



THE HEADMASTER

Speech Day Address

Your Grace and Mrs Herft, Mr David Aitken and members of the Board, invited guests, members of staff, parents and boys. It is an honour to be presenting the School's Speech Morning report in its 147th year. I am especially pleased that we have as our guests, the Archbishop or Perth, the Most Reverend Roger Herft and Mrs Herft. I was interested to read that the motto of the school the Archbishop attended in Sri Lanka was *Learn or Depart*, and I thought our motto of *Duty* was pretty straightforward. Archbishop, we look forward to your address and thank you for agreeing to present the prizes a little later on.

It is not my intention to report to you this morning on the list of exceptional achievements that have occurred over the past twelve months. I could never give justice to such a list. The fortnightly Newsletter has recorded many student achievements and I hope you have found time to read this important publication as each edition is written to inform and acknowledge and enable you to be a part of the boys' achievements as they occur.

Earlier this year, I began one of my pieces in a newsletter with the quote from Plato: *What is honoured in a country will be cultivated there*. I find it a profound statement and one that has real resonance for a school. It gave me reason to think about what we do at Hale, and how we do it. Do we 'walk the talk' in terms of our academic endeavour, our pastoral care, our cocurricular offerings and our daily interactions with each other and what is it that we promote in each of these endeavours. Do we honour what we say we do?

On the academic front, I would say emphatically, yes; although I must add, we are being tested by the many and varied pedagogical changes that are being forced upon us presently. The implementation of outcomes-based education through the Curriculum Framework and in the new Courses of Study will necessarily shift the focus of teaching. The concern that teachers have that more time will have to go into assessing and reporting and less into teaching and learning is overwhelming. Hale has committed resources over the next two years to enable the best possible outcomes to be achieved during the implementation phase. New courses have to be written, assessment procedures reworked from scratch and desired outcomes totally reevaluated. There are many issues involved in this new process that have yet to be addressed to anyone's satisfaction.

However, of greater concern to me is that we are losing control of the academic agenda in this State. The increase in leaving age, the possible realignment of Year 7 into the Senior School domain, reporting in quartiles and A-E bands, Curriculum Framework implementation, Outcome Based Education, an Australian Certificate of Education to be based on a national curriculum: each on its own may have merit. Nevertheless, we are being bombarded with these educational imperatives from all directions at a time when the ability to maintain high quality of teaching is already under threat. To have to completely revise the assessment procedures involved with the new Senior Secondary Education and report accordingly for WA requirements while at the same time being told that the Federal Minister wishes to see 'plain English speaking reports' with reports in

all Years from 1 - 10 in quartiles and A-E bands, is an extraordinary situation. The School has been involved in submissions to the government through its association with the Association of Independent Schools of WA and the Association of Heads of Independent Schools of Australia, as well as writing submissions to the current ministerial enquiry into post-compulsory education. There is no doubt it is a time of uncertainty in educational administration. The goal for Hale must be to retain the high quality education offerings currently in place and to this point, we have set ourselves to do this.

Indeed, as we look to maintain our commitment to academic opportunities, a Gifted Education Co-ordinator has been appointed in the Senior School from the commencement of 2006. Her role will be to co-ordinate and enhance the opportunities for the boys already in place. Mr Robin Shaw and others have overseen this area of the academic domain in recent years; however, if we are to provide additional quality educational opportunities that enrich and challenge the boys, a more focussed and directed approach is needed.

Throughout 2005, many boys have achieved success in numerous Mathematics, Science, Creative Writing, Accounting and Geography competitions, including several medal and High Distinction winners. There have been Art awards from the Cathedral Art Exhibition, extraordinary representation again with six of our Year 12 artists being selected for the upcoming Perspectives exhibition of Year 12 work, an amazing six boys (two in Year 11 and four in Year 10) in the top 10 of the Alliance Française examinations this year and three Year 11 boys chosen to attend the National Physics Olympiad Camp in Canberra next January. The list goes on and hopefully you have noted them all during the year from the Newsletter. In the Year 12 Careerlink programme, six students received awards, one received a scholarship in hotel management and two, Leigh Maisev and Dillon Rivers, received Commonwealth Awards in Vocational Education

In PSA sport, Nevin Mills' 1st VIII rowers again took second place in the senior crew with the shed finishing third overall, the tennis team completed their third win of championships, as did the rugby team. Soccer shared the Lawe-Davies Trophy for the second year in succession following an extraordinarily courageous win against Guildford. And the Badminton team, with Honours winner Louis Lee, added the fourth PSA trophy to the cabinet. But we know our sporting programme is so much more than trophies. Across the sporting domain, Hale sport more than held its own throughout the year, not only in terms of results but in terms of sportsmanship, behaviour and organisation. The importance of having so many of our coaches being classroom teachers must not be underestimated. The relationships are strong, the values and approach are consistent and the boys appreciate the genuine enthusiasm the Staff has for their efforts. The Sportsmaster, Mr Ross Barron, is moving to a role on the School Management Team next year and his successor will have a superb mentor to call upon as he maintains this area of the School. Having said this, we are always looking to enhance the co-curricular offerings in the School. There are support groups springing up in many sports to

assist in various areas and I thank parents who are getting involved in this way.

I am always thrilled to learn of the success boys are having in sports outside their PSA commitments. They show real determination and commitment and the level of achievement is quite extraordinary. Lacrosse, cricket, football, rugby, soccer, diving, go-karting, karate, kayaking, athletics - the list goes on. Again, I record in the Newsletters all that I hear as I believe we should all be aware of what others are doing. It makes the School a more informed and friendly community. I hope I will continue to hear of such achievements.

The dramatic productions at the School this year were superb. *Little Shop of Horrors, Lord of the Flies* and *Beauty and the Beast* were all very different but engaging productions and as Mr Chris Rutter stands down from his demanding dual role as Venue Manager and Productions Manager, his contribution to Drama at Hale could not be showcased better than with the 2005 Drama programme.

The place of music at Hale continues to be enhanced through the performances of the boys and the vision and passion of the Director of Music, Andrew Bushell and his staff. The opportunities for boys interested in music are endless: the Cantate tour to England this year, and the formation of a symphony orchestra in Term 4 have added extra dimensions to the opportunities that exist in that area of School life.

I must note the Outdoor Education and Service Learning programmes at this point. Greg Harvey and his team provide a structured programme from Year 5 to Year 10 with the Exmouth experience being the pinnacle. I simply cannot understand why some boys do not want to go. I do not know of a camp that provides such a unique backdrop for what is achieved. The boys return tired but with memories and life skills that serve them well into their future.

The Service Learning programme is an integral part of a Hale education and it is humbling to see the large number of boys who volunteer for each activity, usually many more than can be accommodated. Be it the Sony Camp for Disabled Children, the Kim Beazley School, Chrysalis Montessori, Family Pathways, James Brown Anglican Hostel, St Vincent de Paul, Mt Hawthorn Special Education, North Beach Education Support, the many charities supported including the Cancer Council's *Relay for Life* or the 40 Hour Famine, the students involved give of themselves and come away enriched by their own contribution and the difference they are making to the lives of others.

During the year, the School has reassessed the many elements that make up a Strategic Plan. Early on, it became obvious that we needed to review the School's Aims and Objectives to ensure they align with the other aspects of the overall plan. The result has been a statement of Purpose, a Vision Statement and a list of Values that underpin all that we do at the School. The determination of the Values of the School was an affirming process as the suggestions that came from many areas of the School community were very similar. The nine core Values that were settled upon to articulate what we hold dear are: Excellence, Integrity, Respect, Christian Identity, Leadership, Enjoyment, Learning, Creativity and Innovation, and Community. I believe they say a great deal about the Hale community.

Another important facet of the Strategic Plan is the Facilities Plan. Again, the needs of the School were examined by different groups in the Hale community and a list of facilities to take us well into the 21st Century was established. The cornerstone of this building programme will be a new Library/Resource Centre. The current library is 40+ years old and was built for a School population half the current number. The library staff work miracles in the current setting to provide the quality learning environment they do but, there is a limit to their work. A new facility on or around the site of the old Faulkner House building will present a strong statement of our core business. A suite of learning areas adjacent to this new building will be part of the building programme as will the conversion of the tuckshop to a cafeteria style area on the other end of the dining room, forming a student precinct for passive recreation and I'll stop before I say too much; certainly the last bit hasn't gone to the Finance Committee just yet!

It has been an exciting and time consuming process and as we surge towards our 150th year celebrations in 2008, the timing of the programme becomes important. I shall be sending you a formal document outlining the outcomes of the planning process early in 2006.

The Pastoral Care aspect of the School continues to thrive. The opening of the new Boarding House in January this year changed the dynamic of the boarding community significantly. What hasn't changed is the commitment of those involved with boarding. The boarding Heads of House continue to commit themselves without reservation to the awesome responsibility they have been given and to Richard Tongue, Brian Grimes and Mark Walsh, our sincere thanks for your amazing efforts this year. The care they give to each boy is augmented by the Assistant Heads of House, Jo Fordham, Brenton Hantke and Dan Vernon and the resident tutors. However, an email forwarded to one Head of House from a parent of a senior boy suggests our efforts to get boys to phone home is still not producing the desired results in all instances. The email read: "Dear Son, We are about to pay the second instalment of School fees, but are unsure if you are still alive or not - and therefore we are not sure if we are paying for something that there may be not benefit from. Regards, Dad.'

In 2005, we restructured the pastoral care system in Year 9 by moving the boys into the mainstream of the House system under the care of the Assistant Head of House. They have appreciated the slightly different focus and the feeling of being part of their House. Indeed, all Heads of House, Assistants and PCLs provide wonderful support for the students in their care.

As is plain from the challenges identified earlier

in this report, 2005 has been a big year for staff and it will only get bigger next year. I am tremendously grateful for the dedication of all staff, teaching and non-teaching, to their jobs, and the myriad other responsibilities they willingly take on. In his book, <u>The Learning Game</u>, Jonathan Smith puts the essence of the job and of its challenges in plain language:

"At secondary level, teachers spend their time teaching, caring for and trying to build relationships with their students. This is a challenging and very interesting job. Schools are dynamic and human places. Parents who are finding it very stressful living with their adolescent sons should sometimes reflect that teachers have their classrooms full of adolescents every day all day."

They care for their boys and they care for each other. The air of sadness and disbelief that has been hovering over the Staff this term as much loved staff member David Lindegaard battled with cancer reflects the character of those entrusted to teach and care for your sons.

A number of members of staff leave us at the end of 2005. We thank them for their unstinting support and friendship and for their many valuable contributions to the lives and education of the boys.

Mrs Davinya Ferguson and Mr Brent Hedley have made valuable contributions this year, Mr Chris Wisniewski moves to Sydney after three years in the English Department, Ms Carina Sas, leaves us to continue her studies after four years in the English Department and significant involvement with Public Speaking and Mock Trial teams, Mr Steve McFarland leaves us for a career in professional rugby after three very busy years, as all conquering rugby coach, a History teacher and pioneer Head of House in the reconstituted Loton House, And Mr Laurie Scott leaves for the challenges of a girls' school in Toowoomba, having completed 16 years at Hale, 12 as Head of the highly successful Geography Department. His commitment to the students studying Geography is well known and his involvement in the Hale rugby fraternity over many years has also been valued highly. I asked Mr Scott to speak at the final assembly on Wednesday but he declined, suggesting he had nothing to say. My guess is that he had already said it all.

