Excerpts from Speech Day Address
Friday, 4 December 2009

I often tell parents that our school community is a microcosm of society, warts and all. While we like to think we have all the best bits of what life is like in the big wide world, the truth is that this is not the reality and we have to accept that and deal with it. Our special guest this morning, the Honorable Len Roberts-Smith, deals very much with the big wide world, being in charge of the Corruption and Crime Commission, indeed, dealing with what's under it might take more of his time. We are privileged to have him with us today and he has agreed to say a few words and present the prizes.

In a recent interview, Professor Howard Gardner of Harvard University's Graduate School of Education suggested that he has an "elevator speech" he would give to the President of the United States. It is this: "Americans used to be the best and the brightest but we have now been dominated by the three Ms - Money, Markets and Me. You have to spin the three Ms by 90 degrees to get the three Es - Excellence, Engagement and Ethics. If we had more time we could talk about the fourth E of Empathy. We need to get young people off the money-marketme cycle and on to excellence, engagement and ethics in work and in citizenship, and then quickly add another 90 degree spin to the E to get W for We. It is about getting people to think more collectively and less egocentrically."

It is an interesting view of the world and one that can be readily discussed in terms of what we aspire to at Hale.

I recently asked the School Leadership Team to rank the 9 core values listed in our current Strategic Plan in terms of their importance to the school. Excellence was listed in the top three Values of every member around

the table. In a similar exercise I asked the captive audience at the recent AGM of the P&F. Excellence was ranked at the top of the collective list from 30 or so parents. To my mind, the notion of personal excellence, not perfection and not necessarily a level of achievement that is comparable to others, rather a commitment to strive to achieve one's best, is the key. I like the quote attributed to Aristotle "We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, then, is not an act, but a habit."

Last Saturday as I was putting the finishing touches to this report, the essence of Gardner's second point - engagement - struck me. As I looked out one window I saw the Forrest Library in all its glory, inviting students and staff to enter and lose themselves in the dreams of books, conversations and technology. From the next window I saw a constant stream of boarders, moving into their dining room to grab lunch before returning for an afternoon's amusement by the pool, the TV, a twitter or two or a trip to the beach. Forty metres away, Snooty Snow White and the Seven Short Pirates was in full rehearsal mode; outdoors, with a co-ed cast, Director Danny Parker in full control, and enjoyment filling the space.

As we continue on this 360 degree tour, the latest development in the quest for an engaging and challenging education delivery at Hale - the Middle School - was nearing completion. Fifty metres further on, cricketers from the 7 PSA schools were engaging in a 20/20 festival. It confirmed my belief that we do engage most boys here, and the vast majority of them do enjoy coming to school each day. It might be to be part of the "eV" Challenge, to be a member of one of the 24 debating teams this year, to play in one of Mr Kerr's outstanding Jazz ensembles, or to enjoy Geography being taught with a west coast flavour by Mr Walsh.

I believe the culture of striving for excellence and ensuring engagement with the students is at the core of the achievement and sense of fulfilment felt by the boys. In February this year, the school returned to the news that a Year 12 student from 2008 had taken top place in the state, while Hale boys filled another 6 places in the Top 40. Such news sets a platform for the year as the senior boys listen and, by their competitive nature, try to emulate these feats.

In PSA sport, the swimmers provided a wonderful entrée to the year. Their 3rd place finish, just a relay score behind the winning school, had even the mild-mannered team manager, Mrs Pearce, raising her voice in enthusiastic encouragement. The 1st XI cricketers fulfilled a dream so many in that team had harboured for many years. Playing uncompromising cricket well into the last hour of the final game of the season, they won

the Darlot Cup. The Alcock Cup also returned to Hale for the first time since 2003, courtesy of a highly committed 1st XVIII, and the 1st XV once again set the benchmark in their competition, winning the PSA trophy for the 7th year in succession.

Our sporting programme is so much more than trophies. Hale sport more than held its own throughout the year, not only in terms of results but in terms of sportsmanship, behaviour and organisation. The importance of having so many of our coaches being classroom teachers must not be underestimated. The relationships are strong, the values and approach are consistent, and I know the boys appreciate the genuine enthusiasm the staff have for their efforts, as they do in other domains of the co-curricular programme.

Life at school is full of achievements and failures. This is how we learn and developing resilience is a part of life. In order to achieve a goal, material or otherwise, you still have to go through the process of getting there. If there is no pleasure in that, or if the journey is not pursued with integrity and honour, then the achievement of that goal is largely worthless and unsatisfying. Boys, think of a goal you have achieved this year and ask yourself "How satisfying was the journey to get there?"

Returning to Howard Gardner's comments, it is my strong contention that the pursuit of excellence will count for little if we cannot educate boys ethically and with empathy for those around them. At times, this may place the school at odds with wider society, but as has been said by people far wiser than I, "if you don't stand for something, you will end up standing for nothing".

Our Service Learning programme is one strong example of that Jesuit philosophy, 'Being Men for Others'. This year I was fortunate enough to visit Cambodia with the Service Learning group who worked there and in Vietnam. It takes the boys out of their comfort zone and into their courage zone, leaving a lasting impression on all involved. The Chaplain's Pilgrimage, the Sony Camp, weekly visit to agencies around Perth, as well as the fundraising and awareness-raising carried out here at school, are vital to gaining an understanding of our place in the world in relation to others.

The notion of living our lives ethically and with a sound values base is tied in very closely to the final comment in Gardner's words, where he says the Me must be turned into We. The partnership between parents and the school is fundamental to our desire for boys to develop a Values base. When boys hear their parents agree to falsely tell the school there is an illness in the family that requires an overseas visit in the last few days of the term, they register that it is OK to do this:



make no mistake, it sinks in. Or a parent's tolerance to let them consume alcohol from a young age. Don't worry that Henry Lawson wrote "beer makes you feel how you ought to feel without beer" - I urge you to stand strong on this one, because there is much research, the law, and you would be surprised how many other parents, to support you.

Externally, we are faced with the looming reality of league tables, the bland rank ordering of schools through a one dimensional set of figures based on national testing and calibrated by an instrument called the Index of Comparative Socio-Economic Advantage. But league tables will not tell you about the school's commitment to RideAid, where fundraising of over 40 thousand dollars in the past two years has led to the building of a school in Cambodia; or the opportunity for senior students to walk the Kokoda Track, an unforgettable experience for those boys and staff involved; or the pastoral care work where a group of students came together to assist a younger student through all the challenges of Year 8 life; or the successes of our sportsmen; or the involvement of our Yr 10 boys in the Young Achievement programme; or the accounting students securing 1st Year university accreditation; or the roles of the Nulsen Haven youth patrons and committee; or the lessons learned at Exmouth.

I am a believer in tests and ranks and passing and failing and communicating all of this within a school community so that we do not fall into a self-satisfied blancmange. However, I do not want these valid measures of a part of a person or a school to become invalid measures of the whole person or school that the wider society can ogle. We need to accept the principle of accountability in schools but we should not accept the dangerous and simplistic comparisons between schools.

I am tremendously grateful for the dedication of all staff, teaching and non-teaching, to their jobs, and the range of other responsibilities they willingly take on. Two years ago, the school initiated a scheme to acknowledge master classroom practitioners. This year, Mr Mark Pressley and Mr Andrew Dean

were awarded Advanced Teacher 1 which recognises them as teaching exemplars, Mr Shaun Lane, Mr Tim Parish, Mr Heath McCabe and Mrs Sarah Pearce were awarded AT2 which recognises them as innovators in their field and our inaugural AT3 recipient, which acknowledges a mentor/coach with commitment to academic research and leadership has been awarded to Mr Eddie Cecins. This is a significant honour.

The support for Brenton Hantke and Brian Clarkson in the boarding community, and Julianne Nissen in the Junior School, as they have dealt with cancer, has been strong and, I should acknowledge, has been matched by the support of the parent community. The passing of Nic Bean midway through the year had a profound effect on many of us, not only for the tragedy that it was, but that David Bean is a close friend to many and highly respected colleague of us all. The level of support shown in these tough times reflects the character of those entrusted to teach and care for your sons.

At the end of 2009 we will be farewelling a number of staff. June Richardson is leaving the Curriculum Support department for a role at Perth College, Eloise Billes leaves us after two and a half years in the Philosophy, Values and Religion department while Louise Elscot is returning to the Art classroom at All Saints College, having been both teacher and technician in our Art department for 6 years. Our superb Head of Art Maggie Fisher is retiring after 7 years, as is our long serving counsellor, Ros Kruger. Robin Wake is seeking new challenges at Santa Maria College, having done so much in the planning and implementation stages of our Forrest Library. Our English department has also been hit, with Heather Hankinson relocating to Hobart, and the Head of English Penny Leiper and her husband Mark Bonnin heading to Albany, where Mark will assume the role as Director of Pastoral Care at Great Southern Grammar.

While we expect students to build relationships with their teachers and vice versa it has been obvious in recent weeks that the parents

also respect so many of the teachers here. I received an email from one parent recently commenting on Mr Bonnin's departure. It read "Mr Bonnin has been our son's Havelock Housemaster for the past two years. Lachlan respects him hugely and this respect has been well earned. Mr Bonnin has helped him to grow in confidence. He has been interested in him both as a student within the school and as a person. Mr Bonnin is probably unaware of the impact he has made on Lachlan but it has been huge. In Lachlan's words: Mr Bonnin is DEADLY"-----that means incredibly good!" I've called him deadly before, but with a very different meaning! These deadly departees, and indeed all staff at Hale, deserve our thanks at this time.

THE OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE NEW "HALE SCHOOL" IN CAMBODIA





The Chaplain's Pilgrimage to the Solomon Islands has become an important part of the Year 10 Service Learning Programme.

After almost a year in the planning it finally happened, eighteen Year 10 boys, Scott Anderson, Sebastian Ashford, Mitchell Bestry, Daniel Campbell, Nicholas Chapman, Thomas Elliot, Robert Ferritto, Henry Giles, Dougal Haslam, Ryan Lewis, Timothy McLeod, Rourke Moynihan, Christopher Morley, Jack

Murray, Aidan Orr, Liam O'Shea, Brett Penny, Andrew Rule, Ms Katie Feutrill and I landed in Honiara on Monday 28 September for what was going to become ten days of lifetime memories.

The pilgrimage took the form of an "immersion experience". It presented a unique opportunity for the boys to gain an insight into a culture, education and spirituality completely different to their own.

After spending the first two days orientating ourselves to the culture and history of the Solomon Islands, we travelled sixty kilometres by water taxi to the small community of Siro. The Anglican Church in the Solomon Islands is well into the process of providing the leadership, teaching and infrastructure at Siro Community School. For the next six days the boys became not only guests, but also members of Siro. The school is the only one on the island with a secondary school and has an enrolment of approximately 450 students from pre school to Year 12. Most of the students had never spent time with or even spoken to an Australian before, but the boys quickly adapted to being "on show" and very soon found out how good the Solomon's boys are at soccer and volleyball.


For a large part of this year the Hale boys and their families have been raising funds for the school and the presentation of this as well as sporting equipment on the last night was a very moving event. The Hale boys had also filled approximately 300 gift bags with a variety of small gifts and the Chaplain of the Siro Community told us of how important these would be at the end of the year as part of their celebrations.

The traditional welcome of the people wherever we went, attending the Chapel Services at Siro and Honiara, the visit to the World Discoverer wreck, the US and Japanese War Memorials, the WWII Outdoor Museum, The Solomon Islands Parliament House, The National Museum as well as the sights, smells and people in the markets certainly gave us an insight into a culture and people very different to those we go to school with, and live with here in Perth.

