AHISA, two of three. Adam Bick led the enthusiastic team and again, the large number of debaters augers well for the future.

"The Awesome Threesome" of Chris Jones, David Leigh and Steven Ford were the backbone of a polished group of Year 10 debaters, who went seven and three in the WADL and in the AHISA Competition, four and one. David Leigh is certainly the quickest speaking Hale debater in a long time. He and Steven Ford were selected in the State Debating Squad in mid third term.

The Year 11s, with Charles Miller and Robert Shilkin forming the nucleus of a large squad, were, unfortunately, knocked out of the AHISA in the first round. In the WADL they won six of ten debates. Competing in impromptu debates for the first time, next season's Year 12s will be a formidable combination. Charles Miller, in particular, should be congratulated for making the W.A. Debating Squad, along with the two previously mentioned.

Led by 1991 Captain of Debating, Jeremy Rosenthal, the Year 12s were disappointed that they only won three of five debates. Richard Sewell was elected Captain of the State Debating Team in first term, following the lead of Jeremy, who made that team last year. Strong performances also came from Greg Wheatley and Niall Pigott. Their result was a disappointing end to five seasons of debating from a team that has always been dominant.

The House Debating Competition for the Davy Shield began with all Houses attempting to dethrone the champion House, Haynes. Parry and Riley emerged in the final and in front of around fifty spectators in the Music Centre, the more experienced Parry side consisting of Glen Giles, Niall Pigott and Robert Shilkin, were unable to conquer their more youthful opponents, Chris Jones, David Leigh and Steven Ford. Congratulations to Riley, commiserations to Parry.

This year, Mr. Adams and Mr. Arkle have assisted in organising the teams and the Debating Society sincerely thanks these Masters for their time, effort and enthusiasm.

Above all, thanks to Mr. Goldsmith for his tireless efforts in coordinating the 1991 debating programme at Hale. The hours he puts in are phenomenal and every Hale debater thanks him and wishes him an enjoyable year in Scotland in 1992. Hopefully, the new year will bring both increased numbers involved in debating and increased success.

His able assistants, Brendan Cornish and Ryan Varley worked effectively in the execution of the lighting plot. David Manchester and Charles Miller were Mr. Van Oijen's capable sound assistants for the production.

Mr. Bill Stewart wrote a lovely score for the Play. The foreboding and threatening "G.J.I.s" and the up-tempo "Just Johnny", were chorus favourites, while the beautiful "Heart Song" was a delight. The "Swan River Colony Song" deserves greater exposure in the future and "Ford the Flood of Fear" touched a great number of people, as the many cards, telephone calls and requests for copies of the song indicated, in the post production period.


The 1991 Showband was exceptional. A demanding rehearsal schedule, involving most afternoons after School and House

sport, lunchtimes and Sundays, saw the Band attain a performance standard far beyond their Schoolboy status. Musical Director, Mr. Bernard Harvey, rated the Showband as the most technically correct and sensitive in their musical interpretation of some intricately scored songs, entr'acts and mood passages of music. For Andrew Lilleyman, Adam Pinto and Tim Markham, the 1991 Showband marked their fifth consecutive School Play (1987-1991). Theirs has been a remarkable commitment to the Showband and the School. So to the players — the 21 G.J.I.s (Government Juvenile

Immigrants) were the best chorus assembled at Hale since

"Reflections" (1984). They sang well, moved with real energy and were not frightened to experiment with ideas. There are many fine talents among this group, particularly Chris Meyer (the Lincolnshire Poacher), who sang with real panache. Many of these boys will, no doubt, make a significant contribution to the theatre at Hale in years to come. The six soldiers of the Sixty Third Regiment, were impressive in their uniforms and as they were all first time thespians, they grew in confidence and stature as the rehearsals proceeded. Their final presentation was disciplined and slick - they all looked superb in their handcrafted 19th Century moustaches. Andrew Benness (the Round House Cook) and Simon White (his apprentice), served excellent bread rolls, while Jeremy Padfield (the prisoner Nesfield), took a bloody beating in Act One. Michael Wiggins (Merchant Samson) and Murray Jones (his clerk, Hawcroft), developed effective characterisations, while Chris Jones ("Snoop" Murphy), displayed a talent for dramatic dialogue, particularly in the cell scene in Act Two.

