Excerpts from Speech Day Address 7 December 2012

Earlier this year a colleague with whom I taught many years ago, published a book entitled "Ethics, 101 conversations to have with your kids". Michael Parker, currently Deputy Head at Cranbrook School in Sydney opened his book with the question: "Would you rather your child was smart or good?" He goes on to suggest "Your immediate answer is probably both. But what if you could not have both? What if you could have a child who was good but not particularly smart or a child who was smart but not particularly good? Which one then?" You probably eventually, perhaps even reluctantly, said good (at least that way your child will come and visit you in the nursing home).

Many families and almost all schools spend a great deal of time developing their children academically. This is a good thing. Yet it is at least as important for us all to think consciously about how we ethically develop the next generation to be decent members of society.

I had the opportunity to speak at another school recently on the notion that really effective schools are those that provide what I called Education with Character. I referred to the Hale School experience which I believe and I hope you do too provides just that. And I use the working definition of character as 'what you do when no-one else is watching'.

While character development is a personal experience with personal outcomes, so many of the opportunities to which boys at Hale are exposed provide authentic character building situations. As we live in an academic age where Year 12 students need attain a university entrance score of 80 and no more to gain access to one of the 4 under-graduate degrees at UWA, we need to prove to parents that their decision to invest financially in their son's education at Hale School will not only provide an academic outcome that is commensurate with his ability but also give voice to young men with sound ethical behaviour and decisionmaking skills, respect for others and a social conscience.

As I wrote this paragraph last Sunday my attention was drawn to the Redfoot Green where a number of our Year 12 leavers have returned of their own volition to devise a pantomime to perform to local primary schools earlier this week. Earlier in the term, over 120 Year 11s gave up the final weekend of their Term 3 break to attend the Leadership Development course and 80 or so Year 10s have been in a Peer Support training day earlier this week when they did not have to be at school in preparation for the role they will take on next year. There are many such situations occurring each weeknight and weekend throughout the year. They point to a commitment or a moral obligation to be part of something that is bigger than themselves. Indeed, one of the reasons I encourage boys to play team sports is for the responsibility to others that such involvement brings. If you don't front up, your team or crew will be affected and the outcomes of that session or game will be impacted upon by your decision.

The School's Strategic Intent document states: Our vision is to provide opportunities for every boy to excel, with special attention to delivering on 'moments of truth', highly personal events that shape a boy's experience. As we end 2012, I hope every boy here can tell their parents on the way home about an opportunity they have had to excel this year (whether they have taken it or not may be another story) and a "moment of truth" - be it an occasion when you have encountered an academic or personal challenge and have been helped in a manner that builds self-esteem, resilience and character, or perhaps a realisation that you have achieved a personal best in an area, or areas of endeavour.

There should also be moments of inspiration and aspiration. Our Dux of School, Alan Wang provided both this year with his wide ranging and high quality contributions. Dan Hoang, Jack Cooper and Ben Neil will be spending part of their upcoming break in National Olympiad Summer Schools in Maths or Physics, Josh Billington's efforts in athletics this year, William Huxtable and Ben Clapin provide ongoing inspiration in the field of music, Matt Salter and Lincoln Vickery, both Honours recipients in Drama will hopefully provide the aspiration for others, the achievements of the senior football, hockey and rugby teams in winning their PSA competitions, Hamish Robinson in public speaking, Josh Dunne's success in state and national writing competitions, or the single minded focus of Curtis Luck who in golf currently holds all four major WA junior titles. There are myriad state and national level sportsmen in our midst, Duke of Edinburgh awardees, Service Learning devotees and young men whose character development is well and truly on the right trajectory - they will all provide moments of inspiration and aspiration next year. The fortnightly newsletter chronicles so much of what goes on here.

At senior management level, one of the issues that took our attention this year was

the process of school registration. Behaviour Management, Anti-Bullying, Absentees, Duty of Care, Crisis Management, Grievance, Mandatory Reporting, Emergency Drills, Complaints and Risk Management are but a few of the policy documents that were examined to within an inch of their lives. And that does not include the piles of paper that were devoted to documentation on the management of curriculum issues. In the end, we were successful in receiving the maximum re-registration period of five years so you can all rest easy, Hale will be open for business for at least five more years.

But that is not to say that as a community we can rest easy. The post-modern malaise of 'dreaming without doing' is creeping into politics and into schools. The Prime Minister's speech at the National Press Club mid-year was entitled 'A National Plan for School Improvement' and re-affirmed her desire to improve education standards - we moved from an "education revolution" to an "education crusade" and her aspirational goal to have Australia's external testing results in the top five countries in the world by 2025 is laudable. More recently, the Federal Government's White Paper on 'Australia in the Asian Century' has tied future government funding to schools teaching Asian languages. As one education commentator wrote "It is one thing to learn a language, it is another to understand a country." If the drive of the government's paper is to be able to do business in and with Asia, we must be creative, resourceful and engaging and we need to teach enterprise, endeavour and excellence.

So, how do we improve? The \$6.5 billion a year of help for schools as recommended by Mr Gonski will be welcome, but on its own will not bring about the desired outcomes.

Firstly, we can encourage parents to read to their children, talk to their children and give to their children a model for life-long learning. Parents can help their children eat, exercise and rest properly. They can encourage the growth of pro-social skills. More than anything, parents can love their children and give them the gift of time. By so doing, stress in the home will decrease and learning in the school will increase.

Further, the partnership between parents and the school is fundamental to our desire for boys to develop a Values base. When boys hear their parents agree to falsely tell the school there is an illness in the family or a relative's wedding that requires an overseas visit in the last few days of term, they register that it is OK to do this. Make no mistake, it sinks in. And your tolerance to let them consume alcohol from a young age; don't worry that Henry Lawson wrote "beer makes you feel how you ought to feel without beer", I urge you to stand strong on this one because there is much research, the law, and you would be surprised at how many other parents, to support you.

Secondly, teachers in countries that top the international school league tables enjoy highesteem, accept high demands and enjoy high salaries. Teachers must be appraised regularly.

Staff must be professionally developed. The privacy of the classroom needs to be removed in favour of a transparency that allows colleagues to visit, appraisal to happen and excellence to flourish.

Thirdly, our students are being hobbled by an addiction to the western mantra of 'mean, median and mode'. We are obsessed by what the average child is doing and this has led to generations of students becoming content with mediocrity. We are consumed by what is normal and rarely ask what is possible. We should be encouraging all students to realise their potential.

Mediocrity in schools is exacerbated by childcentred learning philosophies that require every educational endeavour to be fun. Life is not always fun. No great or worthy endeavour is ever achieved without a modicum of pain. Our children must not be mollycoddled to the extent they collapse if the whole repertoire of superlatives is not used to describe their ordinary performance. Quite simply, we need to expect more from our children. The motto of Gordonstoun School in Scotland "plus est en vous" – there is more in you (to which they add 'than you think') strikes directly at this point.

Central to the provision of a 21st Century education which lies behind school improvement in this day and age is the integration of technology into the curriculum so that it effectively supports and enhances understanding, learning and communication. Progress requires change and as Benjamin Disraeli stated: "in a progressive country, change is constant; change is inevitable." We cannot ignore emerging technologies. We must embrace them and teach our young people to use them well. It is my belief that if greater utilisation of technology is accompanied by improved pedagogy, our young people will use it wisely, effectively and responsibly.