Being a part of Siro and later in the trip visiting Selwyn College, a total boarding school about two hours from Honiara, certainly gave us a completely different appreciation of the privilege of being at Hale.

NICHOLAS BEAN 24/09/1992 - 15/07/2009

In the July holidays the School was deeply saddened to learn of the death of Nicholas Bean.

Nic was in Year 12, and had just completed Semester 1. He was making wonderful progress towards his TEE, and had achieved straight A grades in Semester 1. He was top of English Literature, and was ranked second in Ancient History, fourth in History and in the top fifteen students in Discrete and Geography. He had a very bright academic future ahead of him because he backed up his ability with incredibly hard work.

Nic was a determined, competitive and persistent young man in this as in every other facet of his life. He was the type of student who makes the very most of their time at the School. He received Symbols for Choir, Concert Band, Chess, Service Learning and Public Speaking, and would certainly have been awarded Academic Symbols at the end of the year.

Nic was a young man of extraordinary compassion, kindness and empathy, unusually so for one of his age. He felt injustice keenly, and this made him a principled young man, a person of the greatest integrity. He was very loyal to his House; in Havelock he took his responsibilities as a House Prefect very seriously. He wanted above all else to be just one of the team. Although he did over the years swim and play volleyball and badminton in House sport, which took great courage, it was a source of tremendous frustration to him that he couldn't participate as fully as he would have liked to have. Yet never did he express resentment; he accepted his lot, and the limitations his condition put upon him — indeed, he sought other avenues through which to contribute.


When he couldn't compete he would help out in other ways such as timing his colleagues. He debated and coached the younger Havelock teams. His real forte though was chess; it was a passion he discovered as a child, and he followed through with it into adulthood. Nic had become a very good chess player indeed. Not long before he died he won five out of his six games in the 4-way Interschool Chess competition, and was named the best player.

Nic was a committed young man, an exemplary student in every sense of the word. His example to us is to live every moment of our lives intensely, richly and fully. As he grew up and became aware of his illness, and the possibility that his life might be a relatively short one, instead of despairing, he dived headlong into life. This is his legacy and his challenge: to make the very most of our lives, and never to take anything for granted.

We are all the poorer for Nic's untimely death. Yet we are so fortunate to have known him and to have had him with us for as long as we did. It was a privilege to have been associated with such a fine person.



YEAR 12 ACADEMIC ACHIEVERS



TEE RESULTS 2009

For yet another year the School has achieved superb academic results in the WACE/TEE examinations as judged by several measures. On the measure of Curriculum Council Awards, Hale School students were awarded five General Exhibitions for being placed in the top 40 in WA. The students were: Aditya Eranki, Jeremey Huynh, Jordan Aitken, Arjun Kaushik and Joshua Reed. A sixth General Exhibition was awarded to Jonathan Ng for his achievement in being the highest scoring TEE student for whom English was a second language. Since 2006 Hale School students have now won 23 General Exhibitions. Three students won subject Exhibitions: Sean Kelley (Engineering Studies), Jordan Aitken (Geography) and Arjun Kaushik (Philosophy and Ethics).

A significant measure of student success is the Curriculum Council's ranking of schools

based on the percentage of students whose TERs place them in the state's top third. 119 Hale School students (67.24%) were placed in the top third in WA. Hale was ranked second overall in WA - and top boys' school for 2009 - on this measure of academic performance. 98 students scored a TER of 90 or more, 60 students scored 95 or more and 19 students scored 99 or higher. These very high TER scores mean that the great majority of the School's 176 TEE students are likely to receive offers for the university courses they have selected.

In 2009, our average TER was 88.4 and our median TER was 90.4. Both these figures are the highest since the year 2000.

Another measure of WACE/TEE examination success is the number of times that Hale School was placed in the 'top ten' for each

subject or course. 12 subjects achieved this distinction in 2009: Ancient History, Applicable Mathematics, Applied Information Technology, Calculus, Chemistry, Economics, Engineering Studies, French, Geography, History, PE Studies and Physics.

In our CareerLink programme, all 16 students enrolled in that programme achieved a nationally accredited training Certificate 1 or 2.

The School is immensely proud of the academic achievements of the students of 2009, and we are equally proud of their commitment to the School in co-curricular activities, sport and in community service.

<u>JUNIOR SCHOOL</u>

REFLECTION OF JUNIOR SCHOOL





I was Head of Hale Junior School from April 1996 until July 2009 and it was indeed a remarkable journey.

I draw comfort that I will see the boys of the Junior School again as they progress into our

new Middle School in the years to come. Collectively they have a wonderful spirit which has filled the Junior School with energy, humour and learning. It has been a wonderful school staffed with a team of people who have a natural warm authority, practical wisdom and a positive professional tone.

As I contemplate my time as Head of Junior School I offer my thanks to teachers and parents for understanding that a world class independent boys' school requires commitment, energy, humour and intellect from all involved in the boys' education and upbringing. The core function of our school has been to provide outstanding opportunities for boys to grow and achieve extraordinarily important qualities:

- i) a sense of belonging and purpose in their lives
- ii) a growing sense of mastery over learning and the acquisition of core values
- iii) a degree of resilience and a quest for independence and individuality
- iv) a spirit of generosity as well as respect and empathy for others.

From an educators perspective it takes outstanding teachers to achieve these goals in an educational context. It is difficult to undertake a quest to teach both the qualitative and the quantitative aspects of this list, if we simply perceive our workplace as being a Monday to Friday parallel universe where we work in a mechanical and prescriptive context. Schools must always seek people who love teaching. Teachers must be people who possess a sizeable "chunk" of the qualities we desire your sons to develop. In my experience, the greatest teachers also have a "B" side to their lives, of real quality! They have a passion for life, humour, and, usually believe one part of the curriculum is superior to all others.

I am aware that we live in cynical times. Yet, a thriving independent boys' school is a remarkable work place. It is forever filled with youthful energy and enquiring minds demanding to be engaged. It truly is a place of perpetual youth. Teaching remains an honourable occupation. It is a craft that appeals to wisdom, to virtues and to most human interactions. We must avoid delusions of grandeur as a consequence of past glories and recognise that our independence, our collective wisdom and our resources compel us to be an outstanding school. We pursued

such a goal with confidence in the Junior School because the teaching teams' skills, values and collective spirit grasped the rich opportunity for action and initiative our independence provided us.

The greatest teachers know that designing quality curriculum requires a sense of energy, creativity and vitality. This is what sustained us each year. Such a curriculum ultimately requires enterprise and innovation from teacher and student. This is because intelligence is not just being capable with verbal and mathematical reasoning. Intelligence is diverse, dynamic and distinctive. Our curriculum must also feature these qualities.

Another critical function of our school is to support your son in accepting responsibility for the consequences of his actions and decisions. Ultimately, this quality is what makes us responsible members of society. Experience has taught me that this is best achieved in an environment where the parents of boys understand their critical importance in supporting their school to develop this quality. It is a quality that can be learned or lost in Junior School. It is a quality taught by both home and school. It is a quality taught and learned by degrees. It requires parents to acknowledge that their son will at times make a mistake as a part of learning about life. Gradually, a boy learns about responsibility to himself, his peers, his school and his family. When a boy was asked to take responsibility for his actions and decisions in this school we strived to ensure it had been done:

- Not without question; but without blind parental defence or obstruction
- Not without disappointment; but without indifference or mischievous deflection of blame
- Not without hope of moving on; but without defiance towards an expectation of changed behaviour in the future.

My memories of my time in the Junior School are filled with rich characters, memorable performances and undertakings rarely seen in any Junior School. Of course there are also many teaching and learning moments of pure magic I have enjoyed with my own class.

The boys of Hale Junior School have demonstrated that they have an academic capacity that is stunning. However, what is more evident is the diversity of their intellect. I am also immensely proud of the diverse nature of our curriculum which has been designed as a response to this breadth of intellect. This fact is critical when we look forward over the next twelve years when all the current Junior School population will have finished Year 12. Society is changing now to such an extent that education must react. I do not easily succumb to tabloid headlines and breathless assessments about

our technological future. But our world is changing. These boys will require skills that previously might have been seen as peripheral or innate in only a few. The ability to; be creative, be innovative and to connect and interconnect knowledge and processes will be vital skills in all future occupations. I believe that educators who deny the impact of technology on education or those who scorn the degree of change required in our thinking, have not honestly and courageously examined what it is they believe an education must now offer our boys. A passive, one-dimensional, manufacturing style educational process must be consigned to history.

Not the critical content, not spelling and grammar, not mathematics, but; the belief that education can remain a conventional, passive content delivery system. It is time for significant thinking on this issue. Significant thinking about the curriculum, the tests we focus so much on, and how we teach and how well we teach. Our focus must be to ensure that in this next twelve years we continue to be profoundly proactive and alive in generating human dignity and confidence, in generating the capacity for performance, for dialogue, for thinking in all our classes. Our Middle and Senior Schools will be better places for them being there. I also thank the hundreds of families for their faith in the Junior School by commencing their son's journey at Hale School in the Junior School.

Finally, let us all commit to being advocates for an educational context that knows learning in school is about connecting ideas and creativity with innovation, and being afforded the opportunity to demonstrate those connections uniquely. Teachers and boys. All the time. Every day.







Infectiously positive, extremely enthusiastic, compassionate and good humoured; all character traits of the boys that made up the class of 7H in 2009. In a new classroom, with





CHALLENGE PROGRAMME & DRAMA

CHALLENGE PROGRAMME

The Challenge Programme in the Junior School involved a wide variety of units of work undertaken by students identified as gifted or talented. Across all year levels and in every classroom, boys were encouraged to extend their academic endeavours in order to develop their grasp of skills, processes and concepts.

The master classes provided opportunities for boys to become submersed in their particular area of interest or strength and were designed to promote complex, flexible and creative thinking skills. This year master classes were undertaken in the Learning Areas of Science, English, Drama, Art and Spanish. Boys undertook a wide variety of tasks from creating model submarines, designing and implementing a major mosaic artwork, developing an original piece of theatre, producing cooking videos in Spanish and creating picture books based on an environmental theme.

In the Mathematics Learning Area programmes were facilitated for Year 4 to Year 7 mathematically talented students and designed to challenge and engage the boys with a wider range of topics. Highlights of 2009 include participation in the Australian Mathematics Trust Competition, Have Sum Fun Team competition, Australasian Mathematical Olympiads and the Year 7s group involvement with the ASX Share Market Game.




MODCROSSE

PENNY LEIPER



Penny Leiper, Head of English 2006-2009, Co-ordinator of Literature 1996-2005, made an outstanding contribution to the teaching of these subjects at Hale School from 1992 to 2009. There are many dimensions to the substantial legacy she has left: a large, happy and highly professional department; a commitment to excellence in English; a history of excellent results; superb facilities and resources; students who enjoy English.

Penny arrived at Hale with a brilliant First Class Honours degree in English and a Diploma in TEFL, no experience in Australian schools, two years teaching English in Japan and a glittering school girl career at Penrhos behind her. Penny began in 1992 and was appointed Assistant Head of Parry House almost immediately and held that role for the next 4 years, 1992 – 1995, but it was her English and Literature teaching that had boys and colleagues sitting up and listening immediately. Her intellectual flair, challenging and sparkling manner in class, great sense of humour, quick wit and ability to inspire appealed from day one to boys of all ages at Hale.

When Penny started teaching at Hale the new Curriculum Council Literature course was just starting – gender, race, class and cultural identity were the concepts to define and to find represented in literary texts. Penny led her colleagues and students in this and taught humanist, aesthetic and historicist approaches to Literature just as keenly.

