EXCERPT FROM SENIOR SCHOOL SPEECH DAY ADDRESS 2015

In a recent edition of The Messenger, a monthly publication from the Anglican Diocese of Perth, the Archbishop refers to the story of a visitor to a property in the Australian outback, intrigued by the seemingly endless kilometres of farming country with no sign of any fences. He asked a local farmer how he kept trace of his cattle. The farmer replied "Oh that's no problem. Out here we dig wells instead of building fences." The implication is obvious. There is no need to fence cattle in when they are highly motivated to stay within range of the source of life.

While I am happy to be corrected on the logic of this statement by the farming fraternity with us today, let me say firstly, I will refer your comments directly to the Archbishop, and secondly for the next few moments I ask that you stay with me as we extend the rather romantic analogy a little.

Schools such as Hale cannot build fences to keep families here. While some may argue the endowment fee and the annual tuition fees are handcuffs of sorts, the truth is that our little lambs, poddy calves or heaving heifers are free to wander off and find greener pastures as they wish. The challenge for us as educational farmers is to dig wells of opportunity, not so the boys fall down them unable to get out but rather that they can drink until their thirst is satisfied then move on to a new well on the property then another and another. As freshly sown fields are looking increasingly attractive to some these days and others are becoming increasingly selective as to the wells they visit, the challenge

is to provide life-giving nourishment from the wells, not only in terms of academic guidance and support but also the breadth of co-curricular opportunities and nourishment of the soul through beliefs and values.

There is no doubt that we have reached a new paradigm in the world of independent school education. The recent downturn in the economy has many families looking more carefully at how and where they spend the dollars earmarked for their children's education. It is our responsibility to make the case for Hale School compelling. It is both a statement and a question I have put to the staff at Hale in recent months.

Our aspirational vision of providing opportunities for every boy to excel is alive and well. One only has to witness academic successes in external competitions. achieved through the hard work and talent of the students, combined in so many cases with the motivation and guidance of masterful teachers. I watched the senior mock trial team win the state competition with a display of legal knowledge and understanding that had the Chief Justice nodding in awe as final submissions were presented. Sporting teams at all levels have also excelled, either displaying their ability as they defeated all comers or in the case of the Gentleman's V basketball team or the 3rd XI cricket team, having fun while respecting the rules and their opponents. The music programme continues to provide a platform for the aspirations of so many boys and the service learning opportunities are as over-subscribed as ever. The Da Vinci competition, Philosothon, debating, the Pedal Prix, James Dingley being acknowledged as Top Scorer in a world-wide Science competition involving 46,500 answering questions on a topic we do not even teach at Hale, the boys who gained international recognition in the courses they completed at the Oxford Summer School all stand testament as examples of boys fulfilling the School's vision.

To my mind, this notion of boys feeling engaged with their tribe refers to the more global but less measurable notion of culture. Why do our students embrace what is on offer? We have discounted the suggestion that they are ring-fenced into participation and so many of the examples cited recently are 'buy-in' activities. Peer pressure may have something to do with it, extrinsic rewards may be a motivating factor, but these are not sustainable. There must be something else. The underlying culture where boys want to belong, want to contribute, and want to achieve is stronger than just about anything else we hold up as compelling reasons to attend Hale.

Hopefully, character and values development as well as the ability to reason and to rationalise are also on the list of reasons to be here. But that is not a one way transaction. There are many factors which come into play when shaping one's character and moral compass. We certainly do not have all the answers; the approach at home is critical. I was discussing with a colleague recently the rather superficial yet at times illuminating topic of boys not turning up to school the day after Year 9 camp. If you are sick or injured, fine. But being tired? That should not be a reason given to parents as to why you are not getting out of bed. And I do not believe it should be a reason accepted by parents. Sometimes the soft option is the easy option. Mr McPartland used the phrase, Valuing the Experience as the mindset required to get the most from time spent at a school like Hale. We suddenly found ourselves diverted to a discussion on what Valuing the Experience would look like; that is, the Hale education experience that your parents, grandparents, perhaps your extended family have given you. The Statement of Intent

- I would get to school on time; no, before time and be organised and ready for the day. I would do this myself without prompting from my mum or teachers.
- I would only be away from school because I

- was too sick to get out of bed
- I would beg my family to take their holidays in the holidays
- I would seek opportunities both in and outside of the classroom.
- I would challenge the way/why we did things at the school because I value this school and I want it to be better for everyone.
- I would try hard, not just some times when things are easy, but all the time.
- I would show respect to those who have given me this opportunity and also to those who are integral to making it happen.

And for all this I would become a more balanced person.

- More resilient because I pushed through the tough times.
- Educated with this the world will be an exciting opportunity for me.
- Helping the school be a better place for those who follow will give me pride.
- Passing on the value I have in education to my children will be a great gift.
- I will have gained insight into the importance of trying hard, of finding a way and of measuring my success against my effort and not my result. I will have many friends for life.

I would be proud to be a Hale boy!

One of the most referenced topics in schools and the wider community in the last two years has been the idea of well-being, mental health, positive education. The terms have become confused and interchangeable as new programmes for implementation in schools flood our in-boxes on a weekly basis. There is enough research available to suggest there is a definite increase in the number of young people struggling to stay positive and balanced in our society today.

Well-being is commonly defined as positive mental

health. This does not mean those with a strong sense of well-being always feel happy or that life always goes their way. Rather, well-being embraces the ability to enjoy our successes and cope with setbacks. Having it means embracing the good and bad times with resilience. mindfulness and social and emotional competency.

Obviously, the School cannot be responsible for how people choose to think and to respond to their environment. However, within the school environment, we are all responsible for providing practices that support positive outcomes. By promoting relationships, engagement and purpose we will of course be developing environments in which people, staff and students are less likely to experience workrelated stress. By finding and stimulating positive conditions rather than trying to identify deficits in behaviour, we are promoting the approach espoused by Martin Seligman in his work on Positive Psychology. His latest book Flourish is a worthwhile read. It is an area we will be addressing as a school in more detail in 2016.

"It is no longer what you know but how you use what you know." It is becoming a phrase which prefaces many discussions on the future of teaching in schools. Teaching is being informed that it must change. It must retain a focus on core skills but develop students who can participate in our 21st century society (albeit that we are already 15 years in). Many teachers acknowledge that essays, completing tests from memory and a general focus on content are features of modern teaching that must be questioned and replaced. But replaced with what is the unknown.

There are three important drivers of this conversation;

Technology: over the past 25 years technology has been used to amplify our teaching methods, engage students with their learning and make educational infrastructure more efficient. Today, technology can transform teaching, classrooms and schools in ways we never considered possible. Individual teachers and some schools are exploring breathtaking innovations...educational

innovation is as diverse as it is spontaneous and irregular currently.

Brain science: the science of learning has revealed significant new insights into how students learn best and the unique nature of each students learning. We need to focus on developing the intellect of individuals in the 21st century.

The future needs of students:

to ensure they can be active participants in a 21st century society where citizenship, career and communication are envisaged to be very different to existing contexts. We need to understand and cater for students, perhaps our brightest students, who can now genuinely consider creating their own job rather than go to university or follow a traditional career path.

In order to develop students who are best equipped for the future a new core set of skills have been identified as being essential for successful participation in the 21st century economy and society. They are usually identified as:

- 1. being creative and innovative in their thinking
- 2. being able to collaborate, sometimes over distance
- being able to problem solve
- being able to communicate well in a different modes

Currently, creativity and innovation are two of these skills discussed in detail and many teachers seek to bring these qualities into their own teaching. Their practice is often technology rich and innovative. Students respond well to this exciting new context. The focus on creative or innovative teaching practice is important, but it is overshadowing the need for students themselves to learn how to be creative and innovative. We not only need to teach creatively; we need to teach creativity. That is both a challenge and an opportunity for all of us

To that end, our potential link with the Association of Independent Schools of WA and an international organisation called the Innovation Unit, the continuation of the Hale Innovation Award, the possible implementation of a curriculum link with a STEM-based

startup education group called JustStartIT, existing innovations such as Hale21 Hale@home and Hale Future School programmes and the forging of new partnerships with UWA and Curtin, are evidence of innovative T&L practices to be progressed during the course of 2016.

These initiatives can only happen with the dedication and hard work of the teaching staff. It is a common occurrence to see members of staff engaged in conversations, extra lessons, and tutorials around the school; it would be easy to forget that so much of this time is willingly given abo

tne demands of full teaching timetables to enable the student to grasp the concept. practise another question or unravel the complexities of some theory or argument.

At the end of the year we farewell Mr Monty Campbell, Mr St John Kenny and Mr Sean Henderson, as they take collectively 90 years of teaching at Hale with them. Their contributions have been significant and enduring. As has Mr Danny Parker's ten years of energy and commitment to the world of drama and Ms Geetha James' seven plus years of service including 6.5 years of determined leadership of the Maths department. They will be missed. At this point I ask you to join me in acknowledging all staff for their efforts this year.

I would now like to announce the School Prefect team for next year. Before I do, I wish to thank publicly the efforts of this year's prefects, especially the Captain and Vice-Captain of School, Hudson Delves and Oliver Hoare. CHAPLAIN



Chapel has such a broad range of effects on people. Some are apathetic to spirituality, others are firm in their beliefs and many, although they may offer it little concentrated thought, are somewhere in the middle or spiritually confused; that is to say they are unsure of what it really is they believe in. For some, chapel has become an escape from whichever academic study preceded it in period 5. For some it is a period of deep internal exploration. It is the role of the Chaplain to make some connection to such a diverse group.

For Jordan Crabbe, Chapel Prefect 2015, it became evident that "one of Father Dougall's primary objectives is to make us all better people regardless of our beliefs. disbeliefs or whatever might lie in between. I would say that this is the reason we have often been taught through parables and stories throughout the years".

Jesus often spoke in parables and when the disciples asked him why, he replied: "Though they have eyes they do not see; though hearing they do not understand. But blessed are your eyes because they see and your ears because they for they hear."

This subtle means of conveying a message via allegory has appealed to many young men in the room, even if they have not noticed it. How many of us enjoyed watching The Matrix and then compared it to Plato's Allegory of the Cave or Neo and Jesus from John's Gospel? And then there was the comparison of Morpheous and Father Dougall. That might be drawing a very long bow!

Jordan went on to say, "We have always been challenged with the idea that if we are going to 'talk the talk' we should also 'walk the walk'."

'Walk the walk' was what 23 Year 11 boys did in the Solomon Islands this year.

The programme for the week was that the boys worked in the classrooms each morning. Some boys were helping the younger students with simple, but very much needed, English and Maths, while others worked with the senior students in assisting in the preparation for their exams.

Harrison reflected, "Textbooks were unheard of at Siro, and stapled booklets of photocopied paper served as meagre replacements. Despite this, the laptop computers that we brought with us were a constant source of wonder. Something as simple as drawing a line on Microsoft paint brought cries of astonishment from any who were watching. Although I never spent time teaching the younger students, the frequent singing and laughter that echoed across the school was an indication of the enjoyment that the kids gained from having us there. I have heard many tales from the boys who taught the younger students of the excitement aroused by simple activities, such as reading a book to them or playing a game on the blackboard.

Matt reflects, "As the week went on we became much closer and developed stronger connections and relationships with the Siro community. We became a part of Siro, they all loved us and we loved them This was evident when we had the privilege of seeing Father Dougall baptise two babies while the whole community watched alongside. This was a particularly special moment for us who had never seen a baptism but also seeing how community-based Siro and the Solomon Islands really is; everybody is part of one family.

'Walking the walk' can completely change our own outlook on life, making us feel not only happy but downright elated.

I used to think that happiness came from GETTING what I wanted. But what the research shows us is that happiness comes not so much from GETTING, but from GIVING. One of the reasons why this works is that it is hard to feel sorry for yourself in the midst of an act of kindness or giving.

A CHALLENGE FROM 2015:

Do something every single day that intends to bring joy into someone else's life. Remember that one very profound form of kindness is simply to express gratitude to others. Who has made your journey here possible? Who enriched it?

Will was fifteen-and-a-half, an avid AFL football player, lead singer of a rock band, good student, great mate to his friends, a great boyfriend, and a parent's pride and joy. He was full of life and had an amazing future to look forward to.

A commemorative tree and plaque have been placed in the Hale School grounds in honour of Will. A ceremony was held there on Valedictory Day, when Will would have been graduating.









Extracts from the eulogy by Hale School Headmaster, Mr Stuart Meade

As the great grandson of one of the most significant Headmasters in Hale's history Dr Arnold Buntine, Will had a connection to our school like few others. The link was one of which he was proud. I recall meeting the family when on a visit to Singapore several years ago. Even then, at 7 or 8 years of age, he mentioned how he was looking forward to one day coming to Hale.

