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Extract from the Headmaster's address at Senior School Speech Day.

At the start of this year, I thought that after we'd had such an incredible year last year, that maybe it would be hard to build on that this year. With this in mind, I wrote in the first letter of the year on the 14th January:

The specific idea that kindness and helping others needs to be prioritised above success and achievement at all times is going to be a focus for 2020. According to the research it's those people who are kind, care and can empathise with others who are the ones who will achieve the most in life anyway.

So, we began the year aiming to think about others more, show greater levels of kindness and care to others, find greater degrees of empathy, all because those who can, achieve the most anyway.

Then COVID-19 hit – and you don't need me to tell you about that because unlike just about any other disaster, this one has impacted us all. We all have a story to tell and we all are living with it on a day-to-day basis.

So, if one of the purposes of Speech Day is to give an overview of the year that was, then the overview is that this year has been dominated with questions that have resulted from COVID-19.

- Will we have a sports season or won't we? If we have a sports season, for how long will it continue?
- Will we be learning online and for how long? How will we sit our examinations?
- Will we be the ones to see a case of COVID-19 within our community? If so, what will we all do?

Even prospective parents, while on a tour here at Hale School, had questions. A true story:

"Headmaster, the restrictions that are in place at your school appear unnecessarily onerous. Could you recommend a school that does not take this virus so seriously?"

(For your information I was unable or unwilling to assist this lady with her enquiry).

Surely, though, the real highlight for 2020 is that unlike so many students on the east coast and all over the world, we

have had a largely uninterrupted year and one with the vast majority of our usual programmes running as normal.

Instead of giving an overview of the year, let me ask you just three questions.

First question: Did you make your parents proud this year?

Don't let your mind jump to an A grade in Science or French that you promised or were hoping to achieve. Don't even be tricked into thinking that I mean the A team in sport or a call up to perform in the Garland Concert this year. Because while it's true that this might make them proud – and well done if you did – most boys won't always get an A, most won't all get in the 1sts sporting team and won't get the lead role in the musical next year.

What I mean when I think of you making your parents proud – and what I think every single boy here is capable of doing – is simply about you being a good person and, as I indicated earlier, a kind person. Our School Values of courage, excellence, resilience, integrity, creativity and service are there for a reason. Our Chapel is here for a reason. Our staff are here as role models for you. That's because we want you to be someone who has manners, someone who is respectful, stands up









tall and cares about contributing to others and, more generally, our society.

In my mind there can be few greater moments than when you realise that you have made your parents (or someone you care about) really proud.

Also, if you think you have done something to make your parents proud but upon reflection you don't think they know what it was that you did, then make sure you tell them!

Second question: Did you ask for help this year?

I do mean help with solving algebraic equations and I do mean help with structuring your essay to be a more powerful display of your understanding of the novel from English.

But, also, what I mean, on an even deeper level, is whether you did ask for help around something that makes you feel vulnerable. Perhaps you have been reluctant to ask for help about these sorts of things because you feel your pride might be hurt if you said it out loud.

What are the topics that might make someone feel vulnerable? Well, they might relate to the development of better friendships with boys and/or girls. Perhaps it's wanting to explore more fully why you lack motivation or just feel a little lost more generally at certain times of the week. Or, possibly it's about you wanting to be more open that you do sometimes feel anxious when you are here at school.

These are the tough questions to ask, but I think that you are over half-way there to finding some of the answers as soon as you are able to talk about it. While on this topic let me share with you three things that I have learned about asking for help:

- If you get yourself into some sort of trouble or difficulty, it's very difficult to get out of that trouble on your own. You need to ask for help.
- 2. When you do ask for help, many people really want to help you.
- If you don't ask for help, rarely does anyone offer help. Often, they just don't know you need it.

I hope this year has been one where you have sought help. If not, then make it a goal for next year.

Third and final question: Did you move any closer to finding your purpose this year? Amongst our mottos, our statements of purpose, our values and all the things we stand for this might be one of the most important things a school can do. Hale looks to provide purpose. One of the things I think we are good at doing is providing opportunities for boys; that's another way of saying providing opportunities to find purpose.

This school tries to expose boys to so many different experiences: different

people, different teachers, different students, different challenges. Yet I know for many boys, confusion does reign on this topic because it's not an easy question. I do think it's hard for us as males – boys and men – to really know 'that's my path'.

Ultimately what I do hope a Hale education can do, though, is to equip each boy with the confidence to know there is a path for him and that he can take it. It is about having confidence to take control of your own life.

The first Chapel service of the year took place on the new student Orientation Day. It was a service of much significance to the School, being the memorial service of The Reverend Russell Earls Davis, Hale's inaugural School Chaplain. Reverend Davis served the School as Chaplain for 27 years from 1960 to 1987.

Some of my favourite passages of scripture are those associated with the liturgies for funerals and memorial services. They contain some of the most beautiful and poignant words in the entire canon. At the memorial service for Reverend Davis, we heard some of what the Church refers to as 'the comfortable words' as we gathered to remember.

"Those who believe in me, even though they die, yet they will live," from the gospel of John.

"God is our refuge and strength, our very help in trouble," from the Psalms.

We also heard the beautiful reassurance from the eighth chapter of the epistle to the Romans that "neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." These comfortable words are all about the connections we have with God and with each other.

The role of Chaplain at Hale School affords me, as it did Russell Earls Davis and each successive Chaplain, the great privilege of being connected with the large community of people, young and old, who are associated with the School. So many of these connections have to do with the Chapel of St Mark as the gathering place for pastoral events, whether they be funerals and memorial services, baptisms and confirmations, or weddings.

Not long after the first Chapel service of the year, along came COVID-19. Once the initial disruption of not being able to gather for Chapel in the usual way subsided into finding ways of gathering differently, we learned how portable 'Chapel' could be. That the auditorium in the Music and Drama Centre works really well for year-

group Chapel was a good discovery to make. So too was realising how well we can do Chapel outside. When we were able to gather in smaller groups than we had been used to, I began the practice of running Junior School Chapel every second Monday in three sessions: one in the Upper Junior Centre, one in the Middle Junior Centre, and one in the Lower Junior Centre. So successful was this new venture, particularly with our youngest students, that Chapel in the Lower Junior Centre is now a fixture, with every Monday being a Chapel day for Junior School. One week we have Years 3 to 6 in the Chapel of St Mark, and the next week we have Chapel with Pre-Primary to Year 2 in the Lower Junior Centre. One of the joys of this is the capacity to be more agespecific with messages. Another is that it enables Pre-Primary boys to experience Chapel when previously they did not due to lack of room in the chapel building and the distance of the chapel from the Junior School for those with little legs!

By Term 3, when Chapel had become a 'moveable feast', the Prefects of 2020 ran a series of very well received Senior and Middle School Chapel services on diversity. The brainchild of David Olanrewaju and in response to the Black Lives Matter movement, the Chapel series struck a chord with many, particularly those who had experience of race-based discrimination. The set of prayers used at each service was built around the second great command of Jesus to love neighbour as self, and its explication in the gospels that everyone is a neighbour:

Dear God, we are all made in your image, which makes us members of just the one human family. Hear our prayers today for love and unity between people of all races, places and beliefs.

We pray for the world and especially for places where racism and bigotry have become institutionalised. Give to those who are demonstrating and calling for equality the courage, resolve and grace needed to peacefully break through barriers of hatred or indifference. Open the hearts and minds of those who need to change their attitude toward people of colour. For when asked, "Who is my neighbour?"

Jesus said, "Everyone!"

We pray for the whole human race, that we find the true love of God and learn to show God's love to all people. Because we are all made in the image of God, enable us each to come to the realisation that none of us are any better or worse than anyone else, that we are all one in Christ. For when asked, "Who is my neighbour?"

Jesus said, "Everyone!"

