THE HEADMASTER



HEADMASTER Dr RJ Inverarity

We have assembled here today to celebrate both the achievements of the boys and the School and the life and growth of our community over the past 12 months.

As I reflect upon this past year and more especially upon the 14 years since 1989 of my membership of this Hale School community, the achievements of the boys and the School tend to fade into the background. To the fore comes the sense of community, of belonging, of identity, of a journey, shared thoughts of fun and laughter, of struggling together to resolve difficult situations and of support for each other in times of unbearable sadness. The most poignant reflections for me are simply those of sharing the gift of life with others in a real and vibrant community, a community which is vulnerable to the vagaries of life and at the same time is underpinned by the great strength of knowing that its raison d'être are the honourable pursuits of delivering a quality, liberal education and the formation of young men, each with his unique personality and individual qualities.

That is what I will remember, and treasure most.

One of the most significant developments in the School this year has been in the area of Service Learning. The younger boys have taken the lead in this area and their personal growth as a result of these outreaches of service into the wider community has been most significant. Further, it enables those of us in this community to gain a better appreciation of our opportunities and good fortune.

I hope that a sense of gratitude and a sense of obligation will always accompany the wonderful opportunities that go with being a student or a teacher at this School.

What are some of the things I have seen and learnt during my 14 years at Hale about what makes this School an especially valuable community? What is it that makes this place the type of community that allows each individual to grow and to flourish to the best of his ability?

I have become increasingly wary of those who shroud education in jargon, complicated language and mystery. However complex the organisation and structures of a school may be, the essentials should remain clear and relatively simple. In every classroom and in every club, in every team and in every rehearsal, in every performance on paper, on a sporting field or on a stage, in every individual's life, there must be a determination to make the most of it.

The good school, skilfully and subtly blending ideas of community, responsibility and individual freedom, is a place where most events and encounters are given special significance and leave people feeling more alive than they were before.

In the classroom, does the teacher have a passion for the subject and for igniting that passion among his students? There must be energy and a transfer of that energy - both ways, from teacher to student, and from student to teacher. There must be sensitivity, but sensitivity that is not too easily swayed by every emotion and mood. There must be determination and hard work, but not hardness. There must be a sense of respect but not of stiff formality. There must be a sense of order but not regimentation. There must be a sense of purpose but not one that can be reduced to a clinical pursuit of grades and results, at whatever the cost.

The standards of a community, the ethos and the 'feel' of a community have a profound impact on the behaviours, values, attitudes, relationships and lives of its members.

How best to get the community feeling 'right' is as fascinating as it is elusive.

Within a community which does feel right, where relationships reflect dimensions of respect, care, compassion and consideration, within such a community it is natural for people to feel encouraged and allowed to feel proud of who they are and of what they can achieve, to feel comfortable with their ability to give and to receive, to respect and to be respected and to aspire to the most worthwhile and valuable goals.

To have a community that reflects these things, then there needs to be many strong contributors.

The motto of this fine School is the simple, single word 'Duty'.

Duty: sense of obligation, doing for others, service, contributing, selfless, doing the right and honourable thing because it is there to be done and it is the right and honourable thing to do, and doing this with a sense of humility and gratitude.

Individuals within a community feeling and enacting a sense of duty, each in their own way, build this community on the strongest of foundations.

I would like to relate to you briefly the story of a man who has acted out his sense of duty and has been an extraordinary contributor and example to our Hale School community.

Rod Isaachsen was born in 1924. He married in 1949 and had two children. In 1956, aged 31, Rod Isaachsen, an Old Haleian, had a heart attack and died, leaving his wife and two small children, a son aged 5 and a daughter aged 2. Rod had been an active member of the Old Haleians' Hockey Club and his friends rallied round behind his widow. They ensured that their late, great friend's son had a Hale School education. The son, Eric Isaachsen, attended Hale from 1964-68 on an Old Haleians' Scholarship. He demonstrated his appreciation of his educational opportunities by making the most of

them. He applied himself with dedication to his studies and with great enthusiasm to a wide range of extra-curricular activities. In his final year he was recognised by his peers and the School by way of being appointed Captain of School.

In 1991, Eric Isaachsen's son, Paul, began at Hale School in Year 5, and so began the second round of intense involvement at Hale for Dr Isaachsen. As a parent, as an active member of the Old Haleians' Association and then as a Governor of the School since 1995, and Chairman since 1998, Dr Eric Isaachsen has made a most extraordinary contribution to Hale School in an entirely honorary capacity. I have never known of a more committed, sustained, informed and wide-ranging contribution in such a capacity. I consider it to have been a privilege to have worked alongside and formed a partnership with such a dedicated man who has been quietly expressing his gratitude, enacting his duty, making a wonderful selfless contribution to our community and. incidentally, in the process making it clear to us what this School is, in essence, about.

As he has indicated that he will be standing down from the Chair of our Board of Governors early next year, and having already embarrassed Dr Isaachsen and at the risk of embarrassing him further, I ask you to join with me in recognising and appreciating Dr Isaachsen's efforts.

At the end of each school year, there are reflections, farewells and the looking forward to changes and to new, fresh beginnings. This is the life-blood and wonderful energizing force of a school.

We farewell 181 fine young men who are the graduates of Hale School in 2002. In recent years, and especially this year, they have made wonderful contributions to the life of our School with their talents, energy and individuality. They have been splendidly led by Kingsley Rudeforth who has a deep commitment to this School that may result in his following Dr Isaachsen's lead, and becoming Chairman, perhaps in 2032.

We farewell a number of staff and it is fitting that we make special mention of seven:

Mrs Colleen Brady, the angel of the Library, will return to Queensland and retirement after 5 years with us.

Mr Haydn Jackson, an outstanding contributor, who seems to spend nearly all of his time down in the Art Room or poolside, is travelling across the river to be a boarding housemaster at Aquinas, after 4 years at Hale.

Mr Julian Dowse, a teacher of extraordinary passion and quality, has been with us for 6 years and will follow his wife to Melbourne where he will become Deputy Head of Camberwell Grammar School.

Mr Tom Mitchell will leave us after 12 years of outstanding service as teacher, Head of Chemistry, Head of Havelock and Wilson and coach of the 1st XV to become a Deputy Head of Iona College in Brisbane.

Mr Brian Heibner has been teaching full-time at Hale for 28 years, This talented, modest, kind and youthful man of 65 will change to a different part-time role next year and we are delighted we are not losing him altogether.

Mr Heng Lim, a senior teacher of Japanese at Hale for the past 12 years, is leaving us to take up a position at Ivanhoe Grammar School in Melbourne where his two sons have recently moved to study and work.

And finally, Mr Roy Kelley who left two months ago to prepare to take over as Headmaster, King's College, Auckland in January. He was simply the best Deputy a Head could ever wish for and his contribution to the life and to the integrity of this School was of the very highest quality.

2003 will see the arrival of over 200 new boys and a number of new staff. They will begin their Hale School journey and they will write their own pages in the School's history. The School will welcome them all and support them, as a good community should. A special welcome will be extended to Mr Stuart Meade and his family as they travel from Sydney to enable Mr Meade to begin as Headmaster in January. It is a daunting prospect coming new into a school of this size and momentum and taking up the reins of leadership. I warmly commend Mr Meade to you as a very

fine man and leader and I know that he will be given the wholehearted support that he will need and that he deserves.

Over the next few months, I look forward to hearing that he and his family have settled in quickly as a result of the generous and friendly welcome given to them by the Hale community. I have personally experienced this warmth and support and it is something that I will miss greatly. It has been my great good fortune to have been a part of the Hale community for the past 14 years and I warmly thank each one of you for sharing that journey, or part of it, with me. Good luck to you all for your endeavours in 2003, farewell and Godspeed.



CAPTAIN OF SCHOOL

The following is an edited version of the Speech Day Address 2002.

I came to Hale in 1996 along with my older brother, from a little country school and became part of Buntine House. My father had been Vice-Captain of Buntine in 1970. My brother was asked to be Captain of School in 2000, an office I was thrilled to accept this year. I tell you this to provide you with the context in which I came to this podium.

To enjoy Hale you need to possess one thing - a genuine interest in all aspects of the School. You may not play a particular sport or be in a particular club, but it is vital for the School that all boys take an interest in everything and everyone around them. This year I gained great enjoyment from seeing the enthusiasm of so many of the younger boys. This enthusiasm was personified by Liam Marsh, who attended every 1st XV rugby training and game as the team water boy, purely for the love of it. Or by juniors, Andrew Brannan and Charles Williams, who sacrificed many Saturday mornings to run in the Senior Cross Country team. I know of many other examples of students brimming with enthusiasm and passion - two of the core values needed to be a part of Hale.

Once you reach Year 11 and 12, there is no escaping the 'role model' tag. The Headmaster and other staff often say to the Year 12 group that they are all leaders something that I believe to be true. The great sprinter Michael Johnson wrote that,

The ultimate responsibility and challenge of being a role model, is not to sign autographs in a timeless fashion or to live a stainless life, but to offer up a life or philosophy, flaws and all, to help other people negotiate there own way.

In the context of Hale, it is vital that the senior boys serve as role models and approach their school life in a manner that ensures that the traditions and atmosphere of Hale remain strong. As Johnson says, this doesn't mean that you have to pretend to be something that you are not. Just be natural around all students - no matter what age they are. I know that next year's Captain of School, Raphaël de Vietri, will be an outstanding role model for the boys at Hale. His heart is as big as Pharlap's and it is dedicated to this School.

To continue to increase the sense of community at Hale, the senior boys must realise that they can make an impact on the younger blokes and should take a genuine interest in them. Some of my fondest memories of Hale are being thrilled to bits in Year 8 by the short day-to-day conversations with Year 12 Dirk McCormick, who had the locker above mine. His, 'G'day Kingsley,' or 'How's it going little Ruda?' made my day. I hope that all students leave Hale with memories of positive interaction with seniors in their first few years and will interact positively in their final years.

This year's Year 12s are the last to go through the School not having experienced the new pastoral care system. Although pastoral care creates a protective atmosphere for the

younger boys in which to develop, I believe it also creates a hurdle that the senior boys must cross if they wish to get to know the younger boys. I urge you all to endeavour to minimise the separation between senior and junior students in the future.

I love this School and I know there are many boys and staff who feel the same way. Hale provides an environment in which you are free to follow the path you want – both in and out of the classroom. Our cricketers practise and play on test match quality pitches, our rowers train in the highest quality boats, our tennis players play on grass, our musicians can play on a piano worth more than my house in an auditorium comparable, if not better than the Perth Concert Hall - and the list goes on. The School is filled with individuals who thrive in this caring, nurturing environment and their success inspires those around them.

I believe that it is important to remember that you only live once and you will only be at Hale School once. Do not underrate the importance of living in the moment; don't wait for something bigger and better to come along. Jump into everything with as much enthusiasm as is possible. It is my wish that all students of Hale maximise their time and enjoyment at this great School.