Will had the ability to make friends easily and was known as a popular boy at Subiaco Primary. However, moving into the bigger pond that is Year 7 at Hale, it took a little time for him to realise that not everyone here knew him. As he worked his way through the dynamics of the environment, he became more confident in his own skin - a character trait that stayed with him as he progressed through our school.

A pivotal moment for Will at Hale was when he performed in the Middle School Talent Quest. He took on the role of lead singer in his band and, according to his Pastoral Care Leader in Year 7, Mrs Terri Spartalis, Will was brilliant. He confided in her after their

initial performance, saying he felt a bit awkward as he did not know what to do with his hands when he was singing. So, he did what all aspiring rock stars do, he went home and practised in the mirror. In the final of the competition, Will 'owned' the stage. He was a hit because, as with most things Will did, if he wanted to be good at it, he had the ability to do so.

Will was also keen to 'share the love' - anything he did, he wanted others to do too; even to the point of getting Mrs Spartalis to don her leather jacket along with members of his Year 7 band as they strutted around the place.

Will not only had a way with words, he had infectious enthusiasm and dogged determination when the mood took him.

He was also very loyal, something his friends will attest to. His Pastoral Care Leaders in both Year 7 and 8, say that even though Will had long since passed through Middle School, now ensconced in the heady world of Year 10, he would still happily greet them and stop to chat. He always left an impression.

Mr Scott Allder was his Pastoral Care Leader in Year 8 and came to know Will well. They would chat quite easily about all manner of things, especially their common love of music. Some parents may find it difficult to believe that their Year 8 son could carry on a mature conversation with anyone at that age, but for Will, it was easy and natural. Mr Allder said "I count myself lucky to have known Will. He was a down-to-earth and honest young man, with a good sense of humour and consideration for others." It was clear that there was a true bond of mutual respect.

As Will moved into the Senior School, he recalibrated his place at Hale. Music had definitely become a core part of his life and his engagement with Buntine House was strong. Mr Steve McFarland, as his Head of House and History teacher said "Will was passionate about the 'Men in Red' and keen for them to do well in whatever was going on." I am not sure how many lead singers in rock bands have been described as quiet and composed, but Mr McFarland's description of Will speaks of a young man who was able to 'read the play' - be it in the classroom, in the grounds with his mates, or just hanging

around. Ms Kirk, in her role as Assistant Head of House in Buntine, said "Will was mature beyond his years, perceptive and aware of the impact of people's behaviour."

There is no doubt we have lost a young man of ability, of compassion and of integrity. We have a rock star turned politician. We have a musician turned police minister. Whether we would have seen a doctor with a musical bedside manner, we will never know. As the Roman Poet, Quintis Ennius wrote:

"Let no one weep for me, or celebrate my funeral with mourning - for I still live, as I pass to and fro through the mouths of men".

There is no doubt that the memory of Will, will live on.

Fond farewell and rest in peace, Will Atkinson.



Hale School is very proud of the academic achievements of the Year 12 students of 2015. We are grateful to parents who have supported our Year 12 students so well, and to our dedicated teachers. A key factor in student achievement is the strength in the partnership between the home, school and the student himself.



The number of Year 12 students at Hale in 2015 was 210, the highest on record. 199 students achieved an ATAR; this is also the highest number on record. In addition, 11 students received Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualifications.

GENERAL EXHIBITIONS

Hale students won two of the 41 General Exhibitions awarded. General Exhibitions go to the 41 WACE examination students with the highest SCSA award scores, based on their best five scaled scores with at least two from each of the humanities and science / mathematics lists.

Hale's General Exhibitioners were Qiang Li, who was ranked 7th in the state, and Luke Rao, who was ranked 21st in the state



TOP 0.5% OUTSTANDING SUCCESS IN **MATHEMATICS**

Qiang Li, Jesse Barbuzza, David Steketee, Austin Sheard and Luke Rao were all awarded Certificates of Distinction for achieving in the top 0.5% of the State in Mathematics.

To put this in perspective, there were 40 Certificates of Distinction awarded in total in mathematics so Hale students gained 12.5% of them. The WACE examination student enrolment total in Mathematics in 2015 was 13,100.

Jesse Barbuzza also gained a Certificate of Distinction for Mathematics: Specialist, a subject with a WACE examination enrolment of 1,540.



SUBJECTS WITH TOP PERFORMING **STUDENTS**

A significant measure of success is the number of times Hale is included as a school with the highest performing students in a course, defined as the percentage of students scoring over 75% in each course. Hale School achieved this benchmark 14 times in the 2015 WACE.

JUNIOR SCHOOL

Last year I wrote, 'One thing is constant in schools, change'. This year, however, we endeavoured to ease the pace of change, implementing curriculum and consolidating plans which were the culmination of work done over the past few years. We also welcomed a number of new staff to the teaching team who soon felt at home in the Junior School after a thorough induction programme.

This year the Learning Hub came to fruition. Our Hale maintenance team worked over the Christmas period to refurbish and convert the inside space of the Library to a Learning Hub. In addition to the book collection, the Hub now has numerous 'writable' walls and desks, to allow the boys to collaboratively explore their thinking. Flexible furniture, presentation spaces, mobile technology and robotics have transformed the space, ensuring that the Hub is a hive of activity.

Learning Hub lessons have followed a 'Community of Inquiry' approach where the boys explore 'big' questions while being challenged to think about their thinking (metacognition). Learning Hub Coordinator, Mrs Alicia Chisholm, also explored having the boys write their own reflections on themselves as learners. The response from the boys was incredibly insightful and intuitive. This experiment was very successful and challenged some of our thinking about reporting to parents.

In 2016, the Learning Hub will continue to evolve and explore new ideas and pedagogy. With Mrs Chisholm on maternity leave for 2016, Ms Vanessa Hallett will be stepping into the Hub. Vanessa is looking forward to building on the 2015 experience whilst exploring exciting directions the Hub may take.

Chinese language (Mandarin) was introduced for the first time at Hale School this year. Years 1 to 3 boys had lessons with Miss Zhenyu Wang, who was on exchange from China with the Confucius Institute

(UWA). Zhenyu introduced the boys to the Chinese language and culture as well as organising some exciting visits from Kung Fu masters. Next year's introductory programme will be expanded to all Junior School boys, with many exciting opportunities being provided by the ongoing partnership with the Confucius Institute.

At the start of the year, the Junior School teaching team came together for a two day staff retreat at Club Capricorn, Yanchep. In addition to looking at staff values, we also did a one day 'Rock and Water' training programme which involves teaching social skills through physical activity. On returning to school, all teachers joined their class for a 'Rock and Water' lesson with each cycle led by me. 'Strong, grounded and centred' and 'Calmness leads to good decision making' were mantras that came through strongly in the programme.

'Rock and Water' has a very strong anti-bullying message with many physical activities, giving the boys strategies to deal with bullying, both from a victim and bystander perspective. The success of the Semester One programme and the positive response from the boys saw 'Rock and Water' extended to Semester Two. It will also be a prominent inclusion in our 2016 Personal and Social Development programme.

The Junior School boys continued to make us proud with the results they achieved in a number of areas. We had prize winners in various national Mathematics competitions. In fact, I can recall one assembly where the stage was very crowded with boys who had received various awards in a major competition. The Junior School team won the State Primary Schools Triathlon Championships at Champion Lakes in November. Our cross country team came 3rd in the JPSSA Cross Country event, only a few points behind the winning school. The external Oracy judges were full of praise for the Year 6 boys in their Term

3 speaking assessments. The judges felt that the boys took the standard to another level, particularly highlighting the standard of all boys. These are just a few examples of the outstanding results we enjoyed in 2015.

This year we welcomed Mrs Melanie Wallis (Head of Junior School Curriculum), Mr Andrew Lane (Year 3 teacher), Miss Chantelle Savage (Year 5 teacher), Mr Martin Wheeler (Canadian exchange teacher), Miss Christina Hebiton (Music teacher), Miss Stephanie Massev (RAVE teacher). Miss Zhenyu Wang (Chinese teacher - Confucius Institute), Mrs Michelle Falconer (Learning Hub Technician), Mr Luke Sells (Education Assistant) and Ms Amanda Webster (Receptionist) to the Junior School team. We have thoroughly enjoyed having these people join our team this

2016 promises to be a year in which the Junior School teaching team will give some serious consideration to future curriculum delivery in order to bring to life the Australian Curriculum's General Capabilities. We are having some exciting discussions on what a Junior School curriculum and timetable could look like in the future. Some 'out of the box' ideas could be easily implemented while others may prove more challenging. However, as a Junior School team, we are constantly reflecting on our practice and striving for excellence. This is what makes the Junior School such an exciting place to be.














CHINESE

During 2015 the Year 1 to 3 boys were introduced to Chinese phonetics and Chinese characters. Four different tones are used to articulate words in Chinese as they can change the meaning of words. LEARNING HUB

2015 brought about the exciting opening of the Junior School Learning Hub.

The design of the physical environment and furniture was highly intentional in creating a space to facilitate the development of skills in our students to equip them well for their rapidly evolving future. The writable walls have been a launching pad for collaborative problem solving and creative task design. The flexible seating options have aided the boys' metacognitive development, requiring them to be selfaware and to self-regulate during the learning process. Equipped with technology, and with the expertise of Mr Toby Trewin and Mr Daniel Groenewald, the boys have been supported in learning to effectively navigate digital contexts. The boys' convincing application to the Parents' and Friends' Association saw them successfully granted funding to transform the area between the Hub and the Art Room into a nature-based outdoor learning space, a wonderful extension and addition.

The Hub is home to a learning mindset characterised by curiosity, creativity, collaboration and choice. It is

about learner-led exploration with a focus on the process rather than product. That is, how we are learning, more than the content and context of our learning. Today's digital landscape offers a tremendous wealth of knowledge and information at the click of a button. Using the model of 'Philosophy for Children' (P4C), all boys in Years 1 to 6 developed their capacity to be shapers of knowledge reflecting upon and articulating their opinions, whilst critically questioning those of others. They practised and developed their skills within the six stages of the information research process: define, locate, select, organise, create and reflect.

Also housing our Junior School book collection, we welcomed Mrs Michelle Falconer to the Hub. The Genius Bar, a port of call for boys who have loved mentoring and learning ICT skills from each other, launched some terrific digital technologies as we saw the Hub take shape as a 'Maker Space' during lunchtimes in the latter part of the year.



This year we have used the OSMO's to develop our drawing skills. This device paired with an iPad allows boys to practice their hand-eye coordination whilst producing a masterpiece.



We are often asked, what makes Hale School stand out from the rest? It is a great guestion and one that requires a well-considered response. Undoubtedly, the culture of Hale School is something unique and special, as are the students who constantly astound us with their capacity to go 'above and beyond'. However, then there are my colleagues who are professional, committed and passionate; the parents who consistently support us; the amazing facilities - and so on. As you can see, the response to this simple question is quite complex. In the Middle School, so many significant individual and collective activities take place each day and these build the capacity and the richness of our community. It is impossible to outline them all, but there have been many noteworthy achievements. While the following paragraphs will never fully explain what life is like in the Middle School, I have confidence that they will give you an insight into some of the highlights of the 2015 academic year.

CO-CURRICULAR

From a sporting perspective it has been a tremendous year with numerous team and individual successes. Once again our swimming team was triumphant at the PSA Inters and this was followed by further success during the summer sporting season. The winter season followed a similar pattern, with many of the Middle School teams dominating in the various sports. Numerous teams remained undefeated, including the 8A, B and C cricket teams, tennis 8B, water polo 7/8/9 C team and the football 8B team.

While sport continues to play a major part in the lives of boys at Hale School, the experiences on offer in the Middle School are far more diverse.

- Six Year 8 students, Siddhant Bhat, Yale Cheng, Matthew Foster, Bailey Ireland, Kye Opie and Finlay Player, competed in the Scitech Brainstorm Challenge Cup. The competition included five STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) based challenges. The Middle School teams came first and fourth out of a large and talented pool of opponents.
- Middle School students Reece Ashley, Matthew Foster, Will Cornish, Kristian Jongeling, Arshaq Siraz, Triyan Jha, Bailey Ireland and Yale Cheng participated in the state division of the da Vinci Decathlon. The competition required the students to compete in teams of eight across ten disciplines including Engineering, Mathematics, Code Breaking, Art and Poetry, Science and English. The team came second by the slimmest of margins (equivalent to one or two questions out of a couple of hundred on the day) and, needless to say, the team manager Mr Andrew Dean was very proud of the boys' achievements.
- In late October Girik Dev, Arshaq Siraz, Siddhant Bhat, Dhanush Vijayaraghavan competed in the Future Problem Solving (FPS) national finals in Brisbane. Out of 200 middle category teams who participated, 33

- qualified in the nationals and the Hale team placed second.
- The Year 8 Novice debating team, comprising Michael Garas, Peter (PJ) McSkimming, Chirag Tharakan and Noah Benzie-Drayton were the Western Australian Debating League Champions.
- The annual Canberra tour was once again an outstanding success. There were numerous highlights, including a moving Dawn Service, tours of Parliament House and the Old Parliament House, spending time with the Governor-General, and a wreath laying service at the War Memorial. The boys were outstanding ambassadors for the School, their families and themselves.
- Music offered its regular supply of breathtaking performances. Highlights included the Middle School Music Night, Middle School Spring Arts Festival and the Rock Night. However, the musical highlight for 2015 was the KaBoom programme. As part of the annual Artist in Residence programme Middle School students worked with two professional musicians over a week. which culminated in a whole school percussion production. The final performance was recorded and the movie was launched at the Middle School Speech Day. Congratulations to the entire Music Department team for the successful execution of this ambitious and exciting innovation.



ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

Excellent academic achievement is reflected right across the School in classrooms every day. What always gives me the greatest delight is to see students' eyes light up with excitement as they share with me something they have learnt or created, when I read a school report where it is obvious that the student has made significant improvement, or I hear of a student who has had a change of attitude and begun to achieve their potential academically. However, while I take great enjoyment in noting the 'everyday' successes, there are always some specific achievements that require significant acknowledgement.

- Jake Just placed first in the Western Australian Junior section of the Australian Geography Competition. Oscar Cooke and Triyan Jha were also extremely successful. In the Junior Division, there were ten Hale School students placed in the top 5% Australia wide
- Calum Wong was announced as the Year 8 State Champion in the Australian History Competition. Five other students, William Beckwith, Yale Cheng, Bailey Ireland, Fraser Jaffray and Jayson Spencer, achieved Certificates of High Distinction which placed them among the top 5% of participants across Australia.
- Triyan Jha was awarded a medal (highest award) after achieving a perfect score in the University of New South Wales ICAS English test. Peter (PJ) McSkimming and Dhanush Vijayaraghavan received High Distinctions, placing them in the top 1% of participants.
- As has been the case in recent years. Middle School students performed exceptionally well in numerous mathematics competitions. This year Michael Garas, Robert Petitt and Jeremy Pearson-Lemme were all placed in the 100th percentile and Joshua Purwien was awarded a Prize placing him in the top 1% of the Year 7s in the Australian Mathematics Competition.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AND SERVICE LEARNING

The Middle School has a wonderfully positive culture and we build upon the strong sense of connectedness and a real sense of responsibility to the broader community which is a hallmark of Hale School. As has been the case for many years nearly half of the Middle School student population volunteer their time to participate in some form of community service. Over the course of this year, they were involved in assisting younger boys at sport training, visiting an aged care facility in Osborne Park, working with a local special needs centre, supporting the Keep Australia Beautiful and Adopt a Sport programmes, developing anti-bullying strategies for our Middle School, and fundraising for a South African orphanage

To emphasise the supporting and proactive culture that exists within the Middle School, two occurrences must be highlighted. At the start of Semester 2, the students were offered the opportunity to sign up for the various Service Learning options via an electronic system. The system was opened one evening and within 15 minutes all of the places had been filled, with many activities being over-subscribed! Later in the same term, the Middle School student Anti-Bullying Committee spoke at an assembly about the importance of the entire Middle School taking a stand on this issue. During the speech, they encouraged the students to sign a pledge which indicated they would personally commit to this cause. By the end of that day 300 Middle School students had made their way into the reception to sign the pledge. As you can see, there is a strong sense of social justice within the Middle School and the staff and students are congratulated for their commitment to the notion of 'service above self'.

STAFF

Our School's exceptional teachers do not merely teach, they educate - helping students to think, challenge and reflect. Hopefully in the process, students find and tap into their own beliefs and their own uniqueness. With this in mind, I wish to publically acknowledge the work of all our staff and to thank classroom teachers, the staff involved in the boarding house and the administration team for their enormous effort. All that we achieve as a school would not be possible without them.

As is the case in any dynamic organisation, staff movement is inevitable and this year was no different. At the end of Term 1 we farewelled Mr Verne Jones and Ms Kylie Sandover from the Year 7 PCL team and we were extremely fortunate to employ Mr Pasha Hayat and Mrs Paula Santos as their replacements. Both Mr Hayat

and Mrs Santos have been outstanding additions to the already highly successful Year 7 team. Next year Mr Mark Williamson will move into a Year 8 PCL role and his role is being replaced by Ms Isabel Bucher, who is currently employed at St Hilda's. Ms Bucher joins us as a highly regarded Mathematics teacher and as an outstanding pastoral care leader. Mr Charlie Liggins and Ms Helen McIntosh will leave the Middle School and take up duties as Assistant Heads of House in the Senior School. These appointments mark the next phase in their professional careers and we wish them all the best in these endeavours. After six years of outstanding service in the Middle School, Mr Chris McClelland will relinquish his PCL role at the end of this year as he focuses on his senior Art teaching duties. Mr Warrick Nelson will also be stepping down from his PCL role. We welcome Mr Tim Harley, who after holding an acting PCL role in Term 1 will become a permanent member of the Year 8 PCL team. Mr Daniel Harvey will also assume a Year 8 PCL role next year. Mr Harvey, who worked at Hale School on a temporary contract at the start of this year, is already well known to many of the boys in the Middle School. Both Mr Harvey and Mr Harley come with vast experience in the pastoral domain and we are very grateful to have secured their services.

As you can see the range of unique opportunities provided for our students is a real hallmark of the Middle School at Hale. We are a school with exceptional opportunities and programmes and clearly distinctive features. The most valuable aspect of these programmes, however, is not the success these activities enjoy, it is the development of character such activities engender in the participants. I have no doubt that next year will be just as exciting and rewarding.

Innovation.

These are all words that the Middle School Councillors of 2015 have had to ponder over and attempt to put into action on our quest to maintain and improve the School and the lives of its four hundred members. Harold Geneen, a very successful American businessman, once said: "Leadership cannot really be taught. It can only be learned." And so it was with this year's Student Councillors. Each class elected a representative for one semester, and then another one in the second semester. In this way, twice as many got the chance to work in a functioning leadership team, and we were constantly learning as we went along through experience, listening to opinions and further discussion.

The annual Middle School Talent Quest was one of the major events the Council was responsible for. We broke up into teams to tackle the different aspects required to get the show to run smoothly. We learned the key principles





of management skills when organising MCs, the act order, judges, and more. The efforts put in by everyone paid off in the end, culminating with a fun afternoon for all classes to showcase their talents and watch others'. All of this would not have happened without long-lasting commitment to the task.

There were many plans sprouting in the young. creative minds of the Student Councillors right throughout the year. The lack of a clock in the Middle School was quickly identified as an issue and a probable contributor to general tardiness around the schools, and we wanted to fix this. Ideas such as racks in the toilets. additional handball courts and a voting box for the song for the School bell were simply waiting to be put into action. However, due to a lack of time, we were unable to implement many of these plans, but stay tuned as they live on in the Year 7s and are likely to be followed up on next vear.

In Semester 2, we were asked what we wanted to get out of our time in the Council. It was clear that a great interest lay in developing our leadership skills, and so Mr Manley helped us to do so. He wanted us to think of ways in which we could make a difference in our communities, whether they be at home, at school, in the boarding house or in the broader community. After all, leadership is often about setting the example by doing the little things. Some common responses involved completing a certain amount of random acts of kindness every day, picking up litter and talking to someone who seemed to be lonely or having a bad time. All noble, helpful actions - but significantly lacking in imagination. We were challenged to think harder, to dig deeper, and come up with creative ways to give back. As Steve Jobs said: "Innovation distinguishes between a leader and a follower." Ideas began to brew, and two Councillors went as far as to give out free drinks and sunscreen one morning at Scarborough Beach, which is testimony to their lateral thinking skills and kindness.

However, there are some things which all leaders must do, and we were exposed to these in an extreme form - in leadership of the military.

We watched a speech by Stanley McChrystal, a revered former US Army general. He discussed being able to lift your team following failure, and communicating effectively so as to grow a common purpose and sense of belonging between its members. This bond is so strong in the elite US Rangers squadron that they "...will never leave a fallen comrade to fall into the hands of the enemy." In other words, no matter what it costs them, if someone needs help, they are coming. This is extreme selflessness, which is a quality needed for successful collaboration. It is the leaders responsibility to advocate for and foster these ideals

2015's Middle School Councillors may not have had much success in regards to getting things done, but have undoubtedly learned some important lessons and left next year's Council with a massive platform upon which they can build. The Middle School and the way of life it offers so many will only continue to improve under their guidance.



PASTORAL CARE

THE MIDDLE SCHOOL SERVICE LEARNING **PROGRAMME**

As always, the Middle School Service Learning Programme proved extremely popular with over 150 boys volunteering to help out in various ways. Whether it was mentoring Junior School boys, working with the students at Holy Rosary Siena Centre or visiting the residents at James Brown House, our boys consistently demonstrated their commitment to helping others, wholeheartedly embracing the notion of 'duty'.

An addition to the programme this year was the Anti-bullying Committee. Made up of a small group of dedicated

students, they led the way with a number of initiatives aimed at:

- Making boys think twice about bullying others.
- Building awareness around the issues of bullying.
- Helping give boys who are bullied the confidence to seek help.
- Providing bystanders with the confidence to offer

Some of the signature events included a student survey to identify key areas of concern; the launch of an anti-bullying pledge, which had well over 300 signatures; and a poster/ slogan competition, generating some incredibly creative designs. YEAR 7 NEW NORCIA RETREAT

Things people have told me about teenaged boys include: "You just need to run 'em - like horse." and "Meditation is not appropriate for this age group." Well, that is just not the whole storv.

Our Year 7 New Norcia retreats give our young men a chance to explore a very different side of themselves. Yes, most enjoy being physically active, often with others. They often love to make noise and to have a laugh. However, they also enjoy silence and learning to calm their minds. The boys are incredibly curious about people like the monks who choose a different lifestyle from the high energy, task-focused one they live. They are also willing to try many different things - art in an old chapel, exploring a historical cemetery, praying with the monks, and experiencing a new way of approaching mealtime. Another much appreciated aspect of our journey to New Norcia is a visit to the fascinating Gingin Gravity Discovery Centre, where the boys can marvel at our earth and universe via science. Taking the whole of the Year 7 cohort out of school for two weeks requires the support of many people, and it would

be easy to say it is just too hard. However, we persist in running our New Norcia retreat because we think it adds something very significant to our boys' school experience. The monks at New Norcia are clear about what matters to them. Their motto, PAX, means peace: peace without and peace within. They live a simple life honouring God and those who visit them. As we spend time in this environment of gentle acceptance, we encourage the boys to reflect on themselves - what matters to me? What are my dreams and hopes? Who am I today? Going to New Norcia also takes the boys out of themselves as we enter a place with a culture still very deeply connected to the pioneering early days of European settlement in our state.

YEAR 8 ANZAC PROJECT AND CANBERRA TOUR

This year 42 Year 8 Hale students signed up for Middle School Canberra Tour.

Prior to their departure, the students spent time learning about the Great War and researching Old Haleians who had died in the conflict. This important research enabled the students to cultivate an understanding of the character and lives of these men - who they were before and after the war. They also developed a real sense of connection with the person and the history of Hale School. The students met with a variety of quest speakers, including Hale School's former historian, Dr Bill Edgar, and Pru Cowan, the niece of Raymond Cowan who died of malaria in Damascus in 1918. Both speakers told the boys about the perils and hardship of war.

The highlight of the tour was attending the Dawn Service. This was a memorable event, not because of the 2.15am awakening or the cold weather and wet plastic seats; after all, those elements were insignificant compared with the conditions the ANZACS experienced 100 years ago so that we may enjoy our freedom today. The moment was

solemn and reflective. Candles glowed brightly, like the spirit of an Australian nation gathered that morning to remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country.

While on tour in Canberra the students had the privilege of meeting the Governor-General Sir Peter Cosgrove and Victoria Cross recipient Daniel Keighran. They participated in a wreath laying ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier alongside Vietnam Veteran, Adrian Roberts

Other excursions included visits to the Australian Institute of Sport, where everyone was able to release some energy: the National Portrait Gallery; Parliament House and Old Parliament House; the National Capital Planning Exhibition; the National Screen and Sound Archives; and the National Museum of Australia. We also participated in an educational session at the Australian Electoral Commission and found time to visit the National Dinosaur Museum and Questacon, which was a definite favourite of the boys.

SUMMER and WINTER **SPORT**

SUMMER SPORT

We hit the ground running at the start of the year as the summer sport season began at the end of week one. This is always a hectic time of the year as we only have two sessions (one in some cases) with the boys to select teams for our first fixture. Basketball and cricket continued to be the most popular summer sports for Middle School boys with over 50 boys in each year group choosing to play them at PSA level.

