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HEADMASTER



It is true that in schools you do get wonderful and sometimes creative responses as to why a boy might be absent from school. Here is an example relating to a boy who has been participating in the wonderfully successful Hale@home programme. This is an email that was sent to Mr Mike Valentine and Mr Heath McCabe.

Hi Mike and Heath,

Please accept Ryan's apologies for this afternoon. I need to use his stockman skills on the motorbike to get some lambs in this afternoon. I know that's a pretty average excuse, but we have an opportunity to sell some ewe lambs to Russia so I need to get them into the yards tonight in the cool ready for tomorrow morning. So I'll make sure he counts all the legs and divides by 4, and checks out where Russia is on the map and why on earth they want Dorper lambs from Mingenew??

In Yuval Noah Harari's book *Homo Deus* – *A Brief History of Tomorrow*, he makes the extraordinary claim that for the first time in history more people die from eating too much than from eating too little. More people die from old age than from infectious diseases and more people commit suicide than are killed by soldiers, terrorists and criminals combined. For all of human history, in one way or another, human's main concern on a daily basis was avoiding plagues, famines and wars. It is Yuval's contention that now humans have managed to control famine, plagues and wars, and while these continue within our world, the vast majority of people no longer worry about these three things. For example, there are no longer natural famines in the world, there are now only political famines. So, today, this is an achievement we can all be very pleased about. It's an extraordinary world achievement – congratulations to us all!

But we know that the most common reaction of the human mind to achievement is not satisfaction but a desire for more. An excellent examination result or being appointed a School Prefect bring moments of joy and satisfaction but it is human nature to be soon looking for something else. It's how we have ensured our survival as a species.

So, if we really have solved the three big issues that have faced humankind forever, what then will the human race seek to achieve now? Will we be content to tinker around the edges to further eradicate the last remnants of war, famine and plague? I am sure we will, but as a human race there needs to be a new challenge.

Yuval suggests that there are two new challenges that we humans will default towards; first being that we will now seriously take on the task of struggling against old age and perhaps even death itself. It's a logical extension of the fight against famine and disease. For those of us a little older, I would imagine we are all probably open to anything that will allow us to live a little longer and feel a little younger. The second, he suggests, will be related to finding the key to being happy. We are already very interested as a society in being happy. Our western society has successfully marketed the idea that we need to feel happy more often than we do. We need only read a magazine or newspaper to know that the wellbeing industry is booming.

When you don't need to worry about where your next meal comes from or if someone is going to kill you, then it's easy to start to think more inwardly. It's human nature. Yuval and many others know our brains are wired this way. Therein lies the problem: if we don't need to worry so much then our brains will default to worrying about ourselves – living longer and stronger; being happier – thinking inwardly not outwardly.

The result of this default thinking is, it seems to me, already evident. AN Wilson who wrote, *The Book of the People*, says, "Materialism – the most boring as well as least accurate way of experiencing the world and recording experience – is the dominant mindset of the Western world."

Now that all sounds pretty bleak, but the truth is that I find the reality of working in schools different to what the literature suggests. I look at young people and I just don't see it. I don't see the inwardlooking nature that Yuval talks about. I see young men who increasingly want to look outwards and experience what is around them. I see young men who are often gripped by the social issues of the day and want to make a difference to the world around them.

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You need only look at what students these days do in terms of service learning. So many schools have enormous Service Learning programmes, far bigger than when I was at school. Well that's not inward-looking then, is it?

Having said all of that, the issue of happiness (and wellbeing) is real. Maybe Hale will introduce further programmes around wellbeing. I know there are few schools that could not say they don't need it. But the irony for me is that in the haste to adopt a programme or build a new building to support wellbeing and happiness, we are at risk of forgetting about the richness of the programmes we already have. Placing energy into the programmes that we have and evolving what we do using the best research and innovative ideas can be equal if not better than inserting yet another theme over the top.

Let me describe three traditional programmes to you as examples of how they make a profound contribution to the happiness and wellbeing of our boys. First is sport and the example of cricket. Now I have never been a cricketer but I love the game and what it represents. It's educative on so many levels. Some would say - and they have - that the greatest classroom at Hale is out there on Craig Oval. The time sitting around waiting to bat, the role modelling, the endless discussion about anything seems to me to be important. The tactics, the mental gymnastics required for a young man to realise this may be more important for his batting success than any practice session. The anxiety felt when you have a larger than usual Scotch boy coming at you with a 120-kilometre-an-hour ball is real. These are important experiences for a young man to endure.

A good friend of mine still has his personal email address as 'take the single' because in his mind this strategy, while useful in cricket, is essential in life. Waiting for the right moment in life to go for the six is really counterproductive. Take every

opportunity in life and go for the single, and in the end, you will end the game with a higher score in life. Please don't ask me how this analogy works for 20/20 cricket!

Second is Outdoor Education, which is another immersive experience that teaches resilience and independence. I met in house groups every Year 12 boy as they departed this year and I asked them what they thought about Hale's Outdoor Education programme and in particular Exmouth. Most said it was not something they would choose to do if left to make the decision, but the majority said that upon reflection they could all see it had been an amazing and educative experience. When I speak to Old Boys it's often stated even more strongly, irrespective of whether they talk about Exmouth or Wittenoom. With Outdoor Education, you have to wait sometimes weeks, sometimes months and for some years before you look back on the difficult experience and realise what has been gained. In a world where instant gratification is often king, Outdoor Education shows that waiting often leads to learning that changes the trajectory of a young man's life. As our Speech Day quest speaker, Mr Syd Kirkby, said to me recently, "In a modern world, lives are complex and shallow. In the wild, lives are simple but profound."

The third example is simply the classroom: working away at something that is really challenging. Learning how to learn. Setting a goal for what ATAR you want to achieve, or what apprenticeship you ideally want to gain requires determination and hard work. Indeed. Carol Dweck (the famous researcher who has taught us so much about growth mindsets) said, "Talent does not make you smarter, it's grit that matters." The willingness to work hard though does not just appear, you have to have confidence in your teacher. Having respect for the teacher means that the learning within the classroom is a fully human relational experience. There is no time for inward looking in the modern-day classroom.

So here are just three very traditional programmes, and of course there are many more, that if Hale continues to enhance using the best research and methods then I believe we can develop fine young men who face outward and not inward as Yuval suggests. These and other programmes are excellent narratives with which to think through a range of human experiences: joy, disbelief, disappointment, fear, envy and even greed. They provide forms of expression to shed light not only on our own lives but on the lives beyond our own.



This has been another very pleasing year where the vast majority of these boys continued to excel in so many areas. That Hale continues to be recognised for its successes by so many within our society is pleasing, but not as important as what is learned by your sons in the process of achieving that success.

Our sporting triumphs (football, athletics and a shared win in the basketball), dramatic performances (such as The Book of Everything and Cloudbusting) and outstanding musical spectaculars (this year was the Garland Music Festival's 40th anniversary) are but a small part of the visible signs of what our boys and staff achieve together. What is behind every programme in the School are dedicated staff who care about the boy, his wellbeing and the development of his character.

I have said it before and I say it again, the relationships that exist within this school are foundational in ensuring transformation education occurs. That our academic results continue to be as strong as they are and that we celebrate more than one pathway beyond Year 12 is something that I know we are all proud of at Hale. The appointment of a Head of Careers, Mr Stephen Kernutt, will add to the wonderful collective work done by so many. It will almost certainly shine an even brighter light on the possible pathways for our boys throughout and beyond the secondary school years. The Careers Centre will be located adjacent to the Dining Hall and will become a physical base for the important task of guiding boys into the best pathway for them and their skills. Indeed, we understand that when it comes to education, one size does not fit all.



The Institute of Innovation and Research, under the leadership of Mr Toby Trewin, completes its first year and in that short time has made progress with a number of excellent projects. We were a recipient of *The Educator* Innovative Schools Award

for 2017, which was all about recognising schools that are leading the way in best preparing students for other support groups and volunteers give so generously of their time so that this school is even stronger than it already is.

I acknowledge and thank the Board of Governors for their efforts for the School. For many, their work is often invisible and yet their wisdom and ability to guide this school are rather profound. To departing board members Mr Jon Birman and Mr Andrew Howe, thank you for what you have done for Hale School. To Jon Birman (Chairman of the Board of Governors) specifically, I am grateful to you, in this my first year as Headmaster, for your support and encouragement.

Of the 191 Year 12 students at Hale in 2017, 175 or 91.6% received an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR). Fourteen students were involved in the CareerLink programme. Two students were on alternative pathways.

given consid in the space that were als opportunities commenced the rebuild of the Junior School. After a number of years of planning, we returned in January to find temporary fencing and a very visible blue barrier dividing the Junior School in two. The Junior Primary (Years 1 to 3) was located on the northern side in a temporary demountable village and the rest of the Junior School was

rest of the Junior School was still operating in the original buildings. This presented numerous challenges to the staff; however, for the boys, it was more a matter of walking extra steps to get to play areas and specialist rooms. Instead of walking, many decided it was a great opportunity to run evidence of the enthusiasm the boys bring to the Junior School. Despite the logistics, to everyone's credit, we quickly adapted and it was business as usual as we had another terrific year of teaching and learning, achievement and participation.

One of the exciting additions that was ready for the boys' return in January was the nature play space. A large portion of the fence had been moved back into the existing bushland to create a play area where the boys could climb, create and explore.

Cubbies, trench systems, collections and bases were features for all boys from Years 1 to 6. The boys collaborated, negotiated, resolved issues and enjoyed themselves at recess and lunch as the nature play space became a favourite for many.

This also provided some great learning opportunities as Mr Simpson (Deputy Head of Junior School) contextualised some Personal and Social Development lessons in the space. As the boys were given considerable freedom in the space, issues did arise that were also great learning opportunities. Being one never to miss an opportunity, Mr Simpson presented some lessons to selected cohorts in the nature area.