As we seek to move unerringly from good to great, we need feedback. I once again asked the departing Year 12s for their thoughts as they approached their final weeks here this year. As in previous years, they referred to the commitment and support they have received from the staff - teaching and non-teaching. They spoke of the extra time out of formal class time given to them by their teachers: before and after school, at lunchtime, in the holidays, via email in the evening, as well as the friendship and support given by Gaye Wilkin and Vicki Langdon in the Roundhouse, the housemums and Dee in boarding, Roger in the canteen, the list went on but the respect was obvious. Further proof came when one of the student speakers at the Valedictory events this year said "The funeral for Mr Clarkson in 2011 was emotionally challenging for many boys. If we ever needed proof of the man he was, the power of emotion the celebration of his life evoked, crystallised this for me, and it is and will remain an honour to have known such a caring and unique individual." Pretty powerful stuff and as we acknowledge tomorrow the one year anniversary since Brian's passing it is fitting to announce that a boarding scholarship with criteria befitting Brian's approach to life will be launched next year and will be known as the Brian Clarkson Rural Scholarship.

WACE RESULTS AND AWARDS 2012

Outstanding achievements for the Year 12 cohort as a whole

In 2012, the total number of Hale students to gain an ATAR was 185, from an overall Year 12 cohort of 203 students. Collectively, these 185 students achieved outstanding ATAR scores. The median ATAR for Hale was 92.40, the second highest in the School's history and just below last year's record high median ATAR of 92.75.

The median ATAR of 92.40 was the second highest achieved by any school in WA in 2012 and shows that many Hale students of average ability performed to their best academically while being fully involved in their House responsibilities and in the busy, co-curricular life of the School.

The average ATAR achieved by Hale students in 2012 was 89.35, which is the highest average ever achieved.

Behind these statistics for the group are hardworking, skilled and dedicated staff, students who have set a goal of achieving their best and a school culture which fosters, respects, nourishes, enjoys and celebrates good learning.

20 students (11%) achieved ATARs of 99 or above, putting them in the top 1% of all Australian students to achieve an ATAR. 32 students (17%) achieved ATARs of 98 or above, putting them in the country's top 2%. 63 students (34%) achieved ATARs of 95 or above, putting them in the country's top 5%.

109 students (59%) achieved ATARs of 90 or above, putting them in the country's top 10%.

Outstanding individual achievements in the WACE, 2012

An average final mark of over 85% is required in at least four courses to achieve an ATAR over 99.

Hale School was ranked fourth in the state for the number of SCSA Awards received: 41 awards were achieved by 25 students.

GENERAL EXHIBITIONS (2)

These are awarded to the 40 eligible WACE examination students with the highest SCSA award scores based on the average of their best five scaled scores with at least two from each of the humanities/social sciences list and the mathematics/science list.

COURSE EXHIBITIONS (1)

A Course Exhibition is awarded to the top eligibles tudent obtaining the highest combined mark in a WACE course.

Hale School students have now won the Course Exhibition in Engineering Studies for five years in succession. The course itself began just six years ago.

The School is immensely proud of all of its Year 12 students of 2012 and congratulates each of them.

All students deserve acknowledgement and credit for their academic achievements in 2012. While individual successes are rightly praised, a review of Hale's performance in terms of ATARs gained and Exhibitions and Certificates awarded in 2012 and over the past five years shows how strongly each year group has performed as a whole. The following characteristics have been consistent amongst Year 12 WACE students over this period:

- all students have striven for excellence and, in particular, average students have performed to their best
- teamwork and collaboration have been hallmarks of the way students study and learn
- a strong sense of identity and pride has been evident in their class groups and as senior students in their academic areas
- the Forrest Library has assumed a valued, central role as a resource and study centre
- excellent, respectful and trusting relationships are maintained between students and staff

In summary, the School's culture of good learning is a value genuinely shared by students, parents and staff and it has been strongly exemplified in this five year period by the performance of its Year 12 students.

The Stage 2 course Business Management & Enterprise 2AB was also named as having highest performing students.

HEAD OF JUNIOR SCHOOL

From my years in education, I have always found that schools are places that seem to be forever evolving, always looking to the future and reflecting on how best to prepare the students for their lives ahead. The Junior School is no exception. As a staff, we are constantly reflecting on best practice, current research and literature, and on our own professional judgement. The Junior School is not only a place for student learning, but one for teacher learning. We like to think that all involved in the Junior School are a part of a community of learners.

One initiative that has been implemented by the teaching team in 2012 is what we call, 'Communities of Practice', or CoPs. Every Wednesday after school, the teaching team has met in interest groups that are looking at topics such as:

- Boy responsive pedagogy (teaching, learning and practice)
- Emotional Intelligence
- Developing apps
- Visible learning
- Mathematical Literacy

The participants read a range of professional materials related to their selected topic, reflect on practice and consider strategies for further implementation and considerations in our work. Through this strategy, the Junior School teachers have demonstrated a commitment to their own ongoing learning and development as expert teachers whose goal it is to provide the boys with the best education possible.

We continue to be committed to the Australian Curriculum and are always reflecting on making the delivery engaging, creative and boy responsive. Our approach is data informed, research based and futures orientated. We strive to equip our boys with the skills required to access the curriculum through targeted and precise intervention, while nurturing creativity, critical thinking and goal setting. The challenge for the teaching team is to continue to define and refine the content of the Australian Curriculum, while providing opportunities for the boys to explore, create, solve and excel.

The boys continue to thrive in the Junior School. As always, life is busy for the boys, particularly as they progress to the older grades where, in addition to the day to day learning programme, there are many co-curricular opportunities.

Within the Arts, the boys have had the opportunity to join Art Club, with their work being displayed at a number of exhibitions both within and outside the School. The musical opportunities for the boys include the ensembles, Junior School Band and Orchestra, with numerous opportunities to perform for an appreciative audience. The Junior School musicians also took their talents to Bridgetown where they spent two days performing and showcasing Hale's music programme to the local primary schools. I was very proud to witness the way the boys interacted with the Bridgetown students and school communities. They were truly fine ambassadors for our school. And, who could forget the Book Week and Christmas performances directed by Hale's amazing drama staff? These productions are full of colour, comedy and opportunities for all boys to have their moment in the spotlight.

The boys at Hale continue to go above and beyond, thriving on developing their strengths and seizing opportunities. This year our boys

competed in Tournament of Minds, the da Vinci Decathlon, and various mathematics and literature competitions. It is always a pleasure to acknowledge these boys' results at our assembly. Their intellect and commitment are a great inspiration!

Hale boys continue to thrive on the sporting field. When comparing enrolment numbers between the Junior Schools in the PSA competition, it is fair to say that we well and truly 'bat above our weight'. This was evident at the JPSSA Athletics Carnival in September where the Junior School team, after leading all day, finished second following some close finishes in the relays. The courage, determination and support for all competitors, both our team and other schools, was indicative of what we see every Thursday during interschool fixtures. The boys' sportsmanship is always a source of great pride for teachers and parents.