On February 2 1998, I sat in the chapel and listened to Father Pengelley welcome us to the School. Father Pengelley correctly summarised what we were about to experience. He said, " Over the next five years you will grow from boys into young adults. You will form many friendships in the classroom and on the sporting field. You will be surrounded by staff members who are eager to help you realise your potential. The time will eventually come when most of you will sit in the Memorial Hall doing your T.E.E. and after that you will go over to Rotto and get blotto. And then it will all be over." Mr Pengelley was right. Just as I have found, I hope you all understand that you do only get one shot at making your stay at this School unique.

Some say that recent world events in the past year trivialise the events in our School calendar. I disagree. Participation in events that affirm and continue the traditions and aspirations of individuals, schools and community behaviour is more valuable now than ever.

2002 has been a year of highs and lows, however one of the most important things that I have learnt from Hale is that it is the process and not the outcome that truly matters. This year Hale has had fantastic outcomes in cricket, athletics, swimming, football and rugby. Everybody enjoyed the outstanding concerts put on by Hale and St Mary's bands and the various drama productions went off without a hitch. Unfortunately, in fifty years time it will be hard for anyone to find out much about Hale in 2002 other than that Hale won the athletics for the second year in a row, the best cricketer to ever to pass through the School finished as captain of a victorious Darlot team and the Headmaster of fourteen years concluded his term. Mum, Dad, Clancy and Marissa. My life has been filled with happiness as a result of how we manage to be quite different, yet still very close. I have greatly appreciated your support. On behalf of the boys, I would like to thank the staff members for whom this is also their last day at Hale, and wish them all the best for the future. Today is also the last formal school event for the headmaster, Mr John Inverarity, and his wife, Mrs Inverarity.

Mr Inverarity, the boys who attended Hale from 1989 to this day have had the privilege of having a most committed, fair, experienced and dedicated Headmaster. Your interest in everything is beyond imagining. You know the names of all the boys at the School, and converse daily with them about 'how they are travelling'. The boys of Hale have blossomed in the environment passionately created by you and your staff. Students hold you in the highest regard and think of you as the man who has led this School to a time of outstanding academic, sporting, drama and musical success.

I look forward to keeping watching the positive progress of the School in the coming years, keeping an even closer eye on the junior rowers from my vantage point as a rowing coach in the speedboat. Thank you, it has been a great time.

Chapel Valedictory Address -Father Tim Russell

Valedictory Day is such a contradictory sort of event in some ways. We celebrate your moving on, but that will not happen for a few weeks and when you do move on, most of you will leave here for the last time in school uniform. We celebrate the end of your learning among us, yet many of you will study longer and harder than ever in the next few weeks. Funny, then that we should choose now to have this most significant rite of passage. Funny, yet wholly appropriate.

Valedictory Day appropriately marks the time at which you begin to go your separate ways to follow your own paths through life - the beginning of your journey from here appropriately begins together.

Hale is not about one single event or time or person, it is about community in all its breath, depth and diversity. It is about preparation, not for one single event such as the TEE, but for life in all its richness. The goalposts here are set much, much wider than the narrow focus of the TEE, or any of the great things that may follow directly from your time here, jobs, TAFE, sport, University, travel, whatever. Much wider than purely intellectual growth, Hale seeks to develop the whole person - body, mind and spirit.

A diversity that when, celebrated and embraced, informs our growth as whole people - and gives us infinitely more fuel to burn in our deeper education of self, of spirit.

For many of you the fruit of this spiritual growth may not be noticed for years to come, or indeed you may never notice the full effects on your life of this part of your development here at Hale. However, the mark of this School's community will be indelibly embedded on your spirit.

For tonight as we celebrate all that has been and look forward to that which is yet to come, we can already perceive the depth of communal spirit that has developed among you in your years together. It is seen in the ease with which you mix with each other, the trust you show each other and in the esteem you have for each other.

Here, at Hale School you have been privileged not only to share some of your defining moments, moments that you will always treasure, but also to share in a part of the wonderful life journey that has seen you grow in wisdom, in stature and in favour with God and your fellows. We cannot pretend that your time here has fully prepared you for much of what life will throw at you, it has however, begun a process. A process in body, mind, and in spirit, in which you will find out who you are, what your great and inherent value is and the value of those who accompany you throughout your life.

I have been privileged to share the past three years with you and feel that the experience has allowed me to grow in wisdom and stature. I have been blessed time after time, to see and hear of events in which you have extended yourselves and found new inner strengths - times that have seen you grow into young men of some maturity. I hope and trust that you too feel that your time here has also been special.

Gentlemen, Valedictorians of 2002, this is my charge to you:

"open the eyes that are blind,

bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, from the prison those who sit in darkness."

Let the light kindled in you shine. Place that light where it may be seen and give light to the world.

Hold fast to the great lessons of being a diverse people, yet still a tight community, lessons learned by simply being here with each other. Lessons that teach you, not how to get into TAFE or University, to find a job, to run faster, to jump higher or to kick with greater penetration, but lessons that help you to understand your value as a person and to appreciate the individual sitting beside you, whatever his nationality, religion or wealth. Pull those around you from the dungeons of mean hearts and selfish desires. Remember the richness of this School, its basis in diversity and tradition and its wonderful sense of community. Remember those who offered you care and compassion when you needed it most.

Go from this place sure in the knowledge of the blessing and favour of each other, Hale School, and of our most loving God. It is for eternity that you will have a home in each.

The Lord, the God who loves and nurtures, be with you, in all you do.



JOHN INVERARITY - A TRIBUTE

(December, 2002)

In St Paul's Cathedral London, lies the tomb of its famous architect, Sir Christopher Wren, upon which are inscribed the words, 'If you seek my monument, look around you.' The words are inscribed in Latin but, as John Inverarity has been Headmaster in an era when Latin was banished from the TEE, on this occasion English will have to do.

There are plenty of magnificent buildings at Hale School which constitute a monument of sorts to John Inverarity, but in each case the physical structure is just the last point in a long chain of inspired planning and community building.

The Peter Wright Technology Centre was the first example. John saw the need for a subject linking design, manufacture, technology and physical creativity. He inspired staff; he required the creation of a new 8-12 technology curriculum and the resultant programme has provided fulfilment and good learning for countless boys and has attracted many to the School because of its uniqueness and appeal. The building itself, the last link in the chain, perfectly fits its purpose.

The colonnade around the quad was Tony Brand's vision, but for me is a great symbol of the connection John makes between buildings and the people in a school. The colonnade gave a very open space a human scale, linking the buildings, encouraging people into this part of the School, softening the grand, the austere lines of the Hall. The boarders, inspired by Mr Tongue, have an annual race around the quad under the colonnade, risking injury as they turn the corners between concrete and brick. A small tradition has started which adds to the identity of the School.

The Music and Drama Centre is the best example.

John wanted music to flourish at the School, but rather than the first step being to create a building, he created a passion for music amongst boys and staff with his gifts for enthusing and inspiring.

This began in the early nineties with the appointment of additional music staff, the creation of music scholarships and bursaries, establishing a music curriculum throughout the School, encouraging orchestras and choirs to the point where 500 students were taking instrument or voice lessons, and the existing facilities had been long outgrown ... all this occurred over a six year period before planning for a new building was even contemplated.

John had an almost intuitive appreciation of what the creative and visual arts can bring to the education of young people

and the pleasure they can bring to everybody in a school community. The creative energy, imagination and vitality that is put into play by the great programmes in drama, art and music in this School are very much a reflection of John's own creative energy. He has created a school where performance in drama and music and exhibitions of art are a constant feature of school life. Audiences are required, it seems, several times a week, term in and term out, bringing parents, relations and the wider community into the School very regularly to share the joy of art, music and drama experienced so richly in this School.

John's compassion for others has impressed itself on many in the School community. Many have witnessed the personal devastation he feels when comforting School families, students or staff experiencing personal tragedy or when a crisis arises, and many School families will have received great comfort from his genuine warmth and care. His sense of justice and his decision-making in difficult circumstances are always distilled through compassion.

Another side of his compassionate nature is his insistence on courtesy and good manners. He has exhorted boys on countless occasions to be gracious, to be considerate of others, to respect the wishes and needs of others, to be tolerant of those who hold different views, to temper their vigorous energy with gentleness. Catalogues of injunctions to be good, like this one, have an impact when delivered by John because they are so clearly just an expression of himself.

A further aspect of John's compassion comes to the fore each December and January when the notion of a year group being 'full' at 192 students is thrown to the wind as the number hits 200 by Christmas and 205 by mid-January, because John cannot say no to yet another wonderful family who have walked into the foyer at the School.

John Inverarity is an incredibly persuasive man. Many boys can testify to this because the Headmaster has urged them to get down to athletics training, to rowing, to get back into swimming or football when they thought they had made the decision not to continue, or to make a renewed commitment to their schoolwork.

Teachers at Hale School experience the same persuasiveness more often and at closer quarters! The following examples, all from the last 12 months, will suffice. One staff member declined John's offer to take on a particular role by means of a quick phone call, saying that if he stepped into the office he knew it would be fatal, he would be unable to resist the Headmaster's persuasion and persistence and he would have to accept. When a prospective employee whom John wants has politely and firmly withdrawn his application, has expressed the view that this School is not for him, and thanks John for the time he has spent, this is regarded by John as merely the beginning. "Just come and have a talk," will be the next line he'll use. "I'd like you to meet one or two people here." "Just come and have a walk around".... They rarely get away.

Dr Paul Dunham has allowed me to reveal something of the campaign to which he was subjected by the Headmaster, prior to accepting the Head of LOTE position. "I call it telephone stalking, David", Paul said to me. "He was relentless! Phoning constantly". On a particular Friday Paul said, "Just give me a week to think it over". Early next Monday, John rang to say: "Well, have you made your mind up?" The Headmaster's latest objective was soon achieved.

Leadership is really service. John often declares this, and his own record outside the School, of which many boys and parents may be unaware, bears this out. He was a member of the Murdoch University Senate in the mid 1990s, he is Chairman of the WA Kidney Foundation, he is Patron of the Huntington's Disease Association, is active in the WA Cancer Association. He was a member of the State Advisory Committee on Juvenile Justice (1990-1992), and was on the Boards of the WA Institute of Sport and the Fremantle Dockers. All of these roles, except the last mentioned, have been carried out unobtrusively, alongside his duties as Headmaster.

John Inverarity's leadership within the School has been leadership by example. His example of enthusiasm and encouragement and genuine concern for every student is witnessed daily and is expressed through his presence at countless School events and activities - in classroom visits, in training sessions, in rehearsals, in the School yard and the Dining Hall, at the P&F, the Old Haleians' meetings, reunions of past students.

