HEADMASTER MR STUART MEADE

Excerpts from Speech Day Address
Friday, 3 December

At the commencement of Term 4 this year, we held a 2 day Leadership Development course for boys in Year 11. It was voluntary, certainly not selective and 117 boys turned up. On the first morning they were involved in a panel discussion with four members of the wider community who were making a difference through their leadership in their professional lives. One of the panellists was our guest speaker today. Mr Ken Wyatt spoke quietly, with conviction and with authority. I will introduce Mr Wyatt a little later as we are very fortunate to have him address us today and present the awards.

2010 has been an extraordinary year; settling 28 new teachers, bedding down the new Middle School, dealing with the demands of the National Curriculum which became the Australian Curriculum, which was to be implemented in 2011, now not implemented but trialled next year, providing opportunities for every boy to excel, in classrooms, on sports fields, on the stage or in so many other co-curricular activities as boys strive for success and enjoyment, engaging in the government funding debates, trying to understand how NAPLAN can possibly be used as the be-all of determining the worth of a school, or coping with the rise of IT developments and social networking as the biggest challenge to students' acceptable behaviour; there has been something for everyone in the past 12 months.

It will be tedious for all here today were I to launch into the pros and cons of the Australian Curriculum. The American writer and futurist, Alvin Toffler points out "The illiterate of the 21st Century will not be those who cannot read and write, but those who cannot learn, unlearn and relearn". While the new curriculum may inform us what to learn, it is still in our jurisdiction to decide how to learn. Information literacy, digital literacy, guided inquiry, differentiation, and meeting individual student's needs, are all approaches to learning that are occupying teachers' minds at present.

We have launched into our implementation phase and I can guarantee you there are many people, schools and other authorities having a close look at what we are doing. David Bean and the curriculum leadership team have charted a course that has involved staff from Junior, Middle and Senior schools reviewing the current curriculum and bringing it into line with the national requirements. Even if the federal government delays or commissions further re-writes of the documentation we are confident that the work undertaken this year will stand us in very good stead for the eventual outcome. The work of staff in this area has been significant.

In a document published by the Independent Schools of Queensland this year, Norm Hunter urges schools to speak for themselves with confidence about their achievements; not ignoring or dismissing quantitative data such as Year 12 or NAPLAN results but insisting that they be used as they were meant to be used and balancing them with the depth and power of human, qualitative data. Many experiences that cannot easily be measured in the life of the school, both in and beyond the classroom, generate deep learning; learning that occurs through experiences that enrich the lives of the students and empower them for the challenging world they already live in.

The challenge for us is to speak for ourselves in ways that firstly identify these experiences and secondly, elevate them to the status that is currently accorded to the hard data of the media league tables and MySchool website. A further challenge is to do this without denigrating the role of standardised testing in education; or appear to be covering up for any genuine failings that might exist on the part of the school.

Schools are urged to confront the concept of transparency by redefining it in the spirit of light pouring through a transparent glass prism, displaying the true rich colours that make up the life of a school.

Some of those true rich colours at Hale could reveal the 117 Year 11 boys who volunteered

to attend the aforementioned Leadership camp during their Term 3 holidays, or the Year 8 boys who competed with such success in the da Vinci Decathlon, or the huge cast of the Guys and Dolls production this year. Just as colourful would be the 30 or so senior students who, whilst on their post-exam break, spent last weekend putting together a pantomime to perform to local schools earlier this week, as well as the 25 Year 12s who return to be part of the Sony Camp next week. Those occasions and decisions result from the culture that exists in the school. We must guard it jealously. Just as colourful was the sporting highlight for me this year; not the fact that the 1st teams in football, rugby and soccer won their PSA competitions, but the moment the players joined forces after the final whistle in the final football game on Craig Oval to share each other's success. The culture of the school is on the right track if that can become the norm. When we learn that 39 boys in Year 10 put their names forward to be part of the Nulsen Youth Patron Service Learning programme or that \$40k has been raised this year to be presented to the RideAid charity, we should be factoring that into our consideration of the worth of the school.

Further, when a boy leaves school, I suspect the memories that remain will not always be the lessons on quadratic equations and split infinitives. The things we remember are the things that amuse and the things that shape. The school that wishes to sculpture character in students also needs to gift them with memories that matter. The classroom will mould the mind, but it is the job of the school to mould character. This must be done in partnership with the home and must be done outside the classroom.

There is absolutely no doubt in my mind that alcohol and technology will bring down this generation of young people more than anything else. Accept that at Hale we will take a very conservative stance on teenagers drinking alcohol. When I read of families letting their Year 12 sons/daughters go to Bali for Leavers Week as the drinking restrictions are almost non-existent there, I despair. On a couple of occasions this year, I have been presented with transcripts of Facebook conversations that have taken place among boys sitting in this room. Usually it has been by a parent wanting to make a point about the unsavoury nature of the communication. It is extremely deflating, not only for what is written but for the time at which the conversations take place. The commentary defies belief and the use of offensive language pervades so much of what has been written. We know that a recent study of internet usage in Australia has found that the peak time for young people to be on the internet is 12.30am. Please, if you take nothing more from today, do not let your son have his computer in his bedroom where his usage is not monitored. In fact I would sit down right now if I could get a guarantee

that everyone here would do this, but given that 80% of Year 8s put up their hand when I asked earlier this week if they had access to their computer in their bedroom, I am not sure the message is getting through. Please, please for your benefit as well as ours, accept this advice. It is a battle worth having. I also invite you to invoke the 'bucket rule' for mobile phones – put all phones in a bucket in the kitchen at 10.00pm and leave them there for the night.

The article on the front page of The West two weeks ago detailing how a teenage boy has been convicted for child pornography offences – for allegedly sharing inappropriate images of a girl with others via his phone – is a sobering example of the naivety of youth when it comes to the legal ramifications of their internet and social networking practices.

We ask a great deal from those prepared to teach. We expect them to know their subject so well they can "throw open window after window into the future" for each boy. We expect them to thoroughly like what they are doing. In many occupations that is not essential; there are other motivating factors. But a teacher deals with the young, and the young, although forgiving of mistakes, dislike insincerity and will not respect the bearer.

We expect teachers to like all their students. They need to like them for their youthfulness, aggravating though it may sometimes be. We expect teachers to know their students. Teachers learn about them by mixing with them, out of the classroom, in a range of settings, watching endeavour, selfishness, bursts of great warmth and thoughtfulness, silliness, fear, hopes. There are rewards in this but there is also a huge investment in time and emotional energy. On top of this we expect teachers to know much else. They cannot be mentors unless they are interesting people, who belong to the real world. They must also have good memories, willpower, kindness and a very good sense of humour to keep it all in proportion. What an 'ask'! And how important is it for us as a school community to recognise it – and to provide support. I extend my warmest thanks to the teaching staff and I ask you to join me in thanking them for their commitment and efforts throughout this year.

At the end of 2010 we are farewelling three long-serving members of staff.

Mr Phil Dook is retiring after 25 years of loyal and committed service, as a teacher of Physics, as Head of Haynes House, as 3rds hockey coach and devotee of the chaos theory of coaching, among so many contributions. Roger and Helen Gray have decided to 'call it quits' after a combined total of 63 years at Hale. Roger's 41 years have seen him do just about everything there is to do, from Head of Department, senior sport coach, overseeing the Outdoor Education programme, Head of House of both day

and boarding houses, secretary of the Old Boys' Association...the list goes on. Helen has helped redefine the role of the teacher/librarian in her time here and both staff and boys have been the beneficiaries of her knowledge and dedication. She was also an outstanding Head of Riley House for many years. There is no doubt their departure will be felt by many of us for quite some time.

I would also like to acknowledge Richard Tongue's time in boarding as he leaves the role as Head of Faulkner House after 13.5 years. His time has been characterised by compassion, advocacy for 'his boys', and pastoral care and the odd nano-nap during the day.

So to 2011 and the challenges and opportunities that await: the aforementioned curriculum issues, a year without any building programme but a focus on facility renewal, ongoing evolution of Middle School practices, a new Chairman of the Board and continued enhancement of student leadership opportunities. To that end I would now like to announce the School Prefect team for next year. Before I do, I wish to thank Kevin Bush, the Captain of School this year, and his prefect team. While some prefects had perhaps a lower public profile than previous years when they were appointed, their work ethic and commitment to the roles they had were outstanding. Kevin was a superb leader of this group. He knew when to be strong rather than popular, he led by example and as a role model. I have worked with none better.

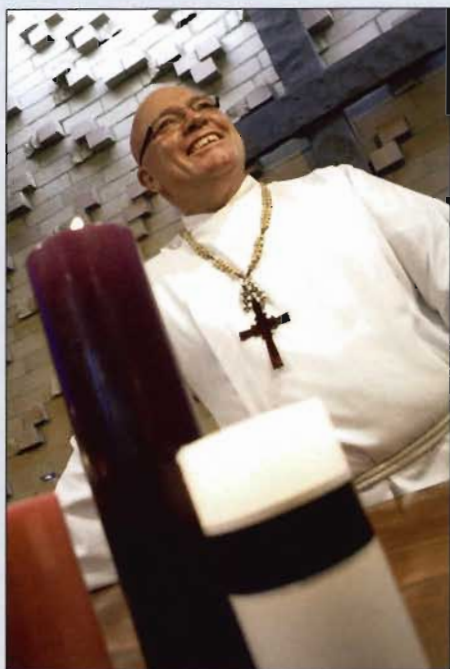

As I sit and begin to write for the Cygnet magazine I wonder "Where has the year gone?" It just seems like yesterday that I was at Rowing Camp and as far as the year is concerned the Year 12's are almost finished their WACE exams. WOW! When you work at Hale life certainly goes at a pretty rapid pace.

As I look back there have certainly been some challenges, but these have been overshadowed by the many highlights. As I reflect, I think of the Governor's Prayer Breakfast, Darren Reynold's presentations in Chapel for World Vision, House Arts Cup, House Athletics, House Swimming, Football of all codes, Guys and Dolls, Sunday Family Services, Evensong in St Georges Cathedral with the Cantante, Father's Day Breakfasts and Chapel for the Junior Primary and Senior Primary, Weddings, Baptisms and the Annual Confirmation, just to name a few.

Thirteen boys (David Ingram, Robert Ingram, Thomas Ingram, Robert Ferritto, Rourke Moynihan, Andrew Huxtable, Andrew Kelly, Daniel Wells, David Buckley, Shaun Huxtable, Jacob Augustson, Matthew Gadenne, Austin Sheard) offered themselves for Confirmation this year in what was a significant step or as some put it a "Rite of Passage" in their faith and spiritual journey. This year I was privileged to lead the 2010 Prefects in a short Chapel Service before their final Prefects meeting. We have had these services either at the beginning or end of each term to help develop their understanding of leadership. In one service we explored the thoughts of Steve Matthews who submits that everything he needed to know about Life he learned from running!

One of his thoughts which I put to the prefects was that coming in first or last doesn't matter... finishing well does.

He says: In a Marathon, unless you are an elite runner (probably from Kenya), it matters little whether you come in first or last. What matters most is first, that you even dared to run, and then second, the manner in which you run and finish.

In short, success or failure in a Marathon is not measured by the time on the clock or by the number of people who cross the line in front of or behind you. Rather, it is measured by miles you have placed behind you, the wear on your shoes, the sweat on your face, and ultimately, having crossed the finish line – whatever your time is – that you are spent, and that you can look back on the race as having put all your energy into the effort.

Steve Matthews goes on to say, "It matters less the positions we hold, the money we make, the toys we accumulate, and the treasures we lay in store for ourselves than how we run our race or races of life. And finally at the end of our long run, whatever the length, that we are spent, nothing left. That we run well, no regrets, and nothing but joy in our hearts for the journey we've made, and the people we made it with."

At the end of the year I was moved by the story Duncan Lissiman told in the Valedictory

Chapel Service about his trip to Vietnam/Cambodia under the heading "Being a Man for Others". Here is a little of what he said. "After a few ice breakers, a few of us sat down with a few of the children to use some of the art supplies we had brought them. I was sitting next to one boy named Tola, who didn't have any arms from about the elbow down and had prosthetic feet. After a few minutes of watching the other kids draw, Tola motions for me to hand him a box of Faber Castell pencils and some paper. From then on, he managed to take out a pencil and start drawing some lines on the page, using his stubs of arms, all by himself.

My first thought was, "that's pretty cool, a kid without any fingers able to use a pencil!" A little while later I realised that he wasn't just sketching random lines on the page, but he was actually drawing the castle from the Faber Castell box of pencils – at an amazing level of accuracy.

He went on to finish the castle, using a variety of other colours, and I was very honoured when he gave me the finished product. This experience on day one of the tour taught me, and the rest of the group who were equally amazed at Tola's sketch, to see the ability, not the disability in people.

My point here is that while being a Man for Others is not necessarily a display of character, it definitely is a way to develop it. The way these children dealt with adversity on a daily basis and the character and strength they showed inspired all of us on the tour to try to do the same; as they let their own light shine, they unconsciously gave us permission to do the same."

An interesting thought as we continue to follow those two great commands of Loving God and our neighbour as ourselves.

A SNAPSHOT OF HISTORY, LEADING TO A VISION FOR THE FUTURE

Many of you already know that Hale School is the oldest independent boys' school in Western Australia. Founded in 1858 by the first Anglican Bishop of Perth, Dr Mathew Blagden Hale, the School moved to its present location in Wembley Downs in 1961 from Havelock Street in West Perth.

The shortage of playing fields and the increasingly inadequate facilities at Havelock Street influenced Chairman of the Board, WL (Bill) Brine and Headmaster, Dr Arnold Buntine, to search for a more suitable site. With this in mind, they purchased 198 acres in the Tuart gum bushland known at that time as Herdsman's Lake and today, measured in terms of the metric system we now use, the current campus is set on 48 hectares.

After some time and thwarted by the outbreak of the Second World War, the foundation stone for the new site at Wembley Downs was eventually laid in 1958. Tuition began at the commencement of 1961, with John Prince at the helm as Headmaster and the first lesson given to Year 1 pupils by Miss Doris Green, who had been a staff member for 35 years. It was at this campus where the new House system was implemented, namely Buntine, Faulkner, Haynes, Loton, Parry, Riley, Stirling and Wilson, most of them named after prominent Old Boys or past headmasters. Stirling was later changed to Tregonning (named after Dr Ken Tregonning, Headmaster 1967-1988) and in 1990, two new Day Houses were added, Havelock and St Georges, to commemorate former School sites.