Mr Eddie Cecins has decided that ten years as Head of Parry House is enough for a while and Mr Andrew Woods will take on this important role next year. Mr Peter Crosbie will hand over the responsibility of Head of the Design and Technology Department to Mr Haig McGlashan. Mr Gareth Roberts will be taking the reins of Loton House next year. There are many staff looking for opportunities to make a mark in the School and I commend them for their willingness to step forward. The unfortunate part of this is that enthusiastic and committed people have to miss out. I ask you to join me now in thanking the Staff for their tireless work this year.

Student leadership is another drum of mine that gets banged often. We are continuing to explore options that will provide more authentic leadership positions for boys in all Year groups in the Senior School. This year's Prefect team was led by Matthew Aitken and Guy Doggett, boys with styles of leadership that complemented each other. These young men had a genuine desire to assist the younger members of the School and their contribution to Hale School in 2006 was significant. Matt, I thank you for your compassion, care and the lateral perspective you brought to the role this year. I would now like to announce the School Prefects for 2006. As I call their names, I ask them to come onto the stage where we shall acknowledge them as a group: Joel Badger, Chris Bausor, Mark Bellini, Henry Bromfield, Will Clapin, Cal Doggett, James Doyle, Andrew Gale, Dylan Hirsch, Joe House, Michael Li, James Lucas, Robert Malaney, Thomas McCulloch, Jilen Patel, Joseph Sawyer, Reid Smith, Marcus Stoinis, and Mat Stone.

When we spoke to these 19 boys individually, their sense of leading by example, of integrity and their willingness to be role models were obvious. To lead this team and indeed the student body, I would like to ask the following to take one step forward from this team: Vice-Captain of School for 2006: Cal Doggett. Captain of School for 2006: Will Clapin. I am confident Will and Cal will prove to be strong leaders of a committed team.

The House Captains also hold significant positions in the student leadership team. Their role has a different focus to that of School Prefect but pastoral leadership and administrative support to the Heads of House are important requirements for the position. The following boys have been given this role in 2006. Buntine; Mark Bellini, Faulkner; Mat Stone, Havelock; Michael Li, Haynes; Sam Bayford, Loton; Steven Salvarinov, Parry; Cal Doggett, Riley; James Lucas, St Georges; Joseph Sawyer, Tregonning; Tom McCulloch, and Wilson; Dylan Hirsch.

The Parents' and Friends' Association has been very active again this year. At the recent AGM, Mrs Ali Harris stood down from the Presidency, after two highly energised years. I thank her and her committee for their efforts. Their objectives are clear and I urge you to support their initiatives as they work to enhance the spirit of community at Hale.

The Board of Governors give of their time selflessly. Expertise and experience stand behind their contributions and their genuine commitment to the betterment of the school is unfailing. The Chairman, David Aitken, is meticulous in all that he does and I thank him for his honest and ever-present counsel.

In conclusion, thank you and congratulations to the students of 2005. You have, in the main, given it your best, coping with the challenges that life at your age brings, whilst remaining positive and true to the values of the School. Enjoy your break, get your summer hairdos happening if you wish but spend a few minutes thinking not only about what you did but how you did it. The journey is all important.

To return to Plato's quote, I believe we do honour appropriately the Values we wish to cultivate at the School and through the support of all in the Hale community we can continue to do this.

I leave you with the words of Adeline Yen Mah, author of the biographical text, <u>Chinese</u> <u>Cinderella</u> as she mused to her grandfather "And *if l should be so lucky to succeed one day, it will be because you believed in me.*" I hope sincerely that the young men here feel they can say the same thing to both their teachers and parents, as that would say a lot about us all.

I wish you a very happy Christmas and a wonderfully relaxing summer break. It is a privilege for me to be part of this great School and with all of you to be part of its destiny. It is worth every bit of effort we put into it.

Nelson Mandela said this about the human condition:

Our deepest fear is not that we are inadequate. Our deepest fear is that we are powerful beyond measure. It is our light, not our darkness that most frightens us. We ask ourselves, "Who am I to be - brilliant, gorgeous, talented and fabulous?" Actually, who are you not to be?

At this point in your life, at some point in your life, you must confront that fear and step beyond it. You must set your sights above survival and conformity. Instead, strive for the Kingdom, and these things will be given to you as well.

But, what is the Kingdom? Simply put, the Kingdom is anytime and any place in which we see God's glory being revealed - and the glory of God - as one of the great Christian thinkers wrote, is a human being fully alive. (St Thomas Aquinas)

Gentlemen, as you leave here, I invite you to think about what it is to be fully alive, to be brimming with life and energy, excitement and joy. Because this is the hope for you of everyone gathered here in this Chapel and, of course, it is God's dream for you too. And enabling you to become this, I believe, has been the very purpose of your schooling. To start you on the journey of becoming yourself in all your glory, so that, as you step beyond Hale tonight, you may continue the search for that which brings you fully alive, that which ignites your passion. Because people who are doing what they desire to do, what God always meant for them to do, are people full of energy and joy, people who are fully alive to the good things in life.

Do not keep striving for what you are to eat and what you are to drink, and do not keep worrying. For it is the nations of the world that strive after all these things.

Instead, find that which awakens the enormous pool of life that is welling up inside you and you will have all you need to be happy and complete. Don't let life become a manic pursuit of the next promotion, the bigger pay cheque or the larger house. Do you think you would care so very much about those things if you suffered an aneurysm, or felt a telling stab of pain in your chest? Chase abundant life, not an imitation of it or of yourself

Mandela finishes what he has to say about human potential with these words:

You are a child of God. Your playing small does not save the World. There is nothing enlightened about shrinking so that other people won't feel insecure around you. We were born to make manifest the glory of God that is within us. It is not just in some of us; it is in Everyone. As we let our light shine, we unconsciously give to the people around us, permission to do the same. As we are liberated from our own fear, our presence automatically liberates others.

We all have gifts and passions. Follow them and you will know the blessing of being fully alive. You will be a blessing to the world. You will meet God and be God's glory – a human being fully alive. Go from this place, liberate your passion for life on the world, and in so doing you will begin to liberate others.

Consider the lilies and know you are of great value. Know you are loved. Be fully yourself and fully alive. The world is a gift to you and you who can be a gift to the world.

OBITUARY



David Lindegaard was an English teacher, rugby and tennis coach, assistant boarding House Head and much loved colleague and friend to staff, students and parents at Hale School for six memorable years from July, 1999, to November, 2005.

Boys from Year 8 to Year 12 loved David's humour and the infectious enthusiasm for learning which characterised his English and Literature classes. David Lindegaard wanted students to find their own voice, to express their own views with confidence and good arguments, and to write in clear, passionate language. His students knew intuitively that David was genuinely interested in them and their opinions, and this created a classroom atmosphere of trust and mutual respect - the ideal setting for good teaching and good learning.

David had an adventurous and independent spirit. After growing up in Bristol and, following his schooling at St Brendan's College, Bristol, David completed a Bachelor of Education degree at the University of Birmingham. He then travelled to the Republic of Malawi, East Africa, where he taught at St Andrew's College, Blantyre, for six years (1982-1988), loving the different culture, the vibrant landscape and in general thriving in response to the many new challenges facing a young teacher in post-colonial East Africa.

David returned to Bristol in 1988, married Louise and set about planning his next journey, to Australia. Arriving in Perth in 1989, he joined the staff of Trinity College and after ten happy years there, moved to Hale School. The David Lindegaard who began at Hale in 1999 was immediately recognised by his new colleagues as an experienced, compassionate classroom teacher, deeply concerned with the emotional well-being of his pupils and not afraid to push those same pupils towards the high standards he set for them.

David Lindegaard (1957-2005)

In David's final year at Trinity, he was a well-respected President of the Staff Association, so he brought to Hale a high level of awareness of the importance of good relationships and collegiality amongst the teaching staff. He contributed much towards that dimension of Hale School life. Colleagues valued and enjoyed his common sense, good humour, suspicion of educational theory, his love of tennis, films, good books, meals out and barbeques at home, conviviality. laughter and recreation in the truest sense. His brother, Sandie, wrote of David's "gift for making friends". That gift flourished at Wembley Downs.

Rugby was a vital part of his life. While a schoolboy at St Brendan's, Bristol, he played in the 1st XV, won colours for rugby, then played in the Bristol Rugby Club at senior level. At Hale School, he was a passionate rugby coach. He was master-in-charge of rugby in 2003 and coach of the 1st XV, 2001-2005. His 1st XV co-coach in 2003-2005, Steve McFarland, spoke of David Lindegaard's insistence on fair play, sportsmanship and good conduct in all his teams and his delight in seeing rugby played with style and panache. David enjoyed rugby played in a dashing, French style, and not in the sometimes dour English way. In making this distinction, Steve McFarland said that he thought that rugby played with flair appealed to the literary and poetic streak in David's nature.

The delight David experienced in seeing his son Ben share the same love of the game was palpable. After PSA rugby triumphs, Ben had two turbulent months at the Newcastle Knights, at the beginning of 2005, then returned to Perth where he is now a member of the Western Force Academy.

In 2002, David accepted the position of Assistant Head of Brine House, the School's Junior Boarding House, an

appointment requiring David, Louise, Ben and Emma to move into residence on campus. Despite his gift for pastoral care, the time in Brine House was unexpectedly not plain sailing. Nevertheless, the Lindegaards loved living on campus and for three years cared wonderfully for the junior boarders and were a dynamic part of the Hale School residential community.

The sudden decline in David's health in mid 2005 resulting in the diagnosis of cancer in September and his death nine weeks later on 29 November, 2005, devastated the School.

David's final weeks, though, were truly inspirational to his friends, colleagues and students. He faced the prospect of death with incredible bravery, comforting his grieving friends with unfailing humour and courtesy to the final day. Louise's response was similarly remarkable. She kept the house constantly open to friends who visited, welcoming everyone so generously. David's riddles and jokes with his Year 8 class all came back to him on a large "Get Well" card, which, amongst the many messages received at the time, gave him particular pleasure. This class of 12 and 13 year old boys followed the journey with Mr Lindegaard from Term 1, beginning as expected with a thorough introduction to senior school English with the best of teachers, to the then unimaginable conclusion. All David's students in 2005 traced a similar journey, never to be forgotten.



WESTSCHEME AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE

Thirty-one students gained a TER of 97.5 or more (TES 395 +). This was 17.91% of Hale's TEE population. By comparison 6.89% of the State population scored a TER of over 97.5. Fifty-two per cent of Hale's students eligible for a TER attained a score of 90 or above.

Twelve of the School's academic departments ranked among the Top 10 in the State, the ranking being based on the number of students achieving a final mark of 75% or more, in a particular subject. The twelve subjects were: Accounting, Ancient History, Applicable Mathematics, Art, Biology, Chemistry, Discrete Mathematics, Calculus, English Literature, French, Geography, Japanese and Physics.

