Editorial

Since 1858, when Hale School began under the guidance of Bishop Hale, it has evolved into an institution based on tradition. It has been this continual dedication to uphold tradition that makes Hale what it is today; a school which derives its strength and support from a community of past and present Haleians, enabling constant interaction between those involved in the running of the school at present and those who believe that they still have much to offer. This is what distinguishes Hale School from many others and ensures that Hale continues to take its rightful place amongst the most prestigious schools in Australia.

This year, however, we have seen Hale incorporate the stability of the past with visions of the future. This, perhaps, is what 1993 may best be remembered for, as it marked changes which will, undoubtedly, lay the path for education at Hale in the years to come. Hale has always been proud of its ability to provide its students with a well balanced education, one which incorporates an active sporting calendar with an academic and cultural curriculum, ensuring that Hale students are given an education which will provide them with an opportunity to pursue the interests of their choice and feel secure that they are being well prepared for life. So, as we have witnessed a recent push towards science and technology in Australia in view of the strengthening economic relationship with the Asia-Pacific region and the desire for Australia to evolve from "the lucky country" to "the smart country", so too have we witnessed the development of science and technology at Hale School. This year marked the commencement of a new Design and Technology Centre which is to enhance and modernise the manual arts, science and technical syllabii in future years. The ability of Hale to isolate and develop those areas of modern education which will best benefit its students, both during and after their years at school, is a tribute to the flexibility and foresight of Hale, the very foresight which was shown so many years ago by the Bishop, the first "Haleian" of us all.

Hale's dedication to the "balanced education" has also been witnessed through the emphasis on the development of cultural societies and events throughout this year. The introduction of Music as a TEE subject has further stimulated the Music Department and the synonomous enthusiasm for both Music, Drama and the Arts at Hale this year marked the introduction of many cultural events, including an Art Exhibition, a series of concerts and dramatic productions spread over the course of the academic year. At the same time, 1993 saw the general strengthening of clubs and societies at Hale and the opportunity to become involved in the associated advantages of a Hale School education were immediately welcomed by the Hale School community as a whole.

Finally, 1993 was a year in which two new Houses were introduced — St Georges and Havelock. This was a decision made by the School to enable House numbers to be kept to a minimum and the quality of student-master communications to be increased as a result, a decision which only serves to emphasize Hale's desire to develop the all-round student; one who has not only enjoyed the academic and sporting benefits of a Hale School education, but one who is proud of his school, its traditions and the moral values and ethics which it attempts to instil in each and every student.

Thus, even as Hale looks towards the future and continues to broaden the horizons of its students in the process, it is not without the guidance and security of a strong tradition that this is achieved. Behind every step taken this year there has been the support of the Hale community as a whole, a community that has always been there in the past and will continue to be for many years to come. It is this sense of belonging, being part of a family, that makes us realise that our time at Hale gives us more than just an education — and makes Hale more than just a school.



The Governors of Hale School

Hale School is constituted under an Act of the Western Australian Parliament which is known as the Hale School Act, 1876. This Act provides that the management of the School shall be in the hands of the Governors who shall be nine in number. The Archbishop shall be one of the Governors and shall be the Visitor. Four of the other eight Governors are appointed by the Old Haleians' Association and four by the Diocesan Trustees of the Anglican Church. Currently Messrs Boyatzis, Ilbery, Hyde

and Sandover are Old Haleian appointees and Prof Andrich and Messrs Cruickshank and Hantke are appointees of the Diocesan Trustees. The Ven. S. Threlfall served as a Diocesan Trustees' nominee until he retired in August, 1993. His replacement is the Very Rev Dr J. H. Shepherd. The Governors serve in an honorary capacity.


Dean volunteered to take photographs for Cygnet at the beginning of 1992.

Headmaster's Speech Night Address — 1992

Mr Chairman, Mr Loton and Mrs Loton and Lady Loton, Bishop Farran and Mrs Farran, Governors, Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen, it is with pleasure that I present the Headmaster's Annual Report for Hale School in 1992.

It has been a year of intense educational activity, of endeavour and strong development and we are gathered here this evening to review and celebrate all of this. There have been many highlights. The first I wish to mention is the manner in which the Year 12's have applied themselves to their studies. They settled quickly at the beginning of the year and the improvement many have shown, by tenacious and sustained purposeful application, has been remarkable and a joy to behold. The vast majority responded admirably to the great opportunity and challenge that Year 12 provides. We must continue to regard Year 12 as a framework that provides a wonderful opportunity for personal growth and not drift into negative and pointless perceptions of undue pressures and stress.

Amongst other highlights have been the wonderful Service of Nine Lessons and Carols held in St George's Cathedral just two evenings ago, the energy and extraordinarily strong development of the Music Department, including the emergence of a very good Senior School Choir; the consolidation of a considerably wider set of drama productions including combining so successfully with St Mary's in "Little Shop of Horrors" and the very strong resurgence of chess with our Premier Team winning its division for the first time since 1977.


On the sporting field there were the particular thrills of the wins in athletics, the first since Dr Tregonning was captain; in cricket, the first since Mr Geoff Marsh was captain; and in swimming, the first for twelve months! The PSA calendar has been changed for 1993 and the athletics inters will be held in May. After a 51 year drought we face the prospect of winning the Alcock Shield twice in eight months. We shall certainly be in there trying very hard.

In March, Minister Beazley announced the names of 500 winners of the Australian Students' Prize. These top performers in tertiary entrance scores from 1991 throughout Australia were given \$2000 each as part of the recognition of their outstanding results. Forty-eight of those were awarded on a per capita basis to Western Australians. There were only four schools that received more than two awards. Hale School had five students receiving awards; one of two schools to do so. Our congratulations go to Stephen Papadopoulos, Niall Pigott, Tim Markham, Andrew Benness (all in the top 25 in the State) and Paul Quinn for their outstanding academic performances. They were amongst the nine boys who topped 460 out of a possible 510 and the 27 who topped 400. These numbers were as high as we have had for a very long time, perhaps ever.

On the one hand we are pleased to be able to give recognition to and celebrate the achievements of our best students, whilst on the other hand we are very wary about the likelihood of the media establishing a League Table based on the academic performance of the students in a school. The passing of the pending Freedom of Information Bill will provide ready access for the information necessary for this.

A school cannot be properly judged by the marks gained by its best students. The focus is too narrow to provide a decent analysis and judgement of a school, but a ready measure will be freely available and used. The media hounds are likely to have a feast and will not wish to have their stories and headlines complicated by taking into account a broader and deeper picture. Many of the most significant elements of a rich and valuable education cannot be readily measured at all. When Sir James Darling (Geelong Grammar School's famous Headmaster from 1930 to 1961) talked about "the myth of a good school" he seemed to be wanting to stress that what counted most were the welfare, confidence and personal growth of the students, an emphasis that can easily be lost if the focus becomes stuck on institutional goals that are capable of becoming false gods.

A good school offers much more than the classroom. With great purpose it attempts to create an environment in which enriching human relationships flourish and many various worthwhile and wholesome activities are pursued with great vigour and interest. A feature of the good school is the breadth and depth of its offerings, providing opportunities for all and niches for most.

What else is it that we expect of Independent Schools such as Hale whose very roots and ethos are set with conviction in the Christian tradition and which have a deep commitment to the provision of a true liberal education? Though examination results and vocational training have a very important place, there is much more to education, than these. Independent Schools have an especially strong commitment to a far broader and deeper educational offering and process which is infinitely more complex and subtle, vastly more demanding to deliver, immeasurably more precious to receive and substantially more rewarding to participate in. It is a process that includes progressively discovering meaning in life, and liberating and empowering individuals to be responsible for their lives and learning how to make a positive and strong contribution to society.

Pastoral care and the nurturing of a sense of community are corner stones of all good schools. Education is about the growth of young people in a community in which they can develop attitudes, values and standards for living. Being able to grow in a secure and responsive community environment is vital if young people are to grow in stature, in human happiness and in fulfilment. They have a right to experience mutual respect, learning from one another, caring for one another, feeling at home, trusting and being trusted, gaining and receiving, loving and being loved. Community means all of this and more. It means gathering, reflecting, sharing a spiritual bond, accepting common standards of what is good, true and right and the courage and support to act accordingly. Above all, community means healthy growth towards maturity, wisdom, independence and the freedom for life that a quality education brings. Freedom for life which includes true respect and tolerance for all others, too, to enable them to live a life free from unwarranted interference. A curse of society and a microcosm of society, the school is the apparent need of some inadequate individuals to dominate and bully (by any of its insidious forms) and this has no place in a community genuinely concerned about itself. This issue must be squarely faced and addressed by all who have the basic perceptiveness needed to understand. The home and the school can form a very special and powerful partnership in all of this. Each must show wisdom, judgement and strength and support for the other for the chain of guidance will be as strong only as the weakest link. The home and the school must sustain each other and each must be the stronger for the other.

Changes in the structure of education continue to abound at a pace. Retention rates in post compulsory education (beyond 15 years of age) have increased significantly in recent years and this is having a dramatic impact on schools with the development of appropriate subjects, methods of teaching and assessment,

certification and graduating to the next stage of life, be that University, TAFE, Apprenticeship or Employment.