Making his debut as Daniel Lynch (a condemned man), Greg Cumming paced his dialogue well and sang the lovely "Heart Song" with a real feel for the rhythms and a sensitive interpretation of the lyric line. Tom Plant (Lieutenant James Walsh), was excellent as the straight forward professional soldier, who did his duty, but still had an appreciation of the plight of the G.J.I.s. The difficult role of Captain Philip Keneally, the uncertain, indecisive Commander at the Round House, was undertaken by Martin Vinton. In previous years, Martin's specialty was comic characters and this was quite a challenge. Martin fought with the character of Keneally throughout rehearsals and eventually produced an effective characterisation. Scott Trudgian (Johnny, a boy with no surname), sang, danced and interpreted the character with great poise, charm and

genuine pathos. He is a considerable talent. Mark Hopkins' performance as the deep, dark man, John Schoales, Government Immigration Agent, was extraordinary. Rarely does an amateur performer achieve the levels of technical skill which Mark displayed in his portrayal of this character. Contrasting this with his comic flair and female impersonation skills seen last year as Horrie Castle and Miss Matilda Mutton in "Doubletake", there can be no doubt he is one of the Dramatic Society's most accomplished actors.

Mrs. Helen Vinton (almost single-handedly) organised the costumes and her contribution to the production cannot be underestimated. Mrs. Vinton deserves our praise and thanks.





"The Birds"

During the first semester, about twenty five students met on a regular basis to participate in Drama Club activities. They explored movement, mime and improvisation. They found out just how difficult it can be to try and recreate, on stage, which would be believable to an audience.

They progressed rapidly - so rapidly, in fact, that I felt it was important for them to put their developing skills to the test through the medium of a public performance. I selected "The Birds" because it would enable the students to apply the movement skills they had learned through the use of masks and, at the same time, explore an issue that has concerned thinking people for two thousand years, the concept of freedom.

The original text was written by Aristophanes, the great Greek playwright, and it has undergone countless revisions. We used the version developed by Tony Nicholls, a local playwright. His text was very funny, topical and slightly outrageous. With some heavy pruning and adaptation, we ended up with a fast paced show, which was just long enough for our young performers, many of whom were performing for the first time.

I also chose to use the Music Centre for our performance venue, as it is a pleasant, intimate space with a functional lighting grid. This posed some interesting problems, as it has no formal acting area, wings or back stage space. Fortunately at Hale, thanks to the dedicated work of Mr. Hopkins, we are well endowed with sets, costumes and props, so the raw materials for a theatrical conversion were readily available. The result was a pleasingly informal, yet functional performing area, as can be seen in the photographs.





Our colourful masks were made by Jerry Parkinson, a retired school teacher, who has at last found time to indulge in his favourite pastime, dabbling in theatrical design. The sets were painted and many of the larger props created by two reliable year ten students, Ryan Varley and David Manchester, ably assisted by our lighting trainee, Robert Creasey.

I was delighted by two aspects of the production. The first being the manner in which the boys committed themselves so co-operatively to the discipline of rehearsal and the second being the way the various families provided so much time and support. It made the whole project such a pleasant experience for me.

The audience response was very enthusiastic and a number of people, whose opinion in these matters I respect, were impressed by the quality of the boys' performances.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Headmaster, Mr. Inverarity for his constant interest and encouragement, Mr. van Oijen for his advice on lighting and Mr. Harvey for the thoughtful manner in which he shared the facility.



1991 Australian Mathematics Competition Results

The annual Australian Mathematics Competition (sponsored by the Westpac Banking Corporation) was held on 30th July in the Memorial Hall and various other school venues for students in Years 8 to 12. This year, 292 students from Hale School entered the Competition, out of approximately 400,000 students Australia wide. The breakdown of awards is shown below:-

Mock Trial

In 1991, Hale took part in the Law Society's Annual Schools' Mock Trial Competition for the second consecutive year. Year 11 and Year 12 teams were entered.

In a mock trial, a hypothetical legal case is presented to two schools, one taking the plaintiff's case and the other the defendant's. Having prepared their arguments, the two teams meet at a law court, witnesses are sworn in and then the testimonies begin.

Barristers must open and close their respective cases, as well as cross-examine the opposing witnesses, trying to disprove their argument by conclusive questioning and interrogation.

Witnesses must recall testimonies and be able to fend off the best efforts of opposing barristers.

Solicitors, court orderlies and magistrate's clerks, contribute in smaller, but no less important, ways.