The Senior School gymnasium has had somewhat of a 'basketball refurbishment' this year with the addition of world class fibreglass backboards, sprung rings, a new scoreboard and spectator friendly seating. This combined with the appointment of former Wildcat Nik Lakovic to head up our basketball programme has resulted in an even greater profile for the sport within the Hale School sporting landscape. The 8As and Bs had mixed starts to the year recording as many wins as losses (3 and 3). The 7As won four games while the Bs and Cs had three wins each. Year 8 students Daniel Rogers and John Ibukunoluwa were selected to represent Western Australia at the National Championships.

We certainly have some talented cricketers in our Middle School ranks and if Term 1 results are any indication then the future of the sport at PSA 1st team level should be quite healthy for the next few years. The 8As, Bs and Cs went through the season undefeated while the 7As and Bs also had strong performances.

The rowing numbers were slightly down on previous years (23 boys) where we have traditionally had over 30 Year 8 boys select rowing in first term. In Term 4 the Year 8 boys were involved in some small regattas aimed at improving their boatmanship and developing the necessary skills to race successfully in the 2016 regatta season as Year 9s.

The annual Trogs Iron Man was won this year by Ben Johnson in Year 7 and by Sam Rowbottam in Year 8. The Hale Swim Champs were held as a twilight meet under lights for the first time. In the Under 13 age group Josh Edwards-Smith; Tom White and James Harris finished first, second and third respectively in the Champion Boy. In the Under 14 age group Joel Hill was named Champion Boy with Harry Saggers runner up and Zac Chan in third place. Joel Hill and Josh Edwards Smith both excelled on the night breaking three Hale

Champs records apiece. The PSA Swimming Championships saw Hale School (1204.5 points) take out a much coveted 'three peat' with one of the biggest winning margins ever recorded over 2nd place Trinity College (832 points) and 3rd place Christ Church Grammar School (831.5 points).

In tennis it was another relatively successful season for our Middle School boys. The 8As and Cs won four fixtures, drew one, and lost one while 8Bs went through the Term 1 season undefeated. The 7As found the competition a bit tougher winning only two of their six fixtures while the 7B and C sides both won four fixtures each.

Our volleyball teams were again competitive across the three grades with the 7/8/9As and Cs winning two out of their six matches and the 7/8/9Cs winning one.

Water polo numbers have been at record numbers for a couple of years now. We have considerable depth throughout the school in water polo with all of our 7/8/9 teams recording strong results in term one. The 7/8/9C teams went through undefeated while the 7/8/9A and B teams only dropped the one game.



In the interhouse Cross Country this year the top three place getters in Year 7 were Ben Johnson, Jack Tozawa and Joseph Warr while in the Year 8 event Zac Sanderson, Quinn Donaldson and Sam Smith finished 1st, 2nd and 3rd respectively. In the PSA Cross Country our junior team finished in 5th position. It is pleasing to see that the culture of Middle School boys running with the senior boys on Saturday mornings continues

This year we had the highest number of Year 8 footballers (80 boys) that we have ever had sign up to play - which equates to 40% of the year group. Our results across all teams indicate that we continue to be strong in this area. The Year 8 sides both enjoyed dominant seasons with the 8B team remaining undefeated while the 8As only dropped the one game. The Year 7 football teams were consistent in their effort and performances. The 7As won seven and lost four while the 7B side won four and lost seven

Our hockey numbers remained fairly consistent to previous years. Under the watchful eye of Mr Barron our 8A boys were again our most successful Middle School hockey team. With state representatives Sam Ashton, Lloyd Cant, Marcus Jorgensen and Calum Wong in the side I have no doubt that we will see these boys representing the school at 1st team level in the not too distant future. The 8Bs and 7As both had mixed seasons but there was steady improvement shown by the boys across the year.

While the 1st XV took out the Brother Redmond Trophy for the 13th consecutive year our Middle School rugby results indicate that our dominance as a school in this sport might be coming to an end. The other PSA schools have certainly started to make ground on the Hale rugby juggernaut throughout the Years 7,8 and 9 age groups. It will be interesting to see if this can be converted to success at first team level in future years. The 8A side finished with a 5-6 win/loss ratio for the

season, including two strong wins in the final games and a couple of 'so close....losses'. The 8A Best and Fairest was awarded to Nick Kane. The 7As performed strongly throughout the season winning nine games and losing two.


Soccer continues to be the second most popular winter sport with our boys (behind AFL) with 100 boys playing across Years 7 and 8. In recent years we have been quite dominant in both age groups with our A sides having gone through some seasons undefeated. We have certainly come back to the pack this year with mixed results for all of our Middle School soccer teams. The Year 7 teams were the most successful soccer teams averaging seven wins and three losses across the board. The Year 8 soccer teams struggled to finish off games and this resulted in several draws throughout the season.

The annual PSA Interschool Athletics Carnival was held at AK Reserve on Friday 11 September. Our Under 13 boys finished in 4th place

overall while our Under 14 boys excelled on the day finishing in 1st place. Overall as a school Hale placed in 4th position (1440 points) behind Trinity (1449 points), Aguinas (1596 points) and Alcock Shield winners Scotch College (1764 points). In the Under 13 age group the recipient of the Champion Boy award was Joshua Harris; Harry Boden was runner up and John Ibukunoluwa was third. In the Under 14s the Champion Boy was Lachlan McKay, runner up Sidhant Bhat and in 3rd place was Zac Sanderson. Year 8 student Michael Christie represented the State in High Jump claiming a Bronze medal at the National Championships in March.

Finally, sport at Hale School could not happen without the help of our coaches, managers, officials, administrators, kitchen staff and supportive parents and friends of the Hale School community on the sidelines. On behalf of the boys, thank you to all.



MR ST JOHN KENNY Soon after graduating from Trinity College, Dublin, in

the early 1970s, St John

Kenny came to Australia for an adventure and to visit his uncle (Ireland's Ambassador to Australia and New Zealand at the time.) After experiences as varied as being a jackeroo in rural NSW and an officer in the Commonwealth Bureau of Minerals and Energy, St John had a 10 year career as a geologist with Esso Exploration. He re-trained as a teacher in 1984 and joined Hale in 1985. St John taught geology and geography in his early days but for most of his 31 years at Hale he taught biology Years 10 to 12 and science, Years 7 to 9. To all his classes and to the generations of students he taught, he brought memorable stories of his vivid early experiences and his wide knowledge of the plant life and geology. St John was a passionate contributor to Hale School's Rottnest Island Re-aforrestation Project, leading the cultivating and planting programme on the island each July from 1985 to 1999. The mature plantations of trees dotted over Rottnest are a wonderful legacy and a permanent reminder of this valued community service pioneered by Hale. For many years St John also maintained a superb school plant nursery which contributed to the study of botany at Hale. For four vears (2006-9) St John took on the responsibility of Year 8 Pastoral Care Leader, to which position he brought his good humour, optimistic spirit and a lifetime of worldly wisdom. St John was an enthusiastic rowing coach for his entire 31 year

career at Hale, specialising in the Year 10 fours for a decade and coaching Year 8s in more recent years. His winter sports were rugby and soccer. He coached rugby from 1985 to 1996 then switched to soccer for 13 years, returning to rugby for a final 5 years. He was a stalwart of the staff Common Room, running the wine raffle, helping organise social events and presenting a welcoming face to new staff. St John, together with his wife Nola, was also exceptionally proud that their two sons, Alexander and Giles, were Haleians, We wish him well in his retirement.



MR DANNY PARKER

An inspiring Director of Drama and Youth Theatre whose star blazed at Hale School for ten years, Danny Parker had the creative spirit, teaching skills and charisma to ignite a passion for drama in hundreds of students. Danny joined Hale from Gordonstoun School, Scotland, in 2006 and was appointed to the Director role in 2008. While his goals included creating a whole of school drama curriculum and increasing student participation in the academic subject of drama, he also aimed at building student experience of drama outside the classroom and in that he achieving instant success. Students across all three sub-schools from Years 1 to 12 flourished in his presence; Danny radiated enthusiasm and energy. He was in his element directing a large cast in an ambitious production. To refer to some of the musicals alone, Lionel Bart's "Oliver!" with a cast of over 150 boys from Junior to Senior School, St Mary's girls and a full orchestra was a stunning early success at Hale, followed by "Guys and Dolls", "Godspell" "Singing in the Rain", "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown." The range of different styles of work experienced by students under Danny's direction was vast, extending from devised works such as a play based on the Batavia incident from WA's early history, to Shakespeare, to Christmas pantomimes. He founded the redfoot

vouth theatre which brought young people from all over Perth to join forces with Hale students for rehearsals and a dauntingly long production schedule alongside Hale School productions. Redfoot continues to thrive, a great example of Hale School's engagement with the community. Danny mentored past students, inviting them to direct for redfoot and encouraging their developing careers in drama. Danny led Hale School/ redfoot productions on tour to London, New York and Las Vegas and his UK theatre connections, especially, opened doors backstage and initiated meetings with the stars for Hale students. As a teacher of drama, Danny has been brilliantly effective, unpredictable, chaotic, spontaneous and always fun. Danny has recently entered the field of children's book publishing and that too has been brought into his teaching; he has used his writing to inspire Hale Junior School boys in their own compositions. In summary, Danny Parker has earned the School's gratitude for exerting a significant positive influence on the creative and performing arts at Hale for a decade: he will be missed.

SPEECH DAY ADDRESS 2015

Today is my final opportunity to make an impact on this school, and normally most other captains would mention some of their most memorable experiences. However, I

feel that most of you do not really care about my Year 8 swimming carnival, where I unfortunately forgot to tighten up my speedos and upon entry into the water, my speedos spontaneously slipped down to my ankles, leaving me momentarily naked and forever scarred. Yes, my experiences are pretty tragic and rather embarrassing so I thought I would leave those behind and change it up to what I care about the most. I want to share with you all my final thoughts, ones I hold particularly close to my heart, and hopefully ones that will leave the greatest impact on

Well, today I ought to pay homage to my role model, a young man by the name of Jake Bailey, whose story resonates with me ever so

deeply. Jake Bailey was the Senior Monitor for Christchurch Boys' High School in 2015 A week before he was due to give his final prize-giving speech at his graduation ceremony, Jake was diagnosed with cancer and told he had less than three weeks to live if treatment was not immediate. Even though he was told he would not be alive by the time of graduation to deliver his speech, and despite his worsening condition, Jake left his hospital bed in a wheelchair. None of Jake's classmates expected him to be there. He said in his speech that "we don't know where we might end up, or when we might end up. None of us get out of life alive, so be gallant, be great, be gracious, and be grateful for the opportunities you have." To me, Jake Bailey is my ultimate hero, my role model who puts so much into perspective. Although Jake is just an ordinary schoolkid like you and me, he made me realise that life is never going to be easy, and as much as you want success to come your way, life may stop you in your tracks. So make the most of everything you have, cherish what you love and pursue your dreams, because you never know when it may be all taken away from you. Jake has left his legacy, and although mine is in no way similar to his, I hope I have left my mark on this school, because although at times I questioned whether I deserved this role, and I know many others questioned it to begin with, I have given it my all, and that is all that matters I thank you all for entrusting me with such an honour; I have loved every second of it.

So whether you are Mitch Pratt (next year's Captain) leading the school, or it is your first day of school at Hale, when it is your time to stand up, what will you do to leave a legacy? What will you do - whether it be now, next week, or next term - to make your mark at Hale and leave knowing that you did your duty and gave everything you had to this school? It may be something relatively new and foreign to you, such as trying out for the athletics team or giving debating a crack, but I urge you boys, do not waste what you have in front of you, take a risk and take pride in what you do. because your only regrets will be the opportunities you did not take.

Part 2: Be the person that you want to be, not the person others want you to be.

As my time at Hale draws to a close, I realise that after all this school has given me, it is time to give back. This is why what I leave with you all today may well be my most important words as Captain.

Arguably my most important reflection upon my time at Hale is that it is crucial to stick to who you are and what you believe in, throughout this year and later on in life as men. I would like to reiterate Pharrell Williams' message upon being awarded the most influential fashion icon of the last decade: "That which makes us different is what makes us special, and that's okay." No matter who you are, where you come from or what you believe in, always stick to who you are and never ever change yourself just to please others. Most people are so caught up in being afraid of what others think, what others want them to do, and what others tell them to say, so do not be like the others, do not live a version of someone else's life, because it is okay to be different. Never let people tell you that what you are doing in life or where you are heading is not worth it. Just do what makes you happy; that is all that matters.

Not everyone will share your vision and not everyone will be okay with who you are, and that is okay - there will always be people who will tell you that you are not good enough. What right do others have to determine your dreams and, more importantly, why are you listening? Do more of what makes you happy, and do not get caught up in what others are doing, rather focus on what you love and how you are going to get there.