Over the past eighteen months or so, as Australia's economic recession deepened, three most significant reports on secondary education in this country have appeared — they are the Finn, Mayer and Carmichael reports.

The Finn Report came first, early in 1991. Commissioned by the Australian Education Council (which is made up of Commonwealth and State Education Ministers), it places a strong emphasis on education as preparation and training for employment. The Finn Report highlights the need for schools to adjust to the increased number of pupils they will have for whom tertiary entrance is not a realistic goal. The "better learning outcomes", to use Finn's phrase, which he proposed for the increased numbers in Years 11 and 12 pointed to a need for more vocational training in schools; and for all young people, whatever they study at school, to achieve various "competencies", essential (in the view of the Finn report) for adequate preparation for the workplace.

The second report — the Mayer report — further developed this idea of "key competencies". Mayer proposed that the seven key competencies he identifies as essential for all school leavers to have gained — be taught, assessed and reported on for each student in Years 11 and 12 by the end of 1995.

The competencies are: collecting, analysing and organising ideas and information; expressing ideas and information in writing and orally; planning and organising activities; working with others and in teams; using mathematical ideas and techniques; solving problems; using technology. The Mayer committee considered, but then dropped, one other competency, that of cultural understanding.

Few would deny that these seven "competencies" are desirable acquisitions for successful participation in the workplace. We would claim that teaching these skills has been a part of the aims of education at schools such as ours for decades. Broad in scope though the Mayer competencies are, they do not equate with the proper whole purpose of school education.

The danger for schools lies not in the pursuit of these "competencies" — we already pursue them — but in the as yet unstated roles of teaching, assessing and reporting on the competencies. Presumably, an educational authority will oversee this considerable task. Existing syllabii will need to be scrutinised to see how many of the competencies are now included, whether implicitly or explicitly and course changes may need to be made. Will external examination or schoolbased assessment of the competencies be required? What safeguard will ensure objectivity and compatibility of assessment from school to school? These issues and questions are unconsidered by the Mayer report. A great deal of consultative work with schools lies ahead for those charged with implementing the Mayer report recommendations by what seems all too soon a date — 1995. With all of this, will there remain sufficient time for effective teaching and learning of skills and content and for the process of education to actually take place and flourish?

The third significant report is that of the Employment and Skills Formation Council, chaired by Mr Laurie Carmichael. Carmichael's report, entitled the Australian Vocational Certificate Training System, outlines proposals for links between schools and local training institutions, TAFE Colleges or workplaces where pupils can gain work experience as part of a school course. Under the Carmichael plan, pupils would choose specific vocational training courses at school which would combine instruction by teachers at school with job training in the workplace. School-based learning, work experience and parttime work would be very closely linked. How a school can operate well, with continuity, momentum and real learning outcomes, with students having much time with one foot in the workplace, remains a mystery.

The economic context of these three reports must be kept in mind. Although there is much of permanent value in them, they are certainly products of these recessionary times. The Finn committee, for example, deliberating in the gloom of Australia's economic difficulties, was composed mainly of representatives from TAFE, the Confederation of Industry and the ACTU. There were just two representatives from schools on the Finn committee. It is perhaps not surprising, given the make-up of the committee and their brief from anxious politicians, that the implicit premise in the Finn Report, as in Mayer's and Carmichael's, is that the education system has failed to supply the economy with young adults prepared for the workplace and

that schools should provide more vocational training. Education, in short, should serve the economy. It is both unfair and foolish and many important home truths are missed when schools are made the scapegoat of unemployment and other social ills.

While schools are bound to accept some of the worthwhile recommendations of Finn, Mayer and Carmichael, our educational charter is much wider than theirs, and we must hold our line, keep things in perspective and retain our focus on education in its true and richest form.

The Chairman has reported upon the fund-raising and the developments of our Design and Technology Centre. May I add my heartfelt thanks and appreciation to the many who have contributed so much to make this exciting and significant educational vision come to the brink of reality. May I express my personal appreciation to Mrs Bennett for her very special and generous involvement in this and share with her the joy she will have in helping to create an educational facility that will have a profound influence on all future Haleians as a tribute to the life of her late father, Mr Peter Wright.

The facility will provide educational opportunities of great significance in a changing world. The emphasis will be on problem-solving in a practical hands-on environment. At the turn of this century Science had virtually no part in the school curriculum. At the beginning of the next century Design and Technology will be a core and major part of the curriculum of all good schools. Schools will adjust their timetables and curriculum and adapt and build facilities. We intend Hale to be the first and the best in Western Australia with this initiative.

This year saw the expansion of our Senior School outdoor education programme. To complement our very successful Year 11 adventure at Exmouth, all of the Year 9's were taken to Dwellingup. We look forward to this camp becoming an established and integral part of our Year 9 offering.

Six of our boys joined with some girls from St Mary's and Perth College on our third trip to St Petersburg in as many years. Our Russian connection was supplemented by a visit to Hale School by nine students and three teachers from Japan in August. We appreciated the joy of hosting a group of delightful young people and we hope that next year a party of Hale boys may be able to return the visit.

Mr Richard Pengelley was admitted to the Diaconate at a Service of Ordination in St George's Cathedral in March. It is with pleasure that I announce that the Reverend Pengelley is proceeding to Priesthood and we anticipate that he will be ordained in 1994. It will be necessary for him to spend a considerable amount of time out of the School in 1993 and 1994, but our short term loss will be our long term gain. As a School community we are very grateful for the Christian leadership and support that the Reverend Pengelley provides.

I am delighted to be able to report that the first teacher exchanges involving Hale School in recent memory are taking place this year. We have been greatly enriched by the presence of Mr Michael Elder and his teaching of English (on exchange from Daniel Stewart's and Melville College in Edinburgh. Scotland) and Mr Derek Wiggins who came to our Design and Technology Department from St Edward's Oxford in August. They have exchanged with Mr Goldsmith and Mr Cecins respectively and they have made and are making very strong contributions which are greatly appreciated. To Mr Elder and his family we say farewell tonight and hope that our paths will cross again in the not too distant future.

Mr Robin Johnson is the only member of the Hale School teaching staff who is leaving at the end of this school year. An Old Boy (1947-1949), Mr Johnson has been a dedicated, willing and fiercely loyal member of the teaching staff since 1966. He has made an outstanding contribution to his school in many ways, but mostly in the teaching of woodwork and the coaching of athletics. The entire Hale School community joins in thanking him for his efforts and wishing his wife and him a long and fulfilling retirement on his property at Donnybrook.

At the end of term one we farewelled Mr Wapnah who left to partake more fully of a true European lifestyle after he had taught French at Hale for twenty-two years. He was replaced by Miss Fraize, a native speaker, both as a senior teacher of French and Head of the Foreign Languages Department. She has begun her teaching career at Hale School in fine style as has Mr Kilkenny who has brought a great deal of wisdom and experience to Hale as our first School Counsellor. He has added another dimension and strength to a pastoral care team which is providing splendid support to the Housemasters in whom enormous responsibility and faith is placed.

Mr Bushell joined us in January to teach Music and he has subsequently been appointed as Head of a newly constituted Music Department. His vision for Music at Hale is clear and we look forward to an exciting and expanded offering in this area which can do so much for the soul of a school.

We have also had the pleasure of Miss Leiper, Mrs de Reus, Mr Lim and Mr Garratt-Reed being with us for the first time this year. They have all made a very strong contribution and we look forward to them continuing at Hale.

I wish to pay tribute and record my thanks to all of the many who work so hard to make Hale the happy and thriving school that it is, both the non-teaching and the teaching staff. In particular, I wish to make special mention of the Bursar, Mr Beech, Messrs Macmillan, Shearer, Bean Kelley Weston and Panarese, the Housemasters and Heads of Departments for their decisive and very effective leadership. The school could not run as it does if it were not for the special abilities and commitment of these people.

And to Mr Roger Gray, a most sincere thanks for twenty years of Housemastering, the last twelve in the Boarding House in Wilson, as he steps aside. Mr Sweet will replace Mr Gray and Mr Jordan and Mr Alderson will be the foundation Housemasters of Havelock and St Georges. The House system is the core of our Pastoral Care system. We have been concerned that the Houses have become too large and in 1994 the very considerable responsibility for Housemastering will be shouldered by ten rather than eight Housemasters and more boys will receive opportunities to lead through House expectations and activities.

1993 will be an interim year for the formation of these two new Houses and an opportunity for the Housemasters elect to come to know the future boys of their Houses and their families.

This evening is the climax to the 1992 School year at Hale. In a moment it will be my pleasure to invite our Guest of Honour, Mr

Brian Loton, to present the prizes. Before I do, I wish to address a few remarks to the Year 12's. At the end of October we had our Valedictory Assembly and Chapel Service. That was their day and we farewelled them properly then. Tonight, I again want to thank them all for their contributions to Hale, both individual and collective. Robert Barugh has been a splendid leader and I salute him. He has shown maturity, judgement and strength. Robert, Michael Babon, his deputy, the Prefects and all others in Year 12 we thank you and we join as one to wish you every happiness and fulfilment in your lives beyond Hale School.