In Hale's first trial, both teams were faced with the task of convicting a man accused of stealing five dollars' worth of shaving cream from K-Mart. The Year 12s, led well by barrister Jeremy Rosenthal, defeated Mirrabooka Senior High School convincingly, by five points. Despite the best efforts of witness Simon Tan, the Year 11s were defeated by half a point by Morley Senior High School. Both cases were heard at the Central Law Courts.

In Hale's next case, we had to defend a restaurant owner after a retaining wall fell on a client's car. The Year 11s, arguing at the Francis Burt Law Centre, confronted a strong team of M.L.C. prosecutors. Willie Ooi performed superbly as the restaurant owner, fending off a vicious barrage of questioning. Alas, the team lost the case by one point and were thus eliminated.

The Year 12s case was at Newman College. Barrister Greg Wheatley and witness Robin Leedman were Hale's best, but the team was unfortunately beaten by a polished Newman team by five points. With one win and one loss, the team did not progress to the knockout round of the Competition.

Adam will continue bis musical studies at U.W.A. in 1992. His future in music should be assured as he has a fine talent, combined with musicianship of an unusual depth.





Rottnest Conservation Project

This year, eighteen zealous students and four very eager Masters took part in what has become an annual event at Hale School over the last nine years - the re-afforestation of Rottnest.

It all began in the later months of last year when the programme officially began with nearly 3,000 seeds being planted. These months of hard and laborious work were always entertaining (the "dirt we work in, dirt we play in" and others being the source of relief). The result was nearly 1,000 trees being loaded onto the boats bound for Rottnest. The boats this year were provided by old boys Mr. Barrymore and Mr. Pip Phillips and were used to transport all personnel and supplies to the Island. However, we hadn't got there yet, as Mr. Phillips and his crew soon found out, the barnacle covered propellers resulting in an hour's delay and a few cuts to the hand of the Captain's son.

Finally at Rottnest the real work began. It didn't take long to settle in, with the re-afforesters in the first three days planting trees at three locations around the Island, again, like last year, starting at the airport, where around 200 Rottnest Pines and Ti-trees were planted, replacing last year's rather frivolous attempt at planting trees with new ones, along with the mandatory "grow tube" and chicken wire guard for each. It must be noted that this is the first time a chicken wire guard has been used, so it's even harder for the average quokka these days. This was followed by planting near the tip, where some 500 trees were planted in a day and a half.

However, it didn't take long for the virgin re-afforesters to learn of the treasures of the trip. Under the guidance of Stuart Lowe and the medical brothers, Ben and Tim Hewitt, all old reafforesters, small groups went their separate ways at the end of each day. Due to the bad weather, fishing trips were not a common occurrence, although there are a few strays in every flock, as was found out with the Hewitt boys. However, the bad weather didn't stop the surfers who, led by Gavin McKay and Rowan Bevan, "carved up" the waves at Strickland Bay ("Stricko's") at every spare moment. The wet and wild weather also permitted a group of "cruisers", led by the one and only Garan Pierce and rather feathered Anthony Eastman, to ride the length and width of the Island on the rather slippery bitumen roads. These first three days at Rottnest followed this format of morning planting and late afternoon recreation.

After the third day, the weather created a small change to this programme. Smaller groups were assigned to all kinds of jobs, ranging from the sheltered clean-up and sweep out of the caves, to the rather rugged and wet job of weeding and re-wiring areas previously re-afforested and planting trees at West End. Despite the bad weather, all jobs were completed quickly and efficiently, allowing some time in the afternoon for cleaning up gear used earlier in the week.

The last day again saw a change to this programme. The group began the task of re-brushing a "blow-out" at Parker Point, another futile attempt of previous years. The formation of a human chain saw the task completed in a short time, leaving the rest of the day for a small game of touch rugby, won by the maroons, due to the skills of well known Tom Plant and Stuart Lowe. With all trees planted and all work completed, the group packed up and returned home on the Friday.

The huge success of ths year's re-afforestation is the result of the hard working Mr. Kenny and "Chaz", the Rottnest Ranger who had organised things such as accommodation and television for all those Eagles fans. Mr. Sweet, Mr. Wallman and Mr. Cooper proved to be invaluable and are thanked for their time, input and toast cooking! Mr. Barrymore and Mr. Phillips are also thanked for the use of their boats as transport to the Island.

