


CYGNET COMMITTEE 2003







THE HEADMASTER



HEADMASTER SG Meade

It is an enormous honour to be presenting the School's Speech Morning report in its 145th year. I would like to especially welcome Dr Wood, whose life has been one of initiative, determination and service. These characteristics sit very comfortably with this School's ethos. We congratulate her on her most recent award as the West Australian of the Year and thank her for agreeing to present the prizes.

In my first School Assembly this year, I spoke of Kurt Hahn, the founder of Outward Bound Australia, and a school called Gordonstoun set in rugged surroundings in Scotland, who used to quote an ancient proverb to motivate his students to new experiences. It was:

"A lion chased me up a tree and I enjoyed the view from the top."

I explained my interpretation of the quote, as being that at times you have to be pushed into action, to try something different, but that in the end you will enjoy the result once you have completed the job. I said I was hoping the boys would climb the tree themselves, not needing the lions sitting behind me to chase them; that it takes discipline and commitment to try something new and work hard at it, but I urged them to have a go. And most boys have. The participation levels in Drama, Theatresports, and Service Learning programmes, Inter-school sport and music, among other activities that are integral to the education provided here, have been very high; not necessarily to be the best, but to have experienced the challenges that present themselves in so many areas of Hale School

One of the first really strong impressions I had of the School occurred on Old Boys'

Day. In a hall packed with students, staff and Old Boys, Brad Kerin sang a Frank Sinatra song accompanied only by a piano. Being comfortable in performance mode, it was probably not a big deal to Brad. To hear the acknowledgement from the

audience, particularly the boys, of his performance, was a big deal to me. Later in the year David Helfgott, the worldrenowned pianist, visited the School for a performance and masterclass. Mr Watt's senior English group had a class with him to discuss his life. The off-putting experience of having a man whom one has not met hug you in the corridor and basically not let go while whispering in your ear can be confronting to say the least. But the boys took it in their stride, accepting this unconventional, yet brilliant man for who he is. And in Term 3, one of the boarding residents suffered the tragic loss of his sister. I was asked whether the School could assist in any way with the cost of the flight back to Botswana to enable Mzi to attend the funeral. Before I had a chance to respond, a collection had been organised by the boys in the boarding house. 50 boys raised \$1000. The values of the boys in these and many other situations that occurred this year were sound.

One of the secrets to a good school is good staff - this staff is very good. But they are now meant to do so much. We might need a new teacher of History, but if we are to meet the expectations that are made of us and by us, he or she needs to be a brilliant cricket coach, a front row forward who can recognise a long neck, a front desk first violinist, front of house for drama productions, mad about festivals, an ideas man, an administrative whiz, good with boys, tactful with parents, kind to Headmasters, a debater, generous with his time, hold an endorsed licence to drive buses, keen on the outdoors, a good Christian, hold a first aid certificate, and of course be a first class teacher of History. When you have a good staff, other people want them!

This year, we farewell two senior members of the staff. Mrs Mary Pfister, formally Head of Art who has been on leave throughout 2003, and the Head of English, Mr Ed Lawless. When I first arrived I found it somewhat contradictory to have an American in charge of English at the School, but very soon I realised why this was the case. Mr Lawless is an extraordinary teacher, a man of perception, compassion and integrity who has been a dynamic part of the classroom, the Common Room and the Hale School community for six years. He leaves us to 'enjoy the view' from the position of Head of Senior School at All Saints' Anglican School on the Gold Coast. We wish Mr Lawless, Annemarie and Mira every happiness in the next stage of their

At this point, I would like to thank the dedicated and tolerant Senior School Executive who have shouldered so much this year while I have familiarised myself with the machinations of the school. Mr Mike Shearer, Mr Mike Giles, Mr Richard Goater, Mr Jim Bausor, and then Mr David Bean, Mr Sean Henderson and Mr Lawless are efficient, productive

and good-humoured. I have looked at the management structure of the School during the year, and made appointments to take effect, or in some cases to formalise the current situation, from the commencement of next year. Mr Goater has been appointed as the newly created Director of Pastoral Care, Mr Henderson can now formalise so much of what he has done with quiet yet unerring efficiency this year in a new role as Assistant to the Deputy and Year 12 Co-ordinator. Mr Ivan MacLean takes on the role as Learning Technologies Manager, with the implementation of the notebook programme in Year 8 next year.

I have pleasure in announcing that Mr David Bean will assume the role of Deputy Head from the commencement of 2004. He will lead a staff committed to providing education of the highest quality.

Wherever I look, I see teachers involving themselves in every aspect of the boys' education. For example, if I happen to be a little tardy getting to one of my Year 8 Values classes, I will invariably find Mr Biddle in there discussing his values with the boys. He will be found coaching basketball in Summer, hockey in Winter, athletics every day of the season and in every discipline, giving advice about student leaders, as well as mentoring the staff who need to be mentored, whether they are new to the School or not. There are many others like him who give of themselves selflessly. Last Friday, as I trundled down the drive ducking and weaving the wayward footballs of the boarders at about 6 o'clock, I came across Mr Weston dragging a large red wheelie bin in front of Wilson House. 'Goodness,' I thought, 'they've gone a bit overboard with the detentions!', but then found out that he and Mr Young had just returned from a successful cricket expedition with the 9As and Bs to Guildford. The cricket kits were carefully packed in the wheelie bin for easy transport. They could not talk for long as they had to hop on the bus taking the Year 8 and 9 students to a social event at Hillarys, not returning until after 10pm. I guess there was some exam marking and report writing for them to do over the weekend as well. Such is the commitment of the Hale staff, but I am sure the boys and parents know that.

The results of the Year 12 leavers in 2002 were outstanding. 3 General Exhibitions, 4 Subject Exhibitions, 14 Certificates of Distinction, 20 Certificates of Excellence, and an award for Excellence in Vocational Education and Training. The bar has been set very high. But I am at pains to point out that there are problems with judging a school, its students and staff on a single TEE score. Education goes much deeper than that. For one boy a TER of 80 may be just as meritorious as one of 97 for another. If a real love of learning, together with a strong work ethic, have been developed, then that may be more important than a final ranking or score.



Indeed, we should be measuring success by the extent to which these young men are ready to lead fulfilling, happy, emotionally satisfying lives. In helping them achieve these academic results in the context of other challenges as well - in sporting, cultural, intellectual and spiritual areas - we, as parents and teachers of Hale School students, have helped give them a wonderful start.

Each week, you will see teams from other schools coached by non-teaching staff. Fine though they may be, the presence of a staff member on the sidelines is a strength of Hale. The new, highly effective Sportsmaster, Mr Barron has worked tirelessly to ensure we have as many quality coaches as possible and also to increase the opportunities for the boys to represent the School.

I have undying admiration for anyone who rows and to see them hard at it during the camp in January only strengthened that thought. Scott Goodbody led the shed well and the two Year 10 crews were outstanding throughout the season. Outstanding performances abound: Jeff Yip swimming all over the top of the Aquinas swimmer in the final relay of the night to cement an Inter-School swimming victory; the immensely talented and very young 1st VIII with the likes of Matt Ebden and Guy Doggett winning the Corr Cup for tennis, Keith Hauck and Courtney Moores captaining competitive basketball and cricket teams; an extremely talented team playing a wonderful brand of rugby with skills from - 15; a doggedly determined 1st XVIII winning the Alcock Cup with that memorable game at Trinity; the emergence of cross country running as a genuine team sport where the strong performances week after week by Julian Lennon, Tom Clapin and Christian Cywicki needed the support of the other boys in the squad. And so the list continues right through the sports and the age groups. Most weeks in the Assembly, the feats of the Yr 8 and 9 teams were also mentioned with significant achievements liberally occurring throughout. Our State champion debaters, the performers and stage crew in Stalk, Being Divine and Animal Farm; the circus skills boys; the musical talents of so many, we all know of many others. I want the School community to know and recognise the many talents that live within our School.

Academic departments are doing amazing things, the boys in the Science, Maths, Music, and French, are scooping the pools with awards and results, yet I have to push to get the results. The boys are keen to recognise the achievements of others. I need to hear about them.

Looking forward, we are keen to provide more leadership opportunities for the boys as they move through the School. Mr Goater is keen to initiate a Peer Support programme involving boys in Year 11 working with boys in Year 8. This can only enhance the student leadership currently in the School, and that is not a reflection on the Year 12 leadership this year. Captain of School Raphaël de Vietri has been superb. From the moment he offered his father's assistance to help unpack the furniture trucks when we arrived

in January, I knew he was dedicated to the School, working tirelessly to create an environment that was spirited, positive and proud. His leadership style has been inspired and highly efficient and he leaves us today as a young man in whom we have enormous faith. I salute Raphaël and thank him. Ably assisted by Mathew Hyde, who moved quietly, yet with enormous influence, through the School, they led the Prefects, the Year 12s and the wider student body with distinction.

I would now like to announce the School Prefect team for next year. Before I do, I recognise that anyone who influences the thoughts or actions of others is leading. Most senior boys have leadership potential and it is always difficult to select a small group to be part of this team. However, we are confident that these boys will perform the role asked of them with dedication and whole-hearted enthusiasm. The following boys have been selected to be School Prefects in 2004:

The boys selected to be Captain and Vice-Captain of Hale School in 2004 are firstly, Vice-Captain, Michael Cowley and Captain of School, Phillip Stroud. They will lead a strong team.

Next year, in a strengthening of the already very significant Outdoor Education programme, the camps will be placed in a period spanning the first five weeks of Term 3 with one or two camps during the July break. Mr Harvey and his team of dedicated staff run a programme that is the envy of most schools and they are keen to use the refined schedule to their advantage. The Year 8s will also be engaging in a four-day programme in the first few weeks of Term 2 to maintain continuity in the outdoor education programme at the School.

The boarding facility is on target for a September 2004 completion. It is exciting to watch it get bigger and biggerand bigger each day. There is much to do in terms of the management of the new Houses and we will keep everyone informed of decisions on this front as they are made. I take this opportunity to thank the four Heads of the Boarding Houses and their families for the time and genuine care they give to the boys in their House. Their commitment is one that goes way beyond any possible remuneration that could be offered.

All this, added to the introduction in Year 8 of the notebook programme so successfully implemented in Year 7 this year, will keep us busy next year. It will be an exciting year.

In a recent speech by General Peter Cosgrove to senior educators in the ACT, he spoke of teaching as a vocation. He likened teaching to the defence forces. I think all teachers have made the same comparison at times! He said that one does not devote a

lifetime of effort to either, if one is motivated by wealth or prestige. Each imposes enormous responsibilities on its members for the well being of others. At times both feel undervalued and in both cases, our failings are noted and magnified and our success is sometimes more difficult to define

I ask boys and parents to join with me in thanking the staff for their dedicated efforts this year.

I would also like to acknowledge the Board of Governors. It is a Board with positive and creative energy and has been of enormous assistance to me in my first year. The members of the Board have reached out supportively but not intrusively. We are the richer for their contributions. Earlier, you heard of Dr Isaachsen's enormous contribution to Hale School. We are all indebted to his true sense of duty to his school. Dr Constable who, along with Dr Isaachsen, has a lot to answer for as they were on the selection subcommittee who nominated me for the position at Hale has a sharply tuned mind for educational issues and her perspective on all areas of discussion has been invaluable. These two Board members have given me wise counsel and support throughout the year and I will miss their input. I too thank them for their devotion to Hale School over many years.

