

s I reflect upon the 143rd year of this School, I am reminded of our deep need to form communities, and the power and the potential of buoyant, cohesive communities, which share worthwhile goals. The Sydney Olympics, where an extraordinary generosity of spirit prevailed, provided a graphic reminder of this for us.

To reflect upon the year 2000 in the life of Hale School is to celebrate the endeavour, involvement, support, teamwork, range of talents, friendships, trust, learning and growth of many people following many different paths and to celebrate the gift of life itself. We have shared a sense of identity, a sense of purpose, a sense of community and a sense of journeying together; the focal point being Hale School.

Western Australia's Review of Post-Compulsory Education, the rapidly improving information and communications technologies, the expanding range of flexible skills required for a changing and more complex work force in a global economy and the less stable environments in which children are raised all bring into question the role of the School in 10-20 years time, and our traditional concepts of schools.

We are becoming increasingly aware of the need people have to form and belong to communities, the binding force of which are fulfilling and worthwhile activities and relationships. Ours is an increasingly amorphous society where the inclination is to develop things on an ever larger scale resulting in ever more frayed threads of identity.

Schools are communities. They are learning communities. They are human communities and they are developing especially strongly as lynch-pins in our society. In these communities the making of a generous, strong and quality contribution

simultaneously builds well the community and enhances the individual contributor.

It is from individuals making a wholehearted effort, giving, with the focus on other than self, that the growing, the rewards, the maturity, the more elevated journeys flow.

The greatest contribution we can ever make to a community is through the gift of our personal qualities and our virtues. We can all make a strong contribution here for this has nothing to do with God given talent.

A reflection from a member of a learning and teaching community, a teacher, but it could as well be a student:

"I have come to a frightening conclusion. I am a decisive element in a classroom and around the School. It is my personal approach that creates the climate. It is my daily mood that makes the weather. I possess tremendous power to make another's life miserable or joyous. I can be a tool of torture or an instrument of inspiration. I can facilitate learning and growth or I can place barriers in the way. I can humiliate or humour, hurt or heal. In all situations it is my response that decides whether a crisis will be escalated or deescalated, and another person humanised or dehumanised."

In our fast moving times of social instability, we all need more than ever a sense of rootedness in a living and everlasting tradition. We need to learn to hear the sound of eternity and feel the assurance of a grounded anchor in the midst of change.

This everlasting tradition needs to have deep rich veins of what is best, most elevating and most honourable about civilised and just societies and of what provides for the living of fulfilling lives.

Education is a key. Schools and universities are keys. We may well defend our shores by military means, but we defend our civilisation with quality learning institutions.

In a good educational situation, learners are engaged with their learning and desirable outcomes emerge regularly. In most quality educational settings, learners are engaged with their teachers, learners are engaged by their teachers.

In education, just as much is achieved by mood as by method, by the spirit as by the intellect. It is more to do with mind-set than the mark book. In this most human of activities, we must think mostly in human terms. We must talk human strategies. Talk to people, look into their eyes, and remember that wisdom and perceptions often get us further than bolted-on concepts. Teaching and learning is a human activity or it is nothing.

TS Eliot asked: "Where is the life we have lost in living? Where is the wisdom we have lost in knowledge? Where is the knowledge we have lost in information?"

We need to appreciate that a school should be a community, acting through the medium of education, which is committed to developing students as rounded and well-integrated people, able to serve and able to love.

A school does well to enable its students to have the courage and the means to drop the protective guards that may have been built about their souls; to enable them to have the various aspects of their innermost selves made accessible, receptive and eager to explore and grow.

Many people are associated in many different ways with the Hale School community. They have shared journeys through a common region but by way of different paths.

Today signals the end of a road, and a most significant turning point in an association with Hale for nearly 200 students, 8 teachers, many parents and others.

To name but very few:

Clancy Rudeforth, a very warm, respected and unpretentious leader of the School and a cohesive, respectful Year 12 group of very fine young men; Nadine Fraize, Alastair Macmillan, Richard Pengelley.

I suspect that whilst Nadine Fraize was growing up near Paris she did not anticipate becoming the first woman to hold a senior position at a boys school in Perth, which was founded in Napoleon III's time. She has performed her duties here with Gallic brilliance for nearly 9 years.



When it was announced this time last year that I would be Captain of School for 2000, the most common responses I got were "you?" and "Sweet, a speech day address that lasts for less than 3 minutes!"

Well, I don't know if I can promise that, but I will try and keep it relevant and understandable.

My target audience is the boys, my underlying message and theme is to be yourself, keep it real, don't get caught up in trying to conform or be something you're not.

Obviously, the pressure put on a "different individual" by members of a group so insecure about themselves that they feel they have to verbally or physically alienate someone who is 'different' is often so great that the 'odd-one-out' is forced to conform to the group stereotype, just to feel accepted.

The blame here is not on the previously excluded person for conforming, but rather on the group for not accepting that all members of a community are individual in their own way.

Therefore, if being allowed to be yourself equals enjoyment in life, and enjoying yourself leads to getting the most out of yourself, then I think the most relevant but also the toughest challenge for the boys of Hale School is to forget about stereotypes, ask yourself "Am I being myself, Am I letting others be themselves?"

Because if you are, I think you are doing a service not only to yourself, but to the school community as a whole.


The most pleasing aspect of year 12 for me was that the all too common scenario I just mentioned was minimalised.

Almost everyone I think felt that they could be themselves because the larger group accepted individuals for who they were.

It was the same in 1999.

A year group which maybe was not such a tight unit before they became the leaders of the school, suddenly gelled together through the universal responsibility of setting the tone for the rest of the school, and wide ranging success inevitably followed.

Their example was not lost on us as year 12 leaders and I hope what I think was an excellent example across the board this year will not be lost on the year 12s of 2001.



In my opinion, to lead is to do something most people don't want to do at the time.

To the year 12s of next year, a lot of people don't think that there is the leadership or team atmosphere essential to leading a school within you.

My message is...

Who cares what people think, the school needs you to step up and do the things that the bulk of people wouldn't, so learn to cross the boundaries of fear just as we all have to, because the example you set will determine the success of Hale School in 2001.

In illustrating my point I will use the example of the Darlot Cup winning 1st XI cricket team of 2000, a group said by some to lack the leaders and stars that the 1999 team had.

When someone needed to step up and be counted, more than one person did, and success once again followed.

The link between goals, leadership, direction and success is obvious; do not underestimate the power of one in setting off chain reactions of success. It happened in 99 and 2000 and I'm sure if you get off to a good start next year success will follow.

I'll now go through a few of the events which made this year the most enjoyable of my five years at Hale.

Firstly, the rowing shed as a whole, but in particular the 1st VIII, who won the prestigious Head of the River after having never won a race in their entire rowing careers at Hale. Once again, a group not regarded as the star crew in 1st VIII circles stood up when they had to because they wanted it more than any other crew.

That trait, of 'finding that little bit extra when we have to' is becoming more and more a characteristic of Hale teams, and it is something we should work hard to keep.

Astrofunk 2000: Organised chiefly by my parents, Geoff and Dianne. Cameron Stevens and his mum Mrs Jan Stevens, Mr Adrian Arnold and his sidekick Duncan Shaw, the night went off with a capital O... (for off) The nightclub atmosphere created under the big tent had everyone who attended saying that this was the best ball ever.

Athletics: The athletics team began training earlier than ever, with the intention of taking out the Alcock Shield for only the second time since World War 2.

On the day of the Inters, our theme song, "Right Here Right Now" was pumping out of Wilson House as the buses left for Perry Lakes. We were primed, the scene was set, and I felt as if I could start thinking of a victory speech then and there.

Led by a great group of year 12s, an outstanding middle distance group and dominant throwers, Hale was in front all day.

Before the final relay, it was announced that we were up by half a point, only having to finish ahead of Aquinas to clinch the shield.

In what will go down as one of the classic Inters finishes, we were pipped on the line, not before breaking the school record time for the Open relay. We gave it our best. The beers were on ice and unfortunately they had to stay like that.

As Mr. Biddle said at the post-inters function,

"In sport, there is more agony than ecstacy", and as I said at the same function....Beep beeep beeep expletive beeep!!.

It was still a highlight for me because of the way a group of boys which would not usually have the opportunity to be in the same team as people like James Ayers, Chris Hood, Craig Wilson, Calum Page or Mark Somic, came together as one, thanks largely to the leadership of the senior athletes, as well as the coaches, in particular Mr. Crosbie, Mr Groughan, Mr Peisker and Andrew Lane.

There were many other highlights but the only other one I will single out is the Valedictory Chapel service for the departing year 12s.

None of you will understand how much school means to you until you experience that service.

In 45 minutes, the appreciation of our whole schooling lives and the realisation that this was the end hit me like nothing else I have experienced. You have been a teacher, coach, advisor and mate to me in my time here and we as a year twelve group feel honoured, even if it is only coincidental, that you chose our year as the year in which to retire. Thankyou.

Also to Mr Bonnin, Mr Hopkins and Mr. Dowse, who had great influences on me throughout my years here and always seemed interested in how I was going.

Finally to my parents... Mum and Dad, for doing most of the things that I got the credit for this year, and to my Grandma, for continuously emphasising the point that studies are as important as sport.

I'm sorry if it lasted for more than 3 minutes but I hope my message of being yourself, letting others be themselves and just showing an interest was understood by all the boys.

Chapel

The Chapel of St.Mark was a very busy place throughout the year 2000. The weddings began in earnest in January so that by the time school started on 1st February, the place was well and truly warmed up. It has been my vision over the years to include chapel services as a natural part of what we do at Hale, as well as to mark the big occasions with meaningful and sacred rituals. Some of the highlights for this year were:

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- a late night prefects' leadership training service before school started.
- the staff chapel service where the Dean of Perth, the Very Rev.
 Dr.John Shepherd was the guest preacher,
- a variety of house chapels for the beginning of the year, prefect inductions, community building, the end of the year, change of Head of Houses.
- boarders' chapels which settled on a 9.00pm candle-lit format which seemed to connect really well with the boys,
- monthly family services on Sunday mornings, where many baptisms and welcomes to communions occurred.
- a wonderful confirmation night, led by Bishop Brian Farran where 13 boys, a parent, a sister and a staff member were confirmed,
- a series of guest speakers and preachers,
- · weddings and funerals,
- Old Boys Day, Retired Old Haleins, Mother's day, Father's Day and several other secular observances,
- Church year services including Ash Wednesday, Lent, Palm Sunday, Easter (a fantastic and very moving promenade chapel around the grounds lead by Mr.Beckett and his year 10 and 11 drama students), Pentecost, Ascension, Trinity, All Souls, Advent and Christmas,
- morning and evening prayer every day in the Oratory and a weekly Thursday lunchtime eucharist,
- the commissioning of Father Tim Russell as Assistant Chaplain in the Oratory by John Shepherd,



- a very moving year 12 Valedictory service.
- · a final year 7 service,
- a sit-on-the-floor eucharist with the leaving year 12 boarders,
- and a wide variety of year group chapels.