To Mitch and the prefect group for next year, I have every confidence in you boys to make the role your own and leave the School with no regrets, knowing you made a positive impact on others. For the 17 of you who have been given this privilege, always stay true to yourself and never change, no matter what others think. It is your year - do it your

I love this school and everything there is to it, and I am so blessed to call myself a Haleian. This year has been by far the best year of my life and I thank you all so much for being a part of it.

I will finish by saying that every great dream begins with a dreamer, so be different, be unique, but most importantly, be yourself and never, ever give up.





OXFORD TOUR LONDON

Late one June Sunday night, the air was abuzz as eighteen excited year 11 Hale boys gathered inside Perth Airport. Along with tour leaders Mr Audino and Mr Matson, they were ready to embark on an adventure to the other side of world. Bidding farewell to parents and home, the boys took off, and after a brief stop in Hong Kong, found themselves in the monstrous Heathrow Airport. After passing through customs without much fuss, the boys spent the evening enjoying the picturesque Hyde Park.

The following day, the trip was off to a flying start with Mr Audino leading us through Westminster Abbey, Harrods, the Natural History Museum and the Science Museum - at the same time passing by other landmarks Big Ben and Downing Street. James Tazwell thoughtfully packed an AFL footy, which resulted in him being awarded the inaugural "Spirit of Australia Award", presented by Mr Matson - starting a tradition continued throughout the week. Such small touches kept morale high as the boys explored the historic St Paul's Cathedral, the rebuilt Globe Theatre, Hamley's Toy Store, and the National Maritime Museum. During a brief stop at the Royal Observatory, the footy was passed across the Prime Meridian, before we headed to the Tower of London and an enjoyable trip on the London Eye.

Whenever the group slowed down, they were kept moving

along by Mr Audino's incredible walking speed. It certainly inspired the boys for the annual Great Hale Hunt at the British Museum, where they gazed upon historical artefacts such as the Rosetta Stone and the Lewis Chessmen. That afternoon was spent exploring Camden Markets, before visiting Trafalgar Square, the Houses of Parliament, the Churchill War Museum and Covent Garden on a packed final day in London. The boys then reflected on this history and culture, relaxing in Hyde Park by going for a run or kicking the aforementioned footy. The next morning the bus took them out to the city of Oxford, as all felt a mixture of nerves and excitement.

OXFORD

With the eighteen boys spread over the colleges St Catherine's, St Hugh's, Balliol and Lady Margaret Hall, each member found themselves heading off upon their own Oxford journey. The boys went into dinner and icebreakers preparing to represent Australia, before being surprised to find out that many others from down under had made the trek across the globe. Of course there was still a strong international flavour, with students from Brazil, China, Estonia, Italy, Greece, Japan, France and of course England - just to name a few. Not only did this help students to gain an understanding of these various cultures, test out the language skills they acquired at Hale, and meet new people, it allowed them to appreciate the perception of Australia internationally, a poignant reflection many carried home with them.

With these new friends, the boys were flung into two weeks of university life at Oxford. This not only meant staying off certain patches of grass, but developing more independence and organisational skills. There were opportunities to go punting, see musicals, visit old manors, and explore the hidden treasures of the historic town under the careful guidance of old boy Ben Spagnolo. The boys balanced these adventures with those of intellect, in daily classes where they chose two from a variety of subjects, including Mathematics, Physics, Literature, History and Economics, and afternoon workshops where they developed skills in acting, debating and leadership. Several boys were awarded for their outstanding achievement and effort amongst an international cohort: Xander Clapin (Economics), Ben Hamblin (Public Speaking), Matthew Blacker (Physics), Haseeb Riaz (Chemistry, Medical Biology), William Wu (Business Challenge, Counsellors Award) and Michael Dawson (Journalism, Contemporary History, Leadership and Team Building).



LANGUAGES

JAPANESE

The 2015 Japanese language programme at Hale School provided the boys with the opportunity to learn more about some cultural aspects of Japan they previously had not come into contact with. We were lucky enough to welcome some delegates from the University of Hyogo who provided the Year 9 boys with a presentation of Rakugo - a style of Japanese comedy storytelling. The pair, who are English teachers in Japan, delivered a comedy skit to the Year 9 cohort and even welcomed several of the boys to be a part of the act. Whilst the boys were initially very nervous, those asked were able to assist in the skits in front of their peers.

This year also saw many of the Year 8 students participate in the Language Week investigation. The theme for this year was

"Weapons & Warfare". The activity combined the skills for reading and writing Japanese characters, as well as looking into an interesting historical Japanese topic. The boys were able to investigate the different eras of Japanese warfare and produce some visually stunning projects. 2015 saw the Year 11 Hale boys embark on a language-centred social outing. In October, 11 students and two staff enjoyed an evening of lovely Japanese food at the newly opened James Parker Sushi and Sake restaurant in Northbridge. The boys (dressed to the nines) were able to try some authentic delicacies prepared by one of Perth's premier Japanese chefs. Having enjoyed themselves thoroughly, the evening out was a huge success. We hope this is the first of many future visits for the boys in the upper school languages programme.

FRENCH

In order to enhance cultural awareness. French students were asked to explore the theme of warfare during Language Week this year and then to produce their own models or posters. Teachers were most impressed with some of the pieces presented and the original interpretations of the boys. A highlight for Year 12 boys is the Japanese /French soccer match. This vear's match was much more even than in some previous years, with the French side eventually securing a hardfought 1-0 win. To finish the term and complete the cultural experience, Year 11 boys enjoyed an evening of French cuisine at Chez Pierre in Nedlands.

Term 3 is also a term in which boys sit external assessments of their language competency. Years 10 and 11 participated in the Australian Language certificate testing programme. Many boys achieved results in the High Distinction and Distinction range. In the annual Alliance Française examinations for Western Australia, Shailesh Vasandani from Year 10, Max Anderson Loake, Domenic Quail, and Adi Ganguly from Year 11, and Qiang Li from Year 12 were placed in the top 10 percent. Shailesh Vasandi was placed 2nd in the Year 10 category and Domenic Quail came 3rd in Year 11.



House sport at Hale remains one of the truly unique events in the Hale School calendar. As the saying goes, "Play for your School, die for your House"!



Wilson House have enjoyed a golden run, winning the Cock House Cup since 2009 - but not in 2015. Just when it appeared that no house could ever go the distance of the house sport season, another house has not only won the Cock House Cup, but won it convincingly. Congratulations to Faulkner House who have secured the Cock House Cup for the first time since 2008. Unfortunately, the day houses must now plan for yet another year!



The first major house carnival for each year is the interhouse Swimming Carnival which is now split into a Middle School and Senior School carnival which run back-to-back with points flowing from one to the other. It appeared as though it would be business as usual in 2015 as Faulkner and Wilson took up their annual positions of 9th and 10th but there would be much jostling in the top 5 positions throughout the day. Parry looked to be the favourites with Haynes looking to go one better than their one point loss last year. Tregonning and Loton both ensured it would be tight leading into the final Year 12 freestyle relay for the day. In the end, Parry won by 5 points to Haynes, Tregonning, Loton and Havelock.



The summer season commenced in fine weather once again where the boarders were clearly much more comfortable on land. On the back of their swimming success, Parry House made their big move, winning the Sholl Cup which covers volleyball, baseball and s-ball. Faulkner came in 2nd, followed by Riley and Buntine. In the other sports, Faulkner won the basketball and ultimate frisbee trophies, Tregonning won the combined water polo, Parry won the cricket and Riley were the best tennis team.

The winter season was remarkably played in conditions more accustomed to summer - which usually means the rain will come on cross country or athletics days! The first cracks started to appear in Wilson House's plans as their senior football slipped down to the 5 v 6 playoff,

opening the door for Faulkner to play Riley in the senior final and claim the combined football trophy. Faulkner continued to flex their muscles by winning the soccer trophy and placing 2nd in the hockey. All was not entirely lost for Wilson as they won the hockey trophy whilst St Georges picked up the touch football trophy and Riley took home the badminton/table tennis competition.

The annual cross country event was held in week three of Term 3 which was the bye week for PSA sport. 

Boarding











It has been an enjoyable and rewarding year in the boarding community with our boarders making the most of the many opportunities being afforded to them. We welcomed more than 30 new boys into Brine House and seven new boys into the senior house. The boarding houses continued their dominance of house sport, they performed admirably in the Arts Cup and were again the mainstay of PSA sport! The boys have maintained their focus on academic improvement whilst also being involved in activities such as debating and service learning. The culture in boarding has never been as strong and as positive as it has been in 2015.

The new REACH leave system was employed in the senior house, after a trial in Brine House the previous year. We had a few initial teething problems but it has certainly streamlined the processing of leave for the Heads of House and boys have found changing their locations much easier to complete. The addition of a large screen and projector in the senior boarding house was welcomed by the boys, who have enjoyed watching the footy, movies and playing FIFA. Heads of House have also used the screen for presentations to the boys. This project was made possible due to funding from the P&F Association. Their support of boarding over recent years

has been excellent and greatly appreciated by all in the boarding community. The installation of WIFI throughout the senior house was the third significant technology improvement in boarding this year and was also well-received by the boys.

2015 saw the introduction of two new pastoral care initiatives in boarding. The first was the boarders' academic peer support programme where a group of senior boys worked closely with the younger boarders once per week. The Year 12s met with the Year 9s; the Year 11s helped the Year 8s; and the Year 10s assisted the Year 7s. The senior boys completed an induction session and then helped the younger boys with their organisation and use of diaries, as well as providing support and advice in various subjects. The programme proved to be successful over the course of the year, not just with increased academic support, but perhaps most importantly it allowed positive and genuine connections between the senior and junior boarders to be established.

The second initiative was the creation of a Boarding Personal Development Programme. Heads of House and Assistant Heads of House have formalised much of what they do with the boys into a coordinated programme built around some key themes.

They have guided boys through various issues and activities in their year groups. The programme started in Term 1 and continued at various stages each term through the whole year. It has also had a positive impact on the boys and on the culture in boarding. Whilst the 10s and 11s focused on relationships and leadership, the Brine House boys formalised the transition into boarding by focusing on topics including resilience, homesickness and the digital world. Year 12s got themselves involved in some 'life after boarding' activities including completing a barista course, doing some cooking sessions and learning to wash, sew and iron!

Perhaps our most successful PD programme was that coordinated by Mr Chris Guard and Mr Heath McCabe with our Year 9s. The core theme of their programme was Community, starting with the boarding community in Term 1, the school community in Term 2 and the wider community in Term 3. The highlight of the programme was the Sports Wheelchair WA challenge in Week 9 of Term 3. Many of the Year 9s spent half a day in a wheelchair in the boarding house and at school, whilst also fundraising for the organisation. The week long event culminated in a game of wheelchair basketball on the Friday night. The boys managed to raise more than

\$13000 (which was an amazing effort) but importantly they also raised awareness within the Hale community about the day-to-day challenges people in wheelchairs face. At the Wheelchair Sports Association Sports Star of the Year Awards night, Hale School was presented with the 2015 Community Fundraising Award in recognition of the Year 9 boarders' involvement last term. This is something all Year 9 boys, with Mr Guard and Mr McCabe, should be extremely proud of.

The Year 11 'Influencing Others' programme builds upon previous leadership and peer mentoring opportunities and aligns with leadership activities at school.

The Year 12 'Life after Boarding' programme aims to provide Year 12 boarders with a range of opportunities and experiences to enhance their prospects for part-time or full-time employment and to prepare them for independent living after school.

A highlight in the boarding calendar is the Hale/St Mary's Siblings' Dinner in June, hosted this year by Hale. This was the second Siblings' Dinner and was well attended by more than 60 siblings. Kai de Lacy did a great job producing a video where he interviewed some of the Year 12 sisters and brothers about their younger siblings. It provided for some very entertaining moments! The kitchen staff prepared a wonderful three course dinner. The brothers and sisters certainly enjoyed the evening and having some time to catch up over dinner.

This year saw a changing of the guard in boarding with Faulkner House asserting its dominance over Wilson House in the Cock House Cup. Wilson have won the trophy for the last 8 years (an amazing statistic) but had to settle for third place this year and accept the realisation that Faulkner had knocked them off! The positive vibe in the green

camp throughout the year was great to see. The leadership of House Captain Elliot Briers and his prefect team, combined with the enormous support and positive energy of Mr Vernon, proved a winning formula. It will be interesting to see if Faulkner can create their own period of dominance over the next few years.

The Exchange Student programme this year was again an outstanding success. The three students from South Africa thoroughly enjoyed their stay at Hale and made a very positive impression on staff and students. Similarly the Kings School boys from Sydney also made the most of their opportunities during their exchange. It is important to acknowledge Mrs Glenys Walsh for her efforts in coordinating the programme and undertaking all of the administrative tasks. The Exchange Students' function at the end of Term 3 was a fitting way to farewell our visiting exchange students, whilst wishing the three Hale boys, including Blair Sewell, the very best of luck on their upcoming exchange to South Africa.