Quarry tracks were the only access into Wembley Downs when the School opened

its doors and the roads were only improved when the Perth City Council created and built more in preparation for the Commonwealth Games at Perry Lakes stadium in 1962. By the 1970s, the area was almost completely developed. Mr John Inverarity was appointed Headmaster in 1989 and during his tenure, significant advancements were made in the cultural and technological aspects of the School's curriculum.

The Peter Wright Technology Centre was completed in 1994, taking Hale School to the forefront of Australian education in that area of study. In 2000, the magnificent John Inverarity Music and Drama Centre opened its doors to a new generation of drama and music students in this state.

In 2010, the School continues its outstanding record in all fields of endeavour – in the arts, the sciences, on the sporting field, in the laboratories and on the stage. In 2011, we look forward to celebrating our 50th year at Wembley Downs, focusing on how Hale School has served and interacted and with the local community over this period and highlighting characters who have attended the School and have since been instrumental in colouring and forging important changes and events in WA's history. We also look forward to the coming decades with a confidence that the young men graduating from our institution in the future, will continue the rich example set by the many who have already built a profound heritage, leaving an indelible 'footprint' as leaders in the affairs of this state and the country. It is opportune, therefore, to remind our readership of the Vision and Values that underpin the spirit of Hale School.

WACE RESULTS 2010

Hale School Year 12 students of 2010 continued the School's tradition of excellence in achieving outstanding results in the WACE examinations.

Of the 188 Hale boys who sat for the WA Certificate of Education examinations:

- 96 students (51%) achieved an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank or ATAR of 90 or higher, placing them in the top 10% of students throughout Australia.
- 61 students (32%) achieved an ATAR of 95 or higher, putting them in the country's top 5%.
- 33 students (17%) achieved an ATAR of 98 or higher, putting them in the top 2% in the country.
- 19 students (10%) achieved an ATAR of

99 or higher, putting them in the top 1% in the country.

Our three top scoring students were Daniel Chu, Darren Tan and Jeremy Tan, who each achieved an ATAR of 99.9.

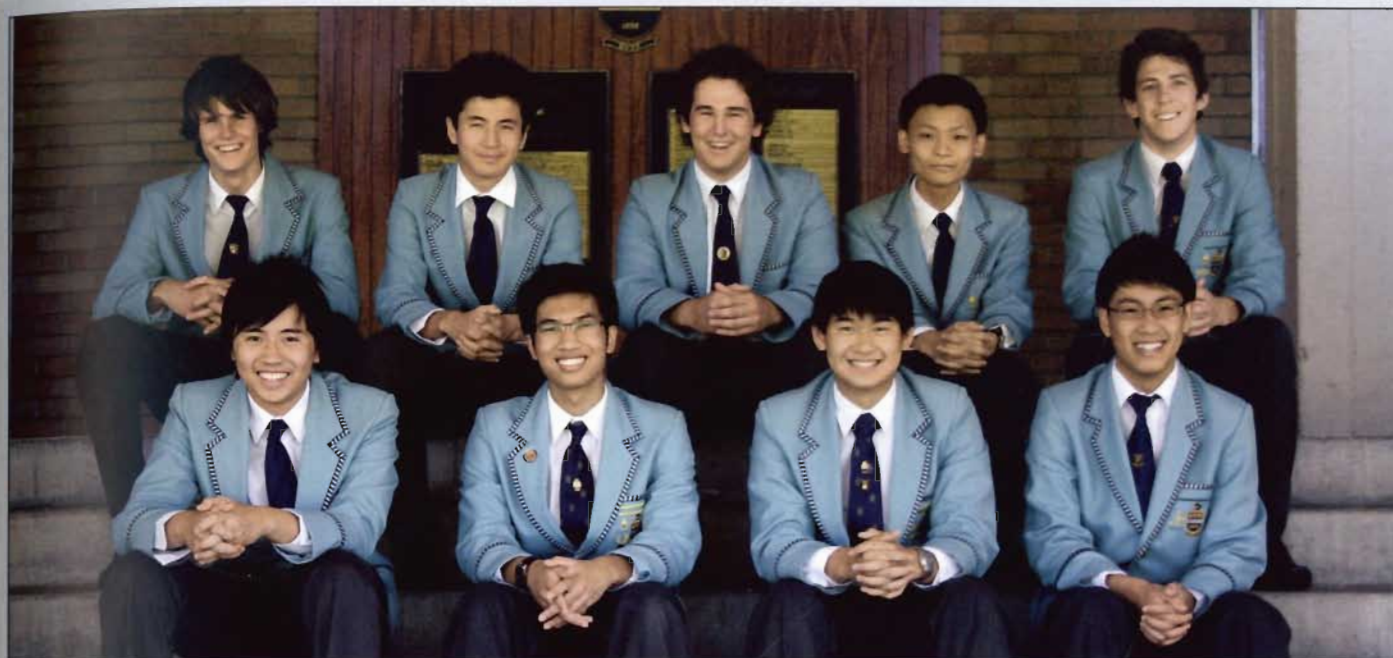
The School's median ATAR was 90.5, the second highest of WA's boys' schools and close to the highest in the state.

Hale School was named in Curriculum Council data showing schools having the highest performing students in no less than fifteen Stage 3 courses. They were: Accounting and Finance 3AB (in the top 7 schools), Ancient History 3AB (in the top 3 schools), Applied Information Technology 3AB (in the top 6 schools), Biological Sciences 3AB (in the top 14 schools), Chemistry 3AB (in the top 10 schools), Economics 3AB (in the top 15

schools), Engineering Studies 3AB (in the top 5 schools), Human Biological Sciences 3AB (in the top 10 schools), Literature 3AB (in the top 10 schools), Mathematics 3CD (in the top 10 schools), Mathematics: Specialist 3CD (in the top 15 schools), Modern History 3AB (in the top 10 schools), Philosophy & Ethics 3AB (in the top 5 schools), Physics 3AB (in the top 10 schools) and Visual Arts 3AB (in the top 7 schools).

The School is immensely proud of the collaboration between boys, parents and teachers which creates the strong culture of teaching and learning that characterises Hale School.

JUNIOR SCHOOL



As a result of the wider changes at Hale School, the Junior School underwent significant restructuring in preparation for 2010. An additional class was added to Years Three, Four and Six, with two classes being added to Year Five. Of the 300 boys enrolled in the Junior School in 2010, 150 'new boys' joined us for the first time. Considerable planning and preparation were required for a smooth transition, and, with thanks to the professional staff, positive parents and enthusiasm of the boys, we experienced a very smooth start to the academic year, a tone that was maintained. In addition to the families, 13 new staff joined the Junior School team. All in all, the injection of new boys, families and staff enhanced the energy, collective wisdom and collaboration in the Junior School.

As this new and exciting stage approached in the latter part of 2009 the Junior School staff began to collaboratively articulate a Vision that acknowledged the Junior School's present position and an ideal to strive for. Hale School Director of Staff Development, Richard Goater, facilitated a number of team building and 'Shared Vision' sessions that culminated in an agreed Vision Statement pertinent to the Junior School context.

The Junior School declared our Vision to be; An inspirational learning community built upon genuine relationships and the pursuit of excellence, providing meaningful and engaging learning opportunities for boys.

This statement encapsulates both what exists in the Junior School and what we intend to commit ourselves to strive for over the coming years. The Vision Statement will act as a reminder to us as to what we aim to achieve, particularly at this pivotal time when the Australian educational landscape is on the cusp of significant change with the introduction of the Australian Curriculum. The Junior School is eager to implement the Australian Curriculum ensuring that the following Values guide us so as to maintain and enhance our unique setting and identity. The following Values were articulated by the Junior School staff in 2010;

Teaching and Learning – We encourage a lifelong passion for creativity, innovation and learning.

Integrity – We act in a manner which demonstrates respect and engenders trust.

Excellence – We strive for excellence in all that we do.

Enjoyment – Experience joy and satisfaction as part of this community.

There were many highlights in 2010, with the addition of the new Multi-Purpose Hall adding another world class facility to the school. The Junior School Multi-Purpose Hall was officially opened on Tuesday 26 July, 2010. The Hall was funded under the Federal Government's 'Building the Education Revolution' (BER) scheme. While there has been some negative criticism directed to the Government over the value for money of some projects, there are thousands of primary schools around the country celebrating the success of the programme. Hale School is one such success story. The

\$2.5 million facility is simply outstanding. The Hall combines functionality with quality fittings, environmental sustainability and a modern design that complements the surrounds. The architects, James Christou and Partners are to be congratulated. From the Junior School perspective, the construction period was painless. PS Structures ensured that there was very little impact on the day to day business of the Junior School. The Hall is now used on a daily basis for physical education, sport, special assemblies, lunchtime games, drama, dances and class activities.

The Junior School boys continued to shine in 2010, both within the school and wider community. Our boys excelled in academic competitions, art exhibitions, animation festivals, musical events and tours, sporting events and in their general representation of Hale School. Through such experiences there is no doubt that the boys were provided with many opportunities and challenges. For most, there were times when they were daunted or overwhelmed. However, with the support of staff, parents and their peers, the boys have overcome the challenges that confronted them and have grown as a result.

During the Speech Morning I encouraged each boy to reflect upon what they personally achieved in 2010. I reminded the boys that the results of the student next to them was not important, more so the sense that they gave their best. If the boys genuinely believed this, then the reward from within means more than any prize offered. I sincerely hope that all the boys finished the year inspired to continue their Hale School experience in 2011.

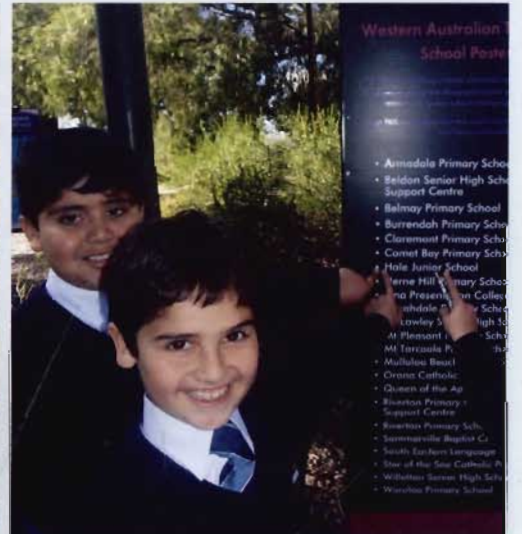

STUDENT COUNCIL REPORT

During the first term, each class group voted on a Class Councillor to represent their class throughout the year. DA VINCI DECATHLON

During June, the Year 8 da Vinci Decathlon team were successful in winning the Western Australian da Vinci Decathlon title at Wesley College.

The Western Australian da Vinci Decathlon is an all day Interschool competition operated in the spirit of an Olympic Decathlon. Teams of eight Year 8 students from each school compete in 10 events of an academic nature. Twenty schools compete for the Western Australian title each year and the winning school and host school are invited to compete in the National da Vinci Decathlon in Sydney during the Term 3 holidays.

The Hale School team, comprising Joshua Dunne (Captain), Reece Clark, Dylan Bremner, Nicholas

Lantzke, Riley Tan, Liam Strickland, Darren Gan and Jonathan Pang, won six of the ten events, demonstrating their wide range of abilities. The challenging events included Engineering, Art and Poetry, Science, Games of Strategy, English, Creative Producers, Mathematics, Forensic Sleuths, General Knowledge and Code Breaking.

Following their victory in the W.A. competition the boys were invited to attend the National da Vinci Decathlon during the Term 3 holidays. The 11 top schools in the country came together to 'Celebrate the Academic Gifts of Australian Youth' and to compete in a final decathlon over three days, held at the prestigious Knox Grammar School in Sydney.

On the first evening a symposium was held where each team was asked to make presentations demonstrating their creative problem solving skills. They were required to choose a specific location in their home state, predict a possible disaster and then design a preventative plan to protect the location. Our boys received very high commendations for their presentation describing a tidal power generator that could also be used to contain oil spills threatening the coastline at Kalbarri.

From the outset it became obvious to our team that they were up against some very high quality opponents from around the country. After three days of competition it was still not clear who was in the lead. Our boys had won a couple of events with style and finished very well in several others. It came as a big surprise at the final presentation when they were awarded the silver medal. Sydney Girls' High School won gold by the narrowest of margins.

In addition to the competition the boys spent time sightseeing in the Sydney CBD with visits to Centrepont Tower and The Sydney Aquarium. The middle day of the competition was excursion day and all of the competing schools took a ferry cruise, walked across the Sydney Harbour Bridge and spent time wandering around Darling Harbour.

The team trained very hard for both the decathlons, giving up many of their lunchtimes to be coached by dedicated staff. Thanks to Mr Bean, Mr Vaswani, Ms James, Ms Depiazzi, Ms Jarel, Ms Watson and Mr Dean for their expert assistance in coaching the team.