The Board has been led effectively by Mr David Aitken this year. He is never too tired or too busy to return fire on the phone or email at all hours of the day and night. I have enjoyed working with him this year. His passion for the School is obvious.

This time last year I received a letter, or probably a reflection is a better term, from a parent of a Year 12 boy. It referred to what she termed the humbling experience of raising children. She wrote "But the biggest mistake I made is the one that most of us make when doing this. I did not live the moment enough. This is particularly clear now that the moment is gone, captured only in photographs. There is one picture of the three of them sitting on the grass on a quilt in the shadow of a swing set on a Summer day aged 6, 4 and 1. And I wish I could remember what we ate, and what we talked about, and how they sounded, and how they looked when they slept that night. I wish I had not been in such a hurry to get on to the next thing: dinner, bath, book and bed. I wish I had treasured the doing a little more and the getting it done a little less." Humbling and insightful words.

And so I wish everyone a very happy, safe and holy Christmas with their families and hope that they take the time to enjoy the doing, not just the getting it done. We share a common vision of giving our sons love, respect and opportunities to grow. Between us we are providing both the security and the challenges that will enable them to develop.

Schools do not come much better than this one. It is worth every bit of the effort that we all put into it, boys and adults alike. I commend Hale to your loyal and continued support.

CAPTAIN OF SCHOOL

Captain of School's Speech Day Address 2003

Today, we reflect on the yearlong journey we have taken together in 2003. Today we celebrate endeavour as well as achievement; we celebrate the everchanging life of the School as well as the long-standing traditions that have made it great; we celebrate a beginning and an end, renewal as well as change.

We are humbled by the presence of our Guest of Honour. Dr. Wood, I speak on behalf of everyone in saying thank you for being here today, for sharing your story. Many leaders throughout history have pointed out the truth to humanity - that where force rules, there is no love, and where love reigns, force does not count. Through your strong spirit, Dr. Wood, you have used your knowledge and your leadership to show just this. In your creative and compassionate response to the Bali victims, you perhaps subconsciously recognized the nature of the psyche that had plunged the nation into shock and far from allowing yourself to be suppressed by this onslaught, you used your vocation to fight it. As I see it, you did what leaders around the world should be doing; you rose to the majestic heights of meeting physical force with generosity of spirit. Thus, a time of destruction and malevolence was transformed into a time for caring and compassion. It is fortuitous that Dr. Wood is here today because I wish to use the characteristics for which she has become known as a springboard for the ideas I want to discuss.

Carl Jung pointed out that Christ's religion of love was the exact psychosocial opposite to the politics of power of the Roman Empire. I point out today that this "religion" (for want of a better word) of love, a lifestyle characterised by a radical, non-violent, sacrificial compassion of people like Dr Wood, is the exact opposite to our contemporary world environment of unrest and mistrust. However, it is the former ethos that is promoted at Hale School.

The essence of being a valuable member of any society, and not least the small community of Hale School, is to have a mind and heart open to this way of life. I am not suggesting that we should all subscribe to a certain set of dogmas, or

that we should all obey a certain set of rules and regulations. No, I simply propose, and it is nothing new, that we have our hearts and minds open to a life committed to

love and justice. I am an idealistic teenager, if you haven't already guessed, but I have tried to put my idealism into practice in the little world of school. It is this modus operandi to which the Prefects of 2003 and I have tried to commit ourselves - a commitment to love and to justice - working with other students, particularly the younger boys or the marginalized or disadvantaged, so as to help them realise their potential as valuable members of the School community. To illustrate this I should like to give you some examples of the small things I have enjoyed most about this year. They include playing a game of cricket with some Year 8s, or having a tug-of-war with the Year 9s, spending lunchtimes coaching junior House debaters, or relaxing and having a meal with some younger boys in the dining hall after a hard athletics training session. It was at times like these that I really enjoyed being a School prefect. I would like to thank the prefect team for sharing this unforgettable year with me.

Although 2003 has been an historic transition period in the life of the School I feel little need to catalogue the events of the year or to comment on the change of leadership that has taken place. All I will say is that I feel absolutely confident that the School is in excellent and caring hands and will continue to prosper under people who realise the importance of both continuity and change.

To you, the boys who will return to Hale next year, I have some advice. One of the greatest gifts this School offers you is the gift of opportunity. You have heard this before, I know, but that is only because it is true and important. Taking up the opportunities with enthusiasm and

passion is what made the difference for me. Hale School was once described as a great hallway of doors ready to be opened (Scott Murray, Captain of School 2001). I think you should remember this image when you return to school next year and see which doors you can open and see how far the opportunities offered there can take you. The most enjoyable thing about being at school is being around your mates, and I feel the best way for a Hale boy to experience true camaraderie is for him to be meaningfully engaged in the life of his School.

This year's Year 12 group was the first to experience through the Pastoral Care system now in place - we were the guinea pigs. Mentioning this detail may at first seem of little importance but I feel this is an important detail to note as it connects my ideas with the education system that has shaped my thinking. The 2003 group of Year 12s represent a new wave of Hale students who have been shaped by the Pastoral Care system that they pioneered. The benefits of the Pastoral Care System far outweigh its shortcomings and it is my belief that the Service Learning element of this system has given students an opportunity to fulfil the sense of their school motto 'Duty'.

I recognize that the motto 'Duty' may appear somewhat stern and formulated to newcomers of the School. Having said that, I like the way we have been able to reinvent the term, giving it new meaning and significance over the years. Service Learning is an example of this. It has grown from a concept into a reality over the five years I have been at Hale Senior School. As a community, Hale has progressed to the realisation that charity, compassion and duty means more than a few gold coin donations during the year. Many people have shown us that time and effort put into the community is what service is all about. Our last headmaster is but one example of this. What I hope to see is that Hale students continue to have the opportunity to put this concept into practice through an ever-strengthening curriculum.

In concluding this address, I wish to thank all the teachers, coaches, staff, parents, and boys who have made my years at Hale so special. I congratulate Philip Stroud and the prefect team who will lead the School next year and wish them well in what promises to be a bright and fruitful year.

BISHOP HALE SAILS TO THE SWAN RIVER in 1857

Dr Mathew Blagden Hale first came to Australia when he was appointed Archdeacon to Bishop Short in Adelaide in 1847. Ten years later, he was appointed the first Anglican Bishop of Perth and was mosecrated at Lambeth Palace in London by the Archbishop of Canterbury on 27 July 1857.

The new bishop's party boarded the sailing ship "Nile" on 23 September 1857. Hale later wrote to a friend in England, telling him of a harrowing ordeal:

"...there were 270 men, many of them of desperate character and bent on mischief, surned loose in a low lighted prison between the decks of the Nile, without any officer on the ship having any previous experience with these types of desperate men. In the darkness it was easy for the prisoners to conceal themselves to avoid detection. Shortly after we put to sea the wrote) it became evident that the prisoners were in an unsettled and unsatisfactory state of mind. There was a constant tendency towards insolence and depredation while they were on deck for airing.

On one occasion the harness cart in which the meat was stored was plundered. On another occasion the chief mate discovered a prisoner in the act of carrying off a goase from the longboat, He pursued the prisoner. This gave rise to jeers and taunts from the other prisoners on the deck; some of them shouted to him that he had better count the sheep and see whether they were all right. The offender was punished and placed in the 'black box'. This is a box that is a little larger than a coffin. When a man is put in it he is either left standing in a perpendicular position, or laid down upon the deck. Another man was detected in the act of passing down an iron crowbar from the deck into the prison. He was also rewarded with a period in the black box.

On the evening of Thursday October 1, the chaplain went to the prison to conduct a service. He had the prisoners sing some verses of hymn and then they commenced to scream and whistle through their fingers. They used bad and abusive language and shouted out 'we'll do for you'. The surgeon superintendent was standing under the hatchway a little behind Mr Wright and both had to retire after finding it impossible to proceed with the service.

On the night of October 4, one of the warders was assaulted and injured. A second warder also received a blow. For this disorderly conduct six men were seized during the next afternoon just as it was getting dark. These men received corporal punishment and their ringleader was detained in the black box. The other five were placed in irons and sent below with the rest of the prisoners, but in a short time they had freed themselves from the irons.

The bishop went on to write that while the paying passengers were at tea in the saloon one evening they became aware of a seriout disturbance in the prison. Everything was immediately in confusion. The women and families on the ship were afraid to remain on their own. They came crowding in a terrified manner into the cuddy and up to the poop deck.

All the guards were issued with arms. The other men on the ship were mustered and furnished with cuttasses. When the prisoners attacked the bulkhead and bars of the gaol below deck (about 12 g'clock) a party of the guard was marched to the bars to intimidate the rioters by firing on them. The prisoners then assailed the officers and surgeon with the most violent abuse. They were informed of the manner in which they all would be murdered when they felt into the prisoners' hands. Two officers were told that they would 'walk the plank', another that he would be cut up piecemeal. The women were also threatened and advised of the manner they would be treated when the ship was taken. The appearance of the soldiers at the prison bars seemed to have a restraining effect and after a time the tumult abated.

... floggings were carried out soon after daylight in the morning. To release men after their punishment back among the other prisoners would be a mistake, so the captain decided that they should be interned in isolation in a special cell that was erected near the forecastle of the ship. All other prisoners were warned not to communicate with them.

Bishop Hale made a strong request to the captain for he, the surgeon and the commanding army officer on the ship to be allowed to express their views. Hale bluntly told them all that if the disturbances were allowed to continue there would soon be bloodshed and probably loss of life on the ship. He suggested to the captain that the ship should head for a British naval station, either Ascension or St. Helena Island. He formed the opinion that many of the prisoners should be returned to England and not taken to the Swan River Colony; in his opinion there were nearer forty than thirty dangerous prisoners on the ship and they were not wanted in the colony, Captain Johnson later altered course and headed for Bahia (Salvador) in Argentina.

When the 'Nile' arrived there was a British

warship anchored in the harbour. Captain Johnson had his men row him to the manof-war. After the long consultation with the naval officer, Captain Johnson made a decision to continue the voyage to Fremantle. He had no option - the owner of the ship had been specifically paid to convey up to forty dangerous convicts to the Swan River Colony. The rates were a little over eight pounds for an average prisoner but up to twelve pounds for a dangerous one. Johnson knew that he had ten 'twelve-pounders' locked up in the forecastle of the Nile and up to thirty 'ten and eleven-pounders' in the prison below deck.

Later it was established that one of the prisoner was completely unfit for the purposes of colonisation. He had passed under many feigned names (at least fifteen) and had been moved to no less than seventeen different prisons in England. He had been guilty of violent conduct, murderous assaults upon warders, attempts upon the tives of governors of prisons. breaking out of gaol and outrageous behaviour of every description ... So dangerous was he on the ship he was kept lashed down hand and foot for upwards of a prinight at a time. The bishop expressed the view that if anyone wished to do great harm to the ship's company or to the inhabitants of a colony there would no better method than to turn this man loose among them.

The Nile arrived at Fremantle on 1 January 1858. Captain Johnson was a relieved man for he knew that there had been a real threat to his ship.