As you look forward, so we, who remain at Hale will look forward, too. 1993 will present challenges all over again and we shall embrace these and live and grow together through them. A new group of Year 12's will enjoy their responsibilities at the top of the School. I now have pleasure in formally announcing to the School community those who have accepted the invitation to shoulder the responsibilities of being Prefects in 1993:



The Peter Wright Technology Centre — A Major Initiative in Design and Technology Education

In 1989 Hale School made a decision to undertake a major initiative in Design and Technology education. Mr Michael Shearer, Director of Studies, was sent to the United Kingdom for six weeks on a fact finding mission. He tapped into numerous schools which were leaders in this field and an architectural firm that specialised in providing facilities for Design and Technology education.

Exhaustive enquiries and planning were conducted throughout 1990. In 1991 the whole school timetable was revised to create

slots for Design and Technology which was to become a core part of the curriculum. Extensive specific curriculum development in the area was conducted, together with the development of a very detailed design brief for the project architect. A budget was established which nominated \$2.8 million as the limit for expenditure on the establishment of the bricks and mortar. The fund raising of \$2 million was set and reached and arrangements were then made to commence building in February, 1993. The new facilities will be ready for the start of the 1994 school year.

It will be very much in the interests of the Western Australian educational community that Hale will be establishing a genuine centre of excellence; a true state-of-the-art set of design and technology facilities. This "lighthouse" will offer decisive leadership and be a source of inspiration in this frontier of education to the rest of the community. Mr Kevin Richardson, South Australia's renowned leader in education from Technology Park, has been a regular consultant for Hale and his advice and encouragement have been invaluable.

Australian industry has been far too slow to adapt to and develop new techniques to make Australia competitive on the world economic front. The participation rate of students in science, engineering and technological courses at tertiary level and the exposure of secondary students to related subjects, have become issues of concern in recent years.


The construction of a specialist Design and Technology Centre at Hale School is a direct response to these concerns and this educational initiative has already aroused a great deal of interest in Perth.

Technology Education can be viewed as engaging students in contexts which encourage:

- i) active involvement on the part of the learner;
- ii) appropriate degrees of learner control;
- application of knowledge, skills and creativity in problemsolving;
- iv) designing, modelling and making;
- v) critical appraisal;
- vi) co-operation;
- vii) communication.

The present Senior School Design and Technology curriculum consists of a compulsory core for Years 8 and 9 leading to more specific elective subjects in Year 10. Curriculum development in the Years 8 to 10 programme has emphasised four strands: Materials, Systems, Graphics and Communication and Information. These strands will lead to more specialised courses in Years 11 and 12.

While the initial emphasis has been on the 8-10 programme, the basis for development of the 11 and 12 courses has been established. Curriculum development and trialing needs to continue with a focus on the study of technology and its application through design in domestic, industrial and





commercial settings — in rural and urban environments. Specific subjects need to address a continuum, spanning a wide range of vocational education areas, to subjects which apply more demanding concepts within a design environment and which have links with science, technology and engineering faculties of tertiary institutions. While subjects satisfying the former criterion already exist and can be refined and extended, the latter has been sadly neglected in this State.

Hale School believes it can, and must, take the initiative in vigorously promoting the development of a design and technology based TEE subject. The School plans to take the initiative in developing such a course and to fight for its acceptance.

Special Services have included our first Old Boys' Day Chapel in March, the Retired Old Haleians' Service in September and the Year 12 Valedictory Service in October. Weddings and funerals continue to occur regularly and it was with a great sadness, but a deep sense of appropriateness, that we farewelled Arron Mullins at a special Service on August 17th.

The tremendously exciting development this year has been the continuing growth and development of the Choir. Under Mr Bushell's expert direction and with the help of Mrs Gladstones and Mr Venables, the Choir has performed at every major Service this year with great distinction. They have added so much depth and atmosphere to our worship that many, many people have been deeply moved by each occasion.

Thanks must also go, as usual, to Mrs Morrison and her fathful team of flower arrangers who continue to brighten up the Chapel (even after the key went missing!).

Finally, have a wonderful, safe and blessed Christmas.



Mrs Robin Wake joined the Hale School staff at the start of Term 2 as Head of Library.


Mrs Wake's previous teaching experience has been in both English and the Social Sciences and she has co-ordinated both primary and secondary school libraries in the government and independent sectors.

At Hale School, Mr Venables is responsible for all bands at junior and senior levels, shares the music teaching in the Senior School and plays a full part in all School music activities.




Mrs June Daniel

Mr Andrew Irvine



Mr Geoff Marsh joined the staff of Hale School at the start of Term 3, 1992.



The Junior School had a flourishing instrumental programme with many students blowing, plunking and banging away. This was apart from the Senior School where he not only managed the Band, but was responsible for overseeing music studies for many blossoming professionals. Bernard introduced a wide variety of performing units: The Hale Jazz Band, the School Band and The Show Band.

With Mr John Cardell-Oliver, Bernard was responsible for the concept and planning of the Stow Music Centre which opened in 1981.

In 1978, Bernard, in conjunction with Sir Vic and Lady Garland, organised the first Garland Music Prize held at the School and this competition, for junior and senior students, is still flourishing.

When Mr Jeff Hopkins suggested "home grown" musical comedy, Bernard, Jeff and Mr Bill Stewart (a Music teacher at Hale at the time) then wrote and produced a succession of remarkable plays that became the feature of Hale in the 1980's. These plays really were "home grown"; original lyrics, music and dialogue with the sets produced by the Woodwork and Metalwork Departments under the supervision of Mr Robin Johnson.

Bernard is essentially a "bandsman", not given to blowing his trumpet (or horn) for his own benefit, but dedicated to his students and their music.





Arran Toby Mullins Buntine House 1980-1993

Eulogy

Delivered at a Service of Thanksgiving for the life of Arran Toby Mullins, Tuesday 17th August, 1993.

If you can remember the November before you started your career at the Senior School at Hale you will perhaps recall the first time that you and I met. In that very first Housemaster interview, with your parents, you may recollect that I spoke of the Buntine House family, how by becoming a part of Buntine, you were about to gain 90 brothers. Today, sadly, we gather here in the Chapel because one of those brothers has been tragically taken from us. If you are lucky enough to have a brother in your immediate family, then you can begin to understand what a loss like that means.

Arran Toby Mullins was born on the 3rd May, 1980. When he was accidently killed on Sunday, he was 13 years, 3 months and 12 days old. He had lived less than 5,000 days. He wasn't ill, he had no disease, he was a fit, healthy, vivacious, vibrant young man and yet he died. How can that be? Why is it allowed to happen? Most of you greeted the news (as I did) with shock and disbelief. Then came the confusion and the fear and finally the anger. Why was it allowed to happen?

There is no answer to that question. There is simply a new question, how do we come to terms with what has happened — with Arran's death? Today we ask that question. The answer comes in three ways.

Firstly, we know that Arran is safe. How do we know that? We know it through faith. Whether we call ourselves Christians, or we are Jewish or we follow Islam or Buddhism, we know that: "...a greater power than we can contradict" cares for Arran's soul today. Even those of us who are tempted, sometimes, to deny that that power exists, cannot permit disbelief this afternoon. Arran is safe, his soul is in caring hands, we know it — this is our belief (our faith) and through it today, we can endure the pain of grief.

Secondly, we knew this boy — he had touched all our lives — we treasure his memory, even though we can no longer share his friendship and brotherhood.

All of you who went to the Hale Junior School since 1988 knew him well — Arran was in your class and your team. All of you who began at the Senior School this year knew him. He shared your excitement, your fears, your anticipation, your relief and joy as you faced each new challenge from Orientation Day onwards.

The Year 11 boy who selected the Buntine swimming team knew Arran and his times, picked him in the team and had confidence in him. You took over from him in a relay in the pool. The Years 8 and 9 boys who wanted to lift Junior House volleyball, so we could all share a Sholl Cup, needed Arran as a team mate doing his best, as you were. You knew him, you encouraged him and he helped you win.

In athletics, he took the baton from you and passed the baton to you in a shuttle relay. In high jump, pit 2, it was Arran jumping the high jump. You paused and watched him do it. He ran his 100 and 200 metres hard — you saw that too.

Without Arran the Year 8 team could not have taken second place in the Under 14 Division of the Annual Cross Country Championship. His points counted with yours — you had run some of the way with him.

He had the locker next to you, he was a part of your Maths class. He sat next to you in this Chapel the last time you were here.

In years gone by, you have been a babysitter for Arran and his younger brother, Joel. You may have known Arran through his elder sister, Danika, or through his friendship with your younger brother.

That "knowing" does not die. It lives on in our memories. Today you must search for that image of Arran, that you can recall best, and hold it for all time. While you hold that picture in your mind, Arran is not lost.

Seek to recall the wiry young man with the dark hair, the searching eyes and the apologetic smile.

Personally, I recall last Wednesday, when at a drizzling and wet House line up, we tried to get enough players to field a junior football side. I called for volunteers who would be prepared to switch to the football team and help us out. Arran's hand went up, he volunteered to play football with that characteristic engaging look. He played in his red hockey shirt and blue socks. How he must have enjoyed the game and many of you shared that moment with him.

While we recall Arran in joyous moments wherever and whenever they occurred — he is not gone.