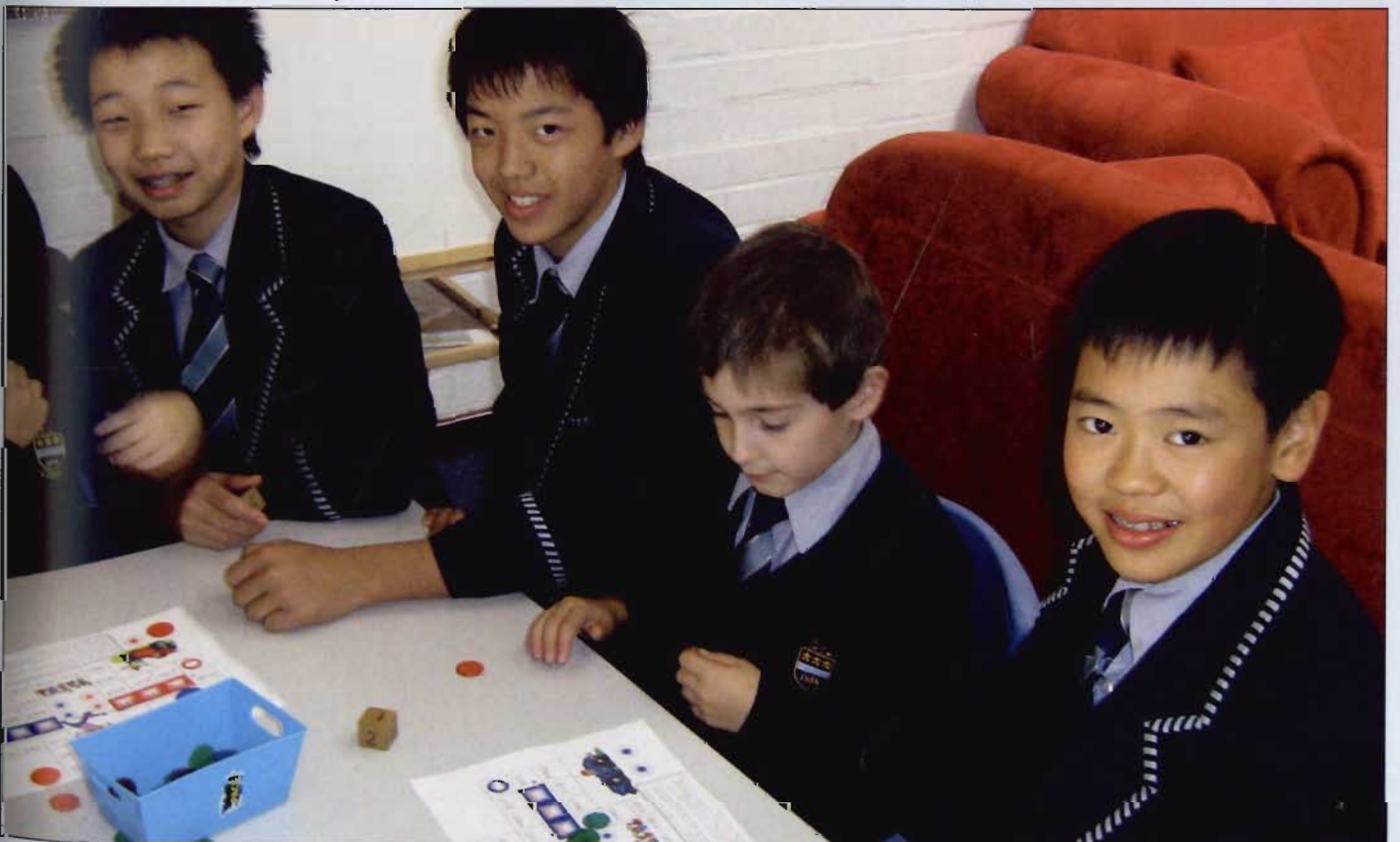
Hale School has a long and distinguished tradition of service to others and our Middle School is committed to ensuring this continues with our boys in Year 7 and 8.

 and I knew this was the start of a great rivalry.

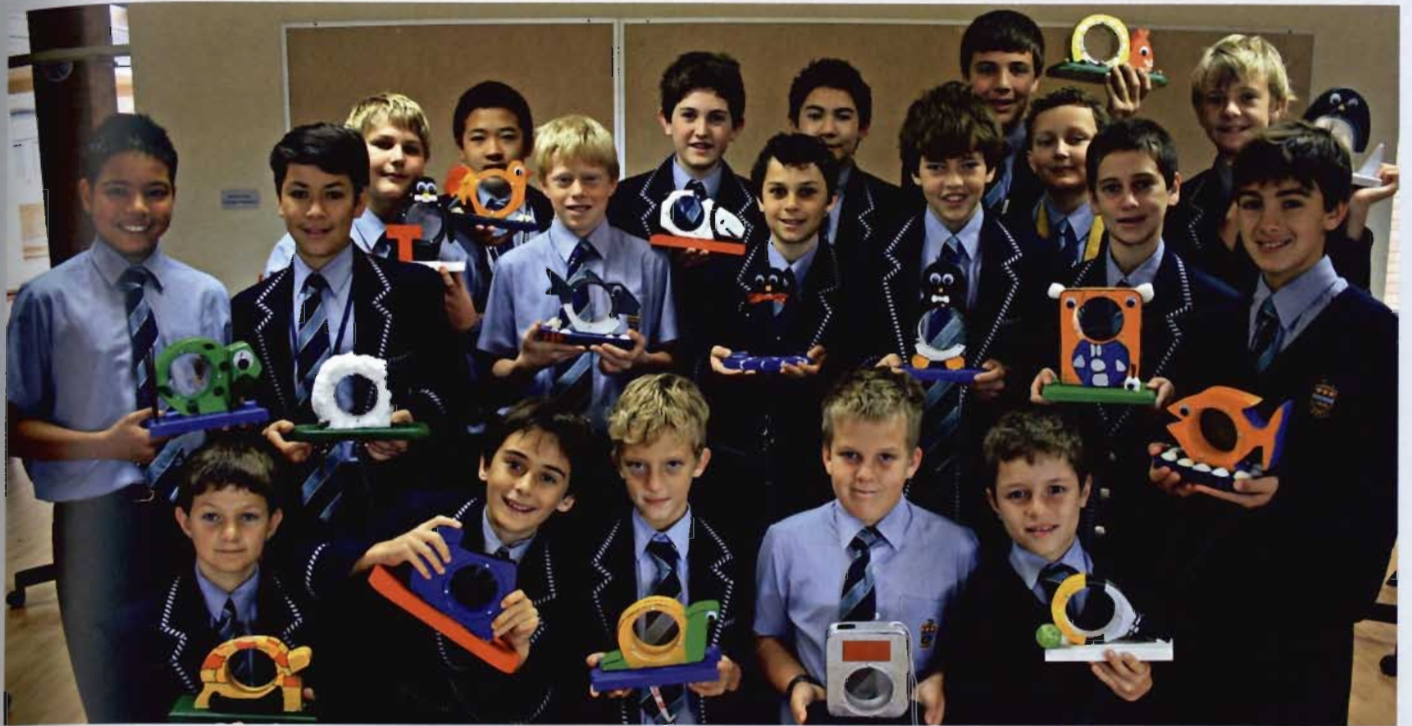

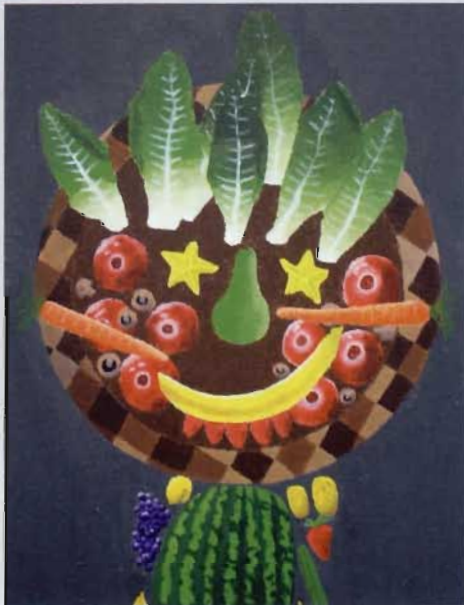

MIDDLE SCHOOL SUMMER SPORT WRAP

2010 was a first for Year 7 participation in the PSA and Hale School had over 300 Middle School boys looking forward to their first taste of PSA sporting action.

The basketball programme welcomed the services of a former State Basketball League player to the coaching ranks. The Year 7s were the beneficiaries of his expertise as the As and Bs both managed to piece together some solid performances in first term to win a respectable four games each. The Year 8 boys found the going a little tougher as they often came up against much bigger and stronger opposition. To the boys' credit they gave their best every week and were rewarded late in the term when both sides managed to defeat Scotch for their first wins.

In cricket, it was a season of mixed success for most teams. The boys performed well throughout the term with several closely contested matches. The 7As and Bs both won four games apiece. The 8As and Cs won two games each while the B team were the best performers of the Year 8 sides, claiming victory on four occasions.

We had over 30 Year 8 boys put their relationships with their parents to the test when they signed

up for rowing in Term 1. After coming to grips with the early starts, the boys were put through some important safe boat handling skills in the first few weeks, and were then instructed on the techniques of scull oar rowing, both in quads and sculls. With a combination of strength and conditioning work at the school gym and technique sessions down at Cygnet Hall, the boys took their fitness levels to new heights!

Hours of training over summer resulted in the achievement of many outstanding personal bests by our swimmers at the PSA Swimming Championships in early March. Hale School finished in second place (960 points) 92 points behind Christ Church (1052 points). This was a great result and our highest finish at the Inters for a number of years. The boys are now more motivated than ever to go one better next year, and are back in the pool training hard in preparation for Term 1, 2011.

In tennis the Year 7 and 8s both went through the season undefeated. The tennis boys led the way for other sports to follow as they swept past their opposition each week without losing a match in all grades. An incredible effort! With a couple of Year 8s being called up to play in the 1st Tennis team on Saturday mornings,

these results are even more impressive!

The Year 7 boys were introduced to volleyball through their Phys Ed lessons earlier in the year; this combined with the compulsory viewing of a 1st team exhibition game and the volleyball programme was never going to be short on numbers! The Middle School boys signed up in droves and displayed a genuine willingness to learn the skills of the game which transpired into some outstanding performances on court. The 7/8/9As won five games, the Bs won three and the Cs were the best performers of the Hale School volleyballers, winning all 6 of their games.

It is pleasing to see that even the oldest Olympic team sport, water polo, continues to grow in popularity at Hale School. Many boys elected to get in the water in Term 1 to escape the heat. This ensured that we were well represented, with four teams competing in the combined 7/8/9 age groups. The A team were the best performers of our Middle School teams with six wins. The B and C teams both had four wins each and the Ds finished the season on two wins and two draws.

**ROGER GRAY**

With the retirement of Roger Gray after 41 years of outstanding service to Hale School, an era comes to a close. Roger's connection to Hale is life-long as his father Dr Lindsay Gray was Captain of School and Dux in 1933 and a School Governor until the years when Roger was a young teacher at Hale in the 1970s. Roger entered Hale (Havelock Street) as a student in 1958 under Headmaster Vernon Murphy and finished as a Year 12 at Wembley Downs in 1964. Roger thus experienced a defining period in the School's history as one of the first generation at the current School site. When Roger was appointed to the teaching staff by Dr Tregonning in 1970 his enthusiasm and affection for Hale was natural and already deep-seated, and did not waiver for the next 41 years. Countless staff appointed after Roger, myself included, have admired Roger's loyalty, professionalism, common sense and good humour. Roger has also been a great custodian of Hale School's traditions and embodies the "memory of the tribe".

Roger made very substantial contributions to the School in five broad areas: as a teacher, a Head of House, a cricket and hockey coach, a leader in outdoor education and as Secretary of the Old Haleians' Association.

Roger was a fine Biology teacher at Hale for 40 years and Head of the Biology Department from 1993 to 2002. Roger's focus on field work, excursions, experiments and learning by observation and questioning gave a practical and experiential character to his biology classes and his period as department head. Countless biology students of the 1970s and 80s will also recall the camps (which were organised by Roger and his colleagues), for marine studies at Point Peron for Years 9 and 10 students, or at Araluen for other fields of biological study.

Roger's first appointment to a senior position of responsibility was as Head of Parry House in 1973. He was then 26 years old and confesses that his early parent interviews as a young Head of House were sometimes challenging. Roger recalls one formidable parent beginning the interview, "You're not very old Mr Gray... are you married?", then appraising Roger in silence. The interview ended not long thereafter. However the inexperience passed quickly and he was either a Head of House or Head of Department for the next 28 years.

After 8 years at the helm of Parry, Roger turned to the challenge of a Boarding House. He was a much-respected Head of Wilson House for 12 years, 1981 – 92, and provided a welcoming environment for many students from rural and remote WA and for international students. Helen, Roger and their three children Annabel, Julian and Elizabeth developed strong relationships with the families of their boarding students, no less than with the students themselves. Knowing their sons were in Wilson House under Mr and Mrs Gray's watchful eyes, gave confidence and peace of mind to many Hale School families from rural WA.

From 1971 to 1988 the School's outdoor education programme focused on Year 11 students and was located in the Hamersley Ranges (now Karijini National Park) and the town of Wittenoom, with student groups led by a staff leader and a young assistant. The staff member in charge of the entire programme had a complex role to fill. Roger Gray was a group leader almost every year of the programme's 18 year history and a superb coordinator of the Outdoor Education Programme 1985 – 1988, living on site in the Pilbara for three months each year, managing supplies and transport from Perth and Paraburdoo to the camp sites, supporting and advising boys and staff in the remote and always challenging environment. As a fitting reminder of the School's outback connections to which Roger Gray contributed so much, the painting "Outback" by the artist Leslie Styles, a long term resident at Wittenoom, was given to Roger and Helen on Roger's retirement.

At short notice in 1989 Roger Gray and Brian Heibner closed down the Wittenoom programme, then planned and set up a new programme at Exmouth, the basis of today's outdoor education experience for Year 10 students.

Roger coached hockey for most of his 41 years on staff. He took the 1st XI 1972 – 76 and many other teams at all year levels in subsequent years. He was also the 1st XI team manager for a number of years when Craig Ashton was 1st XI coach, and organised tours of the eastern states and also, in 2003, to Vancouver British Columbia. Roger was a memorable cricket coach of the 2nd XI for 18 years, 1971 – 88, and in that role he combined excellent coaching skills, the highest standard of sportsmanship and

the ability to transmit his utter enjoyment of the game to the students in his care. The 2nd XI experience was doubly memorable for many boys as the 2nd's went on tour to rural and remote WA from time to time, hosted by Hale families in Pinjarra or the Murchison for example. A dry salt pan on Curber Station became the pitch for a 2nd XI tour in 1978, as remembered by a team member, David Aitken, later a Hale School Board Chairman.

Roger's 41 years at Hale was not unbroken. Roger, Helen and their children enjoyed a refreshing 18 months pause by taking a year's teacher exchange at King's College, Taunton in the UK from mid 1993, followed by further travel for another 6 months.

After stepping down from the role of Head of Biology in 2002, Roger embarked on a new phase in his career. Because the then Director of Development, Alex Panarese was committed fully to the Boarding House fundraising appeal, Roger was appointed to take over the running of all other Development Office matters – tours, marketing and publications. Roger also became secretary of the Old Haleians' Association in 2003. From 2004 onwards, Roger's single focus was to serve – and to lead – the Old Haleians'. His energy, enthusiasm and unequalled personal contacts with the School community over literally a lifetime were now of tremendous value over another critical era of the School's history – the period leading to the 150th anniversary. Roger's role was pivotal in the organisation of the celebrations during 2008, the School's 150th year. He also found time to put together a book during that year – "Snapshots", co-authored with David Aitken. At the end of 2008 Roger organised yet another massive Hale event, "Back to Havelock Street", which was a superb reunion of students and staff from the pre- 1961 era, and also where Roger entered the story of this great school. So many stories...is Roger's summary now, looking back. He also expresses gratitude to Hale for the opportunities offered him, which were always grasped with Roger's characteristic optimism and energy.