Exmouth

A new base, a store for food supplies and gear, a bus turnaround point and staff rest area, were kindly provided by Richard and Jennifer Shallcross at Bullara Station (90kms south of Exmouth) for our Year 11 Camp this year. Richard and Jennifer were delighted to allow us to use their shearers' quarters three times, per set of groups. It was difficult to rouse the boys after a night of actually sleeping on a mattress, rather than the ground under the stars.

A Bush Camp, erected by Adventure Out Chief Instructor (John Matten) and his wife, plus other AO staff, a few kilometres behind Learmonth RAAF Base, near to the learning abseil point, was an addition this year. The boys' camp site was a couple of hundred metres due west, in a sheltered stream bed, for obvious reasons... and not that it is dangerous to camp in a water course either. Anyhow, it doesn't rain up there during winter - just ask the boys in Groups 7, 8 and 9!

Pilgonaman Camp, in the Ningaloo Reef region was set up and maintained by an Old Boy of Hale School, Shane Addis, who has really caught the NW bug, having been there for three seasons now. He began as an Assistant Resident Master and is now employed by Adventure Out as an instructor in abseiling, climbing, caving and anything else if required - except fishing - a skill overlooked at Bindi Bindi, where he helps run the family property as well. Some Hale School ingenuity has rubbed off it seems. Camp rules were enforced to the letter:

1. "Whatever you open...you eat."

A couple of groups soon realised that food was not to be wasted when they had to sit around a 3kg tin of baked beans with a spoon to finish it off.

2. "Five minutes off your time in Exmouth for each piece of litter found around the camp site."

A heap of ten matches was found by eagle-eyed Shane which equalled 50 minutes off — hardly time to buy chips and a coke.

The gamut of emotions were experienced by all when faced with a sheer drop over the edge of a gorge in the Cape Range National Park. The ropes and the harnesses were examined very closely and looks of anxiety, mild consternation and even unbridled fear, disappeared as the joys of abseiling tested the character of everyone. Few were found wanting.

The usual crop of blisters appeared on heels, toes and even on the soles of soft "city" feet. With the introduction of a personal medical kit, the School's emergency supplies of bandaids lasted for a longer period. The gradually increased length of each hike got feet and shoulders toughened somewhat before the dreaded Mandu Mandu Hike.


Heavy rain managed to save one group, but spirits sank when they found that, on returning to Bullara Station on the back of the 4WD, they stopped and were told that in place of the hike they had missed, they were to take a 10km stroll across thick spinifex country, using their compasses, to the Station. Mutiny reared its ugly head for a moment, but strong words uttered by a resigned Group Master had the group ready to set off. One (to remain nameless) member of the group had the presence of mind to jump up into the vacant driver's seat and lock the doors. He wasn't going anywhere! Looks of relief appeared on their faces when they were told that it was only a test of their character and that they could be re-seated on the vehicle to continue in style. (Little did they know that it was about 20kms to go, not 10kms!)

The purchase of six new canoes, paddles and life-vests made possible a new activity this year. After an interesting 26km 4WD trip from Bullara Station shearers' quarters (even a "most" interesting drive when the track was wet), Mangrove Creek launching site was reached. After a quite detailed explanation of paddling techniques, canoe loading and care, safety and rescue procedures, most pairings zig-zagged their way across to Doole Island in about one and a half hours. It depended a great deal on previous experience whether the fish in the Gulf were in danger of ending up on a Trangia frying pan. Some groups managed to eat well, whilst others had a go, but didn't get their protein from that source. The cans and the microwave prepared meals were needed instead.

The mud crabs managed to remain unmolested, mainly because the tides were wrong, or the boys couldn't find a rocky outcrop to hunt them. Future groups will be required to live off the land a good deal more and then stomachs will no doubt encourage greater activity and persistence.

The Group Reports will expand on the above points, I'm sure, but finally, I wish to mention that now Exmouth is seen as a more than suitable substitute for Wittenoom, the Headmaster and the Board of Governors, with the help of Mr. Michael Kailis, are arranging to have a permanent complex on the Exmouth Peninsula near the Kailis Fisheries site, 20kms south of the Township of Exmouth. This is an ideal site, being near to most of the areas where our main activities are carried out. Transport, communications and medical facilities will be easier and closer, reducing the costs and making it safer for everyone.

Other schools and organisations, parents and teachers would be able to hire the complex when it was not being used by Hale School camps. A most useful acquisition for the School.