Penny was appointed as Coordinator of Literature in 1996. Her teaching team for Literature in her first 8 years as coordinator included Patrick Wallis, Ed Lawless, David Lindegaard, Heather Hankinson, Bev Korbosky, her husband Mark Bonnin and David Bean. Her Literature results were extraordinarily good and the number of students grew. In 1999 the Hale average was 75%, 12% above the state, in 1995, 11 above the state average, 2004, 76%, 12 above the state. In recent years Hale School has consistently had the State's biggest cohort of boys from one school doing Literature.

Literature at Hale School was in the top 10 schools for Literature results in the TEE for six years in a row under Penny's leadership. The Subject Exhibition was achieved twice: in 2003 by Nic McLean and in 2004 by Baxter Roberts. Fifteen Certificates of Distinction for being in the top 0.5% have been achieved since 1995. These great results were a tribute to the sheer quality of Penny's teaching and leadership and the way she engaged her students.

Penny passionately believed that the masculine gender by itself presented no artificial barriers to achievement in Literature and English and she believed that some contemporary theory emanating from the field of boys' education and the supposed need for a different, gender-based approach in English teaching for boys was often over stated. Her results provided the data to support her view. Instead of theory from the boys and literacy field, Penny had expert subject knowledge, engaged the students fully at their individual point of need, developed excellent relationships, helped them on an individual basis at every turn and used technology brilliantly when needed.

Penny has been a Year 8/9 hockey coach, a producer of House plays 1992 – 1995, an athletics coach for 7 years, a tennis coach, a coach of mock trial and debating. She won the School's Isaachson Award for contribution to Teaching and Learning for 2008. We are indebted to Penny for her educational leadership, her contributions to the deliberations of the Heads of Department meetings and her passion for her subject which has influenced thousands of students. We wish her well in the next phase of her life in Albany.

MAGGIE FISHER



Maggie Fisher, the doyenne of Art Department teachers in Western Australia, made an outstanding contribution to the development of Art at Hale School in her seven years (2003-2009) as Head of the Art Department. Maggie came to Hale from Methodist Ladies College, where she was first Head of Art and then Head of Boarding. Before that she was Head of Department in several government high schools.

Maggie had a rare and enviable combination of qualities which meant she was an inspirational teacher and leader in schools. Her passion for Art (she is a fine painter herself) was palpable and she was always positive and encouraging as a teacher; students and colleagues experienced her creative, constructive responses to their artworks on a daily basis. Her excellent people skills and genuine concern for the professional and personal development of her staff meant she was an outstanding manager and leader whose colleagues formed a devoted, dedicated team. Maggie was a consultant to the Curriculum Council, playing a significant role in the development of the new courses of study in Art, and was a regular presenter on professional learning topics to Art teachers around the state. She was a TEE examiner for many years.

In 2007 the Federal Government published its National Review of Visual Education which comprised case studies of Australia's best schools for Art. Only two WA schools featured in the review; Hale School was one – a fine tribute to Maggie Fisher. Teaching excellence, the high student numbers in TEE Art and in all other year groups, and the valued place of Art in the curriculum at Hale were all cited in the review.

Students' achievement and enjoyment in Art flourishes under the direction of Maggie and her staff. She expanded the number of different studio areas students could work in - photography, sculpture, ceramics, textiles, computer – generated works, glass and work in other materials and new forms complemented the fine work done in painting and drawing. Many Hale Year 12 students' works were selected for the Perspectives Exhibition of outstanding TEE Art work and Hale School was ranked in the Curriculum Council's ranking of 'top ten' schools for TEE Art results six times in her seven years as Head of Department. The School's Student Art exhibition was a highlight every year.

Maggie's vast experience, her network in the education and art worlds, her deep affection for her students and her boundless energy strengthened Art at Hale. Her own words, quoted in the National Review, sum up her philosophy: "the arts are the heart and soul of a school, and without them there is no heartbeat".



MARK BONNIN



Mark Bonnin arrived at Hale School in 1995 from St Philip's College in Alice Springs. In his fifteen years at the school he has taught English, History and Religious Education as well as a very short, yet highly successful stint of Conversational French. Mark's co-curricular involvement has seen him coach tennis, football, cricket, basketball and athletics. However, it is his nine and a half year reign as the Head of Havelock House that would rank as Mark's most significant contribution to the life of Hale School.

Mark is a passionate educator. He has derived great pleasure and a sense of pride in the achievements of his students, both in the classroom and on the sporting field. In his time here no less than four of Mark's English students have been awarded Certificates of Distinction and he has coached five PSA champion hurdlers. An annual feature of the athletics squad's training would be Mark's demonstration of perfection in hurdling technique and would prove to all that Mark leaves no stone unturned for the sake of his charges. It has also been reported that the sight of an ageing human stick

insect hurtling down the 100m hurdles track is one of the scariest sights to ever be seen at Hale School.

Mark's appointment to the staff of Hale School not only gave him the opportunity to move to Western Australia but also introduced him to his future wife; then fellow English teacher and now departing Head of English, Penny Leiper. Mark and Penny were married in 1997 and in doing so joined a select club of those on the staff who work here alongside their spouse.

As has been mentioned, Mark is a passionate man and there is no doubt that he will carry this forward into his new role as he leaves the School. Mark's absolute desire has always been to encourage the very best in team spirit and this has been infectious to the boys and really marks out his approach to all Havelock activities. Mark's passion has always been most clearly on display during interhouse sporting activities. On these occasions it was the responsibility of his erstwhile Assistant Head of House to constantly monitor Mark in order to keep these passions in check. Indeed, Mark has had to be counselled on more than one occasion that it is not his place to run out onto the field and actually play on the half back line with the Year 9 boys.

Havelock House has a relatively short history compared to most other Houses at the school and Mark leaves Hale as the longest serving Head of this House. Mark's leadership has fostered in the boys an approach to teamwork and service to others and is a priceless legacy for them, their families and the school as a whole. Over the years it has been obvious to the boys that their Head of House cares deeply about them as individuals. Mark's innate ability to communicate and his empathy to each boy's individual needs will be missed greatly by them all. The influence he has had on the lives of many young men in his care is immeasurable.

Mark leaves Hale to take up the position of Director of Pastoral Care at Great Southern Grammar School in Albany. We wish him, Penny and his family the very best for and we thank him for all that he has contributed to the School.

ROBIN WAKE



Robin came to Hale in 1993 and already by then she was recognised as one of the most pre-eminent teacher librarians in the state. She has won prestigious awards and been a committed and hard working member of numerous committees and professional bodies, in addition to presenting papers at national conferences.

To Hale School, she brought an encyclopaedic knowledge of young adult literature, particularly for boys, and enormous enthusiasm for fostering reading. The Year 8 Ribit and Year 9 Literature Circles programmes, as well as a range of Year 10 units, became firmly established under her guidance, and as a result many boys have become life-long readers. The long-running Author in Residence programme was Robin's idea, and Hale has been very lucky to host some most prestigious Australian authors.

Robin has led the way in keeping abreast of new technologies, pedagogies and information literacy developments. She has always been keen to share her knowledge and her expertise. The School and teaching staff have been the grateful

beneficiaries of Robin's extraordinary work ethic, thanks to all the hours she has spent in the evenings, at home or at school on the weekend accompanied by her beloved dog, in order to monitor professional list servers, check out websites, read reviews, and alert people to things she finds useful.

It is obvious when you look around the Hale collection in the Forrest Library, that it is without doubt the finest school collection in the state, if not the country. Robin's knowledge of curriculum and resources has been the backbone of the growth of all that we have, in both the print and non print areas.

The magnificent new Forrest Library is a result of Robin's vision and determination to focus on the teaching and learning to take place there. Her vision can be seen in the design of the spaces we have today. Her imagination ran to a library designed like a flower, and in the early planning stages she was drawing daisy petals for classrooms, which are the very classrooms we see today. She dreamed of outside spaces for reading, and the courtyard was born. Robin was inspired by the concept of a Learning Commons, and she ensured that this became the overarching philosophy behind the library spaces and functionality.

A great sense of adventure and keen interest in doing something for others has seen her travel to Vietnam, Korea and soon, China to teach and appreciate other cultures. She has an ESL qualification and teaches English to migrants in some of her out-of-school time.

Robin leaves Hale after seventeen years of loyal and outstanding service. She will be missed greatly, but her legacy is there for all to see. She is looking forward to another challenge, and we wish her well in her new all girls school experience.

Heather Hankinson began her teaching career at Hale School in 1997. Heather is a brilliant teacher. MICHAEL CRAWSHAW



Michael Crawshaw, Head of the Geography Department for almost four years, 2006-2009, resigned at the end of Term 3 2009 to take up the position of Head of Senior School, at the Swan Valley Anglican Community School.

Michael emigrated from the UK to Western Australia in July 2005 to join Hale School in Semester 2 of that year, and taught initially in the Commerce Department. Geography results in the TEE were outstanding under Michael's leadership. The Geography Subject Exhibition was won by Hale students in both 2008 and 2009, and student numbers in the subject remain high at Hale, Years 8-12, at a time when they are declining elsewhere. We are indebted to Michael Crawshaw for his fine contribution to Hale School.

LEANNE RUCKS



Leanne Rucks, who commenced at Hale in Term 1, 2006, was the co-ordinator of the Senior School's inaugural Gifted Education programme, the 'Challenge' programme, whose role was to identify and nurture gifted students so that their academic potential, in whatever domain of learning, could be realised at Hale School. Chief among Leanne's tasks was heightening teachers' knowledge of, first, the need to differentiate curriculum for the gifted students and, secondly, of ways to engage and inspire the underachieving gifted students.

Before joining Hale, Leanne was already a pioneer in the education of gifted students in the government school sector in her roles as an Academic Excellence Co-ordinator, as well as being a Head of English, in different government high schools. Her Master's degree in Gifted Education provided the theoretical underpinning.

At Hale, Leanne conducted meetings to raise parents' awareness and understanding of gifted education, helped classroom teachers to recognise and cater for the needs of the gifted student, and worked with those students herself as a mentor.

She conducted professional development seminars for colleagues and these were memorable for the passion and intellect with which they were delivered.

She established the students' Philosophy Club which met regularly to provide a forum for critical thinking and debate on philosophical topics. Leanne and Matthew Wills (Head of Philosophy, Values and Religion) together established the Philosothon, a philosophy competition for all WA schools which is now recognised Australia-wide as a model of its kind. Leanne also collaborated with Matthew in running the School's annual philosophy camp.

In addition, Leanne taught in the English Department at Hale. The School is grateful for her pioneering work on the Challenge programme in the Senior School and we wish her well at Belridge SHS.

Peta Ranieri began her time at Hale School in 2000 as a final year student teacher under the guidance of a former Head of Drama, Mr Chris Rutter. JO FORDHAM



ALEX NINKOV Excerpts from Speech Day Address Friday, 4 December 2009

Good Morning,

Chairman of the Board of Governors Mr Fullarton, Headmaster Mr Meade, Minister for Education, Dr Elizabeth Constable, The Right Reverend Tom Wilmot, Assistant Bishop of Perth, Special Guest the Commissioner of the Corruption and Crimes Commission the Honourable Len Roberts-Smith QC, staff, parents and boys.

Today is the culmination of what has at times been a difficult but rewarding year both personally and as a school community. We have faced challenges and overcome them; as a school community we have grieved for the loss of a much loved and respected colleague. Nic Bean; we have strived for goals and reached them and it is these achievements both individually and as a school that makes

reaching this milestone so important.

It has only been in the weeks since Valedictory that I have begun to realise just how important Hale is in shaping the attitudes, perceptions and goals of young men.