We pray for Australia as a wonderful melting pot of diversity, in race, religion and culture. We ask your blessing on all Australians, from our Indigenous people to those who have come here much later. Grant us as a nation such an understanding of true neighbourliness that we are each prepared to work hard to remove the inequity that exists between various people groups. For when asked, "Who is my neighbour?"

Jesus said, "Everyone!"

We pray for our school and for all Hale students, staff and families. Enable us to live into the highest ideal of mateship, that the Hale 'brotherhood' is experienced in such a way that everyone has someone to speak up for them and to stand with them. For when asked, "Who is my neighbour?"

Essentially, this theme of neighbourliness in community captures the overall aim of the Chapel programme this year. Whether it was in a Chapel service in the building itself, or outside, in the Memorial Hall, the Music and Drama Centre, or somewhere in Junior School, the act of gathering a group of diverse individuals into one community is significant. Celebrating the shared life of this one community through our Anglican traditions, even in this somewhat disrupted year, continues to be a very rewarding aspect of being School Chaplain to Hale.

WACE RESULTS& AWARDS 2020

OUTSTANDING ATAR RESULTS

Hale School is extremely proud of the 2020 graduates for their hard work and commitment to their studies, reflected in their outstanding achievements. Congratulations to all students on achieving the WACE.

Of the 194 Year 12 students at Hale in 2020, 100% achieved the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE). 169 or 87.1% received an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR), 23 students were involved in the CareerLink programme and two were on a General pathway.



In 2020 the median ATAR for Hale was 90.35 and 81.65 for WA.

88 or **52%** of our ATAR students were in the top 10% of the nation with an ATAR of 90 or above.

44 or **26%** of our ATAR students were in the top 5% of the nation with an ATAR of 95 or above.

12 or 7% of our ATAR students were in the top 1% of the nation with an ATAR of 99 or above.

JUNIOR SCHOOL

It would be fair to say that this year has been a year unlike any other. It has been our ability to work together and draw on the strong relationships we have with one another that have enabled us to rise in 2020 with mighty wings, delivering terrific teaching and learning opportunities for the boys whilst keeping an ever mindful eye on wellbeing.

As a teaching team, we have worked to draw attention this year to our School Values and learning habits, and sought to incorporate them into our lessons and presentations. At the start of the year, at the parent information night, I referred to three key points:

- 1. Building relationships.
- Kindness.
- 3. Joy in learning.

It is true that we are blessed with incredible facilities in the Junior School, but I believe the Junior School experience is enhanced and defined by a student, parent and teaching team who work together to create an environment where boys can thrive.

'Together we can' is the Prefect Motto that has been adopted across the School this year and we have all certainly taken this on board. I thank all our parents for their incredible support and understanding this year. I would like to give particular thanks to parents who earlier in the year were not only juggling their work commitments and own uncertainties, but also working to assist their boys with schooling whilst at home.

'Choosing kind' has been a message we have shared throughout the year with our boys, and there have been some incredible acts of kindness. Over the course of the year, I have spoken much about personal brand and how boys want to be known. As I write this address, my mind is instantly drawn to a Year 6 student. In the scramble to train up Year 3 to 6 teachers and students in the use of One Note and Teams in a very short timeframe, he saw that we had great help from IT, and teachers were helping teachers, but he had the foresight to see that he too could pitch in. Without being asked, and fully proficient, he used his time to sit alongside Mrs Leatt-Hayter as he patiently trained her and others on the use of Microsoft Teams. He then went one step further when he was at home, prior to our official move to online schooling, and made how-to video tutorials for boys and teachers. No-one asked him for this, he just offered, and so is known to me and many others as incredibly thoughtful and kind

There have been plenty of acts of kindness this year where people have expected nothing in return. I will not say that all has gone smoothly in this area as we have also had our share of boys who have made poor choices throughout the year. Together, we have worked to support them, at times with consequences where appropriate, in order for them to reflect on their choices, and we have also worked hard to ensure those who have been impacted have also been supported and cared for.

Lastly, joy in learning. It is my hope that we have all found some joy in learning. We have been so fortunate and have worked hard to pivot, adapt and be flexible this year to try to keep events running,

stay compliant, and keep our boys active and engaged. Art exhibitions, music concerts, assemblies, Chapel services, learning journeys, recitals, popup performances, triathlons, cross country, sporting fixtures, and an enormously successful whole school Athletics Carnival to name but a few. We have also worked to develop service and connection with our broader community to give to others via Give Write, the Christmas shoebox appeal, and writing to Old Boys who were self-isolating at home in April. One of the Old Boys was so moved by the letter he received from Year 6 William Hodby, he sent him his 1945 School cufflinks in an incredible act of generosity and tradition.

Sustainability initiatives have thrived in the Middle Junior Centre in line with their curriculum and these are rippling outwards towards the other centres. Amidst all of these activities, there have been many creative and collaborative learning opportunities for the boys within their classrooms and specialist areas. One such activity involved our Pre-Primary boys, which saw them introduced to a basic cardboard box. We then watched with joy as they explored directional language with two boys tucked up inside the box driving as others 'coded' to navigate them safely through the room.

With all of this occurring, I believe a large part of this article is the opportunity to share gratitude and give thanks. To our teachers and education assistants, you are an incredibly passionate and talented team to work with. Over the past 19 years, I have seen the way both of these roles have changed and grown to meet the needs of our boys. In your care is our future, and I am in constant admiration for the way you build positive relationships to create the environment that encourages boys to put their best foot forward. You have allowed boys to fail in order to learn, held them accountable in order to get the best out of them, listened and encouraged, mentored, mediated, designed,

organised, stretched capabilities, and provided safe and comfortable spaces where rich learning can occur. And it does not stop when the school bell sounds. Thank you for your dedication.

Earlier, I left you with a question to ponder: If you had one wish for the bikeriding student that we all care for as he hits that uphill section in life, what would it be? Maybe I will leave this to Neale Daniher. A couple of years ago, I watched a clip of Neale, former AFL footballer and coach, father and now grandfather, where he spoke of responding to adversity and these uphill challenges that life can present. Neale has an incurable disease called Motor Neurone Disease (MND), Neale now spends a good portion of his life raising funds and awareness in his fight against MND. Neale was addressing the Melbourne Football Club and the message he shared was what he wanted his young grandson, Cooper to know about life: "Life is good, but it does not always promise to be fair. When things do not go the way you had hoped, my wish is that he strives to conduct himself in the right manner."

So what is the right manner when things go a little differently to what you had hoped or planned? It is summoning up the moral courage to take responsibility and look for the opportunities that may be there. Neale adds, when this happens, "what will then emerge inside of you is the better side of your character that will allow you to move through it and to prevail."

This year, there have been plenty of good times where we have been riding downhill with the breeze at our back. We have also had plenty of times where situations have called upon everyone to step up and do our best into a stiff West Oz sea breeze

JOURNAL ENTRY #2 BY ANDREW RYAN

Friday 1 March 1846

Dear Diary,

I am afraid that I am feeling miserable today. Papa made the decision to leave Ireland two days ago due to the increasing number of deaths each day and the food shortages. We gathered all the non-perishable food items left in our larder and stored them in bags to take with us. I doubted whether there would be enough food to last the entire journey to New Holland (or Australia as it is now called), so yesterday Papa insisted that we divide the food into meagre rations to ensure we all had enough to eat.

Despite those troubles I am still excited and feeling overwhelmed in anticipation of reaching Australia. However, I so do want to return to Ireland again one day and visit all my old school friends. What a joy it would be to be able to feast on the amazing food at Fibber Mcgee in Dublin again, where I can enjoy a lovely Coddle loaf or well-cooked steak. My stomach is growling at these thoughts! I did promise myself that I would not cry during the journey but I do miss home so much. I can now feel a river of tears flow down my cheeks and my heart clutching like a fist with pain as I think about all that I am leaving behind: my school, my friends, the Irish food and the only life I knew.

