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Extract from the Headmaster's address at Senior School Speech Day.

I am sure we have all thought about this, but less than 12 months ago, if we had a single case of COVID in the State, we went into lockdown and Hale moved to online learning. In January this year we were waiting for the borders to open and for COVID to move through our state. We were all getting vaccinated. We were learning how to use RAT tests – if you were lucky enough to be able to find one of them.

In Term 1 we wore masks everywhere and back then, any positive case or close contact meant you could spend up to two weeks in quarantine. In Term 2, it was a steady revolving door of staff and boys sick with COVID and in isolation for one reason or another - a week at a time for so many of us. Then came Term 3 and everything - masks, talk of vaccines, and even COVID just seemed to go away. Having said that, most households have more RAT tests now than they know what to do with! Looking back over the course of the year though, it seems guite hard to fathom how much has changed and how far we have come.

In spite of COVID, we have had a remarkably successful year. Actually, we have had three successful pandemic years and it's an absolute credit to our staff, our boys and, of course, the support that parents offer us.

So, what do I mean by 'successful'?

 1153 boys from Years 7 to 12 participated in PSA sport, playing 1340 games of sport plus three major carnivals.

- There were 112 debaters this year a remarkable number given how COVID restricted the program this year.
- 4 PSA premierships (basketball, volleyball, hockey, rugby).
- 3 Redfoot productions (nine shows in total) and seven drama showcases
 Charlie and the Chocolate Factory being a highlight with a cast of well over 100 students.
- In Music we saw 55 different concerts, recitals, assemblies and performances – an incredible effort given Music has also been hit hard by COVID.
- 28 providers and 37 different Service Learning activities offered.
- 750 Year 11 and 12 boys and girls enjoyed the Ball this year (with 749 boys and girls catching the flu and COVID afterwards!).
- The Year 10 Conversations started between boys and their Head of House. In line with our new wellbeing strategy, conversations have unfolded

- about the really important things that need to be talked about.
- Success for Haynes House, which won the Cock House Cup – but I suspect nine other houses would not agree with my definition.
- Further development and expansion of the peer mentoring program, connecting the new Year 7 boys with a Year 11 student. That has resulted in 107 Year 10 boys going into Year 11 receiving mentor training at the end of the year.
- It's assumed, but I want to publicly acknowledge that 198 new Year 7 boys successfully entered the secondary school. In a similar way, 201 Year 8 boys successfully fully entered the House Hubs they are the first cohort to do so, and it's been a huge success.
- Terrific career outcomes for our Year 12 boys who leave the School again with outstanding ATAR success and alternative pathway clarity. Median ATAR last year (2021) of 91.85 with







92 boys in the top 10% of the nation is simply extraordinary.

There were approximately 1600 boys who believed me when I said that I needed some help with naming the new swans that I was introducing to the School, to live on Craig Oval, on April Fool's Day earlier this year. I am still wanting to speak with the boy who thought that 'Daddy Dean' could be a good name for that swan!

But as successful as I think this year has been, we will need to be mindful of the resulting trends that might appear because of these rapid and lurching societal movements over the last few years. So, beyond the commentary provided by media outlets, I would like to suggest that inspiring courage in young people may require some additional focus.

The pandemic has demanded that we separate and isolate. The idea that we have all retreated from large groups of people – that we have used masks to separate ourselves socially – could be a reason behind a broader trend: the 'opt-out culture'. The opt-out culture means that people in society more readily avoid the normal opportunities that are presented because they can.

This is an observation from Dr Andrew Fuller, a leading clinical psychologist. Dr Fuller has been working with Hale and it's his research that underpins our new wellbeing framework, launched to the community earlier this term. His views are that if the pandemic has provided more opportunities to opt out of something, then you are robbing young people of the opportunity to gain resilience from failure and confidence from success.

What he is talking about is the regular experiential learning that we all gain from any opportunities or experience that we

participate in. I have talked to this before, but what I think Hale does really well is keeps on providing boys with experiences, every day and every week; as many as we can that are challenging, diverse and interesting. These all go towards supporting the development of really well-rounded and interesting young men.