It is said that a teacher affects eternity, because you can never tell where their influence stops - the same can be said of a school. This school as an institution plays an integral role in shaping who the boys in the audience today will become. This capacity for a school to shape the minds of boys is not one which should be taken lightly and I know Hale School takes this duty very seriously.

It was John F. Kennedy who said, "Let us not think of education only in terms of its costs, but rather in terms of the infinite potential of the human mind that can be realized through education.

Let us think of education as the means of developing our greatest abilities, because in each of us there is a private hope and dream which, fulfilled, can be translated into benefit for everyone."

It is this capacity of a school to encourage the dreams and goals of its students which both highlights its importance and is a measure of its success. It is easy for us as students to become complacent about how privileged we are to attend Hale - we can take for granted what surrounds us daily. You as parents have made a decision to send your sons to this school, and in so doing reflect the private hope and dream that Kennedy spoke of - to allow your child to achieve something for the benefit of everyone.

Whilst parents see the long term benefits of a quality education, I know at times it is hard to share their same sentiment. We all know, particularly the older students, how heavy the workload becomes, - the bottom line is that school is hard work. In the weeks since my final TEE exam, with the opportunity to reflect, I now truly appreciate how much Hale has meant to me. On Valedictory Day, a friend said to me, "I'll miss seeing you every day mate" and it was at this moment it struck me what I was leaving behind.

The lifelong friendships forged at Hale, the memories - sporting, artistic and academic make leaving Hale so difficult. I say to the boys remaining at the school - enjoy your time here, enjoy seeing your mates every day; and face the challenges which come to you with confidence and persistence.

Trust me you will miss it all - if not the work, then the people, the teachers or pulling on the Darlot Cap or the sky blue jersey.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank The Honourable Len Roberts-Smith QC, for addressing us and presenting the prizes today. As Commissioner of the Triple C, Mr Roberts - Smith, is in a unique position to comment on character and integrity as he leads a Commission established to, amongst other things, continuously improve the integrity of the public service and in so doing reflect community standards and expectations. On behalf of the school we would like to thank you for your attendance this morning.

To next year's Captain of School, Kevin and the Prefect team I wish them good luck in all endeavours they undertake.

Don't underestimate the importance of the positions you assume and the responsibilities which come with those positions. A point that has been made clear to me this year and throughout my time at Hale is that we all have choices, between those that are right and those that are easy. To the Prefects remember the words of Bill Bradley "Respect your fellow human being, treat them fairly, disagree with them honestly, enjoy their friendship, explore your thoughts about one another candidly, work together for a common goal and help one another achieve it."

Finally, to the boys remaining here in 2010 and beyond, always remember it is a privilege and not a right to attend Hale and it is your choices which will determine your experience. Whilst each and every student will leave Hale with a different level of attachment to school, you will never lose the friendships you forged, the memories you shared, and the education you received here.



HOUSE REPORT

All in all, 2009 has been a successful year for Buntine House. I would like to thank Mr McFarland and Mr Barugh for being awesome mentors for the boys this year, and also the Buntine prefect team, James Weir, Jackson Merrey, Paul Oliver and Chris Burch, ensuring that all the House events were well organised and ran smoothly.

The final House event was the traditional Buntine Sundowner, organized by the Year 11s. This was held on a calm October evening and here we said farewell to the Year 12s. To conclude, the memories that have been created during my time in Buntine House will be everlasting throughout my life after school.







HOUSE REPORT

2009 has been another successful year for Havelock House, which is testament to our energetic Head of House, Mr Bonnin, and his Assistant, Mr Venables. A dedicated and enthusiastic group of House Prefects - led by Captain, Oliver Johnston, ensured a sound year for all involved, be it in the sporting arena, musical or dramatic performances. The organization of the leadership groups allowed little to be left to chance. This, along with a positive culture of active participation, was crucial in the achievements and accomplishments of 2009.

The Interhouse Swimming Carnival is traditionally a strong point for the House however having lost an extremely strong group of Year 12s from last year, we were out with a point to prove. It proved to be a triumphant start to the House Sport calendar, as we placed third in the carnival - missing out on 2nd place by the smallest of margins. We managed to set yet another high target for next year's group, who should share equally high expectations for the coming year.

The rest of the summer sport season may not have been as successful as the swimming, yet there were still some outstanding results that should be noted, such as our tennis players finishing in second place, setting the scene to be the top performing Havelock House team in the summer season.

With the onset of the winter House sport season, we were always looking to improve, and the senior House football team is a perfect example of how hard work will pay its dividends to those willing to put in the effort. The team finished a very pleasing third place to be the highest placed day House. It will,

again, be a tough challenge for the boys of 2010 to equal, if not better, this outstanding result.

Another fantastic result for Havelock this year was its dominance of senior soccer. It was an enthralling victory in the final against Tregonning, who were leading for the majority of the game and with 10 minutes to play, were up 2-0. We managed to sneak back into it and by the final whistle, drew even at 2-2. Havelock was able to win a penalty shoot-out.

While the walla rugby and hockey teams struggled to get to the top of the tables this season, it was not due to lack of effort. The teams were eager and enthusiastic week in, week out, and were made up of a number of young junior students who will have gained valuable experience. We finished 9th and 7th respectively.

The cross country, much like the Swimming and Athletics Carnivals, is a show of House spirit. The boys would remember this particular day for two reasons; firstly, for the pouring rain and windy weather, which made the already challenging course into a grueling event; and secondly, for the immense efforts of all of the boys involved. We were able to place second. The boys should be very proud of their efforts in this event, which proved to be one of the huge accomplishments of this year.

The House Arts Cup is contested over several activities throughout the year. Havelock performed very well in all aspects of the Cup, resulting in us winning it for the second year in a row. Debating starts off the points tally in Term 1, with boys having to prepare and perform their own speeches. House debating is not compulsory, so the effort of all boys that competed must be noted. Overall, Havelock finished third, gaining valuable points for the Arts season to come.

Chess is another early bird in the race to earn the Arts Cup, with boys competing during House Sport time. Havelock placed top in this competition with greats such as Nic Bean and James Wu going down undefeated throughout the competition. This success however, was not reflected in the senior theatre sports competition with the boys scraping into ninth place. This left us relying on the outcomes of the House Arts day and the junior theatre sports to get us the points needed to win.

The House Arts day is always something to look forward to on the school calendar and this year was no different. All boys compete in their respective house choirs and it is always fun to watch and listen to your fellow students singing their selected song, no matter how horrible (or great) they sound. Havelock has a strict regime when it comes to the choir performing on the day and we went in with victory on our minds. Singing a song as an

unpracticed choir comes with its difficulties — our choir fell out of time with the piano near the halfway point, though with guidance from the senior boys and the conductor James Wu, the choir pulled itself back together, finishing in a dignified seventh place.

This left us with the band and junior and senior Art to get us points on the day. The band performed very well, grasping third place behind Parry. Havelock had some of the finest artists in the Year 12 group, and as such they came up with an outstanding piece of artwork which reflected the great amount of preparation that was put into the making of it. Though our art was outstanding, the Buntine artwork secured first place leaving us with second best. The junior artwork had great success on the day securing their victory in that section of the competition.

This left us relying on the junior theatre sports to get those final points which were make or break in the final stage of the Arts Cup. To win the Cup outright we needed to come in third place or better. Riley and St Georges took an early lead, however in the later stages Havelock managed to win the last couple of rounds, gaining the points needed to overtake Riley and end up securely in fourth place. This led us not to win the Cup outright but to share it with Buntine. All in all, the House Arts season was one to remember with every place in every event counting towards the final goal, the House Arts Cup. Even though we are sharing the Cup this year we still add it to the histories of Havelock as third year running having the House Arts Cup in Mr Bonnin's office.

After fifteen years at Hale School, nine and a half of them as Head of Havelock, Mr Bonnin has resigned to accept a new position as Director of Pastoral Care at Great Southern Grammar in Albany, From Term 3 2000, Mr Bonnin built Havelock up, culminating in tying with Wilson for the Cock House Cup in 2006. He has been a wonderfully caring Head of House, expecting a lot from his students, and always stressing their personal accountability. Enthusiasm and a commitment to being the best they can be in every situation have been the hallmarks of Havelock students over the years. Havelock students past and present thank Mr Bonnin for his guidance and help over the years and wish him and his family all the very best for their new life down south.



commended for being lead singer for the first time and performing excellently.



HOUSE REPORT







Each year the creativity of students in the Art department delights the staff with surprises in the new ways they interpret and develop the studio work related to each project. In 2009 activities were diverse and challenging, but as always the boys have risen to the challenge, producing terrific artwork of which they and we can all be very proud.

Year 8 boys enthusiastically scrubbed away at wool tops with soap and water on a plastic-topped table to produce a multicoloured length of felt into which they later stitched map-like forms; they visited the Fremantle Maritime Museum to view the botanical studies made by the first-fleet artists and the French expeditions to our shores, emulating their exquisite work in their own botanical observations and making pressings into clay, formed into superb tiles; others have produced sky-scraper sculptures with out-of-scale animal forms on top; some undertook a thorough exploration of tone, colour, form and style in multi-painting assemblages of self portraits or fruit; and, yet others have manipulated photographs on their laptops to produce distorted, elongated designs to charmingly emulate the paintings of Modigliani in the resultant self-portraits.

This diversity of practice was reflected in all years, with an incredible range of studio project outcomes. Painting continued in popularity and expertise, but ceramics, sculpture, printmaking, textiles, creative photography, graphic design, drawing and glass work was also produced. Once again, our annual exhibition was a superb showcase of the boys' work and this year I was very pleased at the large number of students and families in attendance. It is always a treat for the boys to see their work displayed in such a professional way. In his opening speech, Mr Brett Fullarton, Chairman of the Board of Governors, expressed the Board's commitment to the provision of a broadly based education in which participation in and access to quality experiences in all the arts is encouraged.

A highlight of the year was the different format for the Arts Cup activities. Keen to use the foyer of the new Forrest Library as a display point, senior boys did 'For(r) est Interpretations' on large clear plastic drops using both transparent and opaque paints which were subsequently displayed on the glass windows. The junior boys made sculptures based on 'Fantastical For(r)est Creatures' which were also displayed in


the foyer. This venue will continue to be a wonderful space for the boys' art to be displayed. Michael O'Connell's popular Year 10 "Archie Boys" project was exhibited in the space, the wonderful portraits of many of our Hale teachers attracting much interest and admiration from students, teachers and visitors.

Year 12 Art students were the final group studying TEE Art as the 3AB Visual Art course will replace it in 2010. We say goodbye to this subject in 'fine fettle' as in both the visual inquiry and studio work, this group of students has excelled in maintaining the traditional pursuit of excellence which has prevailed in Art at Hale for a long time.

It is with mixed feelings that I leave Hale after seven wonderful years at this great school. While looking forward with much pleasure to the next phase of my life I know I will miss being part of a very special Art department and school where both the boys and my teaching colleagues, Louise Elscot, Lorna Murray and Michael O'Connell have made each day a joy. I thank them all and wish them continued success in the future.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

The thing that stood out most about the Outdoor Education Programme in 2009 was the congeniality of the staff. In an environment where we attempt to provide opportunities for students to develop teamwork and leadership, the boys could not have found a better group of role models. The catchment for contract instructors has changed somewhat over the years as the diversity and quality of programmes have increased. Hale School has managed to stay at the cutting edge of the Outdoor Education field by keeping a fresh, vibrant and life-experienced staff. With a global community fast becoming a reality, we found ourselves flying a number of instructors in from Victoria and South Australia as well as the odd one from as far afield as New Zealand's alpine peaks. Importantly, many of these interstate and international staff sought work with Hale; such is the reputation of the Outdoor Education programme.