Bishop Hale questioned the motives of the prison officials in England who had sent such vicious men to the Swan River Colony. He said that the class of convict transported to the Western Australian colony, by agreement, was intended to be men of good behaviour (who) could become useful members of the community. The prison authorities had blatantly defied the criteria for selection of prisoners that had been so clearly stated before the House of Lords. The bishop had taken passage with many desperate men, some of whom in his opinion had been lucky to escape hanging.

Note: Bishop Hale had published a book on the convict system earlier that year ealled, "THE TRANSPORTATION QUESTION". In it he advocated a reform rather than retribution approach in the treatment of convicts. One wonders if his precarious voyage may have altered his benign opinions!

Chaplain's Valedictory Address: Father Tim Russell

First Reading: Genesis 32:24-28: "And Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until the breaking of the day. When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he touched the hollow of his thigh; and Jacob's thigh was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. Then he said, "Let me go, for the day is breaking." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me." And he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." Then he said, "Your name shall no more be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with men, and have prevailed." (Revised Standard Version)

Gospel Reading: Luke 2:41-52: "Now his parents went to Jerusalem every year at the feast of the Passover. And when he was twelve years old, they went up according to custom; and when the feast was ended, as they were returning, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem. His parents did not know it, but supposing him to be in the company they went a day's journey, and they sought him among their kinsfolk and acquaintances; and when they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem, seeking him. After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions; and all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers. And when they saw him they were astonished; and his mother said to him, "Son, why have you treated us so: Behold, your father and I have been looking for you anxiously." And he said to them, "How is it that you sought me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" And they did not understand the saying which he spoke to them. And he went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them; and his mother kept all these things in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom and in stature, and in favour with God and man." (Revised Standard Version)

Since most of you began here at Hale the world both inside and outside the School has changed. Change that, at times, has been radical and swift. I need not remind you of events that have changed the world in an instant. We have awoken to find that from one day to the next our world has been irrevocably altered. The gravity and impact of some of the defining moments of your years at Hale have been immediate. The passing of your friend Leicester is a profound example of this and it has indelibly marked your growth. At other times the change has been barely noticed. This sort of change can only be seen when we stop, at moments like these, to look back on who we were.

I think of those of you like Troy Hancock who, since Year 8, has grown about four feet taller and 400% louder, or Brendon Williamson who struggled as a new Year 8 boarder, but has since made use of every opportunity available to him and has found fulfilment. The importance of other moments will become apparent only gradually as their full impact unfolds sometime in the future. Our readings tonight reflect upon this theme of change, both dramatic and gradual.

The first reading is a small part of a long tale about the building of the people of Israel, a people whose history, telling the

story of that nation's relationship with God, has an effect on our own lives as part of a Christian school. In the story of Jacob, whose sons became the founders of the twelve tribes of Israel, we see that he is changed forever through struggle, pain and blessing as he wrestled with life and with God. The outward sign of this change is the limp with which he walks away from this encounter and the more symbolic sign is the changing of his name to Israel: the beginning of a nation. Although this is just one small event in the vast history of a people, it is a defining moment for both them and Jacob.

The second reading is the only part of the childhood of Jesus ever recorded. It is remembered simply because, like the story of Jacob who becomes Israel, it is definitive of who Jesus is to become. Both Jacob and Jesus are marked by these events for the rest of their lives, and what

they go on to do is informed by these short experiences, appropriately summed up in the second reading by the phrase:

"And Desus increased in wisdom, in stature, and in favour with God and men."

Our lives inside and outside Hale have many defining moments. The concluding phrase from our readings also describes your growth as you have moved through your school years.

Here at Hale School many people, including those seated around you, have been privileged to share with you some of those brief, defining moments that you and they will treasure in your hearts. They have also shared in this part of the wonderful journey that has seen you grow in wisdom, in stature and in favour with God and your fellows. This is a life's journey that is only just beginning.

The sad and beautiful truth of your time at Hale is that we are unable, even with the best of intentions to prepare you for much of what life will throw at you. In reality, your time here prepares you for life no more, and no less, than a night-time wrestle with God prepared Jacob for what lay ahead of him as the man and nation Israel, or a few days at the temple prepared the 12 year old Jesus for the trials of teaching, betrayal and eventual death on the cross that lay ahead of him.

However, while the events in the readings and those that comprise your memories of Hale might not be able to prepare you for everything that lies ahead, they do build a platform on which you can stand. As you leave Hale you do so, not as an isolated individual, but as part of a community.

Dr Eric Isaachsen



As a general practitioner in Perth, Dr Eric Isaachsen's deepest interest in medicine is in human relationships, in understanding his patients' needs and how they are feeling or coping.

It is important to him to grasp the nuances of the complex social relationships that affect his patient. This sensitivity to human relationships has characterised Dr Isaachsen's nine years on the Board of Hale School. For the last five years he has been its outstanding Chairman. It has been his interest in people and the relationships he can develop personally, or encourage between others, which have given him the most satisfaction. He laughs as he declares that no Board member can leave a meeting having remained silent. Dr Isaachsen gained a great sense of achievement from strengthening the social organisation and the personal relationships within the Board, between Board members and staff and between Board members and students.

He took great interest in modernising the Board structure and greatly enjoyed being involved in the appointment of other board members. For him a key factor in the selection was a demonstrated commitment to community service. Board members for whom selfless involvement in their communities is a way of life bring an invaluable, intangible extra dimension to the Board and to the School.

Dr Isaachsen's relationship with Hale began as a recipient of a scholarship that paid for his five years in the Senior School. Many have heard him speak gratefully of that opportunity. When asked what motivated him to dedicate the extraordinary hours he gave to his position as Chairman, gratitude to Hale School for that scholarship was his instant answer. The previous Headmaster, John Inverarity, said, "He has repaid the School many times over. I have never known of a more committed, sustained, informed and wide-ranging contribution than he has made."

During his period on the Board Dr Isaachsen played a leading role in the planning of the John Inverarity Music and Drama Centre, the new Art Department and the new Boarding House currently under construction. He saw each major building as an achievement that provides wonderful facilities for students and staff, but for him the collaborative planning process provided another arena for the growth of successful relationships.

Beyond his extraordinary commitment, attention to detail and his involvement in

management as Governor and Chairman of the Board of Governors it is typical of Eric Isaachsen's character that for him the most rewarding aspect of his involvement at Hale was seeing young boys developing towards successful adulthood through their experiences at the School.

Dr Elizabeth Constable



Dr Elizabeth Constable's passion for excellence in education was evident throughout her nine years on the Board of Hale School. She drew on her background in education,

including her PhD research on the different learning styles of gifted children and her time teaching at St Hilda's Anglican School for Girls, to raise issues at the Hale School Board. She is now Chair of the Board at St Hilda's and has been the Independent Member of Parliament for the seat of Floreat since 1992. She was the first woman appointed to the Hale School Board and she recalls with a smile, the traditional call to order at her early meetings. "It was Gentlemen, oh, and Liz."

Dr Constable particularly enjoyed her involvement with establishing the Aboriginal education programme at Hale and the search for and the selection process for the new Headmaster, "always a School Board's most significant task." In addition she was very committed to the review of governance conducted by the Board and was involved for more than two years in the detailed process of analysing and thinking through every aspect of the Board's roles, assessing how they were executed and ensuring they were recorded. "It sounds dry, but it was deeply interesting, really making everything very systematic," she noted.

Indicative of her commitment to serving her community Dr Constable describes the balance of the relationship with Hale in terms of the opportunities it provided her.

"This is a Board where I've continued to learn. It was the interesting mix of skills and experience that allowed that to happen, they were different from mine but they always seemed to gel very well. The thing about Hale is that it's such an outstanding institution, it was a great pleasure to work with that Board."

The following staff members have left Hale School during 2003. We thank them for their contribution to the School, and wish them every success in the future.

Peter Mayne

Peter Mayne joined Hale School in 1988 and his contribution to the Hale community was significant. During this time, in addition to teaching Mathematics at all levels from Years 8 to 12, he fulfilled the following roles: Assistant Housemaster of Buntine; Coach of the 9A football team; Manager of

the 1st XVIII football team; Coach of the 1st XVIII football team. In his final two years at Hale, Peter accepted the challenging roles of Master in Charge of Athletics and Acting Sports Master, while continuing to teach and coach.

Peter also had an important role in the Staff Common Room Association. He organised many staff social functions, both within Hale and with other schools. Peter helped to organise, and supervise the sporting carnivals between Hale, St Mary's and interstate schools, including the final one in 1999. Within the Mathematics Department, Peter mentored teachers on practicum and new teachers.

Hale won the Alcock Cup in 1995 and 1996 when Peter was Manager, and in 2001 and 2002 when he was Coach of the 1st XVIII Football Team. Hale won the Alcock Shield for Athletics in 2001 and 2002. However Peter was adamant that these trophies were the result of the hard work, passion and ability of the entire team to lift to a higher level, rather than an individual performance by a student or coach.

Peter was wholehearted in his commitment to Hale School students, sport and achievement. He strongly believed in the importance of schoolteachers coaching schoolboy teams because of their knowledge and experience of teaching and learning and the many daily opportunities they had to develop reciprocal positive relationships.

Peter fostered a culture for sport in general, and Australian Rules Football in particular, that was developmental and inclusive. He encouraged boys and staff to share his enthusiasm, team spirit and endeavour. The large number of 'off field' support crew, boundary umpires and spectators who attended weekly training and sporting fixtures reflected a genuine desire and willingness by the younger boys to be involved with the senior athletes and the coaching staff. This provided a solid foundation for them to continue to develop their confidence, skills and participation at the next level.

Peter established strong links with coaching staff and officials in the PSA competition and maintained an interest in the performance of the opposition. This ensured that he had a sound knowledge of the skills and abilities of boys at many levels.

His interest in the boys' sporting achievements extended beyond School. He frequently went to WAFL colts or league games and cricket games on weekends to support past Hale students.

At the end of 2002, after 14 years of service, Peter left Hale School and returned to Victoria where he accepted a position as coach and selector for Frankston Football

Students and colleagues alike appreciated Mary's enormous capacity for hard work. She organised superb student art exhibitions and was a vital member of the group who established the Hale School Art Show, which attracts work from artists throughout the State. She organised art camps and arranged for visiting artists to share their skills and inspire the students at Hale. Mary was herself an excellent painter and brought the skill of the practitioner to her excellent teaching. Under Mary's leadership student numbers in art outgrew the existing facilities and Mary made a significant contribution to the design of the new art department building. Mary's dedication to the students at Hale is also revealed in the fact that she was group leader for the outdoor education programme at Exmouth for each of her nine service. Mary was caring and empathetic with all her students and those who were troubled or unsure especially benefited from her compassion and wise advice. Mary has resigned from Hale School to join her partner in running his boat charter company and we wish her well in this new endeavour.