The Chapel was also used throughout the year for a variety of speakers, choir practice, outside musical groups and a few services for other schools and groups. It has been a real help to have Tim Russell as my Assistant this year. He came to us from the Christchurch Claremont parish and has brought many skills, a great deal of enthusiasm and a knowledge of church life which I have found invaluable. I am delighted that he has been appointed Chaplain from 2001. Thank you to Alison Craig and her helpers for the flowers throughout the year and Bev Scannell and her team for the regular busy-bee clean ups. Thank you also to the variety of musicians who have enhanced our worship so much with their talents.

Religious Education

RE has continued to develop at Hale School and was taught in years 8-10 this year by myself, Richard Tongue, Justin Beckett and Tony Pullella. For the first time it was assessed and reported on in year 8, with a view to this extending to year 9 in 2001. Curriculum support was offered by John Reddan from Geelong Grammar and John Waters from England. The comprehensive curriculum is based upon the Peter Vardy 5-strand approach and the Anglican Schools Commission guidelines.

Pastoral Care

The Chaplain and Assistant Chaplain were available for pastoral care to all members of the Hale School community. Much of this is done through the big rituals of baptism, marriage and funerals. The Oratory has enhanced the care we can offer and is often used as a place to sit and think and pray, especially when a loved one is in great need.

lastair James Macmillan, "Mac", is a distinguished old boy, and has been a catalyst in the lives of many people at Hale School. Having been a Junior schoolboy in the late 1940's, a successful academic and athletic secondary student in the 1950's, and as an inspirational teacher and sporting coach at Hale School in the period 1961 to 2000, "Mac" retires having touched the lives of so many. Without doubt he has done his duty and now it is time to celebrate his unique contribution.

Alastair entered Hale School as a Year 5 Junior schoolboy in 1948. He made the transition to the senior school at Havelock Street in 1951, passing his Junior certificate examination in 1953, and was made a House and School Prefect in his final year, 1955. His schoolboy days were full, but balanced. He made the First XI cricket side in 1955 and he was a member of the school's First XVIII in 1954 and 1955. He captained the First XVIII in 1955 and gained colours for his leadership and quality football at centre half forward. "Mac" also represented Hale in the P.S.A. Athletics in 1954 and 1955. In this Olympic year it is worth noting that in the Inters 'mile' in 1955, "Mac" finished fourth to a useful runner, Herb Elliot. Herb went on to Olympic gold! Alastair found gold in many of the schoolboy athletes he would train for middle distance running. Alastair was a member of the School's Air Training Corps from 1952 – 1955 where he rose to the rank of Warrant Officer. He was also on the Sports Council and Cygnet Committee in 1955.

Perhaps to the surprise of many readers, he was also actively involved in the Hale School Dramatic Society in 1953 and 1954. He played Sergius in Arms and the Man, in 1953, and followed up in 1954 with a critically acclaimed performance in Baa Baa Black Sheep. George Northmore "Bill" Altorfer, a much-loved mentor for "Mac" as a schoolboy and master, directed both plays.

After successfully passing his Leaving Certificate examinations in 1955, Alastair moved on to the University of Western Australia where he gained a Bachelor of Arts and Diploma of Education. He still kept in touch with Hale School during this period, coaching the Second XVIII as an old boy in 1956. In 1960 he returned to Hale to do his teaching practice and was forced to handle Year Nine students like Roger Gray. However, he passed the test and was appointed to the staff of Hale School in 1961. He retires this year after forty years of service.

Again most will be surprised to hear that History was his first teaching area and he taught that subject to Year 12 level up to 1975. He made the switch to Mathematics teaching, in that year of major upheavals, and continued as a Maths teacher right up to his retirement. He was a colourful and charismatic pedagogue and his students, "the boys", were always his focus. "Mac" could inspire and generate self-belief in many boys who had "given up". Some readers will smile as they read this, realising that they gained their "pass" through the neversay-die attitude of their History and Maths master.

"Mac" was also a caring counsellor and confidant. He was a resident master in Wilson House between 1961 and 1965, and in the following year, he switched to Loton House in the same capacity. However his happiest years came in the fifteen-year association with the boys and parents of Buntine House in the period 1970 to 1985. Many boys were introduced to the school, disciplined to its procedures, guided through their subject selection and career paths by "Mac's" wise counsel. The Buntine House sporting achievements in that period are legendary and have never, and probably will never, be matched. "Mac" demanded the best and got it. The red Buntine machine swept all before it but still maintained that Macmillan trait of being humble in victory and very gracious in the rare defeats.

Involvement was a key element in the career of Alastair Macmillan. He was involved in the Hale School Army Cadet Corps from 1962 to 1973 initially as a Lieutenant, eventually rising to the rank of Captain. "Mac" involved himself in the Wittenoom project from 1972 to 1983; he recalls these adventures as some of his great times at the school. He was on the School's Sports Council from 1965 to 2000, and the P.S.A. Committee from 1969 to 1997. "Mac" served as P.S.A. football secretary from 1977 to 1996, again recalling these as great years, and was responsible for the P.S.A. matches fixtures throughout that period. Alastair served on the Hale School Old Boys Committee from 1963 to 1992 and was President of the Old Boys' Association in 1969. Apart from the great variety of all this service, it is the longevity of his involvement that is staggering. Many careers would have started and ended in any of the periods that "Mac" kept turning up to meetings, serving the various organisations and committees of which he was a part. It is a proud record.

Within the school, "Mac" held a number of vital roles. He was co-ordinator of the Cygnet Magazine during 1968 and 1969. After 15 years as Housemaster of Buntine House, he became Deputy Headmaster in 1985 and served in that capacity until 1994. From 1995 until his retirement this year, he was Director of Day to Day Operations.

However, "Mac" will probably be best remembered as the coach of the Hale School First XVIII

However, "Mac" will probably be best remembered as the coach of the Hale School First XVIII. He had two stints at the helm of the Firsts. Initially between 1963 and 1968 and then from 1972 to 1995. The statistics record seven Alcock Cups in those periods, and probably, more significantly, the eleven times that Hale School was runner up in the competition. That translates to being Premiers or Runners up in eighteen out of thirty seasons of coaching. "Mac" is often asked about the "best team" he ever coached and although it is like choosing between your children (an impossible task) he does nominate, for the record, the 1995 First XVIII as his "best team ever". He points out that they rank just slightly ahead of the teams of 1973 and 1966. Interstate football Carnivals between 1965 and 1999 were also a football highlight in this magnificent career. In other areas, "Mac" coached distance runners for the P.S.A. Athletics in the period 1962 to 1986, and he has coached various cricket teams over the years most recently the Third XI from 1996 to 2000.

It is truly a remarkable record of service to Hale School and its related organisations. However, it is a skeleton only. Where is the man in all of this? It is the search for the man that may prove the most intriguing. Alastair is a complex, and at times, an intensely private man. He is an extraordinarily passionate person. How can that complex, private and passionate man be revealed? The answer lies in his unique skills as a communicator.

Alastair is a wonderful letter writer. From the informative note to his colleagues about the start of a school year, to the touching notes of sympathy, received in times of personal tragedy or grief, or the many thousands of reports he has written (which often read like intimate notes to a parent or boy), Alastair masters the written word. His distinctive turn of phrase, his mastery of the image, the quotation, and his fluency, are admirable. The two word instruction to "aim high", said it all on so many reports. To be balanced Alastair was also the master of the vitriolic pen and when letters began "this is a letter for which no reply is required or expected", the receiver knew that they were about to be corrected in no uncertain terms. Many such epistles have been safely preserved for posterity.

Alastair is a clever conversationalist. He will listen intently to, sometimes spurious arguments, and then with great politeness acknowledge that, while some points are well made, the bulk of the argument cannot be supported. His deconstruction of the points and his incisive and sometime cutting summations often leave the participants struggling to keep up. Then, in typical self-effacing style, he will make a joke, and lighten the mood, leaving his interlocutors in no doubt that their position needs, at least, a serious rethink.

Most significantly, Alastair is an orator without peer. His particular style is deceptive because often the speeches are thoroughly planned, well crafted, and rigorously rehearsed, and yet they seem so spontaneous and casual in their delivery. Alastair can delight an after dinner audience in a tribute to the career of a retiring colleague. He can bring tears and admiration in the strength of a eulogy to a former student or loved one, and he can inspire with fiery and flamboyant addresses to a football squad, poised for greatness, and yet running the risk of building only "sandcastles." Sometimes, it was his quiet words of wisdom, couched in cautious terms, that meant so much to the listener. Humorous exchanges under "the cone of silence", which came to mean "broadcast this at will", are still recalled with pleasure. To hear him speak is a genuine privilege and it is those spoken words that will echo down the years for so many who have been associated with him.

Shakespeare chose the melancholy Jacques to tell us that:

"All the world's a stage,

And all the men and women merely players:

They have their exits and entrances:


And one man in his time plays many parts,


His acts being seven ages."

VALE FATHER RICHARD

here are many influences that go into shaping communities like Hale School, but ultimately our attempts to define ourselves, who we are and where we are heading, begin and end with the people who share our journey. For the last fifteen years, Richard Pengelley, has been there at the centre of our community, living our trials, rejoicing in our tribulations and sharing the gospels with anyone who might listen. He came to Hale originally as a Physical Education teacher in 1986, after four years teaching within the State school system. He remembers with horror having to teach Biology and Maths in his first year at Hale, a feat that interestingly he was never asked to repeat! In 1987, with his commitment to Christianity firmly established within the school community, Richard was asked to take on the Senior School Religious Education programme. Two years later, he was appointed lay Chaplain of the school, an appointment which raised many eyebrows, but which in hindsight transpired to be extraordinarily prescient. He began a degree in Theology at Murdoch University, and at the end of 1991, he finally 'surrendered', listened to his heart and took the monumental step of joining the priesthood. He was ordained a deacon in March of the following year, and on November 1st, 1994, All Saints Day, he was ordained a priest. After serving as part time chaplain for a couple of years while he finished his studies, he became full time Chaplain of Hale School in 1995.