When asked what is his vision for the School, John has sometimes answered that since a school is made up of hundreds of daily, personal interactions between individual teachers and students, his vision is that each of those interactions is always positive and affirming; characterized by good learning, good judgment, mutual respect, personal warmth, integrity and challenges physical, mental, moral or spiritual. These qualities are present in anyone's encounters with John. His personal qualities inform his 'vision', although he's skeptical of that word, and it is a vision that is simultaneously idealistic and pragmatic, like him too. John has gone a long way towards implementing such a vision at Hale School.

Under John Inverarity's Headmastership, Hale School has maintained and enhanced its longstanding community reputation for high standards of learning, for sporting excellence and above all, for a century and a half, the preparation of young men for leadership in the communities they enter, imbued with the notion of duty: the School's motto. But as only a great Headmaster can do, John has transformed the culture of the School while, at the same time, retaining the best traditions of the past.

Under John's leadership, the School has become remarkably more diverse in its curriculum, in the range of extra-curricular and cultural activities offered, in the backgrounds and interests of its students and staff. John's gift has been to foster a climate of confidence, informality, ease of human relationships, and tolerance in which very different areas of endeavour, reflecting the differing needs and interest of boys, have flourished. This underlying climate of enthusiasm for learning has benefited every aspect of school life. It is, therefore, not really a paradox that the great sporting successes, the Beazley medals, of recent years have been achieved while there has been an apparent focus on the Arts.

The tone of relaxed informality that

visitors to the School notice, together with its great sense of purpose are monuments to John no less than the buildings themselves. Equal monuments are the trust, affection, admiration and gratitude felt for him by the students, parents and staff who have been part of this community in John Inverarity's time as Headmaster.

We thank John and Jane Inverarity for the enormous contribution they have made and wish them well in the next stage of their lives.

Roy Kelley

Roy Kelley first displayed his teaching skills to Hale School in 1978 as a university student completing his final teaching practicum. So impressive was he that Ken Tregonning, the Headmaster, offered him a job, to start at the beginning of the following year and so began a distinguished contribution to the life of Hale School.

In the classroom, at the cricket nets, on the basketball court (he coached the Second V from 1981 - 1989), or as Housemaster of Faulkner (1985-89), Roy earned the respect of all who came within his compass.

Roy left Hale at the end of 1989 to return to England, which he had left as a sevenyear old, to teach Geography at Sherborne School in Dorset, England. Sherborne, typical of English boarding schools, was a strong Rugby Union school and apparently Roy impressed the locals with his enthusiasm and complete lack of knowledge of the game. (No doubt this experience will hold him in good stead in New Zealand where, apparently, they take their rugby fairly seriously).

Roy returned to Hale in July 1991, after an absence of 18 months, to become Director of Pastoral Care and Professional Development. He became Deputy Headmaster in 1995. For eleven years Roy Kelley has been for me a wonderful working companion, loyal ally and outstanding teacher and leader. In my 36 years of teaching I have known no better.

Roy Kelley is a man of integrity and astute judgment. In his roles he often needs to assess a situation quickly, make a decision and follow it through to a satisfactory conclusion. The fact that he is liked, respected, rated and trusted by students, teachers, parents and others is testimony to the quality of the relationships he establishes with all individuals in the school community. Roy was firm but fair, always good-humoured and direct but respectful in the dozens of personal interactions that made up each day of his life at School.



For 22 years, Roy Kelley has made an extraordinarily significant contribution to the life of Hale School. Never one to seek accolades or the spotlight he has won a place in the hearts of all who have known him at Hale. Roy has shown himself to be a teacher and sports coach of the highest calibre. What truly distinguishes Roy, however, is the manner in which he effortlessly, it seems, and always expertly handles the great variety of complex issues that arise in a school community. That he has won and retained such overwhelming support from the Common Room, as he has, is rare. Roy Kelley is a man of rare quality.

He left Hale School in September 2002, to prepare for his next challenge as Headmaster of King's College, Auckland, New Zealand. He took up that new role in January 2003.

King's College has chosen wisely. In Mr Kelley they have selected a Headmaster of outstanding quality and we wish Roy, his lovely wife, Ann, and their two delightful daughters, Amy and Sarah, a richly deserved, happy and fulfilling time in New Zealand.

Bill Hutchinson

Bill Hutchinson began his 14-year career at Hale School in 1985. Bill's teaching up to this time had been in Queensland, but after spending his long-service break in WA in 1984, he decided to move to Perth. Bill came to Hale as an English teacher and as an experienced athletics coach, specialising in high jump – in fact, he became a high jump coach for WAIS and coached, amongst others, Vanessa Brown and Alison Inverarity. For seven years from 1991 to 1997 Bill was Head of Riley House, a role he fulfilled with dedication and enthusiasm.

As an English teacher Bill was always generous with colleagues with both his time and his resources. He was a dedicated teacher keen to foster his student's interest in the subject. Bill's personal characteristics of endless patience with, and great warmth and affection for, his students were widely recognised. Bill was a pioneer in the teaching of Senior English at Hale School and was commissioned by the Curriculum Council to write resources and course programme booklet for the teaching of Senior English State-wide.

As athletics coach Bill brought great technical expertise in individual track and field disciplines, highly valued by school athletes and his fellow coaches. Bill's triumph on a rainy afternoon in September 1992 was to lead as Head Coach the Hale School Athletics Inters team to victory after a 40-year drought.

In 1991 Bill was appointed Head of Riley House. He filled this role tirelessly until 1997. When asked what he thought his greatest success was as Head of Riley House, he simply replied, "The thing I enjoyed most was the number of kids I was able to help". At the end of Semester 1 1997 a new position in the School, Information Services Research Manager, was created and Bill with his expertise in computing and his familiarity with current trends in educational research, was the ideal appointee. Bill had gained his PhD in 1995 and, for a few years, the School was able to benefit directly from his knowledge of theory and practice.

Bill took extended leave from Hale in 1999 to take up a position teaching ESL in a government school in Hong Kong. His role there 1999-2001 involved the move from classroom teaching to an almost completely administrative and public relations role in the school. In 2002, Bill took up a new position in Hong Kong as Deputy Head of the Sea School.

Bill Hutchinson leaves Hale after a very successful time at the School. His good humour and generosity made him a valued colleague and we thank him and wish him and Susie well for their future in Hong Kong.

Brian Heibner 1975 to 2002 (and beyond...)

Brian recalls Hale Junior School as a small community with a friendly, warm, family atmosphere. He remembers a wonderful committed staff. Teachers such as Ann Campbell, Joan Hills, Dave Haskett and Dick Holmes are recalled with fondness as is the splendid Masterin-Charge for over forty years Bertie Mill.

As an Art teacher at the Junior School, Brian experienced enormous contrasts, teaching in a Nissan Hut, which was 'as hot as hell', and moving to a beautiful new Art Centre with all the latest equipment. The family atmosphere of the Junior School extended to the large classes, wonderful parents, and the unforgettable end of year class Christmas parties and presents.

In 1985 Brian accepted Dr. Tregonning's invitation to move to the Senior School to become a 'master of all disciplines'. In the next eighteen years that would prove to be very true in his teaching of a large mixture of subjects but most boys will remember him for his expertise, and their enjoyment, in his English and Art classes.

Once Outdoor Education became a major focus in the school, Brian found another outlet for his limitless energy, enthusiasm and sheer hard work. He remembers fondly his five years as Master-in-Charge at both Wittenoom and Exmouth. Building and organising the base camp at Exmouth and later developing a wonderful rapport with Greg Harvey and his team was another highlight.

As a sportsman Brian's credentials are undoubted. He has played cricket and rugby himself at very high levels of competition and he has brought knowledge and love of those games to his coaching of boys at Hale School. He is an unassuming winner and is always gracious in defeat but his many undefeated seasons in Year 8 and Year 9 cricket and rugby cannot be allowed to pass without comment. I bid farewell and good luck to Hayden Jackson and thank him for his inspiration, professional guidance and dedicated hard work.

I am delighted to welcome Maggie Fisher to the helm of the Art Department. Maggie comes to Hale with a wealth of experience, warmth, enthusiasm and professionalism.

I am sure the boys will greatly benefit from her leadership.

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OUTDOOR EDUCATION

THE INVERARITY YEARS

It seems appropriate as we witness the change of guard in Hale School Leadership to recount the development of the Outdoor Education Programme over the last 14 years.

When Mr Inverarity started at Hale School in 1989, the Year 11 Wittenoom camp occurred for the very last time. Since the early seventies, it had involved a 14 -day expedition for all Year 11 students to Tom Price, and then into what is now Karajini National Park. The decision to cease the programme was based largely on the fact that the State Government was closing down the Wittenoom Township following the mine closure. While the tales will live forever, and are still recounted with fond memory at the odd staff function and every Old Boys' day, I never attended these camps, so can only listen in awe. By all accounts it was a priceless chapter in Hale School history.

I understand that with the end of Wittenoom, there were some early talks about ceasing the Outdoor Education Programme altogether, but there was such strong resistance from staff and Old Boys' alike, that an alternative was quickly put into place. Messrs Brian Heibner and Roger Gray stood firmly at the helm to guide this process. Each had been the Master-in-Charge of Wittenoom for some years. And so it was that the Exmouth programme was born.

Adventure Out Australia was a dominant force in providing adventure-based experiences to schools at this time, and they were contracted to run the new Hale School programme. For 1990 and 1991, the camp operated out of the Learmonth RAAF base through Adventure Out's military contacts. It was a 12-day expedition spanning the whole of the peninsula from Exmouth Gulf to Ningaloo Reef and all in between. From 1992, Bullara Station, which is still run by the Shallcross family - (Old Haleians Richard 1953, Tim 1989), was used as a second base for the venture out to the islands of Exmouth Gulf.

Simultaneously in 1991, the first Hale School Year 9 Programme began. In the four days leading up to Easter, about 160 students converged on Icy Creek Campsite in Dwellingup. Once again run by *Adventure Out Australia*, this camp was also the initiative of Brian Heibner who was doing his best to improve Outdoor Education at Hale. This is where I came in. Aside from attending Exmouth Camps, in 1992 I took over the the organisation of the Year 9 camp, and continued to run this 4-day camp with Adventure Out Australia until 1994. By 1995 however, we had decided that a camp en masse at Dwellingup with 180 students just before Easter, was in fact more detrimental than educational. We shared the location with up to 5 other schools, the staffing with Hale teachers was becoming increasingly difficult to fill, and the environment was suffering. Thus the Year 9 camp was short-lived.

Coincidentally, Brian Heibner had continued his focus on the Exmouth programme. Ever the quiet achiever, whilst on the golf course he had managed to arrange for Hale to use an acre of land at MG Kailis Gulf Fisheries in Learmonth. This was to become our new base. In 1992 Brian and Mr Keith Truman who was then Head of the Maintenance department, traveled to Exmouth to erect the first shed in time for the June Programme start. They also traveled to Wittenoom to gather fridges, freezers, pots and pans before relinquishing the Wittenoom house that had been donated by the late Lang Hancock.