HELEN GRAY



Mrs Helen Gray joined the staff of Hale School in Term 4, 1988, as an already experienced teacher, having been a deputy principal at Exmouth District High School and a History and English teacher at other Education

Department schools. Helen has made a significant contribution to Hale in a wide variety of roles over 22 years, but it was as a Teacher Librarian that she was appointed.

Helen was a pioneer in this position and used her teaching expertise to communicate library research skills and the essential skills of information literacy and the enquiry process in both print and digital contexts, to countless boys at Hale.

Helen's experience, professionalism and personal warmth led to her appointment as the first woman to become a Head of House, Riley House, in 1997, a position she occupied for 12 years. Helen was an outstanding leader of Riley House – diligent, compassionate, firm and sensible – and the Riley boys of her era remember her with great affection.

Helen was the first to propose that the School

have an annual House Arts Cup Day, now an institution in the School calendar, and she was a principal contributor to the successful format of that day.

Helen's strong connection with Hale School preceded her appointment to the teaching staff because she lived on campus in Wilson House with her husband Roger Gray, Head of Wilson House, 1981-1992. Their three children, Annabel, Julian and Elizabeth were a part of the larger Wilson House family for 12 years, and Helen's total involvement with the care of Wilson boys and the bonds made with the boarders' parents were highly valued, and depended on, by the School and the boarder parent community.

Helen contributed to the Exmouth Outdoor Education programme as a group leader from 2005 to 2007. She was a swimming coach for some years, and was the organiser of the School's United Nations Youth Association student team.

For many years, the School ran an Interhouse drama competition, which involved an annual three night season of one act plays. Helen Gray directed many House drama productions and contributed back stage to the major school productions. Helen was Cygnet Magazine editor from 1995 to 2000; this was

a difficult job which she accomplished with typical efficiency, commitment and attention to detail.

In 2009 and 2010 Helen contributed to the organisation of the Vietnam-Cambodia Service Learning tours and accompanied Jill Maskiell on the journeys each year. She was an integral part of the important and life-changing experiences for Hale School boys as they volunteered in orphanages and other institutions for children in need in those two countries.

One of Helen's extraordinary, behind-the-scenes contributions which went beyond the call of duty was her annual selection of book prizes for Senior School Speech Day. She knew each boy, so the prize books were individually chosen to suit each student. This was a labour of love, assisted by a substantial budget, requiring many hours in Perth's best bookshops and the results were superb, year after year.

The School is very appreciative of Helen Gray's remarkable and varied contribution over 22 years and we wish her happiness and fulfilment in her retirement.

PHIL DOOK



Phil Dook retired at the end of 2010, a week after his 60th birthday, and after 25 years as an outstanding Physics teacher, a much-loved Head of House and hockey coach, and as a colleague who worked hard to

maintain Hale's high standards in teaching and learning. He occupied the same physics laboratory - S8 - for over twenty years in a period characterised by extraordinary stability and equally outstanding student academic achievement for the Physics Department. For a quarter century Phil has instilled in his students the need to aim for their personal best and to strive for a deep understanding of physics. Clarity, precision and meticulous planning ahead were hallmarks of Phil's teaching that never varied.

Unchanging stability is not the whole picture, though. Phil began his teaching career as a Youth Education Officer, a largely non-classroom teacher role to provide programmes for less academic students in the Government sector. Phil also taught in Zimbabwe 1983-84,

and then at St Mary's Anglican Girls' School before coming to Hale in 1986.

Phil was Head of Haynes House from 1990 to 1995 and did the job with great thoroughness and care. Teamwork, brilliant organisation and methodical forward planning in the completion of any task set were qualities which Phil exemplified in his daily life, and generations of Haynes House students will be grateful that these life skills were practised by their Head of House in their formative years.

After stepping down from Haynes House, Phil was a Pastoral Care Leader for several years. He also inaugurated the Common Room Liaison Committee, to represent issues raised by the teachers' Common Room to the Headmaster or School Executive of the day. Phil was Chair of the Liaison Committee for some time and was always proud of the contribution it made.

Phil led several international tours of Hale students to far flung places - to Africa in 1996, and later a trekking expedition in Nepal. He was frequently a group leader in the School's outdoor education programme to Karijini National Park before 1990 and later to Exmouth and the NW Cape.

He took a semester's leave in 1999 to work voluntarily in a school in Kathmandu, another indicator of his strong values and adventurous streak.

For more than twenty years Phil was the renowned coach of the hockey 3rd X1. The squad was often large, up to twenty students at times, and all were made to feel included and valued. Phil's own prowess as a hockey player and skill as a teacher meant that boys always enjoyed being in the thirds. Phil used the term 'chaos theory' to describe the 3rd X1 and its approach, by which he meant that "If we don't know what we are doing, the opponents cannot predict what we are going to do and therefore cannot plan against it!" Good humour is another feature of Phil Dook's personality.

Phil Dook has been a great servant of the School as a fine teacher and Head of House, a legendary coach and a stalwart of the Common Room. His legacy, for which the School is grateful, is as an example of high standards, great expertise in his subject, unfailing loyalty and hard work which will be long remembered.

*Excerpts from Speech Day Address
Friday, 3 December 2010*

Good Morning,

Chairman of the Board of Governors, Mr Brett Fullarton, Mr Meade, special guest, Mr Ken Wyatt, staff, parents and boys.

Today we are gathered here once again to celebrate yet another successful year at Hale, one which has been particularly outstanding across all areas of Hale life. I personally feel that 2010 has been an ideal representation of what Hale really stands for: records have been broken, obstacles have been faced and overcome, and excellence has been achieved to the highest possible degree in every aspect of the school. Not only have the individual efforts of the students been astounding in many areas, but what has really defined Hale's success in 2010 is the way in which each individual within the Hale community has pulled together, in order to strive for excellence and achieve it, in all facets of the school.

Over the last few weeks, I have had the opportunity to reflect upon my experiences at Hale, and after recalling and contemplating the times and events that I have experienced and shared with my fellow peers, I found myself reverting to one fundamental question: "What will I miss most about Hale?" Whether you experience a 'Hale moment' running onto the field for your debut in a first team sport while being cheered on by your peers, during a frantic huddle on the chairs in Challenge Stadium at the PSA swimming inters, or in the middle of one of our famous Hale School war cries, all of you have the opportunity to experience these moments. Although this may seem obscure to you now, you will know when a "Hale moment" hits you. When you suddenly experience an indescribable feeling of belonging, a transcendent sense of euphoria, or when time slows down, even just for a second, you will feel the immense pride that so many past Haleians have experienced before you, and this feeling defines the "Hale Experience" for me. So today, for the boys that remain, I'm not here to lecture you on the right way to study and go about enjoying your time at Hale, but I urge you to pursue these "Hale moments" in whichever way possible, through any area of the school, as they have changed my life, and so many that have travelled this journey before us.

I can speak for myself and the Year 12s of 2010 in saying that leaving Hale this year has left a void in our lives that will be hard to fill, and the connection that we have had with the Hale School community will last forever. Although it now takes on a different form, our relationship with the school is a testament to the outstanding transformation that takes place within these grounds on a day to day basis, and although the remaining boys may not feel the intensity of this connection every day, it only takes a short term of absence from this community to realise how lucky we as Hale students really are. Personally, I will

be forever grateful for everything that Hale has done for me, and I know that the experiences I have had, the times that I have shared, and the lifelong friends that I have made, have all been a result of the unique Hale School environment which I have been lucky enough to be a part of.

I would like to personally thank Mr Ken Wyatt for his invaluable contribution to this ceremony today. I know that his address to the Year 11s on their leadership course earlier in the year was inspirational to say the least, and I have no doubt that his words of wisdom have inspired a great number of us here today. Thank you, Mr Wyatt.

To Adam Birman (Captain) and both Liam O'Shea and Preston Sudlow (Vice Captains) and your prefect team; I wish you good luck in all the endeavours you undertake next year. I have no doubt that you possess the persistence and enthusiasm to help maintain Hale as the outstanding entity it is today. I wish you the very best, and hope that you learn and thrive from the challenges which face you in 2011.

Lastly, to the boys who remain, I would like to ask one simple favour from each and every one of you. Put everything you have into your involvement with this school, and strive for personal excellence in all that you do on a day to day basis. As Lucius Seneca, a famous Roman philosopher once said, "luck is when preparation meets opportunity", and I have no doubt that your endeavours will be kindly rewarded during your time at Hale, but only to the extent to which you are willing to work for them.

I wish you the very best for the future. It has been an honour to be part of the Hale School Family, and I thank you for your time today.

We went into the cross country with high expectations of a top 5 finish in the Cock House Cup and ended up in 3rd place, and the Year 7s runaway winners of their year group.

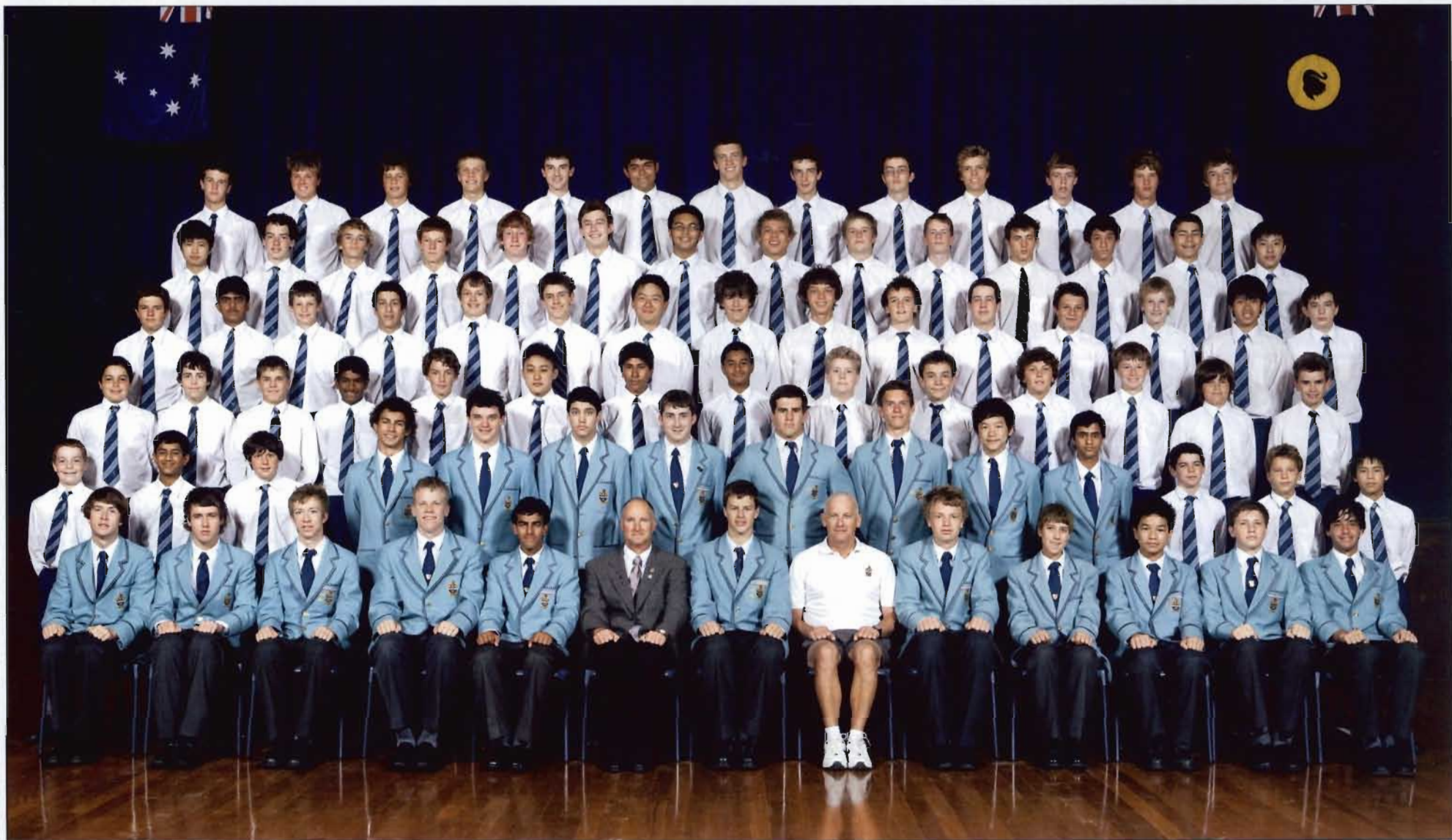

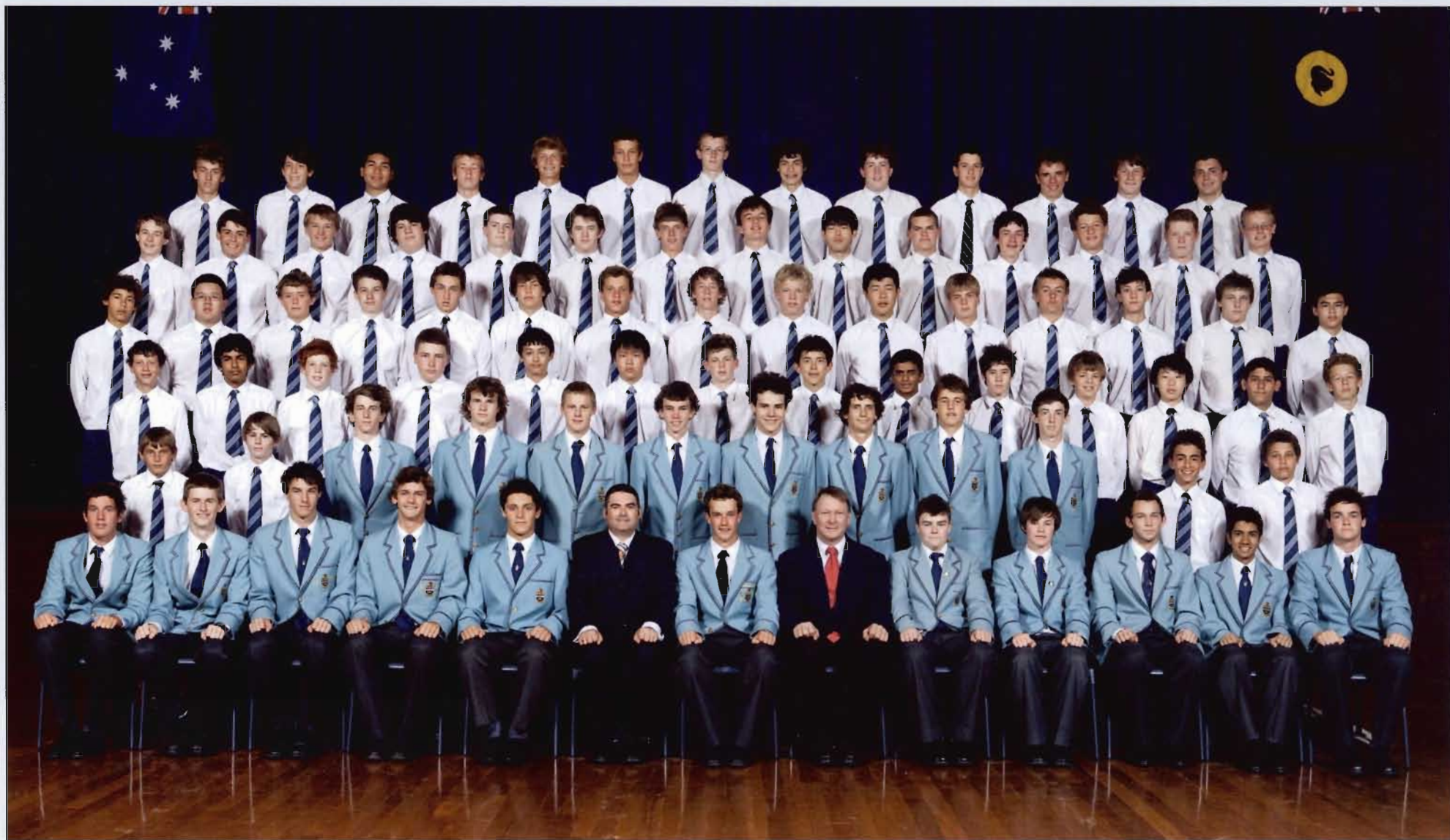
Athletics in recent history has been somewhat dismal for St Georges House, but in 2010 we