Thirdly, and finally, we come to terms with Arran's death by living through this week. We share Arran's family's sorrow and we extend our sympathy to Valerie, Colin, Danika and Joel. We grieve in our own way. Yesterday, some of our eyes filled with tears and we cried for a friend. Others shed no tears but felt an ache inside. Some of you felt nothing, you were just left empty by Arran's death. It is all grief. It is part of trying to come to terms with something which confuses, frightens, shocks or angers.

Today's simple service is our attempt to come to terms with Arran's death — to face it. We know he is in caring hands, we can recall some good times and be thankful for some of the 5,000 days we were all allowed to share with him.

On Thursday, at his funeral, Arran's earthly body will be farewelled with dignity and the formal grieving will be over, but we will not forget. Our lives will resume and go on. We will do this because we must.

We will do it well because we know Arran is safe, we have preserved precious memories in our minds (inside of us) and we have endured this week of grief, reflection and saying a formal farewell to a friend.





Once again the boys from Faulkner House had a very fulfilling year. At the helm of the House for 1993 was House Captain, Michael Hepworth who had very able support from the House Prefects and Housemaster, Mr Lange.

On the first day of Term 1, Faulkner House was very proud when Michael Hepworth was inducted as a School Prefect.





Havelock House Diary

On Wednesday, 3rd February, history was made with the birth of two new Houses in Hale School, one of which was Havelock House. Havelock House, like St Georges, was named after a former location of Hale School, namely the campus at Havelock Street in West Perth, the home of Hale School before the establishment of the present campus in Wembley Downs. Thus, just as in the past, when Hale School began a new life at Wembley downs based deeply on tradition, but free to grasp new ideas and concepts, so too did Havelock House begin 1993. Congratulations to Adam for an excellent effort at the Inter-School Athletics Carnival and for his performances throughout the athletics season. Adam's efforts were matched in the pool by Stuart Louth and Casey Molenda. Stuart represented Hale at the Inters in five events in the U/13 age group including the relay, three of which he swam in first division. Casey, competing in the U/14 age group, also competed in five events at the Inters, two of which were first division races. While these were some of the outstanding cases, all the boys in Havelock played hard for their respective Houses and I hope that this fighting spirit will remain, if not strengthen, when they play for their "own" House next year.

Fortunately, Havelock was able to compete in several of the cultural House competitions. Havelock entered both junior and senior teams in House debating. The seniors, with highly intensive preparation, put up an excellent effort against a polished Haynes team, the eventual finalists of the senior division. Despite Vic Naicker leading the way with some positively lethal rebuttal, Haynes just managed to scrape home with a 40-odd point victory and we were subsequently eliminated. Once again history was made, although we hope that this type doesn't start repeating itself too often!

Havelockian pride was restored, however, with the junior team's

Havelockian pride was restored, however, with the junior team's defeat of Faulkner in the first round of the junior competition, although the team was unable to repeat their efforts, suffering a narrow defeat, once again, to an experienced Haynes House side in the next contest. This loss was quickly avenged, however, by a 53 point defeat of St Georges. With such devastating speakers as Rowan Sutherland, among others, who knows where Havelock debating may be in future years.

Havelock also produced our first ever play in conjunction with St Georges. The inspiration was there and so too were several students from Perth College. Thus, the production "Not Even a Sparrow" was born and after some quick adjustments to alter the Neo-Nazi theme and primitive script, the show got rolling. Led by budding Havelockian thespians such as Jason Palasin, Matthew Goldfinch and Brad MacEwan, who helped direct and organise the play, it was a resounding success and we will be looking forward to presenting an all Havelockian play next year. Thanks go to Mr Rutter and Mr Adams for the time and effort spent helping rehearsals and organising props. Their help was much appreciated.

Jarron Boynes (Year 8) left school during the year and we wish him well for the future.

So, with a great amount of enthusiasm and dedication, the boys of Havelock House ensured that its inaugural year was a successful one. House spirit seems to be very much alive and I hope that this will develop all the more next year and in future years. The tradition is only beginning!

Housemaster of Havelock House — Mr Malcolm Jordan

Mr Jordan came to Hale School in 1975 and spent his first four years at the School teaching in the Chemistry and Geology Departments. It was not long before he made the transition to the Biology Department and it is in this area that he is currently teaching. With this wealth of experience behind him, Mr Jordan became Head of the Biology Department in 1988. 

On behalf of all Loton House members I wish the Year 12's luck in their forthcoming TEE exams and our best wishes for the future.



Steven Smith (Year 11) left school during the year and we wish him well for the future.






Quads Meet



Hale was now on a two win, one loss record midway through the season as the competition was put on hold for a general bye. An alarming pattern was beginning to creep into the Hale side's fortunes as once again after a break in competition we returned to play uninspired, lack-lustre basketball and consequently lost a game we should have won.

Our last game of the season was against an unbeaten Guildford side. Once again an absence of play over a weekend proved disastrous for the 1st side. We relaxed our commitment at training and showed signs of complacency. We travelled to

Rowing

The rowing season began with the traditional rowing camp attended by 75 rowers from Years 9 to 12. The camp fulfulled its time-honoured purpose of ingraining technique and fitness in all crews, with the added benefit this year of the provision of more rowing ergometers and the increased use of single sculls to enhance technique in the senior crews.

The growing number of rowers and the increased number of events in the Head of the River have put our fleet under great pressure in recent years. A superb new eight, the "I.F. Cruickshank", christened at the rowing camp in honour of the Chairman of the Board of Governors, relieved the pressure somewhat and gave a tremendous boost to the Year 9A VIII.

The 1st VIII of 1993, coached again by Mr Jack Fischer, had a very promising set of results in the regattas before the Head of the River itself. In the first event, the 5km long distance regatta, Hale took second fastest time. A week later at the Aquinas Regatta, Hale again finished in second place and on February 20th, at the Guildford Regatta, Hale won convincingly. A fortnight later, racing in choppy headwind conditions, Hale could not find the steady rhythm needed, finishing fourth at the Wesley Regatta. The 1st VIII then regained its racing form, gaining second placings at the Scotch and Hale Regattas.

Over the final week before the Head of the River the crew trained in a relaxed and confident manner. In the Head of the River itself the stroke, Paul Griffin, set an excellent rhythm, the crew followed with impressive power and length in the water and at the 1,000m mark Hale had a bow-ball lead over Guildford. One of the unforeseen, but always possible, risks in rowing then spelt disaster for Hale. A jammed seat, which came off the aluminium rails, meant six-man Jarrod Daniel could not row effectively. He leapt overboard at the 1,100m mark to help

On behalf of rowing at Hale and the School itself I would like to thank Paul for his contribution to rowing and wish him the best of luck for his rowing future.

The 2nd VIII, coached by Mr Alan Stewart, had a fine record over the season and finished third in the Head of the River. Mr Duncan Booth took on the 3rd VIII for the first time in 1993 and his crew's excellent second place in the Head of the River was, in fact, their worst result of the season! They won four times and came second twice during the six lead-up regattas, with determination and good spirits in equal measure.

The Year 10A VIII, coached by Mr Goater, finished fourth in the Head of the River and, for the first time, a Year 10B VIII also competed, coached by exchange teacher Mr Derek Wiggins from St Edward's School, Oxford. Ninety-five Old Haleian rowers dined with seventy present day rowers in mutual celebration of the great tradition of Cygnet. 

> After the euphoria of Hale School's historic win at the Inters in 1992, Hale's Inter-School athletics team experienced a "let down" in 1993. The team was convincingly beaten by the strong Aquinas team. After 1992, Hale was expected to do well in 1993 and the team did. Second place is a fine achievement.

Realistically, a repeat win was always an extremely long-odds chance. This was obvious at the first meet of the year against Christ Church. In the past decade, Hale has prevailed convincingly at this low-key meet. In 1993 the reverse was true. Our lack of depth was exposed and even many of our medal winners from previous years were beaten by the Christ Church stars.

In 1993, the P.S.A. athletics season was shifted from September to May. While the weather may have been generally kinder and the pressure was shifted away from Year 12 students in their final year, there were teething problems. The lead-up to the May date conflicted with pre-season football, hockey, soccer and basketball training outside the School and tended to detract from the single-mindedness that had characterised Hale's 1992 efforts. In addition, there was the annual rash of injuries (which we had avoided in 1992) and, if anything, they were worse this year. While many of these may have been expected and others were gross bad luck, the lack of running fitness that winter sport helps to build was obvious from the start of the athletics season; basketball, cricket, tennis, swimming and rowing do not provide the same level of running fitness that may be derived from winter sport. Consequently, the short athletics season was fraught by injuries and inadequate preparation.

However, for all the negative aspects of the season, the 1993 athletics season provided Hale School with a number of highlights. We scored a second place behind Aquinas in the Inters. For that the team should be warmly congratulated. Oliver Foster, 1993 Captain of Athletics, became the fastest Hale sprinter ever when he ran 11.0 seconds at the meet against Trinity and Aquinas the weekend before the Inters. Neil Gow won the high jump and became the first Hale athlete to clear 2.00 metres. Scott MacKenzie was narrowly beaten by his Aquinas opponent in the Open Hurdles. He was beaten only by speed. He was the best hurdler this year in the Inters. Kane Warren, Adam Strong, Aaron Triplett, Dane Chandler, Scott James, Scott Relf, Matt Crewe, Jarrod Daniel, Ed Weston and Steve Needle all performed well at the Inters and new students Nick Butler and Tony Monson were assets to the team in their first year.