Throughout the year a number of Hale staff were involved in the field day circuit visiting Wagin, Karratha, Dowerin, Newdegate and Esperance. The Albany boarding function was held in September with Mr Meade and Mr Steenekamp hosting families and friends from the region. The field days and expos are great opportunities for

boarding staff to meet with parents on their home turf and to catch up with families and many old Haleians. We look forward to the addition of some more field days in 2016 including visits to Broome, Kununurra and Albany.

Early in Term 4 the Year 12s enjoyed a week of celebrations including a swim at City Beach followed by fish 'n' chips watching the sunset. The Thursday night Year 12 Boarders' Chapel, followed by a whole house farewell including speeches and presentation of gifts to each boy, was again an appropriate way to acknowledge our Year 12 boarders. The Year 12s were given a very warm welcome by all of the boarding community when they returned from Chapel. Three Year 12 boys - Trent Baljeu, Blake Barrow and Bradlee Applegate - agreed to address the House on behalf of their fellow Year 12s. All three boys spoke very well and all recounted various events and experiences from Brine House 2011 all the way through to this year!

We wish all of our Year 12 boarders well for 2016 and beyond and thank them for their positive contribution and for being such good role models in boarding this year.



In Term 1 we were entertained by the masterful work of former and current students Xavier Hazard and Archie Stapleton with their spellbinding production of The Messenger. This was another opportunity to see the depth of Redfoot's young talent in action. The boys wrote the stage version then cast and directed the piece. Full houses saw the results of their work and left the theatre in no doubt as to the quality of their stagecraft.

In July our UK tour involved a reworking of *The Greatest* Children's Story Ever Written and a new play - The Wolves of Willoughby Chase. In a chaotic schedule we met actors and directors, went backstage on

The skills they gain from this club give the boys the experience required to operate Hale School productions.



da VINCI DECATHLON

The da Vinci Decathlon is an all-day interschool competition where teams of eight students from 28 Western Australian schools compete in ten academic events in the spirit of an Olympic Decathlon at Wesley College.

It is named after Leonardo da Vinci, one of the world's greatest thinkers and scholars and the competition places a particular emphasis on higher order thinking skills, problem solving and creativity. Students work collaboratively competing in events from a variety of disciplines including Science, Creative Producers, Art and Poetry, Engineering, Mathematics, Philosophy, Cartography, English, General Knowledge and Code Breaking. This year Hale School did very well, finishing second in both the Intermediate (Year 8) and Senior (Years 9 and 10) da Vinci Decathlon competitions.

The Intermediate team were very consistent, coupling together points across many of the disciplines. They finished only 20 points behind the eventual winners Sacred Heart College. The boys had a fantastic competition and missed out on a place in the National da Vinci Decathlon finals at Knox Grammar in Sydney by what equates to one place in one event.

The Senior da Vinci Decathlon team were state winners and national finalists in 2014. They competed well again in this year's state competition finishing second to a very strong Christ Church Grammar School team. They won the code breaking event for the third year in a row and finished second in philosophy, mathematics and cartography.

MATHEMATICS CLUBS

Forty boys across Years 7, 8 and 9 formed the Hale Mathematics clubs this year and they met each fortnight to enrich their mathematical knowledge and prepare for a number of competitions.

The first event was the Have Sum Fun competition, where teams of six competed in a fast-paced quiz against other schools. Hale teams had top 10 finishes in both the Junior and Intermediate categories, and our Senior team led the way, taking out third place.

The biggest event of the year was the Australian Mathematics Competition, which returned some outstanding individual results. More than half of the Hale students who entered earned a Distinction or higher. This included 32 High Distinctions and four individual prize winners: Mihailo Bozic (Year 10), Nicholas Durham (Year 9), Vincent Abbott (Year 9) and Joshua Purwein (Year 7). Congratulations to these boys on their brilliant achievement.

Seven students were also invited to take part in the challenging Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad. James Haskis (Year 10), Shailesh Vasandani (Year 10) and Matthew Garas (Year 9) did extremely well to earn Distinctions in this high level competition.

In Term 3, eighteen Year 8 boys joined a group from St Mary's Anglican Girls' School in the annual Maths Camp at Ern Halliday Recreation Camp. The camp was a fantastic opportunity for mathematically talented people to share ideas and experiences with other like-minded students.

To conclude a very busy year, The Mathematics clubs competed in the Junior Olympiad at the University of Western Australia. Sixteen boys from Years 8 and 9 competed against over 500 students from throughout the state. All teams competed well on the day and Vincent Abbott (Year 9) achieved the best individual score for the school He was awarded the UWA Merit Prize for finishing in 8th place overall.

MOCK TRIAL

This year, the Law Society's Mock Trial competition involved 108 teams from 48 schools. Hale School fielded six teams of eight to ten members - our highest participation rate since the competition began. Despite the boys' thirst for a murder trial, cases revolved around a bicycle theft at Rottnest, a dog attack, assault by kitchen fork, breaking a lease agreement, a bank robbery, reneging on an acting contract and a drunken punch. All cases tested the boys' ability to analyse witness statements, address pertinent elements of the law, operate appropriately in a courtroom and think on their feet. Trials were held at the Supreme Courts, a beautiful old building with the weighty atmosphere of a Friday night BBC legal drama. While barristers do not actually get to deliver impassioned speeches to a sceptical but soon-to-be won over jury (American TV has led us astray in that regard), there is plenty of tension and occasional comic relief.

Not only was 2015 our biggest year to date, it was also the most successful, with Ms Lange's Year 12 team winning the Grand Final by defeating the reigning 'premiers', Mount Lawley. Victory was sweet considering that the team had beaten our Year 12 finalists in 2013. Honourable Chief Justice Wayne Martin AC of the Supreme Court of Western Australia adjudicated the Grand Final. In the award ceremony, he favourably compared the advocacy skills displayed by the students with those seen in real courtrooms. The team was coached by John Park (of Park Legal Solutions), who helped them to understand the finer details of the law and courtroom practices. His assistance was invaluable.

Members of the victorious Year 12 team - Shaun Huxtable, Sam Ranson, Hayden Stockley-Smith, Bradlee Applegate and Joshua Tucker - were awarded Colours for their achievement and for their dedication to the competition in previous years. Archie Stapleton was awarded Honours for three years of eloquent, articulate and intelligent participation. Who else could submit to the judge that asking "Where did you go after that?" did not qualify as a leading question because the witness' presence in the courtroom was evidence

PUBLIC SPEAKING

The ability to speak confidently, persuasively and courteously in a public forum is a skill that translates to all facets of life be it at school, in business or in the broader community. Here at Hale School, Public Speaking is an arena that many boys find both challenging and inspiring. In 2015, boys from both the Middle and Senior School have been involved in a variety of events, working together and independently to develop their speaking confidence and expertise.

The Rostrum Voice of Youth Competition has been running since 1975 and focuses on the delivery of persuasive speeches that appeal to both the heart and mind. This year, eight boys from Years 8 to 12 signed up to be involved. Participants in this competition showed persistence and determination in producing the most persuasive speeches possible. The Hale contingent included Rahil Shah (Year 9); Year 10 boys Callum Anderson-Brennan, Douglas Lewin and Raymond McKinnon; Charlie Young (Year 11) and Luke Rao (Year 12). Congratulations to Year 9 competitor Byron Ellis who was selected to compete in the state semi-finals heat, giving an impassioned speech on the importance of accepting yourself for who you are. It was also remarkable to see Year 8 competitor Max Richardson beating many older students in the competition to be selected as a state finalist in the junior division with his

inspiring speech on the power that just one person can have on the lives of many others.

The Australia-Britain Society has supported the annual Plain English Speaking Award Competition for students in Years 11 and 12 since its inception in 1978. The event includes an eight minute prepared speech followed by a three minute impromptu speech on a given topic. The final part of the competition entails a short interview based on the topic of their prepared speech. In September, Year 11 student James Dingley competed in the state finals of this unique event. Speaking eloquently on the topic of space exploration as mankind's next frontier. James was awarded second place in this long-standing competition.

The annual Evatt Competition, organised by United Nations Youth Australia (UNYA), is a model United Nations Security Council diplomacy competition for students in Years 9 to 12. Evatt aims to educate young people about Australia's place in the world and empower them as active citizens by developing their public speaking, mediation and communication skills. This year, Hale was represented by four teams. Working in teams of two, Year 11 students Edward Aitken and Michael Dawson; Charlie Drake and Krisen Shah; Ben Hamblin and Haseeb Riaz gathered research and prepared to represent the interests of their allocated nation in this very popular competition.

The UNYA Voice Public Speaking Competition is a unique opportunity for students in Years 7 to 10 to broaden their knowledge of global affairs and international relationships. Through the presentation of a prepared speech and answering impromptu questions, students explore topics of global and personal significance. The competition gives younger students a taste of what public speaking entails and the chance to make their voice heard on key international issues that are shaping the future of their world. This year, the School was strongly represented with six boys from Years 7 to 10: Year 7 boys Mackenzie Brown and Flynn Mahon, Year 8 Girik Dev, Year 9 Connor Price and Year 10 students Raymond McKinnon

and Lachlan Ranson. At the time of writing this article, it is wonderful to hear that Raymond has been selected to compete in the state finals of this prestigious event and we congratulate him on this marvellous achievement.

The Rotary organisation applies a four way test to their professional conduct. These are in the form of four questions: Is it the truth? Is it fair to all concerned? Will it build goodwill and better friendships? Will it be beneficial to all concerned? Year 10 competitors in the Four Way Test Speech Competition must address each of these principles in their speech. Charlie Young (Year 11) was selected as a finalist in the 2014/2015 round. PHILOSOPHY CLUB

The French philosopher Rene Descartes wrote: "It is not enough to have a good mind. The main thing is to use it well." Throughout 2015 Hale students have continued to develop skills which will enable them to use their minds well. Over 80 students have been studying Philosophy in 2015 with numerous highlights over the year.

Early in April the Year 12 PAE students visited the Hale Junior School to run a series of communities of inquiry with Year 6 students in the new Learning Hub. As an indication of their skills using this method of inquiry, the Year 12 students had to take small groups of students as they explored the question: "Is it possible to do





nothing?" The main emphasis is on skills development in both the Senior and Junior School students.

Through the year Philosophy students have participated in Ethics Olympiads. The coordinator of Philosophy and Ethics. Mr Matthew Wills. came up with the idea a few years ago. An Ethics Olympiad is a unique opportunity for students to engage in interesting ethical discussions with other students from different parts of the country and the world using Skype. On Wednesday 17 March Hale School Philosophy and Ethics students competed against students in Wollongong NSW. Students from Edmund Rice College and Hale students fought it out for a place in the

International Ethics Olympiad. We used Skype to facilitate this discussion. Professor Stephan Millett from Curtin University and Dr Michael Organ from Wollongong University were our judges on the day. Year 11 students Ben Hamblin, Todd Bensky, Andrew Waddell, James Jovanoski and Harry Walters represented Hale

ultimately moulding the students' character for the better.

In September Dr Morgan Luck from Charles Sturt University in NSW spent a week at Hale as our 2015 Hale School 'Philosopher in Residence'. Each year a professional philosopher is invited to undertake an intensive week of teaching and discussion with students and the broader community. Hale is the first and only school to offer this opportunity to students in Australia, with Rugby School in the UK recently taking on a similar programme.

The intention behind this unique programme is to expose Hale students to different philosophical ideas,

assist with critical thinking development and to look at alternative ways of presenting an argument. Logical thinking, articulating and forming arguments and the principles of philosophy form much of the programme.

Dr Luck included a wide and varied range of topics such as "A new religious argument for the non-existence of God" and "From moral uncertainty to vegetarianism". He commented, "Teenagers are naturally great at discussing and arguing! Learning how to argue well is a skill they can apply to any situation. Dr Luck added, "Beyond the great facilities at Hale School, I've seen many earnest young men, with a high level of attention and detail. The

boys are really thinking things through. It has been a very positive experience coming to Hale for the week. The boys are proficient thinkers and many have interacted and engaged at a higher level than many of my university students."

On 2 October, eight Hale students and two members of staff travelled to Sydney for the 2015 FAPSA Australasian Philosothon. Over the following three days they competed against schools from Victoria, NSW and Queensland. Also represented were the other WA schools which had won the previous year's WA Philosothons. Held at North Sydney Girl's High School, competitors discussed topics such as "Are human beings"

individual by nature?" and "Do numbers exist independently of humans?" The format of the Philosothon offered a profound and collaborative way for students to engage in discussion, as opposed to conventional debating styles. The community of inquiry discussions take place in a circle and get students to critically evaluate the ideas of others. Rather than attacking flaws in reasoning or logic, students attempt to clarify and extend various viewpoints of others and build a position together.