Before setting foot in France, the group had to contend with the huge physical difference that separates the two Continents - and twenty hours on the plane. The flight was broken by an enjoyable and relaxing day in Singapore, where we shopped and went on a tour of Sentosa Island.

Almost fifteen hours later, we arrived at Charles de Gaulle Airport in Paris. During the three hours waiting for our train to leave, we caught the Metro for a brief visit to the magnificent Notre Dame Cathedral.

The group then boarded the Very Fast Train for the first town in which we were staying, Quimper. After spending most of the Sunday afternoon on the train, we pulled in to Quimper Railway Station. Many nervous yawns were passed, as we realised that for four weeks we would have to survive speaking a foreign language in a strange, unknown family, who had different customs, habits and expectations.

All five families turned out to be extremely warm and friendly and after a day or so, we all began to feel at home. Our first contact with the French was very positive indeed.

Soon we began to discover the delights of the beautiful town of Quimper which is situated on the North West Coast, in Brittany. With approximately 60,000 inhabitants, Quimper has a rich history. Although centuries old buildings represent the visible facade of Quimper, all the families have the benefits of modern technology. Cable TV and the like blend in with cobblestoned streets, slate roofs and antique frontage.

A significant part of our two weeks in Quimper was spent attending a local high school, "Sainte-Anne".

Trips were organised, including one to the Faincerie factory, where superb hand-made pottery is produced. We also went to the fortified towns of Brest and Concarneau and one of the mothers took us on an enjoyable descent of the Odet River. Others went with various billets to places such as the prehistoric megoliths of Carnac, the rocky coastline of La Terche and the town of St. Malo, destroyed during World War II. Most evenings were spent with our families, but a number of nights were spent with newly made "friends", going to Breton creperies, typical French sidewalk cafes, or to the cinema.

After two weeks, we were sad to leave our families and fellow students at Sainte Anne. Nevertheless, we boarded the train for La Rochelle, which was to be our second port of call, to give us a contrast of lifestyles.

La Rochelle is also on the West Coast, about 300km south of Quimper. We met our new families on Friday 27th September and they were every bit as charming as our hosts in Quimper. Yet again, we all settled in quickly and got to appreciate the beautiful old Port of La Rochelle and its 120,000 inhabitants.

As in Quimper, a number of interesting trips were undertaken. We visited the historical Town Hall, the nearby Town of Rochefort and the famous Town of Cognac, where the brandy is made. In Cognac, we enjoyed a tour of Hennessy, which is a leading manufacturer. Once more, families ensured that we saw a significant proportion of the Charente Maritime region, taking various boys to the "Rottnest" like Ile de Re and Ile de Oleron, local vineyards or houses in the country.

Having attended The Fenelon School in La Rochelle for two weeks, in a similar way to Quimper, a number of major differences between Australian and French Schools evolved. For a start, French Private Schools are co-educational and no uniforms are worn. The playing fields of French Schools consist of one rectangular, concreted area, in which cars are parked and which is about the size of the quadrangle between the Hall and C-Block. Around 600 students from Years 10 to 12 gather in this tiny area.

Smoking is legal and it is a very common practice in School grounds. Around one-quarter of all students smoke at recess. A large number of students ride mopeds to School and no legal drinking age exists. Despite these apparent freedoms, French students have an enormous workload, studying up to twelve subjects in Years 11 and 12, including disciplines such as Latin, Philosophy, Ancient Greek and up to four languages. School runs from 8.00 or 9.00 a.m. to 5.00 or 6.00 p.m. There is an hour and a half break in the middle of the day for lunch, the main meal, when students can go home and then return for afternoon classes. The remainder of the evening for French students is spent doing hours of homework. Students have two hours of sport per week. We found French students to be more mature and self-motivated. In summary, French High Schools are more comparable to our Universities than our Schools. We had a fantastic time meeting more and more students during our stay in La Rochelle.

The French learn very little about Australia - seemingly all they knew was that there were kangaroos and "Crocodile Dundee"! It was therefore quite interesting speaking to their English classes about Australia and seeing their faces light up when we told them about 45° summers.

On Thursday the 20th of September, 1990 we left the Perth International Airport and headed for the Changi Airport in Singapore. Singapore was very clean, as I saw signs saying "\$1,000 for littering". Singapore was also very humid. As we got off the plane, everybody took off their jumpers.

We booked into our Hotel "The Apollo", and we were left to roam around the Hotel for the evening. On the 2nd floor was a restaurant, and there was a Night Club on the 18th floor.