Oliver Foster awarded Honours for Athletics

Oliver is the fastest athlete ever to run for Hale School. After recording his open record time of 11.00 at the Trinity meet, he backed up two races later to run 11.1 in the U/17 event. He produced the two fastest times by a Hale athlete within five minutes of each other! In doing so, he improved open records that had stood for up to 20 years. Oliver may be compared with other past champions and some may suggest that he did not demonstrate the convincing levels of winning performances over a period of years - he won certainly, but often in relatively slow times. In that lies Oliver's main problem in P.S.A. athletics - he was simply too good for anyone else in his age group and was never tested fully in his main events. The ability of this fine athlete was perhaps best described by those who saw his first 100 metres of the P.S.A. 200 metres event in 1993. Oliver won the race with a blindingly quick second 50 metres and then just coasted home. His priority on the day was the Hale 100 metres record! Oliver has been a prolific point scorer for Hale in P.S.A. athletics. Every year since 1989 he has won at least three individual events and, in 1990 and 1991, five individual events in addition to the relay.



We entered one team in the Champion of Champions event over the weekend of 14th/15th August. This team managed to win the B Grade event which was very pleasing.



Rugby

In fact, Trinity had a most successful season with their 1st XV winning the Brother Redmund Cup for the third year in a row. Hale congratulates Trinity on their fine performance - they remained unbeaten over the season.



The 1st XV completed 1993 with a very similar playing record to 1992. Overall the performances were pleasing, but the team never really matched its potential so did not quite reach the performance level hoped for. If any one game is to be highlighted, then the final one against a rapidly improving Aquinas side was certainly it. The determined second half performance of Hale in defending a slender 5-0 lead against not only a pumped-up Aquinas team (fresh from its previous weekend's victory over Guildford), but also against a strong headwind, was quite outstanding.

Over 1993 there were 26 players who pulled on the 1st XV jersey with 21 playing the required three games to gain their symbols. Without the use of a scrum machine, the tight forwards struggled all season to maintain control in the scrums. This was not easy, for the 1993 front row was the lightest for many seasons. When Nick Jenkins broke his wrist, the youthful Ken Yoshimura and John Shin competed for his position. It was a rapid learning experience for both of them with John just eclipsing Ken by the end of the season. Lev Elson-Schwab, the "Rent-a-Yank",

capably anchored the opposite prop position after moving from hooker. His former position was taken by young Nick Golding. Whereas the front row might have lacked size, the middle row was one of the tallest for some time and lineout work was a strong aspect of the 1993 season. Neil Gow being particularly successful jumping from number four and Mark Fowler in his first season in rugby, gained considerable ball from number two in the lineout. Gavin Wearne and Chris Mitchell also added height and strength towards the back of the lineout. In the loose, Damien Cooper was beginning to show considerable talent, but then was injured and it must have been quite frustrating for him to see out the end of the season as a spectator rather than a player. The smallest forward, Greg Roworth, played with great determination and spirit in the "pocket battleship" class typical of the very best of open flankers and Greg must be pleased with his 1993 season.

Paul Srhoj began the season at half-back, but shifted to centre later in the season. It has been a learning year for Paul and he promises much for 1994. Matthew Brooker was quite devastating from the half position and the opposing teams found him very hard to contain. He was the top try scorer for the season and with a little more luck at times, he could have added greatly to his try tally of five. The inside backs of Ryan Parkin and Sean Mouatt gathered confidence over the season and are exciting prospects for 1994. Ryan capped his season by being selected for the successful W.A. Open Schools' team that won the Australian Second Grade Tournament held this year in Darwin. Scotty MacKenzie and Matty Daniels held the wing positions for the year. Playing with great spirit, both players represented considerable danger for most teams with their hard running style of play. Joe Fowler played in various positions over the season and can be described as the complete utility player. He gained selection in the W.A. U/16 State team that toured to Victoria during the July holidays - he was in the State Open side in 1992 whilst still under 16. Joe was the team's top point scorer - 44 points out of the team total of 113 - and his excellent solo try against Aquinas was a fitting conclusion to a fine season for him.

2nd XV (Coaches: Jock Tiernan, Tom Mitchell, Nigel Sonntag) 1993 was a very successful season for this very enthusiastic group. Like always, demands by the 1st XV to replace injured players meant that the team was continually reorganising and this must have been quite unsettling at times. Nevertheless, to finish third in the table is the best result for some time. Michael Cameron, Joel Fogarty, Ashley Cornish, Aaron Smith, Tommy Sugano and Stephen MacKay played strongly in the backs. The forwards were ably led by Jason Warrick, Shane Trainer, Damien Healy and Cameron Sutherland.

Year 10 (Coaches: Michael Kilkenny, Richard Adams)
From the disastrous 1992 season, this group started off under the stewardship of Mr Kilkenny with a strong looking squad. The tight forwards of Chen, Creasy, Monson and Laing boasted strength and size exceeding that of the 1st XV, but as the season unfolded, the bad luck of 1992 continued to haunt this team with both Creasy and Chen breaking bones in their lower legs. By the end of the season, injuries had decimated the team and the final few games were played with undermanned teams.

Year 9 (Coaches: Greg Harvey, John Wallman, John Arkle) This group of about 25 players must feel a little disappointed with their 1993 season. Although the player numbers were obviously good, the team did not combined effectively enough to win more than two of their ten games. All the same, several of their losses were by five or less points and with a little more luck, further victories might have been had. A reliable goal kicker must be found for 1994 for conversion points went begging in most of the games. For the forwards, Ryan McAlister and Simon Ford led the way. The Hollinshead twins of Edward and Dominick, together with Michael Baumanis, improved greatly over the season. Aaron Mack, after shifting from the hooker position, played with great determination in the backs.

Year 8 (Coach: Lawrence Scott)

What this large group lacked in size they more than made up for in spirit. This fighting spirit, expertly directed by their coach, Mr Scott, led them to six victories out of their ten games and they amassed a fine total of 226 points in the process. With all players giving of their best, it is difficult to highlight any particular player. Nevertheless, Nathan Taylor, Theo Kailis and Brett Surman performed exceptionally well over the season. Nathan Taylor becomes the inaugural holder of the Arran Mullins' Memorial Award for Best Year Eight player.

Debating

Overall, two Hale teams made the State finals and we were unlucky not to have several more teams qualifying. Thus, the W.A.D.L. Competition for 1993 was a successful one for the Hale Debating Society and all of the debaters who took part should be congratulated.

A.H.I.S.A. Competition

On the 18th August, the Association of Heads of Independent Schools of Australia Debating Competition began at Perth College, Hale entering nine teams. Results were as follows:

The Year 8's entered two teams in the competition and in its first competition the Year 8A team showed great potential on the way to an undefeated record after five debates. The 8B team also did well to win three of five debates. This was a grand performance by both Year 8 teams and hopefully the tyros in these teams should continue to build on this success in the future.



Languages

Japanese

Three years ago the teaching of the Japanese language was introduced in Hale School. Although it is still quite a new subject, the demand to learn Japanese has strongly increased in our society which is reflected in the number of students choosing this subject on entering the Senior School. In 1993 there are 130 students from Years 8 to 10 learning Japanese.

The students develop the four main skills of a language — listening, speaking, reading and writing. This is linked with the home study tape with exercises prepared for the students from the very early stage of the Year 8 programme. Students also learn the Japanese culture through communication skills.

Students participated in the following activities during 1993:

Language Week: This took place from the 9th to 13th August. Students enjoyed eating a traditional Japanese festive box lunch, attending the exhibition of a famous Japanese film, looking at the Japanese Projects prepared by students from Years 8, 9 and 10 and the cultural artefacts kindly donated by the Japanese Consulate which were displayed in the library. Another highlight was a demonstration of the art of Karate by members of the University of W.A. Karate Club.

Japanese Speech Contest: This contest was arranged by the Japanese Consulate and held on the 22nd August at the Curtin University. Eighteen students from Years 8, 9 and 10 participated and two students — from Years 9 and 10 — won Honourable Prizes.

Australian/Japanese Student Exchange Programme: Hale School developed a sister relationship with Washimiya City, Japan in 1992. A trip to Japan from 29th September to 16th October, 1992 was organised and 22 Hale School students and two staff members visited this city and were hosted by Japanese families. Some of the highlights were the ride on the bullet train from Tokyo to view Mt Fuji, shopping during two days free time in Osaka and Kobe City and a day at Disneyland in Tokyo. The students and staff thoroughly enjoyed the experience. During 1994 Hale will host students from Washimiya City. This exchange programme will surely help us appreciate our earnest efforts in understanding and communicating with another culture.

1993 has been a very interesting year for students of the Japanese language and I am sure that this will continue in future years.