Anyway, I really do hope that this dilapidated, rusty boat will not capsize during this tedious voyage to Australia. As I sit glumly on the deck of this boat with only my memories and my tears, I can see in the distance the beautiful waves gently rolling up on the sandy, pristine shore like old friends. However, as I have not swum nor surfed the beautiful, warm water for so long, I am not sure that they remember me. As I sit there pondering these thoughts the boat lurches back and forth and I feel my stomach churn just before I turn to throw up over the side of the boat. It is going to be a long journey and I know that there are many weeks to go.








It was wonderful to welcome 76 eager students to begin the 2020 school year. Mr Paul Edwards, Mrs Amanda Hinchley and Mrs Sarah Arthur were the teachers in the three classrooms and were supported by Education Assistants, Mrs Catherine Thompson and Mrs Leanne Dale.

The beginning of Year 4 was exciting as the boys were introduced to some of the sports available as part of the PSA sporting programme. Early in Term 1, training sessions focused on preparing for a cricket carnival. Whilst this fixture was cancelled due to COVID-19, the boys were able to participate in carnivals against Scotch **College and Christ Church** Grammar School for AFL, rugby, hockey, soccer and basketball. These carnivals allowed the boys to experience the thrill of interschool sporting fixtures. display skilful match play, and immerse themselves in friendly competition.

During Term 1 the students experienced their first camp at Hale School. This was a wonderful opportunity to get to know new classmates and teachers in a different context. Activities included circus skills, bush art, orienteering around our magnificent

grounds, fishing and a visit to the beach for sand sculpting, running and swimming. During Semester 1 we were fortunate to have a number of interesting incursions that extended the students' knowledge of sustainability. As a result, we established a worm farm and developed a better understanding of what happens to our waste. Waste Free Wednesday was a lunchbox initiative that saw our centre aiming for zero waste. This target resonated with the boys and we made excellent progress towards our sustainability goals.

In Term 3, the students journeyed to the Perth Hills Discovery Centre to revisit their knowledge and understanding of Indigenous culture studied in Term 1. They learnt about early Aboriginal culture and ways of life, putting into action many traditional Aboriginal practices, including working collaboratively to build a fishing net out of bush materials and trawling a pond to catch fish. The students held a traditional gidgee and other hunting tools, and learnt about bush tucker, as they enjoyed a guided walk through the beautiful bushland. This excursion coincided perfectly with a projectbased learning unit where the students were given the opportunity to collaborate in

vertical groups with Upper Junior classes to contemplate the question, "Who walked here before us?" From this inquiry question the boys researched and brainstormed strategies to help educate others about the significance of culture, environment and traditions of the Whadiuk Noongar people. This unit was capped off with a public exhibition, where the students pitched their ideas and showcased their prototypes to a wider audience. We also greatly enjoyed working online with students from Yandevarra Remote Community School. Separated by 1500 kilometres, students from both schools worked together over several months to explore mathematical concepts, create pieces of art, and solve a science and technology design task in a live online classroom.

The journey of the First Fleet was a key focus in HaSS during Semester 2. A novel by Jackie French, Thomas Appleby Convict Boy, was the hook that helped the boys explore life in Britain over 250 years ago. The novel is written in an historical narrative style, allowing the boys to see life through the eyes of the main character, a boy their age. They empathised with the character's personal setbacks that led to him becoming a

convict on The First Fleet, and followed Tom's journey of hardship and eventual triumph as he built a new life in Australia. The students wrote letters and diary entries from Tom's perspective and debated the rights and wrongs of past crime and punishment systems.

The topic of Forces in Science set the Middle Junior Learning Centre abuzz. The students studied different types of forces, culminating in the creation of a marble rollercoaster. Collaboration, predicting, testing, failing, adjusting, measuring and improving were just some of the skills that drove the boys passionately throughout the unit. The students received 'learning intentions passports', which required them to demonstrate their understanding throughout the unit, allowing them to choose formats that best suited their preferred learning style.

As the year drew to a close and our learning centre showcased many of the students' artworks from the year, it was time to reflect on the wonderful year that we had all spent together.

2020 was one of the busiest years yet for the teaching and learning of Art in the Junior School. A myriad of creative learning not only took place in the stunning Junior School Art Studio, but also at Sculptures by the Sea, Bold Park, the FORM Gallery, and on our iPad or laptop screens at home. It was also a year where collaborative projects started to flourish, seeing students use the design process of 'inspiration, designing, creating and reflecting,' not only in the Art studio, but to resolve creative projects including the Year 3 puppet-making day and Year 5 town planning project.

In Semester 1, the Year 6 boys explored the four methods of making sculptures: carving, modelling, casting and constructing. One of the projects they completed developed into a collaborative artwork assembled from household waste based on our ocean environment. The concept for this sculpture was accepted by the Castaways Sculpture Awards in Semester 2 and was displayed on the Rockingham foreshore as a part of the annual Castaways Sculpture Exhibition in late October.

Early in Semester 2, a small group, known as 'Art for

Others', formed in the Art Room every Friday morning before school. The group aimed to use creativity and ingenuity to assist those in need, including boys from Years 5 and 6 and three Service Learning boys in Year 7. Collaboratively we collected, designed and created numerous items that could be sold to raise money for the Nulsen Group. The items included upcycled mosaiced pots, pencil cases and painted Halloween decorations. These items were a sellout at the Awesome Arts Festival in Perth CBD and at school.

In Term 4, the Upper Junior

Learning Centre hosted the annual Junior School Art Exhibition showcasing a diverse collection of boys' artworks. Some of the highlights were the collection of Year 1 inventive robots; Year 2's superb architectural drawings and models; Year 3's 'Pop' inspired art, Year 4 'The Endeavour' drawings, paintings and models; Year 5 surrealist artwork, and the Year 6 self-portraits.

Soon after was the Garland Music Festival with Seth Cheah in Year 4 receiving the highest Junior School honour on violin. This was followed by the live string, band and piano recitals, the Pre-Primary Nativity Concert, Junior Primary Christmas Concert, Year 6 Chapel and Christmas Chapel, Junior School Speech Day, and the Twilight Concerts. Indeed, with the return in 2020 of the beginner string programme to Year 2, we were able to have over 120 string boys perform together at the Twilight Concerts. All the events were warmly received by our supportive parents and relatives who were excited to be able to listen to the boys and enjoy their music.



As we conclude 2020, those words ring truer than ever. Never more so than this year have we understood the uniqueness and privilege of living in Western Australia. While it is documented that we live in the most remote city of more than a million people on Earth, we still enjoy a vibrant, diverse and communityminded culture. Those cultural aspects also resonate down the hallways of the Middle School, Traditionally, I would use these pages to outline events that have emerged from this culture. But this year I wish to take a different, more holistic and reflective approach.

"When you grow older you miss that eagerness; life may be happy, you may have health and wealth and love and success, but the odds are that you never look forward as you once did to a single golden day. You never count the hours to it, you never see some moment ahead beckoning like a goddess across a fourth

dimension." – James Hilton, *Goodbye, Mr Chips*

As I reflect back on the last eight years as the Head of Middle School, I can honestly say that I have never subscribed to this view, and I owe this fact to the 1800 boys who have flowed through the doors of the Middle School over those years.

You see, being surrounded by Middle School-aged students each day is a bit like being Peter Pan. While you might not get to interact with the Lost Boys, fairies, pirates and mermaids on a daily basis, the simple fact that we start each new year with another 200 students of exactly the same age as the previous year, means that you are forever (thankfully) surrounded by youthful optimism and enthusiasm. As a result, it is impossible not to absorb their zest for life. Their boom and/or bust mentality is more contagious than any virus. This will be the enduring memory I take away from my time as Head of Middle School. For this, I am eternally grateful. But before I formally end this chapter of my professional career at Hale School, I want to thank a few groups of people.