In the morning we caught the subway to the huge, five level shopping centre called "Orchard Road". That night we left Singapore on the Aeroflot Airline, which was quite good, contrary to what we had been told. Halfway, we stopped in Dubai to have the plane refuelled and cleaned. We then escaped from the Middle East unharmed! We then boarded our Aeroflot Airline and headed for Moscow. The food on this airline was gross compared to Qantas. As we arrived in Moscow, we and exploring the City before flying to Moscow via Dubai. We were greeted in Moscow by Andre Ovchinnikov, the Director of the Kontrast Youth Commercial Centre, who organised our visit. We were then taken on a guided tour around Moscow. That afternoon, we flew to Leningrad and went to our Hotel called The Sovetskaya. While we were in Leningrad we visited many museums, including the Peter and Paul Fortress and the Hermitage. The Hermitage was the residence of the Russian Royal Family, but it now houses the world's largest art collection. It is certainly a magnificent building. We attended two Soviet rock concerts (one heavy metal), a circus on ice and one night we saw the World famous Kirov Ballet Company. We also visited an English speaking Soviet school and it was here that we met the friends who showed us around Leningrad and took us to their homes on our free days.

Our visit was over far too quickly and we left Leningrad and our new friends very reluctantly. The highlight of the tour was the experience of meeting people from a different culture and way of life. We are grateful for the warmth of their welcome and look forward to

returning the hospitality of the Soviet people when a group of students arrive early in 1991.

The trip to Leningrad could not have occurred without the co-operation and support of a number of people. Firstly, our gratitude is extended to the Headmaster for giving his permission for the trip to occur, Mr. Andre Ovchinnikov, the Director of Kontrast and Alexey Ivanov who organised the itinerary of our visit. Thanks also to Mr. Neil Sander for organising the financial aspects of the tour, Mrs. Anne-Marie Zar of Matway Travel who organised and co-ordinated all the travel arrangements and, particularly, Mr. Ian Cox

breakfast at 8.30 a.m. As we toured Leningrad, we saw many historical monuments, museums, paintings, artillery and buildings. The Hermitage was an old building which was the home of all the great Tzars. The roads were very rough and they had potholes everywhere. I also noticed that I could not see one house — everybody lives in flats or apartments with two, three or four rooms. All the cars were very ordinary eg., old, cheap with colours ranging from white or black to even a rusty colour. Just by looking through our Hotel room we could see that everybody was the same and just wanted to get out of the country and I think that explained why nobody ever smiled.

On the sixth day, we visited a school where we saw how the Russians are educated. It was much like ours, except their school was not as big, was much older and the grades, one to eleven. I was surprised that the students spoke good English. We were told they start to learn English from Year 2 and continue through to Year 11. We met great friends at the School whom we saw every other day to the end of the holiday.

Unfortunately the tour of the Soviet Union had come to an end and it was time to head home. We said goodbye to our friends as we flew Aeroflot back to Moscow, where we saw the largest McDonalds in the world and, boy, was it packed out!

Night came and we flew to Dubai where the plane again was refuelled and cleaned and again we escaped from the Middle East without a scratch. We then flew to Singapore, taking seven hours. We spent four hours in the Changi Airport (in Singapore) and did a bit of "lollie shopping" for the flight home. We arrived at Perth on the 4th of October at 2.30 a.m. Four of the group, Chris Meyer, Rohan Calvert, Mr. Lock and I, had our suitcases stay in Singapore. We eventually had our suitcases delivered to our doorsteps during the holidays.

Overall, the tour of the Soviet Union was a great experience and we all had great fun.





Welcome Back

The Hale School community warmly welcomes Mr. Roy Kelley and his family back to Western Australia - and back to Hale School. Mr. Kelley took up the newly created senior position of Director of Pastoral Care and Professional Development in the School at the beginning of Term III. Mr. Kelley's career began in 1979. He earned the respect of boys and colleagues alike as a most effective teacher of geography and a Faulkner Housemaster for five years. He left Hale late in 1989 to gain fresh perspectives in teaching by accepting an appointment in the United Kingdom at Sherborne School, Dorset. After eighteen months at Sherborne, he has returned to the challenges of Director of Pastoral Care and Professional Development.