For parents of those fortunate boys who experienced an 11-day Exmouth Expedition with the intrepid Tim Jones, I am sure the tales match up to the enormity of Tim's worldliness. Tim is known best for his many motorless trans-Indian Ocean voyages between South Australia and Indonesia aboard a 21 foot

catamaran. He has been caught in wild seas, windless mill ponds and visited by the odd pirate ship. Fortunately he had less than the pirates did, the tale goes that rather than take, they took pity on him and contributed to his supplies.

Then there are the boys who enjoyed the tutelage of Cory Green, who came to us fresh from Mt Cook in New Zealand where he works for most of the year as an Alpine Mountain Guide. When Cory was not in Mt Cook he was climbing Mt Blanc and exploring the deepest reaches of China's Mountain Ranges. The inspirational effect that the likes of Tim and Cory can have on their charges can often not be measured until some time after the event, a situation that is true of many Outdoor Education experiences.

The instructor pool in general has changed considerably in recent years; most now hold an undergraduate degree and many of them are also trained teachers. This is in addition to the very many instructional tickets that they are required to hold. From the point of view of a Head of Department, it has been easy to manage a quality programme when so many of the facilitators are so highly qualified

and enthused. The fact that they have gelled so well as a team is a bonus but not such a great surprise. Outdoor Education really is a discipline where one needs to live and breather the content to carry off a sense of belief in its value.

I am glad to conclude by saying the sense of excitement and enthusiasm does not wane as the year comes to an end. Hale School and its Outdoor Education Programme will be thrust into the limelight once again in mid-January, when Tim Harley and Greg Harvey present a session on "The Emergence of Surri Kayaking" at the National Outdoor Education Conference to be held in Fremantle.

I trust that some of the ongoing enthusiasm and learning opportunities have a long term effect on the boys; however they have viewed the experience at their time of participation Lastly, congratulations to Preston Sudlow as the deserving recipient of the 2009 Year 10 Mainpeak Outdoor Education Prize.

NULSEN YOUTH PATRON PROGRAMME

The Nulsen Youth Patron Programme of 2009 has proved to be an invaluable experience to the Hale Youth Patrons and committee. As a Youth Patron, I can truly express the significance of the life changing opportunities which the programme has provided on a weekly basis, exposing us to an array of people and situations which have brought about a radical change to the way in which we perceive the lives of the mentally and physically disabled members within our community.

Initially, the visits and programme activities were confronting, as they frequently exposed us to the harsh realities which the disabled members of our community face on an every day basis. Through the story of Nulsen clients such as Mark, we gained a greater appreciation for the difficulty of living with a disability in all aspects of daily life. This profound realisation enabled us to re-evaluate all the amazing opportunities which we encounter on an every day basis, and taught us not to take these for granted, but to embrace them in every possible way.

Not only did we learn about the constant struggle of living with a disability, but the friendships and bonds which formed between the boys and the Nulsen clients exceeded our ultimate expectations of the programme. Through the frequent meetings with the Nulsen clients, we quickly learnt that they were exactly like us, and shared many of the same concerns, aspirations, goals and desires. After a few weeks, we had developed valuable friendships, and didn't see them as clients, but as friends, and by doing so, realised the significant role which the Nulsen programme plays in "bridging the gap" between the abled and disabled members within our community.

The most significant skill which we acquired was the ability to "Nurture People", as the Nulsen mission states. Throughout the duration of the year, we were exposed to the unrivalled support that Nulsen provides for their clients, and the commitment shown by the care takers was second to none. The service provided by Nulsen plays a crucial role in the disabled community, as it enriches the lives of every client, and provides a caring and supportive environment for members to reach their full potential.

On behalf of the Youth Patrons and committee, I would like to thank Mrs Maskiell and Mr Reed, as well as the Nulsen Board of Directors and Debbie King, for their support and commitment to the programme, as this privilege would cease to exist without them. We are extremely grateful.

VIETNAM/ CAMBODIA TOUR

In the early hours of Friday 10 April, 12 Hale boys, David and Miriam Bean, Helen Gray, and Clare, Alex and Jill Maskiell, hopped on a plane destined for Vietnam. This was the moment we had all been planning for and it was to be the start of a truly amazing and life-changing experience.

As soon as we stepped out in Danang, Vietnam, we jumped straight onto the coach to Hoi An. As we were travelling we were able to get a taste for what Vietnam would be like. The hustle and bustle of the roads and the continuous honking of the vehicles both shocked and excited our senses.

Once we had arrived in Hoi An it was time to walk through the streets to our first orphanage, the Hoi An Orphanage which would later become everyone's favourite place of the trip. Walking into the room with the disabled children was a shock for most people at first, but with only a second's hesitation everyone was becoming involved in picking the children up and beginning to get a feel for what the trip would be like. The next day was also spent at the Hoi An orphanage and we all began to form strong bonds with the children. The happiness that we saw on the children's faces as we played with them outside and took them out for lunch was truly amazing. It made all of us feel great that we could have such a positive impact on these children even though their living conditions are far worse than ours.

We then went back to Danang to go to the Village of Hope which is an orphanage for deaf and disadvantaged children. This was another amazing day spent interacting with children, with sport and dancing as well as handing out the donations that we had brought from Perth.

The following day was probably the most moving for most of us as we had to say goodbye to the children we had bonded with at the Hoi An Orphanage. Tears were shed on both sides as we had to part with our new friends. We left feeling that we had made a good contribution to the happiness of these children and this particular experience inspired most of the group to say that they would like to return.

Our next destination was Ho Chi Minh City and once again we got straight into the experience by visiting the Christina Noble Children's Foundation (CNCF). We visited the Social and Medical Centre to interact with a range of children who were either disabled or orphaned.

The next day was once again spent with CNCF visiting the social and medical centre again as well as the shelter for boys which takes boys off the street and enables them to receive an

education. We also visited the Tay Ninh Centre which cares for children who are born blind due to the defoliants still remaining in the soil from the Vietnam War.

As well as visiting these orphanages we also visited the Cu Chi War Tunnels and the War Remnants Museum to get a greater understanding of the reasons for the poor conditions in Vietnam. Both of these experiences were quite shocking to see the effects of war and especially the use of the Agent Orange chemical which is still causing problems to this day.

After a tiring and rewarding week in Hoi An and Ho Chi Minh City we left Vietnam for Cambodia. 2009 was the first year the Hale School Service Learning trip had entered Cambodia, and for everyone this increased both the excitement and the apprehension. We arrived in Phnom Penh late that night after a nerve-racking hour-long flight in a small turbo propelled plane. We met Headmaster Mr Stuart Meade at the airport before setting off for our accommodation.

The next day was a sobering one in which we were able to fully gauge the impact the Pol-Pot regime had on the people of Cambodia. We first visited the Killing Fields where many people were tortured and executed. The memorial filled entirely with victim's skulls serves as a reminder of the atrocities committed during the regime. We then went to the S-21 museum. This complex, which was once a school, was transformed into a torture centre where thousands of people were tortured and held. Many of the rooms were filled entirely with photos of those who were about to go to their deaths. For many in the group this experience was completely overwhelming. We concluded the day with a visit to the Bright Kids Centre. This is a very well managed centre where many Cambodian children are given a chance to reach their potential.

The next day was a day of travel from Phnom Penh to Kampot. On the way we stopped at the Mango Tree Project, a place where children from local villages can interact with each other and learn through play. For too many children, working from a very young age is forced upon them and they are not given the opportunity to play and enjoy themselves. The group interacted with the kids and had plenty of fun.

On the Monday we took part in a short march to celebrate the opening of the Epic Arts Centre. The Epic Arts programme aims to provide physically disabled or deaf children with the opportunity to express themselves through singing, dancing and drama. That night, following the ceremonial opening, we had the chance to get to know the kids by

interacting with them through dancing.

The next day we visited the Athlete's Foot School setup by Ride Aid. We were forced to hitch rides on motorbikes to get to the school after the bus encountered an impassable bridge. We started the day by singing the National Anthem, 'Working Class Man' and 'Wish You Well' before playing volleyball and participating in art and craft activities with the students.

After driving to Sihanoukville early the next day we visited the M'lop Tapang shelter, which gives impoverished children an education and an opportunity to escape their unfortunate circumstances. The centre is really well run and the staff are excellent. After the tour we were challenged to a game of soccer. Our opponents were very skillful but we managed to keep them goalless due mainly to the state of the pitch. Hale lost the penalty shootout but all was forgotten as we belted out our war cry.

After a day of rest and travel we left Phnom Penh for "Hale School", a project funded by Hale School (Perth) and set up by Ride Aid. When we got there we sang our somewhat restrained rendition of 'Waltzing Matilda' before listening to a local politician's half-hour speech. This was followed by the ceremonial ribbon-cutting before we handed donations out to all the kids. Although it wasn't the most enjoyable day of the trip it was probably the most important in that we were able to open a new school that will give many children a much needed education. This was the last event of our epic fortnight trip.

Everyone on the trip was touched by their experiences in Vietnam and Cambodia and ultimately it was a life changing experience. Many of the boys have already said that they would like to go back to Vietnam or Cambodia in the future. I would like to sincerely thank Alex and Clare Maskiell, Mrs Gray and Mrs Maskiell for their energy, support, organisation and kindness on what is a sometimes stressful trip. I would also encourage everyone to think about going on the trip – it is a fun and life changing experience.

SONY CAMP FOR KIDS

The 2009 Sony Foundation Holiday Camp for Kids was a vastly rewarding experience for carers and children alike, particularly in terms of the relationships which were forged over the four days. The camp provides recently graduated St Mary's and Hale students with the opportunity to engage with a special needs child; taking care of that child allows them to display a willingness to work for the benefit of others. The camp has two overriding aims: to provide special needs children with an enjoyable holiday, whilst also providing the guardians and parents of the children with some well earned respite.

Sony Camp proved to be a challenging experience. There were tantrums and demands, tiredness and frustration, but it was a rewarding experience. The Camp helped us to see the person and not the disability - to find that special quality within each child and not to let the child's special needs cloud that special quality.

Meeting a person for the first time can be awkward; however, with the kids this was clearly not going to be a problem. With boundless energy they streamed into the Faulkner Boarding House, leaving carers and parents in their wake — this experience of chasing after children was one we would get used to throughout the ensuing days! The first day would prove to be the most difficult, as each carer had to gain the trust of their child. At times this was made exceedingly

difficult due to the non-verbal nature of some of the children. However, with these initial hurdles overcome, the camp was on track to be a huge success.

There were a number of highlights: sailing at Royal Perth Yacht club, swimming at Beatty Park, the appearance of an armoured vehicle and the sight of forty motor bikes streaming past us whilst sitting on the admin green. However, the greatest memories of the camp didn't come from these events; rather, they seemed to stem from simply colouring with your child, getting to know them, and seeing the person rather than the disability. The looks on the faces of the children with the appearance of Santa - the unbridled joy in their eyes is a lasting memory. However, it was the karaoke machine which brought the most happiness, and the constant renditions of 'Mamma Mia' along with the disco were highlights for all.

The camp culminated with a Christmas Lunch for all carers and kids as well as their parents and guardians. This lunch gave us an opportunity to speak to the parents about their son or daughter and about their experience. The children left, hopefully having had a wonderful time, but it was we carers and assistants who would be most profoundly affected. In our final debrief we spoke of the children with affection, and when it was time to leave, no one seemed to move - we wanted to share our experience with one another,

to tell stories and re-live memories, and it was this common bond which highlighted the enormity of the experience.