Throughout these early years at Hale, Richard was of course pursuing with energy and success his other passion – water polo. He attended the '84 and '88 Olympic Games as part of the Australian Mens' Water Polo team, and played in the '82 and '86 World Championships. He was Vice Captain of the Australian team for four years, and has represented his country in some 200 internationals. It is hard to calculate how important this credibility has been in terms of his ministry to teenage boys, but one suspects that as a model of positive masculinity in an all boys school, it doesn't come much better than a universally respected, fiercely competitive all-round sportsman, who models compassion and honours life in everything he does. Richard's decision to move to the parish of Carine Duncraig is a devastating blow to the Hale community who will miss his wise counsel, his generosity of spirit and his central presence in the life of our school. At all our most important celebrations and moments of collective grief, Father Richard has been there, bringing solemnity, sacredness and his whole self to any occasion. His loss will be keenly felt. But for Richard, his new journey offers him a chance to renew his spirit and recharge his soul away from the frenetic pace of Hale School. It is a gutsy move, but a wise one. He is also looking forward immensely to preaching to a congregation who have actually chosen to attend! Importantly, too, it will hopefully give him more time to spend with his family. Jo has occasionally been widowed by the extraordinary demands placed upon a Chaplain of a school this size, and Richard is anxious to redress some of this imbalance in his new life. I know Richard would want us as a community to thank Joe for all she has done to support and love our Chaplain, especially during the dark times.

Each of you reading this brief summary of a man whose life has touched us all will have your different memories. With his departure Hale is losing a great friend, an influence who has for fifteen years kept us honest, who has loved each one of us whether we wanted him to or not, who has shown by example the joys that emanate from a life lived in the presence of God. Soon after arriving at Hale I shared one of my favourite meditations with Richard who seemed to share my delight in its challenge to us all.

The kingdom of God

Is the kingdom of danger and of risk,

Of eternal beginning, of eternal becoming,

Of open spirit, of deep realisation,

The kingdom of holy insecurity.

As Richard leaves Hale to enter the kingdom of holy insecurity, may all of us who make up the Hale community - teachers, administrative staff, parents, students and old boys, come together to say

"God bless you always, Father Richard, and thank you."



OLYMPIANS

ANTHONY PHILLIPS

Why would anyone in his right mind choose to spend most of his school holidays one year studying first- and second-year university work? For fun? For the prospect of overseas travel? To meet like-minded people from all over Australia and the world? I've been fortunate enough to be a member of an Australian Olympiad team for the past two years, a truly mind-blowing experience which I'd recommend for all the reasons above. The International Science Olympiads are international competitions in five scientific disciplines - Chemistry, Physics, Biology, Informatics and Mathematics. The teams representing Australia were chosen through a lengthy process beginning with a national competition in September or October. From this competition, the top 24 students in each discipline were invited to attend a selection camp in Canberra, training for around ten hours a day for two weeks. (The camp wasn't all academic pursuits, however: the main recreation was juggling, which ability made the Australian team somewhat infamous at the Olympiad itself.) This camp was followed by a series of five-hour exams

to select the teams (four students in Chemistry; five in Physics) and another camp for further training, all of which culminated in a trip overseas to the International Olympiad: I went to Bangkok, Thailand in 1999 as a member of the Chemistry team and to Leicester, UK in 2000 as part of the Physics one. All the hard training the teams were put through, however, paid off: I received a Silver Medal in Chemistry, ranking 32nd in the world, the highest score of a team which was ranked 10th in the world. In Physics, I received an Honourable Mention, coming 3rd in Australia; as a team, we came 12th in the world. In such highlevel international competition, we Australians seem to be holding our own! However, the real reward for our hard work came simply in the experience of representing our country at an international level, giving us the opportunity to meet many interesting people - not to mention the best scientists - from all over the world. Having a free trip overseas with plenty of time afterwards to enjoy ourselves as well was an added bonus!

In July, along with the five other members of the Australian IMO team, I journeyed to Taejon, South Korea to participate in the 41st International Mathematical Olympiad. This team was selected earlier in the year through a series of selection exams and training camps. The Olympiad consisted of two successive four and a half hour exams on consecutive days, each consisting of three questions worth seven points each. While in Korea, as well as doing mathematics, we were also given opportunities to experience what Korean culture has to offer. This came excursions, the form of and interactive performances demonstrations. We were also able to meet with other participants from the variety of countries from all over the world that sent teams.

In the competition, I achieved a score of 31 (maximum of 42), which earned me a gold medal, for placing in the top one-twelfth of the contestants. Collectively, the Australian team received one gold, three silver (top one-quarter) and one bronze (top one-half) medals and were placed 16th out of the 82 countries that sent teams, continuing

a tradition of strong results, outperforming all western countries except the USA. This was the second year in which I participated in the I n t e r n a t i o n a l Mathematical Olympiad, having been to Romania in 1999, winning a bronze medal on that occasion.

I, along with the rest of the Australian team, found the 41st Olympiad in South Korea to be an enjoyable and rewarding experience.

ear 10, 11 and 12 boys again achieved fine results in the writing, reading and listening components of the Alliance Française exams this year. A very pleasing number of Hale students in each of the year groups, were ranked in the top 10 percent of the total number competing in this State-wide external French exam.

In Year 12, six boys were asked to return and participate in a speaking exam in order to compete for a place among the top ten students in the State. STUDENT DRUG EDUCATION

SDEPs tudent

In an ever changing society, education systems must follow the times. Thirty years ago, AIDS was unheard of and 'Pot' was the 'make you happy' drug. We now know better. Schools have taken it upon themselves to make students aware of their health and the world surrounding them. Hale's Health Education curriculum is thorough. Students are taught in lessons up to year 10 and in years 11 and 12 receive occasional presentations from guest speakers.

To keep any system up to date, relevant, and effective it needs to be maintained and developed. Enter the S.D.E.P. (School Drug Education Project). This project is an educational task force set up by the State Government with the aim of ensuring that effective drug education occurs in all Western Australian schools. Hale is a member of the S.D.E.P. and as such has a teacher and parent committee and a separate student committee.

Our student committee this year comprised five year tens and five year elevens who have been guided by Mr Brown. The students on this year's committee were Peter Daniel, Anthony Barnes, Rhys Parsons, Ian Ferguson, Edward Anderson, Matt Wilson, Matt Stiller, James Larkan and John Zorbas. We held two or three meetings each term at lunch time in the health education room. To begin with we

discussed the aim and goals of the S.D.E.P. and the role of Hale's Health Education course in meeting these goals.

During Term 3, a group made up of the school nurses, a couple of teachers and seven students attended a public 'drug summit' meeting which was attended by about 800 people. In Term 4 we had one of the key speakers from the summit attend a School assembly to share with us her story of problems experienced because of drugs. A parent drug information night was also held by the school, to familiarise parents with drugs, drug use, signs of drug use and issues associated with teen parties. Armed with this information, parents could more confidently deal with any drug problem that might arise. It is hoped that projects like these will help reduce incidences in which drug use becomes a serious problem.

One of the most important contributions of our student committee this year, has been to offer suggestions for consideration with regard to extending the health education program through years 11 and 12. Year 11 and 12 next year will receive presentations from guest speakers on a variety of topics suggested by the committee. These sessions will enhance the health education course undertaken in Years 8, 9 and 10, including important issues relating to awareness about drugs.

As this year ends, the Year 11s will leave the student committee, the Year 10s have agreed to sit on the committee in 2001, and will draft in new Year 10s. This new group will continue to discuss and work on projects in line with the S.D.E.P. aims and goals and offer advice and suggestions for fine tuning Hale's Health Education curriculum to the interests and needs of our students.

Our week with Boori Monty Pryor was a very special one. The personal warmth and depth of perception, understanding and experience that Boori offered all at Hale was inspirational.




JESSE MARTIN

bout two years ago, David Alderson (Hale Geography teacher, St. Georges' Head of House) and I arranged for a year long swap of jobs, houses, cars etc... In January 2000, he and his family moved into our house in Baltimore, Maryland, and David taught at The Gilman School, an academically and athletically strong school of a thousand boys. At Hale, I taught Year 8,9,10 English and Year 8 Geography, and I coached basketball and soccer.

On Tuesday, January 25th, after 44 hours of travel, I arrived in Perth with my wife, Tracy, and my two boys, Luke and Henry, in desperate need of a shower and a bed. Thankfully, Clark Wight (Hale's Year 2 teacher) and his wife, Leanne, were at the airport to pick us up and give us a warm welcome. They had been friends of ours in Baltimore while Clark taught at Gilman for five years, so even though we were as far as we could possibly be from home, we felt like we had "family" here. Their two children had known ours since the day they were born. As a result, we were nothing but excited to get our year started in Perth.

After four or five days we were all adjusted to the time change (13 hours ahead), and the boys stopped waking us up at 3 a.m. to start the day.



Unfortunately for me, I did not really get a chance to get organised. I had finished exams, grades and reports at Gilman on Friday, boarded a plane on Sunday, and arrived in Perth on Tuesday. I started meetings at Hale at 8 am on Thursday, like a deer in the headlights. Thankfully, Wednesday was Australia Day, so I had one day to recover.

The start at Hale was chaotic. I had no idea what I was going to be teaching, what department I would be in, what my schedule was, or even where I would have a desk. Even though I had eleven years of experience, I felt like a brand new teacher again. When I got my schedule, and found out that I would be teaching both

English and Geography, I was floored. I had five sets and 125 students; I was used to four sets and only about 60 students.



The greatest present a teacher can receive from his students is correspondence telling him/her what is going on in their lives. I hope to hear from some of you over the years.

Thank you to all of the Hale community for making my year such a memorable one. The exchange has been a good one because Mr. Alderson and his family have loved their year in Baltimore almost as much we have loved spending it here. A special thanks to Mr. Inverarity for letting this all happen. I hope to cross paths with many of you again.

JAPANESE EXCHANGE

he fifth Japan-Australia student exchange program took place from the 17th to the 27th August 2000. The strong relationship between Washimiya Town and Hale School continued this year with sixteen Year 8 and 9 students and four teachers making the journey from Saitama Prefecture in Japan.



Apart from the skiing and snowboarding during their stay, the group were involved in many other activities. These








performance precedent can only be exceeded next year.






Last year Parry House was able to win the inaugural House Arts Cup. The Arts Cup consists of 7 components, namely Debating, Theatre Sports, House Singing,








House Leaders: (l to r) Mr John Arkle, Mark Bowden, Cameron Stevens.