Ed Lawless came to Hale School as Head of English in 1997 and brought with him a wealth of international experience in his

personal and professional life that was to have a profound effect on his students and colleagues. Ed was an American brought up in New York State, New Jersey and Boston, who embarked on a career teaching in international schools after his graduation from the University of Rochester, NY. He taught in New York State, at an American international school in the south of France. then moved to Singapore where he taught for seven years at the United World College. Before arriving in Australia he had therefore prepared students for American college entrance, co-ordinated the International Baccalauréat programme, taught within the English GSCE and A Level systems, taught English as a Second Language, and been a Year Co-ordinator for students in a variety of countries. New people, different values, new cultures were vital to Ed's own personal growth. Ed thrives on the complexities and challenges presented by living and working in a different culture. This tremendous mix of international educational and life experience had an immediate effect on Hale School and was a great gift to his students and colleagues alike. In his six years as Head of the English Department, Ed brought warmth, energy and vitality to the role. Meeting the requirements of the Curriculum Council of WA and mastering the complexity of a new educational system were easy for Ed; the Curriculum Council was just the latest in a long line of demanding, external educational regulators that Ed had encountered in his professional life. Ed was extraordinarily efficient, a great long range planner who was always devising schemes for the following year half way through the previous one and he was fiercely loyal and supportive of the members of his English Department. As a Head of Department Ed struck a very productive balance between allowing teachers the independence to create their own programmes and setting firm departmental guidelines for teaching, learning and assessment. Ed's students loved his gregarious, outgoing manner and his sense of humour. His American quick wit and fluency of speech made his classroom communication superb although this verbal mastery was offset, it must be admitted, by his almost indecipherable whiteboard writing which slowed that form of communication to a crawl.

Ed lived on campus for four years, serving in the additional role of Boarders' Academic Officer. He assisted countless boarders with their homework, he ran essay-writing clinics and provided tutorial assistance for boarders. 



In the two most anticipated events of the Arts Cup – the House Choir and House





As in previous years, the Parry Year 11s engaged in a range of community services. These included collecting money for the






point ahead of St Georges and were the proud winners of the magnificent Arts Cup.

talent in most areas and Riley was able to showcase the boys' passion for performance and dedication to the arts. Riley has been a leader in this field for years and 2003 was no exception.







OUTDOOR EDUCATION

In April this year, two of the Hale School Outdoor Education Staff set off for Adelaide and the bi-annual National Outdoor Conference. There were delegates from all over the country including a number from Western Australia. At its least, the forum is a good networking tool but more importantly it keeps us abreast of what is happening in Education and National level. It also gives us a perspective of where the Hale School programme lies in National Terms. This year again, I came away with a confidence that we are not only on the right track but, in many ways we are at the forefront of this discipline. This belief is re-iterated by the many instructors who apply from interstate to participate in our Outdoor Education programme, which is also undoubtedly the largest school programme in WA. The programme of course could not operate at this level without the input of a high level of staffing.

2003 has been a year of immense change and growth for us. It seems as much has occurred for us as a department in the past year, as we have experienced since the programme began in 1996. The contribution to this situation from Messrs Shearer and Goater can not be undervalued or underestimated, and for this we are very grateful. Of course, it could also not have occurred without the support of the new headmaster, who clearly sees a value in Outdoor Education. It has boosted the morale of the Outdoor Education Department significantly, that we are now formalised as a department within the curriculum.

From a bricks and mortar point of view, one of Roy Kelley's parting actions was to approve the construction of the accommodation/storage shed at Exmouth. This structure was in place just in time for the July Exmouth Programme, and was a godsend. It finally provided a decent shelter from sun for the groups that numbered 50 or so, as well as providing shelter and sunprotection for the considerable store of equipment. Amongst its greatest advantages, was that it permitted us to bus the boys in at night and accommodate them until the programme began the following morning. Additionally, it allowed the boys to sleep come rain or bluster, which was previously very hit and miss in the canvas tents that would pull their pegs and poles when the wind reached 20 plus knots.

THE OUTDOOR EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

We had an early setback with the departure of some time employee and senior instructor Jason Dutoit, and it was not until March that Simon Hunt took up a different position as we re-modelled the department. John Inverarity made the appointment in late 2002, and supported our departmental

view that Simon was the man for the job. Jason having moved to Exmouth to live, we still keep close contact with him, and he maintains a keen interest in the Exmouth programme and the base into which he put so much time

Murray Curran remains with us as a full time employee since 1997 following a number of years of involvement as a contract instructor. As well as continued involvement in all aspect of the Exmouth programme, Murray has taken the Junior School Programme to great heights and continues to develop it annually. A major component of the Junior School Programme has been the continued development of the Aboriginal Education aspect throughout Years 5 to 7. In 2004 Murray will begin the first Year 8 Outdoor Education Programme proper with a 4-day bush camp for all Year 8 students in the month of May.

Our newcomer Simon spent the last few years managing a commercial sea-kayaking operation on Ningaloo Reef, as well as working at Christ Church Grammar School's Kooringal Outdoor Education Centre. His late appearance with us followed the completion of a contract as a snowboard instructor in the USA. He has already made an impact on the department as a quality instructor to whom the boys relate well, and has in his portfolio the organisation and management of optional and extension programmes. These include the SCUBA diving programme, certificate courses, diving trips and SCUBA club, rock climbing club, and some longer-term projects such as bushwalking in Tasmania.

Brian Heibner, having resigned from the English Department in 2002 after more than 25 years at Hale, has remained with us in a developing role part-time. He has been involved in victualling for all camps, but is mainly employed as base manager in Exmouth, while the rest of the department is in the field with students. Brian's knowledge and background here is invaluable, as he has been with the Exmouth Programme since its inception. He not only ran the Exmouth Programme for its first 4 years, but is also credited with securing the lease at Kailis Fisheries Learmonth during a round of golf, and was responsible for the early building developments.

Contract Instructors come and go, but their contribution cannot be underestimated. Unfortunately, the Outdoor Recreation Industry, and Outdoor Education Programmes, do not provide enough well paid work for many of them to stay in the job for long. The quality of contract instructors has steadily improved each year and a few of the faces have remained familiar. Amongst these are Cory Green,

Kellie D'raine, Sammie Mills and Steph van den Hoek, and their efforts are appreciated.

Then there's me at the helm though to tell the truth, it is necessarily a very autonomous collective, and I have few concerns at any time that all is not as it should be. We are a happy department. This is largely because we truly believe in what we do, not only as being valuable, but imperative to the a velopment of the students and the future of our environment and theirs.

THE OUTDOOR EDUCATION PROGRAMME

Earlier this year, I had the opportunity to visit the Four Season's Resort in Ubud Bali. Their trip was to buy up cheap furniture for a Gold Coast house fit out. There had been no thought as to why the furniture was so cheap and from which rainforest the wood was pillaged. Clearly this argument is far more complex. Suffice to say that at the very least, an awareness and thought process about the origin of their purchase is an awareness of environmental impact.

I am often tackled at conferences becaused work in an affluent and resource rich school where the students are 5-star campers like my friends above, and that I am able to run activities that others only dream of. There are suggestions that my client group only experience elitist programmes that do little to enhance environmental preservation. My answer always returns to the fact that a number (perhaps 6?) Premiers of this State have attended Hale School, not to mention the many who go on to work in mining, engineering and general entrepreneurial profiteering. If the likes of these minds can be influenced to value the natural environment and affect decision making processes, all the better for the world in which we live.

I have begun to ask a question of my students on camp. How many of you intend to have a family and children of your own? Interestingly, I have had 100% response in the affirmative from what now totals hundreds of students. "Clearly then", I state, "You need to develop a concern for the environment that will be passed onto your children." This concern must extend far beyond city life and resource usage, but into a guardian role in preserving the natural environment". It is our departmental belief that as Outdoor Education develops at Hale School, it is pivotal to the delivery of this ideal, and that of a sustainable existence.

TEE RESULTS

For the third time in four years, a Hale School student won the **Beazley Medal** for the top TEE student in Western Australia. **Dougal Maclaurin** achieved the highest Curriculum Council award score on record of 99.55, based on the average of five TEE marks. In three of his subjects – Literature, Calculus and Physics - Dougal scored a final scaled mark of 100%.

In 2003 Hale School received two **General Exhibitions** and four **Subject Exhibitions**. The second General Exhibition was awarded to Andrew Moser who was placed eleventh in the State. Three of the four Subject Exhibitioners topped the State in the humanities and fine art subjects: Nicholas Maclaine in English Literature, Raphaël de Vietri in Art and Dougal Maclaurin in Ancient History. Dougal also won the Subject Exhibition in Calculus.

Hale School students also received a total of 15 Certificates of Distinction (for results in the top 0.5% of a subject), the second best performance the School's students have ever achieved in this category. Although Hale students were awarded 24 of these Certificates in 2001 the next highest total in this category was previously 14 in 2002.

Certificates of Excellence (for achieving 10 A grades and no grades lower than B over two years) were awarded to 15 Hale School students in 2003.

WEST SCHEME AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING Jerome Wade

Hale School students' average Tertiary Entrance Rank (TER) in 2003 was 87.23, (TES 343.5), marginally lower than in the past few years but still an excellent achievement. By comparison, the WA State average TER was 77.14 (TES 291). 130 students or 83% of Hale's 158 TEE students achieved more than the WA State average.

25 students gained a TER of 97.5 or more (TES 400 +). This represented 16% of Hale's 2003 TEE population. By comparison 6.5% of the State population scored a TER of over 97.5.

The outstanding individual results and the high mean TER reflect the determination and enthusiasm for learning of the students themselves and the experience, dedication and skill of Hale School's teachers. The support and encouragement of the students' families is similarly recognised as crucial to the students' academic success.

The strength of the School's academic departments is revealed by the fact that 8 subjects were ranked in the top 10 for the State based on the percentage of TEE students gaining a final mark of 75% or more in a particular subject.

The eight subjects were: Accounting, Ancient History, Art, Biology, English Literature, French, Geography, Physics.

Finally, the fundamental achievement recognized by the Curriculum Council of WA, Secondary Graduation, was achieved by 100% of Hale School's Year 12 students in 2003.

STUDENT SERVICE LEARNING 2002



The School's Service Learning Programme has continued to grow steadily this year. Its goal has been to give the boys greater opportunities to become involved and enjoy the learning experiences that this programme provides. There are now many ways in which they can participate, ranging from raising money to taking total care of children with severe disabilities. As well as maintaining the success of the programme, Hale's Community Service Officer Mr M. Beech developed an exciting new initiative this year called the Hale Sony Foundation Holiday Camp for Kids.

As the opportunities for our boys to work with others in the community increase, it is necessary to remain conscious of duty of care issues. Many visits take place during extended lunchtime periods during the school week. Staff support for these activities has been overwhelming. Departments and individuals have taken responsibility for various agencies and go out with boys week by week. In addition, boarding staff members have been assisting with the Red Cross Soup Patrol. This provides an important service to many homeless and needy people at night in the city. Another initiative was the caring of a number of boys and girls aged between 4 and 12 years one Sunday by a group of Year 8 students (supervised by Hale staff), in order to give their carer grandparents a day of respite. The Year 8 students gained immensely from the experience.

Support for the programme has not been confined to the staff but has also come from the student body no longer directly involved in Service Learning. The Year 10 Student Representative Committee has been raising money during the course of the year for the Wheel Chair for Kids Foundation. The Year 10 mothers' morning tea was an activity that alone raised \$760.00.

The Hale community continues to learn a great deal from working with the elderly, those with disabilities and the younger members of society. I have no doubt that this will continue to be an enriching experience for everyone. To all those who have so willingly supported and participated in this programme in so many different ways, a heartfelt thanks.