In the Wholly School Assessed subjects, Hale School was ranked in the Top 10 in the State in three subjects, the ranking again based on the percentage of TEE students achieving a final mark of 75% or more in that subject. These were: Graphics Technology, Modelling with Mathematics, and Physical Education Studies.

Hale School is proud of the academic results achieved by the Year 12s of 2005 and is equally proud of the way in which the Year 12 students participated so fully in the life of the School, in Sport, in co-curricula activities, and in service to the Community.

The partnership between parents, students and the School was especially strong in 2005 and underpinned the boys' academic success.

OLD HALEIANS' ASSOCIATION

My second year as President has been another fulfilling one and one that has been extremely enjoyable. My term will end in 2006 and I can honestly say that I will miss it.

The current committee has made my job easy and, of course, the great work by Roger Gray as our tireless Secretary must not go unmentioned. I would also like to thank Alex Panarese for stepping in whilst Roger was overseas on long service leave during second term this year.

Old Boys' Day was once again very special. Over 140 Old Boys attended and enjoyed the presentation of years gone by on the big screen as each decade of Old Boys responded to the roll call. Some wonderful archival film has been unearthed and included was footage of Old Boys' Day 1932, held at the WACA ground where the Old Boys versus The School cricket match was played. Cricket is still a feature of Old Boys' Day today and this year the Old Boys XI defeated the Headmaster's Invitation XI by 18 runs. Luncheon in the marquee by the cricket, another long-standing tradition, continues and was enjoyed by those attending.

Our functions calendar was again a full one with the Old Haleians' Association being involved with the organisation and presentation of some 21 different functions in 2005. This year, we were the host school for the annual Beverley Combined PSA Dinner that was attended by a number of the Committee from Perth, as well as Old Boys from the districts around Beverley. Old Haleian Richard Goyder (1974-1977) was the Guest Speaker at this entertaining evening. Our Western Derby Breakfast, held during the week before the first local AFL Derby, featured as guests the Brownlow medallist, Chris Judd, and Dockers' champion, Matthew Pavlich, as well as many Hale football legends.

2005 also saw Old Haleians' dinners held in London, Sydney and Melbourne. These were all great Hale occasions and the Association is indebted to Peter Pearson (1956-1964), Stephen Van Mil (1974-1979) and Campbell Bairstow (1967-1971) who were the respective hosts at these functions.

The Lister Drake Scholarship (for academic merit and outstanding contribution to the life of the School, for a son or grandson of an Old Boy) was this year awarded to Ben Hogan, son of Chris Hogan (1973-1975) and grandson of John Hogan (1948-1952). The congratulations of the Association go to Ben.

One of our major achievements for this year has been the setting up and launching of our own website. This involved a considerable amount of work by our Communications Sub-committee convened by Warwick Hazeldine and including Lee Panotidis, John Garland and Eric Isaachsen. The website address is www.oldhale.com and we hope Old Boys get into the habit of going to the site on a regular basis so that they can keep up with OHA news and events.

small groups which allowed us to share ideas, work to our talents and learn heaps from one another. 
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








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STAFF FAREWELLS





The Buntine tennis team led by Andrew Chapman, enjoyed greater success and finished in a respectable sixth place. This was a pleasing result considering the team had only one senior PSA tennis player. The most outstanding player was Andrew Brannan, who remained undefeated throughout the season.

Buntine finished in tenth position in the Sholl Cup this year and in doing so, have set the volleyball, softball and baseball teams a challenge for 2006. The junior volleyball team (7^{th}) placed slightly better than the senior team (8^{th}). Both the senior baseball team and junior softball team finished the season in ninth place.

Buntine's senior and junior basketball players finished in ninth and fifth place respectively. This placed the House in eighth position overall. Shrey Sharma was the House's key junior player while Prasad Nair, Simon Bartulovic and Filip Sala were the mainstays of the senior team.

The overall result is promising, as it is an improvement on last year's equal sixth place.

The winter sport season rolled around and Buntine was looking to improve on its slow start to the Cock House Cup. However, it brought only mixed fortunes to the Red Army. Soccer finished a very respectable third after the seniors led by Tom Orme placed fifth and the junior side fourth in what was a consistent performance throughout the season for both teams. Football finished last after a disappointing season that initially looked promising. Despite outstanding performances from Buntine's 1st XVIII representative, Mark Bellini, the senior football team finished tenth. The junior team finished a modest ninth despite the tireless efforts of Max Sadka and Justin Blades. Walla rugby players fought out the season and finished ninth. The results could have been better had some close games gone their way through the round-robin fixtures. Hockey was the standout performer for the Red Army. The team finished first for a third consecutive year. With an excellent contingent of strong hockey players in the team including 1st XI Hockey representatives Dimitri Rtshiladze and Jeff Barton, the team managed Buntine's best result for the winter sport season.

After encountering some tough opposition in both summer and winter fixtures, Buntine looked forward to the House cross country and House athletics events as a way of boosting its position in the Cock House Cup. On cross country day all Buntine boys showed plenty of grit and determination which resulted in Buntine coming a respectable equal fifth with Tregonning. The Year 8s performed exceptionally in their first ever race with Justin Blades and Shrey Sharma placing fourth and sixth respectively. This year also saw the advent of the head to head cross country race that was conducted in the winter sport bye. Buntine was matched up against a strong Havelock House and went down narrowly. Year 12s Michael Rowlands and Tom Orme competed admirably placing first and second, respectively for the House.

Traditionally Buntine has been very competitive in the Interhouse athletics however this year the House was unable to emulate previous success and could only manage a disappointing ninth place. All boys gave their best, but in the end there was not the depth. Once again the spirited Year 8 group shone through, giving hope for the future.

2005 promised to be a successful year for Buntine in the House Arts Cup, with no shortage of musical talent amongst the boys in each year group. Ben Speijers, on the electric guitar, proved to the School that he is one of the best guitarists Hale has ever heard. His experience of playing live in front of a large audience helped and contributed enormously to the House Band. Without him, the House would never have been in the running for any of the musical prizes.

The Hale Interhouse athletics carnival is an event in which Riley has always put in a hundred and ten percent, and this year was no exception. The day was clear and perfect for a day of intense competition. The Year 8s tried their best and managed ninth place, above Haynes House. The Year 9s did well and secured a convincing sixth place. The Year 10s finished in eighth place while the Year 11s ended the day in ninth place. However, the Year 12s set the standard for the House and completed their last athletic carnival in fourth place. 

basketball team led by Scott Modra and 1st V player Adrian Dawson, finished sixth with the highlight being a one point win over Parry, after being down by ten at half time. The rowers worked hard and the seniors ended up in sixth place, while the juniors finished seventh. The tennis players also tried their best but could not lift St Georges out of tenth place. The cricket team, led by Glen Williams, finished seventh following a win over Havelock in the playoff for seventh and eighth.

As the days grew shorter and cooler the winter sports' campaign began. St Georges performed equally well at winter sport, and in particular, in football and squash. The squash team, with star players Nick Wells and Nigel Lloyd, trounced Wilson in the final, to finish first. The result was reversed in the junior football, with St Georges unable to score in the final and the team lost to Wilson. Senior football finished fourth. The hockey players also performed well to finish third. St Georges' recent dominance in soccer came to an end this year and the senior team managed seventh, despite good performances from 1st XI players Stephen Lewin, Jason Carter and Neville Cordy-Hedge. The juniors finished tied for seventh

Cross country is very much a sport about participation as well as skill and determination. The boys who participated did so wholeheartedly, but with some missing, their efforts were to some extent in vain. St Georges came seventh in the end, but the leaders of next year have stated they want a 100% participation rate. Harry Williams, Tom Harper, Tom Sullivan, James Lewin, Marc Eadie and Stephen Lewin were the top runners in their respective age groups.

The final sporting event of the year was athletics and once again the lack of numbers competing, counted against the House. In some age groups there were no reserves at all, and the House had boys competing in events they had scarcely heard of, let alone competed in before! Everyone did his best, but once again, St Georges finished in last place.

St Georges' final position in the Cock House Cup was seventh, a drop of three positions from 2004, so some hard work is needed next year to get the House back into the top half of the league table.

House Arts was an area of mixed results for St Georges this year. On House Arts Day the St G band led by Nick Wells and Glen Chew performing Under the Bridge, placed ninth. The House choir proved that volume, cohesiveness and enthusiasm are greater than an (apparent) lack of tune, and came a respectable fifth singing Bad Moon Rising by Creedence Clearwater Revival. 



One of the major sporting dates on the boarders' calendar each year, is the cross country, and this year did not disappoint.

On paper the team looked outstanding with many of the boys being members of the athletic squad from last year. The Year 8s made the perfect start with all boys putting in strong performances, but Tom Taylor stole the show, running a close second. The Year 9 race was the highlight of the day with Lincoln Meeking, Joe Backhouse and Taylor Smith blitzing the field to set up a thrilling finish, which saw Wilson run first, second and third. A lack of numbers, as a result of boys being on camp, saw the Year 10s drop off the pace but Edmund Forrester fought hard to keep his team alive to cross the finish line in first place. The Year 11s quickly made up for the loss in points with Will Clapin putting in a stellar performance, leading the race from start to finish, to repeat his win in Year 10. Strong improvements from Lachlan Pither and Selby Lee-Steere meant that the Yr 11 team finish second. In the last event of the day the Year 12s took control of the event with a number of boys finishing in the top 30. With the Cock House Cup in sight, all that remained was a strong finish in the Interhouse athletics. Following strong words of encouragement from the leadership team, the boys took up the challenge and aimed to win one more trophy for the cabinet. Many boys ran a personal best and the field results were among the best in years. Wilson led the day from the very first race, but as the carnival continued the lead was gradually being attacked by the boys in Faulkner House. With both Houses poised to win the day, the final result was decided by the last event of the day the Year 12, 8 x 50m relay. The Faulkner team was the best in the School, and Wilson needed to run no less than fourth place to gain sufficient points to win. The race seemed to last forever and with the thunderous applause of some 200 boarders. Faulkner won the event and Wilson placed third. Faulkner had sufficient points to win the carnival, and the Cock House Cup.

Off the field Wilson House had a successful year supporting a number of charities including the Cancer Council's *Relay for Life, World Vision's 40 Hour Famine* and the *PMH Allendale Abseil*. The first of these most worthy events

took place in Term 1 and involved 32 boys (in two teams) running a staggering 760 km in 24 hours, and in the process raising \$5,500 for cancer research. In Term 3, approximately 40 boys battled temptation in the 40 Hour Famine. The weekend included a series of games, competitions and an all night movie marathon. The event was a great success in raising awareness of poverty and famine, and raised \$2000 for World Vision. Special thanks go to Liam Marsh and Corev Stevenson, who organised much of the weekend. The final charity event for the year was the PMH Allendale Abseil where approximately \$4000 was raised to 'throw four boys off a building'. The event was a major fund raiser for the Princess Margaret Hospital and raised a massive \$200 000 for the charity. These events are organised each year to assist boys to contribute to their community and to raise awareness of the difficulties and life struggles faced by so many. Sincere thanks are given to Mr Grimes and Ms Fordham, for their organisation and encouragement of these events, without which, the boys could not have participated.