A key feature of the design of the new learning centres is flexible spaces that can enhance collaboration. Typical of the Junior School team, the enthusiasm for this vision was not going to be deferred until they moved into the new buildings. The Year 4 teachers, Mr Edwards and Mrs Hinchley, opened the partition dividing their existing rooms in May, never to close them again. What started out as a small trial quickly became a part of everyday practice. For the majority of the day, Mr Edwards and Mrs Hinchley would combine to team-teach, facilitate learning experiences, deliver instructions and assist the boys. It was not uncommon to also see the Head of Junior School Curriculum, Mrs Wallis, and the Learning Hub Coordinator, Mrs Hallett, in the room expanding the team-teaching concept further. Bouncing off each other, the room was dynamic and energising. The subsequent professional discussions were reflective and professional with a constant focus on improvement.

Another initiative we explored this year was focused on preparing the boys for learning through singing and physical activity. Sing to Learn has been presented by Mrs Scott to Years 1 to 4 for some time; however, this year, we added what became known as 'Jump Start'. After 15 minutes of highintensity physical activity the boys returned to their classroom and, after a quick drink, did a 15-minute Sing to Learn session with Mrs Scott. The songs had repetition and actions that stimulated thinking and decisionmaking. Following these activities, the boys launched into their reading lesson. Mr Lane (Year 3 Teacher) even took it one step further and sang the instructions for the lesson to his boys.

Anecdotal evidence from the teachers and boys suggests that following Jump Start and Sing to Learn, the boys quickly settled and were attentive and tuned in for their lessons. In 2018 we will be looking to expand this preparation time to other grades.

With the technologies curriculum being implemented in 2018, the Junior School team familiarised itself with the skills and content through online training and trialled a number of activities. The technology day in Term 3 was very successful for a number of reasons. The variety of learning experiences for the boys included construction where the boys tested and refined their designs, coding, cooking, using natural materials for visual art, and experimenting with the virtual reality set. Our focus for the day was to design highly engaging activities; however, when reflecting on the day, it became apparent that by focusing on connection, we also covered many areas of the curriculum. This, combined with the teachers' deep understanding of the existing curriculum, gave us confidence to continue to explore the integration of technologies into other subjects. This confidence to take risks comes as a result of an environment where there is faith in the ability of the team and the trust that learning is at the fore of everyone's aspirations, for ourselves and the boys we teach.

2018 will see us continue this journey as we transition into learning spaces that promote flexibility, collaboration and collegiality. As a teaching team, we have been excited by the possibilities for some time now. Where possible, we have trialled ideas and are very much looking forward to implementing these in purposebuilt learning spaces. This is just the beginning; what really excites us is where we will go from here, particularly the opportunities and ideas we are yet to consider, plan for, and experience.
















LEARNING HUB

Throughout 2017 our Learning Hub has continued to be the home of promoting the core competencies necessary for 21st century learning. The teaching and learning experiences in the Hub have focused on the essential skills at the heart of learning to support future-ready students. These skills include collaboration, communication, creativity and critical thinking. Beyond a physical space, the Hub has seen boys begin to develop a mindset that enables them to confidently and positively grapple with ideas, consider the views of others, challenge thinking and come to reasonable judgements.

We frequently used 'Thinking Circles' with established and understood communicative and dialogic tools to engage in exploratory talk and internalise the language patterns required to participate in rigorous conversations. By providing learning experiences to contribute to classroom dialogue, the boys were provoked to establish everyday, common-sense perspectives on a variety of topics, engaged with their developing ideas and helped to overcome misunderstandings. Thinking Circles saw boys not only explore the limits of their own understanding but also practise new ways of using language as a tool for constructing knowledge.

Digital technologies were frequently embedded across all year levels in Hub lessons. Learning with Bee-Bots, Osmos, Spheros, Virtual Reality Lab and gaming apps such as Hopscotch were all the new, engaging digital resources, which allowed exploration learning and guided play. The boys thoroughly enjoyed opportunities to experience, respond and problem solve when digital challenges were presented.

Learning in the Hub has focused all efforts on ensuring boys are equipped, engaged and empowered for the demands of tomorrow and beyond. Ensuring students are future ready and have the skills needed to succeed have been the priority of all teaching and learning.







Character is like a tree and reputation like its shadow.

– Abraham Lincoln

Throughout history many people have spoken at length about the importance of having positive character traits. A simple search on the topic presents numerous books, quotes and endless lists of character traits. But, when we say someone has 'good character' what do we really mean? This question is one that resonates with me as I reflect on another successful year in the Middle School.

While this report will act as a permanent record of our past 12 months in terms of our academic, pastoral and co-curricular achievements, to my mind the greatest discussions I have had this year have centred around the topic of character. As such, it is my greatest desire that these discussions will last longer in the boys' memories than any other lesson taught this year.

Over the course of this year, we have reminded the boys that good character is not hereditary. Moreover, it isn't determined by a single grand act. Character is established by a continuous and explicit commitment to a set of values. In other words, character is ethics in action. When this occurs, people of good character are guided by principles that allow them to do the right thing even when it comes at a cost.

A person's character is who they really are. Abraham Lincoln once said,

"Character is like a tree and reputation like its shadow. The shadow is what we think of it; the tree is the real thing." In the Middle School, we call our reputation 'our brand' and I have often wondered if the numerous discussions around this topic have resonated with the students. Thankfully, I think this question was answered just recently. A young man had made a bad decision and he sat in my office. I asked him, "What do you think I mean when I talk to you about your brand?" He answered, "It's how I see myself and how others see me!" While our discussion continued as we reflected on his recent decisions. I knew in my heart that he would be fine.

Maybe the British writer and politician Thomas Macauly (1800-1859) explained it best when he said, *"The measure of a man's character is what he would do if he knew he never would be found out."* While Hale School has a clear understanding of its duty to it's students as an academic institution, I think we have always been focused on loftier goals.

In the Middle School this year I have been astounded by the quality of the young men who have graced our corridors. Young men of good character who have acted morally and ethically. Young men who have sought to take the moral high road. Young men who have been able to recognise when they have done something wrong and have displayed the courage to do what is necessary to get back on track.

With these thoughts in mind, I hope that you enjoy reading the following highlights, presented to you as a snapshot of life in the Middle School in 2017.

ACADEMIC

This year, we amalgamated two existing subjects, Information Technology and Digital Technology, and launched the iC curriculum in Year 7. After an extensive period of planning, a team of teachers developed an initial unit of work that focused on Digital Heroes. The boys were required to work through a detailed Inquiry Process Model as they identified the characteristics of individuals and/or organisations from around the globe that have leveraged technology to enhance the lives of others. The second semester of work was constructed around the Design for Change (DFC) model. DFC is a global movement that cultivates the 'I can' mindset in every child. This approach works towards developing the much-required 21st century skills. The framework equips students with the tools to be more aware and informed of the world around them. believe and realise the importance of their role in shaping that world, and take action towards building a more

desirable present thus leading to a more sustainable future. DFC operates in 30 countries around the world; to the best of our knowledge Hale Middle School was the first school in Australia involved in this programme.

After a six-month research process and spurred on with a desire to create teaching and learning spaces that could enhance learning outcomes for students and teachers, this year the Middle School sought funding to redevelop two of it's classrooms. In doing so, we hoped to answer the following questions: "To what extent does altering the physical space improve student attention, engagement and learning outcomes?" and "Can micro-cameras be used to promote greater selfrefection and improved practice within our teaching team?" With the generous support of the Parents' and Friends' Association, a team of teachers set about the task of researching and securing furniture to achieve these lofty goals. The result is a classroom that is not only more dynamic and flexible, but a space that helps students to develop skills for life and work beyond the classroom. Self-directed learning and collaborative problem-solving are essential skills for success and it is our belief that a more contemporary classroom design further enhances the development of these skills. Furthermore, by addressing the mobility and style of furniture within the classroom we have increased levels of student and teacher interaction through formal and informal means. Lastly, we also have addressed the notion of comfortable classrooms (in a physical sense) and the reality that comfortable and functional spaces promote a sense of well-being, keep minds focused and limit distractions. While these are still early days and we are yet to gather guantitative data on the benefits of the new classroom, the qualitative data is already very positive. The second space, called the Learning Lab, for the most part will be used by staff to review and reflect on their teaching practice. With the support of the Director of Innovation and Research and the Director of Staff Development, we have begun developing a model that will allow staff to film their lessons and then use the space and associated technology to review their teaching.

 Liveability is becoming more and more important to local authorities. With the economic downturn it is critical that local authorities optimally play the hand they have been dealt. This year, the Year 7 Geography students went to Subiaco to study first-hand how the city is going about rejuvenating its 'heart and soul'. The boys were engaged throughout the day and enjoyed learning about how places are designed to be as liveable as possible. Each boy paired up with a friend and

together they had to evaluate how liveable Subiaco is from the viewpoint of an assigned demographic, for example a primary school student, a young worker or an empty nester. The boys also had a map challenge they needed to complete as part of the fieldwork. Hopefully there have been a couple of seeds sown that will see some of our boys become urban planners, landscapers, designers and architects in the future.

It's not unusual for Hale students to be acknowledged for their academic prowess and achievements. Each year we ask our boys to test their metal in a number of external competitions. This year they have been even more successful than usual. The following summarises some of these awards.

Each year Hale students compete in the Australian History Competition and we regularly achieve outstanding results. The competition is an annual event produced by the History Teachers' Association of Australia with schools representing every state participating. This year we have once again achieved outstanding results with four students out of the 15 who competed achieving a High Distinction grade and five students achieving a Distinction. A special mention must be made of Song Chen who was the State Champion with a score of 96 percent. Another statistic that further highlights the achievements of the participants is that the Hale School mean was 82 percent while the national mean was 63 percent.