After last year's 'breakthrough' win (our first since 1974) and subsequent winning of the title 'perennial bridesmaid' in the Cock House Cup, we were looking for a repeat of our success.

The campaign began with a flying start, with Tregonning winning the GN Altorfer Swimming Cup in the final relay over Buntine. It once again signaled the reemergence of Tregonning as a swimming powerhouse. The Year 12 Freestyle Relay was the highlight of the day, cruising to victory in school record time for the second consecutive year.

The superb performance in the pool gave the house confidence leading into the summer sports. If there was a focal point of our success as a house this year, it was in the summer sport. For the third time in four years, our cricketers won the Parker Cup. Kim Miller, Simon Meyer, Tim Serjeant, Alex Malcolm and Matt Shaw all put in good performances.

Over the past few years tennis has been a strong point for the house and there was no exception this year. Going down in an intensely fought final to Haynes, an encouraging factor was that our top player, Toby Relf, is only a Year 10.

Rowing was another highlight of the summer sport. Tregonning went into the winter sports




House Leaders: (l to r) Eugene Tse, Matthew Tompson, Peter Cockram, Simon Meyer.

These two results gave us an overall position of ninth, compared with the second place in 1999.

The hockey team finished fifth by defeating Havelock in what proved to be a very even competition. Good players were First XI representatives Ian Ferguson and James Larkin. As with every year there is a fairytale story, and Walla rugby proved to be it. This was the year where previous years of non-achievement would be forgotten, and the bunch of misfits that was the team would become an indomitable machine. Led by the Year 12s, our very own 'Cinderellas' found their way to the ball and finished fourth.

Soccer proved to be a season of missed opportunities. After the winter sports, our advantage over Buntine was reduced to just 5 points, and we knew that if we were to retain the cup, a concerted effort was needed by all members of the house. For so long a controversial event due to the scoring system, the message for this year's cross country race was simple - stay ahead of Buntine. This we achieved, finishing fourth overall, and relegating Buntine to sixth. Notable performances came from Year 8 Chris Guard who finished first, Year 10s Tim Atkins, Toby Relf and Paul Hallot who all finished in the top ten and Matt Tompson who finished ninth in his final school race.

Going into the Athletics, Tregonning held a 9 point lead over Buntine. This meant that to win the Cup outright, Tregonning had to finish at least third if Buntine were to win. Any lower than fourth and we would lose the Cup. In a day that had much tension, Buntine won, demoting Tregonning to fourth. The Cup would be shared.



As the wet weather well and truly set in the middle terms, winter sport at last began.




House Leaders: (l to r) Craig Wilson, Mr Tom Mitchell, James Ayers.

SCIP REPORT

The Student Community Involvement Program is a school program run by Volunteering WA. SCIP aims to introduce students to the concept of voluntary work and to encourage them to make an informed choice about the work they do. During second semester, 2000, six of the eight Year 9 Pastoral Care Groups at Hale were involved in SCIP.

Each boy had a choice of the type of work he would be doing. These choices ranged from environmental work to working with the elderly or disabled. Once the students had chosen their workplace, they were committed to visiting the workplace once every cycle from the start of lunch to the end of period 6.

During each session, the volunteers focused their energy on helping in the community. Working with the elderly at an old people's home involved things like playing board games or just chatting with them, or introducing them to basic computer skills. The boys doing environmental work helped the CALM workers at Herdsman Lake. Working with people with disabilities involved going to a day house and getting to know the clients there; helping with chores; or just chatting to the clients.

In each area of work, the boys met challenges they had to overcome. Some boys have chosen to stay in contact with the work-place and have kept up their volunteer work during their own holiday time. As well as teaching many different skills, the programme was a good introduction to the year 10 work experience curriculum. Overall, the one-term trial was a great success and will be a good experience for future Year 9's

Debating



OUTDOOR EDUCATION

We are indeed fortunate in Outdoor Education at Hale School to have a very cohesive and dedicated team of staff. There are 181 field days in the Hale School Programme. As well as Messieurs Murray Curran and Jason Dutoit who are full-time members of the Outdoor Education Department and outstation for up to 140 days, these programmes are staffed by a core of professional contract instructors. Our programme could not have run so smoothly without the leadership and positive input of our teaching staff, many of whom volunteered their holiday time to take the boys.

The Year 8 students had the usual "Orientation Style" programme at Point Walter Conference Centre in Bicton. While it is not really an Outdoor Education programme, this camp has proved to be a great opener for this year group, particularly since the advent of the Pastoral Care System in 1999.

The importance of preparing the boys for their Year 9 experience cannot be overstated. Each Year 8 group was also given a day session in November, covering simple camp craft skills and equipment to prepare them for Year 9.

Thanks to the Year 8 Camp in 1999, the Year 9 students were extraordinarily well prepared. They have begun the camps with a good platform of knowledge, which has allowed them to focus much more on their chosen activity. In 2000, these students were able to chose from camps in the disciplines of: Sea Kayaking, Climbing and Abseiling, White Water Canoeing and Sailing. Dare I say it again; the best Exmouth programme yet was in June July 2000. We have strived to improve our programme every year, and in 2000 we made some great advances. Most notable of these was the change of climbingabseiling venue, which now occurs en route as part of the walking expedition. It has changed the feel of the programme by making it more expedition based. The venue we are using is a new site, not used by any groups before, which adds another dimension in its natural state. It is a unique opportunity to use a place that has almost no signs of human interference, and we hope to maintain it

The support and feedback from parents, staff and students in 2000 has been quite staggering.

Year 10 Exmouth Camp:

The Journey:

On the 16 hour journey, the landscape changed from a mixture of dry park and woodland just outside of Perth, to the flat, red dusty land, filled with termite nests spinifex and other scrub, highlighting just how far we had already travelled to get to camp.

We were introduced to the instructors for our group and our relaxation and acclimatisation was cut short, as we were divided up into cooking groups and tent partners. We also had to pack the essential clothes, sleeping gear, tents and other personal items we would need for the first part of our adventure, sea kayaking. As we left the highway and peeled off onto the dusty road, many of us sensed that the real camp was about to begin.

Paddling.

We learnt about stonefish, coral stacks and the blue-ringed octopus before we packed and worked together as a whole team to take the rescue boat, and other kayaks into the water. Two hours and a few turtles later, we arrived on the beach, last. We had to carry our boats up the shore because of low tide. This was Whitmore Island, a relatively small island with sandy beaches along the Western and Southern sides, while rocky on the Northern side. After our regular lunch rations of sandwiches, everyone decided a round of fishing was in order. We had all seen Greg's "attempts" at catching a small reef shark trapped in a pool of water by low tide. All the groups spread out over the island, wading out into waters following various shark fins. Nic, Bryce, Matt and myself were immediately confronted with sharks and several swam quickly around and away from us. Amid the confusion Matt had somehow thrown his line into the waist deep shallows and hooked himself a metre long reef shark. After about half an hour's worth of yelling Matt and Bryce managed to get the shark back to shore and killed, whilst Nick and I hunted for more sharks. That night we had shark for dinner. After surviving a giant flame ball from our trangia it was cooked. Our entire cooking group agreed that this was one of the nicest meals we had ever had.

The next morning we again woke to strong winds, this time it was hammering on the tents and surrounding bushes. It was quite cold again, and the morning conditions seem to be a recurring pattern at this time of the year! The paddle to Doole Island was the longest and hardest we were to do on camp. The main highlight of the paddling was the large seas, which threw us round a bit. After setting up camp, the fishing was vital as we had no other food. We eventually settled on a spot in the mangroves on the North Western corner of the island. We were on top of an underwater rock ledge, and could see the fish swimming by, and eventually, my tent partner, and member of my cooking group caught a metre-long reef shark.

Abseiling

That afternoon we set out for the Charles Knife walk, a highlight of the camp. The entire group went up on the walk, and the entire group returned. Fear of heights was common within the group but only a select few suffering any worries once we were actually up there. The views were awesome. The path at times was less than a metre wide and the huge gorges towered above us on both sides when we reached the bottom. We returned that night to base camp, scratched and weary from spinifex.

Without tents, and because we had chosen not to put up hoochies, the next morning we woke cold and wet from the dew. The sunrise over the gorges at Gam was one of the best I have ever seen, and because the sun seldom rises over the sea here in WA, it was a sight to be remembered. Today we were to set out for the climbing abseiling site. We arrived about 10am and went through the safety side of things. Once we got started it was clear who had the fear of heights. Trevor was not even willing to go over the abseiling edge, but after the whole group got up and supported him Trevor abseiled for the first time in his life. After that he never looked back. By the end of the day Trevor had abseiled more than anyone else in the group. Everyone had a go at rockclimbing and everyone did well. 13 out of 15 members in our group made it up at least one rockface. After lunch the 'expert' rockface was set up because of many complaints about the ease of the climbs. First to go up was Elliott, he was the first student ever to make it up that face. Next came Jacob and halved his time. Then myself who took a fraction of Jacobs time after watching him and what he did. Next up was Anthony, and within 2 minutes he had scaled the wall. He literally jumped up the rockface like a spider. After his tremendous efforts the rockface was named "Ant Hill" in his honour.

The Big Walk

After an early lunch, we loaded into the bus to be driven to the start point of our walk. For many people, the walk was the activity they least looked forward to, but around midday we started our fourney across the Cape Range.

My group was to navigate the first leg of the hike, while the others were either pacing (recording the distance we had walked) or having a break and just following the navigators. My group found the first leg of the walk quite difficult as we were the first group to navigate and it really took some getting used to. We had to navigate the right way, otherwise we would have to walk through dense scrub or over unnecessary hills. We walked through quite a bit of harsh scrub on our way to the end of the first leg and we were only starting to get used to the annoying clumps of spinifex (small bushes with needle sharp leaves that break off when you touch them) located all over the range. From the edge of the range we could make out base camp which was located down near the beach. During the long walk we had a magnificent view of the valley beneath us. It was spectacular to look back on the ocean kilometres away. We all felt proud seeing how far we had accomplished in less than half a day.

We had to wake up very early the next day (5am) because we had to be ready to walk by 7am. This was not an easy task but by 7.15am we were ready.

While we were walking we saw a wide range of wildlife. We saw a hawk and a number of other huge birds. We also saw quite a few kangaroos hopping around. The scenery was amazing but the walk was very tiring.

Finally we came to the end of the rocky terrain and we started walking through very flat land. While we were walking we could see the valley below us. There were a number of these gullies along this area of the walk and they zig-zagged through the landscape. Along the walk we came to a large hill and once we had reached the top, we could finally see the sea far away.

