



Speech Morning 2004

It is an honour to be presenting the School's Speech Morning report in its 146th year. Our special guests today give the ceremony an added lustre. The Most Reverend Peter Carnley and his wife Anne have made significant contributions to education, the State of Western Australia and Australia over many years and their legacy will remain with us well into the future. At a farewell Eucharist and Dinner to honour his contribution to education in Western Australia last week, it was announced that the new Anglican school to be

established at Wellard is to be known as the Peter Carnley Anglican Community School.

Professor Don Watts is a legend in education circles in WA. Professor Watts is an Old Haleian, his final year being 1950, when he was *proxime accessit* to the Dux of School, captain of tennis and member of the 1st XVIII. He is currently Senior Policy Advisor to the Vice-Chancellor of Notre Dame University.

In one of his books on educational reform, Andy Hargreaves makes the point that while change is mandatory, improvement is optional. Change is not inherently good, bad or neutral. But in the postindustrial, post-modern age, change is unavoidable. Hence to be true to our goals and aims and our mission statement, improvement is the only choice we have. This year we have seen a physical improvement in the form of a new boarding house replacing the three current boarding houses that have stood since the 1960s. This facility will set Hale at the forefront of boarding in WA and follows a commitment by the Board of Governors to maintain the very strong boarding influence in the School. The vibrancy that a 190-strong boarding community brings to the School is irreplaceable.

The launch of the Loton Day House took place at a Sundowner a couple of weeks ago. The boys who will take on the striking orange and blue colours of Loton, have been either assigned to the House since their entry into the Senior School or in the case of the Year 11 and 12 students in 2005, are volunteers who have accepted the challenge to be part of history. With Head of House, Mr McFarland and his Assistant Mr Young, the boys have developed a House crest, the House colours and a plan for their assault on the Cock House Cup.

This year, I have been fortunate to attend many Hale reunions. Mr Roger Gray as OHA Secretary has done a phenomenal job in organising gatherings of past year groups and participating in the 1964, 1954 and 1949 Leavers' functions has given me wonderful insight into Hale School during its days at Havelock Street. Our current students would benefit from hearing stories of the Havelock Street days, as they tell of a time when the School was not as well endowed with facilities as it is now.

At such functions I am keen to tell the Old Boys of the wealth of opportunities available at the School. They listen and are in awe of the offerings made available to you boys. I then tell them of the achievements and efforts made throughout the year. I get quite excited by such things and as with today, cannot do justice to all of them.

Once again, the boys have risen to the challenges on many fronts this year. The academic achievements of the boys in last year's TEE results were superb. A school with the Beazley Medallist, two General Exhibitions, four Subject Exhibitions, fifteen Certificates of Distinction and the same number of Certificates of Excellence, and an award for Excellence in Vocational Education must be doing something right.

There is a widely-held perception that Hale School has an academically selective entrance policy. One only has to look at the

numbers to see the folly of that statement. In the 2003 cohort, Hale had 32 students or 16.5% of the Year 12 cohort study three or more Wholly School Assessed subjects. Two neighbouring PSA schools had 9% and 7.5% of their candidature completing similar courses. Hale School prides itself on the pursuit of excellence in whatever field of endeavour the students choose.

Throughout 2004, boys have achieved success in numerous Mathematics and Science competitions, including several medal and High Distinction winners, Art awards from many significant competitions, including an unprecedented number (6) of works being selected for the upcoming 'Perspectives' exhibition of Year 12 work and an amazing four boys in the top 10 of the Year 10 Alliance Française exams this year. The list goes on.

In PSA sport, the swimmers provided a wonderful start to the year. Although not topping the table at the end of the night, the sight of the Open freestyle relay team winning the final event in dominant fashion even brought a tear to the eye of coach Mr Lowe on the pooldeck. The rowers succumbed in the final strokes in a nail-biter, the Corr Cup tennis team led by Matt Ebden retained the trophy and has the depth to attempt a 'threepeat' next year, the 1st XV led by Ben Lindegaard retained the Br Redmond Trophy and Themo Georgio's 1st XI soccer side shared the Lawe Davies Trophy. In a one day event the golf team returned with Hale's fourth PSA trophy for the year.

State and national players abound in lacrosse, martial arts, gokarting, rugby league, ice hockey, in-line hockey, eightball, water polo and many more. Garth Kates is well on track to being an Olympic swimmer, Rob Marshall was named national Lions' Youth of the Year, Josh Caddy was selected to go on the Premier's Anzac trip to Europe, Matt Gollow, Jamie Ward, and Year 12 musicians, Sean Woodcock and Mark Pagnozzi's exploits in external musical performances are just some examples of individual achievements in 2004. Drama and music continue to flourish at the School. In Their Own Write and The Tempest were two outstanding dramatic productions this year, the former showcasing the writing and directing skills of current and past students. With over 600 boys in both Junior and Senior Schools involved in music, the breadth of opportunities is obvious and the performances extraordinary.

But life at school is not all about spectacular success. It is full of achievements and failures. This is how we learn. It is what we make of the joys and disappointments that really count. Many of you will have read Bryce Courtney's book, April Fool's Day about his son, Damon, who was a student at Cranbrook when I first taught there. Damon was a haemophiliac who was infected with AIDS through a contaminated blood transfusion. Bryce Courtney is incredibly honest about his son and extremely conscious and accepting of both his strengths and weaknesses. He saw his son dreaming of a sophisticated life style with multiple possessions which would be brought about "by the personal charm, wit and brilliance of a young man who ignored his considerable physical handicaps (in fact he never mentioned them) when he was only half way through his twenties. [Bryce Courtney] was slowly beginning to realise that doing things, not having things, is the whole point in life. That by the time you get all the grown up toys you've largely forgotten how to play with them - the joy must come from what you do, not from what you do with the money you make from what you do."

The actual gaining of things might provide a reward - it may even be the motivation for striving. However, for any goal, material or otherwise, you still have to go through the process of getting there. If there is no pleasure in that, or if the journey is not pursued with integrity and honour, then the achievement of that goal is largely worthless and unsatisfying. My sense is that the vast majority of boys here today have enjoyed their year, the struggles and the disappointments as much as the achievements and the rewards.

Nowhere are the rewards in the journey more pronounced than in the School's Service Learning programme. I am immensely proud of the boys who voluntarily take part in this programme in the Senior School. Mr Michael Beech, Mrs Jill Maskiell and their team in the Roundhouse facilitate a wonderful learning experience for the boys as they move through the years, culminating in the Hale Sony Foundation Camp for the Disabled, a four day residential camp in December where Year 12 students who have finished their time at school return as 24 hour carers for the 20 disabled children. Many other boys assist in various ways from providing magic and drama shows, music presentations and all manner of entertainment for the children. There are no material rewards for this, save the quiet and very personal satisfaction of making a difference to the lives of the young children and their normal carers. If this does not exemplify the spirit of giving, of selflessness, of service, I have yet to see better. On Wednesday we farewelled the coordinator of this programme Mr Michael Beech, as he finally retired from his life of service at Hale School. His drive and determination, his leadership by example, and his integrity will long be remembered by all.

It is not only the boys who participate in the Service Learning programme. More than 30 members of staff give their time during the term to transport boys to different destinations. Before school, during their lunch breaks, in the evening and at the Sony Camp, they provide role modelling behaviour for the boys.

Indeed, the staff, both teaching and non-teaching, offer far more than their letters of appointment require. That is what makes Hale the community it is. The warmth with which the boys acknowledged the administrative staff, the grounds, maintenance, security, kitchen, boarding house, medical centre, clothing shop, canteen, technician and library staff as the departing Year 12s presented them with gifts of appreciation said a lot.

We ask a great deal from those prepared to teach. We expect them to know their subject well and to thoroughly like what they are doing. We expect teachers to like all their students. They need to like them for their youthfulness, aggravating though it may sometimes be. We expect teachers to know their students. Teachers learn about them by mixing with them, out of the classroom, in a range of settings, watching endeavour, selfishness, bursts of great warmth and thoughtfulness, silliness, fear and hopes. There are rewards in this but there is also a huge investment in time and emotional energy. On top of this we expect teachers to know much more. They cannot be mentors unless they are interesting people, who belong to the real world. They must have ways to escape from the young. They must also have good memories, will-power, kindness and a very good sense of humour to keep it all in proportion. What an 'ask'! I extend my warmest thanks to the teaching staff and I ask you to join me in thanking them for their commitment and efforts throughout this year.

Important initiatives that have been introduced into the Senior School this year include the implementation of the notebook programme for all Year 8 students, the semesterised subject offerings in Year 10 and the Outdoor Education focussed Year 8 camp. We would be naïve to promote the complete success of each of them. However, with fine tuning next year, the programmes should bring further benefits to the boys. Next year, the Year 9 Pastoral Care programme has been altered to allow the boys to move into the mainstream of the House system. There was concern that the Year 9s were 'in limbo' in this regard and the appointment of an Assistant Head of House to each House should allow the boys to reap the benefits of both the House and PCL based programmes.

The very professional Heads of Department, under the leadership of Mr David Bean and Mr Mike Giles, are working through the bureaucracy associated with the Post -Compulsory Review process. With the first stage of implementation affecting boys in 2006, 2005's Year 10 students and their parents will meet with Mr Bean to discuss the new English courses of study. The major overhaul will begin in 2007, impacting on the current Year 8s. It is an immense programme and is another factor to add to the many expectations we have of the teachers. It has been stated that some of the State's most experienced teachers will 'call it a day' rather than become immersed in the proposed assessment and reporting regimes.

Student leadership has been on the agenda for the Heads of House this year and the Director of Pastoral Care, Mr Richard Goater, has guided the highly committed Heads of House through many discussions. Decisions reached will be implemented over the next year, although the selection process for the senior student leadership teams has been reviewed and amended for implementation in Term 4 this year. Hence, the Year 11 students interested in being part of the student leadership team next year have completed written questionnaires, filled in review sheets at the completion of their Year 11 monitor duties, participated in a team-building exercise one Sunday morning and met with Mr Goater and me in an interview setting. I have no doubt some very capable young men will not be appointed to School or House Prefect positions. However, I maintain that all Year 12 students have the responsibility for setting the tone of the School and thus their leadership is required throughout the campus in every setting. This year's Prefects were led by Phil Stroud and Michael Cowley, individuals with styles of leadership that complemented each other. Phil's contribution was extraordinary and his role modelling behaviour across the breadth of Hale School life was without peer. Phil, I thank you; you have made your mark at Hale.

I would now like to announce the School Prefects and House Captains for 2005.

Matthew Aitken, Tom Anderson, Ben Banting, Simon Bartulovic, Clinton Benjamin, David Bignall, Guy Doggett, Scott Gaynor, Robert Henham, Karim Johnson, Chad Leeson, Lucas Mata, Alex McFaull, Nevin Mills, Stefan Testi, Ben White, Charles Williams. When we spoke to these 17 boys individually, their promotion of servant leadership was apparent.

To lead this team and indeed the student body, I would like to ask the following two appointments to take one step forward from this team: Vice Captain of School for 2005: Guy Doggett. Captain of School for 2005: Matthew Aitken. Matthew and Guy will prove to be strong leaders of a committed team.

The Hale School community is a living beast and it must be fed to keep it growing. Ali Harris and the Parents' and Friends' Association have been tireless in their efforts at friend-raising this year, the Michael Carr-Gregg evening and the *Trivia* evening were standouts. The Carr-Gregg presentations to boys and parents were exceptional. I am sure all who attended came away with some new insights, although his tip that the best 'brain foods' to assist in memory retention were sardines, anchovies and blueberries was no doubt conveniently forgotten by the boys by the time they got home.

I would like to acknowledge the role of the Board of Governors. Theirs is a role undertaken for the purpose of service. Their individual areas of expertise are collected around the Boardroom table for the express benefit of the future of the School. They are committed and supportive yet not intrusive. They serve this School well and we are indebted to them, none more so than the Chairman, David Aitken. The hours he puts into his role are endless, and his willingness to discuss matters and see issues through to their completion is extraordinary. His commitment is unfailing.

Thank you to all who have contributed to the rich learning environment that is Hale School. Over 220 staff, teaching and nonteaching, work to provide the opportunities and the facilities for the boys. And they in turn, have an obligation to make the most of all that is on offer. As I said to the men gathered at the Retired Old Haleians' lunch last week, we who currently have a place at Hale are merely the custodians of the values, traditions and reputation of nearly 150 years.

A final reflection: The Importance of Small Steps

I was referred to a passage in Carolyn Polizzotto's book, *Pomegranate Season.* Then Luke made the trip to Claremont on his own, for the first time. He and I have been practising it, bit by bit, since pedestrian lights were installed on the Bayview Terrace intersection. With that single event, crossing the Stirling Highway has been transformed from an impossible risk into an acceptable one. Driving down behind the bus, with him on it, I was bursting with pride. When he got out, at the right stop, he shouted when he saw me, "Mum, I made it!"