From those humble beginnings the base has slowly grown year after year. In 1993, a two bedroom transportable house was also installed on the block. We still relied heavily on the good will of Kailis Fisheries for the use of toilet blocks and other services and *Adventure Out Australia* continued to supply specialist staff and equipment. In this same year Mr Richard Goater and I stayed in Exmouth for the 8-week duration to help develop and consolidate the programme. Then as the sun set on Exmouth for the last night of camp, after 10 years as *Master- in Charge* at Wittenoom, and a further 4 setting up Exmouth, Brian announced his intention to step down.

In 1994, I took over the Exmouth programme under Brian's tutelage, and did so again in 1995. After 5 years involvement on the Hale School programme, and considerable study in the discipline, I was ready to guide Hale into another era. Thus late in 1995, following discussions with the Headmaster, I was offered the opportunity to leave the Design Technology Department, and begin as the first Full Time Outdoor Education Coordinator at Hale School in 1996.

One day, before we all forget, we will put together a history of these programme changes. They are too numerous to list, suffice to say that we now have a comprehensive programme spanning Years 4 to 11 in the care of 3 full time staff.

Special tribute should be paid to two people. Mr Brian Heibner is making a very quiet and gradual exit from Hale School. He is too humble to have a fuss made of his departure, but rest assured, he will not get away so easily. While he has resigned from full time teaching, he will remain involved with the Outdoor Education Programme, assisting with victualing and managing the Exmouth Base. Without Brian none of what we now have, would exist.

The second staff change is the departure of Mr Jason Dutoit. Jason's impact on the Exmouth Property has propelled it years ahead of where it would otherwise be. His personal vision and drive led him to lobby for funds, equipment and approval. Then with his faithful sidekick Alicia, he toiled for hours, digging holes, shoveling sand, stitching up shadecloths and erecting poles. Jason will be missed not only for his energy at the Exmouth Base, but for his unique and dedicated approach to teaching the boys. They best of all know what an opportunity they were given.

I did not attend the Year 12 Valedictory Dinner this year, but was told the following day that the Outdoor Education Programme had been as significant feature of both the Valedictorian's and Captain of School's Speeches. Interestingly, I have heard on the grapevine that this has been the case at a number of other schools' Year 12 Dinners.

It is times like these that I am convinced of the value in what I do. While the benefit cannot be quantitatively measured as in other areas of the curriculum, I know that for years to come the Exmouth experience will be a focal memory of students' time at Hale. I would like to think that it may have broader reaching outcomes for the majority, but if all they learn is the value and maintenance needs of our environment, I shall be satisfied.

Hale School in 2002 confirmed its position as the State's leading academic school for boys, as judged by Year 12 results and especially TEE success.

Government Exhibitions and Awards

In 2002, Hale School students received 3 General Exhibitions and 4 Subject Exhibitions. The three General Exhibitioners, Gareth Jelenich, Vikram Rajput and Phil Georgiou were placed 8th, 18th and 25th in rank order in the State, respectively.

Our 4 Subject Exhibition winners, **David Varne** (Ancient History), **Blake Johnson** (French), **Nicholas Maricic** (Drama Studies) and **Gareth Jelenich** (Geography) topped the State in the areas of Humanities and the Arts. This is commendable achievement for a boys' school.

Hale School students also received a total of 14 Certificates of Distinction (for results in the top 0.5% of a subject). This figure is the second best ever at Hale. Although we received 24 of these certificates in 2001 the previous highest total in this category was 13, in 1991 and 2000.

The 20 Certificates of Excellence (for achieving 10 A grades over two years and no grades lower than a B) was the highest ever achieved by Hale School students.

For the first time, Hale School appeared in the West Australian League Tables for non-TEE subjects where Hale performed well, ranking 15th in the top 20 schools.

The mean TER in 2002 was 87.82 (TES 350) that was comparable with performances in recent years. Thirty-one students gained a TER of 97.5 or more, (TES 400+). This was 20% of Hale's TEE population. By comparison, 6.6% of the State TEE population scored a TER over 97.5.

The State mean TER was 79.65. 130 students or 83% of our 157 TEE students achieved more than the State mean.

The high mean TER and the outstanding results achieved by individuals are a tribute to the determination of the students and to the dedication and skill of their teachers.

The strength of the School's Academic Departments, at Year 12 level especially, is revealed by the fact that 10 subjects were ranked in the top ten for the State, based on TEE results: Accounting, Ancient History, Political and Legal Studies, English Literature, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Geography, Calculus and French. Among non-TEE subjects, Applied Technology, Graphics Technology and Modelling with Mathematics were all ranked in the top ten. In Systems Technology the top two students were from Hale School.

STUDENT SERVICE LEARNING 2002

Service Learning while similar in many ways to community service is also fundamentally different. There is a much greater emphasis on individual reflection and evaluation of the quality of the service provided. Educators are now aware of the learning opportunities service activities provide for students. Service Learning is therefore much more than simply helping those less fortunate than us.

Service Learning has blossomed this year. We are now able to provide a plethora of service learning opportunities to Year 8 and 9 students. Many Year 8 boys have been involved in the 'Beazley Project' with regular visits to the Beazley School in White Gum Valley. In addition, our students have co-ordinated various excursions with the Year 7 boys and girls form the Beazley School, all of whom have some form of disability. Without doubt, the favourite seems to have been the trout fishing in Term 2. All Year 8 students have also completed the Home Based Service exercise. Most have completed the 15 hours of service required; we hope that it doesn't all end there and we look forward to hearing that our Year 8 lads have continued to demonstrate initiative and have found ways to support those in their immediate communities, especially their families.

Every Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday forty-one year 9 boys headed off to a variety of agencies. This programme is under the auspices of 'Y Volunteer' a programme run by 'Volunteering WA' in conjunction with the School. The diversity of activities range from helping disabled primary school students, at North Beach Ed Support, through to playing chess with the elderly at the James Brown Home.

Boarders and their Heads of House have also been actively involved in Service Learning this year. The Brine House lads have been nurturing trees, while Mr Richard Tongue and Mr Brian Grimes have enjoyed participating in our regular soup patrols with the Red Cross. One of the great successes this year has been the wooden post and rail fence we built over three days for the Riding for Disabled Association (RDA). The Year 10 boarders formed a committee of interested young men to help build the fence. The group was well led by Chris Kuhn and Rob Marshall. While the fence may not be exactly straight, I doubt that it is ever going to fall over. The staff at the RDA were glowing in the commendation of our efforts and all credit to the boys, Mike Beech and Brian Grimes. Some boarders also learnt some valuable practical skills; in particular Hsien Han Lee, who, when asked to check if the post was straight looked at the level and replied "Many bubbles, many, many bubbles"; having the level upside down and at right angles to the post didn't help much!



Hale staff came up with many wonderful initiatives this year. Ms Jill Maskiell organised the Grandparents for Kids day during Term 3. A group of fourteen Hale lads from Years 8 to 10 volunteered to run a kids fun day at Hale on Sunday September 15. This is a part of a letter written to the Headmaster. It gives a pretty clear indication of the success and impact of the day.

"To all the staff and their families for making this such an extra special day for the children. Can I just say their kindness will never be forgotten. But a very big thank you must go to the Hale boys who went out of their way to take such good care of the children."

"One of the children summed up the day when she said, it was the best day of her life!"

After the Bali bombing Mr John Arkle suggested that we should explore ways of helping the staff at Royal Perth Hospital, particularly those working in the Burns Unit. So that's exactly what we did with the help of boys from each year group and some wonderful Year 8 and 9 mothers. I believe the staff and patients at the hospital were most appreciative. It was good for all of us to feel that we could assist in some way to help those affected by such a terrible and needless tragedy.

None of the activities mentioned in this report could have been possible without the much needed support of many parents staff and of course the enthusiasm and commitment of so many of our young men. However, particular mention does need to be made of two members of our Hale community, Mrs Judy Lynn and Mr Michael Beech. Their commitment, enthusiasm and tireless efforts have allowed us to provide the opportunity for many students and staff to learn from experience, the myriad of emotions, skills and challenges service to others can bring.

ACADEMIC EXTENSION / smARTS

Once again, a group of high-achieving Year 11 Hale School students was invited to participate in the second mARTS programme, run by the Arts Department of the University of Western Australia. The smARTS programme is an initiative developed by the University to encourage the study of through Arts-based works the cultivation of students' research and writing skills. By producing a research project on one of the five possible topics, students were taught effective research, writing, and editing and communication skills. As the project was a group production, students were required to interact with students from other schools in the Metropolitan Area, thus enhancing their communication and negotiating skills.

The smARTS programme gave the students involved an insight into university life as the many tutors and coordinators kept telling students that the projects were pitched at a level comparable to that expected of first year university students. For many among us, the project opened a realm of possibilities because it incorporates online communication as its main medium, with groups meeting face to face only once every few months. This online communications immersion was for many, new and exiting; giving valuable experience the in communication possibilities that will dominate our working life when we graduate.

From the start of the project in March, most students began to grasp the large scope of the task at hand after meeting their group for the first time. The desperation of the final weeks of the project was foreshadowed by the grim task of choosing a group name, with some resorting to heading names on the power point show that confronted us. Fortunately for most, the groups were well chosen, with the majority of them able to decide in a few seconds what their topic was to be. The choices presented to the groups were:

'I am, you are, we are Australian...' The formation and critique of Australian National Identity: a historical/cultural analysis of literature or popular media.

Clones, cyborgs, super-highways: representations of science in contemporary media, literature and science fiction.

Gender identity and performance in contemporary cultural practice.

Eco-cultures: the representation and impact of environmental knowledge in contemporary cultural, literary or media texts.

Imaging Asia: historical and cultural representations of Asia in contemporary cultural and literary texts.

Due to the broad scope of the topics, groups were able to define their own area of research, investigating one small section of their chosen interest.

James Pengelly's and Stephen Whiting's scientific report, 'Genetic Engineering: Test Tube Babies to Blue Bananas' confronted readers with the possible ramifications the exploitation of genetic engineering could have on our post-modern society.

The origins of the Australian identity were discussed in Liam Croy's group, The Oligarchy. Its essay, 'Myths of a Nation: Constructions of the Australian National Identity' defined the heritage with we associate so closely today.

TBA members Greg Sevel and Matthew Lydon investigated the possible effects that genetic technology could cause in the future, recommending precautionary strategies to combat the detrimental effects in 'The Ethics Report: A Cultural Technological Analysis of Advancements in Post-Modern Society'. The size of the projects undertaken was such that while at first daunting in appearance, the seven and a half thousand words permitted were not enough to express all the ideas investigated during the life of the project.

For the first time, Hale did not claim the major prize, due mainly to a few shortcomings in the UWA technical staff who lost the good copy for one of the presentations. I strongly encourage all participants in next year's programme to persevere and work hard to win back the major prize for Hale. All of the students who participated in 2002 wish to thank Mr. Bean for his time and interest and also the School and the University of Western Australia for the opportunity to be a part of this worthwhile programme.

