





HEADMASTER

Dr RJ Inverarity

We are gathered here this morning to reflect upon and celebrate the challenges, achievements, fellowship and support we have witnessed and shared at the Hale Senior School in the Year 2001. Over 900 boys, nearly 100 teachers, 10 Governors of the School, many support staff and interested parents have contributed to a wholesome, vibrant learning and teaching environment of which we can all feel justifiably proud.

Without doubt, one of every community's greatest challenges and responsibilities is the raising of their young. Families and schools are the two primary institutions charged with this responsibility. Parents and teachers are the people who shoulder this profound responsibility. They are the ones in whom this responsibility is entrusted. They are the ones who have this wonderful opportunity to make a real difference; to make a real difference each day.

If we are to become a more civilized and just society, then we need to give greater value, greater appreciation, greater resources and greater status to education, to schools, to universities and to teachers. A society gives less than high priority to its system of education, its educational institutions and its profession of teachers at its peril.

A Story

Once upon a time, a powerful king decided to honour the greatest person among his subjects. He sent out heralds and messengers to every part of his kingdom to find the heroes of the land. On the appointed day, those chosen assembled in the throne room.

The wealthiest person in the kingdom was there, alongside the most influential author. The leading doctor stood with the famous scientist. There was a celebrated lawyer who had won many courtroom battles. And a brilliant musician. A gifted artist. Men and women of talent, achievement and status.

As the king gazed at the glittering assembly of talented and successful people, he wondered how he could ever choose who was the greatest among them.

He noticed a white-haired woman standing quietly at the back. People greeted her with respect and affection and lingered with her. She had eyes that shone with knowledge, understanding and love.

"Who is this woman?" demanded the king.
"Why is she here? What has she done?
Why are so many paying her such affection
and respect?"

"My lord", replied his chief minister. "You have met and spoken to all the greatest people of your kingdom. She is their teacher."

Those assembled burst into cheering and applause as the king came down from his throne to meet her and to honour her.

For no matter how great the achievements, how great the person, all success begins with learning. Honour learning and honour those who teach and together you will truly touch the future.

Though it was pleasing that education was an issue of policy in the recent Federal Election, it was disappointing that the debate was relatively shallow and was reduced to a slanging match about the amounts of money to be spent on particular projects and schools. The amount of money spent, or not spent, on buildings and facilities can at best only heighten or diminish the essential sense of educational purpose that exists within a school community.

That purpose and sense of educational commitment is the by-product of the quality of a school's teaching staff. Distinguished former Governor-General, Sir Zelman Cowan, once spoke of the need for all citizens to demonstrate 'immaculate professionalism' in their working lives. Today, I wish to make a number of comments about the importance of this 'immaculate professionalism' within the teaching profession.

I am fortunate to be able to make these comments as the Head of a school where teachers both deserve and earn enormous respect and admiration as a result of their commitment and dedication to creating a stimulating, challenging, liberal and humane educational environment for all of our students.

All of us here today recognise that the combined effect of the efforts of our teachers, both individually and as a team, engaging the students as they do, is the creation of the energy, the inspiration and the successes that sustain our school community. I also believe that the standards of excellence and dedication set by our teachers are central to the commitment shown by our students

and our equally dedicated parent community.

The demonstration of a true sense of vocation by teachers is badly needed within all schools in our society. No amount of money can make an individual develop what is true vocation, that sense of calling and fitness for a career. It is that sense of vocation that underwrites the immaculate professionalism of which I spoke earlier.

I know the Board of Governors feels inspired by the dedication and sense of vocation demonstrated by our teachers to continue to invest further in the expansion and development of the resources of our School.

I have no doubt that this sense of vocation is THE indispensable ingredient in the quality of educational opportunity afforded to all our students.

It is for this reason that I wish to make some comments on the challenges our community faces in maintaining and further enhancing the required standards of professionalism within the teaching profession.

The facts are that the median age of teachers is now in the high 40s and rising steadily; a shortage of teachers is emerging in key discipline areas; there is a pronounced gender imbalance within the teaching profession, with women outnumbering men, especially in primary school ranks, and Australian teaching graduates are being lured to overseas countries, including England and the United States, where severe teaching shortages are also being experienced.

Clearly, the attraction of the teaching profession has been on the wane for many years. Perceptions of poor pay, poor conditions and lack of community respect have eroded the quality of people entering and remaining within the teaching profession.

What is to be done? Like so many areas of public policy, there are no instant solutions. However, we must recognise that this serious social problem exists. It will be to no-one's advantage if schools are built that contain expensive capital technologies but contain inadequate intellectual capital to teach and inspire our students.

Present teachers must continue to demonstrate to the community their professionalism and deep interest in order to encourage the next generation to join their distinguished vocation.

Universities must reconsider the entrance requirements for teacher programmes. Our community must at the same time reconsider what financial rewards are necessary to keep great teachers within our classrooms.


- or else we would not have been able to hold aloft the Darlot, Hamer, Alcock and Redmond trophies - or enjoy the full houses at *Music Under the Stars*, *Jabberwocky*, *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* or *Hamlet*, as we have this year.

However, this can come at a price, with some students feeling out of their depth; that their achievements, or perceived lack of them, are overwhelmed by such sparkling accomplishments. For this reason, it is vital that we remember that not everyone can jump as far as Braden Searle, play the Last Post as well as Kallan Sadler, or solve the most impossible of mathematical problems like Peter McNamara, but that not all of us need to. What is important is, by all means, to respect and enjoy the successes of others, but also discover what each of us can do, and what sparks our individual interest. It is our right, and obligation to ourselves, to open the doors we want to, and take the chance that success will come.

We cannot do it alone, however, nor do many of us ever need to. Our families, teachers and friends are there to offer advice and motivate us in times of adversity, and for that, on behalf of all the boys, I would like to thank you. The list of individuals I could personally thank, and should thank fellow students and prefects, for the great friendships forged over the last five years, and teachers, coaches and family, for their advice, guidance and support - is far too long to go through now. However, my hope is that they know how important they have been on my journey.

I would like to single out two fairly important people - my parents, who helped me open the heavy door that led to this School over five years ago, and have struggled to keep it from shutting ever since. If I ever needed inspiration, you so easily provided it. Thank you, and thank you to all parents, and to the wider community of Hale School, for your commitment to all of us at the beginning of the life-long journeys that await us.

Roosevelt said this day would live in infamy. Let us not be content to stand by and see whether he is proved right. Rather, knowing that when we leave this hall, so many opportunities exist, especially for us, the students, for the future of this country and the world, let us take them and run with them, and make a difference, in whatever field we choose to pursue. Let us make



CHAPLAIN

In my first year as sole chaplain of Hale School, I have found that one of my chief privileges is the opportunity to be involved in the lives of both the Senior and Junior school campuses, as well as with our boarding community. This in itself has been a great challenge in a school the size of Hale, however, it does leave me in a unique position to develop a view of the School that few are blessed to enjoy. A view that sees me constantly surprised and inspired by the great wisdom and compassion that students of all ages display, whether on the sports field, in the grounds, in the classroom or in regular presentations in Chapel and at both Junior and Senior Assemblies

I am also greatly blessed, as I mentioned to the Year 12s in their Valedictory Chapel service, to journey with this community. through both joy and sorrow, through a great range of significant moments in their year and lives, and indeed this is another of my chief privileges. This year has held for the community of Hale School some stellar moments as well as its share of deep sadness, moments that I have been blessed to share. Some of these moments have had a deep impact throughout the world, while others have been more specific to members within our community. Many of these events have been shared within the confines of the Chapel walls, while many more have been marked in different areas throughout the School grounds. The common tie throughout all these events, however, has been the great compassion, thought and energy with which the students, staff, parents and Old Boys have met them. In particular. I was struck by the deep sensitivity and respect with which our students met the great tragedy of September 11 and all the issues that surrounded it. I believe that this, more than any other single event, has brought to the fore the profound communal spirit of compassion and care that has been developed at Hale over many years. Much of this compassion was given expression as some four or five hundred boys gathered over the lunch period of Friday the 15th of September simply to light a candle symbolising their stance in unified grief with those who lost their loved ones in the great tragedy of the preceding Tuesday, and to display their desire for all that is light in the human spirit to shine brightly in the darkness brought about by these acts of terrorism.

There have been many events and occasions surrounding the Chaplaincy this year but I would like to single out just a few of them.

The year in Chaplaincy began, as it does each year, with a prefects' leadership training service, a beginning of year staff service and the induction of the Junior School Chapel monitors - Matthew Hamilton-Prime, Matthew Lewis, Robert O'Neil and Anthony Tonkin. However, by far the most prominent event of Term 1 was our observance of Holy Week and Easter, the pinnacle of the Christian year. The spectacular performance of the student drama club brought to life the great story of



God's endless love in Christ's passion, death and resurrection. Special thanks go to Ms Souris and all the boys involved for the enormous effort and talent they brought to our Holy Week and Easter celebrations.

As we continued through the year, the Junior School produced Mothers' and Fathers' day Chapels that left not a dry eye in the house. These celebrations sit easily alongside much of the fun and energy that shakes the Chapel regularly on Monday mornings - a great way to start the week.

Term 3 saw the beginning of a lively and enjoyable confirmation course which continued into Term 4, concluding in a joyful and memorable evening Chapel service at which four boys were Baptised, ten Confirmed and two renewed their Baptismal vows before Bishop Brian Farran. My special thanks go to the group of students who made the event so much fun and to all the staff mentors for their continuous support.


As we ran headlong into Term 4, it seemed that the pace only increased, with a moving Valedictory service for our fine group of outgoing Year 12s, Christmas


Chapels, Year 7 Valedictory, and Advent Carols at St Georges Cathedral.



ARCHIVES

The Hale School Museum and Archives facility was first commissioned in 1992 to collect and preserve the outstanding history of the many who have passed through the School. In our Archives we have over eleven thousand records of individuals who have been educated here since 1858; in our Museum we have on display many artefacts donated by Old Boys to illustrate their careers in a wide variety of vocations—from a polar explorer [Sid Kirkby], to a Royal Australian Air Force Chief of Staff [Sir Valston Hancock], a 1943 'Dam Buster' [Lance Howard], to test cricketers, Rhodes Scholars, politicians, prominent writers, poets and sculptors.

The Hale School footprint has been indelibly stamped on the history of Australia and we take delight in preserving and displaying that important heritage.

When you visit the Hale School Museum, you will find it broken into distinct sections:

Politicians

Hale School has produced six Premiers of Western Australia, as well as many State cabinet ministers. Many federal politicians too, attended Hale including John Forrest, the first Commonwealth Treasurer and Acting Prime Minister in 1908, later Baron Forrest of Bunbury.

Civic

- notable Lords Mayor of Perth from Alexander Forrest in the 1890s through to the current mayor, Dr Peter Nattrass.
- On our Order of Australia board are displayed the 25 Haleians who have been honoured by the Commonwealth of Australia for outstanding service to the community, from Air Commodore Geoff Michael AO OBE AFC in 1978 to Todd Pearson OAM in 2001, our 2000 Sydney Olympics duel swimming Gold Medallist.

Scholars

 Hale School's twelve Rhodes Scholars, from the Honourable Justice James Leonard Walker in 1904 to Professor Tim Davis in 1977.

Poets/writers/artists

 Prominent award-winning writer Robert Drewe, noted poet Alex Choate and historian Ken Tregonning are among many Haleians included in a display of collected Haleian works.

Military

Air Marshal Sir Valston Hancock,
 Flying Officer Lance Howard, Brigadier
 George Maitland, Chaplain General
 Tom Riley, Brigadier Russell Lloyd,
 and many others, represent Haleians
 who have given valuable service to
 our country from the Boer War through
 to the Vietnam War. Their efforts are
 commemorated in the Hale School Old Boy
 publication of the book, Veldt to Vietnam
 (Haleians at War).

Sporting -The Museum also displays many of our prominent sporting identities, from test cricketer Geoff Marsh, to dual Sandover Medallist footballer 'Sam' Clarke, yachtsman John Longley, international squash player Dean Williams and present day Olympians, dual gold medallist at Sydney, Todd Pearson and eights oarsman silver medallist, Nick Porzig.

2001 Projects:

Naval Project

In the wake of the project to obtain as many signatures of World War II Haleian aircrew on the G for George portrait, former navy man Bob Glover is in the throes of obtaining a suitable painting of a typical Royal Australian Navy ship for Haleian naval personnel to sign.

Recovering Heritage

In keeping with our charter to resurrect as much of the School's past history as is possible, Old Boy Neil Williamson managed to track down the daughter of one of Havelock Street's most notable matrons, Sister Shenton. The result was a delightful meeting and a piecing together of the personal history of Alma Shenton, the woman who had such a profound influence on the lives of many Haleians in the 1930s. The article which resulted from the meeting may be read in the December issue of The Haleian.

A similar project we have had running for some years, encouraging past Dux and Captains of School to send to us their impressions and reminiscences of their time at The High School and Hale School, is ongoing.

Memorial Groves

- In April 2001 we placed fifteen plaques for Haleians who lost their lives in the (approximate) Middle Eastern theatre during World War II, from El Alamein to India; Malta to Greece.
- In November, in the rose garden beneath the Chapel, twenty-two Haleian Aircrew Europe 'boys' were commemorated, among them Charles Lee Steere, a fighter pilot with number 601 squadron, Royal Air Force who lost his life over Dunkirk in 1940. Next to him is commemorated his brother Roderick Lee Steere, an officer in the Royal Australian Naval reserve, who lost his life at sea when his ship was torpedoed in 1942. Their plaques were placed by members of the Lee Steere family.
- In 2002 we will complete the Memorial Groves project by placing the 37 plaques of Haleians killed either in the South-West Pacific theatre or in Australia. The final two plaques will be for Royal Australian Artillery Captain Brian 'Joe' Luscombe and naval Sub-Lieutenant 'Dick' Sinclair, both of whom were killed in action in Korea while flying aircraft during 1951-52.