Parents, I want to thank you for bringing your children to our school and trusting us with them every day. As members of staff, we are very cognisant that it is a conscious decision to send your son to

Hale School. As such, we thank you for this choice and for your contribution to the ongoing history of this great school. I especially want to thank you for raising such an amazing group of people. The hallmarks of a Hale boy are numerous but can often be distilled down to a few character traits: earnest, authentic and humble. While as teachers we do our best to further develop these traits, we know that the majority of boys entering Hale School come well prepared.

Staff. There are special moments in everyone's career when something clicks and the culture of a team shifts through the gears and excellence is the outcome. This was my experience in the Middle School. Everyone, from the administration team to the EAs and teachers in the Middle School believe in always doing what is best for the students. Your commitment to them as whole people and not as numbers on assessments is the reason that we see them blossom into fine young men. I want to personally thank you for always being professional and committed, for your positive and solutionfocused outlook, and for maintaining your great sense of humour. But most of all, thank you for being genuine people, who see the boy before you see the student.

My closing comments are directed to the Middle School students, both past and present. On occasions I have mentioned



















to boys, "Why wake up in the morning and decide to be mediocre when you can be so much better?" While I hold true to this statement, I think that a line I heard at the Year 8 Farewell Chapel Service this year hits the mark even better. When offering a reflection on duty to others, Cy Dyson (Year 8) said something along these lines to his peers: "Now is the time to fill your cup to the brim!"

After hearing this line, I was reminded of the old parable by an unknown author entitled *Cracked Pots*. Those of us who are less than perfect can appreciate this piece and be encouraged by it.

A water bearer in India had two large pots, each hung on each end of a pole, which he carried across his neck. One of the pots had a crack in it, and while the other pot was perfect and always delivered a full portion of water at the end of the long walk from the stream to the master's house, the cracked pot arrived only half full.

For a full two years this went on daily, with the bearer delivering only one-and-a-half pots of water to his master's house. Of course, the perfect pot was proud of its accomplishments, perfect to the end for which it was made. But the poor cracked pot was ashamed of its own imperfection, and miserable that it was

able to accomplish only half of what it had been made to do. After two years of what it perceived to be a bitter failure, the cracked pot spoke to the water bearer one day by the stream.

"I am ashamed of myself and I want to apologise to you."

"Why?" asked the bearer. "What are you ashamed of?"

"I have been able, for these past two years, to deliver only half my load because this crack in my side causes water to leak out all the way back to your master's house. Because of my flaws, you have to do all of this work, and you don't get full value from your efforts," the pot said.

The water bearer felt sorry for the old cracked pot and in his compassion he said, "As we return to the master's house, I want you to notice the beautiful flowers along the path."

Indeed, as they went up the hill, the old cracked pot took notice of the sun warming the beautiful wildflowers on the side of the path and this cheered it somewhat. But at the end of the trail, it still felt bad because it had leaked out half its load, and so again it apologised to the bearer for its failure.

The bearer said to the pot, "Did you

notice that there were flowers only on your side of the path, but not on the other pot's side? That's because I have always known about your flaw, and I took advantage of it. I planted flower seeds on your side of the path, and every day while we walk back from the stream, you've watered them. For two years I have been able to pick these beautiful flowers to decorate my master's table. Without you being just the way you are, he would not have this beauty to grace his house."

Gentlemen of the Middle School, in some ways we are all cracked pots. But those imperfections are what make each of us special. While we should always strive to be the best versions of ourselves, don't spend your days searching for perfection and feeling let down when that false horizon can never be reached. Rather, look for the seeds along your journey and water them. Respond to the challenges and uncertainties of our world with optimism and courage, whilst holding true to the traditions of our past that have guided and shaped Hale School. By constantly acting with a sense of 'Duty' to ourselves and others, we all thrive.



The 2020 school year began with the Art Department team consisting of Mr Nick Poole, Mr Chris McClelland, Mr Michael O'Connell, Ms Pip Gordon, and Mr Haydn Jackson. The aim of the department was to create a learning environment for the boys where engagement and a determination to do their best was the expectation for every Art student.

With the school year quickly into full swing, the focus for the Art teachers in the early weeks of Term 1 was to introduce the boys to the art making and art responding components of the respective courses of study throughout the different year groups. The next three weeks saw the boys collecting and creating visual information that would form the foundation of their design work.

In what seemed like the blink of an eye, the first five weeks of the school year had passed, and the boarders' long weekend had arrived. Like every year, the extended weekend is a reminder to the Art students and teaching team that Friday art workshops begin in earnest the following week.

There was a strong emphasis by staff to encourage boys to make the workshops a consistent part of their weekly routine. The Year 12 students were encouraged to use the workshops to obtain extra support from the entire teaching team. The Year 12 cohort had an additional leadership role, which involved using the workshops as a vehicle to create a collegiate spirit amongst the Visual Arts students from all years. On reflection, the Year 12 boys displayed excellent leadership in creating a positive and inclusive spirit, ensuring boys from all year groups were made to feel welcome. Attendance throughout the year was consistent, with an average of 20 to 25 students per week.

As the artworks by class groups were completed throughout Semester 1, displays of the boys' work were held in the Forrest Library foyer and the Art Department foyer. These small displays provided the opportunity for the boys and the art teaching team to view and critique the work produced.

With the end of Semester 1 quickly approaching, the feeling within the Art Department team was that the year was again passing too quickly.

Semester 2 began with the annual Student Art Exhibition only two months away. Given the COVID-19 impact and the resulting class time lost in Term 1 there was an extra heightened sense of urgency amongst the boys to complete as many artworks as possible to display at the exhibition. The opening night of the exhibition was late in Term 3. The focus for the evening was to celebrae the achievements of the Year 12 Visual Art students. The COVID-19 restrictions led to a much smaller crowd than usual in attendance. The exhibition was opened by the Fine Art@Hale Year 12 Scholarship recipient, Alex Allen. Alex used his opening address to inform the guests of the benefits and enjoyment he had gained from studying Visual Arts at Hale School. Alex encouraged the younger boys in the audience to continue to select Visual Arts as a subject of study as they progressed through the middle and senior years at Hale School. Alex thanked the Art Department team on behalf of the Year 12 Visual Art cohort for their commitment to the class of 2020. The exhibition was a success with positive feedback from parents, relatives and friends of the boys from all year groups. The exhibition affirmed that Visual Arts remains a popular subject of study.

The winner of the 2021 Fine Art@Hale scholarship was announced at the Speech Day Assembly. The scholarship is awarded to the highest achieving Visual Art student in Year 11. The recipient of the award was Risvan Nair. Throughout the year Risvan demonstrated an exemplary level of engagement, diligence and commitment. Risvan's work processes in both the artmaking and art interpretation components of the VAR ATAR course highlighted that he is a highly-skilled student. Risvan's intellect, creativity, skill and capacity for hard work make him a very deserving recipient of the scholarship.

Cobbled walls border our cots. The darkness encloses itself around us, for no natural light is determined enough to work its way through the moss growing between the cobbles. Drops of water struggle through cracks in the stone, hitting us below. It is an irregular but constant noise, one we have all grown to accept, and even expect. It is as if it has been deliberately contrived to annoy us because outside there has been no rain for months.

My eyes have no need to adjust as they open. The only thing I can sense in the cloak of darkness is the lingering smell of candles from the night before. Although I can't see my inmates, I know they are waiting for it to begin, as they know I am too. Our body clocks have been manipulated for years.

A grinding noise reverberates throughout our cavern. Two women shove the stone from our doorway, with small grunts. They cradle batons in their arms, awaiting rebellion but expecting none. We all file out, guiding ourselves through touch. After all this time, our squinting eyes still struggle to adjust to the light. Fortunately, the light fades away, for it is dark under the stars.

We all trudge single file towards the road at the edge of our compound. A dozen other groups do the same, as they emerge from their prisons. As we all stand together, it looks as if we are a mass of ghosts: a hundred pale, white, gaunt men. Most of us haven't seen the sun all our lives, except those like me who are old enough to remember our early years.