Japan Exchange

On the 28th September, twenty one boys from Years 9 and 10, accompanied by Mr Bean and Mr Lim, left for Japan. This was the second stage in the Exchange Programme between Hale School and Washimiya City. The first stage began in 1992 when nine Japanese students visited Hale School.

We were greeted in Washimiya by many distinguished members of its community including the Mayor and Chairman of the City. We then met our host families with whom we were to spend half of our time in Japan. Despite the obvious communication barriers, everybody settled in quickly. The host families' friendliness was, for many, the highlight of the trip.

In the short time we stayed in Japan we learned a lot about its customs. We ate with chopsticks, slept on futons and experienced the frustration of having to take off our shoes before entering any building.

Most of us had only eaten a little, if any, Japanese food and we soon had to get used to eating rice with every meal. Breakfast was one of the hardest things to get used to. Every morning we ate food like clam soup, fish or salad. It might come as a surprise that one of our favourite foods was sashimi (or raw fish). Mr Bean was the bravest of us all — he ate fried grasshoppers one night!

Whilst in Japan we spent two days at one of three schools — Nishi, Higashi and Washimiya Junior High School. School is very different in Japan. Students do not have homework, but their school day is longer and they also go to school for a half day on Saturdays and night school during the week. For Hale students who think they have a hard time — it's a lot harder in Japan! Even so, we all enjoyed it and made many new friends. Much of our time was spent travelling around Japan on Bullet trains which travel at speeds of up to 270 km/hr.

We visited many different areas, from the very crowded and polluted Tokyo to the beautiful mountainous areas around Nikko. There were many highlights during the trip, including our visit to Tokyo Disneyland, the Big Buddha — which lived up to its name — and the Atomic Bomb Museum in Hiroshima, which proved to be a very moving experience.

We returned home somewhat reluctantly, thanks to the kindness of our host families and new friends. Many of us are looking forward to returning to Japan in the near future, as well as seeing our friends again when they come to Hale next year.

Everyone enjoyed themselves immensely on this Exchange, but more importantly we returned with a greater understanding of Japanese customs, culture and language which cannot be learned in a classroom.

1993 Australian Mathematics Competition Results

The annual Australian Mathematics Competition sponsored by Westpac Banking Corporation was held on the 3rd August in the Memorial Hall and other venues for students in Years 8 to 12. This year, for the first time, Year 7 students represented the Junior School. This year, 472 students from Hale School entered the Competition with great success.

CO-ORDINATOR - AUSTRALIAN MATHEMATICS COMPETITION

1993 Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians

The Australian Mathematical Olympiad Committee (a sub-committee of the Australian Academy of Science in Canberra) has instituted an Australia-wide programme for mathematically interested and talented students in Years 7,8, 9 and 10. The programme is designed to motivate, stimulate, encourage and develop students mathematically in a way that would not necessarily occur through normal school programmes.

The Australian Mathematical Olympiad Committee (A.M.O.C.) asked each school to identify and select students who may be interested in participating in the programme. Selection has been based upon previous school mathematics results and high

performance in the Australian Mathematics Competition for the Westpac Awards.

In March and April of this year, 22 Hale School students partipated in the Challenge Stage of the MCYA. In the Challenge Stage, participants tackled six problems over a period of 3-4 weeks and submitted their solutions to the School Maths Challenge Director. These were marked and results were posted to Canberra. The school received Australia-wide statistics of student achievement as well as certificates for various levels of performance.

In summary, the performance of the Hale students in the Challenge Stage was most pleasing. Many students have demonstrated a real ability and flair for solving non-routine problems and have benefitted from participating.

The results of these students are shown below (in order of merit). The Intermediate Division is for Year 9 and 10 students. The maximum possible score is 24 marks.

Australia wide, there were 2,769 participants in the Junior Division. The mean mark was 8.0 out of 24.

Excellence awards were given to the top 11% in Australia.

Merit awards were given to the next 18%, whilst Achievement awards were given to the next 25%. Participation certificates were given to the remainder.

The second stage of the programme (which has just been completed) is the Enrichment Stage. Students are provided with a series of comprehensive course notes on a number of mathematics enrichment topics. Over a 12-15 week period, students attempted solutions to sixteen challenge problems. The School Maths Challenge Director co-ordinated the marking of student scripts. At the time of printing, the School has not yet received the awards for the Enrichment Stage from Canberra. However, a number of students have performed very well in this stage - notably Daniel Hewitt (Havelock 9), Wesley Huupponen (Riley 8), Jason Foo (Tregonning 8), Harry Oliff (Buntine 8), Adam Strong (Havelock 10) and Jeremy Beckett (Haynes 10).

National Computer Competition

Computer Club

The long lunch break of the second Thursday of Term 1 saw some 25 students report to the computer room for the first meeting of the Computer Club for 1993. The boys were asked to fill in a form to show their interest areas. The replies ranged from "playing games" and "pirating software" — which were banned!! — to "anything to do with computers".

After collation of the responses it was apparent that the major areas of interest were Windows Applications and Multimedia, although some of the older students wanted to make a thorough study of communications — that is, contacting one of Melbourne's better known schools for young ladies and exchanging fanciful conversations with their Year 12's via the computer and a modem! The computer staff felt that the obvious benefits of learning about electronic communications did not justify the expense of the telephone calls — and the repercussions from the staff at the girls' school. We did, however, take the opportunity to demonstrate the fax/modem in Mr Dyer's computer by sending messages to the Hale School office.

The next few weeks saw the boys experimenting with the operation of Windows on the ACER Laptop computers newly installed in the computer room. They used Works for Windows, Publisher and several of the drawing packages and thoroughly

enjoyed exploring the potential of the new machines. In addition, the students learned a little of the possibilities of multimedia computing using the desktop machine in the computer room and were lucky enough to be allowed to use the ACER PAC (Personal Activity Centre) loaned to us by Moncrieff the supplier of our new hardware. This machine not only includes a send/receive fax, a CD-ROM drive, sound card and hifi speakers, but is also a music centre with AM/FM radio and CD, a full function telephone answering machine and an alarm clock it is a very powerful desktop computer. Library

There have been a number of staff changes in the library in 1993. Mrs Heinrichs has retired and Mrs Gray is away in the United Kingdon on eighteen months' leave. Mrs Daniel will be Teacher/Librarian for this time.

Extended library hours continue to be appreciated by the boys. The library is available from 8.15, through recess and most of lunch. After-school opening is being increasingly used by senior students anxious to make the best use of study time available. Wednesday night opening between 7.00 p.m. and 9.00 p.m. is still popular with boarders and day boys alike.

A feature of the library's programme is to adopt technological advances relevant to student needs and, in 1993, the CD network has been upgraded to facilitate faster access to a growing range of software packages. One of these, Austrom, includes retrospective periodical indexes relevant to school use. To further enhance access to up-to-date information through periodicals, CSIRO's data base (SAGE) of abstracts from scientific

and geographical periodicals has been added to the library automation system. Going back to 1988 and updated three times annually, SAGE means that a subject search now provides boys not only with information in books, but with brief abstracts of relevant periodical articles. These abstracts can be printed out and periodicals not immediately available in the library can be obtained through inter-library loan arrangements.

Educational programmes conducted through the library continue to be developed. The Reading Extension Programme, run in conjunction with the English Department, provides for a growing independence and discernment in student readers. The Teacher/Librarians are also currently working closely with other teachers to develop an Information Skills Programme for 1994. It is recognised that the ability to locate and handle a range of information will be vital to the boys' future success and this programme will assist them in developing the ability to logically and systematically apply information skills to meet their specific needs.

The Information Technology Club

This year has once again been extremely busy with the introduction of new computer equipment to satisfy the demand at Hale. Our aim is to provide the best facilities possible for the boys so that they will be well versed in the use of computer technology. A considerable amount of time was also spent this year planning the new computer networks that will be housed in the new Design and Technology Centre.

Last year Hale trialled the use of CD-ROM technology in the Library with two stand-alone PC's and CD-ROM drives. It was decided, because of its success, to expand the use of this new and exciting technology. A CD-ROM network was subequently installed in February. This network included 5 PC's, a laser printer and a fileserver, housing 8 CD-ROM drives. Student and staff usage of this system has been excellent during the year. It is intended to further enhance this CD-ROM network in January, 1994.

Another key initiative undertaken early in 1993 was the updating of the Junior School computer facilities. It was decided to stay with the Acorn range of computers owing to their superb graphics, colour and relevant curriculum based software. An Archimedes network was subsequently installed in the Brine House computer laboratory. This included fifteen state of the art A3020 computers with a networked laser printer all linked back through the school to an A5000 fileserver. To further enhance the learning of Junior School boys, all classrooms in the Junior School have a network point and a computer that can be linked in to access information on the main Junior School network.

This year Hale took delivery of a further thirty notebook computers. These all use Microsoft Windows as their operating environment. Due to price, performance, warranty and available support we decided to purchase ACER notebook computers. These were predominantly used by the Year 8 Information Technology and Years 8 and 9 Design and Technology students.

During the year, senior Chemistry students were also involved in the pilot programme organised by Mr Shearer using a programme that he developed on Chemistry Bonding. Senior Law and Government students were also involved using the ACER notebook computers to study our current Federal political structure using "The Parliament Stack". The existing set of Toshiba notebook computers were predominantly used by Accounting students (Accountability and other software) as well as Geography students who used them extensively in their studies of urbanisation (SimCity) and world geography (PC Globe).