We continued and came to a new type of terrain. This was thick grass, which came up to our waist. It was quite hard walking through it but after a while we got used to it. The ocean was looming ever so close to us by this point and we were all very tired from the walk.

While we were walking the final leg we saw heaps of animals. We saw lots of kangaroos and lizards, even more large birds. We walked on and finally came to the top of the huge hill. From the top of the hill it was a spectacular view. We could see the beach miles below us and the beautiful blue ocean out as far as the eye could see. We were now desperate to get to the bus. We could make out the bus miles below on a dirt track. We all walked as fast as we could down the very, very steep descent nearly falling we were moving so fast.

Arriving at the bottom of the hills, on the other side of the range was a great feeling, similar to reaching Doole Island in the kayaks, only better. Knowing that we had successfully achieved the goal, lifted the spirits of the group somewhat. After taking off the packs, and loading them into the trailer, we headed for Sandy beach for lunch, where the cool clear waters were waiting for us. Walking down the beach in our sweaty old clothes and boots made us look like a pack of galahs, but we didn't mind. After the swim, we all felt refreshed, and relieved.





This year started without a new leader to take the reigns from Mr. Goldsmith who retired last year. 

MOCK TRIAL

Mock Trial

his year saw a continuation of strong involvement in Mock Trial at the school, Hale boasting an arsenal of four teams with some 32 boys taking part. The Hale teams, equipped with ranging levels of courtroom experience and legal knowledge, achieved varing degrees of success. Nevertheless, all boys had an equally enjoyable time preparing for trials and performing in the courtroom.

Round One of the competition saw each Hale team assume the role of defence counsel, with the task of proving our 'client' innocent of assaulting another man with a kitchen knife, using the lawful excuses of self-defence and provocation.

In Round Two, the Hale teams became the plaintiff in a civil-claiming damages against a clothing manufacturer for the sale of "shonky" long-john underwear to a client who developed dermatitis. The fact that he wore them for weeks without taking them off, even during shower times, did not help our case.

In the Third Round, the four Hale teams had the task of defending a man accused of breaking and entering into his next-door neighbours house and stealing a VCR, with the key defence being that another person, in fact, committed the alleged crime and our client was simply attempting to assist in the apprehension of that person when seen entering the property.

Team One appeared to be Hale's most potent combination - consisting entirely of year 12s, including seasoned competitors Anthony Phillips and Chris Pearce, along with the talented Chris Bailey and the notorious intelligences of Anthony Klobas, Simon Dawkins, David Symington and Shyam Young. Unfortunately, Team One faced a treacherous path to proceed from the three round-robin rounds to the finals, coming up against more traditionally powerful schools. This team were incredibly unlucky to have victory in the first two rounds snatched from their grasp by strong opposition (from both the schools and the magistrates at times). losing each trial by a single point. Team One proved its ability in the courtroom, however, with a resounding victory in the third round when luck finally fell their way.

The other Year 12 side – Team Two – comprised of some 'wannabe' law students and a large contingent of jocks and were the outstanding (and surprising) success of Hale's Mock Trial season. Barristers Lucas Joynt, Johan Yin and Elliott Dunn provided the team's

experience. Newcomers Chris Hood, a solicitor with a beaver-like work ethic, Marcus Wagner and Kim Miller, who proved credible and entertaining witnesses, created an all-round courtroom sting that was to paralyse Team Two's opponents. Blessed with an easier first three rounds than Team One, Team Two put each opponent away with clinical efficiency and a great deal of enjoyment. Of memorable mention are: the gender-bending efforts of Marcus and Kim as witnesses, Lucas' bringing to tears of one particular female witness with relentless cross-examination, and Chris' acts of pretending to inform his barristers when actually only suggesting that our opponents deserved to be physically injured.

Team Two won each of their three round-robin bouts and thus proceeded to the knockout fourth round. Here they came up against formidable opposition in the form of Sacred Heart, and in particular one very capable closing barrister. Lucas and Elliott prepared for the trial in great depth but even the performances of these two barristers weren't sufficient to overcome the self-belief of the opposition or the hostility of the magistrate. As counsel for the Defence, Team Two were unable to persuade the magistrate that a drycleaner's late return of a dress is not reasonable grounds for a \$13,000 lawsuit, and so were eliminated from the finals of the competition despite a gallant effort.

Team Three was Hale's Year 11 Mock Trial team, consisting chiefly of boys with prior experience but also some impressive newcomers. Julian Lane, Bryce Crage, Johan Burger and David Montgomery led Team Three with distinction, and Ben Crilley, Alister Martin and Ben and Scott Minson also proved very capable performers. Team Three were unfortunate to finish the Mock Trial season without a victory, although the opposition that they faced (with many older and more experienced teams in the competition) will no doubt stand them in fine stead for a shot at the finals in 2001. The boys in Team Three displayed adept debating and examination skills in the courtroom, and the added experience of taking part in a challenging video linkup trial in Round Three should also prove useful in any future reoccurrence.

A band of enthusiastic and intelligent Year 10s – including Will May, Neil Oborne, Cameron Boyle and Peter Clay – combined to form Hale's final Mock Trial team, Team Four. Having no prior knowledge of the competition and faced with opponents one or two years their senior, the Team Four boys handled their trials superbly despite the daunting odds. Team Four's dedication and energy did not, unfortunately, produce what would have been a deserved victory in their three trials. However, with another two years of Mock Trial involvement available to these Year 10s, each boy should aim to accumulate a firm understanding of the competition and of the legal process and advance to the later rounds



ATHLETICS

The 2000 Athletics season began with the usual pre-season meeting on Monday 14th August, though in reality, training had commenced for a hardy core of athletes in term 1 this year. The athletes coached by Mr Peisker (jumps and sprints) and Mr Lane (mid-distance) marked their commitment to the athletics season by training at 7:00am twice a week. Of these athletes, special mention must go to Rob Rose (U/16 800m & 1500m) who trained virtually all year, culminating in two Stow Awards and Division 1 wins at the Inters in both the 800m and 1500m - a tremendous achievement.

The turn out at the initial team meeting was impressive; over ninety boys listened keenly to the presentation in the Function Room. A plan for success was presented to the boys along with training regimes, the coaching team, expectations and so on. The boys knew that to win the 2000 Inters they needed to be organised, well prepared, committed and, above all, they had to want to win.

Again, based on previous winning Inters scores, Hale needed to amass over 1200 points if they wanted to win the competition. Last years' impressive score of 1172 points included 6 Division 1 and 13 Division 2 winners. We would need to better that result to take the 2000 Inters. An indicator of athletic performance, is the Hale School Athlete Achievement Pyramid, of which a Stowe Award is ranked equal to a top three finish in the Inters. Last year we had 26 athletes who gained Stowe awards.

This season would again be short, only four weeks long, so the coaches designed an intensive training program in order to make the team competitive. Commitment, drive and energy was asked of the boys, and in the first week of training it was clear that the team had indeed the right attitude and commitment to do well.

The first inter school carnival, the Scotch Invitational, was held at the end of the second week. In a morning of strong competition Hale showed real promise in many areas, Sprints. Middle Distance, High Jump, Discus and Shot Putt were particularly strong. Notable performances from Philip Stroud (U/14), Mark Morgan (U/15), Callum Poultney (Open), Gerald Yin (Open), Clancy Rudeforth and Craig Wilson (Open) in the 800m epitomized the never-say-die attitude shown by many in the squad.

The Tri-Meet at Hale School with Aquinas and Trinity was held in blustery conditions. The competition was thrilling, with the Hale team matching a strong Aquinas team in all areas. It was an excellent all-round result which would boost the team's confidence for the Inters the following week.

The two carnivals produced a staggering twentynine Stowe Awards and confirmed the strength in depth of this Hale School Athletics Team. By the end of the last week of training, the quiet confidence and camaraderie of all the members of the team was evident to see. The credit for much of this must go to the tremendous leadership shown by the Captain, Clancey Rudeforth and his able and equally dedicated, Co Vice-Captains, Mark Somic, Craig Wilson, Marcus Wagner and James Ayers.

The last training session ended with a final team meeting in the Pavilion, culminating in a Captain's speech the like of which I have not heard before. It was a passionate and stirring 'call to arms' for his fellow team mates, a beseech



that all the hours of training is not for naught and that on Inters day, each and every competitor will give their all.

Inters day was blue skies and calm conditions, ideal for athletics competition. Who could have known the drama and heartache that would follow?

The first half-hour saw the score ebb and flow, but by event ten Hale was in first position with a nine point lead over Aquinas in second place. Indeed, all day Hale was locked in battle with Aquinas for that first place, and as the day progressed, points unraveled in the following extraordinary way;

Rob Rose U/16, who won Division 1 competitions - 800m and 1500m



This year the 1st V finished the season a creditable fifth in the Blackwood Cup, the team winning two games and losing four. The competition for second to seventh was intense, with form on the day being the crucial difference between a win and a loss.

The season opener was against Wesley, and saw Hale enjoy a comfortable victory against a small but determined opposition. Travis Harvey had an exceptional first half, handling the ball very well, whilst James Ayers worked hard both on and off the ball. His determined play forced many errors from Wesley's guards. Ryan Batt kept the pressure on Wesley through his rebounding and hard running, and when he was rested, Peter Daniel continued in the same vein. All ten Hale players had court time in the first half and performed strongly. Hale only managed to increase its lead by three points during much of the second half, reflecting the great efforts of Wesley. In the final ten minutes of the game however, the pressure proved too great, and with all players adding to the score, Hale ran away with the game.

The game against Guildford was characterised by excellent defence from both teams, which resulted in low scoring. For much of the match, Guildford blocked the keyway effectively with zone defence and Hale struggled to put the ball in the basket. Guildford ran the ball hard out of defence and posted most of their score though fast breaks. The last five minutes saw Hale play good attacking basketball

and some pride was salvaged. Overall however, credit must go to an athletic and aggressive Guildford team that dominated most of the play.

The game against Christ Church pitted two teams of equal ability together in what should have been a close game. In a number of respects it was, although the final score didn't reflect this. After playing fine defence for most of the game, Hale restricted Christ Church to fifty-two points, but with many scoring opportunities not converted, Hale could only manage a score of thirty-six points. Adrian Vis was by far the best player for Hale, rebounding well, defending strongly and scoring half the team's total. Lewis Mann managed ten points but no other player had an impact in offence. This was a disappointing result given the solid preparation during the week leading up to the game. After the Christ Church game, Hale had a fortnight break from the PSA fixtures, during which the annual Old Boys game was played. This game was played in excellent spirit and at a high level of skill. At half time the scores were locked at thirty-two points all, but in the early part of the second half the Old Boys passed very well, setting up a series of easy scoring opportunities. After a timeout, with five minutes remaining in the match, the 1st V responded strongly and managed to reduce the Old Boys' fifteen point lead to eight points, which was the final margin. This was a rewarding and enjoyable match for all involved.