EDDIE GROUGHAN

When Eddie Groughan left Sydney Grammar School in 1994, he was simply taking his family West to begin a new life. That new life began with a job at Lords Health and Fitness Centre in Subiaco. In those days, the PSA athletics was held in the autumn and Hale was looking for an athletics coach. Through his association with the manager of Lords, Dean Williams, a distinguished Hale School Old Boy, Eddie was given a two month contract to coach athletics at Hale.

By Semester 2, 1995, Eddie had joined the PE staff at Hale. From there he was selected to be second in charge to Sportsmaster, Derek Chadwick. Eventually Eddie became the Sportsmaster of Hale School. On the first day of the new school year in which Eddie took over from Derek Chadwick, he chose not to come to the lectern to give his opening address. He stood in the body of the room among the staff. It became a metaphor for his sportsmastership. He always stood with the staff – supporting and encouraging them and sharing moments of their involvement with the boys. Above all Eddie was incredibly fair. At the end of one long and difficult winter sports season, Eddie sat down and wrote, by hand, to every coach of a winter sports team, thanking them for their contribution, displaying incredible insight and knowledge into each and every sport and the boys who played them.

Eddie Groughan is an outstanding coach of schoolboys. While working with Derek Chadwick and the 1st XI cricket side they secured a series of Darlot Cups. In 1999, in a quiet way, he became the assistant mentor of the 1st XV rugby side and they won the Redmond Cup in that year. However, it is in athletics that Eddie is seen at his best. His technical knowledge of so many events, but particularly sprinting, and his meticulous record keeping are measures of the man. In the Hale Common room, some people can tell you the trifecta in the Melbourne Cup, an hour after the race. Some football pundits can pick the 'eight' by submitting their selection cards at 4.00 p.m. on a Sunday. Eddie can tell you, to the precise point, what the athletics squad will achieve at a PSA Athletics carnival, and he can do it weeks before the event. In horse racing parlance, some jockeys have a magic that makes horses run for them, Eddie has a magic that makes boys run for him. They do it out of respect for his coaching skills, in response to his subtle and sincere motivation directed towards individuals, and because they love the man. He carries all these skills into his work in the classroom.

We wish Eddie everything he would wish himself in his new position at Aquinas College. Hale School's loss is very much their gain.

LYNN NUNN

Lynn Nunn joined Hale in 1997 after a long and distinguished career as Head of English at Newman College. Lynn made an immediate impact. A woman of great style, she has a tremendous sense of humour, often directed at herself, and is refreshingly frank in her opinions and evaluations. One always knows where one stands with Lynn Nunn, yet she is sensitive and perceptive to the needs of others. She brought a wealth of experience and

efficiency to the Department. She has all aspects of the teaching job well covered; she is an organised administrator, a fastidious classroom teacher, and has a commitment to the aims and objectives of the curriculum. She demands a great deal of her students, and will not compromise on the standards she expects. She is a woman of principle. Les Nunn joined the Hale staff in 1979, the 'middle man' in a sequence of three ex-Australian water polo captains, sandwiched between Tom Hoad and Richard Pengelley. Even before starting teaching, Les had had contact with Hale School through his in coaching the Hale swimming classes and help in coaching the Hale swimming team during the previous two Christmas holidays.

Les began his teaching at Hale as its first full-time PE teacher. This meant the plementation of the PE programmes in Years 8, 9 and 10 and the introduction of such fashionable' sports as archery, badminton, surfing and soccer.

Les was also involved in the development of a variety of outdoor activities for Hale boys.

As well as coaching the swimming team for many years and to many victories, Les coached the high jumpers for most of his time at Hale.

He developed a new programme of study with the Secondary Education Authority called Industrial Workshop that was mainly for boarders in its early years. He had a new workshop built to house the new course of study and, after being appointed Head of the soon to be called Design and Technology Department, helped design the groundbreaking new Technology Centre. During this time, he spent many hours designing new courses to be undertaken in the new

For all that Les has done, he will be remembered by the boys as one with whom they could be quite familiar but for whom they held great respect.

The staff will be sad to see him go for many reasons. Les has been one who has done more than his share and he has always done it in his own special 'Les Nunn' style. He is a man of action; never content to sit back and just let things happen. This sort of person is invaluable to a teaching staff.

The School as a whole is grateful to Les for 23 years of fantastic contribution in such an incredibly wide variety of areas.

We all wish Les and his wife, Lynn, the very best in their 'life after Hale' and especially in their Ballingup venture where they are restoring a heritage farm on the banks of the Blackwood River.

GARY YOUNG

Gary Young joined Hale School in 1983 as a teacher of Mathematics. Over the next 18 years, he worked his way up in the Department teaching across all levels and streams of Mathematics finishing as Assistant Head of Department and advisor on computer packages and graphics calculators in his last few years at the School. He gave many presentations, both within the School and Australia wide, on the various uses of the graphics calculator. He will also be remembered by many Hale boys for his quiet but expert advice in many sports, as a cricket and football coach but also turning his hand to most other sports as a very accomplished and successful sportsman himself. PATRICK WALLAS

Patrick Wallas came to Australia in 1988 and spent six happy years as a House Master in Pembroke School in Adelaide before joining Hale School's staff in Semester 1 in 1995.

Patrick made a profound impact on Hale School in his six years on staff. As Head of English from 1995 until 1997 he had a unifying and inspiring effect on his colleagues and his exuberant and positive outlook was much loved by his students.

Patrick's energy and academic strength was reflected in the many achievements of the English Department during his period as its Head: Creative Writing Competitions flourished in his time, high academic standards were expected and attained, there was a steady stream of visiting writers and lecturers, and theatre trips and excursions were frequent.

At the end of 1997 Patrick resigned. He took a year away from teaching to write fiction and to reflect and write on English teaching. It was typical of Patrick that he was able to take this bold step, confident of its beneficial effect - and in his 40th year too!

Patrick's rare gift of wisdom and humanity his exhuberant spirit and his ability to inspire and nourish those around him will be sorely missed.



received the Guy Ward Award, an award for Outstanding Leadership in Boarding, an award that hasn't been given to a Faulkner boy in a decade.




opportunity to become acquainted with some of the senior boys, before their move up to Faulkner House in 2002.




With the House competing in several finals, success was bound to come and it did for the House cricket and junior volleyball teams. Special mention must


This year, Haynes improved its





Marcus Wilson received one of ten WestScheme Awards made to students for Vocational Education and Training. The WestScheme award is a tribute both to Marcus and to Hale School's CareerLink programme.

The mean TER in 2001 was 88.19 (TES 351) which was the second highest ever achieved by the School. Thirty-three students gained a TER of 97.5 or more, (TES 400 +). This was 21% of Hale's TEE population. By comparison, 6.7% of the State TEE population scored a TER over (97.5)

The State mean TER was 77.26. 133 students or 86% of our 155 TEE students achieved more than the State mean.

The outstandingly high individual TEE performances together with the very high mean TER are a tribute to the determination of the students and to the dedication and skill of their teachers.

The strength of the School's Academic Departments, at Year 12 level especially, is revealed by the fact that 12 subjects were ranked in the top ten for the State, based on TEE results: History, Political and Legal Studies, Ancient History, English Literature, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Geography, Economics, Calculus, Japanese and French. Among non-TEE subjects, Applied Technology was ranked in the top ten for the third successive year.

Publishing Contract for Hale Writer

Year 12 student Danny Cregan achieved this year what many aspiring writers would give their word-processing arm for - a publishing contract with Penguin Books.

After almost missing the deadline, Danny's novella *Papua* won the WA section of the Qantas Somerset College Novella National Writing Competition. As part of his prize, Danny won not only the opportunity to rub shoulders with many of Australia's literary illuminati at the week-long National Writers' Conference in March 2001, but also the opportunity to be a published author.


Set in Papua New Guinea in 1942, *Papua* is a fictional work about a young soldier, David Blainey, who, against his better judgement, is involved in a covert operation of dubious merit to slow the advance of Japanese troops. The novella builds on an earlier short story which won Danny the Tim Winton Award for Young Writers in 1999.

Danny, who was also the winner of the Year 12 History prize in 2001, describes the novella as historically based, but essentially a fictional story about human experience. The judges of the competition, who included established writers Gary Crew and Helen Chamberlain, appraised the work as being "an accomplished and moving novella, describing a man's


emotion with rare insight. The pathos of the closing scene", they observed, "is masterfully sustained and particularly emotional."

Danny has not visited PNG but his late grandfather fought there during World War II. Danny said that he spoke to his grandmother about his grandfather's experiences.

Along with the stories of other State winners, Penguin will publish *Papua*, in *Confessions of a Neo-milkmaid*, and other stories by young Australians, early in 2002.

Peter McNamara of Year 12 has achieved some outstanding results in mathematics over the past few years. In particular, he has become the first Australian student ever to achieve two Gold medals in the International Mathematical Olympiad.

The Olympiad is the most prestigious and demanding international competition in mathematics for secondary students from around the world. Over 80 countries field teams of up to six students selected from their brightest and best mathematicians. The USA, Russia, China and many of the Eastern European countries usually field formidable teams in the competition and have extensive selection and training processes. The mathematical insight required to compete at this level is a rare quality indeed.

Peter's achievements at this level have been outstanding. Gaining selection to the Australian team of six students is hard enough in itself; to do so in three consecutive years is remarkable.

As a Year 10 student in 1999, Peter went to Bucharest in Romania and achieved a Bronze medal, which placed him in the top half of the 450 students involved. The following year he went to Taejon in Korea and brought back Gold as a result of coming in the top one twelfth of students.

The competition requires students to answer six very demanding questions. Each question is awarded seven marks, giving a possible total of 42. In 2000, Peter scored 31, just enough to achieve the Gold medal.

In 2001, Peter set himself the goal of becoming the first Australian to achieve a Gold medal twice. The competition was held in Washington D.C. in the United States. Peter scored 36 out of a possible 42, placing him tenth out of the 473 competitors and bringing home the second Gold medal.

Peter has distinguished himself as a mathematician of very high quality throughout his time at Hale School. As well as his International Olympiad achievements, he has won prizes in the Australian and Asia-Pacific sections of the Olympiad programme. Twice he has achieved a perfect score in the Australian Mathematics Competition for the Westpac Awards. He has also helped Hale teams

win the *Have Sum Fun* competitions for the last few years.

All in all, Peter's achievements in mathematics have been incredible for a number of years and we wish him every success in his future mathematical pursuits.

finish the business plan. All this hard work eventually paid off later when it came to the awards night.

After the initial shock of been introduced to the world of business and company management, we soon got down to the 'nitty gritty' of producing and packaging our product. Bought from a wide variety of retail outlets, the contents of the sushi making kit were meticulously put together and packaged in our own very special way, guaranteed to please our potential buyers.

The trade fair was a special occasion both for the company and for many company members personally. Dressed for success, the team arrived at Forrest Chase early on a Sunday to prepare for the big day ahead. Encouraged by the early sales exceeding expectations, we went into the trade fair ready for success, and were richly rewarded by just that. Our product attracted a great deal of attention from both the general public and fellow schools. While the number of sets we sold wasn't a great deal, the experience we gained could not have been assigned a dollar value. The highlight of the day was the sales pitch performed by two members from Hale (Gareth Jelenich and Simon Boxer), who both dressed up as ninjas and showcased to the delight of the public, a skit fight, eventually resulting in the ninjas being given godly status by the

younger members of the public.

Over the period of the next two months, the company received a steady inflow of funds from the equally steady sales of the sushimaking kits. As a result, by the beginning of liquidation period, we were sitting on a relatively healthy profit. A few more tasks remained to be done. The annual report had to be prepared and handed in. Once again, like the business plan, the annual report required the input of all members of the group. Walking a very thin line, we managed to complete the annual report at the very last moment, almost to the minute!

The completion of the annual report signalled the end of the formal part of the Young Achievers Quest. Yet to come was the excitement of the Young Achievers Ball Awards Night. At the Golden Nugget Ballroom at Gloucester Park on 3 November, we were treated to a night to remember. Overlooking the river towards the casino, the ballroom was a fantastic venue for this event. After the presentation of the awards, we were treated to a night of fun and dancing.

Applied Technology

Year 11 Community Project

This year the Community Spirit project took a different tack, with the students from each class determining both the recipient and the type of project to be undertaken. Wembley Pre-Primary School and Anglicare WA were chosen as the beneficiaries of this year's projects.

Students making aids for the Wembley Pre-Primary divided themselves into groups, depending on the size of the project, and set about the task of designing and making as a collective unit. All projects were completed ahead of schedule and were personally delivered to the Pre-Primary by the entire class. The projects ranged from a wall of 30 pigeon holes for kids to house their personal items in, to two bookshelves on wheels, a light box, a coat rack for the dress-up corner and an alphabet worksheet stand.

Elanore Lake, the Pre-Primary teacher, could not thank the boys enough, saying that the items the boys had made saved them years of fund raising. As a thank you from the Pre-Primary, each boy was presented with a bravery award for his efforts!

The second group decided to make small wooden toys and to donate those toys to Anglicare WA. The toys consisted of two trucks, an aeroplane, a boat, a spinning top, a train, a most intricate articulated tug of war toy and a magnificent rocking horse. Individuals made some toys; others were made in small groups. Justin Pitsikas phoned Anglicare and arranged for Daphne Thacker to collect the toys.

Graphics Technology

Graphics Technology has gone from strength to strength with two Year 11 classes and one Year 12 in just three years.

The emphasis is for students to communicate their ideas graphically through the production of line and marker drawings and the manipulation of computer generated material. This year, all the students' project work was 'burnt' onto a CD ROM and displayed as a web page, which the boys designed and developed themselves.

Work from this year's group has been of an excellent standard, with many of their designs exhibited throughout the School. Both groups' first major project was in product design and were developed to be regarded as prototypes of the 'real thing'. Some Year 12 Communication Devices were finished to a very high standard and certainly lived up to that expectation.

Other project work included Web Page Design, 3D animation, a child's first reading book and a 'T' shirt design. Examples of the students' Web Pages can be seen on the School's Intranet.

Many Graphics Technology students undertaking the CareerLink programme included design companies for their work experience.