International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS) is a suite of six competitions designed specifically for primary and secondary students. ICAS testing is conducted annually in Australia and in over 20 countries in Asia, Africa, Europe, Pacific countries and America. Managed by a not-for-profit branch of the University of New South Wales, this year over one million students participated in the competitions, with approximately 520 medals awarded. The following Middle School students scooped five of these medals: Song Chen (English Medal), Tom Quick (Science Medal), Jonathan Chen (English Medal and a Writing Medal) and Oliver Cheng (Writing Medal).

The WA Junior Mathematics Olympiad attracts 450 of the State's best Year 9 (or younger) mathematicians. It is considered by many as the State's most prestigious Mathematics competition. Congratulations are extended to: Jonathan Chen (equal first place with a perfect score and Most Outstanding Year 8 student), Laurence Wilson (Prize), Oliver Cheng (Prize). We also won the Most Outstanding Year 8 Team Prize – Fraser Bytheway, Jonathan Chen, Oliver Cheng and Laurence Wilson.

The Australian Mathematics

Competition (AMC) was introduced in Australia in 1978 as the first Australiawide mathematics competition for students. It has since spread internationally with students in more than 30 countries participating annually. This year **Oliver Cheng** (Year 8) and **Luke Phillips** (Year 7) both received prizes. Amongst the Middle School participants, we also achieved an additional 13 High Distinctions.

CO-CURRICULAR

- In early December, approximately 17 Middle School students were given the opportunity to participate in the HASSE Junior Space School Study Programme, which is supported by NASA. The Houston-based, twoweek programme is truly unique. It aims to bridge the gap between industry and education by inspiring and empowering talented students who have a true passion for STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). It is constructed around four domains: Activities (includes Hobbies/Skill). Volunteering, Physical Activity and Exploration. As such, it provides a framework for young people to learn valuable skills, assist others in the community and experience some adventures. - works to provide valuable funding resources to an alliance of grassroots non-profit organisations in Cambodia. PASTORAL CARE

- On the final day of Term 2 the Middle School held its Wellness Festival (formerly Wellness Symposium). This is a whole-day experience, managed by Ms Julianne Nissen, which provided the boys with as many experiences as possible that focus specifically on their personal well-being. The day incorporated keynote speakers, workshops and activities that all focused on developing resilience, positive relationships and growth mindsets. For the first time we also offered a parent workshop by Jason van Schie (People Diagnostix). His presentation was on the importance of building skills in our boys around the positive psychology domains of relationships, engagement, health, purpose and emotions.
- The Year 7 Swan Valley retreats
 were run in Term 4 and the feedback

from staff and students has been extremely positive. The relocation from New Norcia to the Swan Valley provided the Middle School with the opportunity to reflect on the purpose of the programme and realign some of the activities. The result was a more diverse, engaging and purposeful retreat. The goal of the Year 7 Retreat is to provide an integrated learning experience that enables the boys the place and space to stop and reflect upon some of life's bigger questions. In doing so, we ask them to not only be self-reflective but self-aware. Physical challenges are also an exciting and integral element of the retreat. Facing the high ropes course (12 metres off the ground) certainly pushed many of the boys outside of their comfort zones. However, with support from peers and some impressive self-talk, all the boys came away with a well-deserved sense of accomplishment and pride. On the other end of the spectrum, boys were asked to spend time in reflection on some of life's bigger questions such as, "What is needed to live a purposeful life?" and "Why are you here?" Woven throughout the retreat was also a subtle but distinct theme of personal vulnerability. By asking the boys to share their dreams, their uncertainties and then reflect on and discuss their place in the world, we constructed an environment where the boys had to share their inner thoughts with their peers.

The Year 8 Retreat, which was held on Monday 27 November, marked the end of a significant journey for the Middle School boys. It also heralded a new and exciting transition into the Senior School. The retreat provided the boys the opportunity to not only stop and reflect on their time in the Middle School, but also just as importantly to plan for the journey ahead. The day had a combination of rituals, celebrations and activities to facilitate these objectives. Most notable was the presence of the Assistant Heads of Houses for the first time, who played a crucial role in the day's activities, with a specific focus on transitioning into the Senior School.

Middle School Sport

The 2018 Middle School sports programme was characterised by mass participation in sports both at a PSA and House sport level. Our new Year 7 cohort proved to be a talented group of athletes while our Year 8 students showed a level of improvement over the year that reflected well on their attitude towards training.

One of the first events of the year was the traditional Trogs swim at City Beach. With over 50 Middle School boys participating, competition was fierce. George Stewart took out the Under 14 event while Nathan Hunt and Joshua Hantke shared the honours in the Under 13 race.

The PSA Interschool Swimming Carnival followed quickly with 40 Middle School boys being selected in the squad, which finished an agonising one point short of Christ Church Grammar School. There were too many outstanding performances to list in this report but the close loss should provide motivation to our boys for many years to come.

While the swimming season was playing out, the summer versions of PSA and House sport were well underway. The beauty of the Hale House sport programme is the ability for students across Years 7 to 9 to come together under the guidance of senior students to play against other houses. The result is a competitive environment where boys try and triumph over their peers in other houses. It also allows boys to try different sports over the first semester. A full description of 2017 House sport can be found on page 125.

The summer PSA season saw boys participate in one of six sports (basketball, cricket, rowing, tennis, volleyball and water polo) across Term 1 and Term 4. What was particularly noticeable was the improvement of results from Term 1 to Term 4 as well as the enthusiasm of our boys to support their peers in other teams. Both Year 7 and Year 8 boys played an important role in Hale winning the Faulkner Sharpe trophy in Term 1, which is played between Scotch College and Hale School with every fixture from Year 7 to Year 12 counting towards the total. It was our strength in depth in the Middle School that helped Hale gain back the trophy, which Scotch won in 2016.

The end of Term 1 marked the transition to winter sport both at a house and PSA level. The winter codes (football, hockey, rugby, soccer, cross country and badminton) bring out the best in school spirit and 2017 was no different as boys threw themselves into all matches. Across the board the Year 7s again stood out as a very talented group and the challenge going forward will be to maintain the standard they set as they progress through Hale.

After 14 gruelling weeks of winter sport, attention then turned to athletics, which, like swimming, brings together students from Years 7 to 12 in the one team. Despite the short season, it turned out to be a highlight of 2017 with Hale breaking a long drought to claim the PSA Inters title. Alex Perin was awarded the champion athlete in the U13 age group while Walter James Seymore took out the U14 award with both breaking PSA records in the process. The significant contribution of the Middle School towards our championships augurs well for repeated success and the depth in participation again proved to be a point of difference between us and our competitors.

Congratulations should also go to Mitchell Barron who took out the award for the Best All Round Middle School sportsman for 2017. Mitchell competed at a high level for Hale across four sports (football, cricket, athletics and swimming).

It was a pleasure to watch our Middle School students compete on the sporting fields in 2017 and I look forward to watching them continue to enjoy their involvement in years to come.

Lachlan Ranson CAPTAIN OF SCHOOL SPEECH DAY

ADDRESS

As many of you may know, I come under the stereotype of what many people in school regard as a 'drama kid'. I have done drama and loved acting for as long as I can remember and hope to pursue a career in the acting industry. However, the industry is guite a brutal one and it's not every day that you sink a role of the likes of Superman or the Joker or some hotshot in Home and Away. This is the case for many amateur actors and definitely the case for my first ever production. In my first ever production, I was asked to be a tree.

At first, I was guite disheartened but at the same time adamant that I wouldn't let down the director. However, my disappointment in the non-speaking, nonmoving, 'easily replaceable by a piece of cardboard' role was seemingly obvious to an older actor, one of the leads. Having just come off stage a little frustrated at my debut role, he pulled me aside and let me in on a very wise piece of advice. It doesn't matter what role you get, as long as you play that role as best you possibly can, and that way people will know who you are and they will know you are good at, and love, what you do.

This is my last address to you as Captain of School. Whether or not that's a good thing or a bad thing, I will leave up to you to decide. It took me a great deal of time to think about what I was going to talk about today as there is so much to say, so little time and so many people who have already fallen asleep. For those who are still awake, which, will hopefully be the same number of people awake at the end of my speech, I ask you:

What do you want to be when you grow up? When you're older? Maybe in a couple of years? What do you want to be?

For some it might be a simple question with a simple answer. Like my mate David Sciarrone who, in Year 6 when he was posed this question, answered indignantly, "I wouldn't mind being a helicopter". Not a pilot. The actual helicopter. You can ask him personally how he's going with that goal...

For other people, however, the question seems to stimulate further questions rather than answers. Is it *who* I want to be? Or *what* I want to be? Is it in terms of my career or who I want to be as a person? How other people see me, or is it how I see myself?

You might want to be successful and wealthy – in terms of both money and happiness. You might want to be that funny guy that people always look for at parties. You might want to be that good bloke who lives down the road, the same one who everybody can talk to. You might aim for just getting by. You might just aim to be you. To be someone.

Yes, I am only 18 years old. Yes, for 12 years of my life I have religiously kept to the same routine of going to school day after day. Yes, in terms of life experience, compared to some other people in this hall with us now. let's just say that I have a lot more room to learn. But I'm not trying to give you lifechanging advice; I'm not asking for you to find the meaning of the existence of the human race; merely to find and feed the passion that makes you get out of bed in the morning.

For the younger lads in the room, you, like many other people, including various current Year 12s, have absolutely no idea of what you want to be or do once you graduate. Many of you, just like my sister, intend to keep living with your parents until you're 35!The good news is, a well-accomplished comedian, actor and singer named Tim Minchin believes that you don't have to have a dream; that sometimes, if you focus too hard on what's too far ahead of you, then you'll lose sight of the little shiny things that edge into the side of your periphery. And sometimes, the goals that you set for yourself are so high that by the time you are staring into the abyss of what you thought was your big dream, you'll almost be ready to kick the bucket, so it won't matter anyway.