It is our intention to fully integrate the use of computers into all curriculum areas in the coming years. After all, computers can provide a very stimulating learning environment that can be used to enhance the teaching of the classroom teacher in his or her subject area.

Rock Climbing Club



1993 Year 9 Camp

Rottnest Conservation Project

Exmouth Expedition

The fifth annual migration of Year 11 Hale School students to Exmouth was a pleasant experience, not only for the activities, but for the six weeks of rain-free warmth experienced while it poured down in Perth. The Exmouth Outdoor Education Programme is now regarded as one of the best in Australian schools.

This year our new facility at Kailis' Fisheries was used for the first time. It proved to be a well-positioned base camp which offered the eight groups a welcome break from the rigours of camping life. 


Group 5

Group 6




Throughout the trip there were many memorable moments and many memorable comments — some of which cannot be mentioned here!

The Exchange Experience

The Scottish Exchange

Daniel Stewart's and Melville College, a school of about the same age as Hale School, had already become reasonably familiar to me by December, 1991 through my contacts with two members of its English Department, one of them my exchangee. When I did see it — the day after my arrival in Edinburgh — the reality certainly matched the impression I had gained. The term began on 6th January, 1992 and I quickly confirmed that this was a school where discipline was quiet but effective, where excellent academic standards were maintained and where a tremendous variety of other activities, both cultural and sporting, was enjoyed by so many students, both the boys from DSMC and the girls from the sister school, the Mary Erskine School, a kilometre away "up the Dykes" (MES was situated on a road called, curiously, Ravelstone Dykes).



These many activities even extending to the sixth year singing Christmas Carols in front of the school in December and an atmospheric Carol Service in St Mary's Cathedral contributed to my appreciation of being on the DSMC staff.

Stewart's-Melville is a very strong rugby school and up to 27 teams would turn out each week during the season — one soccer team carried the DSMC banner each weekend! The school had three old boys in the 1991 Scottish World Cup squad and I enjoyed watching the skills and commitment of the 1st XV in 1992. The boys of the school would certainly appreciate the convenience of the facilities for these sports at Hale however!

I became involved with debating and public speaking and travelled with various teams to high schools of the Victorian era (straight from Dickens in some cases) and other venues where the very competitive and challenging Scottish systems in both speaking areas were a source of great interest. DSMC has an excellent record in these areas and this continued in 1992.

Over the twelve months we managed to see a good deal of the spectacularly beautiful country that is Scotland. We saw ancient abbeys, soaring mountains (and at Carbisdale, DSMC's outdoor programme, endless bogs under the bleakest skies, accompanied by horizontal sleet!), breathtaking lochs and serene rural settings, all within relatively easy reach of Edinburgh. The beautiful countryside of the Borders was within easy reach at weekends.

Edinburgh was well situated as a "jumping off" point for Europe and we spent a considerable time there. The highlight of our summer holidays (we were the "senior" backpackers on many trains in countries such as Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia and France) was undoubtedly the eight days spent at the Barcelona Olympics, where among a number of Australian athletes, we watched Alison Inverarity competing strongly in the women's high jump. To stand in front of a war scarred Reichstag and Brandenburg Gate in Berlin was an experience I had long anticipated — and will long remember.

I visited several schools in Edinburgh, speaking principally to members of the English Department at each and looking at how such departments were administered. A highlight was a detailed look at the special education area of George Watson's College, another of Edinburgh's leading independent schools, whose facilities were something that any school could well aim at. I attended several in-service courses, both in Scotland and south of the border, each of which was a worthwhile experience.

1992 was rich in experiences, both personal and professional. I consider myself fortunate to have been at DSMC where I was welcomed so warmly and where I experienced a sense of camaraderie and caring among the staff which is unique in my experience.

The warmth of the Scottish people more than compensated for the bleakness of the weather and, in my memories, 1992 will always be a highlight.

I thoroughly recommend an exchange to any teacher fortunate enough to be offered one.

The English Exchange

During the period August, 1992 to July, 1993 I was fortunate enough to be involved in a teaching exchange to the U.K. The School was St Edward's School in Oxford and my teaching partner was Derek Wiggins. We each took over the other's teaching assignments and for accommodation, swapped houses. My wife, Nola and two children, Erin and Sam, accompanied me on the exchange. Derek brought his wife, Sarah.

Oxford is a beautiful University city, located toward one end of even more beautiful countryside — the Cotswolds. St Edward's has been a part of the city since 1863. Its original campus was right in the centre of Oxford. A shift was made about ten years later to Summertown, the current site of the School. With some 90 acres of land only one and a half miles from its original location, this would have to be one of the best positioned schools in England.

I was amazed when I saw my class list. Six, seven, eight, twelve, nine and thirteen students were the figures. This was going to be a holiday! Then I saw the timetable — five days, 8.45 to 6.30, Saturday 8.45 to 12.45, then games (which meant at least until 4.30, possibly 7.00) and for good measure 1.00 to 5.00 every third Sunday. It was brought home very strongly that teaching at a private school in the U.K. is very demanding of time — quite a few staff saw this as a minimum and would also stay on for prep (9.30), plus give up a week or two of holidays to go on camps. Needless to say, the staff at St Edward's were a very dedicated, professional group.

Students at St Edward's are one year older than their equivalents at Hale, e.g., "Shells" (Year 8's) are 14 years old. The final year pupils (Upper 6th) are 18 and often 19 years old. Students in the 6th forms are entitled to drink at a Junior Common Room during prescribed hours. This is generally well handled by the 6th formers who act with a great deal of maturity.

Sport is taken very seriously. At schoolboy age there is no higher standard for rugby, rowing and cricket in the U.K. In Western Australia it would be normal for young sportspeople to play both for their school and an outside club. That is not the case in a U.K. public school. If a boy or girl (there are 60 girls in the 6th form and 500 boys from Shells to 6th form) wants to play sport they have to make the school team. The preparation for the top teams is intense and the level of play excellent. In particular, St Edward's enjoyed succes with its rowers winning three National Schools Titles.

I found the students to be well disciplined and willing to work. Despite the long hours it was a most enjoyable experience and it seemed that good progress was made. Some of the students were a good deal brighter than myself and it was rewarding to learn new skills. For example, two of my Design & Technology students were very good with computers and electronics. I was able to learn much from them about computer graphics and the production of printed circuit boards.

Like Hale, St Edward's has many facets to it beyond good students, staff, academics and sport. Cultural activities like

painting, plays and music are very strong. Socially, it actively involves its parents and guests in dinners and Gaudys (speeches, food and drink in the quadrangle). We were also fortunate to be included in many family meals. The friendship extended by staff was much appreciated and allowed my wife and children to make new contacts and, in some cases, to develop close friendships

Outside of school we found our village, Yarnton, to be an ideal place for a quiet family life. The children were involved in the local school and playgroup. Over time both Erin and Sam made good friends with other children and were able to enjoy their stay to the point that when it was time to head back to Australia they were less than keen to go.



It was interesting to contrast the gentle pace of traffic and sense of calm in the village with the nearby 80 mp.h. motorways and congestion of Oxford. On a number of occasions I walked the three miles to school and often beat my usual bus which became caught in the traffic jams which surround Oxford. The usual cause was a "weak bridge" which would divert seemingly endless queues of vehicles onto already busy streets. The motorways are very effective and efficient, but in England these occasionally suffer the ignominy of British Rail type maladies. Not just for weak bridges (heavy salting of roads in winter cause corrosion of steel structures, i.e., the bridges) but for buckling of long stretches due to heatwaves! This occurred during one day in the summer when the mercury shot up to 28 degrees Celsius!

Travel is easy in the U.K. Despite weak bridges and the risk of heatwaves, we saw many beautiful towns and villages. Sometimes this involved short trips of ten miles or less, sometimes a long trip was necessary — 200 miles. In Australian terms it was just a quick hop from one place to another. Even the Continent is easy to access. We had two wonderful weeks in Britanny and all it took was a night crossing on a ferry and two hours of driving — albeit on the wrong side of the road.

As an opportunity to develop professionally, travel and try something new, this was a highlight for myself and my family. In years to come we will remember our time away as a rewarding and positive experience. I now look forward to pursuing my career at Hale and will begin to put into place the new skills gained during my time away. Thank you to those who enabled me to go and good luck to Derek and Sarah with their careers and lives in England.