Selection for the Hale team involved a trial community of inquiry on the topic "Should we be able to profit from the sale of organs?" a topic that also featured at the

Australasian Philosothon. Each student brought a question related to the topic, and over the course of discussion students attempted to come to an agreement. Questions raised at the tryouts included "Does profiting from the sale of human organs remove altruism?" and "Should we have an 'opt out' policy for organ donation?" All the boys represented Hale with distinction and overall we achieved 3rd place at the event. Students representing Hale School were Archie Stapleton, Luke Rao, Matthew Blacker, Dylan Royce, Daipayan Mukhopadhyay, Conor O'Sullivan, Harrison Auld and Triyan Jha.


they were very appreciative of the chance to focus on their individual studies or to work with other students in a peer tutoring style.

SOLOMON ISLANDS

23 Hale School boys said goodbye to their families and boarded the flight from Perth to the Solomon Islands, with little idea of the life-changing experience that they were embarking on.

We were greeted with a heavy tropical heat and swathes of

palm trees lining the runway. It is safe to say that all 23 of us were blown away by the standard of living we viewed through the van window en route to our accommodation. Makeshift stalls lined the streets; small, dilapidated houses cluttered the skyline; and the local soccer pitch was far from the luscious green we were accustomed to at Hale.

Our agenda spanned ten days, with the overarching goal being to assist Siro Community School on Big Gela, an island two hour's boat ride from the capital city Honiara. Teaching began first thing on Monday morning, myself and six other boys took on a senior classroom of students with ages ranging from 14 to 22, assisting them whilst Mr Dean taught Chemistry on the blackboard. Textbooks were unheard of at Siro, and stapled booklets of photocopied paper served as meagre replacements. Despite this, the laptop computers that we brought with us were a constant source of wonder to the local teachers



and students. Something as simple as drawing a line on Microsoft paint brought cries of astonishment from any who were watching.

Saturday marked the end of our work at Siro, and was to be a day of celebration and donation of the gifts that we had brought for the school and its surrounding village. The local newspaper captured the gifting of a chainsaw, seven laptops, a generator and other small gifts, all of which were purchased using funds raised by us Hale boys prior to the trip. It was heartwarming to view the sheer awe in the faces of children receiving a gift as simple as a necklace or a coloured pen. Furthermore, the Head Girl of Siro was granted a scholarship to Selwyn College, the Solomon Islands' most prestigious college. Festivities took place that night and it was with heavy hearts that we boarded the boats for the trip back to

Here we enjoyed some last minute shopping and trips to major tourist sites as well as

some R & R and then it was home to Perth.

We found an opportunity to reflect on the flight home, and the general consensus was that the trip had altered almost all of the boys perspective on everything that they took for granted back home. Seeing students so eager to learn and absorb information granted a renewed appreciation for our teaching facilities at Hale, particularly when considering how much the students of Siro would excel at a school like Hale.

The Chaplain's Pilgrimage to the Solomon Islands was an extraordinary experience and the memories of the people and places will remain with us forever.

VIETNAM CAMBODIA

April 2015 saw a group of Year 12 Service Learning students and staff members depart

for the amazing countries of Vietnam and Cambodia in Southeast Asia. Leaving the day after the Hale School Ball, the 16 boys met with Mr David Alderson Mrs Wendy Keen, Mr Tim Parish and Lizzie Alderson late on Wednesday night at Perth International Airport all prepared to embark on a remarkable 'once in a lifetime' journey.

After a sleepless night of travel (for those who did not find comfort on the plane or the airport lounge floor), the group arrived unperturbed in Phnom Penh, Cambodia ready to get to work. Throughout Cambodia the Hale School group worked with Frank Surgener, the founder of Ride Aid, an amazing organisation that has developed numerous programmes and charitable institutions for the underprivileged and orphaned children and adults with disability throughout the

Our first stop with Frank was to 'Hale School', where one of the buildings was funded by

money raised here in Perth. Fresh off the bus the boys got straight to work doing what they did best throughout the tour and that was to create havoc! Aussie Rules footballs flew through the air in the dusty playground as well as impromptu Australian Geography lessons in the classrooms. Whilst it looked disorganised it was clear to see that all the Hale School students (Australian and Cambodian) were having the time of our lives.

Whilst in Cambodia, we learnt of the unfortunate circumstances the country had experienced in recent decades. Visiting the infamous S21 (Toul Slena) genocide museum we learnt about Pol Pot's regime which has left a legacy that will take generations of Cambodians to rectify. A visit to the killing fields of Choeung Ek left many of the group in awe and disbelief of what happened there, but many of us became even more resolved about what we were actually trying to achieve with our visit to this country.







That is, to assist those who are paying the price for the injudiciousness of the past.

Over the next week Frank would show the Hale School boys and staff some of the best kept secrets of Cambodia. The Goutte d'Eau orphanage where some of the children had been rescued from human trafficking, and all had disabilities. At Goutte d'Eau it was like the barrier of disability was invisible as we saw children create amazing drawings without hands and play volleyball from a wheelchair. At the New Life Orphanage (for children who have lost their parents to the AIDS virus) the Hale boys and staff once again created a scene of chaos playing sports and Cambodian games for what felt like minutes... we were there for hours!

On the journey to the south of Cambodia we visited the Mango Tree project, set in the grounds of a temple, is a rudimentary childcare centre which saw some of the greatest scenes of laughter


and enjoyment for the whole trip. M'lop Tapang (named the Stars Foundation 2013 Impact Award Winner for Child Protection in Asia-Pacific) was our next destination. This is an organisation whose doors open only once a year, and only to the Hale group. While waiting for their bus, the boys wreaked havoc and created a scene of enjoyement and laughter that had to be seen to be believed. Unfortunately, we once again lost the annual soccer match. Our following visit, to the Steng Hau child centre in the depths of the Cambodia countryside, saw us again break down the vast cultural boundaries within seconds and incredible enjoyment for all of us unrolled. Frank also introduced the Hale boys to a group of Cambodian boys and girls of the same age, but of immeasurable different backgrounds. This was the cultural exchange and was another highlight of the trip. We lived together for four days and the groups bonded as one; the friendships formed were a true testament to all those involved

After Cambodia we felt the 16 boys had formed a group unity that would be tested in Vietnam. A short plane trip away, the Hale group landed in the town of Hoi An in Vietnam. The Hoi An orphanage, Hoi An Aged Care Centre and Red Cross Aged Care Centre remained the toughest days and experiences of the trip. Working in government run organizations with poor funding and unskilled staff did not deter the boys from again finding their niche and bringing smiles to the faces of the young and old. Saigon was our last destination. The three days we spent with the Christina Noble Children's Foundation encouraged us to believe it was possible to deliver quality help with the right dedication and commitment. This is the sort of place that many of us might consider coming back to as a volunteer in years to come

The return to Perth was quiet as the now exhausted boys reflected on what they had witnessed over the past two weeks: the people they had met, the enjoyment they had shared and the personal journey each of them had taken. Some of us only now have had time to truly put everything into perspective.

It is clear to say that for all of us, the trip was a remarkable experience and one that has forged a greater understanding and appreciation for our friends in Cambodia and Vietnam. Their daily struggles do not deter them from having fun nor being happy and it makes life for all of us seem so privileged. This has been a truly enriching experience and on behalf of all of us who went, I thank Hale for allowing us this opportunity.

For many parents, the lead up to camp is a bustling time at home furiously purchasing, procuring, and packing items on the list, as well as anything else that comes to mind and may "come in handy". For some the ability to simply get boys involved is a challenge, while other parents do the packing themselves "just to make sure".

With the latter situation, it is a discombobulating time for the students who arrive at camp with a bag in hand that in many ways resembles a lucky dip. I feel for them, as it is often difficult to find what one has not packed. Parents have always had a habit of popping goods into ne'er before seen packaging, nooks and crannies thus rendering all items camouflaged to the adolescent male eye.

As the years progress, the responsibility rests more upon the students themselves. Often bleary eyed and tired on arrival, they alight the coach apprehensive about their new environment and the task ahead. In latter years having arrived at base camp, the boys must redistribute and repack for various stages of expedition. In addition to their own field accoutrements, they must be fully involved in all levels of victualling and group equipment.

Herein lies the first dilemma as an instructor: "Do I allow my charge to venture forth underdone in the reality that it could be to his significant peril, or do I provide him with the equipment as described and required?" Thus they begin to dismantle the wellpacked goods in their bags and suitcases to check that the contents do indeed line up in both description and condition to the list as detailed. In recent years the lack of attention had led to the newly coined term CPSE (Compulsory Personal Safety Equipment).

To our great delight in 2015 the vast majority of boys came to camp well attired and adequately prepared. We quickly realised that we did not need to carry so much stock of CPSE and subsequently far fewer parents found surprise items like boots and rain jackets appearing on school accounts. Thankyou to all parents who assisted in this process by ensuring their sons were well supplied. For those boys who still needed assistance, I trust that they will return to their next experience with a better insight and better personal responsibility.

On a year by year basis, the camps were well received and the activities characterised by enthusiastic participation and cheery supervising staff. On all counts the camps can only be described as a resounding success.

Thanks must go to the Outdoor Education team behind this result. With Mr Chris Charlton having made a very late move to Wesley College at the end of 2014, the task of coordinating Junior School camps fell to newer staff in Ben Visser and Matt Wells. Mr Murray Curran

repeated his tried and tested formula for success on Middle School camps, while Mr Tim Harley again held the reins with an everchanging Year 9 programme. All staff were fully involved in the delivery of the Year 10 programme as we juggled a larger cohort in a shorter time frame while attempting to avoid the many and growing clashes with cocurricular offerings.

We saw the development of a completely new Year 11 Challenge Day to replace the Leadership Symposium. While initial reception was varied and perhaps not overly supportive, the feedback afterwards was surprisingly positive and reaffirming of the model. It will be a very big change for both Tim and the Outdoor Education Department as he transitions into his new role. He will administer the everchanging landscape of Year 9 camp for just one more year.

It is an exciting time to be involved in Outdoor Education at Hale for boys and staff alike. There are many projects ahead of us including the

Interestingly many of the photos represented activities people and places that are no longer in our fold. As I fondly reminisced, I could not help but think about what made those camps so memorable. The Hale School Outdoor Education programme has always been regarded as first class by our peers, but the thing that mostly sets it apart from others is our diversity and innovation. Whether it be rowing a 24ft boat around Exmouth Gulf, surf kayaking in Torbay or expedition sailing up the Ningaloo coast, we have always offered exceptional and unique experiences.

The message for the boys who are lucky enough to partake in these experiences is to make the most of their time on camp whatever their frame of mind. I hope that they have taken this message home and continue to make every day count.

The Faulkner Sharpe trophy is played for in Term 1 each vear between Hale School and Scotch College where all teams are included and points are weighted toward senior teams. Hale has won this trophy since its inception six years ago which highlights the strength and depth of our teams. Upon entry in Year 7, new boys are reminded that they are entering a big pool and that they may no longer be the big fish. This certainly holds true when looking through the dominance in lower grades.

Basketball at Hale continues to grow in numbers and also strength. The 1st V had a very impressive season under new coach, Nik Lackovic, as they showed enormous improvement from Term 4 to Term 1. Most opposition teams underestimated them at their peril but Aquinas were simply too strong for the entire competition. Next season looks very promising also as a strong Year 10 group joins the current Year 11s, many of whom have had a taste of 1st V basketball already. The G5, or gentleman's V (6ths basketball) team was formed by a group of winter sport centric students who had to play summer sport in order to use the weights room.

They found a willing coach in Mr Richard Tongue and then proceeded to combine their enthusiasm with their powers of self-promotion to go through the season undefeated and, funnily enough, enjoyed playing for all the right reasons.

The 1st XI cricketers had a slow start to their Darlot campaign which, in the end, hurt them at the back end of the season. Going into the last round, Hale could not win the competition but finished with a draw meaning their last four games were recorded as three wins and a draw. Whilst a few teams went through undefeated this year and should be acknowledged, one of the highlights was the fierce contests played in the internal matches - some as 3rds v 4ths or some as day boys v boarders. There is no doubt that some of the boys will remember these internal matches fondly in years to come. Kim Hughes remains as Director of Cricket at Hale and his influence and presence at training and matches have ensured all players and coaches are able to develop their skills week by week.

Rowing at Hale continues to enjoy a strong profile, highlighted each year at the Old Haleians' assembly in the day prior to the Head of the River. The 1st VIII led the shed all season, placing much higher than their final race suggests. In the Hamer Cup, Hale finished 6th which certainly does not do justice

to their season or final regatta. The Year 9 crews performed well and will form promising crews next season whilst the best results were recorded in the seniors with the 2nd VIII, 3rd VIII and 4th VIII all finishing 3rd. The introduction of a second rowing camp in December has been welcomed by the shed as they strive to continue their improvement and secure a top three Hamer Cup position in 2016.