ASTRONOMY



Late in 2001, in an effort to convince the entire Year 9 student body to join the 2002 Astronomy club, Mr Cooper, the supervising teacher, publicly embarrassed himself by dressing up as an alien and spoke to us about astronomy. Of the some 180 students in the Auditorium that day, he managed to persuade six boys -Shymon Kozlowski, Blair Nicholson, Jonathon Akers, Byron Pogson, Matthew Paikos and me to join him. Since then, this team of Year 10s has been joined by a small group of Year 8s; Marc Loney, YiFan Zhang, Conrad Pogson, Andy Pesker and Mathew Skender, who also eager to study the cosmos.

Following a slow start to the year, we finally managed to get away on an Astronomy Camp at the Bindoon airport, where Mr Cooper owns a hangar. This is an ideal location for astronomical viewing, as there is minimal light pollution from the city. It is also far enough away from everyone such that there is no interference from anyone else trying to push in behind our telescopes.

For most of the year, we have been using the School's 8-inch Meade telescope. Although this is still a reasonable telescope, to pursue DSOs (Deep Space Objects) a larger telescope was required. Mr Cooper has recently purchased his own 30-inch Obsession telescope from The Astronomy Club

the United States. Its massive size – well over 12ft tall when fully upright – makes it the largest telescope in the State.

Since our first camp in Term 1, we have observed some of the many delights of the southern sky. To name the all would be futile, but some of the most memorable ones have been the planet Venus (shrouded in clouds of acid that make it the brightest object in the sky), the Andromeda Galaxy (the closest spiral galaxy to our own), the rings of Saturn (made up of billions of small rocks and ice chunks), and several globular clusters (round 'clumps' of stars that look amazing through a telescope.)

Our endeavours have not only been limited to the field of observation. In our Wednesday meetings in S3, we have also been learning about the Big Bang (the cataclysmic explosion that created our Universe), spectroscopy (the art of identifying elements via the light they emit when excited by electricity), superstring theory (the latest theory of the universe, which states that matter is made of strings and that there are eleven dimensions), stellar evolution (the life and death of stars) and many other interesting and often complex ideas.

The culmination of this year, however, will be the Ceduna trip in early December. Here, Mr Cooper will defy all logic and take several Astronomy Club members, as well as any other students who may wish to join us, to Ceduna, in the Nullarbor Plain of South Australia. Here we will witness a rare cosmological event – a total solar eclipse. Many people may remember the partial solar eclipse in Perth in 1999, where the moon shadowed half the Sun. This time, however, the moon will cover the entire Sun's surface, allowing us to view the corona, or fiery atmosphere, of the Sun. We will be able to see (not directly – far too dangerous) solar flares and the large arcs of gas that are so famous, but seen in person by so few.

On behalf of all of the members of the Astronomy Club, I would like to thank Mr Cooper for his patient and diligent tutoring of the group, even when there are Year 8s, high on caffeine and/or sugar, snapping at his ankles.

CAREERLINK

Now in its fifth year at Hale School, Careerlink continues to provide an immediate and relevant bridge to the post-school world for many Year 12 students. Combining Off-the-job Training with Structured Workplace Learning, as well as other valuable vocational and lifeskills, the range and sophistication of the Careerlink programme continues to develop.

Beginning with just six training courses, through a variety of affiliated Registered Training Organisations, Careerlink now offers nineteen separate courses in Offthe-job training in areas as diverse as retailing, building, multimedia, tourism, sport and recreation, telecommunications, and viticulture, to name just a few. In an exciting innovation the courses have been reconfigured for 2003 to enable students to complete nationally recognised Certificate 1 or Certificate 2 training courses during Semester 1 before beginning Structured Workplace Learning during Semester 2. This will enhance the transfer of skills and abilities of students to the workplace both in the context of school based vocational studies as well as into further education and training opportunities. It is not surprising then, that a recent national survey showed that the range of opportunities provided programme by the Careerlink comprehensively cross-match to identified National Skills shortages.

At the same time the range of businesses willing to offer opportunities to our students for Structured Workplace Learning continues to grow and become more diverse. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of those parents who, through various connections, have provided opportunities to our students to participate in Structured Workplace Learning. There is a constant need for enlightened employers to provide opportunities to meet the increasing diversity of interests and talents of our Careerlink students. I would also like to encourage those who might be able to provide such an opportunity in the future to contact the School.

The relevance and quality of the Careerlink programme is also reflected in the successes achieved by the students in 2002. Five Careerlink students were short-listed for Curriculum Council awards in industry-specific areas of Structured Workplace Learning. These students were Matt Crosby and Robin Ellis (Automotive), Greg Richards (Design), Justin Pitsikas (Information Technology), and Tom Freebairn (Primary Industries). To put this in perspective, only half a dozen or so Year

12 students from the entire State are short-listed each year for second round of interviews in the process of determining the top students in each area of Structured Workplace Learning. The students will learn in early January whether they have been ultimately successful.

At an individual level for the second year running a Careerlink student has been successful in obtaining an automotive apprenticeship with Westrac Equipment, specialising in heavy machinery. This is one of the most sought after apprenticeships of its kind in Australia and each year there is fierce competition for one of the twenty or so places available. This year Matt Crosby was successful against a field of over four hundred applicants. Matt is also the joint winner, along with Greg Richards, of the Career and Industry Awareness prize, one of the two available School-based awards for students participating in the programme. The other School-based prize available to Careerlink students, of which Matt Crosby was also the recipient, was the Westscheme Award for excellence in vocational education. This is the second year that Westscheme superannuation has sponsored this award and reflects an increasing awareness of the importance and validity of vocational studies within schools in the wider community.

However, to borrow a phrase from showbusiness, everyone's a winner in the Careerlink programme. As a result of their exposure to the work environment, many students obtained apprenticeships or the opportunity for further work related training under the auspices of a specific employer before the end of the school year. Most importantly the programme enables students to clarify in their own minds the kind of future career they might want for themselves in a rapidly changing world and to position themselves in terms of attitudes and skills to achieve their goals.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the many staff at Hale School who have supported the Careerlink programme in the five years it has been in existence. Whilst successful participation in the programme requires maturity and selfdiscipline on the part of the boys, its implementation also requires considerable goodwill and flexibility from a number of staff to ensure that these students achieve their maximum potential in all their subjects.

However. such was the level of talent that Darmawan Ekaputra, and Ernest Chua, captain of the second team, managed to play in the first team at some stage during the year. In the first team this year were Captain of Chess, Adrian Walker, Edward Maradona, Tim Cheang and Ryan Hannan. In a challenging season, Hale finished agonizingly close to retaining the trophy. Going into the last match, Hale needed to win, but could only manage a draw. Despite finishing second, good chess was played, with some matches being fought down to the last pawn. Hale is in a good position to win back the trophy next year, under the strong guidance of Mr. Shaw.

The second team, captained by Ernest Chua, maintained its purpose of developing the up and coming players. With only two of the four positions guaranteed (Darmawan Ekaputra and Ernest Chua), the remaining two places were decided on the basis of form. availability and the desire to expose more players to competition play. Players used included Chris Bausor, Peter Clay, Warren Argus and Chris King. While at times comfortable wins were sacrificed for experience, all involved were able to learn and improve during the season, with the team finishing mid-table. Hale Chess also suffered from having strong Year 12s in Adrian Walker, Ryan Hannan and Ernest Chua that exposed the lack of experience in the lower boards. This was most evident when people were absent due to other commitments. However, promising players include Darmawan Ekaputra, Chris King (both potential first team players for 2003), Chris Bausor and Conrad Pogson. With continued commitment, the 'weak tail' weakness can be turned into a strength that won't leave Mr. Shaw searching for players when others drop out.

The School Chess Championships were held in Terms 3 and 4, and with many talented players, there was no clear-cut favourite. Many entered, but the Swiss system tournament (people on similar scores play each other) soon sorted the serious title contenders from the experience seekers. The final saw Adrian Walker, Chess Captain, bounce back from a shock elimination in the semi-final last year to take the trophy (winning all his games in the process) over surprise finalist Ernest Chua, who managed to defeat higher rated first team members Edward Maradona and Tim Cheang, but was unable to do it for a third time. Adrian also won the inaugural Hale Lightning Chess Championship, a fast and furious tournament where each player has five minutes in total and kings can be taken.

The House Championship was a close contest and was shared this year by Haynes and Parry.

Overall, Hale Chess has had a successful year and with many eager young players waiting in the wings and second placing in the State Chess Championship, the foundations are present for a great year in 2003.

Applied Technology-Year 11 Community Project

This year's Community Design project for the Year 11 Applied Technology students took place in conjunction with the Hale Junior School. Two classes were involved in the project, with one class making equipment for the Junior School Art Department.

The equipment made comprised a simple set of 12 'tap-tap' hammers used to drive thumb tacks into a cork board, a see-through drawing easel, rolling pins for clay work, sand pit digger, a variety of storage racks, painting frames and even a folding puppet theatre stand.

The other class worked with Ms Gamble's Year 2 class in a joint design project.

This project involved Junior School boys working with a Year 11 'buddy' in order to design and make a desk tidy. The Year 11 students acted as mentors as they guided their Year 2 partners through the design process to develop a desk tidy using the Year 2's ideas. Once a design has been agreed, the Applied Technology students made all the parts of the desk tidy, and then with the assistance of their Year 2 partner, the desk tidies were assembled, sanded down and finally painted.

Naturally, with such young and fertile minds at work, the designs from the Year 2s have been many and varied.

The project provided the opportunity for both groups of students to gain experiences not normally encountered at school. Through this exploration many innovative and creative designs emerged. Whilst all students had great success with their projects, the adjudicated winner of this year's competition was Michael McBriar with his unique shell shaped chair. Second place was Thomas Clapin and in third place was Nathan Gilmour. Certificates of Merit were also presented to Steven Bancroft, Ramon Martin, Clay Rivers, James Verboon, Kim Bayley, Jordan Sheppard, and Ben Flanagan.

Graphics Technology

Graphics Technology has continued to grow in strength in 2002 with further moves to create a subject that reflects current industry trends and intelligences, while at the same time allowing students participating in these classes to explore and develop new skills in communicating graphical ideas in both computer generated and manual mediums categories.

Graphics Technology students in Years 11 and 12 have been engaged in a number of exciting activities throughout the year and the learning curve has never been steeper for all of those participating. AUTHOR IN RESIDENCE

Simon Higgins

Hale School was privileged to have Simon Higgins, a unique and interesting Australian writer, as the author in residence for 2002. Simon gave students the opportunity to see what life is like for a writer and also to learn some tricks of the trade. His talk in the auditorium helped boys understand what goes into creating a novel - from its initial inspiration to the last word. Other sessions were held in the library, which provided boys with writing techniques and advice for their own writing.