The Manchester Boys Choir

On Monday the 29th of March, a young talented group of young boys performed in our school memorial hall. These boys belong to the Manchester choir who have been hailed as one of the finest children's choirs in the world. Their group was formed in 1981 and were made up by musical director, Adrian P. Jesset Currently the senior tutor for Choral and Vocal Music at the Manchester City Council Education Committee Service, Mr Jesset is acknowledged as one of the leading trainers of boys voices and on the changing voice. The age of the boys in the choir ranges from 9 to 15 and all go to different schools. They train up to 3 hours a week and have in their present repertoire a knowledge of 80 to 100 songs! But multitudes can have its drawbacks. Another skill to acquire is to sing their songs in 6 different languages; Latin, French, German, Finnish,

Czechoslovakian and English! Judging by their travel itineraries they need their knowledge. They have travelled to Hong Kong, Czechoslovakia, England,, Finland, Canada and Australia. These extremely talented boys have sung for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second and alongside Ben Kingsley, and even in musicals such as "Evita" and "The Sound of Music". Being used to singing to crowds of 3000 onwards our assembly of 800 students and parents was simply 'cosy' as Mr Jesset described it! Their tours are usually held at the end of school term, but if unfortunate enough, a tutor accompanies them to 'encourage' their studies. These boys also possess another interesting characteristic, they all volunteer for the choir. New boys are taken under wing and no auditions necessary. "I think it is important for the boys to feel a sense of achievement by doing something for themselves, and enjoying it" commentated Mr Jesset, "It is not simply devoting time and effort to be in a choir, an act of determination is required." Well, the students and staff of Hale certainly thought that achievement was accomplished greatly and gladly welcomes them to return and perform again.

A Grand Old Haleian

Tom Fowler retained his interest and support for the School over a span of 64 years. Rarely did he miss an Old Boys' Day and he readily supported any School functions held in his country region.

When the School was ready to move from Havelock Street to Wembley Downs, Tom brought his tractor up from Williams to assist with the clearing of the land.

Tom was the proud father of four boys and three girls. One of his daughters, Jenny, retained the link with Hale by marrying Old Boy, Gordon Pearse (1959-1964).

Two generations of the Fowler family have provided Hale School Boat Club with a steady stream of reliable oarsmen. Three of Tom's sons rowed for Hale in the 1960s and 1970s: Doug (1963-1967) was a member of the 1st VIII in 1966 and 1967 and Captain of Boats in 1967; Ben (1967-1971), who rowed in the winning Head of the River crew of 1971; and Stephen (1970-1974), in the 1st VIII of 1974.

In the 1993 Head of the River regatta, no less than five of Tom Fowler's grandsons rowed for Hale:

Alexander Pearse (Loton 122), 1st VIII, Vice Captain of Boats — son of Gordon Pearse;

SImon Fowler (Loton 12), 2nd VIII — son of Richard Fowler (1958-1963);

Mark Fowler (Loton 11), 1st VIII — son of Doug Fowler; James Pearse (Loton 10), Year 10A VIII — son of Gordon Pearse; Timothy Fowler (Loton 10), Year 10 IV — son of Richard Fowler.

A sixth grandson, Andrew Fowler, son of Richard and, predictably, a member of Loton House, was in the winning Head of the River VIII in 1991.

The School was privileged to have had Tom Fowler attend the Old Boys' Day and Rowing Assembly on 26 March this year. Tom sat on stage next to the Headmaster and presented the 1st VIII crew with their singlets, on each occasion wishing the boys every success in the next day's Head of the River.

Although Tom will not be at any future Old Haleian and School functions, his spirit will be with us through his sons and grandsons. Vale Old Boy.

Although rather fewer students in 1992 than in 1991 achieved the very highest pinnacle of public success as denoted by the Government Awards listed above, the average marks achieved subject by subject were very pleasing. For 15 out of the 17 TEE subjects taken at Hale, the school average was higher than the State's and for many subjects it was much higher. The following 8 subjects - French, Discrete Maths, Calculus, Ancient History, Geography, Biology, Chemistry and Physics — had final mark averages over five marks higher than the State's. Nineteen students received TEE scores over 400 (out of a possible 510).



Hale Represented Inter-State

Judging by the large number of Hale School students who have been chosen to represent the State (and in some cases the nation) in a wide range of activities this year, it would appear that Hale School is continuing to achieve considerable recognition Australia-wide.

Apart from the winning National Debating Championship team, mention of which is made elsewhere in this magazine, the School has also been well represented on the sporting field.

Grant McGill (Riley 12) has achieved notoriety in Archery at the State and national levels. This year, Grant was chosen in the State Junior Archery team for the fifth successive year to compete at the Australian Junior Archery Championships in Townsville in anuary. Grant competed in the U/18 Division and gained Silver and Bronze Medals and a fourth place over three individual events and a Gold Medal for the State team's event. As a result of these performances, for the third time Grant was selected in the Australian Junior Archery team to tour New Zealand. He was also selected, for the second time, in the Australian Junior Training Squad to attend, in April, a training camp at the Australian Institute of Sport. Due to his Year 12 commitments, Grant did not participate in these events, but no doubt we will hear of his further successes in the years ahead.

In Athletics, Anthony Monson (Riley 10) was a member of the State U/15 team which toured Singapore in July. Anthony competed in discus and shotput. He was also a member of the 1992-93 National team and, at the National Titles in December last year, Anthony won Gold in the U/15 hammer throw. He is looking forward to participating in the National Titles at the end

of the year. Neil Gow (Tregonning 12) was also a member of the State Athletics team at the National Titles in December last year. Neil competed in the U/16 high jump.

In Rugby Union, Ryan Parkin (Riley 11) represented the State when he was selected in the Schoolboys' Rugby Union team which toured Darwin at the end of September. Joe Fowler (Parry 12) and Matt Brooker (Tregonning 12) were members of the U/16 W.A. Rugby Union team which toured Adelaide for the National Championships during the July holidays. W.A. finished third in the competition. Ryan McAlister (Parry 9) and Kevin Bayett (Tregonning 9) were members of the State U/14 Rugby Union team which competed against the N.T. and S.A. in the July holidays

In Ice Hockey the School has had one representative in the State team this year. Phil Henry (Haynes 9) represented W.A. in the U/15 team which competed in the National Titles in Sydney in July. David Bandy (Haynes10) represented the State in the U/15 Cricket team in a national competition in January.

In April, Damien Cooper (Buntine 11) represented Western Australia in two national sporting events. He was chosen to go to Melbourne as a member of the W.A. School Sports' Association State Triathlon team and he was a member of the W.A. Age Swimming team which competed in the National Championships in Brisbane.

George Kailis (St Georges 10) was selected to represent Western Australia in the Australian School Surfing Titles which were held at Narrabeen, N.S.W. in June. George was one of five in the U/16 team. In the lead up to his selection, George won the All Stars U/16 School Boys' Surfing Title held at Big Rock in May this year.

To represent one's State or country is a great honour and deserving of congratulations and recognition. The Hale community commends these students and wishes them well for the future.

Valedictory Speech

Eight months ago I stood before you as I stand now and I swore to uphold the traditions and the honour of Hale School. It was a point of change in my life, a time when I had to think of others instead of just myself. After five years at Hale School, this is the single most important lesson that I have been taught.

In reality, today is the last time we will see each other together — we are all moving on. A few months ago I sat atop the cliffs of the most western point on Rottnest with two friends. As we watched the dolphins play under the increasingly ominous sky I asked them if they thought we would still see each other next year or even the year after. Their reaction was instant and predictable — "Of course we will, why not?" Yet as we turned to leave I remember feeling as though something had been lost there on those cliffs — maybe it was my childhood — maybe it was my friends. I guess I'll find out eventually. But no matter, even if I don't see them for twenty years, they'll still be my friends.

What is important to remember is that we will always have Hale School — a place where we grew, where we learned and where we played. A place that helped us on our way, preparing us ever so subtly for this day, for the rest of our lives. Along the way there's been great times, characters and events that can never be forgotten. Our memories span the entire time that we have been at this school and encompass all that we have done.

As a small and skinny Year 8 I was hung over the balcony outside B4 by my feet for being too cheeky. My sore arm was a constant reminder that backchat would not be tolerated. I remember finding it strange to go from a position of power as an all conquering Year 7 to being the lowest of the low in the big school.


I have never been more scared in my life than when I got my first diary signing. My knees were knocking together so hard and I thought my heart would explode. When I showed it to my Housemaster, Mr Greenwell, he just smiled and crossed it off. I'll never forget that.

I remember when assembly was merely a contest between Mr Greenwell and Mr Hopkins, a vocal duel to see who could sing the loudest. Mr Hopkins would sing so hard he would go red and I expected him to explode at any second. I could never tell who won this extraordinary event, but I think they both enjoyed it.

Year 11 was perhaps my most enjoyable year at Hale — the "quantum leap between year 10 and Year 11" — providing new challenges. It was also the year that the ugly spectre of the TEE became firmly entrenched on the horizon. We were told by Mr Green of the truly amazing co-relation between success in TEE physics and joining the Bridge Club — a fact many of us found hard to appreciate.

Exmouth provided us with a completely new arena in which to prove our worth. Many found the going tough — others had an easier time. I was lucky to have a fantastic group of boys to share my time up north with — it's something that I will always cherish. Yet, no matter what group you were in, or who you had as a leader, or whether you mustered up the courage to complete the forward abseil, everybody stepped off the bus a better person than when they had stepped on two weeks earlier.

This year, it seems, has been a bit of a blur. The new found responsibilities and pressures have laid heavily on many shoulders. The TEE now dominates our lives. It is the finale of twelve years of schooling. It has been suggested that to achieve your goals is to have succeeded in life. However, it is important to remember that there are many more goals to be set and achieved in the future. Over the next three weeks, many of us will fall short of our goals — hopefully not through want of trying.