Now in truth, I don't feel that we have seen an increase in young people at Hale opting out of challenging situations this year, but I do think that there can easily become a culture of less courageous attitudes. What I mean is that the idea of choosing to do something that puts us outside our comfort zone is not something we readily want to do. If Dr Fuller is right, then the pandemic has given us another excuse to opt out by choosing the easier path.

An example might be in public speaking, where in recent years Dr Hindley has worked hard to provide really excellent and additional opportunities for boys to formally speak in public – and yet we only had 27 boys formally engage with that program. This might be a small example where a courageous attitude is waning?

In this post-COVID environment, we are so fortunate to be looking ahead to a return to and expansion of Hale's exchange program – mini exchanges for Year 8 students to the east coast of Australia, and then for full Year 10 exchanges we will see opportunities for boys to live in over 10 different countries. Will there be enough courageous boys who want to apply for and take on these opportunities?

One of the things we all love about living here in Perth is just what a safe and beautiful place it is for families. There can be few better places to live, but I am constantly reminded of the need for Hale to be knowledgeable and have an understanding of the world. That's why I

am really pleased that next year we will see upwards of 400 boys on tours to interstate and international locations; tours that cater for a large range of interests including, but not limited to sport. The exchanges just mentioned will be a terrific additional opportunity.

So, from all of this we must continue to inspire courage in young people and, in our context, that at its simplest is about trying new things, but, more importantly, it's about each and every one of us – adults and students – breaking away from the COVID-induced cautiousness.

As we look back over 2022, I do feel like we have had another very strong year of education – and that's in spite of COVID. We have built on our reputation as being an outstanding school for boys, providing opportunities specifically for boys and knowing how to teach boys. My overriding emotion is one of joy and a sense that I feel so proud to be a part of this Hale community with you all.

It's been six months since my family and I arrived in Perth. I would be lying if I said the settling in period has been seamless. Leaving behind friends and family in the UK, getting settled in a new city, a new job and setting up a new home hasn't been easy. However, it's been made easier by the way the staff and boys have been so generous and welcoming. I rarely get a few steps out of the main Administration building without someone saying hello or stopping to engage with me. After only six months, it's clear to me that there's something very special about Hale.

Recently the staff paid tribute to several teachers who have worked at the School for many years and are now moving on: Ken Moir (39 years), David Bean (38 years), John Wallman (34 years), Eddie Cecins (33 years), Richard Tongue (26 years), Carolyn Furness (24 years) and John Cook (22 years). Collectively they represent 216 years of service to the School. That says a lot about both the character of these teachers and the quality of the School.

Reflecting on his time at Hale in his Valedictory address this year, David Bean said:

"Thirty-eight years in one place must seem incomprehensible to some of you and I am highly aware that the dominant view is that current school leavers will all have five or six – or is it nine or 10 – jobs, multiple workplaces, multiple careers over your lifetime. However, if you get the opportunity to stay in one place, to contribute to one organisation, to be part of achieving its goals, you'll find great satisfaction and know that you are adding value for the long term. Friendships and professional relationships will grow in importance and give meaning and purpose that deepens the satisfaction of work."

When David Bean shared these marvellous words, I was immediately reminded of something I'd read in The Rule of St. Benedict. In the 58th chapter St. Benedict lists the three 'vows' of a Benedictine monk: "...he must promise stability, conversion of his way of life and obedience before God and his saints . . . " Whereas most religious communities take the three traditional vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, the Benedictines have cultivated a unique practice: the vow of stability. Stability is derived from the Latin word *stabilis*, which means to 'stand firm' or be 'rooted'. In a Benedictine context, stability means committing to stay in this monastery with these particular people. It assumes a willingness to look for God here in the constancy of this place and in its rhythm of life, rather than seeking God in ever-changing environments, people and routines.

The notion of stability contrasts sharply with the fragility of most commitments in our society and within it is a great lesson for our

wellbeing. Is it not the case that the perennial temptation for all of us is to think that we'd be happy if only our external circumstances would change? While that may be true in some cases, for the most part happiness does not come from a change without, but from a change within. St Benedict was wise enough to recognise that improved wellbeing was more likely to occur when we make the risky decision to 'bloom where we are planted', to invest ourselves fully in the same prosaic daily tasks and in the people right in front of us – as difficult as they may be sometimes.