Hale Sony Foundation Camp for Kids.

The inaugural Hale Sony Foundation Holiday Camp for Kids took place from December 11 to 14. During the camp Year 12 student volunteers from Hale and Methodist Ladies College adopted the role of individual carers for young disabled boys and girls. Each carer was supported by a number of volunteer assistants including parents of students, teaching and non-teaching staff, nursing staff, boarding staff, cooks and assistants. The camp had a number of different goals. The first was to give the parents or guardians of these disabled boys and girls an end of year break for four days. The second was to enable the carers to experience the joy, pain and sleepless nights that caring for a disabled person may entail. The final goal was to help foster a compassionate community in Hale, a community that readily works together for the benefit of others.

Community Service Officer, Mr M. Beech, initiated this programme, and in doing so enabled the School to share its wonderful facilities and students with 19 boys and girls from the Beazley School, John XXIII School, and Sir David Brand Centre. All of the children have disabilities. Some are wheel chair bound

others have speech and hearing problems. The parents and families of these boys and girls have had little, if any, respite from the continual need to care for these children. During their stay at the School, these boys and girls were 'buddied up' with a student from either MLC or Hale. The buddy was soley responsible for the well being of the child in his/her care for the four days. A staff committee helped Mr Beech to get the programme up and running and their enthusiasm and commitment was much appreciated.

The aim of the service-learning programme is to challenge students, both mentally and emotionally and in doing so, facilitate authentic student and staff engagement in and with the wider community. Everyone involved in the camp learned a great deal about him/herself. No one walked away untouched by the deep affection, happiness, occasional pain and feeling of admiration for these courageous boys and girls and for their families and guardians. Sincere thanks go to all who ensured the great success of the camp, especially to the families, the boys and girls, the students from Hale and MLC, Mrs Holmes à Court and the Sony Foundation and in particular, to Mr M. Beech and Mrs J. Maskiell who made it all happen.



ACADEMIC EXTENSION / smarts

UWA Arts Academic Extension Programme (smARTS) 2003

Designed to prepare Year 11 students for post-school studies, the UWA Academic Extension Programme, 'smARTS', once again comprised a diverse range of Hale students. These students started the programme not knowing what it would involve, and what was to be expected of them. Other students in similar positions from around the State, from as far afiled as Prendiville Catholic College in the northern suburbs to a school in Albany, joined them.

The first few on-campus meetings outlined exactly what the programme entailed. The students were split into a large number of groups, with none comprising more than two students from the same school, and most consisting of around six students. This year, the number of schools participating was greatly increased, and thus many more groups were formed. Topics were chosen from within a range of possible choices;

'I am, you are, we are Australian...' The information and critique of Australian National Identity: an historical / cultural analysis of literature or popular media.

Clones, cyborgs, and super-highways: representations of science in contemporary media, literature and science fiction.

Gender identity and performance in contemporary cultural practice.

Eco-cultures: the representation and impact of environmental knowledge in contemporary cultural, literary or media texts.

Imaging Asia: historical and cultural representations of Asia in contemporary cultural and literary texts.

The eventual topics ranged from an analysis of gender roles during the 1930s, to the way in which modern science may be perceived as 'playing God'.

Following the on-campus meetings, the students were introduced to the online side of the programme. The university had established a system whereby the various groups could 'chat' in real-time on the Internet, allowing the fast exchange of information without requiring long hours spent in transit. The first few meetings on-line were rowdy affairs; the members of the group were just getting to know each other, and thus could not yet function as a cohesive group. Soon, however, the groups settled down, and work began.

For the most part, the groups' written presentations were split into sections, with each section assigned to a group member. In this way, a large and comprehensive document could be drawn up in just a few short months. Editors were assigned, and along with printers, designers and other necessary personnel, all drawn from within the group, the various projects soon rose to a high standard. Various small matters were touched up, and eventually the written presentations were handed in.

This, however, did not mark the end of the groups' work; a creative presentation still had to be developed and presented for judging at the Awards Night. This facet of the course was developed in order to show the involved students that albeit possible to perform arduous research and obtain

fine results, it must still all be communicated effectively.

It was with this in mind that the groups set about preparing their creative presentations. Most groups opted for a dramatic representation of their chosen topic, illustrating it in some way that highlighted its primary features and was still entertaining. Fortunately, no group merely read out what it had written, except for effect or where it was absolutely unavoidable.

Robert Marshall and Baxter Roberts are to be congratulated, in that they were lucky enough to be in the group that won the creative presentation award. Despite the efforts of all the Hale students involved, however, Hale was unable to return to school having won overall.

None of this would have been possible for Hale students were it not for the continual efforts of Mr Lawless, who strove always to help the involved students in any possible way, short of writing their projects for them. The participants thank him for his encouragement and ability to cope with all the unexpected situations that arose during the time in which Hale School students were involved in the programme.

All students involved in the programme found it to be an edifying experience even though involvement meant an increased workload. The 2003 smARTS programme was thus enlightening for all involved, and will continue to prepare Year 11s for post-school studies for many years to come with the continued support of Hale School.






held at the Art Gallery of W.A. to showcase the best work of Year 12 Art and Art and Design students.

CAREERLINK

This year saw further development of the Careerlink vocational education programme. Most obvious was the expansion of Off-thejob Training opportunities for Hale students. It is now possible for all Careerlink students to be able to achieve Certificate I, and in some cases Certificate II, of an accredited National Training Course whilst still at school. Hale students participated in areas such as Tourism, Business, Automotive. Conservation & Land Management, Multi-Media Studies, Building & Construction, Metals Engineering, and Information Technology. Next year the opportunities to gain vocational qualifications have been further enhanced with the inclusion of Certificate I in Design, and Certificate II in Community Leadership. The expansion of the number of courses to our students means that a closer fit is now possible between Offthe job Training and the specific industry areas chosen by the students for the extended work experience programme, Structured Workplace Learning.

Benefits were also obtained by conducting Off-the -job Training in the first half of the year, a further innovation in 2003. As a consequence Hale students were able to get a better overview of the industry area of their choice, and were able to commence SWL with considerably higher skill levels than was previously the case. Employers in turn were able to offer more diverse training opportunities to the students when they commenced SWL and allow the students higher levels of responsibility. The notably higher proportion of students who gained 'A' grades for SWL this year suggests that this is a worthwhile change.

Another welcome innovation this year was the holding of a Careerlink Awards Night where students from each of the eleven schools participating in the Careerlink cluster were presented with a certificate for completing Off-the-job training. Individual awards for the top student in each training programme were also awarded. Jerome Wade, from Faulkner House, won the award for the best student in the Metals Engineering course. Perth businessman, Dale Alcock, addressed the audience of students, parents and various school leaders about his experiences as a young man starting out in the building industry. The message of his talk is that with passion, dedication and a positive outlook nothing is impossible.

Winners of Hale School awards for Careelink were Jerome Wade who won the Westscheme Award for Excellence in Vocational Education, and Jacob Aitken & Callum Green who won the award for the best students in Career & Industry Awareness. Congratulations to these three students.

Year 11 & 12 Year Period

The Year 11 & 12 Year Period was conceived to provide a broader context for classroom learning as well as to help senior students develop a conceptual framework for understanding their own experience of the contemporary world. In the process Year 11 & 12 students are exposed to the ideas of numerous guest speakers both from within and from outside the School as well as other presenters and performers. Throughout 2003 a wide range of topics was offered to the students based on the theme of What It Means To Be Human. Some of the presentations were serious, some were humorous, some were quite general in their treatment of a topic, some were highly specific in their scope, some were oriented to have an immediate impact, others will make more sense when the students are older. Some had comfortable messages for the students to receive, others were highly demanding, in both an emotional and intellectual sense. In each instance the students were challenged to think about who they are as individuals and in relation to the wider community.

For example, CEO of Royal Perth Hospital, Glynn Palmer, spoke on the personal reaction of the hospital staff to the victims of the Bali bombing, many of whom were treated in the hospital; retired scientist Dr Graham Chittleborough spoke on the notion of sustainability and economic development; Merryl Bennett, a solicitor with Legal Aid WA, spoke on the topic responsibilities and liabilities for Child Support; Evyn Webster from Hey Dad! spoke on changing notions of fatherhood; Darryl Rawlings, chaplain to the WA Fire & Emergency Service, spoke to the Year 11 students about risk taking by young people; Terry Crestwell from World Vision spoke about the worldwide exploitation of children; Suzy Finch from Marina Purslowe and Associates spoke about funeral practices and attitudes to death; and Andrew Wallace spoke about his experiences as a fireman at the World Trade Centre, immediately following the terrorist attacks of September 11. There were many other excellent presentations, all of which contributed to a rich and stimulating programme.

The value of the Year 11 & 12 Year Period was reinforced for me when I presented a paper on the programme at the Anglican Schools Network Conference in Brisbane in August. A number of delegates commented that they had tried to implement a similar programme in their own schools but were unsuccessful because of the ad hoc nature of the talks that had been presented. The thematic approach of Hale's programme overcomes many of these problems while providing a valuable addition to an already busy curriculum.

Having produced the cards successfully, the company then came to its key stumbling block. This was making sales. Time, limited sales skills and overall organisational difficulties meant that progress was slow and the potential gold mine, envisaged during the halcyon planning days did not instantly eventuate. Making money was a difficult task. In the end, the second part of the project did not make it any further than the drawing board.

During the year the team sold cards at a number of School events such as concerts and plays. It also took part in the Young Achievement Trade Fair at Forrest Place in the city. Sales weren't great but the team created a funny advertising skit with music, juggling and some appalling acting, which didn't win the best ad competition, but was enjoyed by all who participated.

The overall financial conclusion to the company saw shareholders glad that their entire personal wealth had not been sunk into this venture, for sunk it would have been. Shareholders did receive some of their money back, but profits were as extinct as the dinosaurs.

As a company, Yareka had the benefit of expert advice from its sponsors at the Water Corporation. At company meetings a range of production, financial and human resource executives gave the fledgling company guidance in its decisions and its operations. Mr Ewing, who offered advice and some practical help, also contributed to the company.

Did the boys learn anything? Company members have responded with a resounding YES! At the very simple level those in the company have learned that

DRAMA PRODUCTIONS

Being Divine

Involvement in a 'whole school production' can be an unforgettable experience for participants. *Being Divine* started from the premise that a school play should be relevant, thought provoking, enjoyable, inclusive and dynamic. Opportunities existed for students to participate in script writing, composition and choreography during the nine-month project that eventually came to fruition in the John Inverarity Music and Drama Centre in March.

The plot was developed from a news story that related how a young boy in Spain was told that he was the reincarnation of a spiritual leader who had chosen to be reborn in the West. He had to leave his family to be raised in a monastery in India. He is still there as Lama Osel. In her book *Reborn in the West*, Vicki Mackenzie tells the story of a number of Westerners who have been recognised as incarnations of famous Tibetan lamas.

The play's 'what if' concerns a normal High School student, Alex. He has the same aspirations as many of his peers; he plays guitar with an up-and-coming band, 'Classless,' that is about to have its demo CD played on the local radio station. However, his world is turned upside down when a group of strangers arrive from a Himalayan country, Wundustan, to pass on a potentially life changing message. He has to choose between family, friends, duty and self.