In more cultural pursuits, the House choir led by expert musician Henry Clarke sang *l Can Hear Music* and was unlucky not to grab a spot in the top three. The House band did however, taste success with Tristan Bettridge on drums, Mark van der Maas on bass, Taylor Smith on bongos, Henry Clarke on guitar and vocalist, Reid Smith singing <u>Queen's</u> hit song *A Crazy Little Thing Called Love*. All boys are congratulated on a tremendous effort, but a special mention goes to Henry Clarke who worked tirelessly with both the choir and the band.

Boarding life in 2005 has been a big step for all of the boys in Wilson House as they have moved from the old to the new. The new and improved lifestyle of this modernised facility has brought the boarding community together with all boys now located under the one roof. 



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OUTDOOR EDUCATION

The Outdoor Education report so often focuses on the pinnacle programme at Exmouth as a measure of its success. The unsolicited phone calls and emails of thanks from parents for the experience their sons' had, are very flattering. In our discipline, it is often the only avenue for feedback from parents to the Outdoor Education Department and its staff.

The Year 10 Exmouth Programme however could not enjoy the success that it does without the gradual build up of challenges that the Hale School students experience in their earlier camps. I am currently involved in the shared process of aligning the Outdoor Education subject currently being run in many schools, with the new Course of Study, Recreation and Environmental Studies. Interestingly in this process, it has become clear that Hale's Year 9 students can cover more than a semester's worth of classroom periods in their one intensive field experience, and I would suggest on most occasions, in a more appropriate, enjoyable and real context.

With that thought in mind, this year I share with you the experience of one of these Year 9 camps from an instructor's viewpoint.

"Albany sailing camps are always looked forward to for the unpredictable weather as much as for the beautiful scenery of the harbour surrounds. The downside is the seven-hour drive down there in the coaster bus complete with trailer, but like our other Term I camps, we need to service a complex transport schedule that also supplies vehicles to Junior School. The light at the end of the tunnel is that we return home on the 5-star coach that delivered the Year 6 group to Torbay.

The boys handled the laborious drive to Albany well and were of no distraction, a very good start for me as the bus driver, since the camp lessons would not even begin until we arrived at the campsite in the early afternoon. Once again, there was a modicum of recall from Year 8 camp in 2004, so the boys' starting performance was more brisk than in previous years. Having finished the pack down of gear into barrels, there was still enough time before dark to set tents, unload and rig the sailboats, and go through the cooking lesson. Apart from a bit of first-nightcampout excitement, which took some time to extinguish, they settled in for a pleasant and uneventful night.

One could not have ordered a better day for introductory sailing than the one we had on Saturday. The tides were good in the bay, and there was a gentle Sou'easterly



breeze across Princess Royal Harbour. By 11 o'clock, the boys had completed their one-on-one instruction and were sailing with partners on the bay. The wind gently stiffened into lunchtime allowing the group to really consolidate its skills by following the powerboat back and forth on a random course. Although the harbour water was warm and it was a beautiful sunny day, the boys were feeling the effect of being wet and in a constant breeze. Lunch was appropriately hot and satisfying, placing the crews in good stead to continue their sailing into the afternoon. By three o'clock, the breeze had built to a solid 20 knots from the Sou'sou'west. The fleet took this in its stride and the boys were quite remarkable in their handling of the conditions considering only one of them had any previous sailing experience of significance.

Saturday night was the first night watch for this group. The boys had slowed considerably in their performance to the extent that they needed firstly considerable coaxing, then castigation to get them through their cooking and cleaning tasks. They completed their night watch duty as required, finishing just before the rain came at 0630 hours.

We had watched the distant clouds with interest on Saturday afternoon and, coupled with my ever trusty barometer watch, predicted some foul weather on Sunday, despite more favourable forecasts. Indeed Sunday was a less appealing day. It remained overcast though still warmish, and the wind had swung entirely to the West making for a new set of skills required by the boys, and the likelihood of a very difficult beat to windward to get home. The day was most enjoyable nevertheless, allowing time for some exciting sailing racing in the shelter of Camp Quaranup before lunch. The boys were in such good spirits that afterwards they took themselves for a swim on the other side of the point before commencing the journey home.

As expected, the sail back to Panorama Caravan Park was difficult. First the wind blustered fully on our noses as we negotiated our laid course, back and forth across the bay. By 4 o'clock the gusts had diminished to a miserable breeze and by 5 o'clock it was indiscernible as the last boats limped in to the jetty. Cold to the core now, the boys hurriedly de-rigged and lifted out all water craft to avoid another night watch, before scampering off for hot showers. Sunday night was a much improved performance in the cooking and cleaning, and we finished off with a huge digital slide and movie show of all the shots that had been taken.

Monday's cleanup was expectedly slow and difficult to motivate, but the threat of missing their first take-away lunch in four days was enough to get the lads to lift their run-rate and we were finally packed and ready to leave by just after 11 am. Overall these were a very good bunch of boys, and a great weekend."



STUDENT SERVICE LEARNING 2005

2005 has been a very busy year for our Student Service Learning Programme. Approximately 32 Year 8 and 135 Year 9 students have visited a range of Agencies throughout the year. The Year 8 programme involves 16 students per semester visiting the Kim Beazley School where they interact with the special needs students. This has been a wonderful experience for our boys and for many, was the highlight of their year.

Our Year 9 students have helped out at seven Agencies. These include 3 Primary Schools with Special Education Units, Chrysalis Montessori School, where our students assisted with a reading programme and Doubleview Primary School's Indigenous Programme. They were also involved in a variety of activities at St Vincent de Paul and James Brown Anglican Hostel. The students involved were wonderful and the Agencies very appreciative of the boys efforts.

The Senior Boarders have assisted the Red Cross by participating in the Soup Patrol twice a month. This experience has been an eye opener for many of our students who were unaware that so many people lived on the streets of Perth.

From December 7-11, 21 Year 12 students returned to Hale School to care for children with special needs at the annual *Hale Sony Foundation Holiday Camp for Kids*.

In 2006 our Student Service Learning programme will include an excursion to Vietnam. While in Vietnam 12 Year 12 students will work with the children at the Christina Noble Children's Foundation in Saigon, visit the Anglican Board of Missions Medical Centre and help out at the Hoi An Orphanage. This programme will add a new dimension to the voluntary work carried out by our students.

The Student Service Learning programme would not be possible without the fantastic support of so many staff who also give so generously of their time to help others in need.

REFLECTIONS FROM TWO YEAR 8 STUDENTS

It all started the day that Mrs Maskiell came to speak to the Year 8s in the auditorium. She presented us with the opportunity to take part in the Service Learning programme. She explained what it meant was and told us about the project we would be undertaking. For us it involved visiting the Kim Beazley School for physically and mentally disabled children. As she asked for volunteers I said to myself, no matter what, I was going to volunteer. I was so happy to be chosen to participate. When the day came for our first visit, I was nervous, as I did not know what it was going to be like and felt that it was going to be a life-changing experience.

On our arrival I was directed to go into the sensory room with Declan. There we met one of the little girls - her name was Caitlin. She could not speak but as we got to know her, we somehow began to communicate with each other. Many people say the 'mentally challenged' people can't teach you anything but she taught me that life is too short to waste and how lucky we are to be able to do the every day things that we take for granted. Just being able to run or jump, for example. We are very fortunate to be able to do these things, but are so caught up in other things that we that we don't think about them.

Another person who taught me something was a boy named Jordan. He is blind and deaf and has no way of communicating with the outside world. While I was there, I tried to put myself in his shoes. He must be so scared living in his own world, not knowing who is near you or where you are going. He likes to lift up your fingernail.

Meeting these children made me think about my life and about how they have made a difference to me. They are just like everyone else once you get to know them. They all have their own personality. This has been a life-changing experience for me and I am looking forward to being a part of the Service Learning programme next year. **Arjun Kaushik**

Going to the Kim Beazley School has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life. I remember the first time we went. I was very, very nervous, but I don't quite recall why. On that first visit I went swimming with the older kids. Initially I was really unsure of what to do or how to behave. I soon learned that the kids were not a lot different from me and had a really enjoyable time. However, the most fun I had was when I played with the younger kids on our second afternoon visit. They seemed happy to see us every time we walked into the room. On this occasion we went into the sensory room - it was one of the most fantastic rooms I have ever seen. We could play with the kids in a pit filled with balls, sit on the vibrating bed, or look at the bubbles in the tube and do many other magical things. I thoroughly enjoyed playing with the children in this space. Applied Technology

Community Projects

In Term 4, Mr McGlashan and a group of Year 11 Applied Technology students responded to the Stop the Toad trapping initiative and made cane toad traps as their Community Spirit project. Cane toads are expanding their range across Northern Australia faster than ever expected and are moving up to 20km in just a few weeks. 2006 will be a crucial year in the effort to stop the cane toads spreading throughout the Kimberley region. Students produced 30 traps by early November that were then sent to Kununurra where a team of volunteers deployed the traps along the front line of defence near the WA/NT border. Each trap is tagged with a number, enabling boys to track the number of toads caught via the Stop the Toad web site. It was also very rewarding for the boys, especially knowing that their traps are the first to be made and deployed in WA under this initiative.

The boys in Mr O'Garr's Year 11 Applied Technology class worked with the Year 2s from the Hale Junior School, developing a design idea in order to make a Desk Tidy. The final project had to hold four items and have some kind of movement to add interest and challenge the senior boys. The Year 11s guided the Year 2s through the design process using the Year 2s' ideas. The Year 11s then made the parts of the desk tidy, and with the assistance of their Year 2 partner, the desk tidies were assembled, sanded down and finally painted.

Graphics Technology

Graphics Technology proved to be a popular choice amongst students and this year projects were undertaken using the Macromedia suite of programs. Impressive flash animations and web designs were completed by senior students, particularly Hong-Rui Lee, Barath Lyer and Oska Williams-Pagh.

In Semester 1, Year 10 students were challenged to design and develop a short promotional movie for the next sci-fi 'blockbuster'. The results were amazing, with final movies including a vast array of spaceships, virtual planets, and star systems with weird and wonderful environments, all of which were interwoven with exciting spaceship chase scenes and tumultuous musical scores. All students demonstrated excellent good computer graphics skills and produce interesting and diverse movies, though Jackson Harvey, Callum Twigger, Andy Abadi-Ghadim and Hong-Rui Lee deserve special mention for their outstanding contribution.

A highly competent Year 12 group undertook for the first time a rotoscoping project. Rotoscoping, is the process of manually tracing shapes through a captured image sequence, and has become a central and critical part of creating computer-generated imagery (CGI). Nearly every modern film with special effects involves copious rotoscoping, often consuming up to twenty percent of the human time required for a CGI project.

An impressive array of movies included the ZZ Top drummer 'drumming' with light sabres by Nick Pitt, an 'extreme boarding' movie by Sebastian Moone and Leigh Maisey, and my favorite, a group project that showed Andrew Feakes rotoscoped into a series of computer game clips.

Systems Technology

This year saw the introduction of a computer numerical controlled machine (CNC) in the systems technology area. The Roland MDX-20 is a state-of-the-art machine that will be used by lower school students as an introduction into CADCAM. However, it is anticipated that students undertaking the new (2006) Engineering course, will also utilise the machine for more complex design and make activities. Students initially undertake computer aided design (CAD) work using Corel, Rhino or ProDesktop, and send the file to the machine for making. This ease of use, allows DT staff to introduce the concept of CNC machining to lower school students, and also allow Engineering and Graphics Technology students to use the machine for product development.