Amidst interesting stories about publishers and novels, Simon told the boys about his experience as a Senior Constable in the South Australian Police Force. One particular recount of how he accidentally almost shot a young boy in a dark alley left the entire audience sitting on the edge of their seats. The boy was just taking a shortcut home and had reached into his shirt pocket to get his handkerchief - it was a moment of hesitation by Simon that saved the boy's life. His infectious humour also made the talks interesting and very enjoyable. He shared with the boys how he used a writing module in the shape of a pentagon with key elements of a story on each point to begin his stories. This method of developing an original idea was encouraged in English classes during the next week as a basis for creative writing.



Simon resigned from the Police Force in 1994 to work for a prominent Adelaide law firm, investigating cases for defence barristers. Not long afterwards, he became a private investigator investigating murders, missing persons and even reported UFO incidents. In his life he told how he had worked in many interesting jobs including that of disc jockey, marketing manager, laboratory assistant and even as a monster in a sideshow ghost train! After his work for the in law firm, he moved to New South Wales where he rediscovered his early passion for writing. There have been a large number of students involved in Mathematics competitions and extension activities during the year.

Australian Mathematics Competition

The annual Australian Mathematics competition sponsored by Challenge Bank was held on Tuesday July 30. A record number of 732 entries from Hale School entered the competition which attracts over 500 000 competitors from both Australia and internationally.

Once again, Hale students achieved some excellent results with the Year 8 group doing particularly well. In total six Hale students achieved scores in the top 0.3% of the State, which meant that they received prizes for their respective year groups. The students were Vikram Rajput (Year 12), Gary Butcher (Year 10), Ian McNamara (Year 9) and Dylan Hirsch, Henry Bromfield and Conrad Pogson in (Year 8). Another 18 students received High Distinctions.

Natural Mathematics Competition

Year 8 students Conrad Pogson, Andrew Clarke, Paul Reid, and Chris Mofflin entered a new 'on-line', mathematics problemsolving competition. The competing teams were predominantly from the Eastern States, except for the Hale team and also another from China. The students answered questions over designated twohour time-slots sending their responses via e-mail. Having reached the final stages, the Hale students excelled producing a total score of 98 out of 100 to win the competition from the Eastern Bilingual School from China and Canterbury College in Queensland. Congratulations go to the boys for a most commendable effort especially as their opponents were older.

Tournament of the Towns

Curtin University has invited six Hale students to represent Perth in this year's International Mathematics competition for gifted High School students. The boys involved are Ernest Chua, Philip Georgiou, Vikram Rajput, Dougal Maclaurin, Tony Zhang, Tim Leung and Peter Buckland. This competition is to be held at the beginning of December.

'Have Sum Fun' Competitions

Hale School teams again competed in the Mathematics Association 'Have Sum Fun' junior and senior competitions.

In the senior division Hale's reputation was maintained winning outright for a third time. Hale's first team of Ernest Chua, Philip Georgiou, Vikram Rajput, Michael Laczko, Dougal Maclaurin and Tony Zhang, led the way, eventually overcoming their opposition in the Northern division of the competition. Their score was also sufficient to defeat all the schools from the Southern and Country divisions. Hale School consequently received the Larry Blaker's Trophy for the third year in a row. Hale's second team of Peter Clay, Adrian Walker, David Varne, Chris Lim, Sam Lung and Andrew Moser, also performed very creditably to finish in fifth position.

In the junior division, Hale entered two teams into the competition held at St Hilda's. The Team Number 2, consisting of Chris Bausor, Adrian Yeo, Cameron Hannan, Akhil Chandra and Rhys Kidd came a very creditable fifth. The Number 1 team of Michael Cowley, Peter Buckland, Ian McNamara, Alex McFaull, Andrew Clarke and Conrad Pogson also competed well and finished in seventh spot. The students from Shenton College were the eventual winners.

Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians

A number of students in Years 8 to 10 took part in this problemsolving programme. In the Intermediate division Guang Ping Huang achieved a distinction whilst Ian McNamara and Thomas Jelenich achieved credits. In the Junior division Andrew Clarke and Yifan Zhang achieved High Distinctions and Conrad Pogson and Michael Li received Credits.

Senior and Intermediate Mathematics Contests.

Every year intrepid mathematics students undertake 4-hour examinations of an extremely demanding nature as part of the mathematics talent identification process. In Year 11 Dougal Maclaurin achieved a distinction in the Senior Contest. In the Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad, Ian McNamara (Year 9) achieved a high distinction, Peter Buckland (Year 10) a distinction, Cameron Hannan (Year 9), Tim Leung (Year 10), Alex McFaull (Year 9) and Rhys Kidd (Year 10) also performed very creditably.

Chemistry Report

2002 was another successful year in the Chemistry Department. This year's Year 12 group have worked well, and boys, parents and teachers alike eagerly anticipate good TEE results. The top Year 12 student this year was Dan Spagnolo from Havelock House and the runner-up was Gareth Jelenich from Parry House. Our congratulations go to these two young men for their outstanding success. Both have worked hard and possess very inquisitive and analytical minds.

Many boys were keen to take up the offers of extra help in 2002. Tutorials on Thursday lunchtimes, the 'Conquering Chemistry' series of workshops for Year 12s, and the pre-exam tutorials for Year 12s, were all well attended. If performance matches commitment, then we are in for a tremendously pleasing set of results from boys throughout the year groups.

140 Year 10 boys sat the National Australian Chemistry Quiz. Two boys, Marc White and Peter Buckland, won prizes for being in the top 1% of students sitting the exam. There were numerous certificates of Distinction and High Distinction. There was, however, an even more pleasingly aspect to this year's quiz results. Even with all students being 'volunteered' to sit the exam, the boys gained an average about 6% above the State average. Given that other schools can tend to offer the opportunity to a more restricted range of students, this is a very impressive statistic.

Fourteen boys, two Year 10s and twelve Year 11s, sat the National Qualifying Exam in Chemistry in an attempt to move to the next level of selection and possibly go on to represent Australia in the 2003 Chemistry Olympiad. The boys were:

MOCK TRIAL

This exciting innovative and visionary programme has already attracted musicians of the highest calibre to perform here as we aim to create a centre for musical excellence with a national and international reputation. The concerts take place in the Auditorium of the remarkable new John Inverarity Music and Drama Centre, a facility without peer; the building and the programme together have enormous potential to further the musical and artistic life of this School and this city, both in the short and long term. I am aiming to create an eclectic programme that has appeal to our own community, as well as a wider demographic, and a programme that will foster links with all sectors of music education and music industry.

Underpinning this is the vision that I have for the link between professional musicians and the music students of Hale School. In order to foster musical excellence and brilliance amongst young people, I believe that the boundaries between professional music and music education are becoming less defined, and that this is the way for music of the future. To that end, many of the contracts and agreements between the artists and the Visiting Artists' Programme incorporate the artists working with our music students in rehearsals, workshops or masterclasses. In this way, music education and professional music are inextricably linked and provide our students with a far broader and more liberal musical education than many other institutions can offer. This is the way ahead for music and this programme is visionary and unique as it paves the way for the future of music performance and music education.

The 2002 Series, the first full formal year of the programme, has been a great success, with a variety of performances, choral and instrumental featuring the following artists:

PUBLIC SPEAKING / UNYA

2002 was an excellent year for students who represented the School in Public Speaking competitions. Many of the boys meached the State Finals. The following were some of the achievements:

Beau Tonkin (Year 10) successfully qualified for the State Finals of the APEX Public Speaking Competition, capitalising on his talent for public speaking. Beau's excellent skills and natural flair were crucial in his reaching this level of achievement. He certainly has a good chance of success in competitions over the next two years.

Andrew Williams (Year 11) and Edward Mendelson (Year 12) reached the State Final of the Plain English Speaking Competition. The boys had to deliver an 8 minute prepared speech, and a four minute impromptu speech. Edward softly and persuasively gave his views on religion in his speech on the topic, Life, The Universe and Everything, while Andrew delivered his condemnation of the Americanisation of The Heart of Australia with balance, humour and rhetoric. The topic of the impromptu speech was Is it a beautiful world? and it certainly provided great scope for discussion - a difficult task to do well in just four minutes. However, the boys did

their best, relying on their individual techniques to deliver two excellent speeches.

Thanks must go to Mrs Sas for organising and coaching the boys. Her help and advice was much appreciated. 2003 looks very good indeed.

This year, Hale students formed a new Palestinian State, agreed to pay over five billion dollars worth of fees and decided on anti-terrorism measures, among other international acts through the United Nations Youth Association (UNYA) Hammarskjold Mock Security Council Competition and the UNYA State Conference.

The Mock Security Competition is just as it sounds; teams of two assume the role of an assigned country and take part in a sitting of the Security Council, arguing not from their personal viewpoints but from their country's side; amendments are proposed, rejected or argued and the mighty five (China, USA, Great Britain, France and Russia) hold power of veto and not afraid to use it. In the fifteen-member council, views often came into conflict as nations argued either for or against resolutions including the creation of a Palestinian State, the use of nuclear weapons and civil wars in various nations. Hale's representatives included Ernest Chua and John Zorbas representing China and Chris Lim and Peter Clay representing Great Britain (although in different sessions). The level of commitment by all who took part was evident in the boys' knowledge of their country's policies and alliances, knowledge that was put to the test by an impromptu resolution. While none of the Hale teams qualified for the final, all who participated deserve to be congratulated on their fine performance.

The other event that UNYA held was the State Conference, where approximately 120 high-school students, each representing a

2001/2002

The **1st XI** had an outstanding season, winning all six Darlot Cup Games and retaining the Cup for the fourth successive year. The team was well led by Theo Doropoulos whose brilliant performances over three years resulted in him being awarded Honours for cricket. Hale was sent in to bat on a grassy wicket and battled through the afternoon to be 6-196 at stumps with Alex Malcolm 52 no, being well supported by Theo Doropoulos (38) and Matt Shaw (37). Malcolm went on the next day to score his maiden Darlot Cup century, being 113 no when Hale declared its innings closed at 9-308.Wesley were soon in trouble in their innings with wickets falling regularly. Hale's bowlers all performed well with Alex Malcolm (3-42) and Matt Shaw (3-18) being the stand out performers. The fielding was of a high standard throughout. Batting a second time Hale was 4-115 from just 16 overs.

Hale 9-308 (Malcolm 113 no, Doropoulos 38, Shaw 37, R. Henderson 21) and 4-115 (Doropoulos 46, Hogg 30, Stiller 26) defeated Wesley 168 (Shaw 3-18, Malcolm 3-42, Doropoulos 2-22, Hogg 2-30)

Round 3: Christ Church

Hale won the toss and invited Christ Church to bat on a very flat wicket. After a solid start wickets fell consistently through the afternoon with the Friday stumps score being 6-138 from 62 overs. Ten more overs were required the next morning to wrap up the innings with Theo Doropoulos (4-39) and Andrew Farmer (3-27), the best of the bowlers. A run feast followed. After losing an early wicket, Theo Doropoulos (215 no) and Matt Stiller (96) put on a partnership of 222 runs. Doropoulos in scoring these runs became the most successful batsman in Hale's Darlot Cup history and its highest individual scorer. Hale's innings was closed at 2-373 from 60 overs with Alex Malcolm also 43 no. Bowling a second time Sam Hogg took two wickets in his first over and at stumps Christ Church was 6-109 thus denying Hale an outright victory.