Despite the serious premise, the play, featuring six original pieces of music played live by a rock band, was an entertaining and colourful production. A huge light sensitive screen allowed the band to 'magically' appear at the rear of the stage whenever a song was imminent. Tremendous performances from the female chorus as well as the soloists lent a professional feel to the music.

In the demanding role of Alex, Robert Marshall created a character with which the audience could empathise. Exchanges with his demanding girlfriend, Sophie, played by Amy Webb, were tense. The audience enjoyed the stereotypes depicted in the family scenes, loved the real and the acting bands and delighted in the cameo performances of the 'Homies' and 'Wundustanis'. All performers worked hard to make each scene come to life with some tremendous work happening 'off dialogue.' For many it was the last chance to perform in a Hale production.

Preparation for such a production requires many sacrifices as the performers juggle other commitments to make rehearsal times. Audience response, however, assured the cast that it was worthwhile.

It was a tribute to Matthew's ability to inspire and enthuse them that they undertook so willingly, such strenuous, and at times confusing movement work.

I hope in the future that we shall once again get the chance to work with Matthew and I, like so many others, will watch the development of his career in the theatre with great interest.

Stalk

Stalk is going to be one of those shows that you look back on as a highlight in a long career. I cannot recall any production in which I have had quite so much fun.

The idea of doing Jack and the Bean Stalk, from the point of view of the people living around its base, grew out of the Junior School drama workshops. I started working on a script, ran out of time and handed it over to Zac Gillam, an Old Haleian, who had already written very funny comedies whilst at university.

When the script came back, it was full of clever satire, outrageous characters and it included fairy tale characters that had nothing to do with the original story.


Most pleasing of all, was the fact that the students really enjoyed putting the show on. They revelled in the challenge of creating 'off the wall' characters and slapstick moments.

ANSWER:

The Senior School Library!

Open from 8.15am to 5.30pm daily, and Wednesday evenings 7pm to 9pm the Library is not just a place. Rather, it is people (individuals, classes, teachers, parents, library staff) – with widely varying needs the latest Anthony Horowitz novel; archival information from *The Australian* newspaper; the cricket scores) – looking for resources (computers, online databases, novels) – and support in locating and using them.

Thanks to all our helpers.

Essential to this busy place functioning is the help of volunteer parents and students. In 2003, twenty parent volunteers very generously gave of their time to shelve, create displays, enter data, and cover and process resources.

Year 12 students, Stuart Argus and Arvind Natarajan were awarded Symbols for Service to the School, having, between them, run the Library Issue desk before and after school and during lunchtimes.

(Student Information The SITS Technology Support) group has continued to serve the school community with its main focus on web page development and support of the Hale Intranet. Mrs J. Roberts, the SITS coordinator, has been amazed at the level of skill that SITS members possess and their growing willingness to accept the responsibility to freely share knowledge with other members and to model ethical use of and communication information technologies. Warwick Doddrell, Year 10, was awarded Symbols for Service to the School because of his work in SITS.

The Library simply could not do all it does without the support of these parents and students. Thank you.

A Student Library Committee has been set up for 2004. Students from Year 9 to 12 will offer a range of library related services for other students. Several new initiatives of this group are already underway, including the maintenance of a noticeboard alerting students to new resources and events and a commercial book club offering students the opportunity to purchase new releases.

Staff changes.

Teacher Librarian, Mrs Julie Roberts and Library Assistant, Mrs Glynis O'Neill have been very welcome newcomers on the Library staff in 2003.

Fostering a reading community.

Fostering a Hale School reading community has been a priority this year. The aim is to encourage boys to see reading as an enjoyable and worthwhile activity that plays an important part in the lives of all around them.

Developing the adult fiction and biography collections has led to a most pleasing increase in the number of parents borrowing from the Senior School

Library. School staff members are constantly in and out looking for personal reading materials. Senior boys are becoming increasingly involved in the selection of resources making requests; alerting us to new releases; browsing and reading selections on approval from booksellers. Year 8 to 10 reading enrichment programmes have been extended. A Reading for Life unit encouraged Year 10s to read more widely and to take responsibility for fitting reading time into a busy lifestyle. Students met Teacher Librarians in the car park on the day the latest Harry Potter was released and laid in wait for a bookseller delivering just released copies of Matthew Reilly's Scarecrow. The introduction of a graphic novel collection has created lots of interest and a real highlight of the year was holiday borrowing immediately after Speech Day formalities. To see boys ignoring morning tea to ensure that they were first at the Library to borrow all ten of a Robert Jordan fantasy series or arriving with wish lists downloaded from the online School catalogue the night before said much of the reading community we are building together.

Opportunities to work with authors.

Hale's Author in Residence Programme continued in 2003 with author **Archimede Fusillo** spending a week in the School


talking with students about books, reading and about their own writing.

There were many other opportunities for boys to hear authors speak - Year 8 and 9 students heard author John Marsden speak about the power and meaning of language in our lives; a group of Year 10s met and spoke with author Matthew Reilly; Andrew Daddo shared his storytelling abilities with Years 8 and 9. A Year 8 class attended the All Saints Literature Festival, enjoying authors Margaret Clark, John Larkin and author/illustrator Terry Denton. A group of students interested in creative writing were invited by the Fremantle Children's Literature Centre to participate in a series of Youth Literature Days, having the opportunity to share their writing with authors Mark Greenwood, Tony Eaton, Gary Crew, Marcus Zusak, Boori Pryor and Deborah Lisson.

Many other initiatives.

While fostering a reading community has been one priority, many other initiatives have also forged ahead - computer facilities provide simultaneously for more than 50 students; notebook computers allow for greater flexibility of use; the library catalogue is now available online; Hale Links guide students to specially selected web sites; effectively searching the web and evaluating web sites has been promoted with both staff and students; parent evenings showed parents the range of online resources and support in using these available to students from home; Year 9 students have been encouraged to become aware of their preferred learning style and the need for 'whole brain thinking'; web quests and other online learning activities have been developed in collaboration with subject teachers.

2003 has been a busy and productive year for the Senior School Library.



Language Week



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HISTORY



History Day - Thursday September 25

Rather than limp through to the last day, a dash of colour and variety came to Hale on the penultimate day of Term 3. Any outdoor event planned for September is fraught with danger, but fortune smiled on our day. Thanks to the efforts of Mr Bill Edgar, the school archivist, a display of 10th Light Horse memorabilia was on show in the Main Quad. This was followed by a spectacular display of firepower by the Perth Muzzle Loading Association.

The display of Light Horse and other World War I memorabilia brought history to the boys on their terms and in their space. The life-sized horse with Light Horse equipment and the variety and intricacy of the display was much appreciated by the Year 10 and 11 History students and other boys throughout the day, as was an impromptu military drill by Phil Sullivan and Bill Edgar for those fortunate to see it! The Hale connection with the Light Horse is very strong. Lieutenant Leslie Craig (after whom Craig Oval is named), an Old Boy and later Chairman of the Board of Governors, was wounded in action at Gallipoli as a member of the Light Horse. Lieutenant Craig was subsequently nursed and assisted in his recovery in London at Wandsworth Hospital by old school mates Eric Sandover and Irwin Burges. Craig's great grandson Colin Craig is one of our current Year 12 boys. Jim Cowan, another Year 12 boy, had a great uncle, Ray Cowan, who was also in the Light Horse and sadly died in 1918. Digby Burges and Blair Sandover are current students who are descendants of Irwin and Eric respectively.

The musketry display put on by Dr Leo Laden and his fellow 'muzzle loaders' will not be forgotten it in a hurry. The humorous patter by Dr Laden was punctuated by explosive gun shots and wafting smoke which had many staff opening doors and windows, anxiously peering into the Quad to see whether the revolution had begun!

The boys learned of the trickery of Hollywood in staging battles of this era, whereby those battlefields would have been completely shrouded in smoke after a few minutes, not like the clarity provided on the silver screen. Ear plugs would also have been much appreciated by soldiers of yesteryear with the din of these weapons, as even the single shots demonstrated had the front rows of boys wishing they were further back.

The boys learned much of the evolution of the muskets through to early models of rifles and the various accoutrements worn by soldiers and marines. MATHEMATICS

2003 saw some changes to the Mathematics Department. Mr McLean took over as the Head of Department for the first three terms while Mr Bausor was involved in other responsibilities. The Maths Plus and Maths Prime clubs continued for the Year 8s and 9s under the guidance of Mr Shaw. A Mathematics camp was held for Year 8s with the girls from St Mary's. Across all classrooms there was an increased use of the department set of notebook computers.

As usual there was a large number of students involved in Mathematics competitions and extension activities during the year.

Australian Mathematics Competition (for the Westpac Awards)

The annual Australian Mathematics competition sponsored by Challenge Bank was held early in Term 3. 708 students entered from Hale School amongst 500 000 competitors from both Australia and internationally.

Hale students achieved excellent results in Years 8, 9 and 10. Eight Hale students achieved scores in the top 0.3% of the State and were awarded prizes. The students were Ben Riley and James Gibbons in Year 10, Troy Oliver, Nick Salmon, Chris Mofflin and Dylan Hirsch in Year 9 and Trent Grgich and Bharath Iyer in Year 8. Another 25 students received High Distinctions for coming in the top 2% of the WA entrants.

Naturally Mathematical Competition

This is a relatively new 'online' mathematics problem-solving competition. Teams entered from China, New Zealand and the Eastern States of Australia. The students answered questions over designated two-hour timeslots, sending their responses via e-mail.

Following the outstanding success in Hale's first try in this competition in 2002, more students were encouraged to enter. Four Year 9 teams entered jointly with girls from St Mary's and a Year 8 team also entered the competition. All the teams performed well and made the final. The Year 8 team consisting of Trent Grgich, Darryn Sherry, Shovan Rath, Edward Wang with Bharath Iyer, as reserve, came second overall - a very impressive effort. The Year 9s involved were Chris Mofflin, Paul Reid, Conrad Pogson, John Graff, Tim Wood, Andrew Clarke, Brendan Poon and Yifan Zhang.

It included all combined Hale-St Mary's groups from Year 8 to Year 12 and culminated in the presentation of gifts to the teaching staff of both schools by the senior members of the groups. However, the final performance for the Hale Stage Band boys was a spectacular win at the 2003 Jazz Pestival in York. Congratulations to the boys, who blew, sang and played their way to victory.

Many students are involved in the choral aspect of music at Hale, and this participation, as well as the standard of performances, continues to rise. The School choir is the largest choral group, consisting of students from Years 8 to 12 and performing at the major concerts throughout the year. The Barbershop group is always a much smaller unit and this year comprised twelve boys. A smaller group meant more opportunities for soloists such as Bradley Kerin and Jamie Ward to perform.

The Hale-St Mary's Cantate is a group of selected upper school students from both Hale and St Mary's who perform at a professional standard. This year, the Cantate worked extremely hard and together with the orchestra, performed Handel's Zadok the Priest at the Governors' Concert to an appreciative audience. ASTRONOMY



The Astronomy Club

What another great year for the Hale School Astronomy Club. Following our inception last year, the club has grown in large leaps and bounds, and now plays host to almost twenty students from Years 8 to 11. A range of activities has kept this group of souped-up maniacs occupied, thereby preventing them from destroying Mr Cooper's laboratory in a caffeine-induced rage.