The Hale swim team made it three wins in a row as they went back-to-back-to-back having previously won the PSA Inters in 2013 in the 'old pool' and 2014 in the first year of the new pool. An incredibly strong Year 12 cohort, including two honours recipients (one in division 2!), saw Hale win by 372.5 points. The inclusive culture around the pool has been enhanced with the new facility as all boys are now able to swim all year round, assuming they are still playing a summer or winter sport for the school. Although we will lose a strong year group, there is plenty of excitement about 2016 as the squad looks to make it four in a row.

In tennis, the 1st VIII were in the hunt after winning their first two rounds but a loss on countback against Aguinas in Round 3 meant the team lost some momentum leading into the two toughest matches against Scotch and eventual winners, Christ Church. As has been the case for some time, there is plenty of depth

in the Hale tennis stables with many of the senior boys often playing tougher challenge matches during the week than on Saturdays. Well done to the 3rds and 4ths who were untroubled this year.

Many of the Hale volleyball teams, particularly the seniors, lost some tight battles having won a set or two or lost a few sets at the death. Mr Byron Northmore has done a wonderful job rebuilding the 1sts and is already on the hunt for new recruits in other sports. The tour of Melbourne is back on the agenda along with a number of new initiatives which are designed to enhance the culture of volleyball at Hale.

There is no doubt that the success of the swim team is directly proportional to the success of the water polo teams. Not only do most of the polo players do morning swim training in the mornings, they then double up in the afternoon to do a huge amount of sprints at training across the pool, all in nice deep water. The core of last vear's Dickinson Shield team backed up again this year and went back to back as they shared the premiership with Aguinas. Only five losses were recorded across all teams in Term 1 which is an outstanding achievement.







In addition, we had various specialist coaches come in to provide skill-specific training; Kieran Cranley (former National Men's team player) worked with our team on spiking and Rhodri Simmons (Hale Old Boy and current State league player) showed us various blocking and spiking drills.

To ramp up for the 2015 Brother Carigg Shield training began before the start of the school year, culminating in a game against a local club team and a scratch match against Prendiville Catholic College. Our first PSA game against Trinity College was arguably our best performance of the season, where we came within 4 points of a 5 set match. The grit, determination and skill level of our players were impressive and provided encouraging signs of things to

come. Every subsequent match was characterised by periods of outstanding volleyball, but we had difficulty in maintaining a consistently high level of play. With only one victory for the season against a reinvigorated Guildford Grammar School, the season finished with many of our plans and potential unrealised...so far.

Sam Ranson is to be congratulated on his perceptive captaincy - he always knew what to say to encourage the team and had an uncanny insight into the most appropriate strategy required given the circumstances. Our other Year 12s, namely David Steketee and Jason Ogden, also had a big impact on our season. David showed outstanding improvement and Jason developed into a consistently effective outside hitter. To all our Year 12s, thank you for

vour contribution to vollevball while you have been at Hale. Fortunately, we have some youngsters in the likes of Chapman Ma, Asger Wade and Lucas Falsone who have been on our developmental journey this season, and now have valuable experience for the upcoming seasons. Our Year 11s this year, Matthew Haddon, William White and Callum Scott, are going to form the engine room of our next campaign and we look forward to seeing their continued development next season.

The 2015 trip to Melbourne is going to add immeasurably to the Hale volleyball programme, with ten future 10A players and nine future 1st VI team players being exposed to national level vollevball.

To all the volleyball coaches at Hale - Michael Smith, Mr Peisker, Mrs Woodyard, Mr Moir, Mr Vaswani, Mr Ashby and Mr Lau. Thank you for your dedication and contribution to this wonderful sport. Our efforts will yield even greater results in times to come. The future seems especially bright when you consider the growth of our sport, both in the number of boys taking up volleyball in the Middle School and the quality of their play. With a strong Year 10 cohort and an enthusiastic 2nd VI team, volleyball at Hale appears to be on a solid footing.

Thank you also to the parents, referees and supporters, including Mr Meade, Mr Young and Mr Barron, for their unwavering encouragement of our teams.

Lastly, and most importantly, thank you to all the volleyball boys for your passion, your enjoyment and your commitment to this wonderful sport. It is a pleasure being on this volleyball journey with you and we - vour coaches - are looking forward to seeing where the future takes us.

The grounds always come alive for the winter season as each patch of grass becomes home to a Hale team for next six months. We are in a most fortunate position where boys and staff can roll out of class and onto the ovals without having to be transported to grounds off-site.

2015 was the first year badminton was formally offered to boys in Years 7, 8 and 9. Around 30 boys exercised this option and were able to enjoy competition matches against Scotch College who had a similar number of teams. It is hoped that boys will continue with their badminton and feed into the senior teams. Once again, the expertise of Kay Terry proved to be most beneficial to our senior teams as her knowledge and passion for the sport of badminton ensured all boys were afforded the opportunity to develop and enjoy training and matches.

The cross country team had one of its best seasons on record. Whilst the overall placing of 3rd has been achieved on numerous occasions, there were a few 'firsts', none more so than the seniors finishing in 2nd position in the All Schools' three-man x 5km relay and then again the following week in the 'Ray Brown' 8km race at King's Park. All season, the

team was superbly led by the Year 12 boys and a number of senior runners. Their leadership extended from the running track to training sessions and beyond which ensured that the culture of cross country running at Hale remains healthy and boys enjoy the same profile of the other winter codes.

Hale football is as strong as it has ever been, both in culture and results. The 1st XVIII led the way this year and if not for a horror run of injuries early in the season would have held the Alcock Cup for another season. Interestingly, 35 players from Years 10 to 12 were used through the 1st XVIII this year highlighting the depth and opportunities for all boys. As is always the case, there were boys who started in the 2nds, or in the 10As, who finished in the 1st XVIII on the strength of their performances once they received their opportunity. The skill and speed of the 1st XVIII brand has filtered down to the younger year groups, as has the desire to win each contest - something that will serve the School well in future years.

2015 was always going to be an interesting test for Hale School hockey as some very talented players had left the system the previous year. A win for the 1st XI in the first round against eventual

winners, Scotch College, ensured that Hale were still a force to be reckoned with and would always be a most respected opponent, particularly on their home turf. This year saw all PSA schools, with the exception of Guildford Grammar School, play their 1st and 2nd teams on turf and eliminating the 'dreaded grass games' where upsets were a common occurrence. The link between the school and the hockey club is strengthening, particularly through Kane Greenaway who doubles as 1st XI coach and President of Hale Hockey Club.

Soccer continues to be one of the most populated sports at Hale, fielding the equivalent, if not more teams than schools with compulsory sport policies. The 1st XI finished 5th overall in the Lawe Davies Cup only one point behind 4th place. There exists a clear gap between the top three schools in the 1st XI competition and the bottom four schools yet upsets are still common, such is the nature of the sport. Darren Young has finished his tenure with Hale soccer where he has coached the 1st XI and 9As for five seasons, as well as providing coaching staff with an invaluable resource at trainings. Darren has been formally acknowledged and

will be missed by the Hale soccer community.

For the 13th year in a row, the Brother Redmond Cup will reside in the Hale trophy cabinet. The 1st XV did it the hard way as they lost two games and had to beat Wesley with a bonus point in the final game. A 20 minute blitz in the first half saw the bonus point secured but Scotch, also needing a bonus point win, did enough in their game against Trinity to share the Brother Redmond Cup with Hale. All teams enjoyed characteristically successful seasons as far as results are concerned yet of all the trophies and success on the pitch, the one we are most proud of is the Spirit of Rugby award which was awarded to the Year 9 rugby team for the spirit and sportsmanship they displayed in the Gold Coast Rugby Carnival which included more than 60 teams. That, is Hale rugby.

I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge all support staff involved in the winter sport season, whether it be flipping burgers, running the touchline, selling raffle tickets, driving the taxi, taking photos, screaming embarrassingly or just 'being there', I know the boys appreciate it.

We were fortunate to pick up some new faces this year who were to form much of the spine of the team: Lachie Tweedie, Harrison Stammers, Conor Fowler (a mid-season football injury), Jacob Augustson, Mitchell Pratt and Angus Gregg each realised that their finite frames and good power-to-weight ratios were more suited to the cross country track than any variation of a football field, so into the fold they came. There were some Juniors. like Year 9 captain Benedict Wilson and young gun Zac Sanderson, doubling up from their Friday fixture to run alongside the Seniors as usual, but it was the improvements made by long term members Jordi Hermoso, Will Lawrence, Nick Cameron, Tim Ryall and Isaac Silbert that really added some bite to the team. The Year 12s led by example throughout the year, being prolific attenders at training and always putting in a 100% effort.

Reflecting on the season there are a plethora of positives. In the Senior competition, Hale School finished 3rd overall, an awesome achievement

that matches our best ever result. After our first win of the season at home against Scotch College, we came up against Aquinas on their home ground, which dealt us a solid reality check. This setback was quickly tucked into the memory banks as we purposefully despatched Christ Church Grammar School, Guildford Grammar and Wesley College in close races, with captain Jake Mason winning the fixture at Guildford. Now we were targeting an unprecedented - for Hale - five wins in the home and away fixtures. Final opponent Trinity College's results throughout the year showed that the two teams would be very closely matched and so it proved on the day. At the Manning Rd fields, we suffered an agonisingly tight loss by 12 points, but easily gained 3 bonus points for our efforts, and we were marginally in 2nd position on the ladder at the halfway point of the season - another first for our team.

Working through the six All Schools events, which are like a mini-Inters each week during the second half of the season. we finished 3rd consecutively at Aquinas College, Trinity, Guildford and Wesley, each time right on the tail of Trinity. In fact, at the Trinity 3km

relays, our A team was first across the line, and we tied for 2nd place on raw scores, only being bumped to 3rd place on a countback of the final scoring teams. Hale cross country, however, was coming home with a wet sail and we finally placed 2nd to Aquinas and ahead of Trinity in the 3x5km relay on our home course.

But it was the final Ray Brown 8km race in Kings Park that really showed what the team had been working towards over the whole season. The Hale cross country team produced its best ever All Schools results as we finished a close 2nd to the champions Aquinas College on the day. Tom Renshaw, Jake Mason, and Mitchell Pratt fought it out amongst the elite squad of the top 10, with Zac 'Sando' Sanderson, Isaac Silbert, Lachie Tweedie and Harrison Stammers all meritoriously home within the first 19 places. For Hale School to have seven runners in the top 20 of a PSA All Schools race, and to have our entire team finished within the top 100 (of over 220 finishers), are truly remarkable physical achievements of which everyone should feel very proud.

Above all though, it is the camaraderie and many laughs of the training sessions

that both encapsulate and symbolise the 2015 season. Every boy should be delighted with their efforts in contributing to such an enjoyable, memorable season.

We did not approach the season with a premeditated game plan; we left it to the boys during pre-season and on the camp to show us

what they had. We were then charged with getting the best out of them with the attributes they possessed.

As coaches, we believed that we could not just tell the boys to do things, they needed to want to do them and expect that all of their teammates would do them as well and, more to the point, realise that if they did not they would get left behind. We were able to demand better efforts of the boys and as the season went on the boys were able to demand more from each other.

There were so many standout examples of boys who improved as the year progressed and by improve I mean they decided to buy in and as a result of this became an important part of the team. We played more boys this year than we ever had before, meaning plenty of boys got a go, and plenty of boys got a crack at cementing a spot in the side.

I hope the boys enjoyed their year. They went from a bunch of lads who at the camp wanted to be successful to a team of boys who demanded success personally and from each other. Because of that,

they should be incredibly proud of their achievement

My experience in coaching has taught me that the most talented team in the PSA is not always going to win the Alcock Cup. This is why I stress a 'TEAM before self' philosophy. I am sure the boys got sick of me saying it, they 'took the mickey' out of me often, I know; however, in my experience without it we cannot have success.

Selection of the captain and leaders of a side is often a popularity competition, and players often vote accordingly. Ryan Donaldson not only accepted the job but led, like all captains should, by showing leadership by example. Good captains come in all shapes and sizes, and I think Ryan's leadership this year was fantastic, through action - such as in the first game versus Guildford - to making sure the boys were doing the right thing all the time.

Like all good teams, ours was not just led by one person, but also the able group of Year 12s who embraced those younger as equals. Not having a barrier between age groups is a must for 1st XVIII success and this

year the boys blended well. It is not always easy to embrace "everyone, all the time" but this group of boys did so, and I believe it is because of this attitude that we had a successful year.

We may have not have been an Alcock Cup winning team, but I believe when fully wound up we were the best team our thrashing of Guildford in the second round showed that.

To the Year 12s, I am not sure where football will take you from here, but I hope when you meet up in years to come, like I did with my school mates yesterday, you will look back fondly on your final year of Hale football

This year was the most even group of boys we have had since I became involved in the PSA and so congratulations to Jimmy Miller on winning a well-deserved Charles Veryard award for best player.