If you don't know who you want to be in the long run, be who you want to be right now. There is absolutely no rush to reach an end point. Most in this room will live beyond 100 years, so enjoy the journey. Some people focus too hard on what is in front of them that they do not appreciate what is in the moment. Enjoy being present in what you do.

And for those who have known exactly what they want to be since the age of six, fantastic! Aim for the furthest moon – even if you fail, you will land among the stars. (I promised I would throw in a cliché somewhere!) Whatever you want to be, whoever you want to be, aspire to be the best that you can be. Just aspire! And aspire outrageously to feed the passion that dwells deep inside you as an individual. Aspire to be a racing car driver, an actor, the CFO of a prestigious mining company. Aspire to be a waiter, but be the best waiter that you can be. Aspire to be a father, a friend, a brother, a random that smiles in a busy street. Aspire to be the best you can be - and do not let anyone, including yourself, force you to settle for anything less, no matter in what walk of life you find yourself.

The 2017 school year began with the Art Department team consisting of Mr Nick Poole, Mr Chris McClelland, Mrs Amber Levien, Ms Pip Gordon and Mr Haydn Jackson. The aim for the 2017 academic year was to create a vibrant and engaging learning environment where enthusiasm, creativity and a committed work ethic would be the accepted norm for boys studying visual arts at Hale School.

With the school year quickly into full swing, the focus for all the Art teachers was to introduce the boys to their art projects, the selected artists of study and possible design development avenues they would pursue. With initial research and design work completed, the boys quickly developed the skills and processes to be used in their production work. As the projects progressed, it wasn't long before the creative ideas of the boys were resulting in the completion of resolved artworks that highlighted their creativity and art-making skills.

As the artworks by class groups were completed, rolling displays of the boys' work were held in the Forrest Library foyer and the Art Department foyer. These small displays provided the opportunity for the boys and the Art teaching team to view, critique and acknowledge the work produced. Ms Levien left on maternity leave at the end of Term 1 and was replaced by Mrs Narelle Pendlebury. The mid-year school holidays provided a welldeserved break for all the boys including the Year 12 Art students, who had been working with purpose from day one of the school year.

Semester 2 began with the boys displaying a renewed sense of urgency. All boys were now under significant pressure to complete as many artworks as possible to exhibit in the Student Art Exhibition.

The Year 12 art studio was a busy place in Semester 1 but it became a hive of activity in Semester 2. The Year 12-only work area provided a learning space where the all Year 12 Visual Arts students could discuss and receive feedback from the Art department teaching team at regular intervals as they worked to bring their artworks to resolution for the Student Art Exhibition and the WACE examination.

The opening night of the Student Art Exhibition early in Term 3 focussed on celebrating the achievements of the Year 12 Art students. The MAD Centre foyer was transformed into an exhibition space. The exhibition was opened by Art Committee Year 12 Scholarship recipient, Rhys Hemery, who used the opportunity to speak to the guests in attendance highlighting the benefits and enjoyment he gained from studying Art from the beginning of his time at Hale in the Junior School through to Year 12. He encouraged the younger boys in the audience to continue to select Art as a subject of study as they progressed through Hale School. Rhys thanked the Art department team on behalf of the Year 12 Art students for their commitment to the class of 2017. The exhibition was a success and a great affirmation of the Hale School community by having so many parents, relatives and friends of the boys from all year groups make the effort to support and acknowledge the work of all the Art students.

Late in the school year, the School received notification from the Art Gallery of Western Australia that Thomas Yu was successful in having his artwork selected for the prestigious Perspectives Exhibition. The selection of Thomas' artwork was a wonderful acknowledgement of creativity and art-making skills evident in his work.

The winner of the Art Committee 2018 Year 12 Art Scholarship was also announced late in the school year. The scholarship was awarded to Oliver Yensch. I held his withering gaze but didn't say a word. We'd had this argument time and time again. There was no point. He never listened to anything I had to say.

Beth got wound up as well, of course. 'Lucas! We do so much for you, and this is how you repay us? You won't even call me Mum!'

I sat there on the edge of my bed, massaging the stone in the palm of my hand. I stared into the distance. Once again I'd had the cold truth reaffirmed. My 'parents' certainly didn't love me. Any feelings they had for me were perverted by their bigoted ideals – they hated who I was. They hated my God. Why else would they have participated in such a sick, evil program?

Day after day they tell me adamantly that I am so lucky and that I'm so unappreciative. 'Look around you!' they press. 'You've got clothes on your back, a roof over your head. You'll never have to worry about going hungry and you'll have a quality education. That's unfathomably more than that witch could ever have given you!'

With new repertoire and new Year 9s joining in, it was an immersive day to start the year of music-making. 

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COCK HOUSE CUP

House sport remains one of the great points of difference at Hale School and the 2017 edition of the Cock House Cup will go down as one to remember with the day houses finally claiming success. By Riley finishing at the top of the ladder, it became the first day house to win the Cock House outright since Parry in 2004.

The day houses got off to their regular fast start with interhouse swimming, which took place on a magnificent March morning, seeing day houses fill the seven positions. Parry, led by Year 12 swimming sensation Ashton Brinkworth, took out the first silverware of 2017 with Havelock and Riley coming second and third and positioning themselves well.

The summer house sport season was something to behold. Being new to Hale School, to witness 1200 students participate across such a wide variety of sports in a three-hour window was magnificent. The relationships fostered between boys in different year groups was evident in every event and the healthy rivalry between houses meant that there was rarely a dull fixture contested. It was clear after a few afternoons that each house had its strengths and this was reflected with nine houses winning at least one of the 12 trophies on offer across the seven sports. At the end of the summer season, Riley was atop the Cock House ladder ahead of Haynes and Parry.

Summer house sport quickly turned into winter with Round 1 being the Wednesday before the Term 1 holidays. Despite the boarding houses sitting quite low on the progressive Cock House ladder, their time to shine was now with the winter team sports seeing a significant change in the boarders' fortunes. It was also great to see the willingness of our senior students to officiate the junior games, which was another example of boundaries being broken down across year groups. After five preliminary rounds, the finals were contested on a perfect afternoon late in Term

2. The boarders, true to the form guide, were the dominant houses in both football and touch rugby while Loton dominated the soccer and Buntine the hockey. Despite the boarders' fightback, Riley was still on top of the Cock House from Haynes and Parry with only two events left on the calendar: cross country and athletics. Wilson and Faulkner sat in sixth and seventh places respectively.

Just when we thought the Cock House might be a foregone conclusion, interhouse cross country added another layer of drama. The event again took place in superb conditions with over 1000 students tackling the challenging three-kilometre course. The final results saw the two boarding houses take out the top two spots with Wilson House claiming the Challenge Cup for the **Overall Champion Cross** Country House. Cock House frontrunner Riley finished in ninth spot, which saw its lead at the top of the Cock House ladder narrowed to four points from Haynes House. Wilson was the big mover, now sitting in third spot and Loton in fourth spot, less than 20 points behind Riley. The scene was set for a grandstand finish at the interhouse Athletics Carnival.

The weather gods again shone on Hale with light drizzle in the morning making way for beautiful sunshine as the battle for Cock house supremacy played out on Craig Oval. The day showed House sport at its best with mass participation blending with a determination from each boy to maximise his performance to give his house the best chance of success.

Despite the late push from Wilson, it was Riley House that claimed the mantle as interhouse athletics champions and, as a result, took out the Cock House Cup for the first time since 1986.

Unfortunately, the one house we needed to beat to improve our placing in the Cock House Cup standings (Tregonning) snuck in ahead of us in sixth. The wooden spoon race would have to come down to the interhouse Athletics Carnival.

As usual, the Athletics Carnival was the final event for the Cock House Cup and undoubtedly a big event for Buntine. Tragically the interhouse Athletics Carnival coincided with a Year 9 camp group and Buntine lost many of our best athletes, which may well have foreshadowed the events of the day. Despite the valiant effort put in by all the boys, in particular the depleted Year 9 group (which managed a respectable fourth), we were not able to top a stronger Tregonning House (finishing sixth) and Buntine was left the unlucky winners of the wooden spoon.

Regardless of our sporting difficulties, the culture of Buntine House is not one of giving up upon falling and this could clearly be seen in the determined manner that was taken in preparation for the House Arts Cup. 
Crowded House was awarded

Our combined finishes of fourth and third in the two major competitions saw us




placing an extraordinarily close second. A hard pill to swallow.

Boarding at Hale continues to evolve with several new initiatives and programmes implemented in 2017 to support boys and ensure boarding remains an exciting and enjoyable place for our boarders.

Brine House boys started the year with a refurbished Prep area and new foyer. The old Prep rooms have been transformed into a contemporary, bright, multi-purpose learning and recreational space. With different work stations, a meeting room and a mix of seating, the downstairs area has quickly become the hub of Brine House. The massive TV screen with Foxtel and Netflix has also proven to be a major attraction for our junior boarders.

The Academic Peer Support programme is now cemented as a key component of our pastoral and academic focus in boarding. Apart from the help with homework given by the Year 10s, 11s and 12s to the younger boys, the stronger bonds between senior and junior boys that have developed have been of great benefit.

The Year 9 Boarding Personal Development programme led by Mr Chris Guard and Mr Heath McCabe remained our flagship PD programme for boys in boarding. The boys again raised close to \$15,000 for Wheelchair Sports WA in Term 3, with boys focused on the theme of 'community' during the year. Other year groups had various PD sessions throughout the year, with the Brine House boys undertaking many workshops at other schools, as well as lessons delivered by our School Psychologist on resilience. Many Year 12s completed certification in accredited courses including barista, recreational skippers ticket and responsible service of alcohol.

This year we employed Prep tutors to assist boys during Prep from Monday to Thursday. In their bright blue shirts with a yellow question mark on the front, the two Prep tutors provided additional academic support each night for our Year 10 to 12 boarders. Extra assistance was also provided during the Year 10 to 11 semester examinations for the first time this year.