Well done to all DT boys for their efforts in 2005 and for designing, developing and producing some outstanding projects.

LORD OF THE FLIES

(from the Programme Notes)

I have steered clear of directing *Lord of the Flies* for some time even though it is a set text in English, because I find it a rather bleak story and I don't do 'bleak' very well. However, the awful events of the last few years have made me wonder if William Golding isn't right after all and that the descent into tribalism and brutality is a natural occurrence when there are no longer any moral safeguards such as those provided by church, family and community. When the 'rules' are debased and the unfettered satisfaction of natural instincts allowed, the result is a very cunning and dangerous 'animal', human beings beyond constraint.

In Lord of the Flies, Ralph and Piggy try desperately to maintain some semblance of community and order in the face of growing disintegration of the group for whom they feel responsible. They create rules, hold democratic meetings and try to impose those rules intended to benefit them all. The conch shell becomes the symbol of that order and authority and, once it has been shattered, so is the civility of their battered little community. What is even more frightening about this story is the manner in which the wild freedom of the jungle and the hunt are so seductive. Ralph's attempt at democratic management cannot withstand the lure of the charismatic leader, Jack, and the opportunities for hedonism he offers.

Another concept in the book is the power of irrational fear. The beast, that unknowable danger that manifests itself in different forms in each boy's imagination, distorts their ability to be rational. Fear leads them to a point where they can kill one of their own, Simon, and still be able to ignore their responsibility in that terrible act. In very recent history we have seen how in Darfur, Africa, one group can so despise another that the most appalling atrocities can be considered acceptable by the perpetrators. The same dangerous antagonism exists between Palestinian and Jew, Chechen and Russian and in some sectors of our own communities between Christian and Muslim. Hate is such a simple emotion to hold, love and forgiveness so much more demanding.

The boys and I, in creating the script from the book, have included some comic relief in the form of Sam and Eric, the two 'wise guy' brothers, who do not exist in the original text. We did it on purpose as a counter point to the savagery. We felt that in doing so we could celebrate important aspects of human nature that Golding ignores, the ability to smile in the face of diversity, to go on when there seems to be little hope and to find joy in the service of others. Maybe we should do *The Man of La Mancha* next?

I can't say I hope you enjoy the play because I can't see how you can, but I do hope it raises questions, promotes discussion and encourages action, however small, which improves your small corner of the world and possibly mine as well.



ENGLISH

If anything the last twelve months has shown it is that the nature of teaching is becoming increasingly complex at an unprecedented rate. Whilst we might question the implementation of some or all of these changes, it is clear that the heart of the matter is about providing the best possible education to our children. This has been the philosophy of the English Department as we prepared for the implementation of the new course of study in 2006. However, our time and energy has not simply been taken up with outcomes and there have been a myriad of other activities that made 2005.

The year started out as busy as you could expect it with the first few weeks of Term 1 taken up with a full round of excursions and theatre visits, taking advantage of the Festival of Perth. The initiative this year was to ensure that all year groups had an opportunity to see at least one live performance during the year. There were many highlights during this festival, the most obvious one would have been the performance of *Amajuba* – *Like Doves* We Rise at the Octagon Theatre, a subliminal tale of hardship, despair and hope based around stories of growing up in townships in South Africa.

In total over 400 students took up the opportunity to see at least one performance, a great turn out but also a great logistical feat, with bookings, buses, supervision and management. It made for an exhausting first term for everyone in the English Department.

This year the English Department also sponsored an in-school exhibition of artefacts from the set Year 8 novel *The Lost Diamonds of Killiecrankie* by Gary Crew and Peter Gouldthorpe. The students' main project for Term 1 centered on their own creative project in the style of this novel and the exhibition and associated seminars gave them a hands-on experience of novel writing. However, the real highlight for the Year 8 students was in reading their stories to a number of Year 7 students during the year. There were some outstanding projects, reflecting a great deal of hard work by the students.

Other forms of creative writing were also a key part of the English courses this year and some examples of the fine work of a number of students appear elsewhere in the magazine. Particular thanks go to Carina Sas, who managed the creative writing competition this year. In addition, we had a select number of students involved in creative writing workshops at the Fremantle Childrens' Literature Centre. Facilitators at these workshops were well-known Australian authors who freely gave of their time and energy to help produce the next generation of writers. Some of the work produced as a result of these workshops was outstanding.

On the curriculum front Hale was involved in MSE testing for the first time this year. Our Year 9 students achieved top results with over 98% achieving in the top 50% for the State across all tested outcomes, with 60% of them achieving in the top 25% of the State.

As part of the preparation for the new Courses of Study for Year 11 in 2006 staff in the Department took part in the Curriculum Council's professional development days over the year, as well as participating in a number of seminars with the Association of Independent Schools of WA. A steering committee was also set up that audited the draft documents. All in all a lot of work has gone into ensuring that the new courses not only meet the Curriculum Council's guidelines but maintain the very high standards already evident in the current courses. English in 2006 is looking strong.

On a sad note, the death of Dave Lindegaard in Term 4 left a vacuum in the English Department. He was a key member of the Department and much loved by us all. Despite the fact that his jokes were, at times, funnier to himself than anyone else, we miss the lively humour and good naturedness that brought so much brightness into the office. We will not forget him.

LIBRARY

When 2005 was reputedly the strongest year ever for Internet growth with more than 17 million sites being added to the web (Source: Netcraft); with Hale School's Year 8 and 9 students utilizing wireless networks to use their own notebook computers throughout the school; and when 95.5% of Year 8 students responding to the Year 8 2005 Technology Survey have Internet access from home, 63.1% with broadband access (Source: Hale School survey) - it is perhaps understandable that some query whether access to email and to the World Wide Web meet all of a student's recreational needs? Whether search engines like Google and vast user-edited encyclopaedias like Wikipedia provide easy, instant access to all the information a student requires? And whether the School library is just another internet café with a few books thrown in?

A few visits to the Hale Senior School Library, at different times throughout the day – and the answer to all is decidedly "NO".

First and foremost the Library is a vital place in the School - a learning place and a social place. There are up to 20 boys waiting at 8am for it to open and a similar number still quietly working at 5.30pm when it closes. Lunchtime demand is overwhelming individuals browsing, reading, seeking help from Teacher Librarians (TLs); pairs of students sharing ideas or helping one another; groups debating issues, browsing magazines; playing chess.... The Library supports an amazing range of learning activities.

The Library as a provider of resources is in high demand. It is a true delight to see boys borrow shopping bags full of the most popular novels for the holidays. Demand for resources continues, but media are changing. Fiction is popular in print but also in audio formats; audio-cassettes have been replaced by CDs and MP-3s; the vertical file of pamphlet material has gone; image collections are now online; CD-Roms have been replaced by websites and subscriptions to online databases; these subscriptions to online databases now extend beyond general encyclopaedias to a much wider range of subject specific resources; video in VHS format has been replaced by DVDs, libraries of digital videos on the network and online downloads or streaming from web-based subscription libraries; suggested reading lists include print, web sites and other media; the library catalogue provides access to books, sound and digital video recordings, even selected websites; and loans reflect an increase in fiction and non-fiction narrative reading. The Hale Intranet, maintained by TLs, guides students though this maze and Hale Links offers a comprehensive directory of recommended webs links, organised by subject.

Remote access to resources is also facilitated through the Hale Intranet, encouraging new ways of working from home, collaboration and information sharing. The catalogue of library and departmental resources is now web-based; subject specific databases in many subject areas have been added to previously provided online encyclopaedias and magazine and newspaper databases. All are accessible from home.

Perhaps the major role of the Library is in supporting students in effectively using this ever increasing wealth of resources. Information literacy outcomes are central to all learning areas and TLs work collaboratively with other teachers in each subject area. TLs support students in classes and as individuals. The Library Help Desk is always manned and students may also seek TL support by email.

Hale School Library is a very busy place. In 2006, it has been wonderful to see the increase in parents and staff enjoying the extensive adult fiction collection. Functions promoting new fiction have been held for parents, staff and senior boys. Anthony Eaton was Hale's 2005 Author in Residence and a real highlight of the year was the opportunity for family groups to breakfast with author Mathew Reilly. Three groups of students have participated in Fremantle Children's Literature Centre's Youth Literature Days with the opportunity to work with prominent Australian authors including Marcus Zusak, Boori Pryor and Gary Crew.

Most exciting this year has been the initial planning for a new Hale School Library one specifically designed to support learning into the future. Teachers have identified the need for flexibility of space - for the ability of students to move at point of need from individual to group modes of learning or between different learning styles. Students demanded similar flexibility, requiring control of their own lighting and the ability to reconfigure furniture to need with both age and subject defined spaces being available to them. We all look forward to much more discussion as planning proceeds.

AUTHOR-IN-RESIDENCE -ANTHONY EATON



Our author-in-residence this year was Anthony Eaton. Anthony was born in New Guinea in 1972. After his family returned to Perth to live, he finished high school then studied English, Politics and History at University. He was always keen on writing and reading and after completing his Arts degree became an English teacher at Trinity College in Western Australia.

He started his writing career in 1997, after meeting Gary Crew, an accomplished children's and young adult fiction writer, at a writer's workshop organised by the Fremantle Children's Literature Centre. The result of this meeting was a young adult manuscript, *Karijini*, which, according to Anthony Eaton, was quite justifiably never published. His next attempt, *The Darkness* fared a little better, was picked up by University of Queensland Press and turned into a real book. It was published in 2000 and won the West Australian Premier's award for young adult fiction, as well as being short-listed in the Best Adult Fantasy section of the Aureolis awards for that year. His second novel, A New Kind Of Dreaming, was published in 2001, and was a CBCA notable book for 2002. It was also short-listed for a number of notable awards in the same year. At the end of 2002, Anthony resigned from teaching and took up writing as a full time proposition. In 2003 Fireshadow was published. It was recently announced as an Honour Book in the Older Reader's category of the 2005 CBCA Book of the Year. Hale students from Years 8, 9 and 10 studied each of these novels respectively before Anthony arrived and were brim full of questions to ask him during his residency.

Anthony Eaton spent a very entertaining week at Hale school conducting lectures, workshops, question and answer sessions, individual class lessons and was available to discuss his novels with individual students during lunchtimes. He has a very happy, easy going style and engrossed the boys with his tales of how a simple idea can be developed into a complex story. He spoke of how a teenager running away from home was the impetus for *Fireshadow* and how taking a bushwalk near Dwellingup and discovering the remains of a World War Two prisoner of war camp, provided him with the setting for the story. The Hale boys were intrigued by the way Anthony used Western Australian settings for his novels. A New Kind of Dreaming is set in the north of Western Australia, Fireshadow is set in the South-west, and The Darkness along the south coast. His beautiful descriptive imagery with its sensory appeal powerfully evokes these bush, desert and coastal settings.

Each of these novels has a strong narrative and interesting characters and this was the focus of much of the discussion and questions directed to Anthony during the open forum sessions. What impressed his young audience was his openness about his writing experience and how his personal life had a strong influence on the way he viewed and shaped his characters.