In this new post, Mr. Kelley will co-ordinate the many aspects of pastoral care which we require in a large and complex boarding school. Some of his duties will be to work directly with Housemasters, revise and develop the tutorial system, establish a Year 8 induction programme, co-ordinate the ESL programme and to implement staff development programmes, including those for new members of staff. He will also continue to teach geography.

In the following article, Mr. Kelley gives his impressions of his time in the United Kingdom and Europe.

Vivat Rex Edwardus Sextus!

A school which continues to sing its own anthem in Latin and the school which taught King Henry VIII's only son, Edward VI: Sherborne School in Dorset, England is certainly an institution steeped in history. Its origins stem from the 7th century, when it began as a monastery school and it even lays claim, albeit tenuously, to King Alfred the Great being an old boy. Today, it is a large boys' boarding school, typical of those which are the essence of independent education in England.

Sherborne is a picturesque small town of some 8,000 inhabitants in one of the most unspoiled regions of the English countryside. Its history is clearly evident in the buildings of honeyed local Ham Stone, including one of the finest Abbeys in England situated in the heart of the school itself, which have survived successive centuries. At first sight, Sherborne appears a relic of an all but vanished England and, making allowance for a few of the trappings of modernisation, a visitor might readily suppose that little has changed there since Thomas Hardy described the area in his Wessex novels a century ago.

My family and I arrived in December, 1989 on a dark and dreary winter's day, apprehensive, yet captivated by the enchantments of the town and the school. We were immediately welcomed and received with a warmth and friendliness that typifies the best English traditions of generosity and hospitality. After a week of frantic preparation, the Lent Term began and I started teaching students from the 3rd Form (13 years old) to the Upper 6th (18 years old). I had imagined these boys would be rather different from those I had taught for eleven years at Hale School, given the variance in cultural background inevitable in two societies of different history and composition. However, to my surprise, these differences were largely superficial. Affluence, travel, television, the ubiquity of teenage culture and the perennial interests and concerns of adolescents meant that there were fewer adjustments for me to make than I had expected.

The English private school education system is closely tied to three nationwide examinations. The Common Entrance Examinations at 13 years, the G.C.S.E. at 16 years and A-Level Examinations at 18 years. To gain entrance to the school, a boy needs to average over 60% in eight separate subject examinations in the C.E., including Classical Civilisation and Latin: Needless to say, the academic standards were very high.

The final two years at school involve the narrow specialisation of A-Levels in which students select three subjects for study. This narrowness is exemplified by many Sherborne students selecting French, German/Spanish and English as their University entrance subjects - the ethos of our TEE List 1 and List 2 groupings is far removed! Selection for tertiary institutions is based on A-Level results and a crucial interview with each intended faculty - in fact, many boys were accepted into Universities on the basis of the interview alone.

The school life was varied and creative. Indeed, such are the commitments and demands on staff in a full boarding school that I quickly came to admire the tireless enthusiasm of teachers and, especially, housemasters. Term time was always furiously hectic with 6.00 p.m. classroom finishes, Saturday morning lessons and evenings spent marking and preparing or being on duty in a boarding house. Allied with these memories, are those concerning the "wonderful" mornings spent chipping ice off windscreens; of school on a -13°C day in January and of snow gently falling whilst cricket umpiring at Marlborough College in April! The English regard all of this as merely a test of character. Nevertheless, the sun does occasionally shine and holidays were always eagerly awaited - summer in Scotland, autumn in the Channel Islands and spring in France, Switzerland and Germany, remain significant highlights of our stay.

As a geographer, I have long preached to Haleians the importance of travel, the appreciation of other cultures and a widening of the mind and I remain convinced. I have learned a great deal in eighteen months. It must surely have been a geographer who once said that every person carries a special landscape within him, a landscape in mind that becomes the setting of treasured memories. The beauty and character of the southern English countryside has become so much a part of the topography of my mind that I doubt I shall ever lose it.

Recording for Posterity the History of Woodwork at Hale School

Prior to 1956, Woodwork and Technical Drawing were available outside School hours. These were taken by Mr. R.A. Barker at the Thomas Street Annexe of Modern School.

During 1955, the staff and some of the senior boys under the direction of Mr. L. Drake, built, on their own initiative, a Woodwork Centre at the rear of the Havelock Street boarding house, the prime advocates for this project being Mr. Lister Drake, Mr. Vic Shields and Mr. Tom Hoar. The Centre was furnished and equipped by the Board and until the School moved to Wembley Downs, Mr. Barker and Mr. Drake continued as the Woodwork instructors.