The second Boarders' Farmers' Market was held on Father's Day in Term 3. It was another outstanding morning and the market has already become a great Hale community event on the calendar. Many of our wonderful boarding parents and families donated much of the produce and offered their time to set up or run a stall on the day. This year, the Farmers' Market raised \$12,000 for Breast Cancer Research WA and Crawford Lodge.

The creation of the Hale **Boarding Community Facebook** page at the start of the year proved to be a successful form of communicating boarding events and activities to the Hale boarding community. The new forum replaced the outmoded boarding newsletter and was very well received by parents. It certainly highlighted to parents the enormous array of activities and events that are planned and provided for the boarders beyond the regular weekend recreation activities.



The small but significant increase in international boarders in 2017 was a welcome development in boarding at Hale. With eight new boys from Singapore, Jakarta and Hong Kong joining our ex-pat boys and one existing international student, we could re-establish the International Students' Group this year. The boys met regularly throughout the year and enjoyed a dinner with international students from St Mary's in Semester 1. The diversity that our international students bring to the boarding house is invaluable and an important aspect of contemporary boarding.

Early in Term 4 the Year 12s enjoyed a week of celebrations including the traditional Thursday night Year 12 Boarders' Chapel, followed by a whole house farewell with speeches and presentation of gifts to each boy. The Year 12s were given a warm reception by the boarding community when they returned from Chapel. Three Year 12 boys – Hafiz Shahril, Lawson Ayers and Alex Donaldson – addressed the House on behalf of their fellow Year 12s. We wish our Year 12s well in their future endeavours.

After 10 years as Head of Wilson House, Mr Ian Tredget finished a wonderful stint in boarding. lan presided over many Cock House Cups and was always pushing the Wilson boys to give their best. lan was particularly intent on providing a strong academic focus in the house, ensuring boys would make the most of their opportunities. We wish lan, Sue, Dan and Ben well as they enjoy life after boarding. We also farewelled Mr Justin Forbes at the end of Term 3 after he accepted a position as Head of Rowing at Christ Church Grammar School. Mr

Kane Greenaway also leaves boarding after four years as Assistant Head of Wilson House Year 10. Kane will take the role of Head of Physical and Health Education at Hale in 2017. 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

Redfoot Youth Theatre had an amazing year!

We launched our 2017 season with the delightful tale of Blueback, a play by Peta Murray, adapted from the novella by Tim Winton. It is the touching story of a boy's connection to the environment and who better to perform this allegory than our youngest members of Redfoot? The 14 cast members consisted of Year 7 and 8 boys and girls armed with umbrellas and Hawaiian shirts. They injected colour and enthusiasm as they performed under the backdrop of the Norfolk Pine, which symbolised the Albany region where Winton sets his story. The Developing Artist Programme at Redfoot saw Harry Davidson, a Year 12 Drama student take the reins at directing under the guidance of Drama Teacher Natasha Souris. It was a wonderful collaboration.

Next up was Beautiful Burnout by Bryony Lavery, a dynamic, physical piece of theatre. This play poses the question: Is boxing a blood sport or a noble one? Redfoot was privileged to have guest director Adam Mitchell direct this production. Mitchell is an amazing, awardwinning theatre director who has directed at WAAPA, Black Swan State Theatre Company, Sydney and Melbourne Theatres to name a few. The cast really enjoyed his vision. the sense of play and expertise he brought to the rehearsal room. The cast also worked with a personal trainer, Brock Watson, who taught them how to bring the physical art of boxing into performance. It was a fantastic physical production that really expanded the student's idea of performance. The Year 12 ATAR Drama class was also studying Beautiful Burnout so there was the added benefit of the curriculum students being able to see it in performance and gain another level of understanding on how to approach the text.

In Term 2 we also showcased Hale's first film, *Checkpoint*. The project was created by the students under the expertise of budding filmmaker and Film Club Coordinator, Taran Dunn. The film was in development for nearly three years. Two of Film Club's first members, **Angus Rowe** (2011-2016) and **Tyler Illman** (Year 12), were involved with the project since its inception and saw it come to fruition in 2017. Tyler described the experience as "nothing short of incredible"

"Every single member of film club has been given the opportunity to try their hand at almost all aspects of professional filmmaking," Tyler said. "*Checkpoint* isn't just a short film, it was a learning experience, an experience of unparalleled quality when considering it was done entirely by high school students."

The film explores complex themes of family, brotherhood, love and loss in a haunting tale of humanity's demise.

Term 3 at Redfoot started with the heart-warming story of The Book of Everything, adapted by Richard Tulloch from the novel by Guus Kuijer. Although it appears to be a simple story, this play has many layers and is quite challenging for the seasoned actor let alone a young cast. There are some beautiful and tender moments that captured the hearts of the audience, but this story also reflects the harsher side of human relationships. The story is told through the eyes of a nine-year-old boy, Thomas Klopper, who experiences fear, violence, friendship, love and bravery. Harry Davidson (Year 12), Redfoot's six-foot-one giant (semi-giant), captures the essence of this innocent boy. Guy Hall (Year 12) was given the challenging role of a stern, strict and violent father who doesn't know how to love but is desperate to connect with his family; he reacts with his hands when he really wants to reach out with his heart. Guy is commended for his ability to portray such a complex character. Tim Del Borello (Year 10) added humour and comedic relief to the play with his delightful animated character of Mrs van Amersfoort. The ensemble members were also enchanting. They provided social commentary and created an interactive and immersive experience for the audience by blowing bubbles, water spray, lobbing table tennis balls and lollipops. The Developing Artist Programme at Redfoot saw Tom Yensch (Drama Captain) not just take on the role but own the role of Assistant Director on The Book of Everything. The cast enjoyed working with him and he really embraced the role.

Cloud Busting, based on the novel by Marjorie Blackman, was performed by Middle School students and directed by Julia Jarel. When watching this play it was hard to fathom that the performers were students in Years 7 and 8. Abiola Oyenaike and Kahan Bhatt (Year 7) were captivating and this was only their first Redfoot performance! The whole cast was so invested, eager to learn and their commitment and support for each other is what Redfoot Youth Theatre is all about. Cloud Busting deals with bullying, friendship, imagination and resilience and these are so cleverly woven into the script that audiences can't help but play back scenes in their minds long after the play is finished.

To use a quote from *The History Boys*, a play by British playwright Alan Bennett:

"HECTOR: The best moments in reading are when you come across something – a thought, a feeling, a way of looking at things – which you had thought special and to you. Now here it is, set down by someone else, a person you have never met, someone even who is long dead. And it is as if a hand has come out and taken yours."

I think this can be said about theatre: we take our audience's hand and we ignite their imagination, emotions and open their heart to experiences other than their own.

We wrapped up 2017 with Peter Pan and The Panto Pirates who were a hit with audience members big and small. Mrs Hook (School Captain Lachlan Ranson) charmed the crowd while Hook (Drama Captain Tom Yensch), in true Panto style, captured his audience. It would not be a Redfoot Panto without the Pirates to spread merriment, song and joy to all. Jono Battista (2016 Drama Captain) and Guy Hall (2017 Drama Vice Captain) directed Panto this year and it was under their direction that Panto was a roaring success. To have our senior Redfoot members perform one last time and take their final bows on the Redfoot Green only seemed fitting.

REDFOOT WORKSHOPS

Redfoot members were fortunate to have two improvisation specialists share their expertise. Sam Longley and Damon Lockwood are improvising gurus who have superb comic timing and wit, and kept the students laughing and engaged in their workshops.

Tech Club workshops with Oliver Loweth have given the students experience on technical aspects of production from lighting designs to sound cues. Not every student wants to be on stage and these tech workshops are valuable as the contributions these students make towards production qualities on performances are outstanding. Year 12 student **Alistair de Vroet** has contributed to so many productions over the years by providing technical support. Alistair designed and plotted the lighting for *The Book* of *Everything* and it was an absolute joy to work with him.

Redfoot and Curriculum Drama is about building confidence, creativity, collaboration and community, and having industry professionals working with the students provides them with an industry experience.

INTO THE CLASSROOM

The Year 8 Extension Drama showcase evening directed by their classroom teacher Julia Jarel was a wonderful infusion of imagination and creativity. The boys transported their audience into the world of picture books, which they cleverly adapted.

The images the boys captured on stage were beautifully created and unlocked the audience's imagination, transporting us to a farm, delving into the world of magic, and taking us to an old people's home.

The Year 12 and 11 classes showcased their scripted monologues and original solo performances. I often refer to these nights as a menagerie of performances as the diverse range of monologues allows the boys to show their wide range of talents. The boys made them think, laugh and even bring a tear to the eye. That is the beauty of theatre.

I would also like to congratulate Patrick Hedlam, Guy Hall, Lachlan Obst and Lachlan Ranson and who have all been offered places in various acting programmes at WAAPA. Congratulations on obtaining entry into these highly competitive courses.



da VINCI DECATHLON



MATHEMATICS ENRICHMENT CLUB

Almost 50 boys from Years 7 to 10 participated in various mathematical challenges and activities this year. The boys met every Thursday, with Year 9s and 10s meeting before school and Year 7s and 8s meeting after school.

Toward the end of Term 1, Hale entered teams in the Have Sum Fun competition where teams of six competed in a fast-paced quiz against other schools. Hale placed first in the Junior and second in the Senior categories.

In Term 2, 27 Hale students took part in the Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians. Over a period of three weeks, the students had to work through a total of six challenging problems and submit their fully explained solutions. Six boys achieved a High Distinction: Bailey Ireland (Year 10), Joshua Pham (Year 10) and Michael Garas (Year 9) in the Intermediate division, and Year 8s Oliver Cheng, Jonathan Chen and Bailey Errey in the Junior division.