We must never lose sight of the significance of the small steps in the lives of those growing up around us because they set the foundations in so many ways for the big steps later on.

It is a privilege for me to be part of this wonderful school and with all of you to be part of its destiny and I commend Hale to your loyal and ongoing support.

Captain of School's Speech Day Address 2004

This had been a year with its ups and downs, its highs in success, much accolade and satisfaction but also one of lows in tragedy, sadness and some disappointments. But without agony there is no ecstasy, without disappointment success loses its taste, in achieving goals there will be sacrifice, and sadly death, is a part of life. A lot has happened this year and today we are here to celebrate and reflect. What I have to say is to the boys from whom I have learned; my message to you. In writing this speech I realised, being published in the Cygnet and having a large audience, I would be held to this speech and to what I believe. It was not so long ago Mr Biddle reminded me that: You are what you say.

I remember a few weeks ago Mr Meade said if you turn up at 8:30am every day to leave at 3:30pm, then you'll get an education but that is all. If this is all you desire in life then life provides little. It was Charles Blackman, one of Australia's most famous artists who said, "If you have a talent you have not the right, but the obligation to use it."

For talents are a privilege neither bought nor granted. What Hale provides you with is the opportunity to enjoy yourselves, being with mates or fulfilling a passion. This is why Hale's gates open well before 8:30 and sometimes don't close until the lights go out. This is why the swimmers get up early to taste ice chlorine, or the rowers before the sun rises to row on glass and still air for one race, why the musicians, actors and public speakers battle paralysing nerves and fear of criticism from a crowd of a few hundred and the artists continue their work at every opportunity.

For me there is no experience that will beat the feeling of playing in a band in front of a full hall. There is no crowd I'd rather swim or run in front of than my peers. There is no greater feeling than being with the boys of the $4 \times 50m$ freestyle relay team at the swimming Inters or the 100m relay team at the Athletics sharing with everyone the feeling that we hadn't just won the last event, but the whole day. If this does not interest you, if you have decided a six hour school day is enough, then this is up to you, but don't leave here not having given anything a try, and make sure it is a choice you have made.

In my 17 years I have decided that the key to life is quite simply FUN but this doesn't mean that all life is fun. If you are not enjoying yourself, if you are not satisfied then you are not living but having said this it is important to understand you will not enjoy everything you do, there are some things you will have to do that you would much rather run from, some things will

happen that will tear you down and it will be hard to get up sometimes. Fun is the light in the tunnel you can not yet see. You have to realise that sometimes in life you have to bite your lip and stick it out to achieve your goals, to live your dreams. If life lost its sting, then life would provide little. If musicians didn't have to practise everyday then they would lose their appeal, if art didn't provide so much angst and emotion then the works would have little substance, if everyone ran a 10 second hundred then who cares if occasionally someone broke it. It was JFK when predicting the future of space exploration who said: "We don't do these things because they are easy; we do these things because they are hard".

We admire these feats because of their stamina, humility and difficulty not simply because they are done. Charles Blackman was lucky. He found his talent and lived doing what he loved. But at times his work would exhaust him, take him through a journey of emotion, would elevate him only to bring him back down.

Before I go, I would like to leave you with this message. Take the road less travelled; fulfil your own dreams, your own desires. Forget what everyone else thinks of you and find out what inspires you, what make you think, what gets the blood rushing. I remember Dr Inverarity our former Headmaster saying **everyone in the world is different and thank God that is the case.** In other words, be yourself. As Shakespeare said in Hamlet:

"To Thine own self be true; thou canst not then be false to any man."

When you leave this school give yourself something to remember. Respect yourself and all others, admire those who do things better than you, but do not ever think they have something over you, do not ever want to be someone else, never idolise.

At the PSA Interschool Athletics Carnival, I remember Chris Guard injured, staggering around the three kilometre track, occasionally losing step as he wiped

the water from his eyes. That same day Jarryd Batt crossed the line of his consecutive 400 metres' race win, threw up and then found the strength to be a part of the winning relay team. I have seen, Mike Jelinek play his guitar until he only had three strings left, Sean Woodcock play the piano without seeing his fingers, Larz Harry agonize over his art after he was told, following hours of work, that he could not possibly be finished. Mitch Morton sacrifice Leavers celebrations for his football and fulfil his dream as a member of the Eagles, Rob Marshall win Lions' Youth of the Year Speech Contest, Josh Caddy travel to Europe as a result of a prize winning essay, Tjad Dorrington exhaust himself after competing in five events at the Swimming Inters, placing 1st or 2nd in each, and Ben Lindegaard, now signed to the Newcastle Knights, complete the House cross country course on crutches. It goes without saving that this year has been one of huge talent, success and tenacity. In the words of a great man, my Head of House, Mr Cecins, "It has been a unique year".

Lastly, use what you have learned for more than just a TER at the end of your final year. To all those who wish to voice a political or social comment, don't be a 'fence sitter', choose a side, but be ready to listen to other opinions. If you don't believe in anything, at least believe in yourself. If you don't know how to push yourself, find someone who does know how to push you. In a world of uncertainty, be certain about yourself. Be a man of principle, be a loyal mate, stick by your word.

To the Year 11s, think of Year 12 as a 400m race. If you've never run a 400m it feels a little like this. You start off with energy and bounce but, before long, wonder if you have started too hard and hold back. When you hit 100m you cruise, realising there is a way to go. By 200m your legs start to hurt, your muscles start to produce lactic acid, but you must continue. The next 100m is a mixture of agony and appreciation as you realise that the end is close. The last 50m is all adrenaline and memory. So, as you face next year, realise it will end, understand that it is not supposed to be easy. Dig deep, make your sacrifice, finish the job, but pace yourself. Also realise that for the entire distance you have a crowd to cheer you on; your peers, your mates, your teachers, parents and mentors, because at the end of the day, we are all on the same team.

Valedictory Chapel Address: Father Tim Russell. First Reading: Isaiah 42: 1-7

Here is my servant! I have made him strong. He is my chosen one; I am pleased with him. I have given him my Spirit, and he will bring justice to the nations. I made the earth and everything that grows on it. I am the source of life for all who live on this Earth, so listen to what I say. I chose you to bring justice, and I am here at your side. You are like light for the whole world. A city built on top of a hill can't be hidden, and no one would light a tamp and put it under a clay pot. You are a light to the world. Let your light shine before others.

Valedictorians of 2004, in your years at Hale School, much has changed about the world in which you live and the way you see it. Some of that change has been real, almost tangible, but much more of this perceived change has been internalyou have changed, you have grown, you have matured and come to see things in new ways.

Throughout your time here you have repeatedly heard teachers, Heads of House, the Headmaster, and me, remind you to make the most of the opportunities presented to you: play sport; join the choir, attend to your studies, involve yourself in the life of the School in clubs, societies, as leaders and supporters.... you've heard it all a dozen times or more.

But in the end it is none of these individual activities, or the fact that you have such a variety of them from which to choose, that makes Hale, such a great place to be.

You don't need me to spell out for you what the most important element of your years of study here is, because you have already worked it out for yourselves. I've seen it. I hotice it when I wander down the Administration stairs and see you studying the trophy cabinet and the Archives for the first or for one last time. I saw it when Alex Anderson screamed like he had been shot, and bolted back down the track to be with the team at the Inters when the 12s won the final relay of the meet. More joy than anyone showed at an individual victory. And most plainly I notice it in the care you have for one another.

You care for each other in individual times of need. And most profoundly you care for each other when that tragedy is a shared experience, as in the death of Matt Paikos. Even in the fog of your own individual pain and confusion, you recognised and responded to the needs of others, particularly those of the Paikos family.

In his speech Robert spoke of a place of belonging, a second home. A home in which you have been discovering the joy and comfort of a community that makes each one of you more than you are on your own: more whole, more resilient, more sensitive.

When I seflect on this year group, what strikes me, is that each of you discovered and became a part of what this School can be at its best, a community that sets you free to be yourself. In becoming a part of this community you experienced some of what Christ spent his life and death proclaiming: that communion with God, the highest form of what it is to be human, is achieved through communion with one another and the whole created order - a relationship of compassion and care, not only individual but communal. and not only personal but cosmic. When we move beyond our own needs to be a part of something bigger than ourselves. and when we let go of our own needs to tend to each other's wounds, we touch on what it is to be complete.

Gentlemen, Valedictorians of 2004, in your time here you have been part of something special, a community in which you have shared in each other's lives, and from this you will draw great blessing. You have experienced the light of true community, a light that the world into which you go, hungers for.

So this is my charge to you.

"Open the eyes that are blind,

bring out the prisoners from the dungeon,

from the prison those who sit in darkness."

Let the light kindled in you shine, and place that light where it may be seen and give light to the world. Hold fast to the experience of being part of a community that has communion with one another, in joyful events and in times of tragedy. Hold fast to the most important lessons: not necessarily the lessons on how to get into University, TAFE, or a job, to run faster; jump higher or kick with greater precision. Hold fast to the lessons that help you to see clearly your own great value as a human being, to understand that this is as true for you as it is for the person sitting next to you.

Be a light on a hill. Be a beacon. Illuminate others.

Pull those around you from the darkness of mean hearts and selfish desires that rob them of true life in relationship with each other. Stand against the limited and limiting view that by standing alone is, to be strong and that by seeking your own benefit at another's cost, is the path to success. Remember the people you rubbed shoulders with, with whom you formed rivalries and friendships and those who helped you and offered you care and compassion when you needed it most.

Go from this place sure in the knowledge of the blessing and favour of each other, of Hale School, and of our most loving God.

It is for eternity that you will have a home in each.

The Lord, the God who loves and nurtures, be with you, in all that you do.



VALEDICTORY SPEECH

The following is an edited version of an address given by Dr Paul Dunham, Head of Languages at Hale School, to the 2004 Year 12 Valedictory Assembly.

Headmaster, Mr Aitken, Parents, Year 12s, students. When I was first contacted by the Deputy Headmaster about delivering this address, my immediate reaction was one of bewilderment followed by panic. Not so much at the prospect of having to stand here and talk to you, but more at the fact that the Valedictory address is usually given by a departing teacher. I did seek his reassurance that this was not a subtle way of telling me that I had been sacked and that neither was it a prank call.

Mr Bean thought I might have an interesting story to tell you about how I went from living in the North of England to spending several years in the South of France, about how I went from being a house painter to an academic, and I could easily imagine spinning you a yarn involving breathtaking adventure, hairraising escapes and some other things that it is perhaps better not to mention. People have given me all sorts of advice about this talk and I know that many have certain expectations of what I am going to say. Some people said : "Tell some jokes." My wife made me promise not to. I thought I might talk to you about my own Valedictory Day, but all I remember is that we were not caned, the school priest told us we were all going to hell, and then we jumped on our bikes and went home.

The idea of a valedictorum is, as the word would suggest, to say farewell to you and to give you some advice to send you on your way, hopefully with an example from my own experience in life. Initially I was going to tell you that I would be the last person to give anyone advice, as I adhere fervently to the school of thought propounded by the 17th century French philosopher, La Rochefoucauld, who said that old people like giving young people good advice to console themselves for no longer being capable of setting a bad example. The idea then, is for me to set you a good example. This, of course, is a huge responsibility and, as I reflected on everything I have done, I found it virtually impossible to find anything that would provide a good example for you. I did, however, eventually find an example not about me, but about someone I once knew.

It was the summer of '71 and I was backpacking around Europe. While in Nice I met a Mexican-American trumpet player called Lenny. We travelled to Spain to do the Bull Run in Pamplona, but that is another story and definitely a

very bad example. Lenny was from Chicago and worked as a teacher. He used to be a trumpet player in a rock band but quit because he thought the band was not achieving anything musically and he disliked like the rock musician lifestyle. The rest of the band went on to become one of the supergroups of the 70s: named after their home town, they were called simply Chicago, and Lenny's friends were millionaires by the time I met him. And yet, he had no regrets. He loved being a teacher because he felt he was having a positive influence on people's lives. He told me he loved the communication between teacher and pupil, and that seeing classes of eager young faces all wanting to learn filled him with an immense sense of satisfaction.

He never regretted his choice. As La Rochefoucauld said, *Il ne faut pas regretter ce qu'on a fait, seulement ce qu'on n'a pas fait.* One must not regret what one has done, only what one has not done. Lenny chose to be a teacher instead of a rock star - a fitting story on World Teachers' Day.

The great joy of being a teacher for me is what I learn from the students. In my first year at Hale I found it very difficult to adjust to the secondary environment having come from the University of Western Australia. However, I was given the 10B soccer team to coach and it was that group of boys who, by their goodnatured friendliness, by their genuine sense of team spirit and by their honesty, really persuaded me I wanted to stay here. They taught me an enormous amount about this school just by being themselves. I have had the great privilege of seeing them and all of you become young men. I have known some of you through my French classes and many of you have come to know me through the Wednesday detention sessions. All a part of the School's rich tapestry.