Anthony explained to the boys the impact of a book cover, using his own covers as examples. During one of the young writers' sessions, he used a few of his own paintings as stimulus material to encourage the boys to see what intrigues, or provides clues to readers in book covers. He very amusingly deconstructed two different covers for his novel Nathan Nuttboard: Hits the beach. His audience laughed uproariously listening to Anthony's sarcastic and witty 'deconstruction' of his own text.

Whilst talking to the boys, Anthony discussed how he collected material and ideas. He very generously allowed the boys to read through his workbooks, a wonderful collection of sketches, photographs, postcards, snatches of conversation and moulding of ideas. It was fascinating for the boys to see how an idea is worked upon and then rejected in favour of what often was a completely different idea. Anthony urged the boys to see writing as a process, and handed out copies of letters between himself and his editor, showing how corrections and suggestions for changes in character and storyline were a part of the general discourse before the final product emerged. He shared the disappointment of rejection and how he saw it as part of the process of developing as an author.

Currently completing his PhD in Creative Writing at the University of Western Australia, Anthony is also working on the first book of a science-fiction trilogy. He enticed the boys with a few of the ideas he was thinking of including in the trilogy and made them marvel at the range and diversity of his interests and writing skill. The week proved a huge success and encouraged many boys to read all of Anthony Eaton's work, and possibly may have even planted the idea of future authorship in a few young heads. Let's hope so!

UNYA - Youth Dialogue

August 30, South Perth Civic Centre The purpose of the UNYA forum was to listen to the ideas of WA students regarding global, local and personal issues. Over 300 students from various WA schools participated in this forum, including 13 from Hale School. It was coordinated by Ben Whitehouse, the 2005 Australian Youth Representative to the United Nations. After the conference, Ben would take our ideas to the United Nations General Assembly in New York.

When we arrived at the South Perth Civic Centre we were divided into tables of 10 students, with a trained young facilitator. Our task was to design a message to pass on the United Nations, address local youth issues and major global problems. The day also included informative videos and speakers, entertainment and physical activities.

Throughout the conference students discussed the major global issues included in the United Nations Millennium Development Goals. These millennium goals include:

Chris Mofflin, Conrad Pogson, Chris Mofflin and David Gladwin, were undefeated in their Senior division; and all three teams were awarded a medal for their success.

A developing tradition of rivalry with Saint Mary's in the Yak It Up! public speaking and debating competition was cultivated by strong contest at both senior and junior levels this year. Senior prize winner was Jilen Patel, with the Junior prize being taken out unanimously by Felix Ellis. Felix's speech held everyone mesmerized with his articulate speech and brilliant argument. State Trials



WA Student Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting 2005

The WA Student CHOGM commenced on August 22 and Peter Cash and I were nervous, as we did not have a very clear idea of what was to occur. Although we had reviewed the documents given to us prior to the event, we were still a little apprehensive. However, the Student CHOGM committee soon enlightened us during the 'breaking the ice' session.

The WA Student CHOGM is a meeting modelled on the Commonwealth heads of Government Meeting that is held every two years. Students are asked to assume the role of leaders of a Commonwealth country of their choice and then to debate relevant issues, while keeping in mind the ideas and policies of their chosen country.

We discussed issues ranging from child health to poverty reduction and debt relief. It was difficult to continually be aware of one's country and the suggestions being made, while trying to evaluate how to respond.

Participation in this event was intended to give us the opportunity to consider

the world from a different angle, and encouraged young people to discuss issues that our generation will have to face. It also encouraged us think 'outside the box' when solving smaller problems.

We would recommend attendance at the WA Student CHOGM to all interested students as we found that it helped to broaden our ideas on world issues, and made us more aware of the difficulty of decision making in the world of politics.

A search for justice brought many Year 10, 11 and 12 students to represent Hale School in the 2005 Francis Burt Law Education Centre Interschool Mock Trial Competition. A mock trial is a simulated court case in which teams contest a fictitious legal matter based on the Western Australian Court system. The cases are debated between teams and maintain their authenticity through active participation of the legal profession.

Registration deadlines closed very early in the year in February which meant that any boy who wanted to participate in Mock Trial this year had to express his interest quickly. Hale entered three teams in the competition with all teams consisting of 12 students from years 10, 11 and 12. This might sound like quite a lot of people but, unfortunately, many students who put their name down to do Mock Trial did not turned up to trainings sessions or meetings. Later in the year quite a few boys realised that they wanted to be part of the 'non-stop fun' that is The Hale Mock Trial Society, but if you had not given your details in Week 3 of Term 1,then you were not able to join later in the season. As has been the case in the previous few years, training for mock trial was held after school on a Friday finishing at about 4:30pm.

Members of staff who kindly gave their time were Ms Sas and Ms Watson who organised the teams, while our coaches were Ben Spagnolo, a Hale graduate who is studying law, and another Old Haleian Mr Wally Goodlet, a retired barrister who shares his wealth of experience with "Mock Trial-ers". (They even taught us what to do if we were ever to get arrested – I'm sure it's a skill we'll never need to use.)

At the first meeting we received our Competition Manual and Materials for Round 1. The first case was between two neighbours, one of whom bred Siberian huskies and the other who often held large, noisy parties. The plaintiff, who in this case was Methodist Ladies College, held the defendant responsible for the miscarriage of one of the pups of her main Siberian bitch while the defence, taken by Hale, set out to prove that there was no intention of causing harm to people or animals, and they just wanted to celebrate New Year's Eve, as it only happens once a year. MLC have quite a formidable reputation and unfortunately, and unfairly according to our Coach, all three Hale teams lost by narrow margins in Round 1. As is the case in football, when a team isn't performing that well, the coach gets sacked. We didn't 'sack' Mr Goodlet, we just began looking for someone new, as Ben Spagnolo was now working for the State Sollicitor's Office and Mr Goodlet also had trouble attending the meetings. We now had Friday morning meetings instead of Friday afternoon with Paul Bevilacqua, another law professional. Round 2 was against Wesley College, a familiar opponent in sport from the PSA.

Hale, the prosecution this time, had to prove that a father had assaulted his child, while the defence was to prove that the bodily contact was 'lawful correction that

was reasonable and had such force that was reasonable under the circumstances.' All three Hale teams won this round, prompting a much happier mood among the Mock Trial students. Our third and final round was against Ocean Reef Senior High School about a 'pub brawl'. Hale and the defendant were to prove that the plaintiff lifted up his own beer glass in a threatening manner which was the reason why the defendant hit the individual across the shoulders with a pool cue. We were saying that is was selfdefence and the plaintiff was conversely saying that it was an unprovoked attack. Team 1 snatched victory by one point, while Team 2 unfortunately lost, with Team 3 recording a big win thanks to barrister extraordinaire, Guy Doggett who ripped apart the opposition's witnesses. Although none of the Hale teams qualified for the finals, all had great fun learning about the judicial system of Western Australia as well as competing against other schools in the formal setting of the Central Law Courts on St Georges Terrace. In the last few years, about 20% of Hale's graduating TEE population has gone to study law, exemplifying the need and value of becoming acquainted with the law system. HISTORY

HISTORY CELEBRATION

The biennial celebration of History at Hale was held on site in the School Quad on Wednesday September 21. The colour and focus the displays brought to the School were terrific and much is owed to Bill Edgar, the school Archivist/Curator, who was instrumental in organising the event.

Phil Sullivan made the trek from Baker's Hill with his mobile display portraying the Great War 10th Light Horse Regiment. His very impressive array of photos, coins, medals, and other artefacts were on display and visited by all the Year 10 History classes, as well as many other staff and students. The strong representation of memorabilia from the 10th Light Horse of Gallipoli fame was a key feature attracting great interest. The Hale connection with the Light Horse is very strong. Lieutenant Leslie Craig (after whom Craig Oval is named), an Old Haleian and later Chairman of the Board of Governors, was wounded in action at Gallipoli as a member of this unit. 1907. Rhodes Scholar, Haleian Phipps Turnbull lafter whom Turnbull House in the Junior School is named] was also a member of the 10th Light Horse. He lost his life at The Nek on August 7th 1915, in circumstances so poignantly portrayed in Peter Weir's film, "Gallipoli". Many boys were drawn to a photo of a Major Markwell from World War I who was uncannily like our current Sportsmaster, Mr Barron. Boys also noted the perennial Australian obsession with sport portrayed in several photos of World War I where men played their games of football and cricket amid the clamour of war.

All the Year 9 and 10 boys turned out to watch a fiery display from the Perth Muzzle Loading Club led by the consummate





showman, Dr Leo Laden. Entreaties to stand back from the musketeers were ignored until the first deafening volley. The Napoleonic muskets and rifles, together with swords and sabres, held the boys captivated. They cheered the musketeers racing each other for quickest load and fire, while one boy incredibly volunteered to be on the receiving end of bayonet practice. Another boy volunteered for a similarly hopeless exhibition, where Dr

Laden told his men to 'take the little one'. The smoke and noise generated by just two muskets gave the boys some idea of what a battlefield of the 19th century must have been like in this case. Men with no front teeth were never going to be musketeers, as they needed their teeth to tear open the cartridges. Other staff members were drawn to the display including Mr Meade. Having an unexpected musket volley explode outside his open door during a phone call must have left the caller wondering about the nature of learning at Hale School!

Thanks go to Phil Sullivan for his Light Horse show and to Dr Laden and the Perth Muzzle Loading Club for their generous support and providing a memorable day. **Mr M Cook, Head of History**

In the Year 10 category, **Tim Montgomery**



FRENCH EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

MATHEMATICS

The year started well for the Mathematics Department with the acknowledgement of the excellent achievements of Robert Henderson and Robert Marshall, who both secured a Subject Distinction in Discrete Mathematics. This means they both achieved a score in the top 0.5% of the State. The two Roberts were very talented students of Mathematics and are congratulated on their fine results.

Monitoring Standards in Education

This year, Hale School participated in the MSE testing for the Year 9 cohort. The results in the Mathematics Section showed that 51 students achieved a Level 6 outcome, 71 Level 5 and 36 Level 4. It was quite clear that our Year 9 students are doing extremely well when compared with students in WA, as most of our students achieved Level 5 or higher.

As can be seen from the list below, many students were involved in a number of mathematical endeavours beyond the classroom. It is great to see so many actively involved and also to recognise that this is made possible by their Mathematics teachers.

Have - Sum - Fun Competitions

A number of students took part in these fun problem solving competitions which took place at St Hilda's. These nights are both fiercely competitive and fun and the students usually have a great time and have the opportunity to meet with and network with students from the other schools. Chemistry

Every year the Chemistry Department aims to provide a variety of extra curricula opportunities that encourage students to enhance their awareness, appreciation, and abilities in Chemistry. Chemistry is promoted throughout the year in a number of ways that involve student participation in Schoolbased challenges or State and National competitions. Engaging in these activities primarily serves to extend all students, while rewarding and recognising excellence of achievement. In addition, the associated statistical analyses of relative performance provide the teachers with a valuable external reference of relevant standards and the effectiveness of our curriculum.