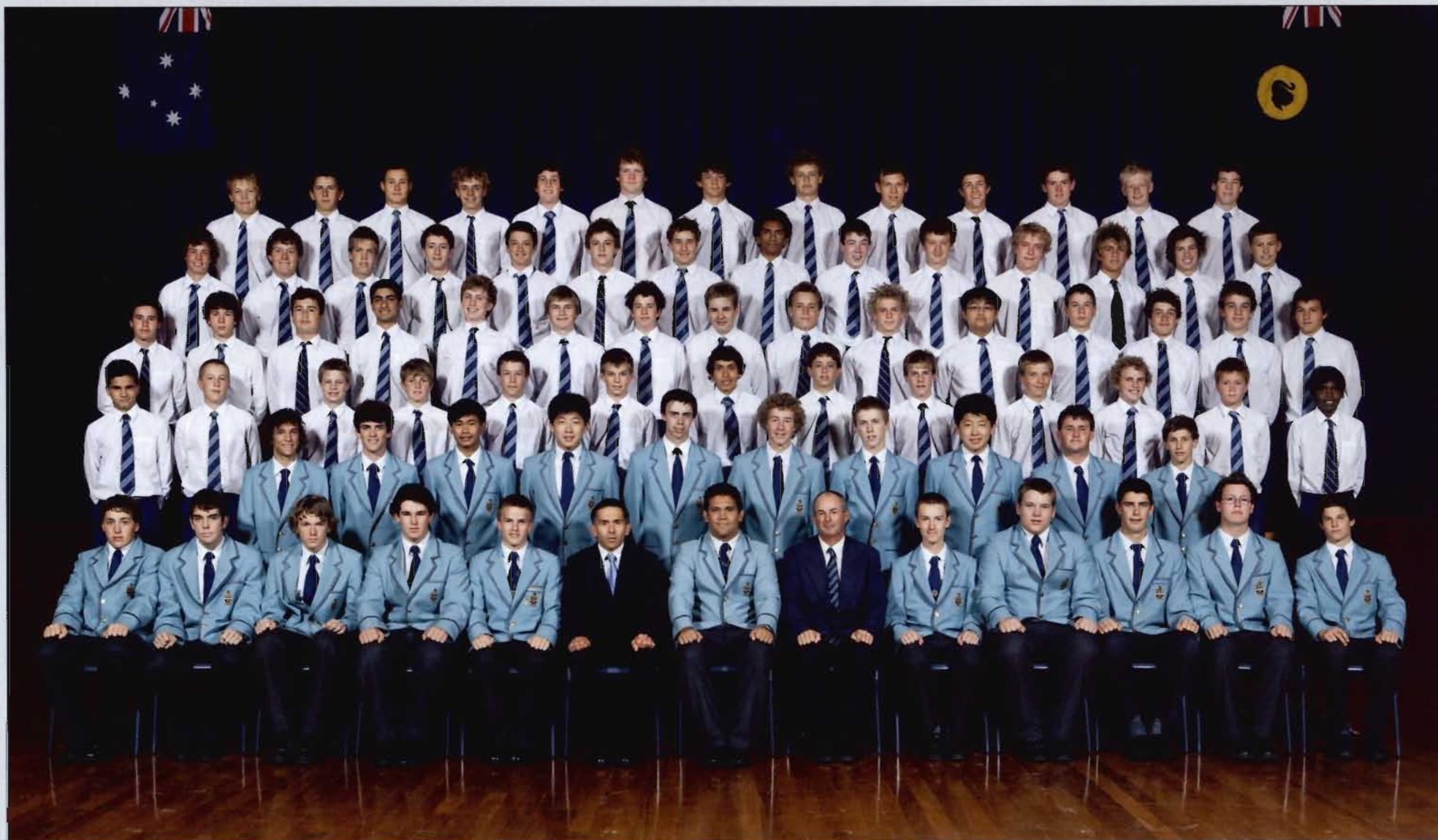
At some point every house spends time out of the top 5 and Tregonning, after at least

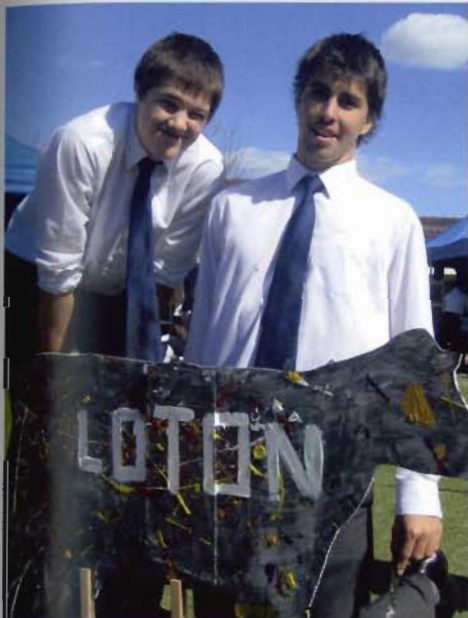

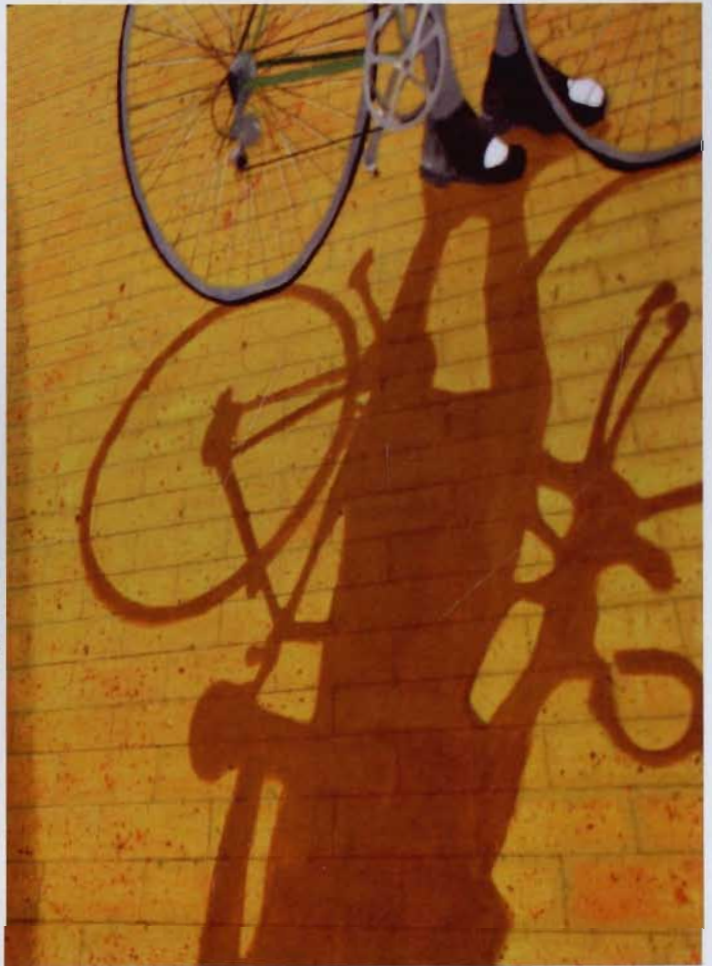
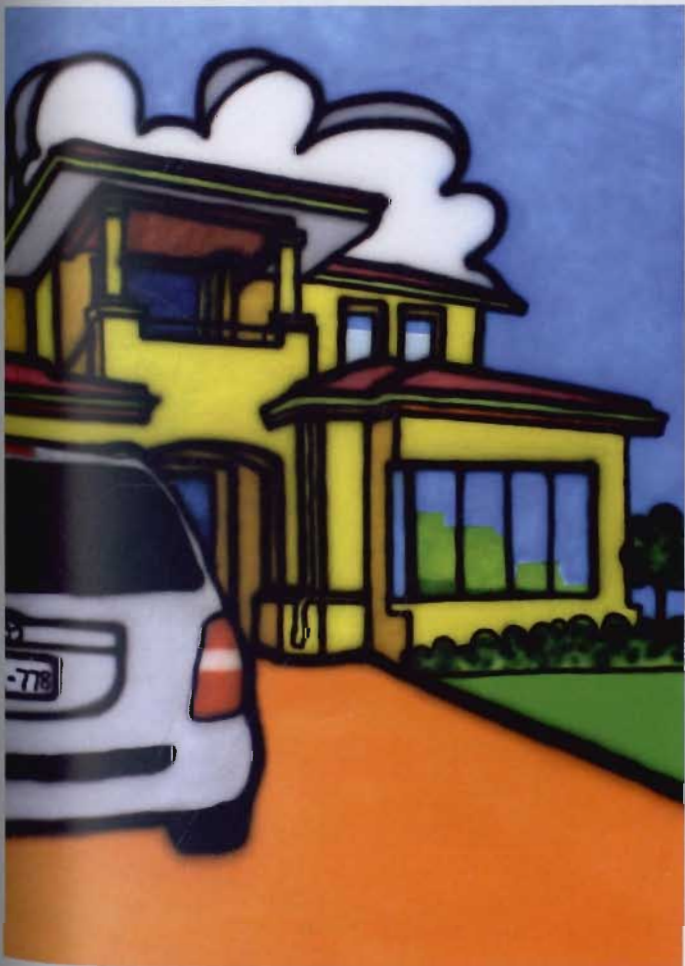

and storage bags. The quality of Ben's work, together with his very easy-to-get-along-with manner, have made him a sought after employee. Hard as we tried to keep him, he has made the decision to move into the lucrative rescue training industry. We wish him well in his future endeavours.

Amie MacPherson also leaves us at the end of 2010 after four years in the Outdoor Education Department. Amie began as a trainee in 2008 on the heels of completing her Cert IV in Outdoor Recreation at Central Metropolitan TAFE. In her three years on full time staff Amie has belied her years in demonstrating great competencies in logistics and planning as well as an authoritative manner demanding respect from the boys on camp. Most impressively, some students were initially only two years her junior. She leaves us in 2011 to commence a new career with the Australian Customs and Border Protection Service. If Amie's management of wayward boys on camp is any sort of indicator, those running the gauntlet on customs issues have every reason to be concerned.

In programme terms, there were a number of noteworthy additions and changes in 2010. Outdoor Education experienced new waters to navigate with the advent of Middle School. Murray Curran relinquished his coordination of Junior School Programmes to head up this Middle School challenge. In what was an inherently difficult timetabling year, Murray produced a camp that received very good feedback and forms a solid foundation for developing Year 7 and 8 into the future.

Tim Harley continued to develop the Year 9 camps into an excellent and diverse model which continues to get praise from the boys and parents alike. Tim will move into a

part time position in 2011 while continuing to coordinate Year 9 and Junior School camps.

We can breathe easily that our pinnacle programme, Year 10 Exmouth, was as smooth as could be expected enjoying good weather and magnificent experiences. Special mention should be made of the overall quality of the students. It was a very difficult decision to arrive at a "Mainpeak Year 10 Outdoor Education Prize "winner" from a strong field of six finalists. Trevor Menmuir eventually stood apart from the rest to take this honour. Some new initiatives this year included the rigging of a sail into the dory rowing boat-an opportunity that most groups jumped at to save from long days on the oars. The programme will experience some major change in the coming years as we prepare to move base now that the lease at MG Kailis Gulf Fisheries has expired. There are many unknowns ahead of us here but we can relax in the knowledge that we have a priceless commodity in local knowledge and experience.

2010 also saw the introduction of the "Year 11 Leadership Camp" at the end of the October holidays. The camp was a two day lecture style event at Hale School to which 115 boys volunteered their attendance. As an inaugural event it was very successful and forms the blueprint for more of the same in the future.

Outdoor Education at Hale School is alive and well. In an international climate where "Nature Deficit Disorder" has been attributed for many holistic educational shortcomings, we can feel confident that we are moving in the right direction.

Initially, the disabilities of the children were confronting, though, as the friendships evolved between students and children, it was easy to see the wonderful and kind-hearted people within.

Assistants also took on a demanding role as they were not only constantly needed behind the scenes, but also assisted many personal companions. VIETNAM/CAMBODIA TOUR

After a five hour bus trip we arrived at the M'Lop Tapang Shelter for street kids. There we saw how far reaching and empowering a

small project could become as we played and spent time with many of the children there. Our next stop was Hoi An, in the central region of Vietnam, where we spent half a day at the Hoi An Orphanage and the next day at Hoi An aged care facility, in what was undoubtedly one of the most eye-opening, challenging experiences of the tour.