During the past 18 months, the Junior School Executive has been working with architects to develop a Junior School master plan. The plan has allowed us to articulate our vision for the physical structures and surrounds that would best promote boy responsive practice. While this plan will evolve over a number of years, it is exciting to see Stage 1, the new art room, or 'Creative Studio' construction underway. Junior School Art Specialist, Ms Lisa Hakkinen, played a crucial role in setting a vision for a studio that goes beyond the traditional art room, allowing the boys to experiment and create art that is truly diverse and highly creative.

In addition to building on existing practice and ideas, some of which have been mentioned in this article, I am looking forward to exploring and enhancing the boys' global connections, particularly with Asia. These visions go beyond learning languages and the culture, which will obviously play a part, but investigating the potential of collaborative projects and regular communication with schools in the Asia region. On Friday 1 June Hale School's Year 8 da Vinci Decathlon team were successful in winning the Western Australian da Vinci Decathlon title at Wesley College.

The Western Australian da Vinci Decathlon is an all day Interschool competition operated in the spirit of an Olympic Decathlon. Teams of eight Year 8 students from each school compete in ten events of an academic nature. The events included Engineering, Art and Poetry, Science, Games of Strategy, English, Creative Producers, Mathematics, Philosophy, General Knowledge and Code Breaking.

Twenty nine schools competed for the Western Australian title this year. The Hale School team was comprised of Domenic Quail (captain), Aditya Ganguly, Haseeb Riaz, Christopher Shields, Harry Walters, Matthew Blacker, Jonathon Battista and James Dingley. As the winning school the team were invited to compete in the National da Vinci Decathlon in Sydney during Week 10 of Term 3. The twelve top schools in the country came together to compete in a final decathlon over three days, held at the prestigious Knox Grammar School in Sydney. Our team was up against some very high quality opponents from around the country. Well over 200 schools now compete to make it into the national decathlon each year and this competition showcased the best of them. After three days of competition it was still not clear who was in the lead. Hale School won the General Knowledge event, came second in both the Art and Poetry and Creative Producers events and finished very well in several others. Overall the team finished sixth in the national competition, which this year was won by Knox Grammar, the host school.

In addition to the competition the boys spent time sightseeing in the Sydney CBD. Highlights included visits to the The Sydney Aquarium, The Museum of Contemporary Art and a hearty dinner in Chinatown. The middle day of the competition was excursion day and all of the competing schools took a ferry cruise, walked across the Sydney Harbour Bridge and spent time exploring Darling Harbour.

The team trained very hard for both the Western Australian and National decathlons, giving up many of their lunchtimes over Terms 2 and 3 to be coached by dedicated staff. While all teams, with the help and support of their coaches, strive to win, top scores are only part of the real value of being involved in debating. Over the course of the WADL and AHISA seasons, Middle School boys formed close connections with their team members, collaborating together during preparation meetings with their coaches Ms Wendy Cormack, Dr Melanie Hindley and Ms Geetha James, as well as spending time together out of school or in the boarding house to discuss topics and to hone the arguments and tactics they used to real advantage on debating evenings. Boarding boys also had the valuable support of Mr Luke Owen - Old Boy, Brine House Resident Supervisor and experienced debater. Our novice teams also benefitted enormously from senior debaters such as Hamish Newman and Theo Stapleton who attended planning and preparation meetings to support the boys and to offer ideas on both the information to be included and the method of delivery.

In 1925, American political thinker and social activist Dudley Field Malone spoke in defence of academic freedom, stating "I have never in my life learned anything from a man who agreed with me." In acquiring and practicing the skills of considered and courteous argument, our Middle School debaters were given the opportunity to develop and hone an important lifelong skill. I look forward to seeing team members continue to perfect these skills over time as they continue to progress in their debating skills in the coming years.

The Year 8s were a little up and down early in the year with the 8As and 8Bs winning as many as they lost (3-3). The 8Cs were the best performed of the Year 8s with five wins and only the one loss.

2012 was an exciting time for Hale School cricket as we welcomed former Australian Cricket Captain Kim Hughes to the coaching ranks. The cricketers demonstrated that there is a bright future ahead for Hale School in the Darlot Cup. Between the six Middle School cricket teams only two fixtures were lost. A couple of rising stars were also unearthed in the batting ranks with some Middle School batsmen proving a little difficult for the opposition to dismiss.

Over 40 boys signed up to the rowing programme in summer, a healthy sign that interest continues to grow in the sport. Conditioning the boys for Year 9 racing is what the season is all about and the boys were able to develop a solid base level of fitness throughout the term. The boys were again put through some important safe boat handling skills in the first few weeks and were then instructed on the techniques of scull oar rowing, both in quads and sculls. Alternating between the school gym for their fitness work and Cygnet Hall for their technique sessions the boys have certainly put the hard yards in and are ready to reap the rewards in Term 1, 2013. The PSA Swimming Championships were held at Challenge Stadium on March 15. The rivalry between Hale School and Christ Church Grammar School in the pool again intensified, for the third successive year Hale finished in second place (991 points) behind Christ Church (1080 points). It is interesting to note that in 2011 Hale finished 268 points behind Christ Church and only four points ahead of Wesley College (3rd place). This year we were only 89 points behind Christ Church and 94 points ahead of Wesley, with improvement like this again next year we should be in with a real chance!

There were some great individual performances by our Middle School boys on the night, highlighted by the Year 7 Medley Relay team of Benjamin Sloan (back), James Haskis (breast), Tom Cumming (fly), and Callan England (free) taking out first place and beating the old record by a second (Time: 2:25:55).

In tennis the 8As had a clean sweep of victories through the term, while the depth of Hale School tennis was evident with the 8Bs and Cs only losing the one fixture. Several Year 8 boys were given the opportunity to train with the seniors and by the end of the year they were pushing for 1st team selection. The Year 7A and B sides both had four wins and two losses respectively.

Volleyball proved to be an extremely popular sport in 2012. Since becoming part of the Year 7 physical education curriculum in 2010, interest in the sport has continued to grow each year. The 7/8/9A and B sides both had four wins and one loss to start the year on a high while the D and E sides were able to give some exposure to boys who had never played the sport competitively before.

It was again a successful start to the year for our water polo players. Under the watchful eye of Mr Liggins the 7/8/9As and Bs both won four and lost one game in Term 1. The 7/8/9Cs had a five-one win/loss record while the 7/8/9Ds went through the term without a loss.

WINTER SPORT REPORT

Our junior cross country runners finished in fourth place this season and impressively a number of our junior runners also doubled up and competed with the senior cross country boys on Saturday mornings. The fourth placing was one position better than last year and all boys can be proud of the significant improvements they were able to make to their times throughout the winter months.

After a year off due to long service leave, perennial 8A football coach and former West Coast Eagle, Mr O'Connell was back at the helm. As Year 7s in 2011 the boys went through the season undefeated, however, as Year 8s in 2012 the boys found their PSA counterparts a little harder, winning four and losing six games. The 8Bs faired a little better with eight wins while the Year 7 sides led the way with both the As and Bs remaining undefeated for the season.

The Middle School hockey teams continued the upward trend of all Hale School hockey teams in 2012. After a few years in the hockey wilderness the hockey programme at Hale is as healthy as it has ever been. The 1st XI boys were able to grab a share of the Ray House Cup for the first time in 22 years and as a school we were able to retain the Tregonning Trophy against Christ Church Grammar School. After stepping down from eight years in charge of the 1st XI hockey side, Mr Barron had an instant impact with the 8As with the boys winning seven of their nine games. In a true sign of depth in the year group the 8B side went through the season undefeated. The 7As were also able to unearth some future hockey talent as they won five, drew one, lost one.