The first game after the mid-season break was against Scotch, who proved to be our most difficult opponent. It was the first time in the season that Hale was unable to restrict the opposition to a relatively low score. This fact, combined with a poor offensive total, saw a very one-sided result. Scotch played aggressively in the first half at both ends of the court to lead by twenty-one points at half time. Braden Searle and Robert Green were Hale's most effective players, scoring half the team's total during this period. The second half was disastrous. Scotch ran the ball very well out of defence, scoring many fast break baskets, and when forced into a half-court game, hit a high percentage of field goals. The confident and in form Scotch ran out easy winners.

The penultimate game was against Trinity. This saw a welcome return to form in defence and most importantly, in offence. Hale jumped out of the blocks early to have Trinity struggling to keep up with the rapid transition from defence to attack. Lewis Mann's rebounding, Justin Morris' passing and James Ayers' finishing enabled Hale to establish a ten point lead, which provided a buffer for the remainder of the game. James Ayers led the scoring, well supported by Robert Green and Adrian Vis. The second half was an evenly contested affair. However, Hale was able to handle the pressure created by a desperate Trinity, who threatened to steal the game with four minutes remaining. Excellent efforts from all players saw Hale prevail. Justin Morris' ball handling wheat being pressured full court was very impressive.

The final game of the season was against Aquinas. To allow boys to attend the Head of the River, the game was played on Friday evening. Aquinas was strongly favoured to win due to their unbroken record of comfortable victories. Hale began well and matched Aquinas point for point in the opening five minutes. Gradually however, Aquinas began to pull away through more effective play, and by half time had established a comfortable lead. Lewis Mann, Adrian Vis and Justin Morris were all making an impact and were well supported by their teammates. 



First XI

Following the exciting Darlot Cup win in 1999, the 1st XI approached the new season with high expectations. However a mediocre term 4 and a couple of shaky starts to our first two games belied the batting feast that was to follow. The 2000 season proved to be our best batting season ever with 7 centuries being scored. This was well supported by solid bowling and energetic, skilful fielding that enabled Hale to win all six matches and retain the Darlot Cup.

Wesley - After winning the toss and batting on the flat Wesley wicket, Hale were soon in trouble at 3 for 9 and then 4 24. However, a 78 run partnership between Phil Edwards and Kim Miller gave us the foundation to go on to a big score. The highlight was undoubtedly Simon Meyer's unbeaten 108 and the 123 run partnership he shared with Nick Birmingham (also unbeaten on 44). Phil Edwards, opening the innings, played most impressively for his 97. After declaring at 7 - 312 the Hale bowlers soon had the Wesley openers in trouble but missed chances in the slips to let them off the hook. Two run outs started the Wesley demise and some excellent bowling by Nick Birmingham and Theo Doropoulos, well supported by Gerald Yin, Ashley Glisson and Chris Hood enabled us to dismiss Wesley for 195 runs. In the 21 overs remaining Hale scored an impressive 5 for 143.

Guildford - For the second week running the top half of our batting failed (7-61) and only some accomplished batting by Nick Birmingham (with solid support from Gerald Yin and Ashley Glisson) enabled us to reach the mediocre score of 161. But

once again the bowlers rose to the occasion to dismiss Guildford for 130 with Chris Hood taking 5-17 from 14.3 overs and Nick Birmingham 4-13 from 14 overs. They were well supported by all the other bowlers and by an energetic and skilful effort in the field. Batting a second time Hale were 5-170 at stumps.

Christ Church - A fine all round bowling performance enabled the 1st XI to dismiss Christ Church for 131 on Friday afternoon. Off spinner Nick Birmingham had the best figures of 4-34 but he was well supported by all the other bowlers. On Saturday morning our top order batsman put on one of the finest displays seen at Hale for many years. Philip Edwards and Theo Doropoulos shared in a 2nd wicket partnership of 158 runs. This is probably the first time that Hale have had two batsmen making centuries in the one innings. Bowling a second time Hale started brilliantly, having Christ Church 6-29 but the momentum could not be maintained and at stumps with the score at 9-125 we were one wicket short of outright victory.

Scotch - Bowling in overcast conditions, the 1st XI were hopeful of achieving quick wickets. This was not to be and at stumps Scotch were 4-191 from 72 overs. Our bowling was not as straight or as penetrating as in previous games. Saturday morning didn't bring much more joy with only two more wickets being taken, but more accurate bowling kept a rein on the run rate with Scotch eventually declaring at 6-287 from 106 overs. Marcus Wagner and Phillip Edwards started positively with an opening stand of 127. This set the the standard for an outstanding batting performance, with us passing the target with only 2 wickets down and eventually reaching 3-336 at stumps. Phillip Edwards scored his second successive century, Theo Doropoulos make a very accomplished 92, Chad Jones remained 56 not out in a batting performance that was full of merit.

Trinity - Trinity won the toss and batted on a very flat wicket but were immediately in trouble due to some accurate bowling and some very good fielding. They went to tea on Friday at 5-42 (2 run outs). Some solid batting after tea allowed them to reach 6-135 at stumps. On Saturday, the Hale bowlers and fieldsmen applied the pressure and the last 4 wickets fell for the addition of 32 runs from 24 tight overs.

After losing an early wicket our batsmen showed due caution against accurate bowling to go to lunch at 1-34. A second wicket straight after lunch brought in Chad Jones to join Theo Doropoulos and a superb 219 run partnership ensued. Both batsmen scored well deserved centuries. A century partnership in the last 20 overs by Simon Meyer and Mark Bowden put the icing on the cake of a remarkable 5-377 total. This is the second highest score made by a Hale School 1st XI.

Aquinas - Sent in to bat, Hale lost an early wicket but then consolidated with an 81 run partnership for the second wicket between Marcus Wagner and Theo Doropoulos. This set the pattern for another very solid batting performance highlighted by Chad Jones unbeaten innings of 100. Hale declared at 7-264, just after lunch. Again our bowling put enough pressure on to achieve consistent breakthroughs, dismissing Aquinas for 130 shortly before stumps. The stand out bowler was Gerald Yin with 6-24 from 18 overs and he was well supported by Nick Birmingham with 3-42 from 24 overs.

1st VIII

he Hale 1st VIII began the season full of renewed enthusiasm and eager for a successful campaign. The crew commenced training six months prior to the beginning of the competitive season with a single goal in mind, to perform to the best of its ability at the Head of the River regatta. Thanks to the dedication of the crew members and coaches this was made possible.

In a term four regatta held over five kilometres, hosted by Aquinas, we raced in two quad sculls, finishing a disappointing seventh and ninth. The first regatta of the 2000 season was raced over five kilometres. Hale finished a relatively disappointing fifth, considering the amount of training both on and off the water the crew had done over the summer holidays. During the week leading up to the Trinity regatta, the team increased intensity at training, until the algae bloom forced water training to be postponed indefinitely. Increased efforts during land training (afternoon runs up sand dunes near Challenge Stadium and ergo training), along with early morning sessions in the school weights room whilst the river was a no-go zone, ensured fitness and commitment were always maintained. Finally, after a fortnight of river closure the Aquinas regatta was held. We finished third

behind a dominant Guildford crew and traditional rowing powerhouse, Aquinas. A third placing was also achieved in the Wesley regatta, behind Guildford and Trinity. The steadily improving Hale crew however was unperturbed by their rivals' early successes, knowing that only one race really counted.

Following the Wesley regatta , the members of the Hale crew were involved in an unfortunate accident, and hospitalisation forced them to be scratched from the Scotch regatta, held the following morning. The following Saturday saw a return to racing but, with a year ten taking the place of a recovering crew member, another creditable third place was achieved, and Guildford continued their winning form.

Hale's overall performance in the 2000 Head of the River regatta was to say the least, exceptional. With all races bar one completed, Hale had won seven of nine events and looked certain to claim the Hamer Cup for the first time since its inception. What followed however made victory so much more the sweeter.

The blue ribbon event for First VIII crews began, and in the first five hundred metres of the race Hale were way back in the field. At Deepwater point (approximately the halfway mark) the crew were in fifth place and looked out of contention. However we found something and stepped up a gear, or more, and powered past Aquinas into second place. With only two hundred metres to go and Guildford still clearly out in front by the best part of two boat lengths Hale surged yet again. With the last three strokes of the race the Hale crew edged out Guildford by 0.3 of a second, much to the delight of a hoarse land based Hale camp and a very animated Headmaster. Thus the Challenge Cup was returned to Hale for the twentieth time in its 102-year history, after a nine-year absence, along with fine memories of an emphatic and unexpected victory. For many of the crew it was their first win ever as a Hale rower. Special thanks must go to Duncan Barton for his dedication and expertise as coach. Without his commitment, the crew may not have reached its full potential.

At the season's climax - the Head of the River regatta, the Hale rowing squad secured eight out of a possible ten victories - a feat unmatched in the extensive history of PSA rowing. The 9As, 9Bs, 10As, 10Bs, 10 Quad, 1st Quad, 2nd VIII and 1st VIII all won their races, some in convincing fashion, others (notably the 1st VIII, 1st Quad and 10As) in nail biting finishes, with the 1st VIII in particular coming from behind in the final strokes of the race. In the two races where a Hale crew didn't win, high places were still achieved. Although a little breezy in the morning the day produced excellent rowing conditions and a number of records were broken by Hale crews - officially the 10Bs, both year 9 crews and the year 10 Quad, and unofficially by the 10As. The 1st VIII were a mere fraction of second outside the PSA record. Overall Hale won the Hamer Cup from Guildford Grammar, by a comfortable 51 points, for the first time in the Cup's 15-year history.

However it wasn't always smooth rowing, with an influence beyond any school's control threatening Hale's chances of success. The whole season was jeopardised by an insidious algae bloom, which forced all boats off the water on the Friday morning before the scheduled Trinity regatta until the Aquinas regatta the following Saturday. Despite the uncertain future of the 2000 rowing season it wasn't hard to keep up the momentum at training. This was due to the commitment of all rowers and the resourcefulness and leadership of the coaches. As soon as competition resumed Hale further cemented its dominance over the rest of the field, winning seven races and proving that nothing had been lost during the algae's stranglehold of the river. Many Hale rowers proudly sported medals from victories in the Wesley regatta the following week and the school's trophy cabinet was bolstered significantly. The Scotch regatta also saw many successes, and hopes were high for the dress rehearsal of the Head of the River: the Hale regatta. Ironically, the Pat Trochet Cup, introduced by Hale School for the best overall performance at the Hale regatta, had never been won by Hale, until this season. Finally it was secured for the first time and signs were very positive for the following week.