Credit must be given to the entire Hale team for their perseverance and stamina. The bowling honours were evenly shared between Malcolm, Hogg, Doropoulos and Belben. In the 66 overs left to reply, the Hale top order batted brilliantly. Led by another fine century (153) from Theo Doropoulos, who was given good support from Moores, Malcolm, Shaw and Stiller, the team amassed a total of 340 runs for the loss of 5 wickets to win the game comfortably.

Round 5: Guildford

Hale got off to a flying start, having Guildford 4-28 after 12 overs. However, the momentum was not maintained as a couple of partnerships developed. Guildford was eventually dismissed for 192 runs. Theo Doropoulos and Sam Hogg were the main wicket takers. The Hale batting that followed was a rare treat – 510 runs from 102 overs with Theo Doropoulos scoring his third successive century, Alex Malcolm his second century for the season, Courtney Moores a stylish 94 and all other batsmen playing positive and entertaining innings'.

Guildford 192 (Doropoulos 4-31, Hogg 3-56) lost to Hale 8-510 (Malcolm 115, Doropoulos 100, Moores 94, Shaw 41, Stiller 40, Hogg 36, R. Rose 35)



Round 6: Aquinas

Having bowled Aquinas out for 138 on the first afternoon thanks to some fine pace bowling by Theo Doropoulos, Sam Hogg and Alex Malcolm, backed up by a fine debut from Year 10 Daniel Stiller, bowling very wellcontrolled leg spinners, Hale's batsmen had to work very hard for their runs. In a tense battle Hale lost seven wickets in achieving the target. Sam Hogg's 62 was outstanding and he was well supported by Theo Doropoulos and Matt Stiller. Bowling a second time Hale's persistent attack dismissed Aquinas for 148. this was an excellent result that left Hale anbeaten after five games.

Aquinas 138 (Doropoulos 4-16, Malcolm 2-22, Hogg 2-33, D. Stiller 2-33) and 148 (Doropoulos 3-31) lost to Hale 176 (Hogg 62, M. Stiller 34, Doropoulos 32).

Round 7: Scotch

For the fifth game in succession Hale fielded first and two early wickets raised the team's hopes, but a big Scotch partnership and some sloppy fielding ensured that the boys had a fight on their hands. Three late wickets on Friday night, thanks largely to a fine spell by Dan Stiller gave Hale hope of an achievable target. An outstanding bowling spell by Sam Hogg on Saturday morning enabled Hale to dismiss Scotch for 270. Sam's fine figures were 6-73. Hale's run chase started poorly and at 5-105 the team looked to be in trouble, but a fine innings from Alex Malcolm (91), well supported by Sam Hogg (43), Liam Croy (42) in his first game and Michael Farmer (an outstanding 75) saw Hale reach the total of 9-317 at stumps to win its sixth successive game and retain the Darlot Cup for a fourth straight year.

Scotch 270 (Hogg 6-73, D. Stiller 2-42) lost to Hale 9-317 (Malcolm 91, Farmer 75, Hogg 43, Croy 42, Doropoulos 29)

The Hale 2nd XI cricket side has enjoyed resounding success this season with a total of 6 wins for no loss. In fact, one of the most encouraging aspects of coaching this group of boys was seeing them develop their game over the course of the year. Attitude to training, sportsmanship and playing performance were aspects which all came into consideration when selecting sides. Consequently, teams were not 'fixed' and changed from week to week with usually, encouraging results.

The 8As proved to be a talented young cricket team in 2002, winning 5 matches and losing only one. In the bowling department many boys were given a chance to show their wares. Ravi Mistry bowled a consistent line and length with the new ball, often sending down unplayable outswingers. Twice during the season the team enjoyed hat-trick success, first with Luke Smales against Christ Church Grammar School and then a few weeks later when Ravi weaved some more magic taking another three wickets in succession. Luke Smales was undoubtedly the standout bowler for the team this year with his well-controlled leg-spin bowling. The control that Luke shows for such a young player is quite remarkable and helped the team play an attacking style of cricket with a lot of variation. Peter Cooper, Tom McCulloch and Chris Bausor bowled aggressively to take timely wickets during the season. Towards the latter part of the season Simon Ongley and Henry Bromfield added needed strength and were able to bowl effective spells.

The team had a number of very handy all-rounders who showed good athleticism, namely Selby Lee-Steere, Ben Sandhu and Tarik Sandhu. Each time these players were at the crease the team was guaranteed action, which meant wickets or runs. These players are also to be commended for their outstanding fielding. Our wicket keeper and Captain for the year was Joshua Lauren. He proved very tidy behind the stumps, taking a number clever stumpings off Luke's bowling, as well as directing the team with improving leadership.

Finally, our key batsmen need to be recognised. The team was particularly well served by David Wright and Rory O'Kane in the first part of the season with a number of good opening stands. Later in the year our leading batsman, Marcus Stoinis joined David as an opener and proved very difficult for opposition teams to get out. Marcus showed the rest of his teammates how to bat with patience and concentration, especially in the final match of the year against Scotch College when he made a magnificent 120 to lead the side to a resounding victory! All in all, it is very pleasing to report that the boys responded well to advice given to them throughout the season and they represented the School with distinction. Thus, it is fair to say that the future of Australian cricket looks very promising given the talent of this fine group of players!

The recent history of Hale rowing has been filled with success not seen at Cygnet Boatshed for many years. Only two small margins in 2001 and 2002 have stopped the 1st VIII from winning the Challenge Cup for three successive years, while the Hamer Cup (for overall boatshed performance on the day of the Head of the River), is not in the Hale trophy cabinet for the first time since 2000. Despite the apparent success of the boatshed, many rowers have come away from the 2002 P.S.A. racing season with a bitter taste in their mouths. As Mr Pritchard said many times to this year's 1st VIII, "You have to want to win so much that you can physically taste it". The boys of Hale rowing wanted the Hamer Cup and the Challenge Cup so much this year that they could taste it, but on the day of the Head of the River were just unable to win the two most

prestigious trophies in the P.S.A. competition. Perhaps 2003 will be the year!

The shed was extremely active over the summer break. The senior rowers had six training sessions per week and the juniors three. Schoolboy rowing has reached a level where to be competitive, crews must train non-stop from the start of Term Four to the Head of the River. The most pleasing aspect of the shed this year was the attendance of the Year 9s at training, a very promising sign for the future. The annual rowing camp on 27 January to

1 February and heralded the start of the racing season. The senior rowers boarded in Brine house for the first half of the camp, rowing three sessions a day from the A.N.A. boatshed. Unfortunately, the junior boys did not board at all, but this did not lessen the productivity of the camp. The main purpose of the camp was to allow the coaches to select crews. All rowers were given the opportunity to show their fitness and skill in the many water and gym sessions.

The **1st VIII** had a mixed season. The crew began training with three weights sessions and one water session per week. Coaches of the 1st VIII for the season were Nick Porzig and Mr Bean. Both men are very experienced in the sport of rowing and led the crew well. Boatshed manager Sandy Burt put many hours into the individual development of the boys in the crew as he supervised all 'winter' and land sessions. The season did not go as planned, and the crew struggled to gain a placing in the first three regattas. Despite the performances of the crew, it had already been decided to send the 1st

VIII to the National Rowing Regatta at Nagambie Lakes in Central Victoria in March. The crew stayed in excellent accommodation just out of the large town of Shepparton, and travelled to and from the regatta for five days. The racing experience gained-during the trip and the opportunity to watch Australia's best rowers, certainly inspired the crew to improve its level of performance on returning to Perth. The crew began to realise the truth in the saying, 'Coaches can only take you so far, and the rest is up to you'. At the Head of the River, Hale School 1st VIII rowed through the line just under a second behind the Christ Church crew, after leading every stroke bar four of the race. The Christ Church boys were deserving winners, however the Hale 1st VIII crew can be very proud of its 100% commitment and is to be congratulated on its outstanding effort.

The 2nd VIII had a horror season. Although progress was made in almost every training session, the boys of the crew failed to perform to potential at the regattas. Coaches, Mr Vernon and Mr McGlashan worked tirelessly with the boys throughout Term Four, the summer holidays and Term One. Unfortunately, the crew came last in every 2000 metre race of the season. must fully prepare for the Head of the River. The **2nd Quad** finished in sixth position after forming very late in the season. Special mention should be made of Ben Kelly and Regan Marchant who were always present at training and set the tone for the rest of the crew.

The Year 12 rowers say goodbye and good luck to Hale rowing, and look forward to watching and supporting the boys from the shores of the Canning River in the years to come.

This behind them and the teams from Wesley, John Curtin, All Saints' and Scotch left yet to be faced, the Hale team sat on top of the ladder with two challenging days to come.

The challenge from Wesley was shot down with a polished finish 1, 2 and 3. Next was John Curtin. Hale dealt with John Curtin in a similar performance 1, 2 and 4. The following All Saints' race would be difficult, particularly after Hale had been given a penalty, but Hale's training regime and strong communication allowed it to gain the upper hand with another win 1, 3 and 4.

Term IV 2001 saw the naming of the **1st VIII** Squad that comprised the 16 best and most promising players across all age groups. Hale Tennis also welcomed Mark Leuba, and Old Boy and Corr Cup winning captain of 1985 as the new specialist coach to take over from Rob Prowse who had stepped down after giving Hale many years of excellent service. The aim for the Gamble Cup Season was to give as many boys as possible an experience of 1st VIII tennis and also to speed up the development of some of the top Year 8 and 9s with regular training at senior level.

Akhil Chandra, Francis Cousin, Guy Doggett, Andrew Kuypers, David Lark and Sam Pike, had all made their way into the squad by the end of Term IV and were gradually showing the benefits of practising with the older boys.

With only four fixtures in the Gamble Cup there were not quite the number of opportunities for experimentation that coaches would have liked but they managed to give 15 players at least one full match experience. two years experience at this level and were clearly the backbone of the team. Throughout the day there were many outstanding efforts from the Hale athletes. Julian Lennon, against the odds, came first in U/16 1500m and open 3000m.

Phil Stroud came first in U/16 shot put and discus, setting a PSA record of 54.76m in the discus.

Yang Li was first in U/14 shot put and discus, setting a PSA record of 15.15m in shot put.

Stefan Todoroski was first in U/15 shot put, setting a PSA record of 15.22m.

There were also two winning relay teams. The U/15 team of Clinton Benjamin, Lucas Mata, Tom Anderson and Brennen Mills and the Open relay team of Simon Psaros, Ben Jones, Shih-Ming Yao and Phil Georgiou. The Open team was victorious for the second consecutive year!