In his wonderful book *Beyond the Walls: Monastic Wisdom for Everyday Life*, Paul Wilkes suggests that the vow of stability offers a resting place, but we must not understand stability to mean we can never change. Life is a journey; it will always involve transitions and changes. Stability, Wilkes argues, "is woven of the ability to stay put and yet never lose the desire to go deeper and experience something new."

What a tragedy it would be if our boys were to spend their school years wishing each day away or floating on the surface without experiencing the depths of what Hale has to offer. Through our chapel program, I'm hoping to cultivate the Benedictine skill of stability in our boys. A skill that will ultimately enable them to "live deep and suck all the marrow out of life", as Thoreau so beautifully put it. It's my belief that the more the boys immerse themselves in the people, life, values and rhythms of the School, the more fulfilled and satisfying their journey will be. As David Bean said, they will find meaning and purpose and know that they are adding value for the long term.



JUNIOR SCHOOL

With the redevelopment of Memorial Hall, we were delighted to host Speech Day on Craig Oval, a place where many stories and special moments have been created over the years, not just through sport but also through connections.

Late in the year, our entire school from Pre-Primary through to Year 11 and Hale School staff were all standing side by side on Craig Oval as we flanked our Year 12s for the Valedictory Guard of Honour. We clapped along with them to the quickening beat of the drum before the boys finished with the School War Cry: "....Oh, Hale you beaut!" reinforcing just how quickly the Hale journey unfolds as the young 'cygnet' turns into a 'swan'.

This year, I shared a story with Upper Junior boys titled, The Making of a Bird by Meg McKinlay and Matt Ottley. Whilst the story itself is about a young child building a bird in her room, it is an allegory, in that the story operates on a higher symbolic level. The young child - after investing so much time carefully building such an intricate and delicate bird - opens the window and releases it to fly out into the world, where the child's heart is then "filled with a kind of sadness and a kind of happiness" sadness after investing so much time only to have it fly away from her, and happiness because the bird can take all that it has learned to explore and make its mark in the world. Lam sure many can relate to the feeling of letting go and allowing your boys

How then do we know when to let them fly and soar with mighty wings?

This year we have seen many students leaning into the wind and learning to fly. To encourage this flight, behind them is a team.

Every boy in the Junior School has unique strengths, abilities, passions, values and interests. It is wonderful to see their

individual abilities shine and we acknowledge these throughout the year. But further than this, there is a real sense of magic and power when the boys learn to work together and draw on one another's unique abilities to solve a problem creatively, drawing on different perspectives; help a peer with their understanding of a concept; bring out the best in younger buddies or perhaps a more competent player; intentionally share the ball with a team mate, building their confidence and so lifting a team's overall performance. When this is done well, the boys start to find their wings through an increasing self-esteem, resilience and sense of responsibility.

Our teaching team have also leant on one another's strengths to navigate quite a challenging year. Not only did they have COVID challenges to contend with and a myriad of lengthy and ever-changing government regulations, but our team were also moving through the process of re-registration on top of their normal day-to-day tasks. To our team of teachers, education assistants and administrative staff, you have absolutely earned a good break.

Parents, you too are a special part of the village it takes to build these wings. Over the course of the year, many parents have taken the time to send an email of thanks, a word of encouragement to our team, and have worked openly and collaboratively with us. Many have been understanding and empathetic as we are working through a challenging situation as no two young cygnets are ever the same. You have picked up, dropped off, read to and been read to, organised calendars, listened to frustrations, shared advice and more - all to add strength to the wings. My thanks also to the team of parent representatives and volunteers for the work done to support teaching and learning, and in building relationships.

Craig Oval, the place where we enjoyed Speech Day this year, was named after the Craig family who had many generations of boys attend the

School. Some years ago now, I was teaching a Year 5 class and we arranged for Dr Craig to come and speak with our boys about Hale history. As he spoke his eyes lit up and he recalled many fond memories of his time here. But it is what he said about friendship that resonated and has remained with me ever since. As he concluded, he said, "Now boys, I am about to tell you something very important, so try to listen carefully. I am going to share a very important piece of advice that has taken me a lifetime to learn: You will never have the amount of time in life that you have when you are at school to invest in building your friendships. The bedrock of any solid friendship is shared experiences, and it takes a long time to grow an old friendship. Use your time well, boys."