Systems Technology

Systems Technology students at Years 10 - 12 undertook work using PIC chips (Programmable Interface Controllers). A PIC micro controller chip combines the functions of: microprocessor, ROM program memory, some RAM memory and input/output interface in one single package.

The technology is very new to schools and allows students to combine electronics and computer control into one programme of study. The PIC-Logicator system is designed to be used to program a range of 8, 18, 28 pin re-programmable PIC micro controllers which provide a variety of output, digital input and analogue input options to suit school projects.

Excellent projects from the Year 11 and 12 students included a security device to switch on a home computer by Justin Pitsikas, a keypad controlled door lock by Sebastian Juerges and a 'collision sensing' buggy by Andrew Jones.

Well done to all DT boys for their efforts this year and for producing some outstanding projects.

ENGLISH

"The books one reads in childhood ... create in one's mind a sort of false map of the world, a series of fabulous countries into which one can retreat at odd moments throughout the rest of life, and which in some cases can survive a visit to the real countries which they are supposed to represent."

- George Orwell

Much of what lies at the heart of English studies at Hale School is summarised in Orwell's words. The boys learn that texts are first and foremost about enjoyment, no matter what form they come in – short stories, poems, novels, plays, feature films, travel-logs, feature articles, TV dramas, autobiographies, etc. Like the first fairytales we enjoyed as children, texts open our eyes to something new, to somewhere different. They take us away to places where "one can retreat at odd moments throughout the rest of life". But that is not all that the English Department has worked to achieve in 2001...

"Books, not which afford us a cowering mjoyment, but in which each thought is of unusual daring; such as an idle man cannot read, and a timid one would not be entertained by, which even make us dangerous to existing institutions, — such call I good books."

- HD Thoreau

As Thoreau makes clear, good texts don't simply provide flights of fancy - they can also challenge, confront and sometimes intimidate us. They can make us see things we would rather not see or know. To this end, students in Years 8 to 12 have enjoyed the challenges posed by a variety of texts. specifically, their views of Australian history and culture have been challenged by their reading of texts such as Dougy, The Inner Circle, Remember Ronald Ryan, The Stolen Children, The Shark Net, and No Sugar. Furthermore, texts such as The cathering, Animal Farm, Lord of the Flies, To Kill a Mockingbird, Macbeth, Dead Man Walking and The Outsider have hallenged their views on such things as ociety, human nature, and the nature of good and evil.

Without a reader, there is no meaning. In Years 8 to 12, Hale boys are taught the portance of "reader response" – the ritical reading practice that emphasises udents' awareness of how to construct acaning in a text. We are each able to unlock" a different meaning from a text, cording to our own experiences, values,

attitudes and reading practices. Special activities have been in place this year to develop students' awareness of how each of us engages and interprets a text on our own personal and cultural terms.

The Fremantle Children's Literature Centre once again featured heavily in this year's initiative to develop critical reading practices. Year 9s enjoyed a seminar on Ted Egan's popular ballad, The Drover's Boy. Centre Director Lesley Reece led each class through a demanding two-hour workshop using the Centre's special textual and pictorial resources of Robert Ingpen's exquisite visual interpretation of Egan's classic ballad. Students were involved in challenging textual and image analysis, and became aware that literature and art are highly complex and hold no definitive answers. The workshop provided a special opportunity for Year 10 students to explore issues of gender and race relations, and to develop the skills of textual and image analysis, which will be essential for their further studies in Year 11 and Year 12 English. Year 8 students had a similar experience with a seminar on John Marsden's co-production with illustrator Simon Tan, The Rabbits. The students' study of Simon Tan's visual interpretation of Marsden's controversial text led to discussion on themes of colonisation and race relations. Students have also had the chance to meet the living 'souls' behind their books. Once again, thanks to the Hale Library's Artist in Residence Programme, Hale boys have enjoyed an encounter with Peter McFarlane, whose novels such as More Than a Game and The Enemy You Killed were so popular with Year 9s and 10s. Whether he was working with Year 8s or Year 10s, Peter McFarlane responded to the boys' interpretations of his novels. He challenged their perceptions of what it is to be a 'writer' and motivated them in formal presentations and informal creative writing workshops to express themselves in their own voices, for their own purposes.

These unique chances for the boys to speak and work with the acclaimed authors who appear on the Hale School booklist have proven to be very valuable indeed. Personal encounters with authors make a big difference to the way boys read. When they come face to face with an author, students recognise that literature is not simply 'homework' but a personal performance and personal expression. Stories and the art of storytelling are made 'real' in such encounters, and many of the boys see the acts of reading and writing in a new and challenging light.

"Books are the best things, well used; abused, among the worst. What is the right use? What is the one end, which all means go to effect? They are for nothing but to inspire. I had better never see a book, than to be warped by its attraction clean out of my own orbit, and made a satellite instead of a system."

- Ralph Waldo Emerson

This year, Hale students have not only been taught to focus upon how we as readers actively construct meaning from texts, but also how we are actively manipulated and positioned by texts. As Emerson observes, books - especially those popular media texts which bombard today's youthful readers and viewers - can draw us into their orbits, making us 'satellites' to others' ways of thinking, rather than serving as stimuli for the development of our own independent thinking and our own personal system of beliefs. The study of print and non-print advertisements, news stories and current affairs programmes has provided fertile ground for analysis of this phenomenon, and a training ground to be on our guard against the 'abuses' of texts. Now, more than ever, students need to develop their critical reading and viewing skills to detect the natural bias and the subtle, persuasive tactics of popular news and media reports. In short, boys as early as Year 8 are taught to heed the warnings of people such as Dan Rottenberg, a White House spokesperson: "There are still places where people think the function of the media is to provide information."

In 2001, Hale students have enjoyed a range of opportunities, not only to develop their reading practices, but also to discover the power of their own "voice" in writing. In creative writing activities and competitions they have had the chance to develop their skills in expressing themselves and affecting an audience with the infinite power of words. Nowhere is this more evident than in the pages of Cygnet 2001, which feature some of the best creative writing from Hale School students this year. Every boy in every class has had a chance to enjoy the pleasure and the pain of bringing their own ideas into the daylight, hopefully gaining a better understanding of what Norman Mailer meant when he said, "Writing books is the closest men ever come to childbearing."

"Where's dad?" he asked.


"He's there." his mum replied, indicating at the pebble-covered rectangle.

ACADEMIC EXTENSION: UWA

smARTS

Hale was fortunate to be one of six schools invited to participate in the inaugural smARTS programme, an initiative of the University of Western Australia. The programme assembled Year 11 students from Hale, St Hilda's. PLC, Perth College, Scotch and Wesley to conduct an extensive research project in the area of humanities and cultural studies. Through conventional tutorial work and online discussion, both supervised by UWA staff, smARTS aimed to develop skills in collaborative research, problem solving, online communication and written and oral presentation. The programme provided a valuable opportunity for students to extend their expertise in these areas, which are increasingly significant in the workplace, as well as offering a preview of study at university level. Beyond the academic field, smARTS presented an opportunity to meet and work with students from other schools, as well as with university staff.

The programme began with an introduction in March, where groups of six were formed, composed of two students from three different schools. Hale was represented in five of the 10 teams by Scott Harper, Ryan Hannan, Adrian Walker, John Zorbas, Philip Georgiou, Daniel Spagnolo, Phivo Georgiou, Liam McLagan, Darcy Dixon and Daniel Aleksandrow. The students had to participate in weekly online meetings and complete scheduled tasks.

The first major decision was to choose a topic for the research project. The topics reflected issues relevant to contemporary culture, and touched on a wide range of subjects, including English and English literature, geography, history and science. The five topics were:

Clones, Cyborgs, Genomes: When Science Meets Culture - The ethics of genetics with regards to the Human Genome Project and its relationship with today's society.

Inside the Landscape: Humanity, Technology and Nature - Society's relationship with their natural surroundings: How has this changed over time and what is in store for us in the future?

Playing the Game: Gender Identity and Performance in Contemporary Culture - Gender theory maintains that while we are born as anatomically male or female, we are taught to behave in either a masculine or feminine manner depending on our biological sex. How is this statement true in our contemporary culture?

Home and Away: An Historical Analysis of the Representation of Asia in Literature and Popular Media - Historically, Western culture has been replete with exoticised images of Asia as the 'other'. How is this image developed in our society?

Australian National Identity: An Historical/Cultural Analysis in Literature and Popular Media - What does it mean to be Australian in the year 2001? How has Australia's identity developed over its existence and what makes up this unique country?

These topics were intentionally broad and thought provoking, and groups were encouraged to focus their attention on particular branches of their chosen theme which reflected their areas of interest.

Scott Harper's group Ultraviolet dwindled in number as he and a Wesley student were obliged to complete the project on Representation of Gender in Disney without the input of four members. Daniel Aleksandrow and Darcy Dixon successfully defined the Australian Identity in their in-depth research assignment. Adrian Walker and John Zorbas of Cognoscenti helped produce an extensive essay titled Here's Looking at You, Kid,

discussing the politics of text and vision. XLR8!'s two Hale representatives were Philip Georgiou and Daniel Spagnolo, and their project on Nature's Relationship with Technology argued that our environment is losing out to humanity and technology.

From March to September, many online and on-campus meetings were arranged. The primary task was to complete a written report on the topic. The written component of the programme represented 70% of the final mark. while the remaining 30% comprised an oral presentation. After five months of planning and collaboration, the written reports were completed and handed in 29 August. The **smARTS** programme culminated with the groups' staging their oral presentations in spectacular fashion at the Presentation Evening held at UWA. The smARTS programme was a great success and all projects produced were of very high quality. XLR8!'s project was judged the overall winner and Daniel Spagnolo and Philip Georgiou were presented with \$120 book vouchers for their efforts.

All Hale representatives should be congratulated for their hard work and excellent research projects. The students would like to thank Mr David Bean, who coordinated Hale's involvement in smARTS, and would encourage all interested students to participate in this worthwhile programme in the future.

HISTORY AND POLITICAL AND LEGAL STUDIES



The year 2001 has been one rich in significance for the History and Political and Legal Studies Department. The centenary of Federation has been a recurring theme in many aspects of studies for all students. Across Years 8-12, the Federation centenary has prompted discussion about the nature of Australian society, its identity, its defining qualities and its strengths and weaknesses as a nation. In addition to work at school on these issues, students participated in various activities outside the School. Year 11 and 12 students travelled to Canberra and Year 11 students participated in the Western Australian School Students Constitutional Convention. Year 12 Politics students also had the opportunity to attend many important lectures concerning the standing of our Constitution, including an address by former High Court Chief Justice, Sir Anthony Mason. The 2001 election campaign provided an apt focus for many of the historical, political and constitutional issues studied by Year 11 and 12 students.

The Department welcomed Mr Michael Cook, formerly Head of Society and Environment at Applecross High, at the start of the year as a teacher of senior History and Political and Legal Studies. Already, he has made a significant contribution to both the Department and the School.

Academically, the year also began on a positive note. Both the History and Political and Legal Studies TEE cohorts of 2000 were placed in the top 10 classes for the State (based on average marks for classes greater than 20 in number) and Elliott Dunn was awarded a Certificate of Distinction for his 2000 TEE examination performance in Ancient History.

HISTORY AND POLITICAL AND LEGAL STUDIES TOUR TO CANBERRA - APRIL 2001

Between 4 - 8 April a group of Hale History and Political Legal Studies students went to Canberra for the first time to study the important historical and political institutions of our country. A better year could not have been chosen given it was the centenary of our Federal existence.

For most of the students, it was their first visit to the nation's capital. We could not have chosen a more interesting time to tour. Blessed with glorious autumn weather and spectacular foliage, we were in Canberra as great events of state were being played out.

The Australian Democrats were nearing the end of their leadership contest, the America - China stand off over a downed spy plane was playing itself out and Parliament was set to adjourn for the Easter break still debating the GST, unfair



dismissal rights for small businesses, regulation of internet gambling, lowering the price of imported CDs and the significance of the Ryan by-election in Queensland.

Travelling to Canberra made the group aware of the burdens of life for Western Australia's Federal politicians. There is no direct flight from Perth to Canberra, and when this is combined with either a two or three-hour time difference and a predictable delay at Sydney airport, a full day is spent just reaching the capital.

Our first full day of touring was Thursday April 5.

The group began its tour at the Commonwealth Electoral Centre where the history and mechanics of Australia's Federal voting system were explained. The Centre is located within the Old Parliament House where the Federal Parliament first met in 1927. Following the opening of the new Federal Parliament in 1988, the old Parliament House has been converted into a Parliamentary museum housing many important exhibits and displays.

We were fortunate enough to participate in a tour of the Old Parliament House that focussed on recreating the events of the most dramatic political episode of Australia's Federal history, namely the constitutional crisis of 1975 that culminated in the dismissal of the Whitlam government on Remembrance Day, 1975. This tour took us within the party rooms of the Labor and Liberal parties and within the office used by former Prime Ministers Whitlam, Fraser and Hawke and, of course, the House of Representatives and Senate chambers. Students took part in recreating the most famous image of the dismissal, being the reading of the dissolution of the Parliament on the steps by the Governor-General's official secretary in the presence of Gough Whitlam. In addition, students were able to tour an exhibit of the social history of Australia during the time that the Federal parliament was located in the old Parliament House. The group also toured the famous Kings Hall of the Old Parliament that houses portraits of Australia's Prime Ministers and famous politicians and figures involved in the federation of Australia.

That afternoon we toured the new Federal Parliament, beginning with question time in the House of Representatives and the Senate. We were witness to the palpable tension amongst the Democrats in the Senate on what was to be the last sitting day of Meg Lees as leader of the party. The group was then fortunate to have audiences with both the Prime Minister and Leader of the Opposition in their private offices. Both Mr Howard and Mr Beazley spoke to us about the issues they believed would be central to this year's Federal election and their daily working routines. They then fielded questions from the group about a variety of matters ranging from the proposed Shell takeover of the Woodside Company, constitutional reform and the possibility of a Bill of Rights. For their generous hospitality, both gentlemen were presented with Old Haleians ties. The group also met with local Federal MP, Julie Bishop, who presented the School with a copy of the authorised biography of Australia's first Prime Minister, Geoffrey Barton in celebration of the centenary of Federation. To conclude a hectic day, the group made an evening tour of the Australian Museum on the shores of Lake Burley Griffin, which had only been opened weeks before our visit.