When the School moved to Wembley Downs in 1961, Woodwork classes were introduced to the main steam timetable with Mr. Barker and Mr. Drake continuing as instructors.

In 1962, Mr. Dave Haskett was employed to teach Woodwork and Technical Drawing to Years 8, 9 and 10. He returned to England in 1964. Mr. W.E. McEwan retired from the Navy and took the Woodwork classes in 1964 and 1965. At the end of 1965 he left Hale School to go into business.

An Old Boy, Robin Johnson, was employed in 1966 to teach Woodwork, Technical Drawing and the workshop side of Agricultural Science. Agricultural Science in Years 11 and 12 covered Farm Management, Husbandry, Metal Constructions, Motors and Building Construction. Until 1974, the University conducted the Junior Examination and controlled the course content. From that time on, we have been able to define the course and redevelop its aims and content. The major change in the Years 9 and 10 Woodwork courses was the introduction of design techniques and a greater emphasis on the students' developing their own solutions to the construction of their design.

Furniture Woodwork was introduced at Year 11 level in 1989 and impacted even further on the need to develop design and researching skills. The furniture in the photos have been designed and constructed by the students with minimum teacher input.

Manual Arts at Hale School will undergo considerable changes over the next three years with the emphasis being on design with a variety of materials. The result of these changes will mean that Woodwork and Metalwork, as such, will cease to exist and Craft, Design and Technology will take their place. This will embrace a wider range of materials and a greater emphasis on design, while maintaining the skills of both subjects.

Final Word ...

In a year of restraint, every facet of an organisation must work harder. Much of that work is thinking time - how can this be done in less pages at less cost? At each stage, everyone thought long and hard and finally the answer emerged. Ideas fed off ideas and more than anything else this has been a team effort.

Ron Sullivan at Georges France Photography thought out the photographic package which was the starting point. Steve Barnby (the principal photographer), with his many assistants, executed the programme with a lively sense of humour that never faltered in five full days of photography. The co-operation and consideration of the team from Georges France cannot be underestimated. From scheduling, to formatting ideas, to final printing of pictures, it was great to be associated with them.

Terry Allen, Laurie Kennedy and the team at Alken Type have done a wonderful job in a difficult year. Every request for new formats and tighter pages was met and often exceeded with the team's own ideas and suggestions. It was a proud day on the 14th November, 1991 when the Magazine went to the folio stage on the page allocation and under the budget. It is axiomatic to state that these sort of things do not just happen by chance!

In a printing industry where costs are paramount, David Miller from Frank Daniels found a way to navigate a network of negatives to find a way to print the Magazine within the funding restrictions. He took calculated risks to keep the 20 year association between Frank Daniels, the "Cygnet" and Hale School alive. David Miller did what many may have tossed in the "too hard basket". He refused to give in and simply say - "Go somewhere else - we can't print it at that price". His work in maintaining the integrity of the School Crest and producing a definitive artwork will benefit the School for many years to come. The "Cygnet" Secretary, Mrs. Jo Harvey, is, in many ways, the linchpin of the organisation. Her accurate typing, meticulous filing and skilful recording of the progress of articles and photographs through the various stages of the Magazine production, is the secret to the "Cygnet". In 1991, she also typed the Junior School "Cygnet". Mrs. Harvey's ability to type copy via the dictaphone system introduced to the "Cygnet" in 1991 was a huge boost to the Master-in-Charge, who would often be seen driving to Hale of a morning dictating copy, letters and organisational memos into the system.

The Cygnet Committee system needs revision. The House Diarists introduced in 1990 have worked splendidly and this innovation must be maintained. However, the organisation beyond the Houses needs definition. Logically, sub-editors should be appointed to cover Sports (perhaps two here), Clubs and Societies, Excursions, Records and Features and these sub-editors should organise the contributors within these sections. The "Cygnet" Editors (the task is now too big for one boy), should then work much more closely with the Master-in-Charge on the page layout and proof reading stages. This really hasn't occurred in 1991, but the restructured "Cygnet" can now offer that opportunity. In truth, it has taken two years to set up a process which will allow this. Hopefully, now that that opportunity exists, it will not be squandered.

Finally, my Christmas story, "The Richman and the Tailor" could not be included due to lack of page space. As it's subtitle suggests, it was "A Tale of Two Cygnets" - it must remain untold!

So have a very Merry Christmas and I wish you everything you would wish yourself in the New Year.