A camp of this magnitude does not take place without the efforts of a great many people. To all the staff and former students from Hale and St Mary's and to the parents who helped run the camp, a huge thank you. Your efforts, particularly at bed time and in setting up all the activities, were greatly appreciated by all. To the nursing team, led by Julie Thomas, your support was invaluable and your assistance, not just in the supplying of medicine, but also in terms of management of the children, was greatly appreciated.

Finally, to Jill "the Boss" Maskiell, a huge vote of thanks. Her efforts over the five days were extraordinary. Mrs Maskiell takes on the responsibility of organising and directing the camp, an unbelievable feat when you consider the magnitude of what is being undertaken. Over 20 special needs children, nearly 40 students, a nursing team and various staff all have to be catered for and programs co-ordinated. Extensive information on the children must be compiled, students and staff alike need to be briefed - all undertaken by Mrs Maskiell. From all of the personal companions and assistants at the camp, we unreservedly thank Mrs Maskiell for her efforts. We are undoubtedly wiser and richer for the experience.


AVIATION CLUB

The Hale School's Aviation Club started this year as an offshoot from the Lancair Legacy Project from 2008. Due to the boys' interest in aviation it was the obvious progression that the boys would work on R/C planes as well as helping in the construction of a Lancair Legacy turbo-prop aircraft being constructed on site. The boys took part in projects that range in duration, for example Tushar Bhatia has spent 6 months trying to find an easier method of finding the weight distribution of the aircraft so that there is less paperwork for the pilot to do before he can take-off.

Rohan Mehra and Ashay Shah have been working on the lighting systems of the aircraft, so that the pilots can navigate and read checklists while flying at night. Callum McGlashan has been developing a cowling for the canopy locking mechanism. If the boys are not working on the Lancair Legacy they spend their time learning to fly and then repairing remote controlled aircraft.

This year we focussed on gliders and the rebuild of an old fuel powered trainer. One of the highlights this year was an excursion to Pearce Airbase; home of the RAAF No. 79 squadron. Wing Commander Cordy Hedge (father of Nic Cordy Hedge Year 12) gave the boys a guided tour of the facility including a play on the Hawke 127 flight simulator.

FORREST LIBRARY

Hale's new 1500m² Forrest Library opened for the start of the school year 2009.

Situated near Administration and adjacent to the main student dropping off point, it took only the opening of the new cafeteria area and English, History and Languages classroom block for our new library to become a real focus point in the school. But it was its functionality, flexibility and attractive décor that really drew the boys in. They were quick to make it their own space.

Designed around 'zones of activity', the library provides the ideal spot for all learning styles. Boys work collaboratively in group rooms and class areas, spreading out across tables, sharing ideas on whiteboards; gathering around wireless connected notebook or netbook computers. Beside them others gather around a chess board. Students assemble assignments in the student production area, flick through magazines and pause to check out new resources promoted on large screen media displays. Year 12 private study students have their own quiet area equipped with carrels and computers. Individuals seeking quiet find the Library Retreat, with its individual carrels or casual tub chairs and delightful view, the

perfect spot. Others choose the ottomans at the end of the non-fiction shelves to browse and think. The more sociable prefer to share books on cushioned benches hiding among the fiction shelves, or the curved fun style sofas overlooking an extensive courtyard. Library activities, both formal and informal, spill out into this courtyard space. Giant chess games run side by side with boys reading quietly or together poring over a book or magazine. Those using networked PCs choose either curved desks that invite sharing or an individual spot by the windows looking out into leafy treetops. And the loan netbooks go everywhere throughout the fully wireless environment.

The library provides many settings for productive learning experiences, and the class areas encourage students to move between learning styles as their task progresses from groups of tables to individual desks to a discussion around a small coffee table to stretched out reading along a curved lounge to demonstrating to the whole class using the data projector. Furniture moves and moves back again constantly. These are very exciting learning spaces, supported at all times by a

teacher librarian on duty, but rarely located, at the Help Desk.

The imposing library foyer was designed to display student work and has been awash all year with Arts Cup constructions and 'stained glass' panels; with Year 11 students' hall tables and Year 12 Design and Technology models; with Year 10 portraits of teachers and with Year 8 racing car models.

In between times, others from the Hale community — Parents and Friends; Old Haleians; parents and boys — have enjoyed functions in this wondrous space which spills out into the outdoor cafeteria area and library courtyard. House debates, Leadership breakfasts, Career nights, AGMs, Head of Department's farewell dinner to those leaving at the end of the year, Library parent helpers' cocktail party — the space has been ideal.

Here too, the Forrest Library was officially opened by Mr Andrew Forrest and dedicated by The Most Reverend Roger Herft, Archbishop of Perth on 1 July 2009.

MATHEMATICS GAMES CAMP

In Term 3, four Year 9 students attended the Mathematics Games Camp in Albany with Mr Sansalone. The team comprising of Tom Lymburn, Miguel Forgaz, Michael Warton and Ali Abu Shamleh did themselves and the school proud.

AUSTRALIAN MATHEMATICS COMPETITION

This year, Hale School students did extremely well in the "Westpac Maths Competition". Michael Warton earned a medal and a prudence award for his outstanding performance. The following boys obtained a major prize placing them in the top 0.3% of their year group in their region: Sam Khor in Year 12, Daven Foster and Benjamin Joseph in Year 10; Alan Wang in Year 9, Dan Hoang in Year 8.

MATHEMATICS INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS & ASSESSMENTS FOR SCHOOLS

This year, 182 Year 8 students entered this national competition run by the University of New South Wales. Hale School achieved above the state average in five out of six strands. In the Space and Geometry strand, Hale School's average was the same as the state average.

MATHEMATICS CHALLENGE FOR YOUNG AUSTRALIANS

Three Year 10 boys - Adam Tynas, Ryan Huynh and Benjamin Joseph - were among the top six per cent of nationwide candidates in this year's Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians.

MATHEMATICS OLYMPIAD

Four Hale teams took part in the Junior Maths Olympiad at UWA this year. The Year 9s won the Jack Bana Award for Excellence for the Best Performing Year 9 Team. In addition, Michael Warton was the top student in the individual competition, the only Year 9 competitor to score a perfect 25/25.

The Year 8 team won a shared merit prize for coming in equal second in the competition.

In the Intermediate Olympiad, 6 students from Years 9 and 10 participated in a gruelling 4 hour examination.

SCIENCE & ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

Once again this year, 32 of our most able Mathematics students in Year 9 participated in the Science & Engineering Challenge. This contest, run by Engineers Australia, saw teams of students building bridges, designing air balloons and erecting air cannons amongst many other activities. Hale students emerged in 2nd place, doing a great job representing the school.

NATIONAL MATHEMATICS SUMMER SCHOOL

Benjamin Joseph has been invited to attend the Summer School in January 2010. This is a programme from which the top 100 students nationwide take extra preparation which can lead to selection in the Australian team to participate in the International Mathematical Olympiad (IMO). The IMO is the pinnacle of competition between students of pre-University level from different countries.

2009 has been a year of continued success for Mathematics at Hale School and we look forward to even more success next year.

Could a slap on the leg of a petulant brat constitute assault, or is it just a reasonable way of correcting bad behaviour?

If someone has been emailing an Olympic athlete in a show of patriotic support and then continues to email her after the Games are over, is it stalking? What if he was simply in love and didn't mean any harm; would that make it ok?

How do you make a shoplifting charge stick when the defendant claims the goods were planted on her by an over-zealous and vindictive store manager?

These are some of the tricky questions we had to tackle in this year's Mock Trial competition, fought valiantly by our three teams, 'Hale Hearsay', 'Hale Objects' and 'Hale Executors'

The Mock Trial Competition, run by the Francis Burt Law Education Centre, certainly offers a unique experience. It is like a cross between Debating and Drama. It attracts students who are interested in law, role play, rational argument and thinking on one's feet. There are opportunities to hone your acting and improvisation skills as well as to expand your understanding of Australia's legal system. When we start preparing a case, each team is told whether to take the position of the prosecution or the defence. We receive legal notes and witness statements. We assign

roles and then, over several weeks, we prepare our case and learn our material. As in sport, no matter how much preparation you do, you don't know what the other team will come up with, so the trial itself is dynamic and suspenseful, with each team hoping to gain the upper hand by throwing everything they can at the opposition while still adhering to the rules of 'the game'.

We were assisted this year by Legal Consultant, Janette Tavelli, who helped us to understand the finer details of the law, how to phrase our questions and how to construct our arguments. Her assistance was invaluable.

Trial nights are never dull. It starts with the quiet tension of pre-trial nerves as teams gather outside the courts, sizing up their competition. This gives way to the studied concentration required by the trial itself. Then students from a range of Perth schools spill out of the courtrooms, buzzing with the thrill of having fielded a tricky question or objection, and discussing the justice of the final verdict. Sometimes the passionate performance of a particularly ruthless competitor has created a stir, and other times it's caused by the Judges themselves, who come with their own quirks and personalities.

This year, the drama was enhanced by being X-rayed for weapons and escorted through the shiny new District Court by security guards. Rounds Two and Three were held at

the Supreme Courts, a beautiful old building with the heavy atmosphere of a Friday night BBC legal drama.

This year, participants for Hale were very talented and committed, with many being awarded Symbols for their contributions over the past two years. Special mention must be made of the outgoing Year 12s: Jordan Hurley, André Burton, Giles Kenny, Oliver Johnston, Tom Taylor, Joshua Hirsch, George Cunningham, Matthew Lim, Stephen Bignell and Richard Wills. These boys participated in Mock Trial to complement several other co-curricular activities, showing that it adds its own distinctive flavour to the smorgasbord of co-curricular opportunities offered at Hale School. It is pleasing to note that there was a great deal of strength and interest amongst the younger competitors, too, and this augurs well for next year in which we hope to improve our win/loss ratio.

COMMERCE REPORT

Eight Year 12 Accounting students were invited to attend the Curtin University Accounting Experience this year. The programme allows Year 12 students to complete the first year university Accounting 100 unit as an extension to their school studies. Selected students are also offered an opportunity to attend the Price Waterhouse Coopers (PWC) traineeship interviews. Two of the boys selected to attend these interviews were successful this year. Stuart Mack and Liam Bennett-Menezes will start working for PWC while studying part time in 2010, joining nine Old Boys recruited from the Curtin Accounting Experience in the last four years. Stephen Bignell and Lewis Wood should also be congratulated for securing interviews for a paid internship in 2010. Liam was also presented with a cheque for \$100 as the Institute of Chartered Accountants Most Outstanding Accounting Student for receiving the highest score in the programme.

Five Economics students accompanied Mr. Grahame Lowe to the State Chamber of Commerce and Industry Student Economics Forum. Jonathan Ng, Stuart Mack, Josh Reid, Harry Williams and Stephen Bignell discussed contemporary economic issues that impact society, government and business in preparation for their final year Economics studies.

Our top Economics students also took part in the UNSW PWC Economics Competition. Cash prizes were awarded to Shaun Marnewick and Joshua Reed for their outstanding performance in the competition.

Joshua was also the winner of the Institute of Chartered Accountants Most Outstanding Economics Student \$100 cash prize for receiving the highest Hale School score.

Our Year 12 Business Management and Enterprise students produced three DVDs for sale to the Hale School community. The class raised \$975 from sales and donated the funds to the Heart Foundation in honour of Nicholas Bean.