The biggest event of the

year was the Australian Mathematics Competition, which returned some outstanding individual results. This included 37 High Distinctions and five individual prize winners: Bray Lyon, Thomas Papathanassiou and Chirag Tharakan (Year 9), Oliver Cheng (Year 8) and Luke Phillips (Year 7).

Vincent Abbott (Year 11) received a Bronze Award in the Australian Mathematics Olympiad Committee (AMOC) Senior Contest. The Senior Contest is an invite-only, four-hour paper conducted in August. Participation was limited to less than 100 students nationwide. Vincent's bronze award places him in the top 50 students of the nation, which is a significant accomplishment and a just reward for the many hours he has dedicated to enrichment material.

In Term 3, 20 Year 8 boys joined a group from St Mary's Anglican Girls' School in the annual Maths Camp at Ern Halliday Recreation Camp. The camp was a fantastic opportunity for mathematicallytalented people to share ideas and experiences with other like-minded students.

To conclude a very busy year, the Mathematics Club competed in the WA Junior

Mathematics Olympiad at the University of Western Australia. Twenty boys from Years 7, 8 and 9 competed against approximately 450 students from throughout the State. All teams competed well on the day and can be proud of their efforts. Individual Merit Prizes were awarded to Oliver Cheng, Laurence Wilson and Chirag Tharakan for placing in the top 12 students. Jonathan Chen (Year 8) is to be congratulated for his fantastic effort of equal first place, scoring 25 out of 25, and receiving the Most Outstanding Year 8 student and the Curtin University Department of Mathematics and Statistics award. The Year 8 Team 1 achieved second place out of over 100 teams present and were awarded the Most Outstanding Year 8 Team Prize. Congratulations to these boys on their brilliant achievement.

SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

The Science and Engineering Challenge is a nationwide STEM outreach programme presented by the University of Newcastle in partnership with communities, Rotary clubs, local universities and sponsors Through the Challenge, students experience aspects of science and engineering that they would not usually see in their school environment. The Challenge focuses on inspiring students in Year 10 to consider a future career in science and engineering by choosing to study the relevant sciences and mathematics in Years 11 and 12.

This year 80 WA schools competed in eight regional Science and Engineering Challenge competitions. The Perth regional competition was held at the Midland Railway Workshops. Events in the WA challenge this year included designing and building earthquake-proof towers, catapults, optical communication systems, model buggies for Mars, bridges, power and rail networks for model towns, and fingers for a bionic hand.

The Hale School team won the Perth challenge, finishing first in many of the eight events. We also achieved the highest



total points across all WA regional competitions and as the top WA school team we were invited to compete in the national finals in Dubbo, NSW. This was quite an achievement as the national finals consists of the best eight teams from over 600 schools nationwide.

In early November, the Hale School team flew to Dubbo via Sydney to represent WA. Dubbo is an historical country town in NSW and the team spent its first day acclimatising,

sightseeing in the town centre and visiting the Old Dubbo Gaol. The following day the finals were held in a massive agricultural building at the Dubbo Showgrounds. The eight finals events were revealed and teams were assigned to each of them randomly via a lottery. Some events we had seen before, but many were new to our team. New events included designing planes, eco-housing, boats and hovercrafts. Despite being highly competitive the

finals were held with a great spirit of friendship, inclusivity and teamwork. Friendships were formed and contact details swapped. It will be an experience that our boys will not forget.

An eight-hour layover in Sydney on the way home afforded the group time to visit the CBD for some sightseeing. The team walked across the Harbour Bridge and through the Rocks to Circular Quay. They visited the Opera House

and some boys even climbed

the Sydney tower for a bird's

eye view of the city.

Hale Institute

The introduction of the Hale Institute of Innovation and Research this year has seen many achievements and progress throughout 2017.

Recognition for the activities of the Institute have been formalised through the Curtin University Consortium of Innovative Schools' partnership, which will provide numerous ongoing collaboration opportunities for the School. Further to this Hale School was the recipient of *The Educator* Innovative Schools award for 2017 that recognises 40 Australian schools who are leading the way in best preparing our students for tomorrow's world.

INNOVATION

Through the Innovation Scholarship an industry partnership has been developed to create virtual reality (VR) learning resources for a global market, which presents an opportunity to develop and showcase the great work of our teachers in addition to contributing to the wider educational community. Further to this, valuable information regarding the benefits of student feedback in the learning process has been provided to staff through a separate scholarship project that will progress to an academic research paper for external publication. Two innovative VR labs have been established across the whole school, now enabling students to experience this immersive and engaging format to complement existing learning activities. This resource has also facilitated a partnership to co-create new History VR content that is customised to our student learning outcomes. A variety of new innovations have also been implemented to further the learning opportunities of our students, including:

- The iC course for Year 7 students to experience the design thinking process to solve real-world challenges with a social enterprise mindset and authentic global collaboration opportunities.
- The Radio Hale programme to create professional audio recordings that provide valuable skills and experiences for our students whilst promoting the activities of our school for the wider community.
- A dynamic lightboard resource and dedicated studio space for student and staff creation of video learning resources.
- C-Pen use and research to provide valuable schoolwide feedback on this cutting-edge learning support technology.
- Three NASA Space School Expeditions to develop student leadership and skills in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM).

RESEARCH

Staff contributions to the Amplify project have produced extensive research, authentic testing and prototyping of dynamic ways to incorporate the valuable 4C skills of creativity, collaboration, communication and critical thinking into mainstream classroom activities. Data for this project included ethnographic research gathering feedback from students, staff and Old Boys to build a comprehensive understanding of the School's current position to make effective recommendations for the future. Other research projects have included:

- partnering with Microsoft to measure the value of OneNote and digital pen use for our past students undertaking tertiary study
- research with Curtin University to investigate the physical and learning benefits of standing desks in a classroom environment
- participation in a global character education research project
- social and emotional action research with current Year 10 students
- Turnitin research to gauge the value of automated feedback, assessment and plagiarism checks using advanced artificial intelligence and machine learning technology

growth in recent times. Hale and Nulsen disability service have maintained a 12-year association and the 12 youth patrons of 2017 once again did a magnificent job. The Big Brother programme at Ronald McDonald continued to be a success and everyone has enjoyed the amazing new facilities at the new Ronald McDonald House. The partnership established in late 2015 with the Salvation Army and our visits to a women's refuge grew from strength to strength.

It is not only the boys who give up their time but also a loyal group of staff. Special mention needs to be made of Mrs Brenda Sapagnolo, who is retiring from Hale School this year. She has always willingly volunteered her time for many years at several of the agencies we visit.

Congratulations to all the boys who participated and gave of

Outdoor Education

I was reading Graeme Green's seminal novel The Power and the Glory as I travelled between Perth and Exmouth in August to re-join the Year 10 Outdoor Education programme. It echoed my sentiments entirely as I pondered how often I have declared my favourite time on camp to be the communal meal. The reward for the hardship of carrying a backpack full of personal equipment and clothing, tents and tarps, cookers and condiments, sachets of sauce, a variety of vegetables and enough water to wet parched throats, is the night-time meal in a magical setting. A place for enjoying comradery under a starlit sky, improved only if the menu includes freshly-caught fish. Time slows down and we often forget what day of the week it is. This is the antithesis of fast food and everything it embodies. Time is not of the essence and clean-up is no less social than the preparation or the repast.

One doesn't have to dig very deep to find a plethora of literary links and references

to the importance of nature in all aspects of the lives and development of humankind. In the last few years we have witnessed a palpable surge in the inclusion of nature and nature learning in school education. The new Australian Curriculum is peppered with references to the terms 'environment' and by a onethird degree 'nature' (though the latter is still referred to five times more than mathematics!). Outside the classroom we have seen the burgeoning of publicly-funded organisations like Nature Play and facilities like Naturescape at Kings Park.

Hale School was truly ahead of the game when the first Year 11 camp began in the early 1970s in what is now Karijini National Park. This experience was so powerful for the students that when in 1989 the state government closed the Wittenoom township, there was an uproar from Old Boys when it was suggested that the camp may follow suit. Thus the Exmouth programme was born, and to this day these two camps are the single most talked-about event at any Old Boys' Day. This sense of value continues with today's students and parents. It was both heartening and overwhelming this year that when, for a variety of reasons, the Year 9 Camp was first cancelled, then re-offered as

optional only, there were over 140 responses within 24 hours for the limited 90 places.

So how does Hale School stay ahead of the game? How does it continue to deliver a programme that is both envied and revered, but more importantly helps to deliver the total educational needs of tomorrow's students in a changing world? Often referred to as life skills, these are the opportunities that help to build resilience, self-confidence and a sense of community and team, as well as imbuing an understanding of privilege and the need for service and advocacy. The answer can perhaps be drawn from the 'Hale way'. From the move to Wembley Downs in 1969, to the Year 11 Wittenoom camp in the early 1970s, Hale has not been afraid to make bold and sometimes unorthodox decisions for the long-term good of its students.

As I prepare myself to embark on the journey of being a Hale School parent in 2018, I am more aware than ever of the information that we disseminate as a school. I have also had to field questions from the occasional worried parent about imminent changes in camp structure for their sons. The truth is our only big plan for 2018 is to bring the 11-day Exmouth expedition back from Year

10 to Year 9. This will see the Year 10 camp running as normal in the first five weeks of Term 3 and the Year 9 cohort experiencing a replica programme for the second five weeks of Term 3. The change is designed to provide Year 9 students, who are now on average six months older than they were seven years ago, with an appropriately-pitched experience to conclude their compulsory camp programme. This pinnacle camp will remain in Exmouth where the Outdoor Education department has amassed an enormous and even unparalleled amount of experience and knowledge. It is hard to believe that next year will mark our thirtieth Exmouth programme.