Unfortunately, I have no deep insights, no last-minute advice as you launch yourselves into adulthood. I suppose as a concerned parent I would want to say, "Be careful" or "Do not drink and drive", but in the present context all I can say is: just have a go, and stay true to the values you have learned during your years here at Hale School. Live life to the full! The gift of life is a sacred thing, something to be treasured. Do not be afraid of becoming involved. Above all, be aware of opportunities. However, in all of this, try to be humble. Whatever you do in life, you will be surrounded by people who know less than you and by those who know more than you. If you remain humble you will not criticise those who know less and you will remain open to learn from those who know more.

All life is a learning experience if you keep an open mind. Do not assume that you will always be learning from people who are older than you. You can learn much from children, as I have in my 3 years at Hale. You never know where life is going to lead you. I would never have imagined in my wildest dreams having a job like my present one. And yet, here I am. I did not go to university immediately after school. I went to university when I was 40. I believe it is important to do what you really want to do rather than what you ought to do.

Nothing is compartmentalised in life. You do not cease to exist for us after you have left Hale and likewise Hale should not fade out of your life just because you are no longer one of its students. Stay in touch through the Old Boys' Association. You are part of a wonderful community that cares about your progress through life. A community that rejoices in your achievements and endeavours to help when there are problems. Having attended Hale, you have been given the best possible start to a successful life whether it be practical, spiritual or emotional. By sending you to this school, your parents have provided you with winning tickets to take you into the next phase of your life.

So, finally, on behalf of the Hale community I wish you all 'Bon courage, Bon voyage, Bonne chance': good luck to each and every one of you. Thank you for teaching me and thank you all for listening to me today.





A NEW LIFE FOR LOTON HOUSE



With the move of all boarders to the new Boarding House [Faulkner and Wilson], Loton House, commencing in 2005, will continue its contribution to the affairs of Hale School as a Day House.

Loton House began operations in 1966 under the expert guidance and 'eagle eye' of Mr Tom Hoar. It closed its doors as a boarding facility on the December 3 2004.

William Thorley Loton, from Staffordshire in England, travelled steerage aboard the *Strathmore* and arrived at Fremantle on March 26, 1863. Subsequently, by dint of hard word and endeavour, became a successful merchant, landowner and politician and was knighted in 1923.

His son, Old Boy Ernest Thorley Loton [The High School, 1906-1912] was

also a highly successful businessman, merchant and pastoralist and was also knighted for services to the community. Sir Thorley served on the board of the Hale School as a governor for twenty four years [ten as Chairman] and was one of those closely involved in the negotiations with the State Government for the sale of the leasehold of the Havelock Street School site. Only then could the current Wembley Downs begin to be developed. In honour of the considerable input by Sir Thorley, the Board of Governors named a boarding house after him.

Loton House, from January 2005 will now nurture a new generation of Hale youngsters - as day boys - but the traditions of hard work and close fellowship that have marked the life of the 'old' Loton House for the past 44 years are sure to continue long into the future.

He was knighted in 1969 for services to agriculture, education and for community service.

experience skill to lead the team to a second place finish. Although the senior basketball tried admirably it was their juniors who shone by securing second place in their competition. 

unlucky when a problem with equipment cost them first place. Likewise, the junior rowing also placed third, and lost only one close race with a team that included star Year 9, Aidan Ashwin. shirts and a Riley green sash. Splitting the choir into Year Groups and incorporating dynamics was included as well, for aural depth. On a State level, in the Science Olympics, Tom Skevington won medals in Physics and Chemistry, Karim Johnson won Bronze in Biology and Brendan Van Rooyen achieved a High Distinction in Chemistry. In Year 12, Marc White was runner-up for Dux of School and also received prizes in English, Ancient History and Applicable Mathematics. In Year 10 James Lucas won prizes for English and Japanese and also the Barclay and Sharland Trophy for being U/16 champion in Athletics – quite a year for James! Marcus Stoinis was the Most Promising Year 10 in cricket earning the Irvine Trophy and Steven Lackovic the SG Luck Trophy for most promising Year 10 basketballer, while musician Adrian Yeo won the Outstanding Contribution to

Orchestra Prize and the Hale Ensemble Shield as a member of the Piano Trio. Well-done boys!

The boys of Riley House can look back over 2004 as a year of hard work and development for the House and those associated with it. The leadership shown by the Year 12s was excellent this year and is exemplified in Michael Cowley and Tjad Dorrington. Tjad was awarded the Edward Burgoyne Prize for Leadership, a prize also won by Riley's House Vice Captain last year. Riley House eventually placed eighth in the Cock House Cup, a big improvement on last year's tenth placing. This improvement is a very good sign for Riley House and hopefully it is a preview of Riley's movement upwards on the Cock House Cup table. Thank you once again to Mrs Gray, who led the boys of the House through the successes of swimming and baseball as well as the disappointments of the Arts Cup and touch rugby and the shattering death of Matt Paikos, one of biggest contributors to the House. 

contingent in 2005, this may be about to change.

Wilson's failure to retain the Chess Cup summed up a frustrating winter sport season. Second and fifth places in both junior and senior football respectively, were the best results of the season. Although the remaining teams collected two seventh and two tenth places the sportsmanship, endeavour and teamwork could not be faulted. Despite this, there were still some very praiseworthy results, with Wilson, although coming last in senior soccer, achieving the closest scoreline of 3-2, against the eventual winners, St Georges and demonstrating the team's courage in rising to the occasion. The Walla rugby team came seventh, a very good effort for a House with only a handful of rugby players. Not only was this a record high for Wilson as far as placing goes, but the tries flowed thick and fast, even against the top sides!

It was widely rumoured that the reason for Wilson's lacklustre performance in winter sport, was the result of the boys 'pacing themselves' - preparing for the cross country. 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












OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Hale School's Outdoor Education Programme is a wonderful example of experiential learning where personal and group challenges, skills in outdoor living, bush craft, kayaking, climbing, abseiling and a host of other skills and the opportunity for boys to grow in selfconfidence resilience and resourcefulness are presented in a carefully structured curriculum.

Structured Programme-Years 5 to 10

In recent years Murray Curran as Junior School Coordinator, has developed an excellent programme for the younger boys. Under Murray's guidance, the Aboriginal Education experience, a major focus of this programme has been the refined. There is now a developmental curriculum from Year 5 through to Year 8. It begins with an introduction to Noongar Culture in the early years through








storytelling and dreaming, and includes activities in making artefacts and an orientation to the Aboriginal way of life. It culminates with a corroborree during the Year 8 camp on the banks of the Blackwood River, where the boys participate in song and dance.


In the Senior School, we have finally implemented a Year 8 camp worthy of Outdoor Education at Hale School. Formerly the boys were involved in a Perth based orientation camp. The new four day Year 8 programme on the Blackwood River was a resounding success from a teaching point of view and was well received by students and parents alike. In the next few years we intend to develop this programme further and to refine the Year 9 and 10 camps, as we cater for better prepared and more knowledgeable participants in future.

The Year 9 cohort experienced a broader range of activities in 2004, with sea kayaking at Hamelin Bay. It was an enjoyable and successful programme for this year group and will place them in good stead for Year 10 in 2005.

In our pinnacle programme in Year 10, the major development was its reintroduction back into Term 3, after











many years of running camps during and either side of the school holiday times. It has taken a lot of work to get this result, and it is in no small way due to the enlightened contribution of the Executive and the many Heads of Departments. The programme still spans a total of eight weeks but five of these are now in Term 3. With the support of the Heads of Departments, many of whom have attended Exmouth camp in recent years, the Year 10 population was provided with a new course of study based around an amount of self-guided work. Many subject areas produced projects relating to the Exmouth location, making it more relevant to the students, and in some instances like a giant 'hands-on' field trip. The overall result has been positive and there is already a murmur of excitement about how it can be improved in 2005.

In addition to the compulsory programme, a number of optional programmes are offered. This aspect of the Outdoor Education Department is coordinated by Simon Hunt.

During the Term 1 break, a group of Year 11 and 12 students accompanied by Ms Carina Sas, joined a group of Methodist Ladies College students at their invitation on a 10-day voyage aboard the Sail Training Ship Leeuwin. The voyage left from Fremantle and ended at the Abrolhos Islands. The wonderful experience enjoyed by the boys was eclipsed only by the overtly positive response from Carina who offered her assistance again, should the opportunity arise.

At the same time, a group of eight students went to Vanuatu on a SCUBA diving trip led by Simon Hunt. It was an exceptional experience with good diving and a great exposure to another culture in the Nivan Vanuatuan people. Simon has worked hard to continue offering the SCUBA diving experience to Hale School boys with two open water courses running each year as well as other diving trips.

Thanks go to Murray Curran and Simon Hunt together and to the contract instructors in 2005 for being the backbone of the Outdoor Education Department. Also thanks to the teachers who volunteered to be group leaders in Exmouth.

The Outdoor Education staff acknowledge Mr Richard Goater as Director of Pastoral Care for his belief, his guidance and his support. In the short time that he has been responsible for Outdoor Education's development at Hale, it has progressed considerably.

The strength of the School's academic departments is revealed by excellent results in both Tertiary Entrance Examinations (TEE) subjects and Wholly School Assessed (WSA) subjects. In both categories Hale School was ranked equal sixth in the State in terms of the number of times our subjects were placed in the top ten for the State.

Seven TEE subjects were in the top ten:

Ancient History, Art, Calculus, English Literature, French, Geography and Physics.

Three WSA subjects were in the top ten:

Applied Technology, Management and Marketing, and Physical Education Studies.

The WestScheme Award for Excellence in Vocational Education and Training was won by Peter Brockman.

Thirty students gained a TER of 97.5 or more (ie a TES of 395 or more). This was 18% of Hale School's TEE population. By comparison, 7% of the State TEE population scored a TER of 97.5 or more.

50% of our TEE students attained a TER of 90 or more.

We congratulate all students of Year 12 2004 on their achievements and acknowledge the very sound partnership between students, parents and School which underlies the students' success.

SCHOLARSHIPS

We congratulate three students for their outstanding success in gaining university scholarships. Tim Leung was the recipient of a Melbourne University National Scholarship. 25 scholarships are awarded Australia-wide for outstanding academic performance. 

ACADEMIC EXTENSION / smARTS

Often at Hale School, we are reminded of the impressive collection of extra curricular activities we have the opportunity to undertake. Many of course, impose harsh restraints on needed time but this particular activity however, demands only the occasional half hour, offers a workload spread over almost the entire year, and provides all the benefits that would result from other clubs but without the more time consuming activities.

Available to students in Year 11, this extension programme is pertinently entitled smARTS. It essentially entails an assortment of interested Hale students being thrown into the mix with students from various other schools from around the State. Students are then divided into groups of six and given the task of researching and subsequently presenting the information they have compiled, on what for all intents and purposes, can be any topic they choose. The parameters set for subjects of research this year included such potentially expansive topics as 'Music's rules in Society' and 'Generation Y'.

Very early in the year, a small notice in the Bulletin was posted, of which very few boys took heed. This we hope will not happen again and we urge the new crop of Year 11s to respond quickly to any chance of being involved in this project. The small resultant groups were allocated University students to act as tutors and resources for the coming months.

Challenged with sharing the project with a roomful of sceptical teenagers, a number of essays, newspapers, magazines, and films, were created for the presentation night. On a few occasions throughout the year we were asked to attend on- campus meetings at the University of Western Australia, where all resources were made available to us. Additionally, on a set date groups would meet in secure chat rooms on the smARTS website to discuss progress, and possibilities for furthering the production. 

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

CAREERLINK

Newspaper reports of the current worldwide shortage of skilled tradespeople highlight the relevance and effectiveness of Careerlink as a suitable pathway for Year 12 students in preparation for successful and rewarding eareers. Whilst acknowledging the practical considerations in choosing Careerlink there is also something fundamentally right about a programme that engages the boys so comprehensively in the development of vocational, intellectual and social skills through partnership with the wider community.

As in previous years, the first half of 2004 saw most of the boys undertaking Off-the-Job Training towards the completion of Certificate I or II within the National Training Qualification Framework. This year saw the further expansion of OJT with the inclusion of Certificate II in Print Design, pursued by a number of students, as well as Certificate I in Community Leadership. The latter was a course completed by Kim Shurman and became the foundation for an extremely successful Structured Workplace Learning experience later in the year. Kim's employer, a large and prestigious law firm, commented on his initiative and his capacity to fit seamlessly into the work environment, attributes no doubt strengthened through his earlier training. Kim's experience is typical of many in the programme.

This year also saw the consolidation of





the Careerlink Awards Night where students from across the cluster of 11 schools to which Hale School belongs, were presented with their qualifications gained through OJT, in the impressive new Perth Convention Centre. It is a sign of the continued expansion of Careerlink that the previous venue, the ballroom of the Sheraton Hotel, was deemed too small to accommodate all the students involved as well as the parents, principals and friends who had come to affirm their achievement. Despite a few teething problems in using the venue for the first time, nearly all who attended, agreed that the night was a great success. Significantly, two Hale School boys were judged to be the Student of the Year in their respective courses of study. Mathew Gollow was judged best student in Certificate II in Multimedia, and Peter Brockman was judged best student in Certificate I in Conservation & Land Management. It is a credit to the boys to achieve this honour in competition with

their peers from across the *Careerlink* cluster. There would have been a few other Hale School boys who must also have been very close to achieving the same honour as Matt and Peter, such was the overall strength of the group this year.