Friday was a day of similar pace and interest. The day began with a tour of the Telstra tower on Black Mountain that offered students a wonderful panorama of the entire city



and its landmarks, including a spectacular view of the Governor-General's official residence at Yarralumla. Then it was off to the Australian Institute of Sport to gain an insight into the training regimes of Australia's elite athletes. It appeared controversy was to follow us out of Canberra as shortly after our return, a scandal erupted over allegations of drugs being found in the possession of one of the major AIS swimming coaches.

Returning to 'downtown' Canberra, the group then toured the nation's most significant judicial institution, the High Court of Australia. The group was able to tour all the courts within the building and further understand the significance of the decisions made by the Court.

The geographers amongst the group were then tested by the fluttering collection of the flags of the 80 nations who have diplomatic representation in Canberra that is located alongside the High Court. The afternoon saw the group visiting the National Museum of Science and Technology known as Questacon where interactive displays gave students a chance to reinforce their knowledge of fundamental scientific principles.

Enjoying the balmy weather, the group was inspired to make the symbolic climb to the top of the Federal Parliament, which again offered spectacular views of the layout of Canberra. That evening, the group drove past the Prime Minister's official residence, The Lodge, and some of Canberra's most important embassies. Not surprisingly, the group was particularly interested in the size and proximity of the American and Chinese embassies!

Our final day had a special cultural and historical significance with visits to the National Gallery, the National Portrait Gallery and the National War Memorial. In addition, the group toured the various memorials to conflicts in Korea and Vietnam located on Anzac Parade.

The tour concluded with a enjoyable evening of ten-pin bowling on Saturday night. The group returned to Perth on Sunday afternoon full of vivid memories of the workings of the nation's capital and a greater understanding of the political processes, influences and institutions that shape our national identity.

'Tour de force' à Rottnest

Japan

JAPAN

I was one of a group of 25 boys who had the wonderful opportunity to improve our language skills and experience Japanese culture over 19 days at the end of Term 3 and during the holiday break. we all benefited greatly in sharing the lives of our host families whilst staying in Washimiya, a small Japanese town of 35,000 people living 80km north of Tokyo, for the 5th Washimiya Machi-Hale School Student Exchange Programme. The trip made the last four years of Japanese studies worthwhile. Unfortunately, these immersion experiences are not always possible for subjects like maths and physics.

On arrival in Tokyo after a ten-hour flight, the group was greeted by the Japanese coordinators of the trip, who then showed us some of the sights of Tokyo before arriving at a museum. The bus trip was our first experience of the massive size of Japan's capital and our first experience of apanese structures - the roof and plastic chandeliers on the bus were so low, even the shorter people on the trip found they had to duck to simply get on the bus and find a seat. After an introduction to Japan and its history, we continued on our trip to Washimiya. The people of ashimiya were obviously very pleased to see us, with a large contingent of dignitaries turning out to welcome us to their town and introduce us to our host families for the next 10 days. Despite the limited language skills all round, the people of Washimiya gave us a very warm and inviting velcome into the Japanese way of life.

Over the next 10 days, with our host family and our four host schools in Washimiya, we were able to experience the very different cultures, lifestyles and foods of Japan. It was a very interesting and memorable time during which we made many friends and experienced some Japanese school ectivities such as lunch at school, kendo, judo, calligraphy, English classes in Japan, as well as kelping the students cleaning the School at the end of each day. During this period with our host amilies, the group was united at times for some whole day activities such as speaking English, kiking through Nikko and exploring Tokyo Disneyland, a highlight of the trip, as well as many official lunches and meetings with dignitaries of Washimiya. Many host families showed their Hale undents to a place known as 'hyaku en kan', which translated means the one hundred yen shop, robably equivalent to our Two Buck shops. Most of the boys on the trip found this to be a haven for cheap souvenirs to bring back for our family and friends in Australia. Our host families viously enjoyed our company very much, as did we, and took many many photos. Whilst Alex Pitt thought 10 disposable cameras for the entire trip was pretty impressive, I know my host family went through at least 10 films in just 10 days.

After experiencing life in a Japanese family, we embarked on the *Shinkansen*, or Bullet Train, as it is known, to Osaka, via the beautiful and impressive Mt Fuji. We travelled to the highest car park on Mt Fuji, observing the beautiful autumn colours on the mountain. It was there that we had lunch and saw a sign for Fried Dog. Although we realised that it really meant Hot Dog, not many of us

felt like eating after that. After travelling for a few hours on the bullet train at about 230 km/h we arrived at the Osaka Dai-Ichi Hotel, our home base for various tours over the next five days. From our hotel, we ventured to department stores and Nihonbashii, Japan's electronics city. Next, we visited many beautiful and ancient shrines in Nara and Kyoto before travelling on to Hiroshima. Hiroshima understandably had a very sombre atmosphere and we visited the Peace Park and Atomic Bomb Museum to appreciate the devastation of World War Two. The excursion to Universal Studios of Japan was another highlight of the trip.

The return flight was always going to be a little nerve-racking after the events of September 11, but all went well, apart from the fact that many of the boys had their suitcases searched to ensure that numerous samurai swords bought were in fact souvenirs and not the extremely sharp authentic weapons as seen in the X-rays.

On behalf of the boys who went on the trip, I would like to thank Mr Lim and Mr Parish for giving up their holidays to tour with the group, and also for their expertise in organizing such a well planned trip. I would also like to thank Dr Inverarity for his strong support in allowing the trip to take place. It was a thoroughly memorable experience and we would encourage anyone who has the opportunity to embark on a similar adventure.

FRANCE

The Hale French tour group left from Perth Airport on 30 March on a cold and windy Friday morning. The first five-hour leg was a Singapore airline flight to Singapore where the excitement filled the cabin once we found out how to have fun: Super Nintendo and in-cabin phone calls. Once in Singapore, we were graced with a ten-hour stay at the airport, most of which was spent on the free tour of the city provided by the government and the rest of which was spent at Timezone and riding the travelators. After the long stopover, we all wanted to sleep as we boarded the plane for the arduous twelvehour flight to Charles-de-Gaulle airport.

On arrival in four degrees Celsius, our passage through Charles-de-Gaulle customs was pain free and we were quickly united with our first host families. This was the one experience that we were all nervous about and the rides to our new homes required the use of all of our years of learning. We all were received with open arms and the host families were eager to learn about our Australian lifestyles and culture.

The first week was spent, for most of us, at school with our host brother or sister in the suburbs of Paris. This was an experience in itself, to see the look on the students' faces when we said we went to a boys only school! The classes were at times difficult and at times very, very easy: English class for example. Each school member took it upon himself or herself to teach us the entire French language: language used when driving.

The second week made a nice change after French schooling, as our families were only too eager to show us the delights of Paris. While many of us toured around Paris, some of us were able to tour castles and other historical venues and so to soak up the French culture. One of the group was lucky enough to live five minutes from the centre of Paris while another actually lived in the centre of Paris: one person even complained of not being able to sleep due to the flashing lights of the Eiffel Tower! In the second week, three students and Madame Spagnolo went to the cathedral town of Chartres.

After spending two weeks with our first host families, we had grown very fond of them, and so it was with regret that we had to leave and make our way down to Provence. While some of us took the TGV in luxurious first class, the rest of us took the perilous services of the Air France shuttle to the southern cities.

The time spent in Marseille, Nice and surrounding cities was very enjoyable. The climate was similar to Perth as temperatures were around 20 degrees and the sun was able to shine through, unlike





in Paris where it constantly rained with an average temperature of about 11 degrees. The lifestyle in the south was more enjoyable than that experienced in Paris as stress was less apparent and the people were more relaxed. Some students discovered that pebble beaches look a lot more appealing than the way they feel when their host families kindly offered to show them their 'fantastique' beaches.

As most of the south was built by the Romans thousands of years ago, many students had the privilege to view ancient arenas, castles and ports such as that of Marseille. We all were astounded by the amount of money in the southern cities like Monaco, Cannes, Antibes and Marseille. The size of the 'family boats' there had all of us breathless. In Monaco, a tax haven for the rich and famous, the typical 'family car' was a Ferrari.

By the end of the trip, many students had again become attached to their families and were sad to go. Once on the plane, we slept and caught up on each other's experiences, and tried to adjust back into speaking English...a task harder than expected. Finally we made it back to Australia, safe and sound.

After the trip, it must be said that our level of French had improved tremendously and should be reflected in our marks. The experience will never be forgotten by any of us and will always be cherished. Any student who is interested in the trip is encouraged to seek information from the very helpful French department: we thoroughly recommend it to all students learning French: the results are absolutely astonishing. Finally, on behalf of all the participants, we would like to thank Mme Spagnolo, our tour leader, chaperone and friend, Nacel, the agency that organised our exchange and of course, Dr Inverarity who allowed us to go in the first place.

LIBRARY

Senior School Library

Always busy - never quiet - the Senior School Library fulfills many functions.

No longer simply a place to come and read or borrow a book, the Library and its staff support students, staff and increasingly parents in finding resources to meet their needs; assist users in the evaluation and effective use of information sources; coordinate a range of educational programmes in reading enrichment and in information literacy; provide easy access to computers and ensure that students' computer skills continually grow.

This is not to suggest that the book is no longer in demand. Resources available from the Library in 2001 include extensive collections of children's, adolescent and adult fiction; a rapidly growing range of biographies and accounts of travels and personal experiences; widely ranging recreational materials and a carefully selected quality non-fiction collection to meet curriculum demands. Students consciously choose when a book is appropriate to their needs, perhaps offering more reliable and in depth information than other resource formats. Staff and parents enjoy access to both popular and literary adult fiction. Holiday book loans are overwhelming.

Popular too are videos, magazines, sound cassettes, CD-ROMs, websites, computer software and online databases. Students daily use laptops with wireless cards providing a link to the School network; scanners; tape and CD players; printers; and digital and video cameras. Assignments are submitted by email or presented as a web page or PowerPoint presentation using a data projector.

It is this proliferation of resources and equipment and the need to make reasoned choices about their use that has led to a whole range of new roles for the teacher librarians. The traditional role of the librarian in locating resources now involves equipping students with the ability to select the most appropriate search tool - be it library catalogue; online encyclopaedia; search periodical database or another library. Searching strategies must be planned and students able to widen or narrow their search appropriately.

Such student guidance is available

through the TL on duty at the Library Help Desk, by email to 'Helpful Harriet' or through an ever-growing range of tools provided on the *Hale Intranet*.

In 2001, students were for the first time able to access such support from home. Password access is now available from the Hale School web site to From the Hale Intranet and students can access guidance on searching as well as details on current assignments and many of the online information databases subscribed to by the School Library. Beyond simply providing assistance in locating information, the Hale Intranet also guides students in evaluating websites found and in selecting a note-making strategy appropriate to their needs. Webbased access to the School Library catalogue in 2002 will further enhance students' home access to resources.

Information Literacy programmes in which teachers and teacher librarians collaboratively equip students to locate, evaluate, use and present information to meet specific needs occur in all subject areas. Teacher librarians support classes engaged in major research assignments; work with small groups coming to the library from a class and guide individual students in and out of class time.

Reading enrichment programmes run by the teacher librarians are an important part of the Year 8 – 10 English curriculum. Enjoyment and sharing of a wide range of reading experiences in the Year 8 Ribit programme is built on in Year 9 with the workshopping of picture books for older readers, helping boys to become aware of their part in the reading process and Literature Circles and reading journals providing ways of responding to and sharing their reading. Year 10 boys explored such topics as books vs films, controversial issues in adolescent literature and the selection of Children's Book of the Year for Older Readers. Book lists, displays and reading promotions target senior boys and seek to further their appreciation of reading as a lifelong leisure activity.

Throughout 2001, a number of activities, author visits and book promotions have further supported the development of a reading community at Hale School. Parents and staff are commonly seen browsing the fiction collection for their own use; Year 8 and Year 9 book clubs meet weekly for lunch and sharing of their latest 'finds'; student readers have been sharing email

responses to recent Australian titles with the WA judge for Children's Book of the Year Awards: the Children's Book Council invited two of our Year 11 students, along with a number of Perth media and professional celebrities, to give their responses to titles on this year's Book of the Year for Older Readers shortlist; a group of Year 7 and Year 9 readers joined with students from other schools to debate publicly Books vs the Web; the WA launch of Boys Stuff was held at Hale; students have had the opportunity to hear authors Andy Griffiths, Matthew Reilly, and Geoffrey McSkimming speak – and the real highlight of the year was again our Author in Residence programme, with author Peter McFarlane spending a week at Hale School.

Far from computers replacing books and taking over the role of the School Library, the expansion of the School-computing network has meant a surge in demand for library services of all kinds. 2002 promises to be even more exciting.

AUTHOR IN RESIDENCE Peter McFarlane

Hale School's author in residence for 2001 was author Peter McFarlane. After a number of years as a teacher, Peter McFarlane is now working in Adelaide as a full-time writer of children's and young adult fiction. His publications include two collections of short stories for teenagers, *The Flea and Other Stories* and *Lovebird* as well as two novels, *The Enemy You Killed* and *More Than a Game*. He is also the author of several novels for younger readers, including the recently published *Goat Boy* which he shared for the first time with Hale students.

Peter has also edited a number of poetry anthologies and books on poetry teaching and writing workshops.

Meet the author sessions were held for Junior School students and for Year 8 – 10 year groups. Peter joined boys in their English classes providing students with the opportunity to share their own writing with a 'real' author and to participate in writing workshops and close discussion of a class text.

Student Information Technology Support Group

The Student Information Technology Support group (SITS), established in 1997 under the guidance of Mrs Robin Wake (Head of Library), has grown and developed this year. The primary role of the Hale Intranet is support for the curriculum, and the SITS students create web pages in a wide variety of areas for the Intranet. It is very pleasing to see that not only do the students create original web pages, but also that they are volved in teaching each other. This means that the SITS members are constantly searning something new.