In terms of win/loss records and on field success, rugby has been the most dominant sport at Hale in the last ten years. Not only have the 1st VIII side won the PSA Brother Redmond trophy every year but across all year groups we continue to develop a production line of rugby players. This is a great reflection of the quality of coaching that the boys receive during their Hale rugby playing days. The 8As continued where they left off in 2011 by remaining undefeated for the second year in a row. The 7As were able to amass seven wins and some big winning margins along the way.

A large number of boys again chose soccer as their PSA winter sport. The popularity and profile of the sport continues to grow within the school and it is interesting to note that it is the second most participated PSA sport across both seasons. The 8As followed on from their outstanding year in 2011, again going through the season undefeated. The 8Bs also had a successful season winning more games than they lost. The Year 7A side only dropped a couple of games while the 7Bs also went through without losing a match.

As is always the case in an Olympic year there was genuine excitement and anticipation for a big day at the athletics stadium on Friday 14 September at AK Reserve. As it so happens the PSA Athletics results would take on an all too familiar trend to the PSA swimming results with the final placings remaining the same as the previous year. Hale finished in third place (1493 points), behind Aquinas College (1664) and Scotch College (1687). Blair Harding (Year 8) finished among the top three point scorers across all schools in the PSA under 14 division.

Sport at Hale could not happen without the help of our coaches, managers, officials, administrators, kitchen staff and supportive parents and friends of the Hale community on the sidelines. On behalf of the boys, thank you to all.

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STAFF FAREWELLS



Jill Maskiell

Jill Maskiell's legacy at Hale School will be the introduction of Health Education and her principal role in building an outstanding Service Learning programme. In her 18 years at Hale (1995 - 2012) Jill introduced programmes that are now part of the School's character. Jill was the Senior School's first health education specialist and its first Service Learning Coordinator. Jill was enormously effective in both of these pioneering roles for a number of reasons. First, she was able to successfully communicate her own passionate belief in the importance of health education and service learning to colleagues and students. Secondly, she did everything with professionalism, commitment and the utmost integrity. Her warm personality, cheerfulness and good humour together with unflagging persistence were an additional, winning combination of qualities.



Michael O'Connell

Michael O'Connell burst onto the Hale School scene 18 years ago when appointed to the position of Head of Art, commencing in Term 1, 1995. Previously, Michael had been Head of Visual Arts at Sacred Heart College, Sorrento. During his Hale School years, Michael's inspiring teaching and excellent communications skills in visual arts education were of enormous value to countless students and to his colleagues. For nearly two decades, Hale School art students Years 8 - 12 loved being in Mr O'Connell's classes for his unfailingly positive and enthusiastic approach, his rare ability to connect with every student and his skill in transmitting art knowledge in every medium. Initially appointed to the PE Department in a temporary, part-time role in 1995, Jill developed an excellent health education curriculum which was promptly implemented in all classes, Years 8 - 10. Jill's influence was immediate, symbolised very soon after her arrival by her Department's name change to the PE and HE Department, reflecting its expanded responsibility to teach health education in addition to physical education. In 1997, Jill and Jim Ashby jointly developed a Years 11 and 12 health education programme using guest speaker periods and the 5A lessons. This compulsory, relevant programme for senior boys, extending from the Years 8 - 10 programme which was experienced by all students, is now widely admired in WA. Few schools have a coherent, compulsory health education curriculum, Years 8 - 12. Jill was able to coordinate collaborative team teaching involving all her new PE and HE Department colleagues to deliver the health education curriculum she had developed.

From 2002, Jill became increasingly involved with the Service Learning programme which had been introduced to the School by Michael Beech and Richard Goater. She linked the school to a number of agencies which provide services to the disabled or disadvantaged in society, developing programmes through which students mainly in Years 8 - 10 could volunteer to help. In 2003, the first Sony Camp for disabled children was held at Hale. This provided 24 hour care to severely disabled children and gave their parents or carers a much needed break in the lead up to Christmas. Jill coordinated these annual camps

Michael was also a practising artist, a fine painter and sculptor, who needed to combine teaching with his own creative work. This was an enormous challenge to Michael and one which at the same time brought great benefits to his students as they saw Michael's passion and authenticity as an artist become fused within his teaching.

In 1998 he stepped down from his position as Head of Art and took leave without pay to work full-time as an artist for two years, 1998 - 1999. From his loft studio in Hay St Subiaco artworks flowed and successful exhibitions were held. In 2000, Michael returned to Hale as a parttime art teacher and continued to inspire his students and, as always, contribute wonderfully to the co-curricular programme by coaching the 8A football team and as head long jump coach for Hale's Inters Athletics team. Michael's role at Hale quickly became full-time and permanent once again.

Michael was proud of his background as a star school-boy sportsman at Trinity College, 1975 - 79, as a pillar of Claremont Football Club 1980 - 87 and as a West Coast Eagles team member in their first two years, 1987 - 88, and this background made him an (over) qualified and much loved coach of the Year 8A football team for many years. That same extensive football background fuelled conversations in the classroom for as long as one wished it to. for many years, attracting large numbers of Year 12 student volunteers, every year. By 2006 Jill had been committed to service learning for a number of years, while still remaining Coordinator of Health Education. In that year she resigned from that role and took on the inaugural role of Coordinator of Service Learning. Another service learning initiative for which Jill had responsibility was the Nulsen Youth Patron programme, which provided Year 11 students with further opportunities to volunteer to assist the disabled. The annual Year 12 service learning tour to Vietnam and Cambodia, initiated by Jill, is now seen as the culmination of service learning experiences at Hale. The work undertaken by Year 12 students in orphanages and other institutions in Vietnam and Cambodia, including the work with the RideAid Foundation and the Christina Noble Foundation, is profoundly moving for many of the boys involved. Under Jill's guidance and personal example, many students at Hale have learnt to "see the person not the disability".

Typical of Jill's commitment to others was her choice to spend her long service leave working in orphanages in Vietnam. Jill Maskiell's value as a role model to students, living out the values of selflessness and compassion which underpin the service learning programme, could hardly be bettered. We wish her well in her retirement.

Michael's value in a boys school as a role model combining sporting brilliance, the creative arts and love of education was inestimable.

In 2004, Michael was commissioned by the Governors of Hale School to create art works for the new Senior Boarding House. Michael's characteristically warm and exuberant sculptures and paintings are now a permanent visual presence there. Year 12 student work of outstanding quality was produced consistently under Michael's inspiring guidance as testified by the many Hale Year 12 artworks selected for the annual Art Gallery of WA Perspectives Exhibition, chosen from all Year 12 WACE Art students works submitted for examination. His former student Christian De Vietri is now considered one of Australia's most collectable artists and he has an international reputation.

Michael had repeated, successful exhibitions at the Moore's Building Gallery, Fremantle, over the years 2010 -12 and exhibited successfully in Sydney in 2011. He had taken leave from Hale once again in 2011, which enabled him to enjoy a period of great energy, productivity and creativity as an artist. He returned once again to Hale in 2012 but it was perhaps inevitable that his resignation would come. It did so at the end of 2012 and was received with great regret by the School. We wish Michael O'Connell success and happiness in his next phase of life as a full-time artist and thank him for his unique contribution to the School.