Dr Craig then went on to say that he lists his Hale School friends as amongst the finest in his life – the type of friendships that stand the test of time, that are supportive, bring joy, laughter and most importantly, where you can be confident to be yourself. But be patient, these may not come immediately, rather they will develop over time. My sincere hope for our boys is that they too, over time, grow fine friendships.

Whilst it has been a year that has again heralded many challenges and hurdles, there has also been plenty of laughter, joy and good learning through experiences. As a Year 2, I recall walking him up to Craig Oval, where we threw down a couple of tennis balls and played a bit of cricket together and shared with him the importance of daring to dream and that with practice, one day you could play a game of cricket on this turf where so many others have played. Eddie, now in Year 10. had remembered that very moment!

It serves to remind us that the little things we do mean a lot and we must not lose sight of the importance of encouraging dreams and believing in one another.

So with teamwork, with friendships and with experience, the swan's wings are strong.

How did Eddie go? In his third game for Hale 1st XI, he chalked up a century, bringing it up with two majestic sixes, one that soared high over the grandstand.

Oh, Hale you beaut! Another swan takes flight.

Our focus this year was on building positive relationships and forging independence as learners. Each morning the boys would enter our Middle Junior Centre with big smiles and warm "Good mornings!" – such a wonderful way to start our day.

Camp

Year 4 Day Camp was a fabulous opportunity for the boys to cement new friendships, participate in team-building activities and enjoy the outdoors. The Outdoor Education team filled the program with rich experiences such as circus skills, kite making, bush art and orienteering. The camp was based around the notion of living sustainably, appreciating and respecting our natural surroundings and being mindful of our environmental footprint. The boys continued to explore and practise this concept throughout the year, tending to our edible garden, composting and recycling at every opportunity. The two-day adventure provided the students with a taste for the camp opportunities on offer in the future and was a highlight of Semester 1.

HASS

A large part of our HASS program this year has been researching, not only the early pioneering days of Australia, but also what life for Indigenous Australians could have been like prior to settlement.

Taking this theme across the curriculum, we also studied the novel *Tom Appleby*, providing an opportunity to explore the events of the past from a young boy's perspective. Crafting daily diary entries as the titular character gave further context to the harsh life of the early settlers.

St Mary's

Late in the year we visited our sister school, St Mary's, to further build on the friendships made in Year 3. The day was split into stations of fun: team-building, quiz games, programming Dash electronic robots and board games being just a few of the activities on offer. It was wonderful to watch the positive interactions, with both girls and boys on their best behaviour.

Book Week

We were lucky enough to have a visit in Book Week from three of the witches from Roald Dahl's book of the same name. Mrs Crofts, Mrs Hinchley and Ms Nissen looked surprisingly realistic in their costumes and the boys were also exceptionally turned out as their favourite book characters.

Science

Year 4s have a special skill: they can spot koonacs! Hiding away in our aquaponics tank this year have been these native West Australian freshwater crustaceans. They have cohabitated with silver perch and provided many opportunities for incidental learning. We have weighed, drawn, researched, fed and observed koonac behaviour. Some students have even been brave enough to hold a koonac for closer study.

As part of our investigation of sustainable practices, we were fortunate to participate in an incursion with Indiaenous auide. Greg Nannup. He explained many of the sustainability practices that the ancient Noongar tribes used. Mr Nannup taught us about the various trees and plants in our own nature play area that Indigenous people used for food, protection, tools and ceremonies. He encouraged us to spread the message of how we too can adopt sustainable practices to care for our environment.

Our studies in the topic of Earth Sciences were enhanced when a paleontologist visited. We participated in many hands-on experiences to develop our understanding of fossils and how information about past times can be found by looking at evidence from the present day. We were able to see first-hand how fossils and rocks are used to demonstrate changes over geological time, whilst weathering and erosion are relatively short-term changes

Lightning Carnivals

Sporting opportunities this year were a highlight for many, with the opportunity to participate in a variety of lightning carnivals. Soccer, AFL, rugby, cricket,

hockey and basketball were on the menu, providing students with the chance to play against participating schools, Scotch College and Christ Church Grammar School. These events were embraced with enthusiasm, team spirit and wonderful sportsmanship, and the parent volunteers on these occasions were greatly appreciated, ensuring all students had a positive experience.