ART DEPARTMENT

Many people are perplexed about art education and don't see much need to learn about art unless you aspire to become one of those strange breed called artists. But art education and the practice of art don't just aim to cultivate a few highly talented painters, sculptors and printmakers. Everyone shares the basic equipment of the artist - ideas, emotions and experience of life and should be given the opportunity to learn how to translate these into visual form.

A good art education aims to give you more than just practical skills. It tries to get deeper, to affect the way you see and think about things. It aims to produce perceptive people able to notice and appreciate or question their surroundings.

Albert Einstein said, "Imagination is more important than knowledge," and the world is but a canvas to our imaginations.

We in the Art Department have the highly satisfying job of fostering a love of art.

This year has seen us follow some new directions with the introduction of glass as a medium.

The Art committee, under the guidance of Jules Sher, funded a glass kiln for the opening up department, possibilities for self-expression. Our Year 9 students were commissioned to create the centrepiece for the annual Art Exhibition in the form of a large mobile. The design was inspired by Alexander Calder's graceful works and the abstract shapes influenced by a study of Joan Miró and Wassily Kandinsky.

A great deal of testing was undertaken, cutting and fusing glass to discover new colours and suitable techniques for the final piece. Cut fingers and some disasters meant further research and a cry for help to Ian Dickson who shared his expertise and put us on the path to success. The resulting mobile was dazzling, with each boy creating a unique glass plate to hang from the elegant aluminium framework. This work will now take centre stage in the fover of the administration building for all to admire.

Our Year 8 students created humorous, quirky figurines using clay. Two of these works were accepted into the 'Young Originals Exhibition' that showcases talented students' work from Years 8 to 12 across the State.

I congratulate Matt Rice and Eamonn Lanagan for their achievements and applaud the inspiration of their teacher Michael O'Connell.

Raphaël De Vietri also had his photographic montage hung in this prestigious event, recognizing his emerging talent.

Our Year 10 students enthusiastically embraced the use of sewing machines to explore self-portraiture through textiles. It was a delight to see them challenge the notion that girls have exclusive rights to this medium and inspiring to see such diverse results.

Haydn Jackson and Krystie Hannah took the Year 12 boys to Club Capricorn for a weekend workshop to put the finishing touches to their Visual Diaries. The bovs worked hard behind closed doors, only stopping to barbeque obscene quantities of meat to keep their energy levels up. This valuable weekend has become a fixture on our timetable.

The Student Art Exhibition is the highlight of our year. It is a major event, exhibiting hundreds of artworks from each year level. Works ranging from paintings, prints, sculpture, ceramics and textiles were on show. The Art Department is most fortunate to have such a supportive group of parents who work alongside us to present the work in a professional setting. We are always amazed at the talent on display and marvel at the standard of achievement. I would like to acknowledge the very significant role played by our technician, Jenny Sullivan, who manages to assist the staff and students in a myriad of ways.

How many of us have had the experience of standing in front of an original Sidney Nolan painting? To admire the skilful brushwork, the purity of colour and the simplicity of expression of such an important Australian artist is a treat not available to most. Our boys are in for such a treat through the generosity of Mrs Mei Wen whose four boys are to be students at Hale. Mrs Wen has made Hawaiian Investments' extensive art collection available to the School for exhibition through a series of showings. We are terribly excited by this proposal and the opportunity afforded to our students and school community and look forward to the outcome of ongoing discussions with curator Mr Rodney Thompson.

ARTS CUP




The day culminated in the final of the House Drama empetition, with all of the 10 Houses competing in a preliminary round, followed by the finals.

MUSIC

Perhaps the most remarkable occurrence of 2001 was the outstanding success of the Hale St Mary's Orchestra at the 12th Australian International Music Festival, where they won the highest possible award 'GOLD' at their first attempt. 2001 also saw the return of Andrew Bushell to the Hale School Music Department and the arrival of Hale's own 'Stuart and Sons' concert grand piano.

Hale St Mary's Music

Our association with St Mary's continues to flourish and the quality of our groups is the evidence of this. The traditional camps for the Hale St Mary's Orchestras and Bands were the department's first musical focus for the year. These camps, held in mid-February for the Intermediate groups and mid-March for the No. 1 ensembles, are most valuable in preparing the repertoire for the numerous performances undertaken by each group.

'Music Under the Stars' (Sunday 1 April) and 'Sunday in Spring' (Sunday 9 September) are the two regular concert events where the eternally hard-working Hale St Mary's Fundraising Committee can raise funds for the benefit of the combined music activities with which we are involved. This year it was possible to subsidise every member of the touring Hale St Mary's Orchestra to the tune of \$300 (no small effort) and we thank the committee for this wonderful contribution.

'Music Under the Stars' was held on a perfect Sunday evening with only the slightest zephyr of a breeze. Compered by Channel Nine's Peter Holland, the theme of the evening was Broadway and it featured a stunning dance performance from St Mary's Old Girls, Nicole Heales and Emma Samson to the melody *On Broadway*. The finale of the concert was from Old Boy, Stuart Laing who, with the backing of the Hale St Mary's Concert Band, sang the Anthem from *Chess*.

Concerts

Following hard on the heels of 'Music Under the Stars', the **April Concert**, featuring our intermediate ensembles amongst others, was held on Wednesday 11 April. The concert schedule for our groups is designed to keep presenting our ensembles with attainable goals. In this way, we can optimise the chances for a meaningful musical education for all of our students and foster the most rewarding musical development in them.

The St Mary's Music Night in June (senior groups) and the St Mary's July Music Night (intermediate groups) gave our musicians further opportunities prior to our own **Governors' Concerts** held on Thursday 16 and Friday 17 August. As this was the final concert for many in our groups, it was a memorable night with fine performances from all who took part.

The Chamber Music Concert, presented on Thursday 13 September, gave the School's smaller ensembles a welcome forum to demonstrate their skills. At Hale there are nine regularly rehearsing chamber music groups and this concert was devoted entirely to them. The sheer variety and level of performance at this concert was extremely encouraging and all who took part on this night are to be congratulated.

Recitals

The first recital for 2001 was held on Thursday 22 March and it featured our String and Vocal students. The quality of the performances at our recitals in 2001 was very high, as evidenced later in the year at the competition for the Garland Music Prize. The other recitals were the Woodwind Students' Recital (Thursday 14 June), Brass and Percussion Students' Recital (Thursday 2 August) and the Pianoforte Students' Recital (Thursday 6 September). The Pianoforte Students' Recital was the first event that consisted entirely of our boys playing the 'Stuart and Son's' concert grand piano. It was a memorable event.

The Stuart

On July 2 2001, the School took delivery of a 2.9 metre Stuart and Sons concert grand piano manufactured by Piano Australia Pty Ltd, a company established by Stuart and Sons Terra Australis Pty Ltd and J. Albert and Son Pty Ltd.

This handcrafted instrument is the first in Western Australia and is proudly housed in the Auditorium of the Hale School Music and Drama Centre. It is made from a log of rare lace sheoak secured from the town of Denmark in the Southwest region of Western Australia. The piano is the twelth of thirteen built by the company so far.

The Stuart and Sons piano is the future of piano playing. It offers new options for the pianist and challenges the status quo of piano performance. The commissioning of this piano reflects the tremendous vision that Hale School has for excellence in Music.

Special Events

Excellent food, music and company were the order of the day at the **Barbershop** Cabaret held this year at Methodist Ladies' College. Our Barbershop Group and the MLC Barbershop group were outstanding, but it was the special guests for the evening that stole

the show. Bad Habits, a four-man barbershop outfit, were simply brilliant and all those present on the night were treated to a rare musical experience.

The combined forces of Christ Church. Guildford, Perth College, St Mary's, St Hilda's and Hale under the direction of John Bates (Director of Music, CCGS) provided a finale for the Combined Anglican Schools' Concert that was reminiscent of a 'last night of the Proms' at the Albert Hall. Held at the Perth Concert Hall, this concert gave our boys the rare chance to perform in what is not only the premier music performance venue in Western Australia, but one of the best venues in the country. Our very own Hale Stage Band entertained the crowd in the foyer at interval and in the concert proper the Hale St Mary's Choir and the Hale St Mary's Concert Band proudly represented the School.

Visiting Artists' Programme

The Music Department's prodigal son, Andrew Bushell, returned to Hale at the beginning of Term 2 from his most recent appointment as the Director of Music at Methodist Ladies' College in Claremont. In an effort designed to involve our musicians with national and international performers of renown, the School embarked on what has been dubbed the Hale School Visiting Artists Programme. Andrew returned to Hale to head this programme.

Our first guest was Professor Barry Snyder from the Eastman School of Music at New York's Rochester University. Playing with our choirs, orchestras and bands, and also as a soloist, he provided much inspiration and entertainment for all who were privileged to hear him. Our second guest, Professor Steve Laitz (also from Rochester University) proved to be just as enlightening and inspiring when he visited in Term 3.

Tours, Festivals and Competitions

The majority of Term 2 was spent preparing for the Hale St Mary's Orchestra's tour of Canberra, Bathurst and Sydney in July. This was an immensely successful tour.

Term 3 saw us once again participating in the annual festivals run by the Australian Band and Orchestra Directors Association. They were held once more at Penrhos College and the Hale St Mary's Concert Band, Orchestra and Orchestra 2, along with a the Senior and Year 8/9 String Ensembles represented the School, receiving favourable adjudications.

Mr Roy Rimmer, former Director of Music at Christ Church Grammar School and former Superintendent of Music for the Education Department of Western Australia, was the special guest adjudicator for the 2001 Garland Music Prize. Held on Thursday 25 and Friday 26 October, the audience was treated to a wide range of musical styles and some excellent performances, indeed, some of the performances at this year's Garland were simply breathtaking. Not least of these performances was the winning effort from Year 12, Siong-Horng Lim, of Busoni's arrangement of JS Bach's Chaconne from The Partita 2 for Violin. Those fortunate enough to be in the auditorium for his performance were riveted to their seats. Mr Rimmer was one of the most excellent adjudicators that the competition has ever had. He was both entertaining and educational to the very appreciative audience, while at the same time he gave expert advice to all entrants.



MUSIC TRIP TO SYDNEY



Hale St Mary's Orchestra 1 departed for Sydney for the 12th Australian International Music Festival at 12.40 am on the 2 July. Arriving in Sydney at 6.40 am, the Orchestra was whisked away to the baggage claim and then onto a coach where we would sit for another four hours to reach Canberra. We arrived at our accommodation, settled in, had lunch and then it was off to the War Memorial and Parliament House. Both of these Australian icons did not disappoint and were enjoyed by all, even with the small amount of sleep that we had had. The next day was devoted to another four-hour coach trip to Bathurst where we were to have our first performance as part of the festival. For the next three days, we would hear the other bands, orchestras and choirs as well as explore the small and quaint town of Bathurst. On 5 July, we had our first performance which went extremely well. With the fine voice of Sam Roberts-Smith accompanying the Orchestra, we received rapturous applause as we left the stage and from then on we knew that we had a chance of winning the elusive gold medal award. Having spent three days in Bathurst, we headed off to Sydney through the Blue Mountains where we encountered snow. For many of us, it was the very first time that we got to play with and touch snow.

We arrived in Sydney on 6 July where we stayed in the YWCA. This night, rated by some people as the best night of the whole trip, included dinner at Hard Rock Café. Here we got to experience good food as well as a relaxing and fun atmosphere which was exactly what the orchestra needed after having rehearsals, sound checks and travelling from place to place. With one night of relaxation, the orchestra was ready to put on the performance of a lifetime the next day at the adjudicated performance in the Sydney Town Hall, the most important day of the whole tour. Having had a sound check, work shop and a bit of free time the Orchestra was ready for its day to stand up and be Everything was perfect, counted. everyone was dressed impeccably and the Orchestra gave the best performance of the tour playing the Divertimento III movements one and three by Mozart, parts of the Concerto VIII by Corelli and what came to be our trade mark piece Plink, Plank, Plunk by Leroy Anderson. Some members of the Orchestra decided to buy presents for their conductors, Mrs Gillet and Ms Coates as good luck charms. They seemed to work very well as that day not only did the Orchestra get called back to play at the presentation of awards where only four other groups got called back, but they also picked up the top award; a gold medal scoring an average of 91.5 out of a possible 100. All involved were ecstatic with the result.

The remaining time of the tour was devoted to our performance in the Opera House. Throughout the whole tour, some people were selected to play in a 100 piece Symphony Orchestra which was to perform the Berlioz Requiem with a 200-voice choir in the Opera House as a finale to the festival. Those people were Alistair MacGillivray, Yvette Tan, Scott-Marshall Harper, Caitlin Alderton, Shih-Ming Yao, Lawrence Kozlowski, Sophie Walker and Cathryn Pilcher. It was the best experience that any musician could ever have, simply because of the scale and intensity of the performance. The final day was devoted to purely free time, which was shopping for all sorts of items. The Gold Medal Winning Hale St Mary's Orchestra returned to Perth at 11.30pm on 10 July.

MAMLET

When it was first suggested that we attempt Hamlet, I was a little concerned about whether our boys were up to doing such a challenging play. Of course, in prospect, it is obvious that I should have had greater faith in them, because their formances were considered by many to be the finest we have yet produced. Nowever, at the time, as I listened to them mangle Shakespearian dialogue at the auditions, I was a little sceptical.

The biggest problem was casting Hamlet. Apart from the massive amount of dialogue that the actor has to learn, there are many abrupt mood changes and fine nuances which the actor must understand and be able to express whilst using tanguage that sounds unnatural to his ear. Nick Maricic, having already experienced a number of demanding roles such as the Devil in Worlds Apart and Mr Harding in One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, was keen to take on this ultimate in acting challenges. He did an amazing job. It is the first time I have seen any humour in Hamlet. Having a much younger actor than normal play the role, there was a very appropriate feeling of 'bolshie' teenager in his performance.