RACI National Chemistry Quiz

The Royal Australian Chemical Institute coordinates this International competition among students from around Australia and in neighbouring countries to promote the relevance of chemistry in a variety of every day contexts. Hale School primarily enters the Year 10 Chemistry students and interested senior students are also invited to participate. In 2005 there were approximately 120,000 entries and the 168 Hale students performed significantly better than the State average in every age group. In all, 121 awards were achieved, including 6 Certificates of Excellence, 35 High Distinctions, 49 Distinctions and 37 Credits.

Rio Tinto Australian Science Olympiads

The Rio Tinto Australian Science Olympiads (RTASO) provides students with opportunities to enhance their knowledge, understanding and skill in Biology, Physics and Chemistry. The National Qualifying Examinations are the first stage in a series of special programmes that lead to the selection of the best three scholars to represent Australia at the International Science Olympiad for each of the sciences. The Qualifying examinations are amongst the most demanding science challenges that not only test raw knowledge but especially problem-solving and analytical skills. From the National Qualifying examinations, around twenty candidates are invited to become scholars in an accelerated training program that ultimately identifies the national representatives.

The performance of the 15 Hale Chemistry students was very encouraging with 4 High Distinctions (top 10%) and 11 Distinctions (top 20%) being awarded.

The best students from each State in each of the science disciplines are awarded a prestigious medallion. Hale has an outstanding record of achievement for this stage of the programme, having been awarded 13 State medallions in the last three years. This year, Christopher Mofflin was awarded the bronze medallion for Physics, while Conrad Pogson received both the silver and bronze awards and Michael Li was the recipient of gold and silver medallions for Physics and Chemistry respectively. All three boys have been invited to participate in the training programme in Canberra this summer.

The Hale Chemistry Licence mastery programme

The main aim of this programme is to encourage Year 10 students to master the fundamental skills and techniques which are essential for success in senior Chemistry courses. It is designed to promote the rigour of Chemistry by setting high standards and progressive goals, and to recognize student achievement with a meaningful accreditation. In order to complete the mastery programme and attain the Chemistry Licence (certificate), a student must achieve a minimum score of 90% in each of 30 specific criterion tests.

Y11 & 12 Senior Science

In 2005 the Year 11 and 12 Senior Science students studied permaculture as part of their course.

What is permaculture? The word *permaculture* was coined in 1978 by Bill Mollison, an Australian ecologist, and one of his students, David Holmgren. It is a contraction of 'permanent agriculture' or 'permanent culture'.

Permaculture is about designing ecological human habitats and food production systems. It is a land use and community building movement that strives for the harmonious integration of human dwellings, microclimate, annual and perennial plants, animals, soils, and water into stable, productive communities. The focus is not on these elements themselves, but rather on the relationships created among them by the way they are placed in the landscape. This synergy is further enhanced by mimicking patterns found in nature.

A central theme in permaculture is the design of ecological landscapes that produce food. Emphasis is placed on multi-use plants, cultural practices such as sheet mulching and trellising, and the integration of animals to recycle nutrients and graze weeds.

Permaculture entails much more than just food production. Energy-efficient buildings, wastewater treatment, recycling, and land stewardship in general are other important components of permaculture. More recently, permaculture has expanded to include economic and social structures that support the evolution and development of more permanent communities, such as co-housing projects and eco-villages. As such, permaculture design concepts are applicable to urban as well as rural settings, and are appropriate for single households as well as whole farms and villages.



During the year the Senior Science students have transformed the School biology garden from a paved area into one that contains many species of edible and medicinal plants, vegetables, fruits and herbs. They have prepared garden beds through the practices of composting and sheet mulching and have created very fertile, healthy soils.

Water is a central theme in permaculture and the students have begun to manage the small pond. Looking down on the garden the herb spiral adjacent to the pond is visible. An herb spiral utilises its shape and slope to provide several micoclimates accommodating for a variety of herbs that enjoy different soil and water conditions.

Many cubic metres of compost have been prepared to improve the soil and the new composting area created this year has allowed the recycling of all garden waste. Several fruits have been included in the design. In the months to come, grapes and passionfruit should begin to climb over the trellis and the shadehouse.

An important idea in permaculture is diversity. Efficiency can be improved by maximising the number of plants and animal species in the design. Companion planting is used to provide natural pest control and assist all plants to grow to their optimum. Attracting local fauna to the garden is also an aim. We are happy to report that a friendly bob-tail lizard has taken up residence and should deal with an over supply of snails further protecting our new seedlings. It is hoped that the garden will continue to flourish in years to come and that all can take an interest in its progress, even if only whilst waiting on the upper balconies for a Maths or Biology lesson. 

HALE ST MARY'S CANTATE ENGLAND TOUR, JULY 2005

Wimbledon, Ashes Cricket, G8 Summit, British Open Golf, London atrocities, awarding of 2012 Olympics to London; just some of the events that occurred during the Hale St Mary's Cantate Tour of England from 29 June to 18 July, 2005. This ambitious and eventful tour revolved around singing Choral Evensongs in some of the Great Cathedrals of England and giving two recitals over a three week period. Intensive rehearsals in the weeks prior to departure were hard work for everyone, but paid rich dividends during the course of the trip. Our first evensong was in Southwell Minster, the Cathedral Church of Nottinghamshire; we were honoured in that not only was the Dean of Southwell present, but also the Bishop of Southwell, both of whom took the trouble to pass on their thanks and very complimentary musical comments about the

standard of singing. We then gave a recital in Eagle Parish Church; Eagle is a tiny village in rural Lincolnshire constituting a post office (next door to the church) a pub (opposite the church) some houses (surrounding the church) and a church! The parishioners and community of the village embraced the concert and I quote from one of the many complimentary letters I received on my return to Perth:

"It was a delight to talk to the singers who shared their experiences so freely and so enthusiastically. Their vibrancy was very evident and enhanced their performance; we shall all remember the Hale St Mary's Cantate for many years, and with affection."

The tour then moved further north, where

the choir sang evensong in the extraordinary building that is York Minster and in Ripon Cathedral, the 'Cathedral of the Yorkshire Dales'. A four hour coach journey then took us to Cambridge, where the students attended evensong in King's College, Cambridge: we even had the privilege of having reserved seating in the Chapel, thanks to the Director of Music at King's, Stephen Cleobury. We gave a lunchtime recital in nearby Ely Cathedral, the 'Cathedral of the Fens,' followed by a tour of this incredible building and of Oliver Cromwell's home in the precinct of the Cathedral. It was on this day, Thursday 7 July, that London was bombed, but the tour pressed on moving to London on the Saturday. Here, we attended a performance of the award winning musical. The Lion King at the Lyceum Theatre, and had a sightseeing tour before going to the

Royal Academy of Music for a vocal workshop with Mr Jonathan Willcocks, Head of the Junior Academy. We then sang Choral Evensong at St Paul's Cathedral, incorporating a quick look at the 'Harry Potter steps' (not open to the public) after sweet-talking one of the vergers, before travelling to Oxford on Tuesday 11 July. In Oxford we sang evensong at Christ Church Cathedral and the Director of Music at Christ Church, Stephen Darlington, gave us a talk on choral scholarships at Oxford, life as an undergraduate and how you actually get in to Oxford University. All the students are now quizzing me for more in depth insight! The short distance to Eton saw us work with the Director of Music at Eton College, Ralph Allwood, and we sang evensong in Eton College Chapel, our last service of the tour.

Planning a tour of this nature is one thing, but the success of anything like this depends entirely on how the tour is embraced by students. The 32 students of Hale School and St Mary's Anglican Girls' School who came on this trip embraced every aspect of the tour, from an intensive rehearsal schedule before departing, to being wonderful companions and superb ambassadors for our Schools, and for Australia. As the Reverend George C Goalby, vicar of Eagle Church, wrote in his letter to Mr Meade:

"I wanted to write to you to say what superb representatives of your School the Hale St Mary's Cantate have been. They performed a very vivacious programme of varied music on Sunday 3 July at Eagle Church. They impressed not only with their music but also by their demeanour and attitude. I told them that they were great ambassadors for music, youth and Australia, because that is exactly what they were. I hope that you are very proud of them and their achievements in England. Thank you for arranging for them to come to England and particularly for encouraging their visit to Eagle Church. My parishioners were all very impressed by the programme they performed and thoroughly enjoyed being with them. We shall think of them as they progress through the Tour, and they are already the stuff of 'legends and myths' within my Parishes in the heart of rural England. Do pass on my very sincere thanks to the Cantate and their supervising staff. We wish every one of them the very best in their lives and music for the future. They carry the torch of your School ethos to very good effect."

In closing I would like to say a big thank you to the staff who accompanied the trip, for their professionalism and camaraderie - Kim Harrison, Miranda Yoon, Lynette Taylor, Martin Taylor, and to our organist and accompanist, the Master of Music at St George's Cathedral, without whom this tour could not have happened, Simon Lawford.







was against a very potent Scotch team. A rally from the lower order batsmen. Liam Scott and Alistair Smail gave Hale a highly defendable total of 216. Nicholas Jones, Jack Payne and Simon Quenby provided plenty of batting strength for the team, allowing competitive scores to be made in each game. Other boys to contribute well include Scott Young, Jeremy Wood, Amar Bhuva and Alexis Hall, Overall, the team played with a lot of enthusiasm and the boys proved themselves to be competent, developing cricketers for their age.



The summer season was a highlight for the 9B Cricket team. Fielding a very strong side in 2005 and captained wonderfully well by Cody Fulwood, the boys achieved some very good results. Excellent performances from Rex Bracken and Cody Fulwood with the bat during the season were rewarded with promotion into the 9A side. Strong bowling results were also recorded for Corey Hurley, Siddarth Jain, Royce Dawson and Toby Dawson throughout the season. The energy, professionalism and dedication to achieving team strategies and goals were admirable and made coaching the side very pleasurable.

A keen and courageous band of young cricketers formed the 2005 9C team and, led by captain Daniel Sparky Archondakis, this blend of players of widely different levels of experience, trained hard and played tough to develop their cricketing skills. Despite many of the top charges being poached to play in the higher grades, the 9Cs redeemed themselves well throughout the season. The lack of opposition schools able to field three teams meant that a majority of games were against a formidable Trinity side. Of the three encounters Hale drew the first and was outplayed in the second and third.

These results do not do justice to the commitment shown as the year progressed, with boys making significant improvements in all aspects of the game. It was difficult to single out individual performances but some highlights included: a storming partnership between Craig Cat Stevens (16 n/o) and Robert Feakesy Feakes (21 n/o and promoted) in the first game against Trinity at home and a solid bowling performance (3 for 21) by James Hargrave to wrap up the tail of a very strong Trinity side in the final game of the season. 

The first official event of the season was the Wesley Indoor regatta in preparation for which, the coaches set challenging ergo training sessions. The hard work paid off as Hale's 1st and 2nd VIII crews won their divisions. The 10A crew placed fifth in its division to give Hale second place overall, narrowly beaten by the boys from Guildford Grammar School.

Rowing camp was a tough experience on the calendar but it ensured good preparation prior to the official start to the racing season. Many boys had the chance to experience pre-season competition as they raced crews from the Guildford and Trinity squads.