There is no desire for communication between us. Legible gestures are far too exaggerated for the guards to ignore, and unless we begin sounding consonants without tongues, or develop a language through only the use of vowels, there will be no communication.

Buses begin to pull up beside the compound. The woman driving ours does little to acknowledge us. A cage surrounding her protects her from us. Our group files onto the bus, and I see that the bus clock reads 21:45. I'm one of only a few who has been educated in counting, so no one else gives the time much attention.

The bus departs the compound, with all its passengers wide-eyed in the seats. No guards accompany us. They know we lack the hope

required to rebel.

The bus glides swiftly down the road. First, we pass compounds, then large apartments, until we eventually reach the city. The bus comes to a standstill, and we all disembark. Hundreds of buses ahead of us have already done so. As those buses pull away, so does ours. We have been abandoned, like we are every night.

The metropolis which surrounds us resembles a machine; it doesn't stop working throughout the night. Giant LED billboards line the concrete monstrosities which house millions throughout the day. Except for the odd group of women who cross the road when they see us, we are the only people here.

I am one of thousands of ghostly white faces that still stares at the skyscrapers which line the streets. Many billboards have the same advertisement: a woman leading two cuffed men to a prison. In big bold letters at the bottom of the board, 'DISCRIMINATION +'. I seem to recall hearing something about discrimination whilst a child, but never anything positive.

The crowd begins its surge forwards. Within minutes of walking, a group of six women appear beside us. They don't wear guard uniforms, so I don't turn my head, so as to not bring attention to myself. In my peripheral vision I see the women skimming the crowd. They spot a man who would be attractive, if it weren't for the lack of skin on his bones, and colour in his face.

They fight their way to him through the surging mass of flesh, then pull him out. He is so skinny it takes only one of them to carry him away. The lust in the women's eyes lingers in my brain; he will have a fate much worse than death.

It is not unusual for abductions to happen. Apparently, there are houses designed for women to impregnate themselves, but most women choose this method. These kinds of kidnappings have happened for as long as I can remember, but the government doesn't care. No effort is put into our protection.

I continue walking, until a hand seizes my wrist, shocking me. I am violently pulled out of line. Two women hold me between them. The eyes of the crowd follow me.

Their eyes do not react to me, but their hearts do. Their hearts pity me, like my heart did for all those others.

The women drag me off. I try to resist but I am too weak. I don't have the energy to struggle and am pulled into an elevator. A few moments pass. As we get off, I am led to a room.

I brace myself for what happens next.



































COCK HOUSE CUP

2020 will be remembered as the year of COVID-19 but for the Buntine boys, it will also go down as the year they broke their 19-year Cock House Cup drought, leading the race from start to finish. It was only the second time since 2004 that a day house has managed to topple the boarders after Riley accomplished it in 2017.

In the first House Sport event of the year, Buntine managed to make it back-to-back House swimming wins, beating Haynes and Parry for second and third respectively. This was without Joshua Edwards-Smith, their Year 12 swimming sensation, who missed the carnival due to an Australian Swim Team training camp. Meade won both the D.F. Poake Trophy for the freestyle relays and the T. Hoad Trophy for the medley relays, Haynes won the backstroke relay trophy and Havelock continued their dominance of the breaststroke relays, winning the Pritchard Trophy.

Throughout Term 1, there were several tight contests in a range of summer house sports. Faulkner made up for their 10th place finish in the swimming to climb to third on the Cock House

Cup leader board after a very strong season. They managed to take home the softball trophy, they shared the cricket trophy with Parry and the frisbee trophy with Wilson. Meade took out the tennis and the volleyball, and Buntine asserted themselves as the dominant house in the pool with a win in water polo as well as taking home the silverware in the basketball.

There were question marks over the remainder of the House sport competition due to COVID-19 and the winter fixtures were severely impacted as a result. Flexibility and understanding were required as there were often back-toback shortened fixtures, multiple fixtures in the one week, and significant delays between games at times. What did not change was the fierce competition and level of participation from the boys who were champing at the bit to get back into structured sport after a period of time without any community. PSA or House sport available to them. Faulkner continued to win trophy after trophy, taking out the football, badminton/table tennis and touch rugby competitions, and Haynes won the soccer and hockey. Interestingly, by the end of winter, Buntine had extended

their Cock House lead due to finishing no lower than sixth in any sport.

Due to COVID-19, the format of cross country was different this year with the competition being run over multiple afternoons. Faulkner and Wilson once again finished in first and second place with Buntine and Haynes in third and fourth and Loton and Riley sharing fifth. All that was left was the House athletics and Buntine were left needing a fourth place finish to secure the Cock House Cup outright. 2019 athletics and Cock House winners, Faulkner, were 20 points behind, with the race for third very tight between Haynes, Meade, Wilson and Riley who were all still a chance.

The House Athletics Carnival was a whole school event in 2020, with boys from Pre-Primary through to Year 12 competing across two tracks and multiple field locations. With food trucks, house fundraisers, a visit from Nulsen Group, and fantastic parent support, the atmosphere was electric. There was fierce competition in the Middle and Senior combined carnival.

After numerous lead changes throughout the early stages, Buntine pulled away from the

pack just prior to the relays and then held off a strong Havelock House to seal the T.F. Hantke Cup for 2020 with Havelock and Riley rounding out the top three. Despite a Havelock win in the 'Super Relay', Buntine managed to take out the Housemasters' Cup for the combined relays as well as the J.C. Taylor Cup for the Year 12 relay. The Kelley Cup for the champion boarding house was won by Wilson.

Buntine added the T.F. Hantke Cup to the B.N. Altorfer Cup for swimming, and the Cock House Cup for the champion sporting house in 2020.

The final Cock House Cup standings were Buntine on 254 points, Faulkner on 206, Haynes 184, Riley 183.5, Wilson 181.5, Meade 180, Havelock 143.5, Parry 137, Tregonning 122.5 and Loton on 120.

ARTS CUP

The highlight of the House choirs was definitely Faulkner who performed a classic Queen tune. The boarders got the crowd on their side with a rowdy version of We Will Rock You. Despite many top performances, the winner of the House choir went to Havelock, who performed Pompeii by Bastille.

While this was happening, each house put forward students to perform a script from the *The Class System* in front of their own house groups. Havelock beat great performances by Loton and Meade to claim top prize in the drama, which they then performed in front of the whole school later in the day.

While the music and drama were taking place in Memorial Hall, the quadrangle was the arena for the art competition. Each house was challenged to complete a t-shirt, tie and lab

coat design based on the 'Mad Scientist' theme. The enthusiasm and engagement by all participants were outstanding, as were the creativity, skill and teamwork displayed by the boys representing each house. At the end of the competition there was very little separating the standard of work produced by each house. Unfortunately, the judges had to determine a winner, and this year Buntine was judged as having the most creative, skilled and unified design.

For many boys, the highlight each year is House band, which showcases in front of the whole school the extraordinary ability of our musicians. Some of the highlights were hearing an array of music from Dire Straits to Gyroscope. The top prize this year went to the Tregonning boys for their energetic, enthusiastic and at times a bit crazy performance of *In the Summertime* by Thirsty Merc.

At the end of the day, scores from all events, plus House debating and House chess were tallied to find an overall winner of the Arts Cup. In 2020, this was deservedly won by Riley. The final table of results is listed below.

With Will Zhang playing a key role in the organisation of the event, the night ran smoothly as a few of the Buntine boys were able to display their music talent while also raising funds and awareness for United Way WA, our chosen charity for 2020.

Thank you to Mr Steve McFarland, Mr Chris Guard, Mr Matthew Cotton and Mr Chris McClelland who have all had such pivotal roles in making 2020 run smoothly, and to the boys of Buntine for such an enjoyable and successful year.



Benjamin Grayson and James Harris, head swim team strategists, selected a deadly combination of swimmers that ensured victories in the D.F. Poake Trophy for the freestyle relay and the T. The year was away with some very encouraging results and second place in the Cock House Cup table.