Fri-Yeh

One of our favourite parts of the week is our Friday morning dance session, which we call 'Fri-Yeh'. As soon as the doors open in the morning, bags are popped away and the entire Year 4 cohort gather in the open area to dance and sing to a popular song. There is fabulous energy amongst the boys, with lots of smiles and laughter and some very cool dance moves.

Our learning centre showcased the students' work from the year during our Open Classroom and as 2022 ended, it was time to reflect on the wonderful year that we had all spent together. It has been a magnificent and fulfilling year and we wish the boys all the best with their future endeavours.

The exciting lineup included surfing, archery, team games, a high ropes course, orienteering, cave exploring, scootering, dory boating on the Swan River and yoga.

During Term 2, using their Design and Technology skills and understanding of chemical science, the boys demonstrated their gratitude and love for their mothers by making a lovely gift of lip balm and scrub. They also had an insight into the exciting Science that awaits them as they visited the Senior School Chemistry laboratory

to participate in hands-on experiments.

In English lessons, the boys put their persuasive writing and public speaking skills to excellent effect with many being mentored by Senior School boys and bravely participating in the Public Speaking Festival. Building on their speaking skills, the boys of 5.3 enthralled the audience with their costumes and accents as they performed their class assembly, reenacting the historical events surrounding the colonisation of Australia and recognising the contribution of the First Nations people to our culture and history.

To finish off Term 2 and with residential camps now permitted, many of the Year 5 boys travelled to the Swan Valley Adventure Centre to participate in their first off-site residential experience, the 'Heroes and Villains' themed Music Camp, which culminated in a spectacular performance.

A highlight of Term 3 was an excursion to the Perth Central Business District, where the boys learnt about the impact of the Gold Rush on the Swan River Colony, visiting the Perth Mint and the oldest building in Perth, the old courthouse, where they participated in a mock trial.

5.1 performed their assembly,

which showcased their learning in Personal and Social Development with Mr O'Brien, sharing their character strengths.

Throughout Term 3, they experienced what life was like in Australia during the Gold Rush and were even visited by a notorious bushranger (played by Mr Simpson), who stole money from the young diggers. The unit culminated in a Gold Rush-themed dress-up day where the boys were immersed in traditional activities including damper making, gold panning and bush dancing. A bounty of gold nuggets was even discovered in the nature play area and exchanged for sweet edible gold nuggets (Crunchie chocolate bars!) Furthermore, the boys developed a sense of empathy and shared their understanding of life on the Goldfields by digitally recording monologues from the various perspectives of the different nationalities that made up the melting pot of cultures there. The last day of Term 3 saw 5.2 dazzle the audience with their Gold-themed assembly.

Science lessons involved many hands-on activities exploring their understanding of how light travels. Researching, mind mapping and following the design process resulted in students building a model and explanatory poster to demonstrate their knowledge

during the Light Expo and Learning Journey afternoon.

During Term 4, time was spent collecting and interpreting data and then drafting and refining community designs, considering the wants and needs of people who may live or work there. Collaborating to build their community planning design was an exercise they thoroughly enjoyed.

Immersing themselves in local author Tim Winton's novel, Blueback, the boys experienced the sensations of abalone and developed their understanding of characterisation as they identified with the main character, Abel. In Science, they studied the marvels of our solar system and wrote an informative report comparing and contrasting the planets.

Following on from learning about 'Democracy Down Under', the boys identified their leadership qualities and communicated what their legacy would be as next year's leaders of the Junior School. Throughout the year, the boys had significantly matured and developed their independence, organisation and respect for one another and for the broader members of the Hale community.

more than 60 boys taking up the opportunity to participate in after-school workshops where performance skills are honed.



The teaching and learning of Art in the Junior School in 2022 presented one of the most exciting and innovating years yet. A multitude of creative learning not only took place in the stunning Junior School Art Studio but also in a series of collaborative projects.