The rest of the cast was equally strong. If one was to single out individuals for praise it would have to be the boys who took on the roles of older men: Dougal Maclaurin, as the King and Matthew Velichkovich, who joined the cast quite late in the rehearsal process. It is incredibly hard to create a believable character when the person is 30 to 40 years your senior and they both handled it very well indeed.

I would like to thank Jessica Anderson (Gertrude the Queen) and Kath Perry (Ophelia), friends of the director, for giving so much time to the production. They were both relatively inexperienced and did surprisingly well. Also my thanks to the St Mary's girls Rebecca Bayford, Amy Webb and Kylie Sandover who added elegance to the crowd scenes and proved that non speaking parts can be vitally important. There was also a 'giggle' of St Mary's girls helping with the make up.

I would also like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the work of Michael Charlesworth, from England, who came out specially to direct Hamlet. This is the sixth Shakespearian production he has done at Hale and according to his brother, who has seen every one of them; Hamlet was his best yet. Michael, whose age is classified material, felt that he had been very lucky to have such a talented cast. It has always amazed me how Michael can get the most ordinary boy with a broad Australian accent sounding like a member of the Royal Shakespeare Company in such a short time. He demands accurate inflections and clear pronunciations and he ensures that every member of the cast, from the leads down to most humble two liners, knows exactly what they are saying and why years of being subjected to slow and boring Shakespeare as a lad, has made Michael particularly determined that the pace of the play is maintained with one scene moving rapidly into the next.

Sadly, he has decided that this should be his last major production for us, so we are all delighted for him that the final result of all his hard work was so well received. I have learned a great deal from him theatrically and enjoyed working with him. He is a charming, generous, gentle, kind and gracious 'gentleman' of the old school.

I believe he will be coming back to Hale next year as resident eccentric and Shakespearian adviser.

Adrian Arnold, as always, created another wonderfully moody and easy set and Duncan Shaw managed the lighting and sound crew with great skill. Carre Wylder helped with the costumes, once more ably assisted by a small but dedicated team of parents.

Next year we embark on two new projects, the *In Their Own Write Festival*, a collection of five one act plays written and directed by current and ex-students which will be presented early in Term 1 and the riotous comedy *Noises Off*, currently enjoying a sell out season in London, to be presented very early in Term 3. There will also be showcase nights where Years 10, 11 and 12 Drama students will present original and set-text pieces, and the wacky and wonderful Junior and Senior Theatre Sports contests will again be held.

Between the two of them, they revitalised the show and made it more appropriate for the younger performers and audience. They, along with the choreographer Sarah Healey, made my life a great deal easier and it is really due to their hard work, patience and willingness to compromise that the show was such a success

There were some delightful moments in the show. The entrance of the *Borogoves*, whose movements were based on African meerkats, as they scuttled across the stage clutching their mobile phones; the revoltingly flatulent *Mome Raths*, played with disgusting gusto by Year 8 and 9 boys with their clubs and shaggy hair; the gently seductive *Slithy Toves* in their sleek Hawaiian outfits and pink hair, who brought a touch of Balinese decadence to a scene staged beside an empty plastic swimming pool. It all worked very well and I was delighted that the students had so much fun with their bizarre costumes, designed by Carre Wylder, and the unusual makeup supervised by Davina Allen.

We were very lucky to find Jaya Henderson, who was looking for as much stage experience as she could cram in between school and going to the Academy of Performing Arts. She played the female lead, Lady Julia, with great skill and graciousness. She was ably supported by two of our best young actors, Bradley Kerin and Nick Maclaine. Bradley has a powerful tenor voice and an innate sense of comic timing, which he used to great effect as Prince Ronald and Nick played the "bad guy", Squire Mordant, with obvious relish.

Josh Caddy as the pretentious King, Will Lodder as the evil *Bandersnatch*, Andrew Williams as the Story Teller and Amy Webb as the overweight Lady Griselova de Poundage, all did an excellent job in their roles and were, like the rest of the cast, a lot of fun to work with.

A special mention must go to Adrian Arnold, Duncan Shaw and the boys from the Tech Club who came up with some excellent ideas with regard to lighting, rear projection and scenery which enabled us to make the most of our new Music and Drama stage.

Rehearsals proved very demanding with levels of concentration hard to maintain at the end of long school days. The challenge of creating the anti-social characters led to many tense moments. A drama novice, Avin Assomul took the role of the American Indian and impressed everybody with his interpretation.

Then, finding rehearsal time through the minefield of music, speaking and sporting commitments, illness, memory loss not to mention examinations and camps immediately before the show...all the threads of life's rich tapestry...

But, Drama is worth it; and the performance provoked, entertained and surprised the enthusiastic audiences. Nick Maclaine's tremendous work ethic paid dividends in an outstanding performance and the tension with Suzanne Barton's nurse was always high. Many of the ensemble pieces with the patients raised the tension in the auditorium but Nick Maricic's rantings and David Northcott's final departure left lasting impressions. All participants are to be commended on their work and development.




AN ENGLISHMAN ABROAD -

A tribute to Michael Charlesworth

Every so often the affable Fremantle Doctor, which so solicitously cools us on those warm afternoons, is joined by a breeze that is equally refreshing, even more affable, yet decidedly different in its make up. I refer of course to that erudite, creative man of theatre, Michael Charlesworth, who has regularly visited our school since his first visit (when he produced 'The Taming of the Shrew' in the Senior School, and 'The Merry Wives of Windsor' in the Junior School) in 1994. I can hear him now, berating me for comparing him to a wind in one breath, and then, to make us both feel better, quoting the 17 occasions when shakespeare compares his characters to some raging or benign wind in the next. Michael is a 'gentle man' in the true sense, someone who has clearly rejoiced in his twin vocations of educating young minds and presenting vibrant, engaging theatre. His skill in somehow unifying time after time a disparate group of aspiring Oliviers in pursuit of an original and refreshing production of Shakespeare, leaves most of us breathless. Yet somehow I have always suspected that for Michael, the process is every bit as important as the final product; he will always be a teacher first and a director second. As teachers ourselves, we have so often watched the students taking part in a Charlesworth production discover that confidence engendered by discovering gifts that they honestly never knew they had. His charges seem to grow at least a foot during the production period, and are left when it is all over with a sustaining sense of achievement that is the lifeblood of constructive growth.

Michael's approach is as thorough as it is effective. In order to familiarise his actors with the lilting cadence of Shakespearian verse, he painstakingly reads each part onto a tape, which is then presented to the relevant performer. He then spends literally hours demystifying this strange language for the cast, and patiently walks each step with them as they grope their way towards a genuine understanding of their character. None of us was left in any doubt earlier this year that Nick Maricic had felt first-hand the guilt-ridden angst of the vacillating Prince of Denmark, and behind the extraordinary level of understanding and maturity in his performance was the hand of a superb director.

In terms of Michael's contribution to the Hale community, we should not overlook his elevating influence in the Common Room and in the classroom. Indeed one year when time proved too limiting to mount a production, Michael visited us as a roving ambassador for Literature and learning in the English department. It was a wonderful few weeks, with classes throughout the School delighting in the energy and erudition, which underscored



his beautifully, crafted lectures ('performances' might be a more accurate description). I have never encountered anyone more likely to enthuse an audience about Shakespearian or Jacobean drama. Having played most of the key roles on several different occasions, he is able to justify his passion for the genre with beautifully intoned excerpts from the text. One sees the boys' faces light up when we tell them Mr Charlesworth will be talking to them next lesson.

The staff too delight in Michael's visits. I still remember the first time he came to dinner with us. Minutes after arriving at the house (bearing gifts, as ever, for the children), he sat us down in a suitably darkened room, and launched into a goose-pimpling dramatisation of a particularly transfixing ghost story. We still talk about it years later. Michael has also mastered the sadly fading discipline of the heroic couplet, and marks the occasion of his leave-taking from the staff with an epic, hilarious account of his visit in his favourite poetic form. There is always an element of pathos in Michael's visits, partly because we know they will be brief, but also I think because he reminds us all of the days when teaching was less encumbered by the administrative demands of the modern era; when it was simply enough to live one's passion in the classroom without having to constantly worry about feeding the hungry beasts let loose by governments in their well-intentioned search for greater accountability and efficiency.

It seems possible that Michael might have made his last visit to our School. We shall certainly do what we can to entice him back, but the horrendous flight from England seems ever more daunting. Perhaps we should use a weapon from his own armoury, and remind him, that like Cleopatra:

"Age cannot wither him Nor custom stale his infinite variety."

Whether or not he girds his loins for one final swansong, it is appropriate that all of us involved in the process of breathing life and possibility and passion into the hearts of the boys at Hale School should pause to celebrate the contributions made by Michael Charlesworth, a man of distinction and an example to us all.

MOCK TRIAL

This year, Hale Mock Trial sent three teams, totalling 26 'Blue Jackets' to the floors of Perth Central Law Courts to engage in legal battle over fictional cases. The Hale teams were armed with wide ranging levels of legal knowledge and adversarial experience. The three teams each achieved varying levels of success, however, all junior 'legal eagles' enjoyed preparing for their appearances and the excitement of their 'day in court'.

The first round of the competition saw Hale teams as counsel for the defence in a criminal prosecution. Hale School's client was alleged to have shoplifted three magazines from the Kalgoorlie Central News Agency in February this year. Hale argued that it had been an honest mistake, excusable by law. The fact that the defendant's family doctor said that, 'shoplifting by middle-aged, financially well-off people is a sad but common phenomenon' didn't help most Hale defence teams.

Round Two saw the Hale teams as plaintiffs in a civil case, claiming damages against a supermarket for negligence in failing to keep their premises safe. Hale's client had slipped on some spilt milkshake, fracturing his neck, spraining his ankle and experiencing psychological shock. Hale accused the shopping mall of no fewer than seven breaches of its duty of care, and for most teams, the mall was made to pay some hefty damages.

For the third round, the Hale teams were defending a smash repairer, before the magistrate for allegedly stealing cars. Despite the smash-repairer making numerous dubious statements including the exceptionally dodgy, "The deals were always made in cash...there was no paperwork...no last names...[and] the business was quite friendly", for most teams the defendant was not convicted. Hale barristers managed to cast enough doubt on each opponent's case to get their clients acquitted.

Hale One, nicknamed 'Hale and Associates', by the mock trial fraternity, looked on paper to be a courtroom heavyweight and Hale's best chance for the finals. Team One's ranks were filled entirely by Year 12s, many of whom were mock trial veterans. Danny Cregan and Bryce Crage filled the positions of barristers. The rest of the ranks were filled by Hale's best and brightest, including Julian Lane solicitor extraordinaire, the Minsons (Ben and Scott) - litigation genii, star witness David Blakeman, as well as Andrew Quigley and Paul Van Der Merwe.

Team 1 fought the first round in Courtroom 46, looking for a win. The round was tough and Hale had trouble denting the prosecution's case. Cross examination of the opposition's witnesses failed to reward the barristers with any legal angles to barbecue the prosecution and prevent Hale's client, played by Ben Minson, from spending time in 'the slammer'. Hale One managed to blow enough holes in the opposition's case to extract a win on points, but not the win in the actual case. Thus Ben did end up 'cooling his heels' in 'maximum security' for shoplifting the three magazines; sorry Ben, we tried our best.

Following the excellent win from a very tough and high scoring courtroom encounter in Round One, Hale was looking for another win in Round Two. However, it seemed the opposition had heard about Hale One and didn't want to be exposed to any legal frying. Ocean Reef High failed to show, and forfeited the round. However, Hale One suitably dismembered their opponents with military precision in Round Three to progress through to the knockout round.

In the knockout round, Hale and a reappearing Ocean Reef High, were at the bar of courtroom thirty-five to contest a murder trial. It was Hale's case for the Crown, that a husband had murdered his wife with a shotgun. The criminal matter was shaping up to be a very tough case for Hale, with no eyewitnesses to the crime and a case based on circumstantial evidence. The case was held before the Director of Public Prosecutions, Robert Cock QC. Hale One put a strong argument forward. However, the case was extraordinarily difficult and despite a gallant effort the team lost at the final count by a mere two points.

Team 2 consisted chiefly of boys with little experience. However, the team pulled off some impressive performances, including excellent efforts from Cameron Boyle, Ryan Hannan, Scott-Marshall Harper, William May, Liam McLagan, Dougal West and others. The team was capable and enthusiastic, often playing against older or more experienced competitors. They managed one win in their trying cases and are encouraged to continue as a team; with the experience they have gained this year Team 2 will be a formidable combination a year from now.

Team 3 was comprised of young but intelligent and adept competitors, including

Jonathan Archondakis, Jonathan Bevis, Toby Hogan, Justin Kwok, Nick Maclaine, Dougal Maclaurin, Kade Rosenthal and Andrew Williams. The team managed one excellent win, but their relative lack of experience meant cases against older Mock Trial 'juggernauts' were difficult to win. Nevertheless, they played superbly under heavy pressure. Team 3 will provide depth and experience in the years to come, as their legal knowledge and courtroom experience increases.

Memorable moments in Mock Trial include Julian Lane's efforts as solicitor, providing much needed legal notes, along with his humorous assortment of bogus notes, to convince the magistrate information was positively flying off his desk to the barrister's bench. Along with legal information, the notes frequently provided fascinating information on the state of his cat's breath, how easy it would be to dismember the opposition, and the fact that the judge looked like he was going a bit heavy on the port. Other memorable moments included the gender bending efforts of witnesses, David Blakemen and Ben Minson - to confuse the opposition, but more frequently drawing laughs from the public gallery - and more importantly extra points from the judges.

All boys who competed in mock trial would like to thank Mr Wally Goodlet, who proved an excellent coach, and Ben Spagnolo, a law student, whose additional assistance proved invaluable. Finally, the Mock Trial teams would like to thank Mr Kaye for his excellent organisational skills and his efforts in getting boys to the Mock Trials. Without these individuals, the boys of Mock Trial 2001 would not have been able to compete in the distinguished manner that they did, or indeed, enjoy the experience, as we did.

WHALE SHARK DIVING TRIP

Intending the meetings, watching the wideos and listening to the speakers in the weeks before the Diving Camp did not prepare us for the amazing experience of diving with the whale sharks.