Recently, as she farewelled her colleagues, Kay said that she had considered it a privilege to be a teacher, and that she had loved her time at Hale School. In fact, it has been our privilege to have her with us, and she leaves us having earned our great affection and respect.

James Egan joined the teaching staff of the Design and Technology Department in a temporary capacity for Terms 2, 3 and 4, 2008, quickly establishing a reputation as a cheerful, hardworking young teacher. The following year he worked in industry but returned to teaching and to Hale in a permanent role in 2010. James taught Design and Technology to Years 8, 9 and 10 classes, enthusing the younger boys, particularly, with his passion for design, his hands-on approach and love of creative, practical work. He also taught Materials, Design and Technology to Year 11 students. In addition to his teaching, James took on the role of the DT Department technician in 2011-12. James was a skilful coach of junior volleyball teams and also coached and supervised the Hale surfing team, 2010-2012. In 2011 and again in 2012, James was a staff group leader on the Year 10 Outdoor Education camp at Exmouth. His good humour and energy made him ideal in this role. In his brief time here, James Egan seized the opportunities provided to develop his teaching skills, to get involved in coaching various sports and to experience the Exmouth Outdoor Education programme. Speech Day Address 2012

For all but two days since migrating to Australia nearly 5 years ago, Hale has been my life.

I arrived on the 1st of February and started Year 8 on the 4th – and since then, I have spent endless afternoons on the cricket field, countless evenings debating what we were going to be debating with the debating team and a lot of very, very early mornings trying to make up for my chronic procrastination. Living between these walls has demanded every bit of my effort, attention and determination – but I really would have it no other way. It's hard to pinpoint a specific moment or memory that is most important to me over my time here, but I would have to say that this speech could very well be it.

After what was an extremely moving and emotional evening assembly at Valedictory a few weeks ago, I took the time to walk around the school ovals and recall my five years at this school. I spent 20 minutes or so reflecting on the end of my school career and all the friends, memories and opportunities that it has given me – but I struggled to grasp the fact that I was leaving everything behind. Suddenly my future looked hollow and empty. It was a feeling I can't really describe, but it's a feeling that I'm sure that everyone had at some stage during that evening. Our time at school was over.

During that time of reflection, I realised that I have so much to say to all of you in this hall today, and this is why the next three minutes are probably the most important of my school career. After all that you have given me, now it's time for me to give back.

When I first came to the school I was extremely tentative, nervous, and sometimes scared. I spent the first two weeks of Year 8 sitting by myself on the other side of Craig Oval overlooking the pond, hoping no-one would see me. I was struggling with my new lifestyle. I didn't understand Australian culture. And I didn't quite get the school's traditions.

Every one of us when we come to high school - whether we have made the short trip from the Junior School, from down the road, from the wheatbelt or from the other side of the world -everyone has shared that same sense of caution and anxiety. But we also shared a huge sense of anticipation.

At the start of our time at Hale, we are all free to choose our own path in a new environment, with new faces and fantastic new opportunities and facilities. Each of us has been influenced in some way by the people around us. Whether it's a Prefect, a Head of House, PCL, the Headmaster or your History teacher. Each of us takes time to find our feet and assert ourselves in our new surroundings, we are all searching for something that we enjoy. Something that makes us tick - that strikes a chord with us. It is something that's not the same for everyone – there is no right or wrong, but it will shape our personality and connection with the school.

For me, after my initial struggles coping with my new school in an unfamiliar country – I found my breakthrough. Walking out to open the batting for the 8As cricket team, I was going into battle with someone whose name I did not know, whose past I had no knowledge of, and whose sporting ability I had never seen – but for both of us, the game represented a common language and a passion for representing the school.

At the Valedictory assembly when the Year 12s stand up together as a year group and face the school – it is at that moment when all our collective achievements are critiqued and judged by the school. Each and every one of us has our own unique and special talents, interests and aspirations. We've had our individual successes, like those guys involved in the winning football, rugby and hockey teams and our unprecedented five honours students but we are nothing without each other.

In this room, all of you are at a unique stage in your own Hale innings, and whilst leaving school may seem to be such an exciting prospect – it means nothing without having capitalised on your time here.

When we stood up together as unit, the class of 2012, for me it was like being a part of a jigsaw puzzle. Each and every student represented a unique and distinct piece of the puzzle - forged by our own individual identity, personality, and shaped by our respective journeys through the school. The pieces fitted together to form the big picture which was underpinned by the Hale value system of excellence, leadership and integrity. Every piece was just as important as the other and every piece is needed to complete the picture.

The most important thing is - if at first your own unique piece doesn't fit – don't give up. I encourage all of you to find out how and where you fit in to the puzzle.

That special moment after Valedictory that I was talking about, for so many boys it was filled with

satisfaction and joy but for others there were feelings of remorse and regret. You may think you've heard this all before: go try music, give debating a go, stick with water polo. It's not about that. I'm not here to tell you who to be and what to do; I'm just trying to convince you to express yourself. Find out what makes you who you are as a person, as a student, of this amazing school.

It doesn't matter if your thing is half-back flank for the 3rd XVIII, a violin soloist in the concert band or captain of the RC Modellers club - it matters not how good you are, how many awards, trophies, or symbols you have on your blazer. In 30 years' time these will be forgotten memories. It is the qualities of passion, motivation and desire forged into you as a result of your time here that will stand the test of time.

This the last hour of my life where I can call myself a Hale School student. When I exit these doors, there will be no one to tell me to tuck my shirt in, no signing in at the Roundhouse when I'm late and no one to replace my locker key when it gets lost – I am completely free, somewhat exposed and unprotected but what I can cling to, are the values that this school has taught me.

So when your time comes for you to stand up in front of the school as leavers, as the audience scans across your faces, what does your big picture look like? What part did you play in the puzzle? Did you find your fit?

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

I begin this report with an updated perspective of the recent and ongoing journey of Outdoor Education at a school, community and national level.

Since 2010 Outdoor Education Australia (OEA) had lobbied hard to have Outdoor Education recognised as a subject in its own right and for it to be included in Phase 3 of the Australian Curriculum implementation. Firstly, OEA had to establish a unique outcome that was covered by no other subject and it pinned hopes of success on the "relationship" that Outdoor Education develops with the natural environment, as opposed to "knowledge of" or "activity within" as covered under the disciplines of Geography and Physical Education. The submission however was unsuccessful and the subject was relegated to being merely an integral element of Physical and Health Education, with the suggestion that the many outcomes of Outdoor Education were satisfactorily covered therein. In May 2012, the Shaping Paper for Physical and Health Education was released by ACARA (Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority) for comment.

The subsequent response to the shaping paper from the Outdoor Education community can only be described as overwhelming for ACARA who were inundated with submissions. None of the panel would have expected the level of passionate and considered feedback. It was

somewhat of a surprise for a discipline that is generally disjointed due to the tyrannies of distance and absence, our greatest plight - saved somewhat by information and together when they are away often and without synchronicity. Outside of the teachers of the formal Outdoor Education curriculum, university students, community groups such as "Nature Play", Outdoor Education and Recreation workers, and the general public all got behind the call for response. The sleeping giant had roused and OEA had ostensibly forced ACARA to sit up and take some notice. It was as much in the interest of Hale School as any other education institution to lodge a submission. Like so many of our private school peers, while we choose to teach Outdoor Education in an expedition style programme rather than the classroom, we serve to cover the integral curriculum through an ever increasing belief in its necessary place in holistic education.