Year 9 Justice Money and Markets and Year 10 Commerce students were kept busy watching events unfold during the Global Financial Crisis and media discussion relating to interest rates, the sharemarket and government were keenly followed and applied to theoretical teaching. Year 9 excursions included a visit to Parliament House and a trip to the Fremantle Magistrates Court to observe case law in action and extend students' knowledge of the justice system. The Hale School Year 10 Sharemarket Game winners were highly successful this year, ranked 5th in the state and 28th nationally from 14,798 syndicates. The winning Hale syndicate partnership of Aiken Lim and Robert Yeoh made almost a thousand dollars a week in a dynamic trading environment.

After a short hiatus, Hale School once again participated in the Young Achievement Australia Programme. The programme is a nationally run competition in which students create a company, produce a product, sell this product and gain experience on how to run a successful company. The programme aims to

give students real experience in the business world, in a risk free environment. This year, seventeen Year 10 students established a company called Futya (pronounced 'future'), The group, under the direction of Ms Maree Harden, produced and sold over 500 ecofriendly shopping bags. The company was very successful and won several awards at the Young Achievement Australia state presentation ceremony including the Secondary Business Plan Award and the Secondary Marketing Initiative Award. We also had three finalists in the Business Person of the Year Award. We congratulate Robin Chab, Timothy Rossiter and Luke Yeo, who won the state award and flew to Sydney to compete in the National Competition.

CHEMISTRY

It has been a very pleasing year in Chemistry and it is encouraging to see numbers increasing. The boys are often engaged in practical work that is closely linked with the curriculum, and students enjoy this and learn well from the experiences. The Year 12, 2008 Chemistry cohort finished top in the state and we are very proud of that achievement. I, along with my colleagues, have been impressed with the work ethic and competitive nature of the 2009 Year 12s, and their results to this point have been excellent.

To achieve consistently good results there needs to be two main reactants – intrinsically motivated students and diligent, knowledgeable staff. The product is, as mentioned, consistently good results which keep coming because we never allow the system to reach equilibrium. We are constantly adding new students each year, the staff continue to learn and produce excellent learning material and environments for the boys, and the product is continually removed, reviewed and improved.

Personally I would like to thank the staff in the Chemistry Department, Katie Feutrill, Andrew Dean, Joe Zlnay and Jean Frost for all their hard work and collegiality. The level of willingness to work together in all facets of the teaching profession is one characteristic that sets Hale School apart from other schools I have experienced.

During the year the department offers Monday lunchtime tutorials. You have probably heard about them in your son's report. Two, if not three, of the Chemistry staff are in there assisting the boys who choose to attend. For me, that is terrific. We also run an afternoon tea sponsored by the Chemistry Department that is actually calculations club. The boys say it is the Milo and food that get around 20 there every Wednesday after school, but I like to think it is the challenging calculations that persuade the boys to attend. Again, this does not happen without staff offering the extra time that is needed. On behalf of the department I would like to congratulate Andrew Dean on achieving his Advanced

Teacher Level 1. He is a prolific producer of quality learning materials, a role model for the boys and colleagues, and a good bloke. The standard of his presentation and portfolio was, like his chemical demonstrations, outstanding.

This year students participated in external competitions, exams and a conference. Two of our most promising Year 10 students, Rohan Mehra and Tommaso Guiata were invited to attend CHEMECA 2009 at the Burswood Entertainment Complex on the 29th of September. This is an annual regional meeting of chemical engineers and industrial chemists from the Asia-Pacific region. The boys enjoyed the experience of seeing what new and innovative ideas were being considered for a world that faces many environmental and industrial challenges. Perhaps one day Rohan, Tommaso and other Hale graduates will be the people we look to for viable solutions.

The top 30 Year 10s and the top 30 Year 11s took part in the Rio Tinto Big Science Competition and did themselves and the school very proud. Our Year 10s finished 24% higher than the state average, and the Year 11s finished 17% above the state average. State wide there were 16 students who achieved a perfect score in this test. Hale had 7 of them! Congratulations to Benjamin Joseph (Year 10), Daven Foster (Year 10), Robert Ferrito (Year 10), Scott Howieson (Year 10), Tommaso Guiata (Year 10), Michael Home (Year 11) and Tavis Bennett-Menezes (Year 11). These boys were invited to Scitech where Mr Toss Gascoyne, the director of Australian Science Innovations, presented their awards. It is worthy to note that 5 Year 11s missed a perfect score by one question. Out of the 60 competitors, Hale achieved 14 High Distinctions, 20 Distinctions, 22 Credits and 4 Certificates of Participation.

Ten of our top Year 11 Chemists were invited to participate in the Chemistry Olympiad National Qualifying Examination. In preparation, the boys are loaned a first year university chemistry text and given 3

extra tuition sessions, run by members of the department. The examination is very challenging, and is designed to identify the highest of thinkers. All our candidates did very well. Tavis Bennett-Menezes, Andrew Gorter, Eugene Teo, Darren Tan and Adam Wilkinson all achieved high distinction, which is an exceptional result. Michael Home, Daniel Chu and Callan Adler all achieved distinctions and Jeremy Tan and James Abbott both achieved credits. I would like to thank each of these boys for having nearly a 100% attendance at the extra tuition sessions and really having a determined attempt at this very difficult exam.

This year we again had our entire cohort of Year 10, 11 and 12 Chemists participate in the Royal Australian Chemical Institute Chemistry Quiz. At Hale all students in these years studying Chemistry participate, whereas many other schools merit select their candidates. That aside, the results were encouraging. The Year 10s finished 14% above the state average, the Year 11s finished 9.4% above and the Year 12s finished 8.1% above. Out of all our candidates, we received 71 high distinctions, 62 distinctions and 38 credit awards. Two students achieved a perfect score, which is rare and exceptional - Daniel Marshall (Year 10) and Sean Kelley (Year 12). Well done!

As mentioned previously, the Year 12 cohort has impressed us with their work ethic and competitive nature. We had three students at the top, separated by a whopping 0.04%. Congratulations to Samuel Khor, Jack Farrell and Shrey Sharma who shared the Chemistry prize for 2009. Well done to all the Year 12s for completing a rewarding year in Chemistry, and we look forward to seeing how their TEE results stack up against the rest of the state. I am confident they will do Hale School proud.

We look forward to seeing the boys back in the lab in 2010.

LANGUAGE WEEK

The theme for Language Week this year was music. They then presented the results of their research in the form of posters, colourfully displayed in the foyer of the new library. Other activities included Year 10s writing and performing French rap songs, Year 9 students participating in a highly amusing musical quiz with sound effects provided by Mr Parish, and chocolate croissants and sushi being sold in the quadrangle. There was also a whole school quiz, with the staff prize being won by Ms James, who proved that her general knowledge extends far beyond mathematics.

FRENCH SCRABBLE CLUB

This year saw the introduction of the French Scrabble club, which proved to be very popular with Year 12 students. Much fun was had by all and the proceedings included plenty of vociferous challenges to some, at best borderline, French words. Club president Sam Howieson showed great generosity in presenting a trophy to be awarded annually to the club champion who, in its inaugural year, was Michael McManus. Members were presented with a specially made badge in the form of a Scrabble tile representing the letter F. It is to be hoped that the club will expand next year to include other year groups and possibly interschool competitions.

EXAMS AND COMPETITIONS

Both French and Japanese students performed well above the national standard in the Australian Council of Educational Research Assessment of Language Competence Certificates. This testing conducted throughout Australia and New Zealand is a highly valuable pedagogical tool because it permits a comparison between Hale and the national average. In French Certificate 2 (Year 10), Hale had 73.7% of students gaining either a Distinction or a High Distinction (national average 39.3%) and in Certificate 3 (Year 11) the difference was 61.6% to 40.4% in Hale's favour. In Japanese Certificate 2, Hale scored an astonishing 100% in the top range as opposed to an Australian average of 40.1%, and in Certificate 3, a commendable 40.9% (national average 21.3%).

As in previous years, Hale students were successful in the Alliance Française examinations. This world-wide organisation, dedicated to promoting both the language and culture of France, offers students the opportunity to experience an externally set and corrected written examination.

In Western Australia more than 1000 students in Years 10, 11 and 12 compete for places in the finals. The top 30 students in each year group are then invited to participate in an oral examination to determine the final 10 prize winners. Hale did well, with 9 students reaching this final stage. In the Year 10 category Adil Khimasia came 5th and Tommaso Guaita won first place and a trip to La Réunion island.

JAPANESE STUDY TOUR SCHOLARSHIP

Congratulations go to Brandon Hayward (Year 11), Conor Lourey (Year 11), Jay Therry-Lim (Year 12) and Matthew Yeoh (Year 12) who have each won an Experience Japan Student scholarship with AFS Intercultural Programs Australia. They will travel to Japan

for a 2 week, all expenses paid cultural tour, in December.

In 2007, the Japanese Government launched the JENESYS / AFS Experience Japan Program in order to help strengthen and promote mutual understanding within Asia.

The programme provides students from Asia and Australia with the chance to immerse themselves in Japanese culture on a fully funded, two week scholarship. The scholarships are worth \$8,000 each and include flights to and from Japan, food, accommodation, medical insurance and study tours.

The Hale boys are four of 39 WA students who have won scholarships out of a possible 240 across Australia, with over 2000 students applying this year. They are outstanding young adults and will be excellent ambassadors for Australia, both in Japan and among the participating students from ASEAN.

The scholarship gives students the incredible experience of taking part in a six day home stay and a school visit together with cultural and historical study tours.

Students will have social and cultural interaction with Japanese citizens. This will provide an excellent opportunity for students not just to experience the Japanese way of life, but also to understand it.

Once again, Hale's reputation for excellence in languages is confirmed. Heartiest congratulations to all our students on achieving such outstanding results.





A brief synopsis of each game is as follows:

The first 10 minutes were all Hale and we did not allow Aquinas to score a high total but they showed great determination to frustrate us into turnovers and too many missed shots, and this proved

to be the difference.

Hale 60 defeated Wesley 50. Top scorers - Matthew Taggart (23) and Tom Mitchell (11). Matthew Taggart was in excellent form and dominated in the first half. It looked as though Hale was positioned to have a big win, but Wesley fought back strongly in the second half and it took a series of excellent plays by Tom Mitchell, Xavier Davidson and Tristan Sawyer to see the team home.

Christ Church 90 defeated Hale 49. Top scorers - Matthew Taggart (9), Tom Mitchell (8) and Tristan Sawyer (8). This was our worst performance for the season. Nothing went right and Christ Church punished us in all facets of the game. Our own errors were exacerbated by the fine play of our opponents, and there was little that we could do about it.

Scotch 60 defeated Hale 52. Top scorers – Michael Niezner (16), Leigh Ashby (15) and Tom Mitchell (11). This game could have gone either way. Our defence was very good but an inability to score a decent total proved to be the difference.

Trinity 85 defeated Hale 58. Top scorers – Matthew Taggart (19), Michael Niezner (9) and Rhys Bedford (8). The 27 point margin in favour of Trinity did not reflect the competitive nature of the contest. With about 10 minutes to play the margin was only 8

points. Trinity were good enough to steady and eventually ran away with the game.

Hale 84 defeated Guildford 78. Top scorers – Michael Niezner (20), Tom Mitchell (16) and Luke Falconer (13). This win (in overtime) resulted from Hale playing with true grit and energy. Halfway through the second half it appeared that Guildford were going to take the match comfortably. All Hale players lifted and we had a chance to win the game in regulation time but a well executed drive to the basket by Tom Mitchell resulted in the ball rolling off the ring, forcing us into overtime. A good win to Hale School resulted.

For the Year 12 group — Xavier Davidson, Leigh Ashby, Tristan Sawyer, Jay Therry-Lim and Michael Lam—thank you for your positive attitude and willingness to persevere through a season where there were many difficulties. It is a credit to you that you always gave of your best and focussed on improvement.