In the second half of the year, students spent one day per week in the workplace. completing an industry specific skills list towards the achievement of the subject Structured Workplace Learning. It is in SWL where the partnership between students, parents, school, industry, and training providers becomes fully apparent as the boys put their newfound confidence and competency to the test in a real life work situation. As is usually the case, there was a wide range of placements undertaken including animal care, jewellery design, teaching assistants, as well as the more traditional areas such as building & construction, automotive, and so on. Especially pleasing are the connections the students are able to make with employers and this year was no exception as a number of apprenticeships and traineeships for 2005 were secured by the boys before the conclusion of the year.

Overall it was a very successful year for all students, none more so than Peter Brockman, who won the Westscheme Award for Vocational Excellence as well as the prize for the best student in Career & Industry Awareness, another aspect of the *Careerlink* programme. Well done to all!

Candle in the Wind

Grandfather slept peacefully in his favourite rocking chair. I frequently glanced over from my comfy, oak armchair opposite him, nostalgically watching the fierce storm outside. His ancient chest rising up and down with such strength, yet with such fragility, much like some of the trees outside that swayed in the winds. He wasn't a smoker, but had been a candle maker all his life and grandmother thought that this frequent exposure to candles caused his bad lungs and consequent thunderous snoring.

Grandmother said this was the worst storm she had ever seen with its fierce winds that stripped trees of any remotely loose foliage. On the radio news, it was reported that the recurrent lighting strikes had hit numerous trees and had even struck and killed a golfer. The thunder we could hear was deafening. The rain was continuous and we were sure we could hear hail stones on the windows and the tin roof. From the noise we expected the windows to shatter any minute. I watched the rain trickle down the trunks of trees nourishing the parched roots beneath, much like the wax strengthening the base of the candle, as it drips.

I can vividly remember my grandparents telling me that storms were God washing himself. The rain was God's water that became cold when it reached Earth, and became hail when heaven was cold. The clouds were the steam these showers produced, and lightning was God's attempt to provide illumination, while God had these brief bathing sessions. I first learnt there are a few untruths amongst this explanation quite recently, but I feel it is nice to ease the mind during a thunderstorm.

"Ah! What's that!?" I yelled as everything went completely dark. "Don't worry, it's just a blackout," my grandmother was saying comfortingly. The softly lit family room atmosphere had transformed into a pitch-black cauldron of coldness and remoteness. A

result of this sudden darkness was my mood, which had gone from relaxed and jubilant to fear and disorientation. But I knew grandpa's Pascal candle that he made around thirty years ago always kept burning in his backyard shed. He calmly obtained one of his fresh candles, went outside and returned with it lit. He put it on the kitchen table and said, "Nothing, can snuff out the light in a candle wick." That made me feel so safe and calm immediately, as I knew even the worst blackout could not extinguish the light around my grandfather.

Today is Friday, and we would make candles to sell at the markets on Sunday. My grandmother had a stall, and sales would be fantastic this time of year, especially with the frequent power failures. "Bring that wax mix over here!" my grandpa yelled at me. "And those moulds and wick strings! Come on, we have to shape them, so they have enough time to set." I gave him the materials, and we worked all morning making wax. Around noon we had some of grandma's homemade pies, before pouring the fresh, molten wax into the moulds, with the wick situated in the centre, and letting them dry.

By dusk we had handmade about 1000 candles of all colours, with a few pleasantly scented, and differing in size from teaspoon length, to the volume of wine bottles. While we worked, the Pascal candle continued to burn, as it had for twenty years. I never believed granddad when he first told me that it had been ablaze without smothering for over twenty years. "It's two metres high with a thick, slow-burning wick." Grandpa would say. "Almost impossible to douse, unless the winds exceed 150 km/h, by my calculations," he once said. The surface wax of this key candle has run rivers over itself like a relentless vine suffocating a tree branch. The drips flowed like the blood in my grandfather's antique veins. But, sadly, as the vast streams of wax strengthened this candle's base, it was a contrasting case in my grandfather, as with every palpitation of his heart, he was, very gradually, getting weaker.

There was no better teacher for me, as he had been through the tough times in his own life, and I held him in the highest respect, especially because of his unparalleled expertise with candles. At 79, he still worked ten hours plus in a day with his candles. He was sometimes a bit grouchy, but I thought of it as like a candle. In that, you can't get too close to the essence of a candle, the flame, without burning yourself, and this helped me deal with this.

As the Pascal candle continued to glow, at the back of his shed, with its single black thread of smoke, we watched the world pass us by. I found the courage to ask if he wanted me to continue making candles after he was gone, and selling them with grandma. He said, as the sun went down, "No...you can do whatever you want with ya life. I don't mind as long as va happy. But, there is one thing I do want ya to do for me. I would like you to keep the Pascal candle burnin' for me. Grandma will do what she can, but when she goes I would like it to keep smolderin'. Think of it as a symbol of my spirit, burning on around you. As the wax flows down the side, think of my blood still pumping, and I will remain a part of your life. Candles are my thing, and I want my favourite candle to keep burnin' for as long as possible." I replied: "Of course. I'll keep it going forever Grandpa."

We went selling on Sunday and it was a successful day, selling around 460 candles, which is more than usual.

On Monday, grandma was going to a big shopping centre far away for a grocery shopping expedition, and I volunteered to go too. Grandpa said he felt tired and stayed home. Grandma spent a long time in the supermarket, buying all her food for the week, as she hated going shopping often. We also had a look at a new ornament depot that sold candles but both decided that they didn't compare to grandads', and went home quickly as the grey clouds forebodingly encased the sky in a gloomy shell of evil.

As we arrived home the rain bombarded the ground in a hurricane of water bullets. The wind was a wall of invisible power, and lightning was projected onto those ominous clouds whilst gunshots of thunder were heard all around. We found grandpa resting in his favourite armchair in deep sleep. Grandma tried to wake him but couldn't. She called an ambulance immediately but I didn't understand why. I went to look for grandma a few minutes after she had finished on the phone and she was crying and weeping like a child. "Your grandfather is dead." These were the only words she said to me and this was all it took for me burst into tears. I remembered all the great times we had together. I couldn't block the overflowing river of sadness, shock, and regret within me. Arthur John, my grandfather, had probably been the biggest influence on my development and now he was gone, suffering a massive stroke. Never will he take another breath, drink another cup of coffee or make another candle. No. His flame has been snuffed out. His wax will never again flow through his body; it was his blood that had obstructed his inner flame from burning on.

I remembered the one thing I had to do. I ran outside, but I saw the shed window had been blown away by the storm. The gusty winds were circulating inside the shed and I wondered - would the Pascal candle's fire have gone out? The door was locked, so I ran back inside for keys. I kept thinking it'd be a regret haunting my mind for eternity, if I'd let that flame go out. I searched the drawers, the cabinets, and his bedside table but I couldn't find them. Had I let my grandfather's flaming spirit die? Had the flow of the wax of his veins dried up? I remember now the key was always with the matches and so I found his box of matches and removed the key. I dashed back and opened the door. I strolled in and to my utter surprise; the Pascal candle was burning strongly. The wax had built up on the side facing the window, blocking the wind from the flame, and keeping the ghost of my grandfather burning brightly. I blockaded the window with all my strength. "I won't let you ever go out as long as I live." I said to myself. It would be magnificent to have grandad here in person, alongside me. But, for me, he was still here, in essence, burning beside, standing tall, in the darkness, with his warmth and his guiding light.

The second In Their Own Write Festival was a definite success, proving that it should continue to be held every two years. It is a production that is comprised of six, one-act plays written by past and present Hale drama students, performed over two nights, with three shows on each night. The event is another opportunity provided by the School during which boys can attain valuable lessons on directing theatre. Students must not only write their own plays but also, in most cases, direct them as well. This can be a little awkward for some as they have to direct their friends and fellow students. This year, five of the six plays were comedies, or were supposed to be funny, and the other was a deadly serious thought-provoking piece.

The opening night began with Ode To The Irrational, written and directed by the talented Warwick Doddrell (Year 11). His work, inspired by Supertramp's, The Logical Song was by no means funny and asked questions about losing one's identity in a school situation, a topic relevant in today's society. This was then followed by a comedy entitled Macca, written and directed by Sam Bayford of Year 10. Macca was based on Macbeth by William Shakespeare and is an uproarious send-up of this Elizabethan classic. The final play on Monday and Wednesday was What If? written by Kim Halligan, who attended Hale in the 1970s and was directed by Brie Rutter, a Year 11 drama student at St Mary's. In this play a fifteenyear-old girl announces to her family that she is pregnant and that the father of the child is God! This work, in it's own satirical way, examines what it could be like for a modern family to come to terms with the concept of a virgin birth.

The second night began with The Unusual Suspects written and directed by Robert Marshall (who also starred in it) and Tjad Dorrington, two Year 12s who showcased their experience and impeccable comic timing with this theatrical production. Inspired by the 1995 film The Usual Suspects, this hilarious show mocks the movie and detectives in general. However, with deeper analysis, it tells us to suspect anyone and everyone. After this was Ying, Yang and the Whole Damn Thang, written by Zac Gillam, who finished at Hale in 1995, and who is now planning a career in entertainment following his experiences at School. Zac was also the genius behind last year's production, Stalk. His play was directed by Mr C Rutter. On Tuesday and Friday the final performance of the night was Pasqual's Revenge, written, directed and performed by Andrew Williams, Colin Craig and Hans Bruechle, three Year 12s who finished in 2003. Their production was a 'musical concoction'


that comprised many sidesplitting parodies of current songs, some stand-up comedy and even 'The Unofficial National Anthem of Germany'.



DRAMA - THE TEMPEST

The Tempest, by William Shakespeare, is a supposedly comic work detailing the strict royal attitudes of the time towards the illusion of justice and power, fate, and the strange conclusions of living in isolation. Mr Rutter wanted to inject new life into this boring classic, where nothing much happens in the way of plot development. The best way of doing this of course was to set the action on an asteroid hurtling through space! Yet, once the lines had been learned, and the Caliban puppeteers had become used to their collection of PVC piping with paddles for hands, rubber flippers for feet, and a foam mannequin head that was supposed to be a deformed, menacing creature, the dialogue and blocking began to flow. The cast was always positive and as soon as a new aspect of the production was developed, was willing to work with it and employ it into their roles.

Some boys in particular, really applied themselves well to this show and it was a credit to them that the final product was so entertaining. Individuals such as Chris Watson, who played Prospero, had four times as many lines than anyone else, and, who was on stage for almost the entire programme, brought to life a character with whom the audience could readily

empathise. Jamie Ward, who played Ariel, was a natural with the Shakespearean dialect and seemed to enjoy letting the words roll off his tongue. Also,

Alex Dook and Sam Bayford, playing Trincullo and Stephano, took great delight in pretending to be eternally drunk while Chris Mofflin, Conrad Pogson, Ben Riley and Andrew Sutton, the were the highly regarded King Alonso, the wise, elderly Gonzalo, the sinful, malevolent Antonio and the equally evil Sebastian respectively. made up the King's entourage. A thought must be spared, however, for those Caliban puppeteers, who began with an 'irrigation pipe-boned', 'flat, wooden bathanded', 'elastic-jointed', 'swimming flipper-footed', 'foam, dressmaker's dummy head-skulled' 'contraption' with which to practise. It was amazing how rapidly they adapted to the body length suit and made it come alive. Although not an experienced cast, it was evident from the performances, that Hale has a talented, unit of actors with great potential for the future

The cast was young, consisting predominantly of Year 9 and 10 students, and Year 8s assisting with the vital puppetry on stage. A large number of individuals behind the scenes were responsible for all aspects in this play from the motorized floor creatures, to the smoke-machined fireplace. Then there were the costumers, puppet makers, computer visuals designers, art directors, lighting designers, set designers, builders and painters, technical supervisors, lighting directors and video editors who were required to make this show the technologically up-to-date production that it was. So many people assisted, including old boy Martin Sawtell on computer graphics, Hale music teacher Ashley Greig who wrote the music for The Tempest, and professional puppeteer Ian Tregonning, who has worked with Jim Henson. The boys thank everyone who helped make this entertaining, cosmic adventure.

I would encourage all aspiring students, to not be afraid of Shakespeare, as it has only lived on for so many years due to the magical storylines and characters, and it is satisfying literature, even more so, when brought to life on stage. Acting in a play is great fun. Being a part of a production can boost confidence, and self esteem, and being in the audience can be just as much fun. Try it, you never know, you might like it!



DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY



2004 has been a very busy year in the Design and Technology Department. Many distinctive and wonderfully unique projects were developed across all year groups, enabling boys working in this area to have exposure to a number of new experiences and opportunities.

This year the Applied Technology Hall Table Design Competition for boys in Year 11 was run once again. Many beautiful and well-built pieces of furniture were entered into the competition. Congratulations go to Laughton Savage (1st prize), Will Clark (2nd prize) and Brendan Dorrington (3rd prize) for their fine workmanship.

As an extension to the Hall Table competition, some of the pieces were also entered into external displays and competitions. Laughton Savage's Hall Table and Sam Ellies' Jarrah Recliner Chair both won 1st Prize in the Years 11 and 12 General Construction category at the annual Wood Show held at Claremont Show Grounds in August. To end a great year for the Design and Technology Department, Laughton and Sam also took out the top prizes in the Value Adding Quest, a Statewide schools competition, promoting value adding of the State's primary resources.

Materials Technology - Year 8 F1 Racing Car Design Investigation and CO2 Dragsters

The Year 8 Materials Technology groups were exposed to the designing genius incorporated in designing and racing an F1 racing car. This included studying the principles of aerodynamics and learning about the interplay between all of the various systems at work within an F1 car. In order to provide the Year 8s with a practical means of testing their knowledge of racing car design, the students were given the opportunity to design, test and race a CO2 Dragster. These small model cars tested each boy's understanding of the design principles associated with aerodynamic performance of real racing cars.

Once constructed, the boys raced the cars to determine the fastest CO2 Dragster in their class. The dragsters, powered by a small compressed Carbon Dioxide canister, were propelled 20m in just under two seconds - providing high levels of excitement and great satisfaction. After the race, the classes then analysed each boy's car to determine the best overall design and its characteristics, based on performance. The topic proved to be highly motivating, educational, great fun, and all boys were very happy with the outcome of their work.

Graphics Technology

Graphics Technology was offered as a semester elective in Year 10. In Semester 1, students were challenged to design and develop a short promotional movie for the next sci-fi 'blockbuster'.

Using software programmes such as Rhino, Bryce and Movie Maker, students had to assume the roles of Production Designer, CGI (computer generated imagery) Modeller and Movie Director. The results were amazing, with final movies including a vast array of spaceships, virtual planets, and star systems with weird and wonderful environments, all of which were interwoven with exciting spaceship chase scenes and tumultuous musical scores.

All students demonstrated very good computer graphics skills and produce interesting and diverse movies. Henry Bromfield, James Brown and Michael Li, deserve special mention for their outstanding contribution.

Systems Technology

Systems Technology courses were offered in Years 10, 11 and 12 this year. Excellent work was produced by the Year 10 group in Semester 1 on the theme of autonomous guided vehicles and in Semester 2 the work focused on PIN (personal identification number) technology and mechatronics. The work produced by John Graff, Tim Wood, Chris Mofflin and Michael Ovens (Year 10 Systems Technology prize winner) was outstanding.

The combined Year 11/12 class for Systems Technology produced excellent projects and folios on the theme 'Smart Systems', where the focus was on finding clever applications for microprocessor control circuits. The ideas included automatic watering systems, automobile climate/light/speed control, automated garage door/lighting and high level PIN security. Warwick Palm was awarded the prize in Year 11 for his fairground ride project and Thomas Enston was the winner of the Year 12 prize for a sophisticated PIN security system that also included a card reader. Thomas was also nominated for a Curriculum Council award and was successful in being awarded a Certificate of Distinction - a very fine achievement.

Well done to all D&T boys for their efforts this year and for producing some outstanding projects.

HISTORY



CANBERRA TRIP

On February 29, 18 boys from Year 11 and 12 History and Political & Legal Studies classes took the 'red eye' to Canberra to savour the cultural and historical offerings of the national capital. Most were looking forward to meeting the Prime Minister. Mr Howard certainly did not disappoint! Without doubt the highlight of the trip was an extended audience with the Prime Minister. An affable Mr Howard was very generous with his time with our boys and they appreciated such a rare opportunity. Questions about the TEE and handshakes to all were followed by a session in his office, with more questions about cricket memorabilia. In answer to a question about his most memorable moment in politics, Mr Howard had no hesitation in recalling being in Washington on September 11, 2001. Mr Howard's Principal Private Secretary also took part. none other than Tony Nutt, an Old Haleian from Haynes House. He was a contemporary of the fathers of two in the touring group, Steven Glover and Jon Akers. The boys were photographed ad nauseum by the Prime Minister's photographer. Despite the fact that one boy only packed one school shoe and was forced to wear his trainers and another forgot his tie, which forced a reluctant Mr Cook to temporarily retrieve a tie intended as a gift, the pictorial record did not reveal the preceding panic!

Seeing the High Court in full session with all Justices firing questions at a QC was memorable, as was a fiery Question Time in Parliament. The boys quickly picked the famous faces through the glass of the viewing area and remarked on the raucous nature of the occasion and the flurry of movement by the people in the chamber. An audience with prominent Catholic Health CEO and lobbyist Francis Sullivan was very illuminating for prospective journalists and politicians. The War Memorial once again did not fail to deliver a poignant and powerful message and many boys said they wished we had had more time to spend in this wonderful Australian icon. School archivist Bill Edgar arranged a special tour with an associate who brought to life the Western Australian and Hale links with the memorial to the fallen Australians in war back to the Boer War.

Visits to the National Museum, National Gallery, Telstra Tower and the AIS were all other prominent features during a four day stay in glorious weather. The sheer scale of the National Museum and the range of themes and exhibits made this a tour highlight. The boys were challenged about the role of art in society and taught the ways in which art may be interpreted by our enthusiastic guide. An Australian rower gave a very illuminating tour of the sport facilities and life as an elite athlete, where the boys marvelled at the routines and disciplines of gymnasts in particular. The technologies being employed by the swimming programme were simply mindboggling, including being towed through the water at world record speed by a special harness from above and wearing video goggles to see themselves swim as a means of correcting technique!

Our boys represented the School with distinction and showed their independence and thirst for learning about much which is central to Australian identity.

Centenary of Parliament House Student Parliament

The Student Parliament took place to commemorate the centenary of Parliament

House, and the 150th anniversary of the establishment of the Swan River Colony. The entire State Parliament, both the Legislative Assembly and Legislative Council, was formed by students in Year 10 from around Western Australia. We each represented the electorate in which our school was located. I was proud to represent Churchlands. Each member was required to prepare two speeches, ranging from a signed petition to a speech on the debate that was the central focus of the event. The latter being 'that uniform adult rights and responsibilities should apply to people from the age of 16 years.'

The Student Parliament took place over three days. Day one we enjoyed a scenic river cruise to Fremantle and back, designed to help us get to know one other. On the second day the real action took place as we occupied Parliament House and listened to a speech by Dr Fiona Wood, who was the State Governor for the day. 

LIBRARY

Bursting at the seams, both with resources and users, Hale School Senior Library in 2004 continues to play a very active part in the life of the School and its community in the following key ways:

- The Library collection offers a wide ranging and print-rich collection with adult and adolescent fiction; graphic novels; biographies and other nonfiction narratives and general interest non fiction in heavy demand;
- Parents and families increasingly make use of after school hours to browse and borrow from the collection;
- Reading programmes in English classes; senior student morning teas to browse new resources; after school 'book club' gatherings; displays; reading lists – together foster active readers;
- The enjoyment of free voluntary reading is clearly evident in the lunchtime and after school crowds;
- Author in residence Marcus Zusak and visiting authors including Robert Drewe provide unique opportunities for boys;
- The participation of two student groups in Fremantle Children's Youth Literature Days have allowed boys interested in writing to work closely with prominent Australian authors;
- Resources supporting student learning and investigations continue to grow rapidly and in an ever increasing range of formats – online magazine and newspaper databases and other quality subscribed databases becoming increasingly relevant;
- A strong computer network connects the library's resources to the classroom and laboratories and teacher librarians work alongside other teachers in these environments to promote information literacy;
- A digital video library now permits individuals to access videos from classroom and library, working with them at their own pace; and
- Collaborative relationships between classroom teachers and teacher librarians continue to build and in will be even closer in 2005 with teacher librarians assigned to specific academic departments.

ARTIST IN RESIDENCE -Marcus Zusak

Scott Kay and Henry Bromfield of Year 10 interviewed Marcus Zusak.

Scott : Firstly, hello and thanks for giving us this opportunity Marcus. We'd like to start by asking you what you like to read yourself.

Marcus: Let me think. My favourite book is <u>What's Eating Gilbert Grape</u>. I've read it about three times. I like a lot of different books. <u>My Brother Jack</u> is another one. It's Australian. It's a good one - so I guess I'll leave it at those two for the moment. Maybe John Irving. Lastly there's an Irish writer called Roddy Doyle. He wrote <u>The Commitments</u>. That's one of my favourite books.

Henry: Does your reading influence the way you write?

Marcus: Yes, I think it has to. You have to learn to write somehow and I guess the best way is from other books and I think what you do is you pick up along the way from all the books you've read and you kind of take bits. You're influenced a little bit by each and then hopefully you have eighty percent from that and twenty percent just you. That's how you come up with your own style.

Scott: Who do you think are outstanding young adult writers?

Marcus: O.K. There are lots of good ones and there are lots of bad ones as well. Probably Phillip Gwynne who wrote <u>Deadly 'Unna</u>, and Melina Marchetta she's written two books and they've both been successful. A guy called Scott Gardner, David Metzenthen and Sonya Hartnett.

Henry: You mentioned in your talk that some of your earlier books were rejected. What were some of the things you had to 'fix' in order to make your books publishable?

Marcus: I pretty much had to fix the plot, character - everything else! Basically I think the first books were really just copies of other people's books I guess. It was just through practice and practice I found my own style. Something that stood out from the rest of the pack - what I mean by the rest of the pack is the thousands of manuscripts that land on someone's desk every year. I kind of found something that was a bit unique probably for me it was the idea of stealing. For some reason it seems to be a bit of a recurring theme in my books. Two of my books started out with robberies - one in a bank and another is an attempted robbery in a dental surgery - so I kind of found making ridiculous robbery situations was a good way to start a book and maybe that's how I got noticed. Maybe that's the key to me being published, I'm not sure.

Scott: How do you evaluate your own works? Do you ever question or feel unsure about what you write?

Marcus: Yeah, all the time! Usually when I have written about forty pages - that's when I start to get a bit nervous and doubtful and think that's pretty bad. But, I think the key is to just put it aside and not worry so much and come back to it tomorrow it might not seem so bad. If it is, throw it out and start again. I start books between one and a hundred times. With <u>The Messenger</u> I wrote the first thapter and I didn't have to write it again. It just depends on each different book. You feel bad about each book you write, especially when you've finished - you think that's no good, but you just have to persist and keep working on it.

Henry: At what point in your life did you decide to make writing your career? Was it a frightening decision to make?

Marcus: No not really. I was sixteen. I thought I'll be a writer and be rich ...no, not rich, but I just thought it can't be that hard and then I realised how hard it is to write a book. My first book, I wrote about three chapters and realised it was the worst book probably ever written and I thought this is going to take a bit of time. The most frightening thing is putting the book out and worrying about what people are going to say about it. That's the scary part.

Scott: Are you a religious person?

Marcus: Um, to a point, I am, but not in a way that's typical like going to church and all that sort of thing. I am in a lot of ways... I think it's the little things are important so that's what The Messenger is about, like sometimes it's the big things he helps people out with and sometimes it's the little things and sometimes it's the little things that are the most satisfying, so that's probably how I view religion. Maybe do little things every day to make you a better person and perhaps that's how religion should be - rather than worrying that you may be going to heaven and hell, which is pretty scary. I don't want to go to hell for all eternity. (laughs).

Henry: We'd like to ask you a few questions about specific books now. Firstly <u>The Messenger</u>. Where did you get the idea for Daryl and Keith? Are they based on people you know or are they entirely imaginary?

Marcus: They are pretty much imaginary, but in a way they are based on people I know to a degree. The way all my characters talk is based on people I know and the way I grew up with my brother and it's like nothing is sacred in a way. Those two guys walk in and they are pretty mean sort of guys. They are there to rough Ed up a bit, but they are eating his meat pies in the kitchen and they tell him 'Your dog could use a wash mate.'... So what you do, is you kind of bring opposites together...situations just to make it feel different and maybe it heightens the experience.

Scott: Does the Doorman function to reveal more of Ed's character to the reader?

Marcus: That's a good question. I think so. I think his relationship with the dog

shows what Ed's like. It basically shows he's a nice guy... even though he complains about the dog a lot. For example when Darryl and Keith - the dog came in and they give the dog the last pie, you know he looks at the dog as if to say you greedy guts I wanted that pie... so even though he tells the dog off he also gives the dog coffee and he does share his life with him. He's like his best friend I think it does reveal that Ed is a nice guy. He goes to a restaurant and orders a meal for the dog to take home because he is his best friend. So it does show he is a nice guy.