There have been, of course, the regulatory Astronomy Camps. Now moved to a Saturday night-Sunday morning format, the camps have generally been well attended, and despite two rain soaked events (not bad for an airport in the Perth Hills during Winter,) all of the camps that weren't cancelled due to the weather were excellent. Mr Cregan and Mrs Spagnolo also joined the camps at various intervals, giving the younger members fresh targets to gradually drive insane.

One of the newest additions to the Astronomy Camps will be Mr Cooper's

new observatory at Bindoon Airport. After Observatory Mk I collapsed (its half-completed dome became airborne during a Winter storm,) a simpler Observatory Mk II has been built, and is in the process of being tested and refined. The ability to leave Mr Cooper's huge 30-inch Obsession telescope 'locked down' in this facility means that the computer controls can finally be calibrated, making observing nights much smoother and faster.

During the Wednesday meetings in S3, many of the students have been involved in making models of famous space vehicles. Rendered have been the Lunar Landing of July 20, 1969, the Space Shuttle, and the venerable Saturn V moon rocket – quite possibly the only launch vehicle in history never to have failed. Mr Cooper has also been attempting to teach us more about the theory of astronomy – he has lectured on cosmic theories and galaxies, and we were honoured to have Dr. Henry Morris to



lecture us on the search of minor planets (a.k.a. asteroids.)

One of the Club's big successes this year was the Mars Opposition Night. This Winter saw the closest approach to Mars by Earth for nearly 60,000 years. These oppositions occur roughly every two years, but the magnitude of this opposition is one of the greatest possible. The night was great entertainment for all, with both the school's 8-inch Meade and Mr Cooper's 30-inch telescope pointed at Mars. Two Astronomy Club members manned the barbeque, whilst two of our Year 8s gave presentations in the Music and Drama Centre auditorium, and the film Mars Attacks! was screened.

Once again, on behalf of the entire Club, I would like to thank Mr Cooper for his patience and diligence in tutoring us about the cosmos. We are all looking forward to a bright and productive 2004.

Rio Tinto Australian Chemistry Olympiad 2003


The Rio Tinto Australian Science Olympiads (RTASO) provides students with opportunities to enhance their knowledge, understanding and skill in Biology, Physics and Chemistry. The National Qualifying Examinations are the first stage in a series of special programmes that lead to the selection of the best three scholars to represent Australia at the International Science Olympiad for each of the sciences. The Qualifying examinations are amongst the most demanding science challenges that not only test raw knowledge but especially problem-solving and analytical skills. From the National Qualifying examinations, around twenty candidates are invited to become scholars in an accelerated training programme that ultimately identifies the national representatives.

DEBATING

The 1st IV team members of 2003 were Andrew Williams, Nick Maclaine, Tyson Broun and Josh Caddy. After organising their 'speaker' positions, they proceeded to plan the attack on the first topic. At this point it should be noted that debating is a lot like soccer in that winning with a one or two point margin, is considered fairly average. The first debate against Scotch was a heated, if somewhat slow, affair with both teams still finding their form. However, the experience of the Hale team held it in good stead and it won by five points.

The second debate was against rival school Applecross. In the opposition team were two speakers who had beaten Josh and Tyson in last year's Junior competition Grand Final, so the Hale side was eager for revenge. Taking the affirmative side of the topic that *Drug addicts are victims*, the boys clearly out-debated the opposition to register a nine-point victory - one of the team's best wins of the competition.

The season then progressed into the 'impromptu' stage of the preliminaries, where each team was given the topic, a room and hour to prepare their argument, without access to any resources. These topics required a great deal of general knowledge, so the team set about keeping up-to-date with political issues and events.

The third debate, taking the affirmative side, was against Shenton College. Once again. Hale proved far too good for the opposition, winning by 15 and a half points. The fourth debate was against MLC and this was where the first real hurdle appeared. Having prepared the affirmative side of The world's treatment of SARS has been sickening, the team arrived at the debate only to find out that they were to take the negative side of the argument. With less than ten minutes to formulate their case, the boys banded together, furiously preparing points of information and writing rebuttal notes for each other. Their experience and skill shone through and they verbally thrashed an inexperienced and unconventional MLC team by 16 points - a team which at one point, described Hale's argument as: "Totally, like, so untrue."

The last of the preliminary debates was almost a dead rubber, Hale's entry into the finals guaranteed by this point. However, the team approached this debate hoping to fine-tune its skills. 

In the first debate of the final round against Seton College, Hale argued in the negative that *Health care should be free* for all. Although not the team's best debate, it still managed to win by eight points and progressed to the quarter-finals where, unfortunately, it was to debate the other Hale team; Hale being the only school to have two teams represented at this level.

The 2nd IV of skilled debaters Tim Cheang, Nick Vinciullo, Matt Lydon and Kane Zhang had argued with flair on their path to the quarter-finals, vanquishing teams such as Applecross, MLC and Mercedes and loomed as a big challenge. In what proved to be the closest debate of the season, the 1st IV won by two adjudicators to one and progressed to the semi-finals to face a different Christ Church team that counted a State-level debater amongst its numbers. Debating that It should be illegal to burn the flag,

Hale simply outmanoeuvred Christ Church, winning unanimously and propelling the team through to the Grand Final.

To the shock and surprise of Hale, the opposing team proved to be the Applecross team the boys had defeated in Round Two of the preliminaries. In a close and heated debate, Hale's knowledge of debating rules and conventions paid off, with the opposition running a defensive line of argument, strong on breadth, but low on logic. The Hale team proceeded to attack this weakness with vigour, Josh Caddy in particular, debating with the flair and logic that had been his trademark all season. In a decision of five adjudicators to two, the Hale Debating 1st IV brought home the trophy for the first time.

However, the team did not, and could not, have done it alone. Deserving of our sincere thanks are Ms Sas, debating coordinator, all those who came to support the team, including Mr Meade, Mr Lawless, and of course all the parents for their support and taxi-driving skills, and

Chris Pearce and Juliet Park who helped from time to time. 

Hale rowing is a proud organization that prides itself on 100% commitment and effort from its members that more often than not, has the boys achieving better than expected results. In recent years the boat shed has been very successful, but this year was one of both agony and ecstasy.

The rowing season began late in Term 2 of 2002 for a group of Year 11s and 12s Years 10 and 11 at this stage) in the form of three weights sessions per week before school. This then progressed to another two rowing sessions per week that were designed to teach any new towers the basics of rowing. However, the first event was the Wesley Indoor Regatta, where the boys compete individually on the rowing machines (Year 10s and seniors only). Hale has held this trophy for the last three years but unfortunately was defeated by Guildford and Wesley on the day. Special mention must be made to Toby Hogan and Nevin Mills who won the 2nd VIII and 10A VIII divisions respectively, an outstanding effort for two new recruits.

The following week Year 10s and seniors were put into crews for the Guildford long-distance Regatta. The Year 10 crews and Hale's Senior Quad

powed a three-kilometre race that finished at Guildford Bay. The 1st and 2nd VIIIs had a six-kilometre race that also finished at Guildford Bay. However with superior knowledge of the river bends and with the home ground advantage, Guildford proved too strong and won the day of racing.

The shed then moved into the 'summer break' as it is known at School. Not so for the Hale rowing boys! The training sessions stepped up to seven sessions per week, and any boy who was available and striving for the prestigious 1st VIII or the 'A' boat in his year division, could be seen at every session. This intensive training was a good lead up to the annual powing camp at the end of January. This vear the camp's residential component was extended to seven days and seven nights. This camp allows coaches to select crews, encourages team bonding and gives rowers the opportunity to settle into and adjust to the new crews for the first regatta in one week's time. During rowing camp boys were bussed to ANA rowing sheds for three sessions per day. The camp was most enjoyable and included shed barbecues and watching the Australia Day fireworks from the Barrack Street jetty.

The 1st VIII for 2003 had a new coach. Mr Matt Doyle replaced Nick Porzig and he ably rose to the challenge of finetuning eight boys from different rowing backgrounds and experience into a polished crew. At rowing camp twelve Boys fought for the eight rowing positions and Michael McBriar and Callum Green tried out for coxswain. Finally the seat races decided the eight rowers and Michael McBriar was chosen to cox. The boys then had the rest of powing camp to get used to their new seats in the boat. The selection of the crew also meant that the boys were permitted to train in the new race boat, the John Inverarity.

Mr Pritchard's exhortation, "You have to want to win so much that you can physically taste it!" did not, however, have the desired effect on this year's crew. It was always going to be difficult to defeat the deserving winners from Christ Church as the Hale crew was on average, one year younger and 8kgs per person lighter. The boys, however, can be proud of their 100% effort at training that resulted in a fourth place at the Scotch Regatta. The youthfulness of the crew is encouraging and it is hoped that Hale Rowing has a brighter future in 2004 and that the 1st VIII will achieve seven places better than in 2003.

The 2nd VIII had a horror season. Although progress was made in almost every training session, the boys in the crew failed to perform to their potential at the regattas. Coach Stuart Buxton worked tirelessly with the boys throughout Term 4, the summer break and Term 1. Unfortunately three 'crabs' were caught in the Head of The River Regatta where the boys were hoping to improve on their fifth place from the week before. The crew was led by example by their stroke Ben Stevens. The Year 11s in the crew will be fighting to earn a seat in the first boat next season.

The 3rd VIII finished seventh at the Head of The River. This result does not represent the crew's view of its performance. The boys preferred to judge their performance by how much fun they had and this crew was well known around the shed for having as much fun as possible. A standard training session for the thirds would consist of going on a half-hour warm-up run to return to a patient and very forgiving coach, Nial Wells, before getting on the water and trying to hide from him when it was still dark. Nevertheless, the boys did put in a lot of their personal time and effort over the six months and helped develop important shed spirit.

The 1st and 2nd Quad sculls were made up of Year 10 boys who filled in places in the open division due to a lack of senior rowers and a surplus of Year 10 rowers. Both of these quads train extremely hard from the very start of the season and rowed to their potential, achieving a gallant fifth in the Head Of The River. The 10 Quad worked along side the two senior skulls for most training sessions. They each helped to push the other quads to go faster.

The 10A VIII and 10B VIII crews were the pride of the shed, coming first in every two-kilometre race but one. The 10B crew was the only one to finish the season undefeated. The As, in spite of crashing in to spitposts and breaking the boat on numerous occasions, were only four seconds behind the 1st XVIII's time in the Head Of The River. The Hale Swim Team of 2003 was a fresh outfit led by new head coach, Jon Wyllie, who ably replaced Mr H. Jackson. The team also welcomed new coaches, Mr C. Wisniewski, Mr G. Lowe and David Winter to assist Mr R. Goater and Ms J. Fordham. The assault on the 98th Annual Inter-School Swimming carnival began in earnest during the summer holidays in January.

After a respectable second place at the 2002 PSA Interschool Carnival behind a very strong Guildford side and with a rapidly improving Wesley squad close behind in third place, Hale knew that it would have to work hard in 2003. Early in the year, signs were positive as a squad of 113 boys formed to compete for places in a team of 80 swimmers. A core of squad swimmers would contest a majority of individual races at the Inters and Jon Wyllie built on the pace of the non-squad swimmers who largely attended the school-based trainings, in order to create depth in the team, as they would be vital members of the relay sides and essential to victory at the Interschool Carnival.