The stimulus for this devised production was Shaun Tan's graphic novel of the same name. Our Middle School production showcased the work of this incredible Western Australian artist through Western Australian stories for Western Australian people. With suitcases in hand the cast set sail for a foreign land filled with steamers, balloons, migrant's stories integrated into the performance, and birds who carried these stories on their wings.

Manful, a devised production where the

cast's input was the stimulus for the performance, was directed by Helen McIntosh. The play's themes explored and uncovered layers of what it is like to be a man in today's society. The production reminded us of what we already knew: young men are just as compassionate, sensitive, kind and loving as women, but they express themselves differently and we need to continue to be positive and supportive role models to nurture this. The boys unravelled the themes of pressures and expectations, both external and internal, and in their unravelling revealed that at the very centre we all just want the same thing: a place to be ourselves and be happy.

MATHEMATICS ENRICHMENT CLUB

Over 50 boys from Years 7 to 10 regularly participated in various mathematical challenges and activities this year. They shared a common desire to succeed in solving interesting mathematical problems.

In Term 1 Hale hosted the Senior Have Sum Fun (Years 11 and 12) competition where teams of six competed in a fast-paced quiz against other schools. Hale placed fifth and tenth. The Junior and Intermediate competitions were postponed until Term 4 because of COVID-19 restrictions. In both these divisions we achieved an excellent second and third place on the night.

In Term 2, 31 Hale students took part in the Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians. Over a period of three weeks, they had to work through a total of six challenging problems and submit their fully explained solutions. Two boys achieved

a High Distinction in the Junior division – Vivaan Wagh and Matthew Ryan (Year 8).

Hale School again competed strongly in the Have Sum Fun Online competition. In Term 3, our Year 9 team consisting of Aiden Ahmad, Evan Cheng, Tian Han and Karim Qleibo, and our Year 10 team consisting of Luke Phillips, Kahan Bhatt, Aidan Moulton and Shaun Randeria won their respective divisions.

Three hundred and sixty-one Hale students participated in the Australian Mathematics Competition in Term 3, which returned some outstanding individual results. There were 32 High Distinctions, 96 Distinctions and one student, Ayodeji Oyenaike in Year 7, won a prize for placing in the top 0.3% in the State.

Ayodeji was awarded a Distinction an amazing result for a Year 7 student in what is a tough Year 10 competition!

Oliver Cheng (Year 11) received an Honourable Mention in the Australian Mathematical Olympiad (AMO), an eighthour contest taking place over two days in which only 130 students nationwide were invited to participate. We had great success in the Australian Informatics Olympiad (AIO) where Isaac Leong (Year 10) was awarded a Silver Medal and Oliver Cheng a Bronze Medal, placing them in the top 20 and top 50 in the country in their respective divisions.

In Term 3, 20 Year 8 boys joined a group from St Mary's Anglican Girls' School in the annual Maths Camp at Ern Halliday Recreation Camp. The camp was a fantastic opportunity for mathematicallytalented people to share ideas and experiences with other

like-minded students.

All teams competed well on the day and can be proud of their efforts. Three students, Ayodeji Oyenaike (Year 7), Ryan Murphy and Will Terry (Year 9) were awarded High Distinctions. PEDAL PRIX



All teams were ably coached by Hale parent and barrister/ solicitor, Dr Marc Saupin. His advice ensured the boys were polished and professional in the courtroom and understood the law against which the charges and claims were being tested.

We have appreciated the boys' interest and effort this year. Many were awarded Symbols for their dedication over two years. It is a shame that, due to restrictions, spectators were not able to witness their brilliant performances; support

from peers and parents was very much missed.

As always it was a pleasure to work with such bright and personable young men.

In a very unique and disruptive year the need to be innovative, able to adapt, change your strategy and create your own opportunities has become more apparent than ever before. The Hale Institute of Innovation and Research has met this demand through a range of projects and student-centred opportunities that enhance our culture of learning excellence and inquiry.

This year saw the creation and development of the Hale58 Academy, a platform that provides students with an opportunity to undertake a wide range of micro-credentials, short courses or experiences that are recognised, improve employability and the student's skill set for the future. The following Hale58 Academy offerings have been made available this year:

- Shark Tank eSchool action learning, project-based programme that provides students with the opportunity to develop skills of entrepreneurship and innovation.
- Case Comp real-world global business case challenge incorporating a range of business and entrepreneurial skills.
- Peak Program an applied, workshopbased programme incorporating modern self-development tools to improve productivity, focus and success.
- Drone course an interactive, nationally accredited Civil Aviation
 Safety Authority certified Remote Pilot Licence (RePL).
- Al for Good Challenge a designthinking challenge to conceptualise ethical solutions using artificial intelligence.
- University of Cambridge Essay Competition – research skills and academic writing development in partnership with the University of Cambridge.
- Barista course providing valuable skill acquisition and improving student part-

time employment opportunities.

- Level Up programme a Year 12 success programme to develop positive life skills and strategies for the final year of schooling.
- Virtual Global Project a series of engaging, online global, collaborative investigations with a focus to enhance student communication skills.
- Innovative Schools Scholars programme – an advanced tertiary learning experience at university for high-achieving students.

The new Shark Tank eSchool course epitomised the vision of the Hale58 Academy through its delivery to Hale and St Mary's students after hours throughout Term 3. Providing weekly workshop sessions with trained facilitators that also incorporated a shared dinner, the students were able to demonstrate autonomy and initiative to co-develop innovative solutions to real-world challenges. After successfully pitching their innovative concepts to a panel of judges, two teams were successful in proceeding to the national finals hosted by the University of Adelaide. Congratulations goes to team Forage comprising Rhiannon Furnell and Vivian Tran from St Mary's with Griffin Harvey, Cooper Thomas and Mahir Zakharia, who were named national winners of the General Category. Their winning concept is an app solution that identifies the best restaurants to provide food to accommodate the customer's specific dietary requirements. This is done through location technology, a rating system, and details of restaurants and meals that accommodate the specific dietary needs of the user. We look forward to seeing the future potential of the Forage app and the wider benefits that the Hale58 Academy will provide to students during their school years and beyond.

With the Exmouth Outdoor Education expedition being a key component of the Year 9 programme, we were eagerly anticipating the conclusion of our research partnership with Notre Dame University that investigated the student benefits of

a longer Outdoor Adventure Education (OAE) experience. This extensive research project was conducted in conjunction with the annual Exmouth camp and used proven instruments to measure student changes in self-efficacy, mental wellbeing and connection to nature. Pleasingly there were several positive benefits from undertaking an extended duration programme with a marked increase in mental wellbeing outcomes for the students. Of the three measures there was significant evidence that a longer programme can promote the protective factors for adolescent mental wellbeing.

The Hale Institute has been continuing to provide a forum in which Hale School can link with other schools, universities, corporations and industry for the purpose of engaging in structured dialogue and creating opportunities for innovation and research. One example of this was through a partnership with the Polly Farmer Foundation, providing a STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) experience for students from Karratha, Wickham, Hale School and St Mary's. Delivering an advanced STEM project and unique STEM Challenge provided valuable experiences for the students, exposure to the potential of STEM disciplines in addition to developing essential skills of collaboration, creativity, communication and critical reflection.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Obviously, this was a very unusual year in trying to combat the serious impact of COVID-19. Because of our inherent need to travel being fundamental to school camps, we had truly been cut off at the knees. Compared to some of our peer schools, however, who took the early measure of standing down their entire Outdoor Education programme, at Hale we were most fortunate and grateful to have a more visionary executive.

Three of my team were already on their way to Albany when the decision was first made to begin suspending camps. There was an irony at the time because we were booked into the old Quarantine Station that was built in 1875 and used to contain the Spanish Flu – still the deadliest pandemic the world has known. The decision was of course made in the best interest of the Year 6 students, and disappointed as they may have been, student safety should always be the priority. After the dust has settled for 2020, the boys of Years 6 and 7 will be the only unfortunate ones to have missed out on their camps this year, but even the former had a replacement of sorts in some activity days at Hale.