Tom Mitchell, Matthew Taggart, Luke Falconer, Michael Niezner, Lukas Geidans and Rhys Bedford – thank you for your efforts. You have great potential to be the core of a very competitive team for 2010. There are very good prospects for Hale to regain its status as a leading contender for the Blackwood Cup next year.



All boys were determined to improve their skills, and they worked particularly hard at their on-court awareness. They learned to show patience on the court, waiting for and creating opportunities to score.


Their attitude and good spirit were most commendable, and led to a very successful season in every respect. I enjoyed coaching the Year 8C team.





2009 was a disappointing season for Hale water polo, considering it was even among the competitive teams. Year 12 players leaving will look back on opportunities missed, wayward passes and near goals that could have resulted in close wins rather than demoralising losses.

This leads me to ask the question, what makes a champion team?

Is it players who are committed to each other and prepared to work toward a common goal? Perhaps players who want to contribute and do not want to leave winning the game solely to one player? Or is it players who adhere to their role as well as take opportunities?

These are questions that each player should know the answer to and endeavour to reproduce them when training and playing games.

The next group of players will need to learn from their experiences and make the necessary changes in their approach to training and how they play the game in order to overcome obstacles that inevitably fall in the path of finishing a season undefeated.

The Fairest and Best winner and Captain, Philip Salter, led the team with a steely determination, both in games and at training, all season. His parents Greg and Louise Salter kindly held the season windup and presentations at their home after the last game, where the presentation of trophies and awards for the all senior water polo teams took place.

Thomas Sangster should be congratulated on his Most Promising Year 10 Award for his efforts in the pool.

I would like to thank all the parents who turned up on Saturdays and supported their sons and the school. I encourage all current players' parents to come down to Trinity pool and cheer for Hale early next year.

Lastly, I would like to thank Haydn Jackson, for his contribution to training the water polo squad and his dogmatic approach to fitness.

Although season 2009 saw mixed results across the board, one thing that was certain was the amount of effort put in by every rower in every year level. With the Head of the River being raced at Champion Lakes for the first time, 2009 was a historic year in PSA rowing. Hale competed strongly in every regatta, with certain crews standing out every week. On Head of the River day Hale underperformed in some races, which cost us valuable points. Hale ultimately finished equal 6th with Wesley in the Hamer Cup.

The season started early in Term 4 with an intensive program set by new head coach Mike Higgins. General fitness was developed for the term and then maintained over the summer holidays for rowing camp, a week of blisters and soreness. This put the crews in great shape for the coming season.

The Year 9s had a consistent season with all crews placing well throughout the competition. With many boys new to rowing, all performed to the best of their abilities. The 9As came 3rd on Head of the River, with the 9Bs just missing out on 3rd. Liam Vandenberge and Jack Hill won the Crewman awards for these two crews. The 9C and 9D crews placed 5th and 6th on the main day respectively, with Craig Law and Kane Parker receiving the Crewman awards. It is hoped that this Year 9 group will develop to produce winning crews in the near future.

There were several factors that affected the Year 10 group season. Numerous crew changes

and injuries caused a disrupted start to the season, however the 10A VIII, coxed ably by Jesse Gerbaz, came home hard and notched up some impressive results towards the end of the season. Their 7th place in the Head of the River was not a reflection of how hard each boy worked, or of their performances for most of the season. The 10Bs, coached by Mr David Bean, had one of the most impressive seasons out of the whole shed, placing 3rd in many of their races. They finished the season placing 6th. Stroke Liam O'Shea received the Crewman award for 2009.

This year Hale did not have enough numbers to field quads teams, however we did manage one senior quad which performed very well given the circumstances. Not having a crew in every race did cost us on Head of the River day: the points we could have received from the 9E race and 2nd quad would have put us a lot higher up in the Hamer Cup. The senior quad, stroked by Crewman award winner Nick Towler, placed well throughout the season.

The 3rd VIII were the pride of the Hale boat shed. They outperformed every other crew (including the 2nd VIII) stroked by the inaugural Clubman's Award winner Daniel Dixon. They also finished 2nd in the big race and were consistently placing on the podium, week in and week out. Sean Whitehead received the Crewman award, showing that even small guys can do big things.

The 2nd VIII struggled to find winning touch this year and performed poorly at

the beginning of the season. However, they improved their time over the next race by almost 30 seconds, which is a testament to how hard each boy worked for their crew. Sadly, they failed to position better than last every week, although this does not reflect the crew's attitude. Stroke James Harvey was the recipient of the Crewman award.

The 1st VIII, coached by Mike Higgins, were strong throughout the whole season. Stroked by Nick Bremner, the crew was in the thick of it for most of the season, however they failed to capitalize on several opportunities. Placing second in the 1000m sprint at the Wesley regatta was proof to the PSA that Hale 1st VIII was not going to be a push over. Hale placed a commendable fourth to a very fast Trinity crew. Congratulations to Rob Sandover on winning the Crewman award.

The season would not have been possible if it wasn't for the work of several key people within the shed. Mr Forbes did an excellent job in his first year as Master in Charge, Sandy Burt always maintained the boats in good condition and Mike Higgins led the shed with his coaching techniques.

All the best to every boy who continues with his rowing. Let's hope Hale can push up to podium finishes in the very near future.





The 2009 Hale football season commenced with an air of anticipation and promise. In a new initiative, we were for the first time to play all schools home and away in the same season. The pre-season appointment of former Melbourne, Fremantle, Claremont and Hale boy Jason Norrish to the coaching staff was to strengthen our midfield operations.

The football displayed on tour in Melbourne this year was impressive as the mature bodied group dealt well with the conditions and opposition. An early indication of our improved depth was also evident, with a number of Year 12s (destined not to play at 1sts level in 2009) providing a significant contribution.

Hale 1st XVIII burst onto the scene in 2009 with a blistering first 15 mins of football, scoring the first 4 goals of the quarter into a strong breeze and having Aquinas on the back foot. Goals late in the quarter to the opposition allowed them to claw back and eventually steal the game.

A full squad was available for selection against Guildford at Craig. The side went on to record their best goal kicking feat of the season with 28 goals, 19 of those coming from players not available in Round 1.

After a tight contest in the first quarter away to Scotch, the side was able to break the game open to win by 15 goals. The new look defensive unit, under the guidance of Brian

Clarkson, had held the opposition to 6 goals each in the previous 2 weeks.

After the bye we were confronted with a Thursday afternoon fixture at Hale against Wesley. With the entire school on the side lines, Hale 1st XVIII produced one of the best first quarter exhibitions of football seen at Craig Oval (8 goals), and we went on to win by 123 points.

The fixture against Trinity was crucial to the outcome of the season, and the first half lived up to its billing with a tight, physical struggle. A strong 3rd quarter, scoring 5 goals to 1, opened a break that eventually led to a 12 goal win against a major competitor for the 2009 Cup.

Solid victories against Christ Church and Wesley paved the way for a top of the table return clash against Aquinas. Aquinas started strongly with an early physical battle and an altercation late in the first quarter. A 3 point margin at half time and a 1 point margin at 3 quarter time set the stage for a thrilling last stanza. A strong, committed Hale had control of most of the play but struggled for accuracy, until 2 late goals sealed a position equal on top of the Alcock Cup ladder, with one loss. Hale scored 3 goals 9, to 1 goal 3 in the last quarter in a memorable victory at Craig Oval.

A return from the break produced a solid victory over Guildford and set up our last

fixture at Craig against an improving Scotch. What was billed as a danger game was beyond doubt at the end of the first quarter, with a 9.2 to 0.1 stunning display.

The team prepared extremely well for the penultimate contest, away against Trinity, but the opposition adjusted to their familiar conditions sooner and scored 4.5 (with a strong breeze) to nil, in the first quarter. Hale fought their way back into the contest to trail by 10 points at half time. A brave contested effort in the 3rd quarter was able to leave an achievable 15 point margin to make up in the last quarter, with the aid of the still strong breeze. Trinity scored first, but the group continued to rally until a scrambled soccer goal at the 21 min mark saw Hale in front for the first time for the day, by 4 points. The celebration was not to be, with Trinity working the ball forward and scoring an outstanding goal at the 23min mark to secure victory by 2 points.

Hale 1st XVIII for 2009 are Alcock Cup winners jointly with Aquinas, with both finishing on 10 wins, Hale having a superior percentage of 115%. Preparation, effort and consistency brought the team great reward for 2009, and the Year 12 representatives who were such excellent contributors — not just this year, but in some cases over 3 years, have left a lasting legacy for future years of Hale football, upon which we can build.





Games against Cranbrook, Trinity and Barker College brought a mixed set of results with one won, one lost and one drawn, but the tour enabled the coach to get an impression of players' strengths and encouraged the team to bond and form what we hoped would prove to be a tightly-knit group of players for the upcoming season.

2009 was the first year where two full rounds – home and away – have been played in the PSA competition. The season began in earnest on 2nd May against a team that has, over recent years, provided a relatively straightforward fixture for Hale. Indeed Hale had not lost against Aquinas since 2003. As the game progressed it became apparent that either the 2009 Hale squad was surprisingly weak or the Aquinas squad was particularly tenacious. Clawing back from a 2-0 deficit, Hale was relieved to scrape a 2-2 draw, but we left the field somewhat shocked by an usually difficult fixture.

The season progressed with largely predictable results. Christ Church, Hale's bogey team of 2008, was despatched on two straightforward occasions, as were Wesley and Guildford – the latter suffering a 7-0 defeat by Hale early in the season. However, two significant surprises came against the teams that have competed, along with Hale, for honours since 2005.

Scotch provided our third fixture and it was this game that represented the nadir of the season. A woeful performance saw Hale go down 1-4 with the agony of the players matched, and perhaps surpassed, by the agony of the coaches watching from the touchline. With few post-match answers, it seemed that two early goals led to wholesale collapse in the Hale defence, and the forwards could not find a way through to compensate.

Trinity, always a strong contender for the Lawe-Davies Cup, arrived at Hale for the 5th fixture of the season and provided, arguably, the game of the season. Hale managed to get an early goal and showed great resilience in the face of a typical Trinity onslaught. Hale's defence played an extremely strong game and blocked Trinity at every attempt.

After the success against Trinity, it seemed that nothing could stop Hale and the race to the Cup was back on. A string of 7 successive wins — a feat not achieved since 2005 — left the team feeling all-conquering. The euphoria was enhanced even further by the knowledge that ten out of the regular squad of fourteen were below Year 12 and had at least one more season in front of them.

Hale met Scotch in Round 12, ready to avenge the earlier loss and make the title even more secure. At the end of the game, however, all connected with Hale soccer must have left the ground wondering what it was about the Scotch team of 2009 that caused such difficulties. The 0-1 loss only compounded the earlier 1-4 defeat; the slightly less severe score line offering little in the way of compensation as the path to the Cup suddenly began to crumble away.

So it all came down to the final game. Depending on the results, Hale, Trinity or Aquinas could have won the Cup. Although a mathematical algorithm was necessary to calculate the different outcomes possible, for Hale it came down to this: Nothing less than victory at Trinity was acceptable. And on Saturday 14th August 2009, in what must have been the wildest, windiest conditions of any 2009 game, Hale lost its chance to secure the Lawe-Davies Cup.

A deflated team trudged into the changing rooms after a second half in which everyone gave their utmost in an ultimately futile bid to claw back from a losing situation. Within 80 minutes the team had gone from getting their fingertips on the Cup, to losing it. Aquinas, 4-0 winners of their final fixture and worthy opponents of Hale in the very first round, had secured the Lawe-Davis Cup.