To the many who have asked, "so what do you do when you are not on camp?" A small part of the answer then is to champion the cause of Outdoor Education for all and Hale School students into the future. To this end we have departmental members serving on; the board of Outdoor Education Australia, subcommittees of the state peak body, The Caving Management Advisory and Ningaloo Marine Park Management Committees which report to the Department of Conservation, Notre

VIETNAM CAMBODIA TOUR

In the early hours of Friday 6 April, 15 Hale boys and staff hopped on a plane destined for Cambodia. This was the moment that we had all been planning for many months and it was to be the start of a truly amazing and lifechanging experience.

As soon as we stepped off the plane in Phnom Penh we were able to get a taste of what the trip was going to be like. The hectic streets and the lack of road safety, along with the continuous honking of motorcycles, both shocked and amazed us.

On Saturday we visited "Hale School" where, after initial shyness, we played with the children, sang songs and generally had a great time. That afternoon we went to the New Life Orphanage which is for children who have lost their parents to AIDS. There we played games with the children, sang to them and, in return, they sang us some local songs.

The next day we visited the Mango Tree Organisation, a place where local children can interact with each other and learn through play. We were welcomed by the children from Mango Tree and Goute D'Eau and played various games and activities with them. That afternoon we returned to the New Life Orphanage where we played games similar to the day before.

The following day was a very emotional one in which we were able to fully understand the impact that Pol Pot's regime had on the people of Cambodia. We visited the S-21 Museum, which had once been a school that was transformed into a torture centre where thousands of innocent men, women and children were sent following this we went to the Killing Fields where the survivors from S-21 were taken to be executed. For many in the group these two visits were incredibly overwhelming and confronting. Following this we left Phnom Penh and travelled by coach to Sihanoukville, a small town on the Cambodian coast.

In Sihanoukville we visited the M'Lop Tapang Shelter which gives impoverished children education and an opportunity to escape their unfortunate circumstances. We split up into small groups and went into the classrooms where we read books, coloured in and played games. That afternoon we returned to the M'Lop Tapang shelter where we played our annual soccer match, which we unfortunately lost! In the evening we had dinner at the M'Lop Tapang restaurant, which is actually run by street children and one of the many programmes set up by the M'Lop Tapang organisation. From Sihanoukville we headed back to Phnom Penh and then to Hoi An in Vietnam

The first organisation which we visited was the Red Cross Adult Shelter. Here we were confronted with a facility that was underfunded and whose residents were not receiving nearly enough care. We spent our time visiting the elderly residents, sharing stories with them, showing them pictures of Australia and, overall, bringing joy into their lives. That afternoon we visited the Kianh Foundation's newly opened day centre which delivers specialist education and health services to children with disabilities. There we all had a great time singing, dancing and playing games and by the end, we were all sad to leave.

The following day, we went to the Village of Hope in Da Nang, an orphanage for disadvantaged children. In the afternoon we walked to the Hoi An Orphanage which would turn out for many of us to be our favourite place. Walking into rooms with disabled children was a shock for most people, though we quickly became involved by picking up the children and playing with them in the playground.

On Sunday morning we visited the Ethnic Minority Boarding School in Hoi An where we received an extremely warm welcome from the 450 students. We were nervous about having to perform songs for them though we were met by a huge applause from the students. We then played volleyball, cricket and football with the children for many hours and by the end we were all exhausted. We returned to the Hoi An Orphanage that afternoon and played with the children just as we had done the day before. As we entered the rooms we could see the children's faces light up, revealing to us the positive effect we had had on them. Leaving was very hard to do and tears were shed on both sides as we had to part from our new friends.

On Monday we flew to Ho Chi Minh City and in the afternoon visited the War Remnants Museum. This was confronting for all of us, though very important as we were able to understand the terrible effects of the Vietnam War and the reasons behind why the country is in its current position.

Over the next few days we visited projects run by the Christina Noble Children's Foundation (CNCF). This included the Social and Medical Centre that provides medical treatment to children and the Tay Ninh School for the visually impaired. At these places we interacted with children of all ages by singing, dancing and playing musical instruments. On the final day spent in Vietnam, we took some of the children from the Sunshine School (CNFC) to the Dam Sen waterpark which was a great day for all.

Everyone on the trip was touched in some way by their experiences in Vietnam and Cambodia and, ultimately, it was a life-changing experience, with many of the boys already saying that they would like to return in the future. I would like to sincerely thank Jason Dallman, Maree Harden and Alex, Clare and Jill Maskiell for the organisation put into the trip and their endless support on what, at times, is a stressful tour. I would also encourage everyone who is thinking of applying for the tour to do so as it is definitely worthwhile.

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NULSEN YOUTH PATRON PROGRAMME

Nulsen is an organisation that provides for adults living with intellectual and physical disabilities, while working to break down the social barriers set up by society. As a part of the Nulsen initiative, four Youth Patrons and eight committee members were chosen as Year 11s, to work with and for the Nulsen cause.

As a group we partook in various events and activities throughout the year with the Nulsen community. On two occasions, groups of residents from all over Perth came to watch the Hale sport fixtures on Saturday mornings. We were able to engage in conversations with the residents and build friendships for future visits while watching the best sport Hale has to offer, in what were extremely successful mornings The Nulsen cocktail party was another key event for the year in which the Patrons and committee members attended. The upbeat atmosphere of the night and the vibrant energy of the residents and their families made for an enjoyable night for all. Some of the residents also visited Hale on our Interhouse Athletics and Arts Cup days, both of which saw the residents enjoy the various talents Hale boys have to offer, as well as the company of the Patrons and Committee members. These events allowed us to connect with the residents around Perth and give them an enjoyable experience. The fundraising events that we were involved in were numerous and varied. The first initiative was the Scope Café coffee mornings. This saw us being trained as baristas, and then thrown into the deep end at Scope Café Floreat Forum. Proceeds went to Nulsen and, while we raised two thousand dollars, we all had a really good time. The second event was a Junior School cake day, which was a great opportunity for the senior boys to talk to the Junior School and make them aware of Nulsen, and service learning in general in the Senior School. The last fundraiser was the City to Surf Fun Run. All of us ran different events, from the

4km walk to the marathon, while raising money individually. After all three fundraisers we had amassed almost five thousand dollars. This was beyond all expectations, and was double last year's total. As a group, we hope to see this continue.

Over the past year, we've been fortunate enough to visit five Nulsen homes, and meet various residents. Visiting these purpose-built homes really gave us all an insight into what it would be like to live with a disability, but most importantly, allowed us to realise that these inspirational people that we had the privilege of meeting were just like ourselves: they loved to have a laugh, loved company, were keen to get involved with the community and had several hobbies of their own. Getting to visit homes and build relationships with the residents really defined this programme for us. One of our favourite experiences as a group was going to the Herald Avenue residence, and meeting a bloke also called Nathan. Nathan has an intellectual disability called Down Syndrome, and we got to spend an afternoon with him, getting to know his love of Kylie Minogue, as well as getting to flick through his photo albums with him! We were all instantly attracted to Nathan's bubbly personality and we didn't want to leave at the end of the day. All in all, being able to visit homes regularly has allowed us to build strong friendships with the residents we've met and these are friendships that we will cherish for many years to come.