It is worth acknowledging the crews who kept up consistent first placings for much of the season. Both the 9As and 9Bs were undefeated, as were the year 10 crews, whilst the 2nd VIII won their last four races.

Whilst it would be easy to become caught up in the outstanding successes Hale rowing experienced this season, the right perspective must be maintained. The fantastic results were a product of rigorous training programs, many early mornings and significant sacrifice. Much of the summer holidays was spent training on and off the water, and team building was a core part of the four day rowing camp, which proved invaluable to teams searching for an edge over the opposition.

Of course, no crew could have achieved as highly as they did without the guidance and support of coaches and parents. Mrs Stephanie Stroud, Mrs Anne Pearce, Mr Kevin Minson and other integral members of the support staff worked tirelessly behind the scenes with fundraising and social events. The weekday breakfasts and barbeques held after the regattas were much appreciated! From all accounts the wine tasting evening was a tremendous success and helped to keep morale high amongst parents, which in turn kept the rowers' minds on the job at hand. To all the coaches must go sincere thanks, in particular Mr Sam McKinney, the Master in Charge and Mr Sandy Burt, the man responsible for building every rower's desire and fitness. Each individual crew knows how important a role their coach played in their success, holding them to their dreams of winning in that final regatta. The school community was also very supportive and very vocal when it counted most. I think I speak on behalf of all crews when I say that there are few things more uplifting than to row past Deep Water Point or to the finish line, with the cheers of your school behind you. 

1st X1 Hale School completed a fine season in 2000 by finishing second to Trinity in the PSA Lawe-Davies competition. The summer of 2000 saw the formal introduction of volleyball as a sport played amongst the PSA schools. From the outset more than thirty boys attended training, vying for positions in two Hale teams. Former Australian Mens National Team captain Kieran Cranley took charge of the 1st team and Mr Ashby managed the Hale squad and coached the 2nd team.

We went into our first match against Trinity full of confidence, as we were well prepared. The team, which consisted of Christof Slawomirski, Shaun Simpson, Ryan Burgers, Saiffuddin Bujang, Jordan Jones, Andrew Trio, Shuta Hoshino, Michael Morcombe (Vice Captain) and Ryan Friend (Captain) won the first set 25-13, and convincingly won the second set 25-14. Hale went on to win the match by taking the third set 25-19. Michael Morcombe held the team together with consistent hitting and Christof passed well in what was a great team effort.

The following match was against Scotch, who had just come off a 3-0 win over Wesley. Again we took the first set but it wasn't as easy as the Trinity match, with a scoreline of 25-21. In the second set Hale again proved too strong winning 25-18. After an early scare in the third set, Hale trailing 15-6, we were able to regroup and take the set 25-22, and hence the match. 

Worlds Apart

A Hell of a Show

Ultimate good versus ultimate evil; It's the oldest story in the world. From the Bible to Harry Potter, from films like the "Ten Commandments" to "Con Air," it is always the bad guy that gets all the best lines.

I always wanted to write a musical that captured this battle between good and evil because I believe that we each have the capacity for both, and that each day is a struggle to maintain a balance between the two. Some days we win and some we lose. Such extremes give a writer the chance to experiment with outrageous, larger than life characters. Hence my messing around with mythology and trying to marry it with a modern dysfunctional family: Zeus as a single dad with two wayward children, Aphrodite and Apollo, a cheeky grandson Eros and a dominating mother, Hera.

I felt sorry for Zeus. His family take him for granted, ignore his advice, laugh at his fallibility but immediately turn to him when things go wrong. Then along comes his twin brother Hades who tries to undermine Zeus's position and we have a classic case of sibling rivalry, which in this case has been simmering for a thousand years.

Hades was the most fun to write and I thought that Nick Maricic, after a lengthy struggle to develop a "devilish" walk, created the right amount of swagger and menace. Stuart Laing's Zeus was a brilliant caricature, full of bombast and yet so sadly insecure and easily undermined. Suzanne Barton created a rather sexy Aphrodite nicely balanced by Sam Roberts-Smith's petulant Apollo. Nick Joshi almost stole the show with his cheeky, sweet singing Eros and Suad Majrough bustled about energetically as the imperious Hera.

There were also some wonderful cameo roles such as the hopelessly dishevelled headmaster, complete with carelessly undone fly played by Alister Martin, David Scanlan's prissy window dresser, Ed Bayford's mad poet, Matthew Lutton's aging chorus leader, and Nick McLean's thoroughly modern Archimedes. Chris Barnes was able to say "oh yeah" three times with such monumental stupidity each night and invariably get applause, which only goes to show there are no small parts, only small minded actors.

People who saw the show thought that the students looked like they were having fun, and they were. It was that sense of energy and the even quality of the acting that gave the show the right amount of pace.

Once again Carre Wylder from "Wylder Designs" did a brilliant job with the costumes, ably assisted by a small army of volonteer mums and a dad.

Adrian Arnold's set was great to look at and easy to use with its many levels and entrance points. Ashley Greig, an old boy, did a huge amount of work on the arrangements, to the point where the original song writers, old boys Daniel Bull and Adam Jefferey, could hardly recognise their own work. I wrote the script and polished the lyrics and I am an old boy but not an "old boy".

Two new professionals worked on the show; Sarah Healey on the choreography and Kathryn Hannan on the voices of the chorus. They were very patient with our young performers and very enthusiastic and professional in their approach so I hope I get the chance to work with them again.

The lads from the technical crew, Costa Constantaras, Greg Rice and Blake Garner did their usual excellent job and the band made up of many of the excellent musicians used in "Vlad" earlier in the year did a top job. Some of them were Year 12's and I was very grateful for their contribution in such a busy year.

Finally my thanks to the girls from St Mary's who brought enormous energy and considerable talent to the production and their parents for being so supportive in so many ways.

Our next big production will be the "Legend of the Jabberwocky" which will be presented in our wonderful new Performing Arts Centre next March.

Vlad! A Café-Theatre Production. March 2000

'Vlad!' was staged in the Hale Memorial Hall, suitably transformed into a Gothic castle by Adrian Arnold. The show shifted continuously from pathos to comedy as it followed the story of a vampire with an aversion to blood.

The café-theatre approach allowed the illusion that the audience were actually tourists whose coach had broken down while on a tour of 'Tantalising Transylvania.' As they were seated at tables, they were greeted by Transylvanian villagers/gypsies who created the ambience with broken English and 'gypsy violins'. The Tour Guide arrived on stage to explain the situation and then introduced some villagers who attempted to entertain with some

appallingly rustic jokes before launching into a shocking folk dance. The audience wondered what was going on!

With a lightning strike and sound effects the atmosphere and lighting changed as the coffin was carried into the auditorium, accompanied by a Gregorian/Bulgarian chant. Vlad emerged to give his long monologue before debunking his own image. He explained his problems with his destiny and informed the audience that, as punishment for transgressions, he must take them on a journey through his life.

In a series of comic, poetic, dance or song scenarios: we met his menacing nurse and his bullying playmates, saw him given the gift of disguise by wizards with a penchant for card tricks, watched him almost trapped by the castle as he tried to escape until rescued by gypsies and taken to Australia. In Act 2 we saw him travelling from rags to riches as he moved from lowly piano teacher to a member of a boy band, a night club singer, and eventually a chat show host. He was entrapped by a suicidal female vampire, with whom he fell in love, and in a fit of vengeance embarked on a killing spree. The show concluded back in Transylvania: the coach had now been fixed and the audience could leave!

The performers ended the experience exhausted but proud to have reached such a high level of professionalism.



"In Your Own Write"

Three freshly printed scripts were thrust into my hands. They were for three one acts plays being presented at the Stow Drama Centre. The scripts were the result of hours of heartbreak, numerous re-writes and stress but they were finished. Now we had one day to do all the technical checks.

Chris Rutter was directing two of the three plays: Foetal Attraction, written by the year 11 class of 1999, and The Caretaker, written by Anthony Phillips. Matthew Lutton had written and was directing the third play, Distilled. I was working with the directors to add in all the lighting and sound effects that would bring the plays to life.

The Caretaker was stressful for the Year 8 sound technician, as he had to cue dozens of car crashes, cats meowing and garbage cans rolling to give the suburban atmosphere to the play. The play questioned our attitudes, by setting the story inside a rehabilitation asylum for the mentally ill, where you are not too sure who were in control.

Matthew Lutton's play had many music cues to enhance the "out-of-this-world" nature of this fantasy. It was a show that combined the two media of film and theatre using music, and various theatrical techniques. The play was set in the future with the human race searching for a new planet and having to contend with the race that inhabited it. The actors spent many hours rehearsing fight scenes and fine-tuning the small physical theatre interludes.

The third piece was a comedy but centred on a very import issue, suicide. The work won first place in the Youth on Health Festival 1999. Set inside a human uterus, two foetuses discuss their lives that are about to unfold. They eventually realise that life is what you make of it. The show ensured that the audience left in a thoughtful mood.


THEATRE CLUBS

Term One

At the beginning of 2000 Janine Gillett and Michael McGregor joined the fulltime Music Staff. At this time, the department's staff were still housed in demountable accommodation in the carpark to the North of the Stow Music Centre. However, no sooner had the new arrivals settled in than they and the boys from the top two orchestras and bands were away on the traditional combined music camps with St Mary's. As before, the camps were a chance to thoroughly rehearse the bands and orchestras and a measure of the success of these camps was the wonderful evening of music provided to the sell-out Quarry Amphitheatre crowd at 'Music Under The Stars'. One of many highlights at the concert was the performance of the Percussion Ensemble featuring recent Old Boy, Andrew Fisenden. He left Hale School at the end of 1999 as a year 10 to take early entrance to the Conservatorium of Music. Also, the voices of Cornelius de Münck and Lynette Taylor were welcome inclusions in the programme and were featured in the finale arrangement of Beethoven's Ode to Joy.

The Pianoforte Students' Recital was held on Thursday 16 March and immediately following this the opening celebrations for The Lady Wardle Performing Arts Centre at St Mary's. This involved a number of our boys in four concerts back to back over the ensuing weekend.