Henry: What values underlie the narrative of your text? Did you set out to portray certain values through the character of Ed?

Marcus: Not really... basically the whole idea behind The Messenger is that ... It's really a comic book. It's really like a comic book... and most comic books have super heroes and you have a normal man or woman turn into something that has superhuman qualities. The thing with Ed Kennedy is he's like that but he doesn't have the luxury of having any superhuman qualities and so he has to do it as a human... a normal person and in a way, that's his weakness, but it's also his strength... that's how he helps people by being kind of rising above... like going within himself to go beyond his own stupidity and hopelessness and so... that's the big challenge... helping people without the superhuman qualities, and in a way that's the point that maybe we can all do little things to help others and make ourselves better.

Scott: Both <u>The Messenger</u> and <u>Reuben</u> <u>Wolfe</u> touch on the subject of young men's fear or rejection. Do you feel young men or boys are not as tough as the image they like to portray?

Marcus: (laughs) I think that that is my job as a writer; to show every facet of one of these characters and um, like Ed... Ed is constantly confessing things... like he's hopeless and that he's no good at that. So my job is to go beyond the surface and show every element of a person, particularly their failings. What we're not good at occupies us most of the time and so, I do think that it is my job to show, maybe the nicer side of people who look rough and the vulnerable side of people who look impenetrable.

Henry: Do you ever feel the need to be politically correct in your writing?

Marcus: Yes, funny, I've been accused of being sexist in some books because there's that kind of... you know... like both Cameron Wolfe and Reuben Wolfe... people say they are a bit woman and sex obsessed and that sort of thing. I don't think that's true at all. I find I don't try to be politically incorrect or politically correct. I just want to write how it actually is and so I don't aim either way. I don't try to upset people. But you know, some people are deliberately politically incorrect in order to get headlines, infamy or to promote themselves or whatever. I don't try to either way.

Scott: As a male, how difficult is it for you to get the 'voice' of female characters?

Marcus: I've never really done it. The book I'm writing at the moment has a female protagonist and so I'm not writing from her point of view. I'm writing it from someone else's point of view, which makes it a bit easier. In that case, like I said, with my characters so far, my job is to really get under the skin of a character and in this case it's as more of an observer of the particular character. Also, I'm not going to pretend to know a female voice either. For some people it comes naturally, but I think I'm better with the male voice.

Henry: Thanks a lot for your time Marcus. It was great. Marcus: *No worries!*

The year started well for the Mathematics Department with the acknowledgement of the excellent achievements of Dougal Maclaurin, who secured the Subject Exhibition in Calculus and a Subject Distinction in Applicable Mathematics. Dougal had a history of involvement in the extra-curricular mathematics programme both at Hale and outside the School and was a very talented student of mathematics. Both he and his teachers, Mr R Shaw and Mr I McLean are to be congratulated on his fine results.

The department continued its develop-ment and introduction of new courses. A new Advanced Mathematics course ran in the second semester of Year 10 and an Enrichment Mathematics class ran as a new option in Year 9.

The Maths Plus and Maths Prime clubs continued their activities and many students were involved in extra-curricular programs and competitions. The Year 8s were involved in a Mathematics camp with St Mary's at Araluen and had a smashing time, socialising as well as undertaking many mathematical activities. Six Hale staff provided the 20 boys with challenges over the weekend.

Have - Sum - Fun Competitions

A number of students took part in these fun problem solving competitions which took place at St Hilda's. Although fiercely competitive these are fun nights and the students have a great time meeting students from other schools. Representing Hale in the Junior division were: Simon Joseph, Mitchell Wansbrough, Edward Wang, Bharath Iyer, Chris Mofflin, Conrad Pogson, Henry Bromfield, Felix Ellis, Ben Hogan, Bryan Tan and Ramanan Parameswaran. Team 2 finished sixth and Team 1 tenth overall. In the senior division Hale's top team finished fourth.

Mathematics Games Camp

Eight Year 9 students went to the Mathematics Games camp held at the Ern Halliday centre in Hillary's. Those participating were: Ben Hogan, Ray Pritchard, Charles Skender, Peter Cash, Edward Wang, Bharath Iyer, Sean Gilleran and Darryn Sherry. Good fun was had by all attending.

Macquarie Business Mathematics Competition

Many Year 10s entered this competition run by Macquarie University and Hale School was ranked third across Australia. Students scoring High Distinctions placing them in the top 6% of entrants were: Henry Bromfield, John Graff, Dylan Hirsch, Chris Mofflin, Michael Ovens, Conrad Pogson, Nick Salmon, Mark van der Maas and Scott Young.

Naturally Mathematical Competition

Hale School entered 5 teams into this international on-line competition. Students are given 2 hours to work on some complex problems in teams of 4. This was a great opportunity for students to work together collaboratively and another chance to mix with their peers from St Mary's.

The team of Matthew Arnold with Amy and Nandika from St Mary's finished second overall, behind a team from Indooroopilly. In third spot, just behind the others was the team of Trent Grgich, Edward Wang, Darryn Sherry and Bharath Iyer appropriately called the Master PhDs reloaded. This was their second year in this competition and their second listing in the top three.

Australian Mathematics Competition

Once again Hale students competed in this highly significant competition. Hale achieved a 'personal best' with over 500 students attaining a Credit certificate or better.



There were many concerts and recitals that gave Hale's musicians the opportunity to showcase their talent and these included the Combined Anglican Schools Concert that involved musicians from seven of Perth's private schools and featured a complete performance of Handel's great choral and orchestral work; Dixit Dominus with the orchestra, led by Captain of Music, Mark Pagnozzi and conducted by the Director of Music. Concerto Night was the opportunity for Hale and St Mary's Year 12 TEE Music Students to perform a solo concerto movement with orchestra. The Governors' Concerts highlighted performances by the senior ensembles. Music Under the Stars was as popular as ever, with a special guest appearance by Sara Macliver. The Cantate sang choral evensong at St George's Cathedral on two occasions, performed superbly at the Carol Service and sang, by invitation, at the School's service to farewell the Archbishop, and at the Royal Schools Music Club Christmas Concert.




The Royal Australian Chemical Institute coordinates this international competition among students from around Australia and in neighbouring countries to promote the relevance of chemistry in a variety of every day contexts. This year Hale School entered all of the Year 10 Chemistry students and invited interested senior students to participate. In 2004 there were over 100,000 entries and Hale students performed very well, being awarded 46 High Distinctions, 40 Distinctions and 28 Credits, while the performances of each of the year groups was significantly better than the State averages. In addition, Certificates of Excellence are presented to the most outstanding achievements in each state and country, usually for perfect scores. Hale School is especially proud of Ben Weber on being presented with a commemorative plaque for his outstanding performance in Year 10.

THE RIO TINTO AUSTRALIAN CHEMISTRY OLYMPIAD 2004

The Rio Tinto Australian Science Olympiads (RTASO) provides students with opportunities to enhance their knowledge, understanding and skill. The National Qualifying Examinations are the first stage in a series of special programmes that lead to the selection of the best three scholars to represent Australia at the International Science Olympiad. The Qualifying examinations are extremely demanding challenges that not only test raw knowledge but especially problem-solving and analytical skills.

The following Year 11 students were awarded distinctions; James Gibbons, David Hellsten, Robert Henham, Karim Johnson, Louis Lee and Mark Wilson. In addition, Stephen Lewin, Brendan van Rooyen and Tom Skevington were awarded high distinctions in an overall impressive result. Tom Skevington's performance earned him bronze medal from among the Western Australian students and he was invited to participate in a Chemistry Scholar programme that includes two week at the Australian National University in Canberra in January.

The numerous opportunities for student involvement are largely due to the initiative, promotion and organisational contributions by all members of the Chemistry department. Whether they trained the teams for the RACI Titration Stakes, provided Chemistry Olympiad tutorials, arranged various events for International Mole week, or assisted the Chemistry Licence programme, their enthusiasm and generosity of time is appreciated.

SCIENCE - PHYSICS

The Physics department had another successful year with boys across all years achieving some outstanding results.

It is very pleasing to note the number of boys who produced outstanding results in the 2003 TEE examination.

Certificates of Distinction were awarded to Dougal McLaurin and Andrew Moser. Outstanding scaled combined scores were also achieved by Tim Cheang, Blake Samuels, Chris Lim and Michael Laczko.

The current Year 12 group have proved to be talented students who have continued to work well and achieve at the highest level.

Eight of these students were entered in the Australian Science Olympiad in 2003. Four achieved High Distinctions and four achieved Distinctions. Three of these students achieved the top three marks in the State. Peter Buckland received the gold medal, Marc White the silver medal and Jeremy Ansell the bronze medal. This was an outstanding result and an indication of the depth of ability in this group.

Peter Buckland was invited to be a Rio Tinto Australian Science Olympiads (RTASO) Physics Scholar. The invitation was based on an outstanding performance in the 2003 RTASO Physics National Qualifying Examination.

Peter attended the RTASO Scholar School from 8 - 24 January 2004 for the Physics programme. The level completed at the Scholar School was equivalent to that in any first year course at an Australian University.

The success of these students is related to their innate talent and their capacity to work on the study materials provided. Feedback from them will enable us to fine tune the study materials provided to prospective candidates in the future.

Rhys Kidd entered the National Youth Science Forum and attended the ANU in Canberra in January 2004.

The NYSF seeks to encourage students to continue on to a tertiary course and career in science, engineering or technology related field. The programme offered a dynamic mix of seminars, debates, workshops, visits to laboratories and key sites of interest around Canberra, as well as social activities.





They have ably represented the school in The West Australian Debating League (WADL), The Association of Heads of Independent schools of Australia (AHIA) and House debating competitions. The quality of debate in all these competitions and the dedication and determination of all teams has been exceptional. Through the thrills and spills of competition we have had varied results with most losses the result of a heartbreaking one or two points, or in the finals the result of a split decision. All boys involved would agree the pain was worth the effort because of the great camaraderie engendered by being part of a team, the friendly rivalry of taking opposing positions, the good humour and the friendships that are the result of participating in this mentally challenging sport.

These boys successfully won all their debates, which covered topics debating the merits of computer games and zoos to the old favourites of Australia's obsession with sport and the proposition that all schools should be co-educational. Being divisional winners we proceeded to the finals, winning the octo-finals, but folding, in the quarter finals, to a very polished Carmel team who ended up competition winners. To get this far out of a field of 152 teams was a very commendable effort.

Inspired by the near win, and the cut and thrust of House Debating we entered the AHISA competition with two very keen teams, comprising of Blair Hurley, Nihar Jha, Matthew Mason, Nguyen Nguyen, Vinh-Nghi Ngo and Niall Virgo. A very hectic five debates in as many weeks, saw us flush with wins, but not successful enough to take honours. These boys were marvellously committed and kept their debates at a high standard all season.

The two teams continued on, with Jilen Patel and David Gladwin, to the AHISA competition where they continued to work well together. The highlights of their five hectic weeks was the debate 'that the Commonwealth should be abolished' in which they beat the opposition comprehensively, and having to take the position that performanceenhancing drugs should be allowed in professional sport. In the latter debate it was a challenge to adopt the positive side of the argument. Despite winning the majority of their debates the points were not in our favour and we were not section champions.

Tyson Broun was announced as the fitting Captain of Debating. Tyson has been a stalwart of Hale Debating having been in teams since Junior School and a member of the winning 2003 WADL Cup Team. Three senior teams comprising of Joshua Caddy, Tyson Broun, Rob Marshall, Rob Korbosky, Julian Storm Cameron Ritchie, John Park, Russell Meeking, Michael Cowley, Niraj Tailor, Naoshad Kabir, and Cameron Hannan entered the WADL competition full of enthusiasm and confidence. Two set arguments were followed by some very testing impromptu debates. The level of competition in the Senior section was awe-inspiring with some of the greatest competition coming from the girls at MLC Two teams fell by

the wayside after some nail-biting encounters, which saw them losing by the slightest of margins. The Joshua Caddy, Tyson Broun, Rob Marshall, Rob Korbosky, and Julian Storm team fought their way into the octo-finals where they narrowly lost to Shenton College. As it was an Olympic year it was unsurprising that the question of the Olympic spirit and drug taking should be on the menu at the AHISA competition. Michael Cowley, Cameron Ritchie, Marcus Hodsdon, Gary Butcher, Nic Jenzen-Jones, Jackson Thompson, Heath Kidd, Tom Adolph, Byron Pogson, Robbie Dixon and Chris Marr formed teams to defend the spirit of the Olympics and in keeping with the controversy of the Australian women's' rowing team, that 'Australians are not quitters'. Not only did we agree that the 'spirit' was the important aspect of the Olympics, but that it was also the 'spirit' that was important in the debating. We did not win the competition, but we benefited from being part of it.