The overall comment from the boys was that the programme with which we became involved was an unforgettable experience, and we've made sure to express to all the current Year 10s the need to apply and to be involved with Nulsen. We're all very grateful for the time and energy those involved spent on the initiative and we hope it continues for the future.

Throughout the year, many students have been scheduled to attend the Hale School Forrest Library for classes other than their timetabled Reading Enrichment and Information Literacy sessions. Many subject areas such as Science, Commerce, English, History and Design and Technology have booked a library area and a Teacher Librarian to work with the students to develop research units based on Guided Inquiry where students are guided through finding and using information. Students' ability to be smart researchers has become a significant and important focus.

During Library and Information Week, Justin D'Ath was the Author in Residence where he discussed with the students the art of writing. He has a vast collection of books to his name and was able to impart some tips and tricks for writing, which he also shared with the Creative Writing students.

As Book Week's theme was "Champions Read," we had Hale Old Haleian Todd Pearson spend a lunchtime talking to the students about being a champion swimmer and having a balance in life, part of which for him was reading before a big race to relax. Kyle Godwin is a young professional rugby player who talked about enjoying his chosen sport and discussed with the boys the books he read as a teenager that are still popular reads with the boys.

It has been amazing to see the students taking advantage of the Library during their own time such as after school where many of them form study groups. The boarders also make effective use of the time they spend in the library with their Drop Everything and Read programme. DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

This year the Design and Technology Department has incorporated new technology in some of the Year 10 courses. Through the generosity of the Parents' and Friends' Association we were able to purchase a 3D Printer. While this technology has been around for a number of years in industry, it has only recently become accessible to schools. Our students now have the mind blowing opportunity to not only create a 3D model or prototype on the computer screen but at the click of a button, they can print their creation in plastic. The Year 10 Materials Technology – Metal students got to try out the 3D printer as they designed a ring using Google SketchUp then printed the real thing using the 3D printer. The plastic model was then converted into a sterling silver ring through a lost "plastic" casting process.

Another innovation has been the use of SMD LED strip lighting. This inexpensive new technology has revolutionised the lighting industry and some of our Year 10 Materials Technology – Wood students jumped at the opportunity to use LED strip lighting in their lamp designs. The flexibility of this material stimulated some stunning lamp creations.

As usual, some of our DT students have produced outstanding work. Callum McKeon won first and second place in the Year 12 Artistic section of the Out of the Wood Competition. Luke Rao was announced the winner of his category in this year's Scitech Animation Film Festival screening with his animation titled 'Dinosaus in Modern Day'.

Occasionally, guest speakers like Mr Bausor and Mr Campbell present to these groups to cover areas of special interest like advanced algebra, Excel programming and 'Mathmagic'.

As a result of the training and practice provided within these clubs, Hale School has had students involved in all the major Mathematics competitions and Olympiads in 2012. Hale School received accolades for student performances in: Have Sum Fun; WAJO; Australian Intermediate Olympiad; Australian Senior Olympiad; Australian Mathematics Competition; and the ICAS Mathematics Assessment (UNSW).

DEBATING

The West Australian Debating League, or WADL, was founded in 1969 to establish a forum for competitive debate between Perth metropolitan schools. Hale had a total of 23 teams this year competing across all categories – Novice, Junior and Senjor. Over 60 schools took part in the competition that spanned a number of months, so just making it to the finals is a feat in itself.

The Hale School Senior Team, consisting of Hamish Robinson, Charlie Viska and Theo Stapleton, won their debate against a very strong Ballajura Senior team by just 1½ points to take out the title. After receiving the runner-up placing in 2011, the Senior Team worked hard throughout the year in a number of in-house debating competitions to give them the best opportunity to excel.

Hale School Debating Captain, Hamish Robinson, said "debating is one of the most rewarding programmes to be involved with at Hale. Not only is it fun but also provides a great platform to develop your communication skills and confidence. I have been debating since 2008 and have found it very rewarding. During 2012, five Year 11 students from Hale School participated in the University of Western Australia's extension programme, entitled "SmARTS", organised by the Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences. A total of 78 Year 11 students from 25 schools in Perth were involved in SmArts in 2012. The students from Hale School were: Tully Bennett, Edward Hutcheon, Varun Kaushik, Jackson Smith and Richard Xu.

The students were organised into ten small groups to explore a wide variety of topics in contemporary culture including "Emotions in the Media", "The Olympic Games and Globalisation", "An Investigation into Internet Dating" and "The effects of Film Music on the Emotions of Different Audiences".

The students were guided by tutors from the University of WA and worked, in effect, like first year undergraduates, using the Reid Library at UWA, producing an individual research paper, contributing to a group paper and performing in a group presentation at the University of WA. Excellent communication skills and the need for strong collaboration between all group members were fundamental to each group's success. Teamwork, good time-management and goal-setting were all skills drawn upon throughout the life of the programme.

Varun Kaushik and Edward Hutcheon won a number of awards at the SmArts Presentation Evening on 30 August. They were members of a group of ten students whose work won all three awards presented for group achievement: the Certificate for Innovation and Communication, the Certificate for Academic Excellence and the Certificate for Online Engagement. In addition, Varun was awarded the Certificate for Best Group Member for his initiative and leadership over the duration of the 6 month project. Varun's and Edward's group research topic was titled "Singing our Souls: An Exploration into the Relationship between Music and Identity".

We congratulate these students for their commitment to this academic extension programme. They gained a university-type experience while still at school and had to be very organised to manage the demands of the SmARTS programme in addition to the demands of school.

The SmARTS programme is a School Curriculum and Standards Authority Endorsed Programme and completion of the programme will be recorded as an achievement on the boys' WA Certificate of Education at the end of Year 12.

SUMMER SPORTS WRAP

The summer season always illustrates the depth in all Hale School sports teams. Too often, schools are judged solely on results, and particularly their 1st team results. In Term 1 2012, Hale 1st Teams placed 3rd, 5th, 4th, 2nd, 7th, 3rd and 3rd – an average of 3.9. However, such a statistic can be misleading depending on how one chooses to interpret results.

The following table maps the 1st team's overall winning percentage against all of the code's Hale teams. (Note: swimming and rowing not included)

Clearly, we enjoy plenty of depth throughout our grades. When boys arrive at Hale, they are inevitably subjected to the 'little fish in a big pond' speech and there is good reason for this as highlighted above. Competition for spots is as hot between C to B teams as it is for B to A teams!

In 2012, there are some emerging trends within the PSA and at Hale. In cricket, numbers are not as healthy as they were five years ago. There was no official PSA 'C' grade competition on Fridays and many schools are operating on thin numbers in their 'B' teams. Fortunately at Hale, we have not experienced a significant drop off in numbers and we were the only school to put out a 7/8C team who were able to pick up games against B teams with the PSA bye.

Rowing is another sport where numbers are dropping. That said, our numbers have been stable in the past few seasons as boys choosing to change sports have often been replaced with new boys keen to try rowing. At Hale, many boys are choosing not to stay in rowing once they enter Year 10 as the training load, early morning starts and time commitment takes its toll. Retention of boys in the shed remains the single biggest challenge for Hale rowing in the future.