Our last stop was at the Christina Noble Children's Foundation in Ho Chi Minh City. There we had enormous fun playing with children from babies through to toddlers – having a good time with the guys at the Boys Shelter for Street Kids, and singing and dancing with the visually impaired children at the Tey Ninh Centre.

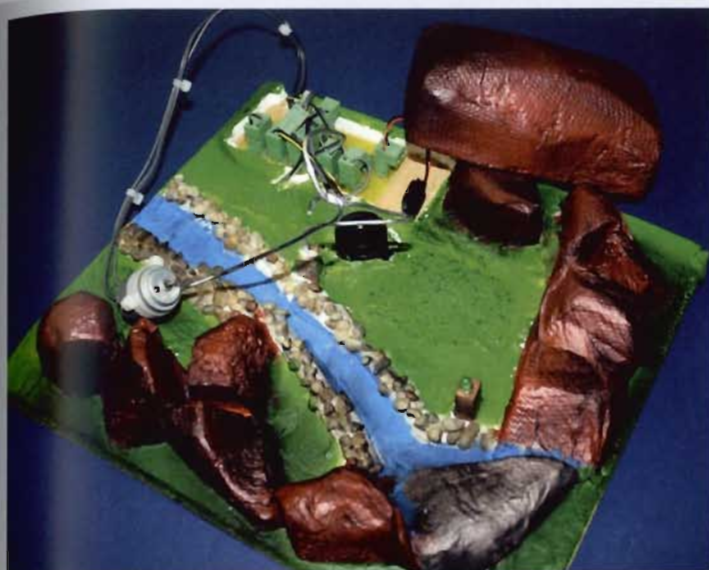
Also there are a range of databases that students can access twenty four hours a day that have extensive and up-to-date

JAPANESE

2010 was another busy and productive year for students of Japanese. Year 10 and 11 students excelled in the national ACER tests, with the majority scoring Distinctions or High Distinctions in their respective levels of testing. Language Week was another busy event with students completing poster projects based on Japanese anime, a popular recess sale of Japanese "lucky dip" bags and a well-fought but disappointing loss to the French team in the annual LOTE Cup soccer match.

Of course the highlight of the year for the participating students was the Japan tour held in the April school holidays. Fifteen boys accompanied Mr Parish and Mr Seth to Tokyo, where they stayed with host families from our sister school in Tokyo, Shukutoku High School. As well as visiting the school and participating in classes, the group toured local attractions such as the gigantic Buddha statue in Kamakura, an outdoor art museum in Hakone, Tokyo Disneyland and the beautiful and historically significant shrines in the resort area of Nikko. The interaction with the host families was, of course, the most important aspect of the trip, and throughout their home stay the students were able to experience firsthand the language and culture which, until then, had only been real in the pages of textbooks.

CANBERRA TOUR 2010

On the 6th of March 2010, amidst great excitement and anticipation, 24 students from the Politics and Law and Modern History courses from both Year 11 and 12 set off for Canberra and under the ever watchful eyes of Mr Cook and Mr McFarland, with the intention of discovering more in regards to our nation's rich political, cultural, social and military history.

On our first morning the boys were treated to a visit to the Australian Institute of Sport, just outside of Canberra, where we were given the opportunity to see how Australia's elite sportsmen and women are trained. Following this we visited the National Museum and The National Film and Sound Archives, where the boys discovered, much to their amazement and amusement, footage of a newsreader (in all seriousness) encouraging women to "... get back in the kitchen." That evening saw an enjoyable meal at the Dickson Tradesman's Club followed by an equally enjoyable journey through pouring rain back to the motel where we were staying.

The following day, the boys visited Telstra's Black Mt Transmitting Tower along with its panoramic views and excellent mobile reception, followed by a chance to re-enact the 1975 Constitutional crises at Old Parliament House. The afternoon was filled with an enjoyable visit to the National Gallery and a session of ten-pin bowling.

Tuesday the 9th saw the boys visit the Australian Medical Association Headquarters for an insider's view on lobbying in Canberra from AMA Secretary Francis Sullivan, followed by a visit to Government House to view the official reception of a delegation from



Indonesia, followed by a visit to Parliament itself where the boys were spoken to by Old Boy Paul Isaachsen who works at the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet. A definite highlight of the trip followed with the opportunity of watching the pageantry and debate of Question time in the House of Representatives and the Senate. That particular day saw rigorous debate over paid parental leave between the two major parties. Following this the boys were reluctantly dragged away to the National Portrait Gallery to view some of the Nation's most prized artworks, including a Ned Kelly original death mask and a portrait of former High Court Chief Justice Michael Kirby.

On the students' final day in the capital we visited the National War Memorial, where many students took the opportunity to pay their respects to relatives who had fallen in battle for Australia. Many of the boys gained a greater understanding of the hardships experienced by our troops in war and all were moved by the tragic loss of life visible

in the size of the honour roll. Following this the tour visited the High Court where we were given a chance to see Courtroom 1 where constitutional matters are processed, Courtroom 3 where charges of Sedition and Treason against the Commonwealth are tried and the boys were even privileged to the riveting experience of viewing a case on the use of receipts and cheques between corporations being appealed in the High Court, an experience I am sure few boys will ever forget. Justice Gummow's habit of 'thinking' during cases by leaning back in his chair and closing his eyes for long periods of time remains a source of amusement for many. Following this, a tour of the foreign embassies was conducted before the tour was brought to a close with a visit to the National Archives and a viewing of the original Australian Constitution. I am certain all boys were thoroughly enriched by their visit to the capital and returned with many fond and exciting memories.

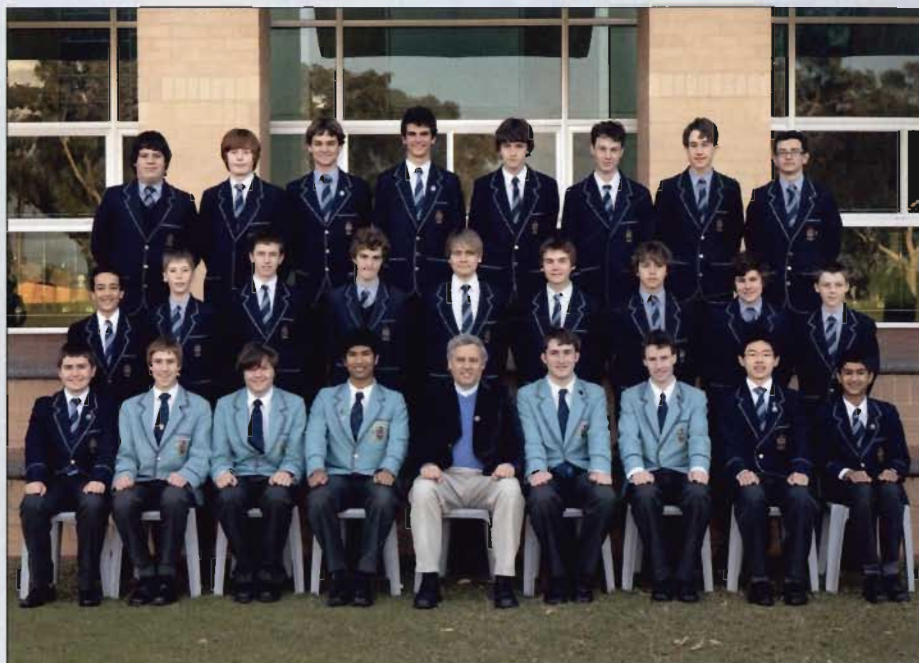

MOCK TRIAL

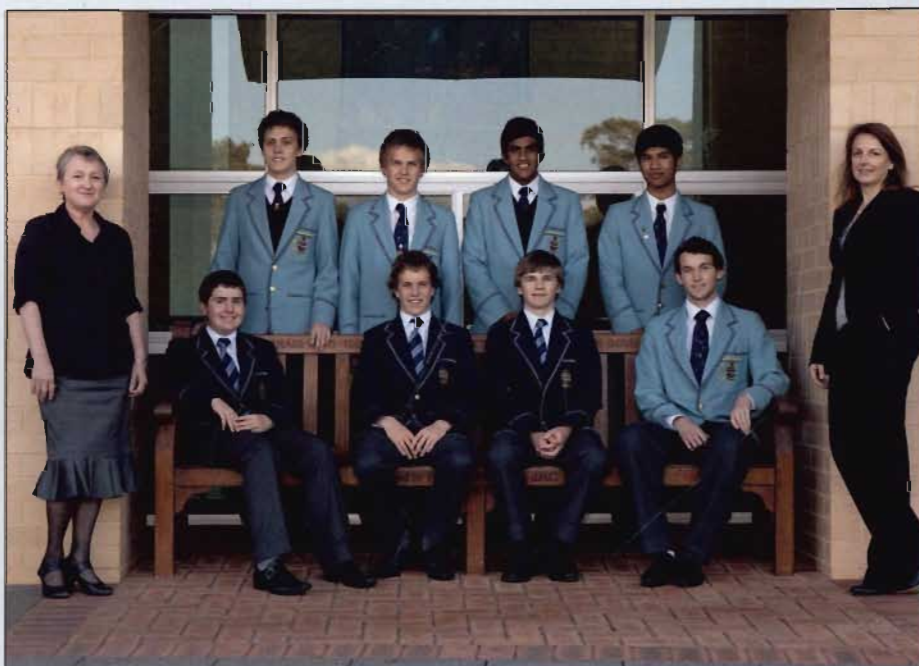
This year's Mock Trial competition was run by the Francis Burt Law Education Centre.

UWA SmArts

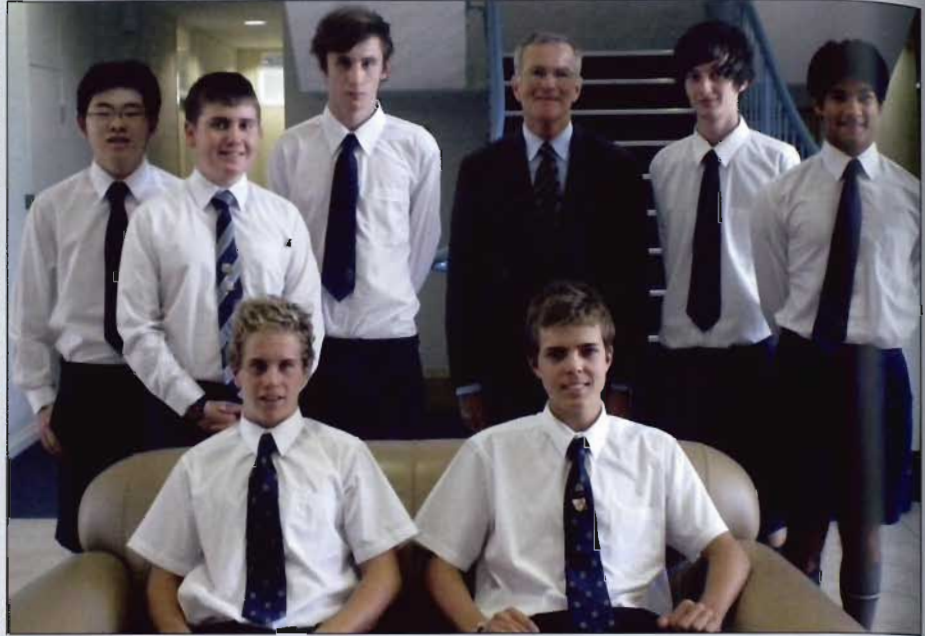

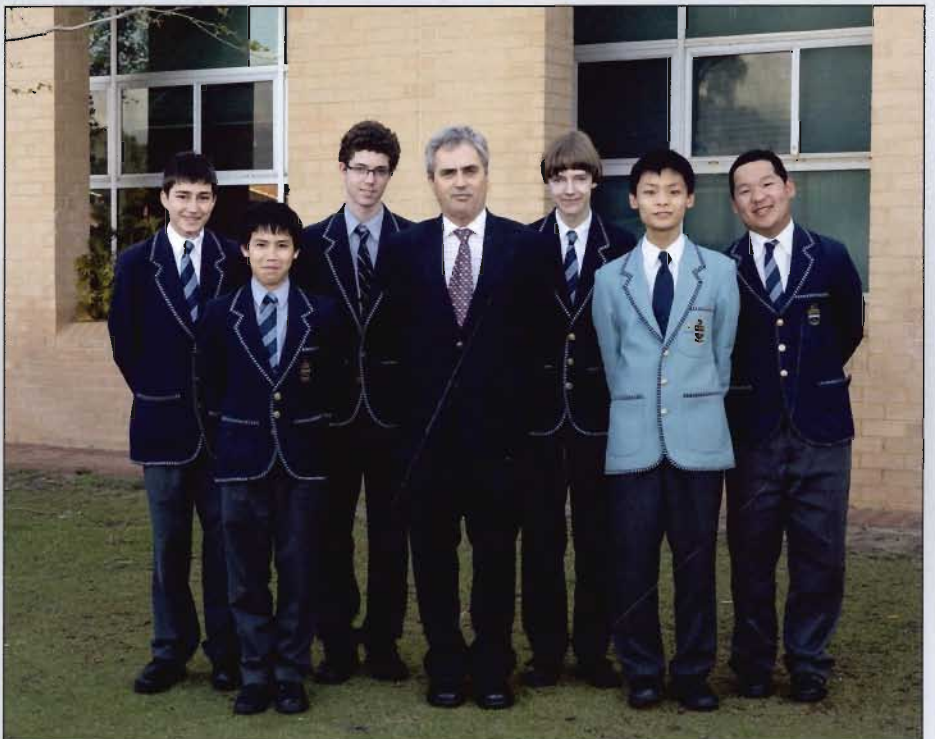

SENIOR SCHOOL SUMMER SPORT WRAP

The annual rowing and swimming camps took place at Hale in January and the 1st XI cricket team toured to Sydney playing games against Barker College, Knox College and Cranbrook School. Water polo training throughout January was also introduced with great success. As always, all teams were well prepared for the Term 1 competitions. In tennis, our 1st VIII played without any Year 12 boys meaning that the entire roster will be available for the 2011 season. Despite their inexperience, the team fought admirably and finished in 4th position having defeated Guildford, Trinity and Wesley. The pathway looks very healthy with undefeated teams being the 8As, 8Bs, 9As, 9Bs and 10Bs.