This year there was no Christ Church regatta because of the shortened season. However, there was an unofficial five-kilometre race for 1st and 2nd VIIIs of all schools. Intense training at rowing camp had made a difference and Hale's senior VIII crews both finished in third place, by relatively close margins.

On the day of the Guildford regatta, there was a howling headwind on the challenging six-kilometre course. In spite of the conditions, Guildford dominated and Hale's 10A and 10B crews managed to place third.

The Aquinas regatta was the first official regatta in 2005 and it gave the boys a chance to determine how much they had achieved since the start of the summer holidays. In the first set of trial races, Hale was strong, winning the 10A, 1st VIII and 3rd VIII divisions. The 3rd VIII and the 1st Quad made an excellent start to the season, giving Hale its only set of medals in the standard 2000m races. The 10B VIII did very well to finish second as did the 9A Quad. In a projected Hamer Cup ranking, Hale placed a well-deserved and narrow second to Scotch College.

The 1st VIII performed better than the previous week's fifth place, coming second by 0.3 seconds and 0.2 seconds in its two races. The 2nd VIII had a much better fourth place in its first race but an exhausting week of training caught up with crew in the second race. The 3rd VIII continued its good form, placing first in the first race but were disappointed to come second in the following race. The 10B VIII did well to win the 1500m race and the Y9 Quads rowed solidly. The 9As Bs and Ds placed third and the 9Es came second.

The Wesley regatta finished with mixed results. The 1st and 2nd VIII crews did not row to their full potential. Both the 10A VIII and the 9Bs came second in their races. The senior Quads took out first and second places in their races and the 3rd VIII dominated in both of its races.

The Scotch regatta hosts a standard 2km race as well as a 500m sprint race. Hale had some good results: the 9B and 9E Quads both placed third as did the 10B VIII. The Y10 and the senior 2nd Quads both placed second in their respective races. The 1st Quad, the 3rd VIII and the 1st VIII crews all won their races.

The Hale regatta was a race rehearsal for the following week's Head of the River. Just one race in each category took place and, as usual, the parents of Hale's rowers provided a much appreciated and scrumptious morning tea. As for results: the 9A Quad placed third, just behind the Scotch crew in an extremely close race. The 9E Quad, 3rd VIII and the 1st VIII also all took third position in their races and the 1st Quad literally flew across the line to deliver Hale a solid win.

The Head of the River began with races for the Year 9 crews. Hale did well as its crews averaged approximately 120kg lighter than most of those from the other schools. The boys held their own and were very competitive. The Y10s, having unfortunately suffered injury during the season, despite great determination and spirit, did not place as well as they had hoped. The senior crews proved themselves a dominant force. The 1st and 2nd Quads took out first position as did the 3rd VIII. The 2nd VIII pushed up a position from the previous week and the 1st VIII placed second in the challenge cup race losing to a stronger Christ Church crew. Overall, the boatshed did well and finished in fourth place in the Hamer Cup tally.

This season, the boys in the Hale boatshed were all part of a tight unit of friends and athletes who worked well as a team. Everyone involved with the Hale rowing programme exhibited spirit and sportsmanship. I hope the younger boys choose to continue with their rowing as they are the foundation of the Hale boatshed. I have learned a lot while rowing at Hale and will never forget the experiences and opportunities that were given to me during this time. As a senior in the boatshed I thought that I would be the one giving the support and inspiration to others but I was wrong. While endeavouring to inspire others, the teamwork, communication, dedication and happy faces encouraged me. This helped me realise that it is not just a few people who hold the boatshed together but every rower, coach and parent who cares enough to put his time and effort into Hale's rowing community. Thank you to everyone who has helped with Hale rowing this year and best of luck to every rower, coach and parent for years to come.

Hale School swimming underwent a number of significant changes in 2005. None was more important than the appointment of new Head Swimming Coach, Andrew Moulin. Andrew works as assistant coach to the highly respected Grant Stoelwinder of the West Coach Swimming School and is an assistant coach with the National squad which includes four Olympians and two Para Olympians. Andrew had a significant input into Todd Pearson's preparation for the Olympic Games in Greece and had a very distinguished career in swimming himself, competing at a National level for swimming and surf lifesaving. He has bought to the squad a high level of technical expertise and an increased level of professionalism to training sessions.

The swimming team has continued to grow with 130 students of all abilities enjoying the camaraderie and varied swimming and social activities the team has to offer. The focus of the swim team is participation and, an effort to encourage as many boys as possible to be involved, has seen the squad develop into one of the largest school swim teams in Australia. The 2005 team was captained by Open School Champion Jacque Naudé and he was well supported by Vice Captains Scott Modra, Ben White and Neville Cordy-Hedge. All four boys demonstrated tremendous leadership and this was no more evident than at the 2005 swimming camp. The camp this year involved a record 65 students and included a range of activities including abseiling, orienteering, beach volleyball and regular favourites such as the swimmers' triathlon. A highlight for the boys was an educational seminar conducted by physiotherapist Kate Laurson entitled 'Core Stability for Swimmer'. So impressive was the seminar that it was decided to employ Kate twice a week to implement a programme designed to improve this important aspect of swimming. The exercises and routines introduced by Kate were both beneficial and enjoyable despite some of us having difficultly walking in the days following a session. Once again, Todd Pearson was kind enough to come and talk to the boys about the benefits of training and teamwork in swimming.



The PSA Interschool Athletics Meeting on Saturday September 17 was strongly contested by a confident Hale team determined to improve on last year's performance. Having conquered the physical and mental obstacles of the wet and the cold conditions that prevailed throughout five weeks of intensive training, the athletes were prepared for the challenges of a wet and windy afternoon at Perry Lakes Stadium. The commitment of every member of the team was evident throughout the competition and was well supported by the appreciative spectators in the stands who amplified their efforts.

In every race and field event within the arena, Hale athletes proudly represented the School with talent, sportsmanship and an indomitable spirit to succeed. While there were numerous first places awarded, the most impressive 'winners' were those resolute competitors who gave their all to get in front of the shirt just ahead with their last jump, throw, or unyielding surge to the finish line. An outstanding senior age group combined with 48 boys representing the School for the first time, focused on wresting the Alcock Shield from Trinity College. Despite numerous individual accomplishments, including 37 personal best performances on the day, the team from Trinity College won, accumulating a massive total after 117 events.

Hale's narrow second place achievement was a just reward for the quality of technique and the tenacity demonstrated in numerous memorable moments throughout the day. Some individual highlights include a brilliant debut by Lachlan Burges who convincingly won both the 100 and 200 metre sprints. Competing in five events, he made a vital contribution to the team along with other members of the impressive U/14 age group. Injury and illness forced numerous late changes to the team, testing the depth of the Hale athletics squad with many reserves called into action. While there were no first places, the effort of the middle distance squad was inspirational. To be competitive in these events, runners require immense will power to match the physical endurance. Edmund Forrester's courageous runs in both the 800m and 1500m, having been unable to train in the previous two weeks due to illness, were awesome. The mental toughness required was also exemplified by Nic Jones who was suddenly promoted to run the first divisions of the 800 and 1500 metres, and did so remarkably well, achieving personal best times in both.

The Open age group provided one final exhibition of sheer class to savour. As a group, Hale won 17 of the 25 events to conclude five outstanding years of domination, with many of the events being won for the third and fourth consecutive year. Collectively the boys hold 11 School records and will be revered for many years to come. The team was led throughout the season by their devoted Captain Lucas Mata, who comprehensively won his 100m, 200m and long jump events. He was ably supported by Vice Captains Tom Anderson and Oliver Saare who each won their hurdles and then high jump and triple jump events respectively. Stefan Todoroski completed his supremacy of the throwing events by winning both the shot put and discus, amazingly while carrying a shoulder injury from the rugby season.



Some may have thought Hale Cross Country was to dip even further in the 2005 PSA rankings this year, with the departure of 2004's Captain of Cross Country, Julian Lennon, arguably one of the greatest runners ever to attend Hale. But, despite the Hale Cross Country crown losing its Jules, the Senior team actually improved on last year's fourth placing and moved up to third. This was a very respectable position, as Trinity and Aquinas (the two schools ahead of Hale) fielded teams of about sixty runners while Hale had a dedicated group of twenty-five runners, proving once again that 'quality is better than quantity'. Training started in the April school holidays with the best trio of cross country coaches comprising Mr Arkle Sparkle, Ms Obs O'Brien and Hardcore Raf Baugh, Jacob's Ladder, King's Park, Reabold Hill, Millington Reserve, the DNA Tower and our favourite, Chunder Hill were all popular training destinations throughout the year.

Quite coincidentally, the first three races were against Scotch, Trinity and Aquinas, the schools that defeated Hale in 2004. Hale was narrowly beaten by Scotch at Scotch, by ten points – literally one runner. A lack of attendance at training was blamed for the loss as everyone believed Hale could defeat the Scotch outfit this year. Trinity also defeated Hale at home with about triple the number of competitors. However, Trinity's win was somewhat diminished by an unpleasant incident at the finish line. Hale had a bye the following week so it was decided to use it to have a friendly fixture against the team from Penrhos, the best girls' school cross country team. However, the girls didn't turn up. Traffic was blamed but the lads felt they were probably just intimidated! (It was actually the 'great flood' on the Freeway).

Aquinas at Aquinas is just about the most difficult trip in the competition, but Hale was not scared at all. Even though Hale did lose its third successive race, Co-Captain Charles Williams ran outstandingly to beat Aquinas champion Michael Glorie in a very good time of 20:04. The next week Hale went to Guildford, and recorded its first victory for 2005 by demolishing the Guildford team (Hale achieved the first nine places). This was followed by another important win over Wesley at home and subsequently a one-point win at McGillvray Oval against Christ Church.

To finish off Term 3, Hale ran in the 5-man x 3km All Schools' Race and finished in third place, pushing Scotch back into fifth place on its home course. After another tough two weeks of holiday training, Hale hosted the 5km All Schools' Race in which Hale again placed third. It was another great result considering some of the Year 10 stars were up at Exmouth on camp. Hale also came third in the 3 man x 5km event at

Trinity and then third in the Ray Brown 8km race at Guildford. In the Senior competition, Trinity's run as the best school ended with Aquinas capturing the PM Moyes Trophy. Although Co-Captain Charles Williams won the most races during the season, Year 11 student James Doyle beat Charles in a few races, including a creditable sixth place overall in the 8 kilometre run. (James also won an event at the Perth Mile Festival during the season).

The Junior team (led by Co-Captains Kirk Gilleran and Lee Ginbey) also had a tremendous season finishing second for the season behind a very powerful Trinity team. The combined teams and parents celebrated the end of the season with a most enjoyable dinner at Siena's Café. Thanks go to the three coaches (Mr Arkle, Ms O'Brien and Raf Baugh) who put so much effort into the team each year. Also many thanks go to the parents for all their help and support, and to the Sports Master Mr Ross Barron. With an enthusiastic contingent of younger runners in the teams, big things can be expected of the Hale Cross Country in 2006 and beyond.



The young men in this squad are to be commended for their sportsmanship. determination and the rapport that has been established within the team. For seven of them this is their second consecutive PSA Championship - a rare achievement. Following a tremendous season in 2004, in which the 1st XI shared the Lawe-Davies Cup with Wesley College, Andrew Bushell stepped down as coach.