Team spirit was developed during the many events held throughout the season. These included the swim camp, the annual Swimathon (which helped raise money to purchase the team item for the year), the Trogs Iron Man Competition, time trials with Wesley, St Mary's and MLC, the School Championships, the Tri Carnival and the relay/pasta night with the Old Boys. Such activities also ensured that the Hale Swim Team had the necessary race practice and maintained its enthusiasm for the sport.

The School Championships were held under lights on February 27. Each swimmer fought for selection in the side that would compete at the Interschool competition. Problems with the temporary lights meant that the final four races had to be completed before school the following day.

Over the course of the season Hale was briumphant at the Tri Carnival, fighting off

a determined Aquinas side, while the Guildford's squad provided uncertainty as to whether or not its best side had taken part. However, there were a number of great swims on the night with Jeff Yip and Garth Kates breaking records.

The Pasta night began with a series of relays against the Old Boys. Much to the delight of the younger generation and, for the first time in many years, the Hale Swim Team succeeded in taking the cup from the Old Boys. This was followed by the announcement of the Hale Swim Squad and a delicious, 'carbo-loaded' meal provided by the parent support group.

The 98th Annual Inter-School Swimming carnival was held on March 21 at Challenge Stadium. Although Hale was classed as the underdog against Wesley and Guildford, the first four races saw Hale powering through to claim victories in each. The Hale crowd was in full voice, while the other schools were silenced. Throughout the night the tally board see-sawed. Wesley went to a healthy lead late into the individual races with its junior swimmers dominating, while Hale dropped back to fourth place. Fortunately, Hale's senior swimmers kept the School

within reach of the lead with the relays not yet swum and good depth across all year groups. Hale wore down Wesley's lead to provide a tense and exciting atmosphere in which the results of the two final relays would decide the Champion School. Spurred on by the Hale supporters, the under-16 4x50m freestylers not only won their race, but also set a race record. The open 4x50m freestyle team ensured that Hale finished 'on top in the pool' with an outstanding first position. This was Hale's first victory in five years. Hale School has now won the carnival a record 32 times.




members. This is becoming a more frequent occurrence as there are with the large numbers of juniors, training at different levels.

The 2003 athletics team began the season with huge expectations. Some people were already talking about the possibility of three consecutive Alcock Shield wins. The athletes however, remained focused on their individual goals throughout the season. Mr Peisker's determination was evident when he began training boys at the very beginning of the year. Raph Baugh followed his example, taking the middle distance boys for several morning sessions a week.

The 2003 athletics season started sensationally when a small team of 20 athletes, 10 juniors and 10 seniors competed in the State final of the 'All Schools Knockout' competition at Perry Lakes Stadium on Friday August 29. The boys surprised everyone this day when Hale ended up winning both the junior and senior divisions, after for most, just one week of training. This effort gave the team a much-needed boost in confidence as it launched itself into preparations for Hale's third consecutive Alcock Shield victory.

In the weeks leading up to the Inter-School competition, Hale competed in a series of tri-meets. The first was against Scotch and Aquinas at Scotch. The team was still lacking in numbers at this stage of the season but it was hoped that it would grow as the Inters drew closer. A week later Hale was at Perry Lakes for a meet against Trinity and Aquinas. Here the team noted that Trinity and Aquinas would prove to be very competitive at the Inters a week later.

The Inter-School Athletics carnival was held on Saturday September 20 and Hale School's 2003 team set out to create some history by winning the it for the third

time in a row. Team manager Mr J. Audino described the competition as a 117-event relay, with each individual event representing a leg of the relay, and to which everyone would contribute. An injury depleted team battled extremely hard all day and every athlete carried the baton brilliantly for the School. Unfortunately the boys were unable to come away with the shield this time. Aguinas led from the start and finished in first place with 1353 points. Hale placed a gallant third with 1183.5 points and whilst there was a feeling of disappointment amongst the boys, each athlete also felt that he had done his best for the School on the day.

There were several outstanding performances throughout the day. Adam Nalapraya won the under 15 hurdles and an exciting sprint by James Lucas to win the 100m were among the highlights.

Hale's under 16 athletes were dominant with a number of first division wins. Stefan Todoroski won the shot put, an event he has dominated since Year 8. He then turned around and won the discus also. Tom Anderson won the high jump and the dynamic duo Clinton Benjamin and Lucas Mata, tore up the track in the sprints. Clinton won the 1st division 200m with a lightning time of 23.11seconds, the quickest 200m time of the day. He also won the triple high jump. Lucas Mata won the 100m and the long jump. Clinton Benjamin and Lucas Mata were also members of the invincible under 16 relay team along with Henry Roberts and Tom Anderson.

In the under 17 events Phil Stroud continued his dominance, winning both the shot put and discus comfortably.






1st XV Rugby

YEAR 4 REPORT

The boys in Year 4 began the year with Mrs Phillips, faced with the exciting challenges of passion projects, literature assignments and nurturing the class pets, two Noodjis. The highlights of Semester 1 included studying the Hindu religion, visiting a Hindu temple and making pop-up books with information on being water wise. The first half of the year came and went very quickly and in Semester 2 the boys welcomed their new teacher, Miss Sutherland.

Term 3 was spent exploring the ins and outs of the human brain. Much to Miss Sutherland's delight, the boys were not afraid to delve deep into brain dissections. There was not a squeamish face to be seen as the boys donned their gloves and seized their scalpels. The boys were able to locate, name and describe many of the brain's sections.

'Forensic Science' also made up a large part of the Year 4 learning

programme, with latent fingerprints, photographs and shoeprint casts being used to catch suspects. A forensic scientist from the Australian Federal Police kept the boys in awe as she recounted tales from her profession. The trip to the Fremantle Prison to look at *Moondyne* Joe's cell was a highlight of Term 3. Everyone was intrigued by the stories surrounding this infamous escape artist. As a part of the literature programme, the boys studied famous unsolved mysteries, ranging from the Loch Ness to the *Marie Céleste*.

In Term 4 the boys looked at 'Cultures'. The novel studied this term was 'Boy Overboard' which gave the boys an insight into the plight of refugees and asylum seekers from Afghanistan. They also learned how to write character letters, diary entries and use storyboards to retell sections of the novel. A highlight of the term was performing the New Zealand Haka at assembly.

To end the year, the boys took their parents on a tour of the classroom and showed them their favourite learning activities from Term 4. Congratulations on a terrific year's work.

YEAR 5 REPORT

The start of a new year always heralds the influx a fresh group of vibrant and excited Year 5s and this year was no exception. Twenty-eight fledglings joined the old boys in what was to be a year to remember. It has always been a time of great adjustment where the very rigorous academic, musical and sporting elements of Hale Junior often comes as a huge contrast to past schooling experiences for many new boys. Whilst still in this transition, the School camps, based in Busselton, allowed the boys to 'take a breather' from the demands back at school, to socialise and develop a rapport with their new teachers.

In Term 1 the boys undertook projects based on the theme: International Year of Fresh Water. They studied two excellent novels by well-known Australian authors, Tim Winton and Colin Thiele. They investigated the water cycle, conducted experiments on transpiration out in the Hale bush and designed and constructed their own wind-powered boats, which were later floated in the Hale pool. The boys studied safety aspects at the beach and met Mr Matt Simpson, a surf lifeguard and an ex Haleian, who honed their powers of observation when looking at beach conditions and who instructed them in basic life saving skills.

Ancient Civilizations was the theme for Term 2. A research project that involved the comparison of two Ancient Civilizations brought out the very best analytical and writing skills of all boys. One boy, dressed as a Roman Guard, discussed his project with the class. Others, made ceramic tiles depicting Ancient Egyptian hieroglyphics, whilst some boys produced their most prized piece

of writing to date. An archaeological dig took place in the 'Ancient Grounds' behind the Year 7 complex. The students had to use a three dimensional matrix to log their findings and miraculously, they came up with artefacts that ranged from Terracotta Warriors to hand made china from Ancient Britain.

Spirited debates, data collection and logging of species found around the Hale Lake and a trip to Perth Zoological Gardens were just some of the activities that the students of Year 5 undertook in Term 3 when studying the Environment. Gary Paulsen's incredible novel, 'Hatchet', formed the centre piece for literature based activities and sparked much interest amongst the boys in the hypothetical circumstance of surviving in the wilderness.

As a grand finale, Term 4 was an exceptionally busy time with a brilliant trip to the Aviation Museum and a visit to the School by yet another ex-Haleian, Andrew Caldow. Andrew was overwhelmed with questions from the boys about his role as a pilot for Qantas. The response to the discussion was impressive and there may well be some budding apprentices following in his footsteps in the future.

To conclude the Flight theme, all boys and their parents, took part in an outstanding night of glider building which was followed up with precision painting and flying of craft. It was a sensational way to end a particularly fun and productive year.

The web links explored to discover facts about Western Australian shipwrecks and to support factual accounts, proved to be fascinating reading.

Term 3 saw some future 'Prime Ministers' begin to practise their public speaking skills with a study of the three levels of Government in Australia. Some creative and informative power point presentations explored the lives of a number of Prime Ministers, from Sir Edmund Barton through to John Howard. Grandparents' Day proved a wonderful sharing time for the boys and enabled them to demonstrate their excellent technology and research skills. Visiting Parliament House together with the Constitution and Electoral Centres gave all boys a first hand opportunity to debate a topic, whilst sitting in a parliamentary member's chair in the Legislative Assembly. Perhaps sometime in the future, one of the 6F boys will become an official representative in the House.

As the hardworking and fun loving 6F boys move forward into the new Year 7 Centre, they can feel comfortable that Year 6 has been academically worthwhile and personally fulfilling.




STAFF

DOUBLE HELIX

2003 saw Double Helix members explore areas of science including the use of crystals in science to serology and identifying fungi to the importance of quarantine. They also enhanced their knowledge of favourite topics such as astronomy and environmental science. In Term 1, the boys enjoyed exploring the skies with Mr Cooper, teacher extraordinaire, who runs the Senior School Astronomy Club. Their studies culminated in an overnight camp at Bindoon where the boys had the opportunity to use W.A.'s biggest telescope. In a guided night walk at Karakamia Sanctuary in Chidlow the boys saw extraordinary numbers of native fauna in the wild: numbats, bandicoots, an echidna, several types of possums, quokkas, woylies and tamars. Everyone learned a great deal not only about the animals and their behaviours but also about their habitats.

Term 2 started with the ecological murder mystery Murder Under The Microscope. While there was some terrific individual detective work, the final results reflected lack of teamwork, essential in crime detection! Boys entered many competitions throughout the year, as individuals or team members. The Science Challenge was spread over 5 months. Several boys entered the National Science Week Art Competition. Mr Cooper shared his experience and knowledge as a pilot as the boys learned about the science of flight in order to prepare entries for the West Australian's 'Build A Glider Competition'.

Some of the highlights of the year for the boys were:

- learning how maggots can help to solve crimes with forensic with entomologist Michelle Harvey
- * a visit to CSIRO for hands-on experience in the work of geologists
- the Frog Watch programme, incorporating a sleep-over at Herdsman Lake Wildlife Centre
- a visit to Technology Park where the boys were amongst the first in W.A. to experience 3-D movies and computer programs without the aid of special glasses.