While the true value of the Outdoor Education experience may not be realised for years afterwards, there is one thing for certain: The Outdoor Education programme at Hale School will not stagnate so long as it is staffed by impassioned practitioners and supported by an extensive network of alumni who want those who follow to share their experience. There is little surprise as parents deposit their boys that we often have the tongue-in-cheek request that they might come along as well.

SUMMER SPORT WRAP

The summer sports season was a memorable one for Hale with brilliant performances and tight finishes the order of the day. Our boys consistently reached and exceeded expectations, which reflected positively on the work done in training sessions and behind the scenes by coaches and players alike. Basketball, rowing, swimming and cricket all had nail-biting conclusions to their competitions, which will long live in the memories of the boys involved.

The 1st V **basketball** team was nothing short of brilliant all season. The style of play and attitude of the group were as impressive as their results with their crisp and unselfish passing of the ball a highlight. Five straight wins in Term 1 gave them a share of the Blackwood Cup before a last round loss to Wesley meant a joint premiership. The boys should be very proud of everything they have achieved in winning the Blackwood Cup for the first time since 2008. Beyond the 1sts, the 2nds and 4ths had strong seasons while

the 10As were impressive, winning five out of six games, which augurs well for the future of Hale basketball.

Our 1st XI cricket team had another successful season, finishing a close second in the Darlot Cup. After a tough first game of the season against Christ Church, the boys regrouped to record two tight victories against Trinity and Scotch, which put them in Darlot Cup contention. Another impressive display against Guildford took them to the top of the Darlot Cup ladder but a tough loss to Aquinas put their premiership aspirations in the balance with one game to play. Hale did everything it could and beat Wesley comfortably on the weekend but a surprise outright result by Christ Church over Trinity meant that for the second year in a row, the Darlot Cup was not ours. The 2nds, 3rds and 4ths all had their share of highlights and victories while the 10As should be congratulated on an undefeated season where they did not look like losing a game. In the 9s, a combined seven wins out of 10 games is another promising sign for the years ahead.

It was a special day at Champion Lakes for the 2017 **Head of the River** regatta. After consistent showings from the Year 9s and 10s, our Opens crews were in readiness for what was for many of them their last rows for Hale School. While the 4th VIII had experienced success in the lead-up regattas, they knew they had to keep improving. In what turned out to be the closest finish of the regatta, the Hale boys beat Trinity home by 0.14 of a second to win the race. The 3rd VIII took to the water next and with a strong season behind them rowed beautifully to finish second behind Trinity. The 2nd VIII took part in an epic battle. For most of the race Hale and Christ Church were neck and neck for third place. The Hale boys found another gear right towards the end and got that third spot in a photo finish from the Christ Church boys, which was a great reward for the attitude this crew had shown all season.

With three successive podium finishes the momentum was with Hale as our 1st VIII, made up primarily of Year 11 students, took to the water. From start to finish the crew put in their best performance of the season and never looked in any danger of finishing below third place. It was a season-best performance on the biggest stage and something that brought great iov to the hundreds of Hale supporters in attendance. The success of the 1st VIII was only overshadowed by the announcement of the Hamer Cup results, which saw Hale, on the back of four straight podium finishes to end the regatta, claim second spot –

our best result since 2004 It was another action-packed swimming season that was characterised by mass participation, a wide variety of events and some outstanding successes. The climax of the season, the PSA Interschool Championships, lived up to all expectations with the final result coming down to the last race. Unfortunately, Christ Church pipped us by just a solitary point but credit should go to all the swim team for the manner in which they took defeat. This was epitomised by our Captain of Swimming, Ashton Brinkworth, whose leadership of the team combined with his amazing performance on the night led him to receive Honours for swimmina.

Our 1st XI **tennis** team improved as the season went on and after dropping the first two games, went on a four-game winning streak to finish the season in third place. The character of the team showed through in tight victories against Trinity, Aquinas and Wesley where, after being down eight sets to four, rallied to win 13-11. It is also worth recognising the contribution of Mr Tredget who steps aside as 1st tennis coach after 17 years in charge - a fine effort indeed. Elsewhere, the 3rds and 10As both completed undefeated seasons and the 9s age group won 15 of 25 matches contested.



Hale **volleyball** continues to go from strength to strength. The 1st volleyball team had its best season in many years winning three games to finish fourth on the ladder. Our lower teams again performed well with the 10As and 9As both only dropping one game each, which shows the depth in our volleyball programme.

Our 1st **water polo** team had its ups and downs in season 2017. Despite two early losses, the team rebounded winning three of the next four games including a dominant display over Wesley where the result was never in doubt. The 3rds and 4ths both completed undefeated seasons with relative ease while our 9As and 9Bs showed plenty of promise.

All in all, a successful season for Hale sport with the performances of our Year 10 age group a great sign of things ahead.

WINTER SPORT WRAP

For **badminton**, it was a fantastic season with the team finishing second and coming within just one set of a premiership. Their progress was particularly evident in the last fixture against an undefeated Wesley team where Hale fought tooth and nail to lose five sets to four in a thrilling contest.

While it wasn't Hale's best

cross country season, the boys' commitment cannot be faulted. They continued to train hard and while results suffered because many of our best runners were playing other sports, there were some exceptional runs, in particular from captain Isaac Silbert. He proved himself to be an elite PSA runner with the highlight of the season being his third place finish in the eight-kilometre Ray Brown Cup.

It was one of the strongest seasons for our **football** programme in many years. In the 9s our As won eight of 10 games including their last-round victory against Wesley, which had not been beaten for three years. Our 10As, despite losing four or five players up to the 1sts each week plus Exmouth absentees, won eight of 10 games.

The highlight of winter sport was without doubt our 1st XVIII football side. After a 50-point defeat in round 1, they won 10 of their next 11 games. In many of these games they were challenged but their resolve was never broken. They were crowned deserving champions of the PSA. The enormous contribution of captain **Rylie Morgan** was recognised as he was awarded Honours in football.

Our 1st XI **hockey** team can consider itself desperately unlucky not to be joining football as PSA premiers. Despite being in third place on the PSA ladder, the team only lost one game all season and even that happened in the last minute of the match against Aquinas. They played a great brand of hockey and their defence, led by **Asger** Wade and Ben Tredget, was consistent all season while Jack Pearce topped the goal scoring with 12 goals. Well done also to the 2nds who went through undefeated.

Our 1st XV **rugby** team had an up and down season. The early loss of Captain Shaun Tatlow to injury hampered the campaign but despite his absence their effort week in, week out was to be admired. Two close losses to Guildford and another to Trinity ended up being the difference between second and fourth place. The future of rugby looks strong with our 2nd XV blue team going through undefeated and the 10s, despite being few in number, losing only one game.

Hale **soccer** continues to grow in both popularity and success with a record number of teams taking the field this year. Our 1st XI soccer team had its best season in many years, finishing second on the PSA ladder with nine wins from 12 matches. **Ben Campbell** scored 15 goals while the entire Hale team only let in 14 all season. Our strength in depth was evident with 12 other teams winning more games than they lost.

During the winter season, we also saw great performances from our **golf** and **surfing** teams. The golf team finished second by one shot while our surfing team was crowned PSA champion for the second year in a row.

It was a long time in waiting, but the success of our **athletics** team at the 2017 PSA Interschool Carnival was special. The team, consisting of over 100 students from Years 7 to 12, put its short but intense training regime to good use as the boys systematically and methodically rose to the top of the athletics mountain through consistent performances over the 140plus event programme. While it is unfair to single many out, Hale School won 30 races, finished second in 31 and third in another 37 races. Two Hale students broke PSA records on the day: Walter James Seymore in the U14 90-metre hurdles with a time of 12.99 seconds and Alex Perin in the U13 high jump with a height of 1.65 metres. The joy from the squad at the wind up back at the pavilion was contagious and the day will live long in the memory of those present, including our enthusiastic group of Year 10 and 11 students who cheered the boys home all day.

The basketball season of 2016 to 17 was a huge success, with Hale winning the Blackwood Cup after a nine-year drought.

During the holiday break the 1st V team held the inaugural two-day, preseason camp. The team trained hard, set goals, watched a fantastic Wildcats win at the Perth Arena, and got locked in and focussed on the six games ahead.

The season proved to be one of the best Hale has produced. The team consisted of an array of state league talent players, including WA representatives and SBL contracted players; a knowledgeable leader in Coach Lackovic, and also an amazing team manager, Sarah Pearce. The team created the phrase, "Working hard to achieve something special by being relentless in our pursuit of excellence". The team stood by this objective with the core values of toughness, togetherness and commitment guiding the way in which the boys

played in every game.

Kicking off the season, the 1st V took on Christ Church at home, coming away convincing 83-29 winners. From the opening tip the boys were locked in and ready to go. Strong 25-plus point performances from Year 11 Jayden Stone and senior Neema Kazemi helped the team get the season off to the perfect start.

Week 2 saw the Hale School gym filled to capacity to view another great game. A talented Scotch team was no match for the quick start from Hale as the boys opened up a double digit early. The Hale boys displayed poise at the defensive end and were deadly on the offensive end, especially from outside with Ethan Vlahov hitting a team high of six threepointers. The Hale team took the game 108-78 and was another step towards its goal.

Week 3 was the first away game of the season and the boys found themselves in trouble early. A lack of effort and intensity saw the team in an unfamiliar position, trailing by two at half time. A calm but focussed halftime speech from the coach resulted in the tables turning completely in Hale's favour after the break, adding another win to the tally.

After a week off, the boys prepared for the Aquinas game, which would ultimately decide whether the team won the Blackwood. Bowen. After being down early, the team reduced the gap to seven points at half time. In their final half of basketball for the year, the boys were ready to make a comeback - and comeback they did. With a quick start, they erased the Wesley lead and took their own of four points during the third quarter. The fourth developed into a tough battle with Wesley playing stellar defence. The 1st V ended with their only loss in the season by eight points, 84-76.