Also during the term a group of very talented Year Twelve students; Stafford Smith (Captain of Music), Oliver Loweth (Vice-captain Choral), Lucas Joynt, Kim Leong Goei and Christopher Pearce were joined by Andrew Fisenden. Under the guidance of Ms Coates, they assisted in the arrangements and performed the music for the café theatre production of 'Vlad'.

During the end of term holidays the department was still busy. Saturday 22 April will prove to be a memorable date for the department. For the only time in recorded history, the Director of Music double-booked himself and failed to show up for a performance that he was involved with. As the Hale St Mary's Concert Band played for the opening ceremony for the Graham Farmer Freeway in Northbridge, Kyle James Venables was born. The Director of Music makes no apologies for missing this gig.

Term Two

Activity in the Music Department intensified throughout this term as two important events loomed on the calendar. One was the 1 July completion date for the

New Music and Drama Centre, and the other was the 22 June departure date for the Hale St Mary's Concert Band tour to Sydney and Canberra.

The term began with Hale School hosting the second annual Barbershop Caberet held in partnership with Methodist Ladies College. Presented in the Tom Hoar Dining Hall on Wednesday 3 May, the superb food provided by Mr Friend and the music provided by the students from the two Schools and the female barbershop group, Facinatin' Rhythm, ensured the evening was a great success. What followed may very well go down in history as the last major school concert to be held in the Old Haleians' Memorial Hall. The May Concert was held on Friday 5 May and the appreciative, large crowd were treated to performances from intermediate bands and orchestras, ensembles and the Hale Choir.

Also, for the second successive year, Hale School participated in the Combined Anglican Schools' Concert, at the Perth Concert Hall. Held on Monday 15 May, the Hale St Mary's Choir sang and a feature of their performance was their a capella rendition of Barry Manilow's hit 'One Voice'. We also presented the Hale St Mary's Concert Band in this concert which was excellent preparation for their fast approaching tour. Old Boy and former oboist, Subha Naidu ('94) once again created an excellent poster for this concert.

On Thursday 18 May the String and Vocal Students' Recital was held in the Stow Music Centre and this will probably go down in history as the last recital to be staged in this venue. On Sunday 21 May the Hale Choir participated in the inaugural High School Choir Festival at Perth Modern School.

Just prior to the Concert Band tour, St Mary's presented its annual Music Night on Friday 9 June (the first major concert to be held in the new facilities at St Mary's). This event involved the boys from the Hale St Mary's Concert Concert Band, Hale St Mary's Concert Band 2 and the Hale St Mary's Orchestra. Also held at St Mary's was a short farewell concert on Tuesday 13 June at which the band members were presented with tour jumpers, badges and stickers.

On the evening of Thursday 22 June the band gathered at Perth Airport to depart on an overnight flight to Sydney for what would turn out to be one of the most successful tours ever undertaken by the Hale St Mary's Concert Band. Upon its arrival in Sydney the band immediately boarded two buses for the trip to Canberra. While there the band visited the National War Memorial, the Art Gallery and had a tour of Parliament House. The band arrived back in Sydney that evening exhausted and ready for a good night's sleep at the YWCA Hotel in the heart of Sydney, this place that would become home for the band for the following nine days.

The next morning music-making began in earnest as the band took its place in the 2000 Australia International Music Festival of Sydney. Over the next few days the band played in concerts at The Sydney Town Hall, St Catherine's School, Darling Harbour and most importantly the Concert Hall of the Sydney Opera House. The Band's Opera House performance was as part of the opening concert and was also when the band was judged as worthy of a gold medal. As gold medallists the band was invited back to play at the Festival's finale at the new recital hall in Angel Place. Stafford Smith, Oliver Loweth, Kallan Sadler, David Shearer, Jaimal Sandhu, Lucas Joynt and Michael Down were invited to play in the World Wind Band. This was an honour for these boys to take part in such an ensemble and in the words of St Mary's, Kimberley Harrison, when they played at the finale "They were hot!"

Term Three

Term Three began for the Music Department before the boys returned from their break. The new Music and Drama Centre was officially handed over to the School on 10 July and on Thursday 13 July there was an abundance of frantic activity as the music staff, helped by the maintenance department (and while dodging frequent showers), moved the entire Music Department into its new premises. Immediately the term began the department began preparing for a busy performance schedule.

Apart from the Opening Ceremony for the new Music and Drama Centre, Term Three also saw numerous concerts, festivals and recitals. The St Mary's 'July Concert' on Friday 21 July was the first and it involved the boys in the Hale St Mary's Intermediate Orchestra, Hale St Mary's Concert Band 3 and Hale St Mary's Concert Band 4.

The next event was the Woodwind Students' Recital on Thursday 3 August. We have had the opportunity to try many different venues around the new centre for performances since moving in and this recital was the first trial, it was presented in the foyer. Much to our delight the venue worked well both acoustically and aesthetically. Two days later, on Saturday 5 August, the Western Australian Schools' Orchestra Festival began at Penrhos College and many of our orchestras and string ensembles took part. There were a number of very good performances from our groups and it was evidence of the growing strength of our string programme here. Shortly after this festival, the Western Australian Schools' Concert Band Festival (also at Penrhos) was held. It started on Thursday 10 August, and as in previous years our bands did the School proud.

The department's attention now turned earnestly in the direction of the Opening Ceremony of the Music and Drama Centre and the Governors' Concert which were now less than two weeks away. Rehearsals took on an even greater importance as staff and students alike waited expectantly for their chance to perform in front of a live audience in the new auditorium. "Was the auditorium acoustic going to prove to be as excellent as we were led to believe? How was the venue going to cope with a full house? Will the backstage work properly and efficiently? Most importantly, how will playing on the new stage affect the performance of the students?" These were some of the questions that consumed nearly every participant as the moment of truth approached.

On Monday evening 21 August, the first sound heard at the Opening Ceremony was the didgeridoo of Ronald Morgan (Wls 11), this was played as a part of an excellent rendition of Tommy Emmanuel's 'The Journey'. As a musical spectacular it was an outstanding success and from every aspect this was the perfect way for the musical life of this new place to officially begin. Also memorable in this ceremony was the performance of JS Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 5 by the Senior String Ensemble which featured Ernest Chua (TRG 10) on the harpsichord, Simon Fisenden esq. (Captain of Music 1998) on the flute and Michael McGregor esq. on the violin. This item was repeated with success at the Governors' Concert with Simon's part played by his father, Neil.

The Governors' Concert held on Thursday 24 August and Friday 25 August (the Thursday concert was repeated on Friday) were both virtual sell-outs. Many of the Music Department's long term, loyal supporters (who have experienced many a Hale School concert) rated the Opening Ceremony and the Governors' Concert of 2000 as the best concert series in the School's history.

The ambiance of the Music and Drama Centre as a whole, and the excellent acoustic properties of the new auditorium in particular, answered all the questions that were mentioned before quite emphatically. The answer was that in every aspect, as an educational institution, the Hale School Music and Drama Centre is a phenomenal success. The fact is that Hale now has an outstanding building that can in itself take our students to a new level of achievement. In this place their confidence as musicians soars, safe in the knowledge that the acoustic properties of each space will enhance, not hinder, their every effort.

The term moved on and we were delighted with the musical participation of each House in the second annual House Arts Competition held in the Old Haleians' Memorial Hall on Wednesday 30 August. Adjudicated by Old Boy, Kimberley Harrison (Director of Music from St Mary's) the spectacle was truly memorable and we salute the two winners of the music section who were the Riley House Choir (Blake Garner) and the Wilson House Band. As all participants departed the Memorial Hall members of the administration staff were heard to remark, "What other inter-house competition has every one leaving with a smile on their face?" This alone speaks volumes for the positive effect that the

arts are having on the whole School community.

Thursday 7 September saw the department trial another venue for a recital, the Brass and Percussion Students Recital was held in Rehearsal One. This evening was also a success except for the setting off of a smoke detector during the supper following the recital. (Steam from an urn set it off not smoke!) Therefore the highlight for some of the younger people attending this event was the Fire Brigade arriving with sirens and lights on. During the semester there were also recitals held on the Performance Stair and outdoor concerts on the terraces overlooking Craig Oval. On every occasion the facilities proved to be more than capable.

On 10 September the annual 'Sunday in Spring' concert was held. This year it was staged in Hale's Music and Drama Centre. This concert is, in effect, the wind-up for all six of the Hale St Mary's instrumental ensembles and this year there were a record 45 Year 12s who left. Also, this concert signaled the beginning of a number of important functions that were to farewell this talented group.

TERM FOUR

Our next farewell function on Friday 13 October was the enthusiastically attended Year Twelve Music Dinner, held once again in the Tom Hoar Dining Hall and beautifully catered for by Mr Friend and the staff from the School's kitchen. It was a memorable evening with speeches from the Captain of Music, Stafford Smith, the Director of Music and the evening's special guest, the Chairman of the Board of Governors, Dr Eric Isaachsen

Close on the heels of the Year Twelve Music Dinner, the competition for the Garland Music Prize was held and it remains as popular, and as keenly contested, as ever. It was staged over two nights, beginning on Thursday 19 October and was adjudicated by a former Director of Music here at Hale, Andrew Bushell. As it happened, the winning performance was heard early in the competition and it was from the Year 12s singer Stuart Laing who gave a very polished performance of Mozart's 'Non piu andrai'. We congratulate Stuart and the other section winners who are listed here.

It has been through coming together under the Hale colours that we have strived and achieved. Now, we're about to go out — not alone — but without the shelter that has brought us all such good times and prosperity.

It's time to go fellas. Some of us have been itching for months now, others for years, others are really feeling the ache of nostalgia in their throats. We're all feeling a bit different right now, but there's one thing we all have in common: we're leaving behind many good times and memories and we're not sure we really like it all that much.

To all the parents here, be very proud of your sons, as I'm sure you are. Hale School has sheltered and protected them and made school life easier than most, but these years have been no walk in the park. These grounds have witnessed a lot of growth and development that has often been painful, exhausting and reluctant.

These young men have surpassed all expectations, gobbled up every benefit and learnt from every source possible: from teachers and from each other.

To you fellas, I have no idea what to offer you would give inspiration and meaning, so I'll let the Greatest, Muhammad Ali, have a try:

"Friendship is the hardest thing in the world to explain. It's not something you learn in school. But if you haven't learned the meaning of friendship, you really haven't learned anything."

We haven't learned friendship in school, we've learned it through this school. And I think each and every one of us has learnt a lot.

Tomorrow


A message brought to me that night, Through miles of copper wire And a cold electronic device, Rendered me fearful as ever I may fear.