Water polo at Hale School is continuing to flourish with the introduction of a 3rds team and four teams entered in the combined 7/8/9 competition on Friday – the most of any schools. Our 1st VI finished 5th, quite unbelievable given they lost three games by only one goal to Aquinas, Scotch and Wesley, all of whom finished higher on the ladder. The introduction of Year 7s saw combined teams drawn from all three year groups and the Hale team had two Year 7s successfully mixing it with the Year 9s – if you are good enough, you are old enough!

In the pool, the 2010 Hale Swimming Squad were united with one goal in mind – win the 2010 Inters! After placing 3rd in 2009, and with the inclusion of some red hot Year 7s, this was a realistic target for the squad. The team were well prepared through the winter and Term 4, with the annual swim camp, swimathon, TROGS ironman and

various time trial mornings. The Australind Shield was successfully retained at the annual Quads meet against Aquinas, Guildford and CBC Fremantle. Whilst Christ Church were deserving favourites, they were certainly looking over their shoulder to see where the blue caps were on Inters night. Unfortunately, the yellow caps edged out the blue ones and Hale would finish an admirable 2nd. With squad numbers in excess of 160, the boys are united in their 2011 quest already!

Hale basketball teams enjoyed another successful season with the majority of teams winning more games than they lost. The 1st V led the way finishing a credible equal second with Aquinas. Trinity were the eventual winners but did it the hard way by defeating Hale by only two points. Congratulations to the Year 10 teams who won all of their games, which were all played at Lords Recreation Centre in Subiaco.

In volleyball, the Hale 1st VI team finished 4th behind Wesley, Aquinas and Trinity who all shared the 2010 premiership. The move (from Lords) back to school gymnasiums was well received and gave our senior volleyball boys an opportunity to showcase their talents in front of their home crowd. The volleyball momentum at Hale continues to capture new boys into the sport and provide them with opportunities such as touring to Melbourne for the annual National Schools Cup.

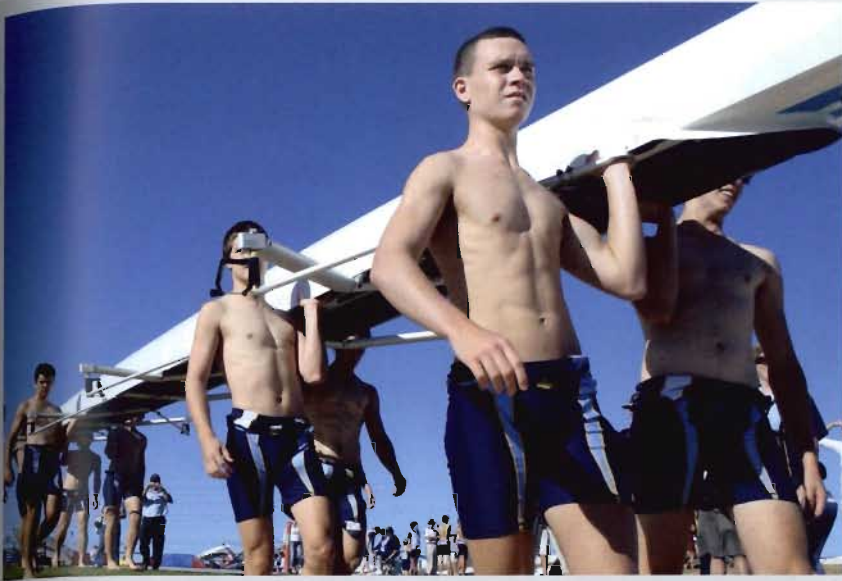

Throughout the season regattas, many Hale crews were able to secure a podium finish and place higher than they have previously. This was most evident in the senior crews who led the way, many becoming regulars in the top three. A top three Hamer Cup finish is on the cards for 2011!

DARLOT CUP - Round 1: Hale 216 def Aquinas 169

Hale recovered from a precarious 5/56 on the first afternoon of the season to record a competitive score (216), thanks mainly to an excellent innings from Taylor (56). He was well supported by McPhee (23) and Marshall (20). On the second day of the match, Hammersley (26) and Blake (33) added 58 valuable runs for the ninth wicket. Six LBW decisions went in favour of Hale's bowlers in the Aquinas innings, an indication of the accuracy of the bowling. Blake, in particular, was in match-winning form with his 5 wickets.

Round 2: Hale 6/309 drew with Wesley 7/223

A very consistent batting performance enabled Hale to post a sizeable total. Hale's seam bowlers were again in sound form, although they couldn't quite dislodge the final three Wesley wickets required to record victory.

Round 3: Hale 8/193 drew with Christ Church 4/342 (dec). Christ Church batted for a long period of time, leaving Hale with the only option of playing for a draw. Lewis (33) concentrated well for over three hours, and then the tailenders, led by a resolute Marshall, held on throughout the last hour for an admirable draw.

Round 4: Hale 122 lost to Scotch 6/242 (dec).

Hale never recovered from being 2/2 early on the first afternoon, struggling to reach 122. Lewis (33) again batted patiently, Fleisher contributed 26 runs and Vernon (33 n.o.) was in sound form in both innings. Unfortunately, he was a victim of a poor decision in the first innings when he was just starting to hit his stride. Scotch scored the required runs comfortably.

Round 5: Hale 237 lost to Trinity 239

In an exciting finish, Hale failed by two runs to match Trinity's first innings score. Taylor (64) and Wood (54) batted sensibly in a 95-run partnership, and Rule (27 n.o.) played a watchful innings late in the day. However, wickets fell at crucial times. In the Trinity innings, Quenby (4/39) bowled very well in demolishing the tail, and Marshall (3/43) again bowled a consistent line.

For the second week in a row, the game ended in a very tight finish. Even though Guildford's ninth wicket fell at 116, Hale couldn't capture the final breakthrough before the last two Guildford batsmen guided their side past the Hale total.

Congratulations to all players for their terrific contribution throughout the season. It was a pleasure to work with a fine group of young

men, who were often complimented by the umpires for the way in which they played their cricket. Sincere thanks to Mr Simon Young for his wonderful assistance right throughout the season – in particular for taking the team to Sydney in January in my absence. Special mention must also be made of the wonderful ongoing support from parents, in particular with such off-field tasks as the afternoon teas and scoring.

Season 2010 was unique in the fact that the 1st VIII team was so young and that even our captain, Robert Ferritto was not yet Year 12. He led a team and training squad comprised of players mainly from Year 8 through to Year 11. Luke Keddle became the first Year 8 to play for the 1st VIII in a Corr Cup fixture since Matthew Ebden in 2001.

Jack Murray firmly cemented his spot as one of our top four players and enjoyed his best season so far. By losing only one singles set, he emerged as the clear winner of the Barry Sanders Trophy for best aggregate in the 1st VIII. Alex Lenartowicz, Kingsley Frearson, Chris Carson, Matthew McAlpine and Brendon McAlpine were our other most regular 1st VIII representatives. They enjoyed mixed success as we came up against opposition sides that ranged considerably in term of tennis ability. Drew Hemphill, Tom Bigwood and Nat County also earned their spot at various times during the season.

Predictably enough, Aquinas proved to be a very tough assignment, and our young team found it very hard to compete with their strength and experience. Losing by 21 sets to 3 left us in no doubt about the magnitude of the task that lay ahead. Things started looking up when we took on Wesley and managed a confidence boosting victory by 17 sets to seven. Unfortunately, our confidence

suffered a telling blow the following week against Christ Church. They were simply too strong and dealt out some harsh tennis lessons on the Cottesloe grass courts. This 19 sets to five loss further emphasized the gulf between ourselves and the top PSA tennis teams. Scotch College showed no mercy and dealt us another heavy blow on their grass courts. We were simply too inexperienced and lacked the serve/volley consistency required on the quicker surface. For the record, we lost 21 sets to three.

To the boys' credit, they recovered quickly from these big losses and steeled themselves for the remaining two fixtures. A close fought win against Trinity at home helped restore confidence and primed us for a final showdown against Guildford who we had lost to in the previous Term 4. It was particularly satisfying to finish the season with a comprehensive victory and secure a creditable fourth spot on the table.

Although it has been a while since our last Corr Cup victory and the 1st VIII are still some way from experiencing the dominance we enjoyed from 2003 – 2006, Hale School tennis is nevertheless very strong. We again had large numbers of very capable players in every year group who all attended training and learned as much as they could throughout the season. Consequently, all

our many teams were filled with enthusiastic competitors who represented the school with distinction. A quick glance at the win/loss record for all teams from the 1st VIII to the 8Cs confirms that we remain one of the top tennis schools. We won 54 out of the 65 fixtures that were played across all teams; this impressive win/loss ratio means that it is only a matter of time before we start to assert ourselves at 1st VIII level again.

The water polo season of 2010 was one of missed opportunities and heartbreak. At the beginning of the season, hopes were high, as our strength was bolstered by some younger guns coming through the Hale ranks. Hale received a hard draw with powerhouses Christ Church, Aquinas and Scotch waiting in ambush for us in the first four rounds, yet the boys were intent on coming out of the blocks hard.

Round One was against the might of Aquinas. This was a hard fought contest but, due to Hale's unfortunate lack of composure at the crucial stages of the game, we sunk to a frustrating one point loss. In the next three rounds, Hale's 1st VII continued to struggle. Defeats by Wesley and Scotch (who were to finish fourth and second respectively) by just one goal, had a somewhat demoralizing effect on the team. The comprehensive loss to Christ Church, who went on to win the Dickenson Cup, demonstrated that we weren't quite where we needed to be to compete for the trophy.

We were to take on Trinity and Guildford, who historically aren't very strong sides. Hale put in solid performances and somewhat reinvigorated the season with two victories, to see us finish 5th behind Wesley.

Hale Water Polo showed some very promising signs, in terms of the players' overall attitude and enthusiasm in these last games. It showed that the team was willing and able to put in some honest effort: the indications for future years are bright.

One of the big positives to take out of the season is the exceptional talent that will be in Year 12 next year to lead to team. Tom Sangster, who went on to win the Best Player and Top Goal scored for the season, along with Nick Hughes, Brendon Lim (who was sorely missed for the majority of the season) and Adam Birman (the quiet but

tirelessly working team mate) will play key roles in Hale's next season.

There are many other people who need to be acknowledged: to Mr Jackson, who has now become an integral member of the Hale water polo community. Special mention has to go to his 'encouragement' which pushed 'Skimpy' Murdoch to his limits as he emerged from the other side of the 50m pool, bright blue with exhaustion. Thanks also to Mr Liggins, coach of the 1st VII, for coaching us through what has been a uniquely fun (and at times frustrating) season.

Celebrating the 111th year of rowing tradition at Hale School, the 2009/2010 rowing season was a year of change. A new array of coaches, a revitalized dynamic to training, the excitement of a new VIII boat, and a new found optimism for Hale's future rowing career, set both current and future rowers in good stead. The extensive hours racing, training, thinking, sleeping, and eating for the good of the shed is an achievement that does not require a medal to recognize the personal success and pride that comes with belonging to a well respected Hale sporting community. As Stuart Meade states in the rowing yearbook, rowers "have a finely tuned understanding of the term 'teamwork'." A most true and valid statement demonstrated by each and every individual I am proud to be associated with.

The 2009/2010 season bears witness to what would arguably be Hale's best outcome from recent years; a 4th place in the Hamer Cup is not indicative of the glory we deserved, but a satisfying improvement none the less.

The first races of the season (Christ Church and Guildford long distance regattas) were naturally Hale's first introduction to the other schools' rowing abilities. Although daunting, there was a mutual optimism that Trinity, Scotch and Christ Church's lead was not 'out of reach'. This was affirmed as the senior crews' assortment of second to sixth placings in the Christ Church 5km race was redeemed with a much more consistent third and fourth place mixture in the Guildford 6km.

Following this, the Aquinas, Christ Church and Trinity regattas at Canning River demonstrated the Hale rowing shed's range of abilities across the senior and younger years. The dreams of senior crews were tickled as the 2nd VIII grasped a well deserved first place in the Aquinas 1km. A consistent and upcoming force of the Senior A quad grabbed two seconds and a third in these regattas. The First VIII established their position in fourth place, and the other Year 9, Year 10 and senior crews revealed strengths and potential.

The Wesley indoor regatta is an annual event held at Wesley College in February. It involves 16 senior and 8 Year 10 rowers from each school. The boys compete in a series of ergo races, with two rowers from each school in each race. Always a very intense event, with fierce competition, this 'off-water' event did not fail to recognize many personal best times and witness many a boy push themselves to the limits. It was heart-warming to see the support the boys gave to each other at the regatta and the strong Hale School spirit displayed.

By this time, the much anticipated 'Champion Lakes' race course was ready for permanent location of the PSA rowing regattas. The Wesley, Scotch and Hale regattas further demonstrated the gathering force of Hale rowing as more noteworthy achievements were made. Our future years rely on the development and strength of the younger years. So it was pleasing to see a second

place by the 9C quad, third place by the 9D and 9E quads, and a respectable fourth place by the 9B quad achieved. There were other impressive results such as the 1st VIII's first third placing in the Scotch 500m, the Senior A and B quads' second placings at Wesley 1km, the Year 10 A and B VIII consistent third and fourth placings and the 3rd VIII's outstanding assortment of second and third placings.

Finally, the Head of River regatta was of great importance as it was the ultimate race that counted to the season placings. Finishing fourth overall on points, the Hale shed showed great teamwork and the capacity to improve. Across the board, the best Hale placing was a much deserved second place to the senior B quad and a well rounded third by the 10A VIII. The 1st VIII finished a respectable fifth place; this result does not give appropriate recognition to the ability and determination of the crew. Many close races and personal best times were the result of a committed Hale rowing crew. I am proud of the 2009/2010 Hale Rowing Team and I have high hopes for their future success. A sincere 'Thank You' is well earned, not only by the rowers, but all of the contributors in the Parent Support Group and Coaching. We do not need numbered placings to tell us this was a successful season.