2002 was also the final year for some athletes who have made outstanding contributions over their years at Hale. However, these champion boys did not win the Shield alone. Every boy who competed on the day to gain that extra point for the School and every boy who was part of developing the competitive environment at training was crucial to the team's success.

compared with the 147 kicked against Hale for a percentage of 352, underlines this point. Despite not quite being able to field a full 8C side and apart from the fact that most opposition schools did not field a third side, Hale organised competitive games each week for both an 8B and 8C side. However, in practice and spirit the 8B and 8C players were effectively one, as each training night, many a boy honed his skills under the watchful eyes of coaches Mr Young and Mr Pearce. The playing record of the 8B team for this season stood at 6 wins and 6 losses for the season and was a fair reflection on where they stood in the competition.

VALEDICTORY

The following is an edited version of an address given by Mr. Julian Dowse to the 2002 Year 12 Valedictory Assembly.

Headmaster, Dr. Isaachsen, Parents, Year 12s, students all. First, I must apologise to the Year 8,9,10 and 11 students. Of necessity, my comments today are directed towards the departing Year 12s. However, I trust that what I say will encourage all the Year 8-11 students to reflect upon the significance of your experiences at Hale. In a remarkably short period of time, it will, for all of you, be your time to leave the School.

I am proud, however, to be here today not just to speak on my behalf but on behalf of all the teachers, technicians, sports coaches, tuckshop staff and volunteers, outdoor education instructors, cooks, groundsmen, clothing store, office and administration staff who have contributed to your education and to this special day.

The most famous school valedictory address was delivered by Winston Churchill at Harrow school in England. He stood up, told the boys, "Never give up" and promptly sat down. This is good advice, especially to young Englishmen. In my experience, however, young Australians have never lacked in resilience and a willingness to 'give it a go'. So I wish to take a different path.

Although not as brief as Churchill, what I want to speak about today are those qualities that I consider to be of enduring value: those qualities that motivate me to teach, those qualities that I believe have been at the essence of your education at Hale and those qualities that I hope will renew and sustain you in the years ahead.

It is an act of treachery and subterfuge by two of the Year 12s here today that I wish to use as my starting point. It was two years ago on my maiden trip to Exmouth. The two men in question were Ed Bayford and Kingsley Rudeforth.

Ed and Kingsley convinced me to have my first full strength can of Coca-Cola since 1984, when I had imbibed to celebrate the introduction of a new voting system for the Senate.

I warned Ed and Kingsley that there might be dire consequences. Indeed there were. I received such a surge of sugar and caffeine to my nervous system that I was unable to sleep as we camped under the stars at the Scarp. Ed drifted off at midnight. Kingsley was able to keep talking until 2.00 a.m., when he too expired. So I was left alone to contemplate the majesty of the galaxy above and around me.

As I marvelled at this extraordinary canopy all I could think of was how minute our Earth is and, how upon this Earth, our own presence is so fleeting and fragile. Year 12s, in recalling my recognition of the perspective of existence, I am reminded of what I want to remind you:

-You have all been given the sacred gift of life-you have your unique chance to dwell on this earth and despite recent national traumas you have been doubly blessed to have lived in a country that by nearly objective standard is one of the most envied in the world

In remembering this we are also reminded of out most important human obligations:

-We learn how important it is to remain a sense of perspective about our ambitions and achievements-remember one generation comes and one generation passes away but the earth abides forever

-We learn that whatever our achievements we can all contribute to the common dignity of humanity by giving to and caring for other human beings

-We learn that the richness of our human experience can never be assessed by a coarse measurement of material riches but in the investments we make in the pursuit of nobility, respect and integrity.

Trust me when I say to you that there has never been a monument built to anyone in the world that has been inscribed with the words-*Here lies*

John Smith- he paid off his mortgage 10 years early.

We learn that the greatest courage of all is moral courage.

Gandhi, a morally courageous man, was once asked what he thought of Western civilisation and he replied, "that he thought it would be a good idea".

Whilst I am not as bleak in my view of the West, I do see some challenges in the years ahead for our society that I hope the valedicts can respond to:

I hope that you all can contribute to a renaissance of civility. It seems to me that we have moved from an age of dinner parties to road rage-from letters to SMS text messages-whatever they are. And, of course, the perversely named chat rooms that have done nothing except destroy the essence of good conversation.

Remember, genuine communication and time spent with your friends and loved ones shall be the foundation of your happiness, no matter what your personal achievements are.

I hope you all continue to strive. Remember the great challenges are great because they are great. It was a great challenge to federate this nation. It was and is a great challenge to irrigate this nation in a sustainable manner. It shall be a great challenge to defend democracy, the rule of law and human rights around the world. But strive to meet these challenges we must.

As a teacher, and especially as a teacher of politics and history, I hope that you all participate in restoring honour to the world of politics and respect to the domain of education. When all is said and done our parliaments, schools and universities remain institutions central to dispensing the essence of our civilisation.

You shall all require a strong sense of personal conviction. A personal faith if you will. Remember living by a sense of faith is difficult but having no faith at all is something altogether more difficult. Life is never fully lived if lived for the facile, material and short term.

It will probably come as a genuine shock to the valedicts that this day is for so many people at Hale, especially the teachers, a genuine wrench. For all of us have to acknowledge that aside from you bizarre taste in 'hell joy sick music', radio stations and packet noodles, you have been wonderful teachers for us.

I return to the Exmouth scarp. Looking at the constellations, Hamlet would no doubt have reminded me:

"It will be short. The interim is mine,

And a man's life is no more than to say one".

And so the class of 2002, you have this wonderful gift of one. Another of Shakespeare's tragic figures MacBeth tarnished his gift. He abandoned his moral integrity and pursued reckless and selfish ambition believing that a usurped throne would make him whole.

When he faced the folly and consequences of his actions that destroyed him, he was confronted by the utter emptiness of his experience:

"My life is fallen

And all those things that should accompany old age Love, honour, troops of friends I must look not to have".

Year 12s –let not your lives be fallen ones. I wish you lives that extend to a wonderfully old age. Above all else I wish you lives that are gloriously rich because they are abundant with troops of friends and full of love and honour.

SPANISH

2002 is the first year that all boys at Hale Junior School have had the opportunity to study Spanish, although Years 5-7 began Spanish part way through 2001. Our focus combined learning the language whilst exploring the Spanish-speaking world. So, one minute we could be discussing what desserts are typically eaten in Spain and the next, writing a brief conversation between Spanish speakers.

Learning another language is a fascinating endeavour and teaching Spanish enables me to share my excitement about language learning with the boys. In class we concentrate on conversational language, so, for example, in Year 7, we spend a semester focussing on specific language that they would use if visiting a Spanish speaking country. Using a foreign language with native speakers is of course the greatest motivation for learning and is a lot of fun! Spanish speakers greatly appreciate our efforts to speak Spanish and it has been great to learn that some boys have 'tried out' their Spanish on members of the Spanish speaking community!

A fundamental goal of the language programme, as our world becomes more of a global village, is to increase understanding between people of different nationalities, leading to tolerance and respect for other cultures and lifestyles. If you happen to join a Spanish lesson you might see the boys involved in looking at flags, describing their pets, shopping, singing songs, making paper flowers, writing little plays, discussing verbs, listening to different Spanish speakers on CD, watching videos of dances, creating menus, cooking tortillas (at school and at home!), listening intently to different types of music, creating their own phrase books and generally discussing the Spanish way of life.

The boys showed off their talents and knowledge, as well as great accents, in two assemblies – one run by Year 5LP and the other, a Latino Talent Quest in conjunction with the boys of 5DP. Throughout the year all Hale Junior School staff have provided terrific support and great tolerance of the noisy Spanish teacher with the blue trolley!

It has been a delight to see how the boys have embraced the challenge of learning Spanish and the enthusiasm they show for finding out about other people and cultures. To all the boys and their parents - Muchisimas gracias! - for your wonderful support.

YEAR 7 REPORT

Year 7 2002 began with twenty-eight new boys and teachers, Mr McCabe and Mr Wight joining Ms Morris and Mr Valentine in Year 7.

Early in Term 1, Year 7 boys boarded a luxurious 5 star coach and journeyed to 'Big Valley Campsite' in Margaret River. Over the next five nights we slept in small 4-man tents, prepared our meals in a small tin shed with nothing but a small stove and a sink and played cricket in a rather dead paddock.

Our first Camp activity involved teaching ourselves how to build sixman rafts out of the inner tubes of tractor tires and ropes and then participating in a race across a dam. On the second day the whole campsite was woken up by the mournful call of the rooster in the chicken coop. Over the next four days we competed in many fun activities including caving in the Calgardup and Giant's Caves at Margaret River. One of the camp instructors almost got stuck crawling through a narrow gap in the cave, famously known as the Rebirth Canal! We also went kayaking down the Blackwood River to an exciting overnight bush camp. At night we played stealth at the end of which, Ms Morris and the camp instructors soaked

all the students and got rather wet themselves! Camp was a great time to get to know each other, learn new skills and have a lot of fun.

From the exciting future of housing in the eco-housing project to the horrors of the past in the Pacific War, a range of issues in the 2002 Science and SOSE programme has challenged the students of Year 7. With technology studies linked to Science and SOSE, we had the opportunity to organise and present our research using a range of applications: a study of Australia's National Parks using PowerPoint; an interactive timeline with dates from the Pacific War in Excel and a Web-based collaborative project to rescue the Earth from comet destruction. A major highlight of the term was the ecohousing open morning when all students had the opportunity to display their models and the winners of the best design was judged by Town Planning expert, Mr Andrew Howe.

This year, computers have been used widely in the areas of Language, Social Studies and Science. Shared by the three Year 7 classes, all laptops are installed with Microsoft Office 2000, PowerPoint, Access, Binder, Excel, Word and Publisher, allowing the students to create just about anything they want. In Term 2 the students of 7W put together a magnificent PowerPoint slideshow titled, 'An Interview with Jesus', with the aid of student teacher Miss Rudeforth. In Term 3 the students of 7M completed an interesting, philosophical assignment on Jostein Gaarder's book, 'Sophie's World'. Also in Term 3, the 7VM class produced an assignment on 'The Ghost Downstairs', by Leon Garfield after which it was rumoured that the boys were seen making a gravestone and beetroot soup late at night on the School veranda! As part of the Laptop programme next year, each Year 7 boy will be given his own computer to work on and be able to take it home with him. I'm sure that many current Year 7 boys are disappointed that they will not be part of this innovation!

Towards the end of Year 7, the boys enjoyed two days of activities with the Year 7 girls of Saint Mary's at Point Walter. Two beautiful sunny days were spent challenging physical strength, problem solving skills, team skills, social skills and bravery! Some of the highlights were abseiling, Possum Glider, Gone in 60 Minutes and kayaking.

2002 has left the Year 7 boys with many happy memories and lasting friendships as they move on into Senior School. Good luck everyone!