National Schools' Debating

Quick-witted argument, verbal jabs and robust rebuttals were the order of the day on Thursday 6th August when Hale hosted a final of the National Schools' Debating Championships. Year 10 students enjoyed the thrust and parry of the vigorous performances of four of the top teams in the competition. Teams were given an hour to prepare a convincing case on the topic that 'the upper house should be abolished' ACT confronted NSW and QLD went into combat against NT. Despite the 'dryness' of the topic our boys were captivated by the clever construction of argument and the astounding use of sophisticated language by the competitors who were only a few years older than themselves. For those of our students unfamiliar with the point of information rule, whereby a member of the opposition team can challenge a point made by the person presenting their case, it was a surprising as well as entertaining aspect of the debates. After an intense and fast paced battle NSW and NT proved to be both popular and convincing winners. Judging by the number of students who chose to forgo some of their recess to listen to the final speakers and hear the adjudication it was a very successful event.

On Saturday 7th August a small group of students attended the Grand Final, which was held in Parliament House. Doctor Fiona Wood presented the key address. The last time Western Australia hosted the finals was in 1997, so the opportunity to see the very best of Australia's young debaters was very much appreciated by all those who had the opportunity to attend.

All in all 2004 has proved to be a very successful debating year. Over the season an increasing number of boys become involved and enjoyed the social occasion as much as the preparation and competition. Thanks to Mrs Juliet Park who volunteers her time to help coach teams, Mr Mahendra Vaswami and Mrs Beverley Korbosky.

Congratulations to the dedicated band of mums and dads who were there to watch and cheer on their sons throughout the WADL and AHISA seasons.

FRANCIS BURT LAW EDUCATION CENTRE MOCK TRIAL COMPETITION 2004

This year I took part in the Francis Burt Law Education Centre Mock Trial Competition (along with approximately 25 other Hale students). This competition is run for Year 10, 11 and 12 students who are looking to see what a career in law might be like, to practise their debating skills, to have a find out what happens in a court of law. And that's the first thing I'd like to point out: the cases are actually conducted in real civil law courts, with a judge presiding over the proceedings

I was part of Hale Team 2 (of three teams), consisting of seven Hale students. We first met in March this year, and met our coaches, including the Mock Trial expert himself, Ben Spagnolo, as well as Mr Wally Goodlet, a learned and experienced barrister. We were given our case notes and told we had four weeks to prepare before the first trial. We were to act as the defence in a civil case. Our brief was a mock suit for negligence in which we had to defend a school principal who had allowed a student to be beaten up on his school grounds. Each Hale team competed against one of the many other school teams, and although our team was the smallest, we were the most successful, winning that first case and then surviving until the fourth round, when we were finally beaten.

The mock trials provided us with a great



Robert competed against over 3,500 students from around Australia to win the title and the grand prize - a trip around the world. Robert plans to fly to England for the Lions' Youth Conference after his TEE, and then spend two months in Europe and the US.

The Lions' Youth of the Year Quest is one of the largest Lions Youth programmes and seeks a high level of academic, leadership, sporting, public speaking and citizenship achievement.



TOURNAMENT OF MINDS

Mr Shaw suggested that I and some of my peers become involved in the 2004 Tournament of Minds quest. The competition entails teams of six students from all year levels who are asked to solve and present two problems. One of them is a long-term problem for which several weeks' preparation is needed and is different for each group, depending on which category the team entered. The categories range from Maths and Engineering to language and Literature. The second problem is a given to the teams on the day and this year, four minutes preparation time was permitted. The longterm problem requires a dramatic presentation, focussing on two main style points (my Hale team used technology and black humour for its 'heroic farce'), whilst

the second problem simply requires good public speaking skills.

Despite leaving their preparation until late, the few conscientious members of the Maths and Engineering group helped to pull the team through and we had a lot of fun working on our machine and presentation. On the day the judges were a lot less harsh than Mr McLean had led us to expect, so we scored fairly well, and some of our reluctant thespians really helped to keep the show moving. The best experience however, was the spontaneous problem task. We were awarded top marks, thanks to our warped sense of humour and vivid imaginations (Conrad knew communism would fit in somewhere!) Despite this, we didn't rank very highly overall but still

managed to beat Mr Vaswani's Language and Literature team, which was a lot better prepared than ours.

It was a great experience and I would recommend it to everyone next year. The Year 10s in our team regret not putting in a huge amount of work at the very start. We found that it was a lot more fun than we initially thought and realised just how well we could have done. We will not get another chance but sincerely hope the 2005's Years 8, 9 and 10 boys give it a go and see how inventive they can be.



The Hale 1st V finished in fourth place in the Blackwood Cup competition this year with a record of three wins and three losses. The season began with a tough opening game against Wesley in which after five minutes of overtime, the boys produced an inspiring win. A solid performance and some excellent defence against Christ Church gave the boys confidence as they headed into the game against Scotch.

At the end of a tightly fought contest, Scotch produced a fine 3-point shooting display to seal the game in the final five minutes. Trinity, always a tough opponent with a hard running and disciplined game, proved to be too good on the night. Against Guildford, the Hale team showed a much more disciplined and hard running style of basketball and finished convincing winners. A win against Aquinas would have meant a tie for third and force Aquinas to share the Blackwood Cup. After a promising start by Hale, Aquinas showed why its team was the form team of the competition and Hale lost to a more patient and disciplined side. Throughout the season, Hale captain Matthew Dawson, ably supported by Steven Freind and Shervin Fazely, displayed leadership, led the team in scoring and was named Best All Court Player. Each week Hale's forwards, led by Jye Dodd and Jason Burgers, battled hard and were able to generate many scoring opportunities. his first over (the 11th) and wickets followed at regular intervals for Wesley to be dismissed for 194. Dan Stiller was the best of the bowlers and he was well supported by Jake Rawson, Scott Davis and Myles O'Meehan.



The 2004 rowing season was one of enjoyment and excitement for the 127 students who participated. With the Hamer Cup a realistic goal for the boys this year, all year 9, 10 and senior boys set about training and honing their skills in order to be as competitive as possible for the Head of the River on Saturday March 27.

For some boys the season started half way through Term 3 2003, with voluntary weights and ergometers sessions held in the School's weights room. Congratulations to the Hale 3rd VIII who took out their division. Ably coached by Mr Keith Reynolds, they were to be a driving force in the boatshed for 2004.

Speech day is typically seen as the end of the school year, but for many rowers it is the time that they improve their technique and fitness ready for rowing camp. The holiday training programme devised by Mr Sandy Burt, incorporated water and land sessions that were challenging, yet rewarding. Certainly by the end of the holidays, the boys who had attended regularly were very fit. Hale is truly blessed with a number of exceptional coaches and paramount equipment, giving all rowers a tremendous advantage in racing and learning this great sport. I would like to wish the future of Hale Rowing good luck and cannot wait to support future generations from the shores.

The 2004 Hale Inters Campaign commenced at the beginning of Term 3 in 2003. With the prospect of trying to win back to back Inters for the first time since 1992, nearly 40 students, keen to get a head start on the opposition, bused to Challenge Stadium twice a week in an effort to build up fitness and work on technique. The Challenge Stadium experiment proved popular with swimmers who enjoyed the camaraderie of the bus trip and the luxury of a heated pool. The strength of this preseason training carried through into the holiday programme. On a regular basis, 40 students would train on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. The lure of a cooked poolside breakfast added to the attraction of these early morning sessions and created a sense of team and unity in the squad. The holiday swim camp was a great success and attended by 40 swimmers. The boys were educated on 'swimmers shoulder' managing bv physiotherapist Chris Lowe as well as learning from the experience and knowledge of two great Olympians in Mark Oberman and Todd Pearson. Todd, who is a great supporter of Hale swimming, took the boys for a memorable hour of coaching. His impact on the boys was significant and his ability to impart his knowledge left all who experienced the session in no doubt as to what he should do after his competition days are over. The boys also enjoyed ten pin bowling, team building activities, a trip to the water slide and the traditional trip to the pictures. The much loved swimmers' triathlon concluded the camp. Congratulations to Mark Schmidt for winning the junior division and Chris Guard for winning the senior division.

Training commenced in Term 1, 2004, under the stewardship of Head Coach Jon Wyllie. Jon, who is a meticulous planner and deep thinking coach, embarked the boys on carefully structure training routine designed to maximize the boys' performance over the relatively short time period of seven weeks. The enthusiasm of the boys was tangible. The squad consisted of nearly 130 members and on a regular basis 50 students would attend the morning sessions and a further 20 for the afternoon sessions. 






















The PSA Interschool Athletics Meeting at Perry Lakes Stadium on Saturday September 18 was the one hundredth challenge for the Alcock Shield. The rich traditions of this prestigious competition were exemplified by another brilliant exhibition of athletic talent and a celebration of school spirit. The 117 individual events were evenly contested with the three main challengers sharing the lead throughout the afternoon. While the honours eventually went to a worthy Trinity College, the day provided Hale School with many memorable moments to savour.

Some individual highlights include Stephan Todoroski's new PSA record for the U/17 shot put with a throw of 15.13 metres and Clinton Benjamin running the fastest 100 metres sprint for Hale School in 100 years, in a time of 10.90 seconds. Stephan also convincingly won his discus event, while Clinton was unbeaten all day, adding the 200 metres, the long and triple jumps to his list of personal achievements, before helping the U/17 relay team win comprehensively in School record time. The other members of this incredible relay team, Lucas Mata, Tom Anderson and Henry Roberts, had earlier won the sprints, long, high and triple jumps in a fantastic display of power and technique. The U/14s performed very well in their first Inters, with Yasuhito Nakajima and David Clarke dominating the sprints, while Trent Murray won his division 2 shot put. Robert Harvey was most impressive, winning the hurdles and high jump, before jumping second in the triple. A courageous third place in the 400 metres, collapsing on the line, best revealed Robert's indomitable fortitude after recovering from nausea, moments before the start. Throughout the day there were numerous examples of commitment to the team and pride in representing the School. Shreeram Young's 800 metre fight-back, Edmund Forrester and Mark Bellini's efforts to compete after serious illness, and the many reserves called upon at the last minute due to unexpected injuries, were wonderful displays of human endeavour. The euphoria of winning athletic

events faded in comparison to the emotion that reverberated around the stadium during the 3 kilometre race. Chris Guard seriously injured his hip during the first lap but continued on valiantly under considerable pain and duress to finish the race. The crowd recognised the sacrifice that was being offered for the sake of the team and rose to a resounding standing ovation as they witnessed something very special. Chris's determination to contribute to a winning cause, reflected the team's commitment to one another and reminded us all of a primary purpose of competitive sport; the revelation of character under adversity and rising to the physical and mental challenges to prevail.

The team was brilliantly led throughout the season by the captain Phil Stroud who won the open discus for the fifth consecutive year in addition to close seconds in both the long jump and shot put events. Jarryd Batt repeated the inspirational feat of the previous year with a blistering 400 metre sprint that will be remembered for a very long time. Jarryd then combined with fellow vice captains Marcus Hodsdon and Alex Anderson and with the electrifying pace of Tim Johnstone to win the final relay race and set another School record. Perhaps it was the success of the last two events, the relay races that provided the team with an overriding sense of elation despite finishing third overall. Perhaps the earlier demonstrations of team spirit had put the competition into context for the athletes who knew that they done their best and given their all for Hale. Or perhaps they believed that they had worked very hard, significantly improved this season, performed well on the day and had hope for even better next year.

Congratulations to all participants and thank you to all the coaches for another dedicated effort in expertly preparing the team during the intensive 5 week season.

outstanding all over the field. Hale eventually took the game by 46 points. Other solid contributors included Clinton Benjamin, Jarryd Batt, Jarrad King, and Mark Bellini.

During the July school holidays the annual football trip to Melbourne took place. Whilst in Melbourne, the team played against Trinity Grammar. Melbourne Grammar, and Geelong College and although the side was competitive in all matches, it was unable to record a victory. However, many of the senior players, including Mitchell Morton, Phil Greaney, Jarryd Batt, Kyle Skinner, Cal Shelton, Robert Henderson and Tom Kennedy, proved to be great leaders on the field. The games were all played in tremendous spirit and the staff and parents at all three schools were wonderful hosts.

The boys were fortunate to attend three AFL games whilst in Melbourne: Carlton against the Kangaroos at the Optus Oval, Brisbane versus Collingwood at the MCG and Melbourne versus the Bulldogs at the Telstra Dome. They watched Carlton train on the Thursday evening, and were shown around the rooms and facilities at Optus Oval the following day by Digby Morrell, a former Hale School student (1996) who is now playing with Carlton. All involved found the experience most worthwhile.

With three games remaining in the competition, and knowing that the Alcock Cup was now a contest between Aquinas and Trinity, the coaches had the opportunity to include more young players in the team. A total of twenty players played 1st XVIII football for the first time in 2004!


The boys showed great courage over the course of the season and displayed a fearless attack on the football often intimidating other sides out of contests.

a good start was always important and the first three games were against Trinity, traditionally strong in soccer, Wesley, who would end up being Hale's closest rivals and Scotch, champions of 2003. 