The five teachers in the Outdoor Education Department were redeployed to classroom teaching in Term 2. Every cloud has a silver lining and it was a great opportunity for us to become reacquainted with the other side of teaching at Hale. While we chaffed at the bit to get back to our core business, in truth it was in many ways quite a revealing and learning experience.

With the extra layers and protocols imposed upon us, it was a monumental effort to reposition the Year 9 camp into Exmouth in late Term 3. The restart models were written and proposed time and time again as the goalposts kept moving.

I must pay tribute to the Outdoor Education staff who facilitated this programme in the field, many of whom were away from home for seven weeks straight. Our task was made so much easier by a generally willing, keen and capable cohort of Year 9 students. They belied earlier concerns of the ability of this age group. A majority of them not only completed the daunting Range Walk rather than take an easier loop option, but did so in far hotter conditions than any Year 10 had

experienced in the past, and many completed the walk a day faster than planned or expected.

No camp is complete without an event that epitomises the tenacity of the group and becomes the benchmark tale of the tour. Having already implemented conservative metrics with all due caution, we were required to present for testing any group member with cold and flu symptoms and a temperature over 38 degrees. As bad luck would have it, this event occurred towards the end of Camp 1 when our practicum student became ill. We were already prepared with an isolation campsite for the unfortunate patient. The problem lay in what to do with the rest of the group who were now considered "close contacts" and they too were to remain isolated until pathology was returned. They literally missed the bus when the coach returned to Perth and they were not allowed to be on it. It resulted in that group of 17 students and instructors having to drive back to Perth in a Hale School bus and to remain in isolation along the way.

Our sincere thanks must go to Old Boy, Aaron Triplett at Overlander Roadhouse, who fuelled up both the vehicle and the occupants on their way through, so that they could adhere to isolation requirements. We were further blessed by the hospitality of Mr and Mrs Nigel and Tanya Moffat at the Minninooka Farm north of Geraldton who fed and accommodated the weary group for an overnight stay. Their son Ben Moffat was accompanying this group as an instructor.

The pressure was not off: we were now missing a bus and trailer and three instructors in Exmouth, and two more of our team had to return to Perth early to plan and run the next events.

The Year 11 Challenge was perfectly timed in a window of great weather at Rottnest in mid-September.

While we breathed a great sigh of relief to see the final Exmouth convoy home safe, it left us with a range of concerns over what 2021 will present. The Exmouth region was over-busy like never before as tourists scrambled for a holiday location inside the State. Most alarming for us was that after 30 years of walking the range, we encountered our first guided tour group camping out on the track we have eked out over years of crossings.

As Term 4 began, the new-look Year 8 camp continued with busy planning and packing mode right up until the set-up crew left for Nannup at the end of Week 1. The agenda is to provide the Year 8 students with a field expedition experience to lead into their major expedition in Year 9. There is no doubt that they are ready for this and that it will pay dividends for them in 2021.

This camp has been two years in the making as we continue to establish a mini centre at Nannup away from other overcrowded regions in the South West. The magnificent Blackwood River continued to inspire and excite our canoeists as they weaved their way downstream between farmland, stopping for an overnight camp on the fringes of state forest. The bushwalking is equally magnificent along the riverbank where possible and further back into the thick forest canopy. The Year 8 students returned buzzing with energy and excitement as expected.

We will not be sorry to see the end of 2020 from a camp perspective, and hope and pray that we manage to get through 2021 equally unscathed.

SERVICE LEARNING

Getting our hands dirty is synonymous within our Service Learning programme in both a literal and figurative sense. In December 2019, our Year 11 boys embarked on the revised overseas Service Learning trip to Cambodia. We continued our long relationship with Ride Aid whereby our students were involved in a cultural exchange with local Cambodian students and gifted Surface Pro laptops to schools in the Kampot region. Shifting the trip from the hot and humid month of April to the more temperate December weather allowed us to get involved in an exciting new building project with our partner, RAW (Raising Awareness Worldwide). Building a house with qualified builders and the local family was an experience that will go down as one of the most memorable and rewarding for the staff and students on the trip. After establishing this new trip, it was with a heavy heart that we were unable to return in 2020 due to travel restrictions.

Throughout the year, the Service Learning programme has seen many changes, cancellations, additions and adaptations along with plenty of creativity. Dwelling on the downfalls of the COVID-19 regulations didn't prove to be beneficial; rather, it allowed us to move forward and take up new opportunities to help others in need. Our weekly Sambos 4 Salvos activity where the boys volunteered to make sandwiches for the homeless was a wonderful way to help out from the Hale campus. As outlined in the 2020 *Haleian* articles, it was excellent to continue to engage in Service Learning

albeit in a slightly adjusted manner such as online meetings with Hale Mates Muscular Dystrophy, Nulsen Group and James Brown Aged Care Centre.

Commencing new partnerships with St Bart's and On My Feet was also exciting. Both organisations support vulnerable people who are dealing with homelessness and mental health. These interactions have provided our students with an insight into the complexities of these issues and shattered some of the existing stereotypes.

This year also saw St Mary's Anglican Girls' School join us in some of our Service Learning programmes, such as the On My Feet exercise group and the Salvation Army gardening group. As we move forward, we hope to strengthen these connections and establish even more programmes as brother-sister schools.

The Nulsen Youth Patron programme has grown in 2020 as Hale now invites residents onto the school campus as well as visiting them in their homes. Our friends from Nulsen have enjoyed many afternoon teas, virtual reality sessions, games and even a karaoke afternoon. With changes to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS), the Nulsen Youth Patron programme is no longer funded, so it was very generous of former West Australian Governor and philanthropist Malcolm McCusker and wife Tonya to open their home to raise funds for the programme to continue at Hale School, All Saints' College and Methodist Ladies' College. Further financial support is still needed to see this worthwhile

programme remain alive for our boys.

Fundraising has continued to be an important way for boys and families to contribute to the wider community. The Starlight Foundation could no longer allow our students to visit Perth Children's Hospital, so our boys raised money via a sausage sizzle to purchase much-needed art and craft supplies for the children. The Middle School Lapathon raised a substantial amount of money for Ride Aid and On My Feet. These are just two examples of the many significant efforts made by our boys and supported by Hale School families.

It is most exciting to support student-driven projects. When a student plants the seed of an idea, it is wonderful to see it grow and come to fruition. Year 11 student Isaac Blackbourne instigated an idea of a shoe drive for young people in the Pilbara who needed trainers to enter a basketball competition. With some assembly announcements, a Facebook post and a local newspaper article, Isaac's idea definitely took seed as he was able to deliver well over 100 pairs of trainers! With the support of his family, his friends and the School, Isaac got his 'hands dirty' by seeing a need and taking action.

As one of the School pillars, service remains at the heart of our school as we have a duty to ourselves and others to serve with compassion and empathy. Now, more than any other time in our lives, we call our students to live our motto of Duty.

Our final event for the year saw a full house enjoy an evening with Dr Fiona Wood AM, one of Australia's most innovative and respected medical pioneers and researchers. As with so many events in 2020, in COVID-19riddled March there was a large question mark over whether there would be a **PSA** interschool carnival let alone an athletics season. Thankfully, we were able to have both this year.

Pre-season training started in the first week of Term 3 with two weeks of early morning starts for keen athletes across all events. These sessions were very well attended, with large numbers of Year 7 and 8 boys, and fantastic numbers for the gruelling 400-metre and middle-distance events. My special thanks to the coaches who have for many years been prepared to pick up this additional coaching work.

Through the back half of the winter sport season, we were able to incorporate training sessions on Monday and Tuesday afternoons for all boys not competing in a 1sts team. These sessions were valuable on so many levels as they allowed boys to reacquaint themselves with particular events, to work with our specialist coaches, and also to try out new events.