On a warm day in April, we met with the girls from MLC and boarded our bus in front of the Hale School Chapel ready for the long journey to Exmouth. Our families waved goodbye as we drove out of the School grounds heading north towards our first overnight stop in Geraldton. Finally in the distance, we could see a hint of civilization, and before we knew it we were setting up our sleeping bags for what turned out to be a pretty cold night. The next morning we had an early start with 10 hours of driving before we reached the Hale Exmouth Base Camp where we set up tents and organized ourselves for our seven day stay.

There had not been a great deal of conversation between the MLC girls and the Hale boys during the trip, but that was soon rectified when we had a group discussion to enlighten each other about our scuba diving experience and our expectations of the coming week's camp activities.

Glad to be off the bus, we settled down for the night with great expectations for the next day. Another early morning start saw us heading for the sea to watch for our first whale shark. The spotter plane circled above us and we prepared for the dive. The first whale shark was spotted and on a signal we were off. We jumped into the water and swam frantically towards the whale shark. Once in the water, it was not too hard to keep up with this most graceful creature as it glided weightlessly ahead of us.

Our first scuba dive was at Mesa Bommies, off the Ningaloo Reef. It was

at perfect depth, which for first time divers was about 18.4 metres but the visibility was average and we could only see about 1.5 metres ahead. This was our first dive and was enjoyed by all, but the best was still to come.

The first night we were thankful for the supplies of spaghetti from Perth. The day had taken its toll on us with the diving and the open air and we were all hungry and tired and ready for an early night.

The second day was magnificent. We had two hours lazing on the boat while again the spotter plane circled overhead. The boat was a huge vessel and lying around on the deck was an excellent way to wait for the signal to join the whale sharks. We had an exciting dive, swimming with two young sharks and an enormous 11 metre whale shark. We watched in wonder as two Manta rays passed by with amazing grace.

The conversation with the girls had picked up by the third day and we had a very enjoyable time as we lay about talking and sunbaking on our way to Lighthouse Bay for a dive at Blizzard's Ridge and then later in the day a dive off Ningaloo Reef at the Labyrinth. We were given a brief talk about the best places to explore and what dangers lay beneath. During our entry, we were alarmed as we reached the bottom to see a huge sea snake swimming beneath us. It was only a matter of minutes but it seemed forever before it swam away over the potholes and crevices out of sight and we were able to concentrate on the surroundings and the beautiful little Angel fish with their startling colours.


The fourth day was our last day on the boat. We had had such a good time on board with a great crew, so it was apt that we go to Muiron North (The Spit) off Ningaloo Reef and Makeral Lumps. This was fantastic diving, absolute magic as we swam above the gardens of multi coloured coral and past the little fluro-blue coloured fish, through the caves under the overhangs and even investigating small sharks. Between dives we sat on the deck of the boat and watched the never ending school of flying fish skim over the water.

The Exmouth Naval Pier was our last dive, on our last day. Visibility was not too good but we spotted five Wobbygong sharks and that was well received by the whole group. We also found an interesting flat sea slug that had a purple and orange lining. Another great dive.

The night dive was a pretty exciting and a new experience. It was one of the highlights. Many of us were a little wary of floating around on the surface at dusk, but soon our fears were forgotten as we began to descend into the sea. We swam through the blackness with our underwater flashlights and our glow sticks, the adrenalin was pumping but once on the bottom, it became an unbelievable dive. This was our last dive and the best.

There was a feeling of reluctance to return home from our underwater paradise and before we knew it, our trip was over. When we reached home, our final goodbyes were said and phone numbers were exchanged so that we could all keep in touch. This dive trip was a great opportunity to meet new people, make new friends, further our experience as divers and have a good time. It was an amazing experience, the memories of this camp will not be easily forgotten.

The Hale athletics season does not end with the PSA Athletics Carnival. Last year, a large number of Hale boys represented Western Australia at a State level, and several played at a National level.

Athletics

Four students, Philip Georgiou, Mark Morgan, Robert Rose and Braden Searle, took part in the National All Schools competition, held in Adelaide in December 2000. Each performed well in his events. After achieving outstanding results, Philip Georgiou (6th in 100m, 11.26s), and Mark Morgan (12th in shotput, 14.05m) were selected for the Youth Olympics Festival held in Sydney in January 2001. This was a superb effort, as both these athletes were under 17 years of age, generally one year younger than the other competitors. Six Australian teams and one New Zealand team were then chosen to compete at the Olympic facilities at Homebush. Mark represented his team in the javelin and finished 7th with a 53 metre throw! Philip ran in the 100m B Division race and finished 2nd in a time of 11.42 seconds. He also participated in the Australian Team 2, running the fourth leg in the 4 x 100m relay. He finished the race off in 1st position after a healthy lead, leading into his leg. This team earned a gold medal for its sizzling time of 41.91 seconds.

Over the summer holidays, Mark Morgan and David Wilson were invited to tour the USA, as part of an athletics team representing Australia. Both returned to Australia with more experience, and benefited from toplevel coaching.

Baseball

Ryan Hastie (Year 11) had the honour of representing his State in the U/16 National baseball championships, held at Mt Gambier in South Australia in January 2001. Following this championship, he was selected to be part of the Australian U/17 AA squad. From the beginning of July this year for a two-month period, Ryan attended the Australian Baseball Academy, where he trained under some of Australia's best coaches. The squad of 25 was cut to 18. Ryan was selected in the team and a week later toured to the USA and Mexico for the AA World Championships, held in Vera Cruz, Mexico. Throughout this period, Ryan played very well. In Mexico he played 9 games for Australia. The team won a bronze medal: only the second time that an U/17 Australian team has won a medal. As well as this, Ryan received other awards. He was presented with the trophies for the most runs scored and the most runs battled in and then he was selected as the World Team's 1st Basemen.

Cricket

Theo Doropoulos was selected in the Western Australian State U/17 team based on the strength of his Term 4 cricket performances; he was the team's youngest member. He went to Brisbane, where he played five games against the other States. His highest score was 61 against Tasmania, and he also took four catches in the semi-final against South Australia.

As a result of his performances at the Interstate Carnival, and in the Darlot Cup cricket competition, where he scored 474 runs and took 19 wickets, Theo was included in the All Australian U/17 team. He travelled to Adelaide to play a three-day game and a one-day game against the National England U/17 team. Theo is currently playing 'A' grade cricket for Scarborough, where during the holidays, he opened the batting with Australian batsman Justin Langer.

Sailing

Cameron Hannan (Year 8) was the sole Australian representative in the IODA World Championship held in China in July this year. Forty-two countries and 208 competitors took part in the competition. The Hong Kong coach, Xu Xiaodong, was his guardian during his stay and he was also fortunate to have advice from the British team's coach, Peter Martin. Events took place at the Qingdao Laoshan Zoujia Sailing Club where a strong 3 to 4 knot tide, which changed several metres each day and lack of wind, made sailing difficult. Due to the unpredictable conditions, not all events were completed. The opportunity of travelling to China, meeting and competing against so many people and making new friends, has been a wonderful experience for Cameron.

The next friendly meet was against the Old Boys, this time with the entire Hale swim team in attendance. It proved to be an enjoyable night where Hale was able to flex its relay strength and depth. However, the Old Boys proved to be too fast and so won the Old Boys' Trophy this year and at the same time, gave the team invaluable practice. The pasta night that followed was most memorable. Everyone ate well and enjoyed each other's company.

The Interschool Carnival on the 23rd of March 2001 proved to be the closest in its 96 year history. The Guildford team was favourite going into the carnival but the Hale Swim Team was not perturbed and set out to swim to the best of its ability, knowing that the deserved results would come.

Hale started out strongly in the individual freestyle events, but after 15 events it turned into a one-horse race with Guildford asserting its superiority in the pool and extending its lead, event after event. This however, did not faze the Hale team which remained on task and began to close the lead that Guildford had going into the relays.

With only 15 races to go, there were two schools out in front. Hale had a buffer of over 100 points from 3rd placed Christ Church but had a lot to do to catch Guildford. The events that followed made this particular carnival the most exciting ever. At the end of the 2nd Division freestyle relays, Hale had reduced Guildford's lead to 60 points. With only the 1st Division medley and freestyle relays to go, the officials stopped revealing the points. Hale's medley relays were its strength and the team finished in the top three places in most of these races. Going into the 1st Division relays, Hale was still in with a chance. The atmosphere was electric, tension rose and disqualifications occurred. Fortunately they were not against Hale but went the way of Guildford. The Hale team was able to keep its nerve and finished off the competition on a high with a win in the last race of the night, the 1st Division freestyle relay.

Swimmers in all years performed particularly well. Tim Carslow and Jac Naudé, who swam strongly in their individual events, ably led the Year 8 team. Our Year 9s once again proved to be the strongest year, as all the under 14s achieved high rank places in the

three relays. This year group was led by Tjad Dorrington who showed his prowess in the pool winning the under 14s 50 metre butterfly from behind with 10 metres to go. Tjad deservedly won the most improved swimmer for 2001. The Year 10s were again dominant during the night. The shed managed to come equal 1st in the Hamer Cup on the Head of the River day. This achievement for the second year running, illustrates the collective power of the Hale School Boatshed.

The annual residential rowing camp ran between the 27 and 30 of January. The senior rowers enjoyed the first class facilities of the recently redeveloped Brine House, while the juniors were located in Loton House. The days were spent on the lovely water in front of the ANA boatshed and in the weights room, with crew selection being a key aspect of the camp. The rowers were informed that selection would be made on the basis of picking the fastest crews, being fair to all rowers and in rewarding those who had shown initiative throughout the summer. Between sessions, the boarding house pool, table tennis and 'foozeball' tables all received a fair workout. A few days after the camp had concluded the Year 8 open day was held and 45 potential rowers attended and had a row under the guidance of the shed's senior rowers. The high attendance by Year 8s to the open day is promising for the

future of Hale rowing.

The void left by the departure of outstanding 1st VIII coach Duncan Barton was always going to be hard to fill, but the minds behind rowing at Hale were able to find a worthy replacement; none other than dual Olympic finalist, Sydney Olympic silver medallist and Hale School Old Boy, Nick Porzig. With these credentials being the tip of the iceberg for his amazing sporting career, Nick Porzig would draw on his incredible experience gained under some of the world's greatest rowing coaches, while being both a mentor and coach to the boys of the shed. This addition to the already strong coaching panel set Hale rowing 2001, off to a great start.

The 1st VIII of 2001 had its first official row at the Christ Church long distance regatta on the first weekend of Term 1. The crew went into the race confident and came off second best to the eventual winners of the Head of the River, Wesley. A force to be reckoned with on paper, the Hale 1st VIII did not appear to 'click' on the water. The crew had dominated the Wesley ergometer competition in Term 4, 2000 and continued to improve its scores, but these scores did not directly correlate to speed on the water. The race was most exciting, for spectators who saw the Wesley 1st VIII defeat the Hale crew by only zero point three of a second. All involved in the race realise that the Hale 1st VIII underachieved this season, but rest assured, the Year 11 rowers in the crew, namely James Stewart, Chad Green, David Kelly, Andrew Lane and Kingsley Rudeforth will use this loss as motivation for 2002.

The 2nd VIII was a strong crew that had an excellent season. Coached by Mr D. Vernon for the fourth year in a row, the 2nd VIII lodged four 1st placings in the lead up regattas to the Head of

The crew finished 6th in the first 2 kilometre regatta and spent their whole season fighting from the middle of the field. In a twist, at the Head of the River regatta, the last race to come down the Canning was not the 1st VIII, but the 3rd VIII. In that race the Hale School 3rd VIII came a

racing. They will definitely go on to be prominent senior rowers in the near future.





the Thursday afternoon challenges and there is no doubt that the team as a whole benefited from the additional match play. Thursday trainings also complemented the key objective of 'consistency'. A colleague of mine once told me that defeat and disappointment are sometimes the greatest motivators. This summed up last year's Athletic season. The question was would those who had been part of it be motivated enough to make amends. My initial involvement in athletics this year was as a football coach, encouraging players to work with Mr Nenad Peisker to improve their sprinting. Though I had not been part of athletics before, I was so impressed with Nenad's professionalism that I gladly accepted the invitation to take charge of the administrative side of athletics at Hale.

While there were again many boys who trained throughout the year, regular training and Saturday competition became difficult for many participants, because of their commitments to club sport, State championship trials and summer sport finals. Despite these problems in continuity, the team was always convinced that it 'would be alright on the day'. In the back of my mind, however, was what I see as the greatest problem in sport: individualism. It is very difficult to make athletics a team sport and, with so many boys absent, it was always going to be a challenge to create the cohesive team needed to win. Without doubt, we had some very talented individuals, but it is often the middle-range athletes, who are prepared to push themselves, who gain the extra points. After losing by two and a half points last year, this was a theme that we stressed from the very beginning. We emphasised the need for unity by encouraging all year groups to mix together and worked on developing team spirit in a competition where an U/14s event is worth the same amount of points as an Open event.

Although it might seem strange, I was pleased to be greeted by grey skies and consistent showers on the day of the Interschool Athletics. Such weather may not please everyone, but I knew it would favour the tough, focussed individuals, of whom we had quite a number among our ranks, and particularly among our leaders. There could have been no better start to the day than Brennen Mills rising from his sick bed and winning the 1st event. This inspirational performance roused the team and the supporters, and we were on our way. At different stages during the afternoon, we fended off challenges from Aquinas, Trinity, and then Guildford. We were already more than 100 points ahead when the relays started, and only needed to finish each race to win, but the team never lost momentum. The U/14s came second by 0.02s and the U/15s by 0.2s, while the U/17s won, setting a new School record in the process. Despite an inauspicious start, the Open division runners, anchored by Captain Braden Searle, came home strongly and also set a new School record.