Miss Shirley Houston







I will always remember coming to Hale. It was a big moment in my life. I have never moved school before but I am glad I made the move. Brodie





DEBATING

The formal season kicked off in Term 2 with the first competitive debates against St Mary's Anglican Girls School. Although the result was fairly lopsided, by the end of the evening, all who attended agreed that the debaters had presented their arguments with a high degree of competency and confidence. This is testimony to the thoughtful research and outstanding commitment demonstrated by all boys when preparing their debate every Thursday morning. It must be noted that many of the participants in the Debating Club were also involved in several other co-curricular activities in the Junior School, making their obvious dedication to practice and improving their public speaking skills all the more commendable.

Topics such as That girls will take over the world and That school is too hard, challenged the boys to prepare and present arguments counter to their own points of view. To their credit, they quickly recognised the importance of working as a team and involving the audience with humour. These two aspects of their progress as debaters featured in Hale's outstanding performance against the powerful All Saints line up in Term 3. The two schools finished on equal terms after a night of compelling debating.

Hale was selected as the host school for this year's All Stars Challenge Grand Final; a night of enthralling, closely fought arguments. A remarkable seven of eight teams won through to the Grand Final and represented Hale brilliantly on the night. After highly entertaining and stimulating debates the verdicts were finally in and the adjudicator agreed. The debating team from Hale Junior School had done amazing things. Three Hale Junior School teams won their debates and two individuals were the recipients of the outstanding debater titles; Giles Kenny and Arjun Kaushik. Giles capped off an excellent debating year, taking home the accolade of outstanding Chairperson too!

DOUBLE HELIX SCIENCE CLUB

The Double Helix Science Club benefits greatly from the involvement of Hale parents, Senior School teachers and students. Mr Bill Cooper inspired a love of astronomy in Term 1, speaking to the boys about 'The Shape of the Universe' and then giving them the chance to explore the skies at Bindoon using his 30-inch Obsession telescope on an Astronomy Sleepover. The highlight of Semester 1 was the opportunity to see Venus transit the Sun through a 14-inch telescope equipped with a solar filter.

Mrs Carol Robson thrilled the boys in the Chemistry laboratories with experiments involving reactive metals. The boys particularly enjoyed the 'pop' test for hydrogen produced by combining magnesium and hydrochloric acid. Mrs de Souza gave the boys a comprehensive introduction to veterinary science with the help of a four-legged friend. On World Water Day, Dr Bath explained the scientific work of the Water Corporation as the boys found out, What is In My Water? The boys again took part in the Water Wonders Snapshot Event and the National Macroinvertebrate Snapshot run by Ribbons of Blue. Several lucky boys took part in the Saltwatch Bus Tour. The Gould League's Freshwater Festival gave the boys the opportunity to hold a snake, meet a raptor and make Nyungar tools.

In Term 2, June Butcher from Kanyana Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre spoke to the boys about bobtail flu. They raised money for reptile boxes with a Snakes in the Jar guessing competition, Junior Primary piñata and Staff Baby Photo competition. The boys enjoyed presenting Ms Butcher with the money on a nocturnal tour of the Centre. The Great Australian Marsupial Nightstalk was held at Ellis Brook Valley this year.

Three boys from Christ Church Grammar School talked to the boys about their winning entries in the Australian-International Model Solar Car Challenge. Rhys Kidd, (Year 12) shared the excitement of the time spent at Sun City in Moscow working with Russian cosmonauts on his Russian Scientific Study Programme. James Whitby, Adam Birman, Liam O'Shea, Martin Shield and Harry Hales won certificates for their involvement in The Science Challenge.

The boys learned about genetic diseases such as cystic fibrosis in Jeans for Genes Week. In National Science Week they tried to solve the online Murder by Moonlight. A visit to Scitech for a programme of Introductory Robotics was thoroughly enjoyed. The final activity for the year was a trip to Scitech for Murder Mystery At Menagerie Park and the Planetarium to see the planet Mars.

MATHEMATICS

Two teams of Yr 4 and Yr 5 boys were entered in the Naturally Mathematical Competition this year. Students have two hours in which to solve three very challenging maths problems online. Alex Bell, Tom de Souza, Nathan Stanley, Andrew Rule, Brodie Olma, Liam O'Shea, Adam Birman, Gus O'Neill and reserve, Harry Hales, represented the Junior School admirably over two terms.

In March, two teams were entered in MAWA's Have Sum Fun maths competition. Each team comprised two students from Yrs 5, 6 and 7. The boys worked together to answer problem-solving questions within a set time limit. Team 2 (Morgan Hughes, Andrew Rule, Andrew Pritchard, Harrison Nayler, Josh Reed and Jonathan van Buren) were placed fourth in the Primary North division. A Yr 7 team and a Yr 5/6 team were entered in the Maths Olympiad this year. There were 5 rounds, each comprising 5 questions. Nathan Stanley was top scorer for the Yr 5/6 team with 19 out of 25 questions correct. Three boys tied for first place in the Yr 7 team with 22 out of 25 correct: Jeremy Huynh, Joshua Reed and Timothy Young.

For the first time, the Junior School entered a team in MAWA's *Have Sum Fun Online*. The competition consisted of three rounds of ten questions. Each round of questions was displayed on the website for only one hour. Teams were required to submit online answers during that time slot. The Hale team of Jordan Aitken, Jeremy Huynh, Tom de Souza, Gus O'Neill, Andrew Pritchard and Reagan Leung won first place. Andrew Pritchard won a Highly Commended award for his entry in the MAWA Maths Talent Quest. The topic for Yr 6 was *Winning Gold*. Andrew invented a new Olympic sport and explored the mathematics of performance and scoring.

In the recently conducted Westpac Awards, undertaken by the top thirty students in Yr 7, Joshua Reed, Aditya Eranki and Ronan Chapple all received High Distinctions, while Jeremy Huynh was awarded a prize for his exceptional performance. Another twelve students received Distinctions.

SPANISH

Throughout the year, the boys continued to become familiar with the Spanish language by learning through a variety of experiences that enriched their cultural and lexical understandings. Each year level followed a different language programme that offered a rich variety of tasks.

In Junior Primary, the boys enjoyed an array of experiences ranging from singing songs to making different arts and crafts such as dinosaurs, insects, vehicles, Easter cards, flags from different Spanish speaking countries, flowers to decorate a Christmas tree and piñatas. The classes also participated enthusiastically in different language games, miming different actions to show their understanding of the language and using newly learned vocabulary.

In the Year 4 and 5 classes the boys studied themes that included learning about the Spanish conquest of the Americas, the Aztec civilization in Mexico, the Olympics, Myself, Flight, Our House, Weather, Space, Television and the Environment.

Each year level had the opportunity to create clay models. The Year 5 boys made caravels used for the discovery of the new world and the Year 4 boys made Aztec calendars. The boys had fun participating in short role plays, dressing up for a fashion parade, writing about their favourite sports, describing themselves and their houses, creating posters and advertisements on different themes, cooking nachos, using the Olympics to learn about different sports in Spanish and creating designs of houses and airplanes.


The upper primary classes participated enthusiastically in activities that enabled them to use Spanish when role playing everyday situations such as shopping, acting out their own comic strips, producing their own advertisements and Power Points or writing letters to friends and Olympic athletes. As well as this they took part in making recycled paper for writing cards and constructed and used traditional toys. They also write a variety of texts including Big Books, travel brochures, posters and pictures books.

The year concluded with a 'Spanish Day', when the boys experienced a day of cultural significance during which they saw or wore traditional costumes, cooked, made art and crafts and were involved in the excitement of making, and most importantly, breaking piñatas.



The Hale Junior School Drama programme runs from Years 4 to 7. It is designed to: help students establish relationships, develop group cohesion, develop skills in coordination, concentration, logical thinking, effective communication, and use of imagination, aid the development of language acquisition, sensory awareness and self-confidence, encourage expression and provide a safe, fun learning environment.

The semester-long units are not designed for the study of particular themes, although focus topics may be used to direct content. Drama is explored as an art form and tool for learning in its own right, with its own special body of knowledge and expressive skills. The programme is developmental and based on the Curriculum Framework model.

OBITUARY



Matthew Paikos (1987-2004)

It has been my privilege to have known Matt since we started here at Hale School, 12 years ago in 1993. Together, we have shared hundreds of unforgettable experiences from basketball and football games, to classes, camps and holidays. In each of these memories Matt's passion for life, his courage, charisma and humour shone through. These qualities made Matt the person he was, and meant that he was held in high regard by so many students and members of staff.

Whether it was early in the morning and Matt, without fail, was kicking his beloved Dockers footy around to everyone, bar the Eagles supporters, or at recess when Matt, despite his obvious physical limitations, was at the front of the pack in footy, tackling with the best of them and never giving up the ball without a fight, his courage and love of life never dwindled and continued to amaze and inspire everyone. For Matt, every day required extraordinary courage just simply to come to school, but to come to school wrapped in his Dockers scarf after a big win, that took real courage. Many of us remember with great fondness when Matt would turn up to school wearing his beloved scarf and proceed to persistently taunt every Eagles supporter he could find, including me, about the Dockers' incredible win on the weekend, and bask in the glory of the Eagles' continued poor performance. It was indeed his time for payback for the years of pestering he endured from all of us during the Dockers' early years, and for the many weak wooden spoon jokes we threw his way.

I remember one comment in particular that he made to me late last year during the Eagles' poor performance. I had, years earlier, asked him after a season in which the Dockers had been rather unsuccessful, who he supported in WA football. His defiant reply had been, "The Dockers, of course! Just you wait, my boys will come good!" And so, late last year, knowing how badly the Eagles had done and how well his beloved Dockers were doing, he asked me the same question, probing to see where my loyalties in football now lay. I replied saying that I had given up on football and now followed the Wallabies. To me, this was Matt. He stuck by his friends and family doggedly and never gave up. His courage and passion for a well-balanced life stretched beyond anything I have ever known and I am so grateful I was given a chance to know him for the time I did.

Whilst deciding what to include in my tribute to Matt, I came across a quote from our former headmaster, Dr John Inverarity that I believe, puts into words what Matt was about. Dr Inverarity said "We have some really sensitive moments here, from camaraderie on the supporting field to spiritual development and appreciating the tenderness of a lovely poem".

Matt sought to lead a life that was balanced and full, despite the horrific challenges that life threw at him. He took it all in his stride and never let it get in the way of him living his life the way he wanted. Matt was given a huge challenge but proceeded to show us all that with his courage, passion and inspirational attitude, nothing could stand in his way. I would like to end with these words from a poem I found in honour of Matt.

> Do not stand at my grave and weep, I am not there, I do not sleep. I am the thousand winds that blow, I am the diamond glint upon the snow. I am the sunlight on the ripened grain, I am the gentle autumn rain. I am the shining star at night, When you wake to the morning light. My time has come, I am at rest, I am the sunset in the West. I am the clouds that race above Where I watch over the ones I love. Do not stand at my grave and cry, I am not there. I do not die. So hear the words that here I say, "I am the love that guides your way."

170 Old Boys attended Old Boys' Day that began with a Chapel Service that was followed by morning tea, the Old Boys' Assembly and lunch in a marquee on the boundary of Vernon Murphy Oval where an Old Boys' team played a cricket match against the Headmaster's Invitation XI. The highlight of the day was undoubtedly the attendance of Frank Willmott (1918-1920) who became the first centenarian to attend an Old Boys' Assembly. All those present found the experience very moving and we were all saddened to hear of his subsequent passing away in July. 2004 saw the first use at the assembly of a high-tech, Powerpoint presentation showing wonderful images of Hale over the decades. Hopefully, we can expand on this and really make it a feature each year.

Our first Western Derby Football Breakfast was a resounding success as was our 'Thank You' function held in the John Inverarity Music and Drama Centre. With our Summer and Winter Sports Days, a successful Country Dinner in Bunbury, the Retired Old Haleians' Luncheon and many re-unions of individual year groups, it has been a busy year.

The Lister Drake Scholarship was once again awarded and our congratulations this year go to Henry Bromfield, son of Richard

Bromfield (1958-1966) and grandson of the late Dr Don Bromfield (1931-1939).

During the year, it was decided that the Association would donate \$25,000 to the Boarding Appeal and it must be mentioned that, to date, the appeal has raised well over \$900,000 with the great majority of it being donated by Old Boys.

Very soon, displayed at the eastern end of the Old Haleians' Memorial Hall, will be our Honour Boards which have been brought up to date from 1909 and which show Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurers. Thanks must go to Mr Tom Hoar and to Mr Bill Edgar for their work on this project.

Service Awards to Teachers were presented again and this terrific initiative is very much appreciated by those who receive them.

My personal highlight was the Valedictory Evening, this very important function being held this year at the School. It was wonderful to present the boys with their Old Haleians' tie and Life Membership Certificate in the Old Haleians' Memorial Hall, built in 1961 from funds raised by the Old Boys. I thought the night was a huge success and we welcome the 196 boys into the Association. When they are ready to return to their School, we will be there and they will be made to feel very welcome.