Due to the extended winter season, we were not able to hold the normal House athletics, Hale Championships or Tri-Meet this year. Instead, we scheduled the Hale Championships over two afternoons, dividing the meets by event types. The first of these events saw high jump, throws and sprints; the second saw boys compete in the jumps and middle distance. Mercifully the weather gods did look after us on both days. Although cold, we managed to avoid the winter rain by hours. We were also able to hold a

few races at lunchtime. Boys seemed very enthusiastic about these events, and these may become more of a feature in future years.

In the lead up to Inters we were able to put together four sequential afternoons of training and the team photo. Then, just like that, the Inters were upon us.

Following our warm-up, Captain Thomas Papathanassiou gave a stirring speech to the boys, which saw them leave the huddle looking happy and excited. Perhaps a future in motivational speaking awaits you, Tommy! Well done.

As the programme commenced, we had a slow start to the day with some of our younger athletes finding the standard of hurdles and middle-distance events to be highly competitive. However, all age groups and events picked up as the day progressed. We moved from fifth place up towards third, hovering there for the rest of the programme. Ultimately, Scotch and Aguinas were too dominant across all events, but the race for third was tight and going into the relays, less than 45 points separated Christ Church in fifth, Trinity in fourth and Hale in third. The story of the results is included in the table. I am extremely proud of every student's individual efforts. Every boy gave his absolute best for the doubleblue, with personal best performances and success across the park.

There were so many outstanding individual efforts this year and I cannot mention them all. However, I must

wonderful efforts, particularly in our open age group. Year 12 James Vercoe once again won the Division 1 triple jump. He has won this event each year since 2017. Harry Boden won the Division 1 hurdles this year, also having won this each year since 2017. Both boys also participated in the open 4x100-metre relay, a race that team has won every year since Year 7. This year's 4x100 team included Seth Roberts, James Vercoe, Harry Boden and Ethan Turner. Also in that open age group were wonderful performances from Ben Johnson (who raced the 800, 1500 and 300-metre races), Kyiah O'Donohue who won a magnificent Division 2 800-metre race, and Matt Kane who contributed 29 individual points to the day's total. I was also delighted to see Benji Busby finally compete at Inters. Benji has trained year in and year out but has been competing in an age group above his year group. His persistence finally paid off and Benji ran the 400 metres Division 2 finishing in fourth place.

I must make special mention of two other boys. In the under-16 age group, whilst many eyes were on the

track, Alex Perin was doing extraordinary things in the field. Alex scored 77 individual points, all in Division 1, with results as follows: discus 2nd (43.32m), long jump 1st (6.12m), shot put 1st (14.14m), high jump 1st (1.94m), and a final run for the day in the 4x100-metre relay, where his team placed fourth.

Finally to Reilly Cunningham, who had a marvellous day out. Reilly scored a phenomenal 80 individual points in the following Division 1 events: long jump 1st (6.76m), triple jump 1st (13.93m), 200m 1st (22.40 sec), 100m 1st (11.27 secs). He broke PSA records in the long jump, triple jump and the 200 metres. He finished the day racing in the under-17 4x100-metre relay team, which also broke the PSA record, with a time of 44.29 seconds (the team also included Samuel Gilbey, Mitchell Barron and Sam Cockle).

These are simply inspiring performances by these two young men.

I am so pleased that we had the chance to compete at Inters this year. I hope all boys are looking forward to 2021.

Good things come to those who wait and this aphorism rang true when the cross country season got underway for 2020, with the team in the capable hands of Ben Johnson as Captain and Guy Rosser and Robbie Forsyth as Vice-Captains. We were also fortunate to pick up several stellar Year 12 team members in the forms of Callum Coull, Christian Dethlefsen and Ethan Turner, who soon became the spiritual 'North Star' of the team as he kept fit while postponing knee reconstruction surgery in 2020. Our pipe-opener was an away race against consistent PSA champions, Aquinas College, and the Red-backs gave us a good reminder as to why they are the Moyes Cup holders and the level of training and racing required to be at that level of team performance.

Mr James Matson joined the cross country staff this year and his access to

the Hale School boarding house provided a healthy boost to the team, especially when we raced on our home course. Our super-sized team for our second fixture against Wesley gave everyone a lift from the top down. Captain Ben Johnson ran his best time on the Hale track with a 17m 39sec effort with Hale runners filling six of the first eight places, including Tom Alexander and Zach Bryan (both Year 9) making excellent contributions in fourth and fifth places for the blue squad. Once school came back at the start of Term 2 after Coronavirus, the boys were itching for footy to start and it didn't take long until we had our first game against Wesley at home. The week afterwards we played a formidable opponent in Scotch who would eventually become the PSA premiers. This game was possibly the most exciting of the year but also one of the most frustrating. After dominating most of the stats throughout the game we came away with a heartbreaking loss by three points after booting ourselves out of the game by kicking four goals 15 behinds.

The Thursday before the holidays we then travelled to Christ Church, which played an outstanding game and defeated a depleted Hale side who were a bit down after the Scotch loss and we went into the Term 2 break with one win and two losses.

After coming back from holidays, we had a 45-point win against Trinity at home, with Vice-Captain Menno Inverarity giving a 40-disposal masterclass. We then faced Guildford away, which was the start of our newfound mentality of digging ourselves out of the trenches after slumping to a 2-2 record. This was our



In rather unique and strange circumstances, the 2020 PSA season kicked off two months later than normal. It was to be a compressed, eight-game season with little margin for error without the usual preseason match preparation, due to the cancellation of the Canadian tour as a result of COVID-19.

We were thrust into the heat of battle with a tough opening round fixture and virtual grand final against old rivals Scotch. In a match in which we certainly had our chances to win, we came up short and lost narrowly. As a result, with Scotch unlikely to lose their remaining fixtures and no return game, the chances of us regaining the Redmond Cup for the first time since 2015 became slim. To make matters worse, we lost captain Francois Helberg for the season - a devasting blow, particularly given he had been such a prominent member of the 2018 and 2019 Hale teams. Whilst we bounced back well against 2019 premiers Christ Church 10 days later with a comprehensive 33-12 win, it was also the last time we were to see 2019 Best and Fairest, Justin Landman, as he too was to pick up a season-ending injury.

Despite our injury woes, the team, under the excellent and composed leadership of Liam Timmins, showed great resilience and played some outstanding rugby. The style of rugby was impressive and some of the tries

scored by the team were breathtaking and would rank with many of the best scored by the Sky Blues this century. Also very pleasing was the attitude in defence, in which we were able to show great composure and grit and went many phases defending the line. Aside from a few lapses in this area, this was to be a hallmark of the 2020 team.

The forwards laid an excellent platform from set piece in both scrum and lineout and were seldom bettered. We were also accurate at the breakdown both on defence and attack, and this laid a great platform from which to launch some exciting attacks. The backs when clinical in their execution had enough guile and pace out wide to score some superb tries. If there was a frustrating element to the team, it was at times the decision-making in attack and the tendency to execute carelessly and put ourselves under unnecessary pressure.

Pleasing wins at Guildford and the return clash against Christ Church, where despite missing some key personnel we played some exceptional rugby, were the highlights of the season. Juxtaposed against this, of course, were the disappointments. Very much undermanned and being seven starter players down in our final match of the season against Trinity, we were mathematically still in with a chance of a shared premiership. Despite the fact that we put in an extremely brave

performance in a thriller against Trinity, we came up short and lost 36-38, deep into injury time – our first loss at Waterford since 2002! Hopefully, the lessons of learning to close out a tight game will be remembered, in particular, for those who return in 2021.

At face value, our second-place finish for the second year running can be seen as disappointing, but in looking a little deeper the 2020 team played some excellent rugby and are to be commended. However, we need to be more consistent for longer periods of play, make better decisions and maybe have a little luck when it comes to having key personnel available, if we are to go one better in 2021!

2020 will be remembered for many reasons, far greater than rugby. We are pleased to have had a season when many around the world did not.