While this victory was a team effort, with every athlete participating to the best of his ability, there are a number of individual performances that warrant particular mention. Captain Braden Searle provided inspirational leadership, with 1st Division wins in the Open 100m, 200m and long jump, in addition to his tremendous relay run. Philip Stroud produced an amazing display of strength and versatility with his four 1st Division wins in the U/15 400m, high jump, shot put and discus. Lucas Mata emulated the Captain's performance, with 1st Division wins in the U/14 100m, 200m and long jump. Chris Guard's sensational wins in the U/14 800m and 1500m brought the crowd to its feet, and with some serious competition, he might have challenged the 18 year old PSA record. and S. Appleby were solid enough in the tight and hard workers in the open and our back row of F. Glendining, C. Rovira and J. Burger was the best in the competition. They worked brilliantly together and allowed our halfbacks, R. de Franck and M. Shaw to dictate play. These two were growing in stature with each game. P. Hallot and T. Overall, season 2001 was successful for Hale PSA soccer. Their involvement is very much appreciated by all the boys in Hale School soccer.

The 1st XI had a mixed season of many highs and lows, culminating in Hale's best performances in the final two games of the season, against Trinity and Wesley. On paper, the 1st XI soccer team had the depth of talent and skill to challenge for the Lawe-Davies Cup that was lost to Trinity in 2000. However, as it panned out, poor early season form affected their final placing, leaving the team in a disappointing 5th position, having recorded 2 wins, 3 losses and 5 draws. Hale finished just one win from 2nd place. The senior nucleus of the team included Justin Bullivant in goals, Joel Seah and Duan Pater (before his injury) and Theo Xydas in defence, Justin Chak and James Purtill in midfield and Chris Williams up front. There were also very good performances by other year 12s such as Andrew Harrington, Alister Martin, Dipesh Karia, Chris Kempin, Praveen Amarasuriya, Steven MacLean and Ismail Shah. Theo Xydas won the David Berg trophy for the fairest and best player and Xydas, Williams and Purtill have been awarded colours for soccer. Special mention is made of Ismail Shah who has completed four seasons in

the 1st X1 (matching Yo Hashimoto's record) and he was a member of 2 winning PSA teams in that time. The Year 11s displayed numerous impressive performances from Jon Benwell (winner of the most improved player), Phillip Georgiou, Harry Backhouse, Christian Bloecker and George Atherley in defence and Anthony Livanos in attack; promising signs for next season. on a Tuesday afternoon, after the Saturday game was called off due to excessive rain and thunder. The Guildford match was followed by draws against Aguinas and Christ Church in the start of the 2nd round of fixtures. A very disappointing 3-1 loss to Scotch at Scotch highlighted Hale's problem with small pitches in the preceding fixture to the Trinity match. In its seven previous games, Trinity had not lost and in the process had conceded only 2 goals and scored 45. Hale went into the half-time break with high morale on the back of an impressive 1st half display, but a spirited second half performance was not enough to prevent Trinity drawing the match. Nevertheless, this was Hale's outstanding performance for the season against the PSA champions. Hale finished off the season with another impressive performance against Wesley, culminating in a 3-1 win, including 2 goals from Anthony Livanos.

Overall, it is true to say that the team under-achieved this season, finding it difficult to play well week in, week out with the numerous injuries suffered, only finding true form near the conclusion of the season. The season highlighted the need to finish off opponents with goals, given that Hale dominated possession in many matches that it drew. Similarly, soft goals were conceded in defence, often against the run of play. The midfield domination of games too often went unrewarded and Hale must learn from this if it is to improve in 2002.

After winning the competition last year, the 2nd XI squad was determined to retain the top position in 2001. However, after losing key players to the 1st squad and the Year 12s from last year, the 2nd XI initially appeared to lack vital experience, with many of the players never having played together previously. After three weeks of solid training the 2nd XI opened the season with solid wins over both Christ Church and Scotch. In the 3rd week of the competition they faced the challenging Trinity side and although neither team was able to dominate the play, a last minute mistake in defence resulted in an own goal being scored and Hale going down to Trinity 1-0. From this point onwards however, the Hale side convincingly beat all other teams. With only two games remaining in the season Hale needed to beat both Trinity and Wesley to retain the Championship in this division. The match against Trinity saw a very determined Hale side match skill and pace with Trinity to win 2-1. This was the game of the season with all boys playing beyond their normal skill level in a very convincing win. The season ended with Hale winning the Championship for the fourth consecutive season. They had kicked a total of 52 goals and only conceded 2 - an exceptional effort! victory. Unfortunately Scotch, Aquinas and Trinity had other ideas and in the secod half of the season the boys struggled against these teams. OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Truly I am blessed for I am amongst a select group of people who, on the whole, love what they do. I cannot remember a day since I began in this position, when I awoke and thought I really don't want to go to work today. That feeling usually only comes after getting to work and enduring a barrage of problems created by a busy world, lots of politics, and students whose approach to their responsibilities is non-committal.

For those staff who have never lead a group of Year 10 boys on their Exmouth expedition, and happily, they are now in a minority, there is still a perception that camping out with 15 adolescents for 12 days at a time borders on a vacation.

Occasionally, often tongue in cheek but sometimes with ignorant belief, comes the call from some of my work colleagues "Ah back from holidays again!" as I flit in and out of the Hale School buildings between programmes. It used to evoke a response. To the many staff members who have given their time both in and out of holidays in assisting as group leaders, I extend the deepest thanks and gratitude. Without their help, this busy programme would be nigh impossible to conduct, and I shudder even at the thought of that task without them. Special thanks and mention must go to Mrs Mary Pfister who has offered her services now for 9 continuous years as a group leader at Exmouth.

For years I have refuted every suggestion that the Outdoor Education Programme is anything less than a lot of hard work, though now I do so with less passion or need to justify. Yet always I give little away of the times when one could believe that life is a holiday - so here, a glimpse of the bright side of Hale School Outdoor Education.

When it appeared the whole world was falling around us in mid September, Mr Rob Brown, Instructor Stephanie van den Hoek and a group of mostly boarding students joined me at Exmouth. The boys were a well-oiled machine and a pleasure to be with. In stark contrast to the group that followed them, they were endowed with good manners, maturity, a sense of fun and eagerness, common sense, and a true camaraderie. There was much to ponder during this programme, and we discussed many topics close to home and further afield.

In one of our more challenging adventures: after failing to make our sailing destination, as the wind kicked up to 25 knots in the gulf, as the boats were swamped and the crew frantically bailed away, while the support craft with towline taught edged slowly forward throttle open - nothing it seemed could break the spirit of this small group.

When we were huddled behind the beached boats to gain refuge in the night from the relentless wind, even when the cold wind stole all of the heat from our little methocookers while we attempted to cook dinner, the boys were still good company. Early in

the morning, amongst the hacking coughs of cold and phlegmy throats, the sun peeped over the water of the Exmouth Gulf Horizon – a special sight indeed and not often seen on this west side of the continent. As the weather pattern had predicted day after day beforehand, the morning brought a break from the wind on this coastal survival aspect of the programme. So how does one overcome the lack of shelter and food? One fishes and forages all day of course and here sometimes it is easy to forget that it is a school camp. Some teachers have been heard to say with glee "I'm being paid today!" or, "I wonder who is taking my class this minute."

With perfect tides and the wind at our backs we send our lures spinning through the air amongst the shimmering clear waters of Roberts Island North. The return to our hunter roots grasps most of us at the core. For some, it is a stark realisation that they are budding vegetarians should they have to catch and kill their own meat. For others it bridges the gap created by supermarkets where meat and fish and poultry are cling-wrapped and void of life. Even for the hardest groups, it gives a true sense of purpose at the most basic level in needing to find one's own food, or opens a world of excitement and exploration in a hitherto unknown environment. And then there are those for whom their medical form details in 'dietary requirements' – he doesn't like fish or he is a fussy eater. On this day they may well break free from their mother's apron strings and take control of their pandered taste buds.

On a good day the banquet rivals that of any seafood restaurant.


One could imagine how such tales lead to people believing that life is a holiday, so for good measure and a touch of contrast, I finish with this.


Thankfully, all is well that ends well and with all casualties well on the road to recovery, we look forward to another successful year in 2002.





YEAR 6 REPORT


The year began with feelings of nervousness and excitement as boys settled into their new Year 6 classes.



VALEDICTORY CHAPEL ADDRESS

Good evening Dr Inverarity, members of the School board. distinguished guests, parents, staff, and especially to the members of the leaving class of 2001. Welcome to a group that has seen our School's challenges, and raised them some silverware and a fine selection of world-beaters. Brother Redmond, Alcock, Hamer, and a bevy of gold and silver medals are just a few of the testaments to the outstanding contributions of this particular year 12 group. But as nice as it is to see our cabinet close to overflowing, trophies come and trophies go. Take the unstoppable Aquinas team of the 2000 PSA rugby competition, in a league of its own. Before last year's group, the last time the trophy had ventured down the dark halls of Aquinas was 28 years ago in 1973. By 1930, Scotch had won fifteen of the 26 inter school swimming competitions. Since then, in the past 71 years, they have only managed half of that. So then how do we measure a year group's worth - by its trophy cabinet? That could be one way, and if so, then we have done Hale School proud.

I would like to borrow from an address that made a lasting impression on me a few years ago. I've re-titled it "Hale School Life":

Hale School life isn't about keeping score. It's not about how many friends you have or how accepted you are.

Not about if you have plans this weekend or if you're alone.

It isn't about who you're going out with, who you used to go out with, how many people you've been out with, or if you haven't been out with anyone at all.

It's not about how smart you are, how smart your parents think you are, or how smart the TEE says you are.

It's not about how good you are at your sport.

And it's not about representing your whole being on a piece of paper and seeing who will accept 'the written you'.

LIFE JUST ISN'T

But, life is about who you love and who you hurt. And it's about friendship, used as a sanctity or a weapon.

It's about keeping or betraying trust.

It's about what judgment you pass and why.

But most of all it's about using your life to poison or to touch the hearts of other people in such a way that could have never occurred alone.

We are here this evening to celebrate our past achievements, and to look forward to new beginnings. As in the analogy of life as a race, or rather, a series of races, a good beginning is essential, but equally important, is a good finish. As in rowing, it's in the last 500 metres that the race is won and lost. And in football, the same is true of the final quarter. In the words of Winston Churchill,

Now this is not the end.

This is not even the beginning of the end.

But it is, perhaps, the end of the beginning.

So we come to the end of one of many of life's beginnings, and I know we are all excited to welcome the next phase of our lives. We may look forward to putting behind us the days of knee-high socks and long assemblies. And we are finally free

to decide for ourselves whether we will rise to disorganisation and untidiness, or sink to better manage our time and energy. So how shall we greet the infamous 'real world'? Free of the claustrophobic control of school, into a place where few concerned teachers offer wisdom and shelter. The apostle Paul once wrote of change, "When I was a child, I talked like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put childish ways behind me."

Paul's transition from child to adult required a new way of seeing the world, just the same as our leaving Hale School requires of us a new way of seeing ourselves. For now we leave this place, not as the boys who arrived here bewildered and disorientated on our first day, but as men.

Some of you remember three years ago, when I first arrived at Hale. Fresh from the confines of my life at boarding school in South Africa, I had just over a month to adapt to the strange accents, freedoms, and mannerisms affectionately called Australian culture.

Three years ago, at about this time, I was anxiously, but reluctantly preparing to leave a country behind.

Three years ago, at about this time, I was savouring the memories of a culture and people that I would leave behind.

Three years ago, I first told some of my good friends that I wouldn't be with them when the next school year began.

This is the part that I regret most. I had left it too late. You see, I only had a few short weeks left of school. I had planned it this way. This way, I reasoned that I could minimise the hostility I knew would come when they found out the rumour that I was abandoning them, running away. The truth is that true friends never believe rumours. But at the time I didn't want to take that risk. As I drove out of the School gates with my parents for the last time, I couldn't help thinking of all the people who I hadn't got around to telling. Old friends who, come January, would discover that not only had I run away, but, I had forgotten to say goodbye.

That's why, in leaving Hale I've tried to say those things that need to be said. Whether that means saying 'I'm sorry' for the near deadly stench of the prefects' room, or a special 'thankyou' to an old teacher. I'd encourage you to do whatever you need to do, and to say whatever you need to say, to finish this race well. To leave this place with special memories of a time, hopefully, well spent.

And now, to this group of men sitting in front of me: tonight is our valedictory. Tonight we say farewell. Some of us have been looking forward to this for weeks, months, or even years. And we're excited about the next phase. We're excited, as we stand poised to evolve from school life to the real world, from schoolboy into manhood.

And as we prepare for this change, and as we prepare to leave this place, I would like to leave you with a Traditional Gaelic Blessing:

"May the road rise up to meet you.

May the wind be always at your back.

May the sun shine warm upon your face;

The rains fall soft upon your fields
and until we meet again,

May God hold you in the palm of His hand."

ALISTAIR STEWART 1988 - 2002

Alistair Stewart, the younger son of Alan and Jan, and brother of James, was born on 5 April 1988 and died suddenly on 23 January 2002. Alistair's life was filled with extraordinary activity. Alistair was an extraordinarily independent, resourceful and energetic boy. To children and teenagers he was a charismatic leader, full of fun and adventure. His friends and family were all important to him and were the main focus of his life.

In 2001, Alistair entered Year 8 at Hale School, joining Tregonning House and Pastoral Care Group 8.7. He loved the experience of Year 8, embraced many of the opportunities offered by the School and made another wide circle of friends.

Alistair was one of those rare people who was capable of doing anything to which he put his mind or hand. During this past year 'Ali', as he was known to many of his Hale friends, was obsessed with basketball. His latest dream was to become a professional player. In 2001, Ali was in four basketball teams - one of which, in typical fashion, he organised himself.

By his loving and generous family, by all in the Hale School community and by his many friends, Alistair will be cherished in memories.

On 26 January 2002, Vivienne Garrett, a close family friend, wrote a poem entitled 'For Alistair', the opening lines of which are:

At this time of your parting, we wish you luck my little friend. The sky is flushed with colour and your path lies beautiful. Journey forth.

Alistair's life was amazingly full and rich, and Vivienne's lines of poetry capture the independent spirit, exuberance and vitality that characterised him always.