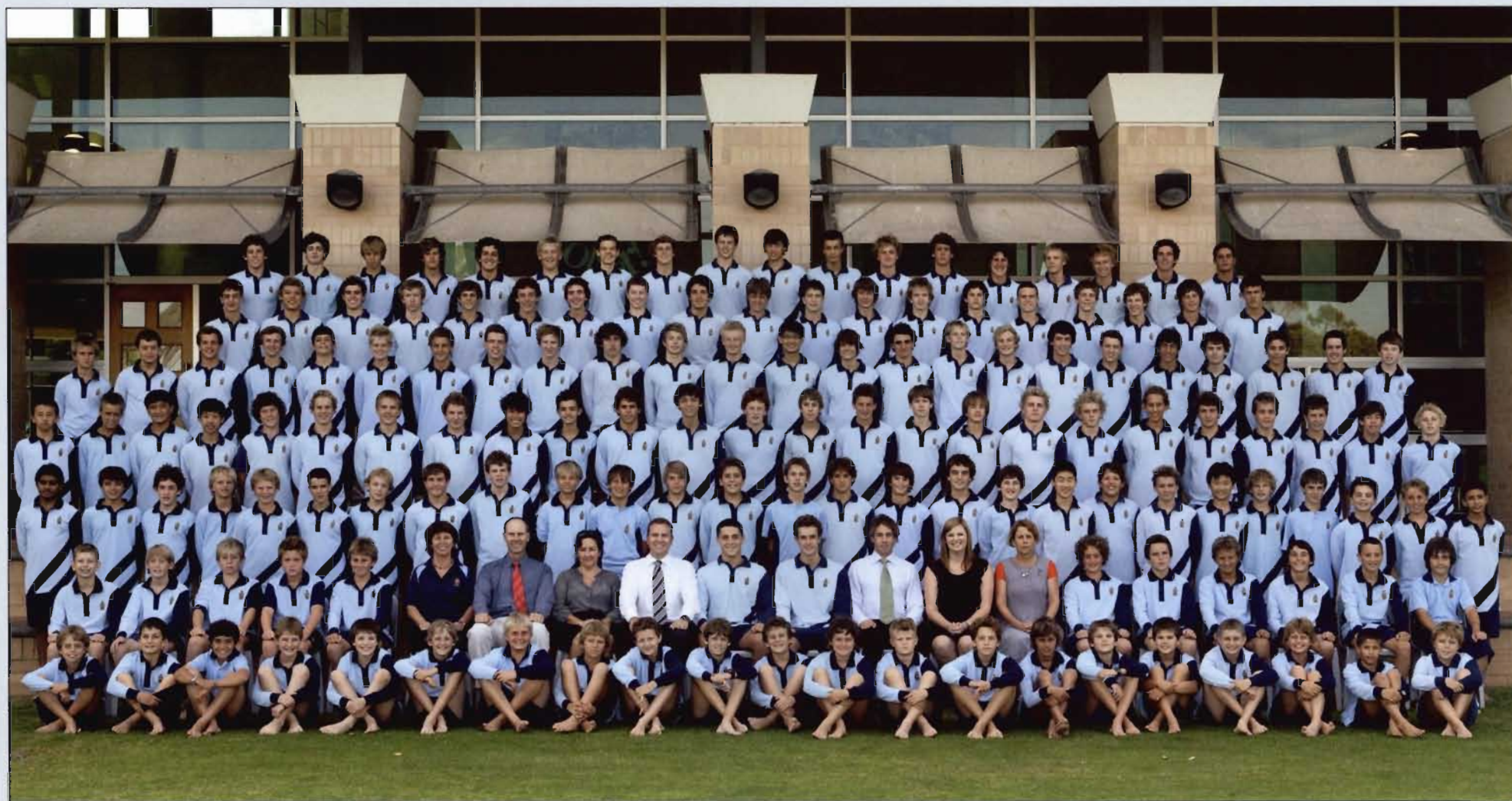

There was a special moment in the 2010 winter sport season that will forever be etched in my memory. It came on the last match of the season on Craig Oval. The 1st XV rugby and 1st XI soccer teams had both secured their premierships and were eagerly waiting on the boundary, along with many other boys, for the 1st XVIII to finish their match against Guildford. The match finished with a win to the Hale boys who finished their season unbeaten. Then, in an unscripted spontaneous wave of schoolboy enthusiasm, the rugby boys, soccer boys and all of their mates, sprinted onto Craig Oval to join the 1st XVIII in a school war cry. There is always plenty of banter amongst the boys about their respective sports, but it was wonderful to see the boys, arm-in-arm, enjoying the success of their schoolmates.

Since soccer was introduced into the PSA in 1987, only one school has ever managed to win all three 'football' codes (football, rugby & soccer) in one season. Hale School did this in 1999 and has done so once again in 2010.

In badminton, the Hale 1st team finished in equal second with Scotch College and behind a very dominant and undefeated Wesley College. The 2nds won five and lost five and provided many challenges for boys in the 1st team. The boys were clearly the beneficiaries of their new coach, who also doubles as the State Coach, so the future looks bright.

In many ways, it would be easy to suggest that hockey suffered due to the successful football codes, but that was not the case as they were still very competitive despite finishing seventh. Unfortunately, the 1st XI team was very consistent throughout the

season, losing many games by only one goal, many often snatched from the jaws of victory. One of the most pleasing aspects of this team was their youth, as five Year 10 boys were blooded throughout the season. In an interesting turn of events, there are some football boys who have chosen to play hockey for the school in 2011. Watch this space!

It is easy to gloss over the success of Hale rugby teams. Year after year, week after week, the Hale boys notch up notable performances which could easily be taken for granted. Those associated with each team will tell you that it doesn't happen by accident – and they are so right. The 1st XV secured the Brother Redmond Cup for the 8th year in a row as they finished the season undefeated and nine points clear of second place, which equates to two games in hand. All Hale teams finished on top of their tables in what can only be described as an extraordinary performance. A feature of all teams has been the humble manner in which they go about their business, both on and off the field.

Football at Hale School has probably never been healthier. The 1st XVIII won all 12 matches to retain the Alcock Cup, having shared it with Aquinas in 2009. To many, this team over-achieved, but those close to the team will tell you that a champion team will overcome a team of champions any day – and that they did! What is most pleasing is that the selfless, skilful and relentless style of play from the 1st XVIII is filtering down to all teams. The depth is clear to see with the 7As losing only one game, the 8As undefeated, the 9As losing only twice and the 10As winning their Term 2 season before

the Exmouth camp phase. All B teams and the 2nds and 3rds won more games than they lost. The challenge for all Hale football teams is now clear as we have gone from the hunters, to the hunted!

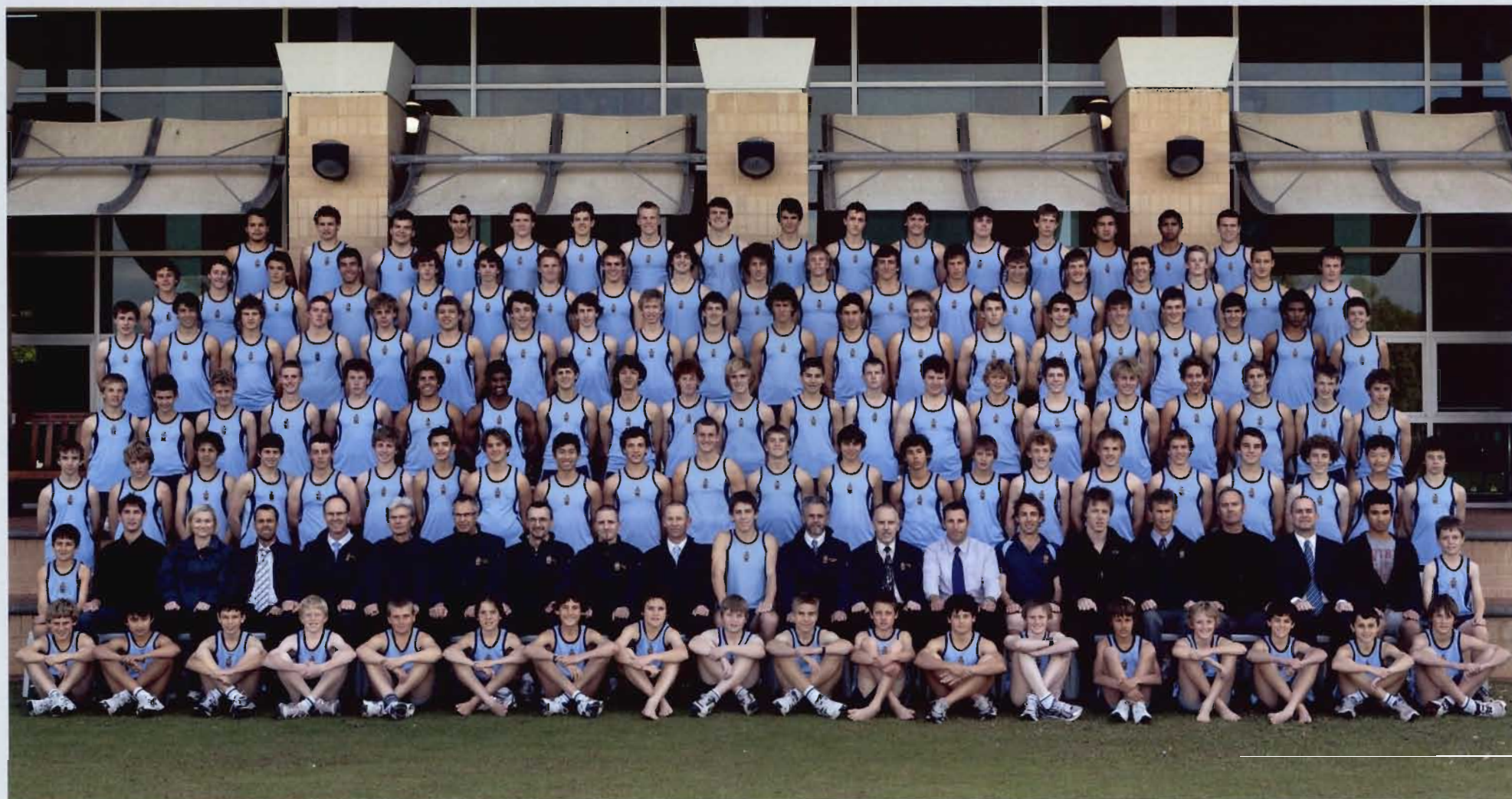

Whilst the football group was coming off a shared winning season in 2009 with Aquinas, there was a feeling that there was more that could be achieved in 2010.

The pre-season preparation moved from interstate to the familiar grounds of the Hale School boarding house. A challenging beach session, supplemented with numerous presentations from the WAFL umpires, WA AFL legends Peter Bell & Chris Lewis, WA 18s State Academy coach Brad Wira, an introduction to our physical presence expert Dr Les Fabre, and trial matches against Wesley and Camberwell (retention of the Buntine Cup) rounded out our preparation camp.

The season opener at Craig Oval against Scotch would provide an indicator of the season to come. The one and only appearance from 2009 Fairest & Best, Tom Mitchell, and first outing of new 'recruit' Jackson Starceвич, saw a year high 25 goals scored in a comprehensive performance.

The first month was to be important in determining the season ahead and we went in prepared and vengeful against Trinity away, still hurting from a last minute loss in the final game of 2009 at the same venue to deny our sole winners mantle. Hale went in with a lead. It was the third quarter, scoring seven goals to one, resulting in a 13 goal win, which stamped us as a genuine contender against one of our major competitors.

Wesley, who defeated us pre-season, were the follow up challenge and the group started

strongly, but after quarter time it remained a tightly contested battle with the margin remaining within four goals right through to the end, with Hale prevailing.

Aquinas away - one of the most difficult tasks in the competition - combined with our only wet and windy day, was to be the challenge that defined the playing group. A stirring first quarter against the strong breeze generated six shots at goal, even though we were two points behind at the change. The second quarter saw Aquinas fight bravely to restrict our scoring and at half time the margin was one point in Hale's favour. The third quarter of this game, in difficult conditions against a strong wind, away venue, against quality opposition was our important moment of the season. Hale scored five goals four points, to Aquinas' two scoring shots, and ultimately prevailed by five goals.

Hale Football 2010 had arrived, undefeated after four games, and on top of the ladder.

Our position was consolidated with wins over Christ Church, Guilford and Scotch, producing a strong blend of consistent team football.

Our impressive Craig Oval record in recent seasons again prevailed as we accounted for Trinity for the second time. Our follow up contest was a danger game against Wesley, who was also having a strong season, on the Thursday afternoon before the semester break, at Wesley. The determination of this group was plain to see; with some late withdrawals and early injuries, the team played inspired football to be 10 goals up at

half time and maintained that intensity to win the contest by 20 goals.

It was all about the next game. A short training session over the holiday break and it was Aquinas at Craig Oval, who was still only one game behind, while a win would see Hale guaranteed back-to-back titles. We started well on a fine day with a final-like atmosphere to lead by five goals at the main change. A desperate opposition worked their way back into the game - at some stages dominating, to draw back level at three quarter time and the scene was set for a thrilling last quarter. The first half of the quarter was a dour struggle until the determination, skill and resilience of the group took control to score six final term goals, winning by 20 points and singing the "war cry" for Alcock Cup success.

The following win against Christ Church made sure the Cup remained in the Hale cabinet "all year" and the final win against Guildford completed an inspiring undefeated season.

The 2010 football group (31 players) deservedly need to be recognized as one of the most successful PSA football teams to have been generated out of Hale, with this record last achieved in 1977 when only 10 games were played.

The impressive Year 12 leadership and the enthusiasm and commitment of the Year 11 group, defined the "winning culture" Hale football was looking to stamp on the PSA competition in 2010.

The 2010 1st XV led by Kevin Bush, had an excellent season and retained the Brother Redmond Cup for a record eighth successive year. They continued in the fine tradition of their predecessors, not only in terms of their record, but with the sublime rugby they produced at times.

In another tight game Hale took a first half lead through a Matthew Ng strike but sustained Trinity pressure saw them equalise in the second half leaving us to come away with a hard fought one-one draw.

The next two fixtures saw Hale comfortably defeat Wesley five-one at home and Aquinas six-nil away with Geordie Papathanassiou showing all his goal scoring talent by netting five of the goals. A hard fought home win

against Christ Church and a comfortable six-nil victory away to Guildford on a Thursday afternoon saw Hale complete the first round of fixtures in fine fashion and with a comfortable lead at the top of the table.

However, fifteen minutes into the second half Ben Jones struck to send the Hale supporters into raptures. Further chances were missed as the clock ticked on but it did not prove costly as the game finished one-nil, thus securing the Lawe-Davies Cup for 2010.

There is no doubt that Hale were deserving winners of the trophy. They scored goals freely and were also solid in defence, evident in the fact that the Player of the Year (Haydn Bradley) and Most Improved Player (Sheldon MacDonald) were vital parts of that unit. Players' Player of the Year was Matthew Ng and the Top Goal Scorer trophy went to Geordie Papathanassiou with a remarkable nineteen goals. The boys should feel justifiably proud of their efforts in what was a stellar year for the football codes at Hale.