Across the PSA, 2012 has seen a major shift towards basketball, volleyball and water polo. There is no doubt that boys are choosing these particular sports for their shorter game times on Saturdays and reduced training loads when compared with rowing and cricket.

BASKETBALL REPORT

WATER POLO REPORT

Senior water polo at Hale School is a popular sport amongst day boys and boarders. This popularity resulted in Hale School fielding four teams in the 2012 season. The 2nd VII went through the season losing one game; the first loss by a Hale School 2nd VII in three years. The 3rd VII won all their fixtures and the 4th VII were competitive against second and third teams from the other PSA schools.

Preparation for the 2012 season started early for those of us wishing to be considered for selection for the 1st VII, with the first training session of the year on January 2. The squad trained every day, apart from Sundays, throughout the January holiday period.

WINTER SPORTS REPORT

2012 will be a historic year for Hale School as 1st Team premierships were won in football, rugby and hockey. The only other school ever to win this winter combination in the history of the PSA was Aquinas College in 1972.

Hale has become a dominant school in recent PSA winter seasons. The two major drivers for this success in winter, across all codes, are culture and depth. In the summer codes, 2-3 dominant players can win a premiership for their school as the numbers required are much smaller than they are in winter. In winter, 2-3 good football players will not be enough to carry a squad of 30 players, nor will 1 or 2 stars win a school the Brother Redmond Cup for ten consecutive years.

Our 1st badminton team slipped down the ladder for the first time in many years. Honours recipient, Shaun Lee, and Matthew Wang were more than competitive in the top singles and doubles matches but the squad didn't enjoy the depth of years gone by.

The cross country team are very satisfied with their overall 3rd position in the senior competition. Having finished 3rd overall last year, this is the best result Hale has ever achieved given the team very nearly pipped Trinity College for 2nd position. The team was led superbly by Max Davidson and Jack Sirett, both premier runners in the PSA, but also great leaders within the team. Mr Chris Guard brought many Middle School boys with him this year and there is no doubt they contributed to the result this year.

The 1st XVIII has won the Alcock Cup for the third time in 4 years. The results indicate they did not lose a game and their dominance is perhaps best highlighted when noting that they finished four games clear of second placed Aquinas with a percentage just under 250%. Undefeated teams are often referred to as 'champions' which seems fitting given this was a champion team and not a team of

champions. Over 30 players were used in the 1st XVIII squad this year, including a number of late bloomers who did not play in the A teams on their way through the school.

The Ray House Hockey Cup came back to Hale School for the first time in 22 years. 1990 was the last time Hale won the cup and 2012 is only the third time it has been won by Hale. The 1st XI needed a draw or win in their last fixture to win the competition outright but finding the back of the net proved harder than their last encounter as a determined Christ Church keeper and rotten luck meant that the cup would have to be shared with Wesley College. Hockey is now very healthy at Hale, right through the year groups - many footy players are transferring back to hockey. Congratulations to all hockey teams who retained the Tregonning Trophy for the second year in a row against Christ Church.

For the 10th year in a row, the Brother Redmond Cup will stay at Hale in what has seemingly become its rightful resting place. It would be easy looking from the outside in to say that the rugby boys did it easy this season – but all boys would tell you they had to work very hard this year for all but a few of their wins and this was highlighted against Christ Church in the last round. The next ten years are looking pretty good too as almost all teams finished on top of their tables.

After a successful pre-season tour to the Gold Coast for the senior soccer squad, the 1st XI were out of the blocks early in the season but stumbled a little through the middle of the season which prevented a late charge. This team was more than competitive this year as the sides above them often only beat them by one goal. A more streamlined coaching structure and pathway is beginning to become more evident, which when coupled with some talented younger age groups moving through the school, should see Hale back to their usual top 3 position in the PSA competition.

Although the season-proper remained short, at four weeks, training and preparation began much earlier. Monday morning middledistance training began in early Term 2 and the sprint squad also started working some three weeks before the end of the winter season. All of this pre-season work was well attended and undoubtedly assisted boys to make the transition from winter sport to athletics.

The house Athletics Carnival was held just prior to the mid-term break and although Wilson were pipped by Riley House, they could still celebrate that day with the announcement of the appointment of the Captain of Athletics; the popular and athletically gifted Year 12 Wilson student, Voda van der Merwe, who would go on to perform exceptionally in his new role.

For the first time, the Hale Championships were run on a Friday afternoon. Competition began at 3.30pm and the early spring light faded only as the last senior high jump competitors were finishing off at around 6.00pm.The event was well attended by over 200 boys; perhaps being excused from Period 7 had something to do with the enormous warm up squad! In any case, there was a very positive vibe to the events with great parental and staff support.

The Hale Gift over 120 and 400 metres was held at lunchtime on Thursday 6 September. Congratulations to Year 8 student, Will Bevan, who took out the 400 Gift, and to Year 12, Craig Law, who won the 120 Gift for the second year running.

The following Saturday morning saw the Tri-Meet take place. Previously called the "Quads Meet", Scotch returned to competing with Christ Church, Wesley and Guildford, and what has always functioned as a non-competitive meet with Hale, Trinity and Aquinas went ahead at the Athletics Stadium. The meet served its purpose; boys competed to affirm selection in the inters team, and in doing so, got a feel for the track and how they'd fare against the mighty Aquinas squad and, previously mighty, Trinity team.

We were blessed with fine weather in the final week of the season and inters day conditions were perfect. There was no repeat of the 2011 watery deluges and the day started well. Under the modified schedule of events, the hurdles and the 1500s raced simultaneously and Hale posted much improved results in both events. In the field we achieved some great successes. Our discus squad was ranked as the top performing school in that event, and our long and triple jump squads were ranked second at the end of the day. The 400, 4x400 relay, 800, 1500, 3000, shot-put and triple jump competitions also all improved their rankings and the reports from coaches of extraordinary performances and personal bests proved that the Hale boys were really giving their all.

Two Hale students set new PSA records. In the Under 17 division, Year 11 student Josh Billington ran a magnificent race and set a new 100 metres record in a lightening quick 10.5 seconds – a time which also beasts the previous Open age-group record of 10.7 seconds. This is his second record in that event in consecutive years, as last year he broke the Under 16 record. And in the Under 13 division, Callan England set a new PSA record in the long jump of 5.29 metres, beating the old mark by 27cm; a fantastic effort given he was withdrawn from competition shortly afterwards after aggravating an existing back injury.

Although there we're many marvellous efforts, far too many to list here, two others particularly stood out. The first was Vice Captain Craig Law's efforts in competing in six events in the Open division and accruing a massive 73 points. The second fabulous effort was from Year 11, Jonathon Tapley, who competed in four events, winning three and accruing 63 points. Both of these boys are to be commended for their contributions.

Extraordinarily, even with our best efforts, the Scotch and Aquinas teams managed to blaze a substantial gap in the points score and forge a contest of two for the Alcock Shield. In what was a nail-biting finish, Scotch's victory depended upon their finishing strongly in the final event of the day; the Open 4x100 relay. The Hale team of Cody Meyer, Voda van der Merwe, Ryan Pallas and Craig Law took out the race in decisive fashion, but the shield went to Scotch for the second year in a row.