The Blackwood winning series is one that all involved in Hale basketball should be proud of. The boys worked very hard to achieve something special. They were relentless in their pursuit of excellence, ending a nine-year drought and winning the Blackwood Cup for Hale.

It was both a dramatic and memorable season for the 2016/17 1st XI as they came within a whisker of winning the Darlot Cup.

The Term 4 trial season served as good preparation as a larger squad battled for places in the Darlot Cup team.

After Christmas and following the appointment of Matthew Spoors as Captain, Hale hosted a four-team cricket carnival between The King's School (NSW), The Southport School (QLD) and Christ Church Grammar School (WA). The four days of matches allowed Hale to trial various combinations. The team ended the week playing better cricket than it started but the benefit was far more than just finding form as the team became a tight-knit unit ready to take on the Darlot season.

Despite the best preparation, Round 1 v Christ Church Grammar didn't go to plan with Hale batting in inclement weather. Christ Church took full advantage of the conditions to bundle Hale out for 67 runs. It was a disappointing start and the team knew it couldn't falter again in this manner.

A nail-biting four-run win against Scotch College the following week gave the group the confidence it needed with **Ben Tredget** and **Matt Spoors** both making valuable contributions. A strong batting display the following week in hot conditions saw Hale post 327 runs with **Sam Timmins** posting a century. This total proved too much for Trinity, which fell 75 runs short.

The good form continued as Guildford Grammar visited Hale. Four wickets to Matt Spoors restricted the visitors to 135 before Hale posted a rapid 3/245 with Ben Tredget top scoring with 95 runs. Hale again bowled Guildford out for 157 but fell agonisingly short of outright points, which would prove to be a cruel blow as the season played out.

After three consecutive wins, a talented Aquinas team brought a halt to the winning streak with 242 not being enough on a quick outfield. **Campbell Dawson** top scored with 86 while **Ross Williams** and **Matt Spoors** both got half centuries. The loss left Hale hanging on to a narrow Darlot lead with one round to go.

The final round of the season at Wesley saw Hale return to form, with 6/289 being more than enough against Wesley, which could only manage 98. Key contributors were Matt Spoors with 82 and Campbell Dawson, who took an impressive 4/9.

As the last afternoon of the season unfolded, it became clear that the Christ Church v Trinity fixture was heading towards an outright result in Christ Church's favour. This result was confirmed in the last few overs of that fixture, which relegated Hale from Darlot Cup Champions to second place. While it was a tough pill to swallow, the season saw Hale produce some fantastic cricket with all players making significant contributions at some point.

I congratulate the boys and coach Simon Bowman on an excellent campaign of which they should be extremely proud.





The 2017 rowing season was Hale's most successful since 2000. We placed a very respectable second overall in the prestigious Hamer Cup to Trinity College. In 2014, Hale placed fifth; in 2015, sixth and in 2016, fourth. It was indeed a fantastic achievement.

With a season full of wet weather, windy 5.00am starts, and injuries and sickness plaguing rowing camp, the Hale rowers fought through it and put their utmost into every regatta.

The season started with the Christ Church regatta where a nervous 1st VIII – with seven out of the eight having never rowed a 2000m race before – came away with a solid placing of fourth and a list of improvements for the weeks to come.

After another week of training in the infamous Matilda Bay, the VIII went out again for the Wesley regatta. Driving in and seeing white caps on the far ends of Champion Lakes were not the most promising conditions for racing, but after weeks of training in the rough weather, the boys were keen to get out and race the same way in which they trained.

This proved to be the best regatta for Hale before the Head of the River, with a placing of fourth in the modified time trial due to the rough weather.

These results of fourth and fifth placings continued throughout the season with us, Christ Church and Scotch fighting for third place, with Trinity and Guildford leading the pack.

The coaches continued to refine the gaps in our techniques leading up to Head of the River, with a change of crew in the middle of the season resulting in only two Year 12s remaining in the boat.

Going into Head of the River, the crew and boat shed in general were nervous. Months of intense training paid off for not only the 1st VIII but every single crew throughout the shed with the placing of second in the Hamer Cup. The Head of the River race was our best result for the season with a placing of third, which augurs well for next year. A final thankyou to everyone involved in Hale rowing – coaches, parents, boys and everyone else – and good luck for next year and the years to come.

ATHLETICS

In retrospect, it seems that 2017 could not have gone better for Hale Athletics. This year's Interschool victory was a combination of many years of hard work, a fantastic team culture, an entire team's worth of effort, and brilliant support within and beyond the School. No matter how we look back on it though, Hale School's first PSA interschool victory since 2002 (and only the fourth since 1941) was tremendously satisfying and will provide all students who participated with memories to last a lifetime.

There were extraordinary performances, records and personal bests in so many events that it is impossible to do them justice by listing them here. Our Inters day really was characterised by fabulous allround efforts and results. One of the keys to our improved performances in the past few years has been the lift in the quality of our middle-distance and 400-metre performances. This year Hale was the third-ranked school in the 400-metre, 4x400-metre relay and the 1500-metre events, and top ranked 800 metre school. I commend Mr Horn Mr Bonner and Mr O'Brien for their efforts in these events as the results this year testified to the passion they have instilled in our boys.

Our sprinters and hurdlers maintained their high standards this year, with Hale the top performing school in the 100 metre and 200 metre combined tally, the 4x100metre relay rankings, and the hurdles events. In the field, Hale was the top performing school with our discus and high jump squads ranked number one, and our long jump and shot put results ranked as the number two overall performers. These results were simply brilliant!

The final result did come as a bit of a shock. The score updates during the day were noted by the team but never taken as assuring us of victory. The announcement at the close of proceedings sparked joyous cheering and celebrations on the track. To win by 142 points was unexpected and absolutely emphatic.

My congratulations to the students who were part of this year's charge. I said at the wind-up in the pavilion, the day was a triumph for the entire team: for those who competed, for the reserves who supported, for the boys given all sorts of tasks to

help manage the team, for the coaching team, for the parents who supported the squad and for Hale School. I am enormously proud of the way that our boys represented the School on the day - they were humble, sporting and determined. Callan England's (Captain of Athletics) victory speech was also a lovely balance of pride, gratitude and honesty. The Alcock Challenge Shield now sits proudly in our trophy cabinet.

2017 was admittedly not the best season for Hale cross country and not a great introduction for the junior runners in terms of how good we can be. It was only two years ago that we came third in the Moyes Cup, rivalling Aguinas and Trinity and giving the compulsory sport schools a run for their money. So this year would be about rebuilding our strength from the ground up. Despite our small team, the dedication of our runners shone through with many of the boys taking great strides forward throughout the season.

Right from their first run, the juniors showed this potential with Jamie Hawes (Year 7), Christian Kelly (Year 7), Noah Warr (Year 8), and Josh Hantke (Year 7) regularly finishing in the top 10 and Mortimer Flahive (Year 7) and Amazis Salama (Year 7) not far behind. These boys would form the core of the junior team that would eventually finish a close fourth on the season, not far behind Trinity College in third place. Highlights of the season were the A team being the first across the line in the fiveman by two-kilometre relay at Hale, and the team's thirdplace finish in the final race of the season, the All Schools five-kilometre race at CCGS. Many of these boys performed well in their interhouse cross country races and were selected in the middle-distance events in the winning Hale athletics team this year.

The team was buoyed by the appearance of the new Headmaster, Mr Dell'Oro, at some of our training sessions. Knowing that the new Head was a keen runner certainly inspired the team to continue to put in its best efforts at training. Whilst we were unable to win any of the home and away fixtures, we did pick up some bonus points against Guildford Grammar School. There were runners who had very good individual results throughout the season: Ben Johnson (Year 7), Lachlan O'Hara (Year 10), Scott Packham (Year 9), Fraser Stuart (Year 11) and Tom Hemery (Year 10) were consistently in the top six runners for Hale.

As a team we all improved significantly over the season. This was clearly seen at the final race of the year, the Ray Brown eight-kilometre race in Kings Park. The run is an extremely difficult course, much longer than we normally run, with some technical tracks, and almost everyone maintained their five-kilometre pace for an extra three kilometres and gained their best All Schools placing as a result. Our points score was consequently the lowest of the season - our best score - and we were only 30 points away from finishing in fifth place. Captain Isaac Silbert capped off a stellar year by finishing third out of over 220 starters. His PSA All Schools podium finish matched our best-ever individual result achieved by Assistant Coach Jack Sirret a few years earlier. Isaac was dulv awarded Cross Country Colours this year thanks to an impressive array of top 10 PSA finishes and victories in two of the home and away races.

Whilst cross country appears to be an individual event, in reality it is very much a team sport. The whole squad would like to thank those juniors who ran so well on Fridays and then backed it up on Saturday, Amazis Salama (Year 7) and Peter Atkins (Year 8) in particular. Year 9s Scott Packham, Ben Johnson, and Tom Love who, after playing a football code on a Friday, came down to run – as their second sport – on Saturdays. It shows the true Hale spirit of being part of a team.

It was often a challenge for our group of volunteer athletes to compete against other schools, reinforced with 50 or more runners. That we kept our spirits up and kept trying to the absolute end with little overt tangible reward is testament to the team's resilience.

Thanks goes to Dr Bonner, Mr Mazza, and our Assistant Coaches, Max Davidson, Jack Sirret and Jake Mason. The coaches have all been exceptional role models for the cross-country team this year, as former 'gun' runners and leaders of the team back in their day.

In 2009 Matthew was awarded a Winston Churchill Fellowship. He used this award to study the teaching of philosophy at school level in the United Kingdom and to promote the Philosothon concept. He also received an Australia Award in 2013 from the federal government, which allowed Matthew to lecture on philosophy in schools in Europe and Israel. In 2015 he was awarded the Outstanding Professional Service Award from the Professional Teaching Council of Western Australia, a fitting tribute from his peers.