These included the Year 6 cohort learning about the <mark>Su</mark>stainable Developm<mark>en</mark>t Goals set up by the United Nations and creating a series of artworks based on Goal number 14: Life Below Water, and Goal number 15: Life on Land. These great pieces of art were showcased in an exhibition involving a number of schools at Herdsman Lake Discovery Centre. Some of the other amazing achievements later in the year included:





Every boy in Year 7 has performed on the Auditorium stage in the Greek plays, whilst also engaging in the incredible music offerings. Watching the opening acts of boys at the Hale Jazz night at Freo Social and the Hale Rock Night at the Rosemount Hotel, the Year 7 musicians shone. Their enjoyment and excitement of performing in these venues were clear. Another highlight of the year was watching the pure joy on the faces of the boys as












































SENIOR SCHOOL

YEARS 8 AND 9

Like every year at Hale, 2022 was action-packed and there was little time for any of us to sit still for too long. The Assistant Heads of House (AHOH) welcomed the Year 8 and 9 boys into the Senior School House Hub areas this year and we have been pleased with their enthusiastic and smooth transition. 2022 was also the first year that we have extended the Character Development curriculum into Year 8 and the boys have engaged very positively with all parts of the program.

The Year 8 and 9 boys hit the ground running at the start of Term 1 and immersed themselves in co-curricular activities such as House and PSA sport, music and drama practices, and the multiple clubs and societies on offer.

This year the boys in Year 8 were also the first to engage in our inaugural Diversity Day during Term 2. House groups explored individual differences in a safe, positive and nurturing environment. It was about our students understanding each other and others in society, and embracing and celebrating the rich dimensions of diversity contained within each individual. Classes were creative with how they immersed themselves in gaining a better understanding of their area by learning a new skill, dance, language, custom and so forth. The day concluded with classes coming together in the Auditorium where nominated boys presented their experiences of the day to the rest of the Year 8 cohort. It was a great success and we look forward to running the day again in 2023

The annual Year 9 ArtsFest, a creative and performing arts festival held over two days in Term 4, was another roaring success. Students engaged with professional artists in the areas of music, drama, visual art, media and dance. They gained an

authentic and practical experience through creative workshops in a selected artistic field such as photography, songwriting, circus skills, filmmaking, textiles, food science, spoken word, sculpture, devising theatre and capoeira. This immersive experience afforded Year 9 students a supportive and encouraging learning environment to appreciate, create and express themselves through the arts.

Outdoor Education is a vital part of the Hale School curriculum, which is focused on personal and social development, critical thinking and management of personal risk. While the boys have an adventure with their mates, they are actually facing new challenges, coming up with solutions and developing life skills like resilience, perseverance and negotiation techniques. All Year 8 and 9 students are lucky enough to be afforded the opportunity to partake in Hale School's Outdoor Education program - Year 8 down at Nannup and Year 9 camp in the North West Cape region. I am confident the Year 8 boys are excited for their final camp next year in Exmouth. It will be the 35th year this flagship program has run and we continue to develop the curriculum embedded in this unique experience. These 14 days of expeditioning provide an opportunity to develop positive relationships with three unique environments (reef, range and gulf), with others and themselves through interaction with the natural world. The School believes these relationships are essential for the wellbeing and sustainability of students, society and our environment. Therefore, Outdoor Education is part of the curriculum just like other learning areas within the School.

The AHOH pastoral care team is an amazing group of individuals, committed to working with students in this age group. I want to take this opportunity to thank them for all they do and their commitment to their students, which goes above

and beyond: Craig Phillis (8.1), Matthew Blake (8.2), Sarah Wilkinson (8.3), Amber Levien (8.4), Trevor Pearse (8.5), Daniel Harvey (8.6), Lisa Woodyard (8.7), Wendy Cormack (8.8) and Heath McCabe (Brine AHOH).

Among the many highlights this year were the two Positive (Year 8) and Respectful (Year 9) Relationships sessions with St Mary's in Terms 2 and 3. These engaging and collaborative sessions are framed with the key message that no matter what kind of relationship - family, friend, peer, boyfriend or girlfriend - it needs good communication, trust, honesty and equality, and that everyone deserves to feel safe and cared for in their relationships with others. Sitting down between girls they don't know is a daunting experience for many boys. These sessions were designed to take the boys out of their comfort zone and encourage real conversations. They were enjoyable afternoons as these discussions evolved. We saw the students genuinely enjoying the opportunity to interact, but realise we need to do more in this space in 2023.

The AHOHs and I look forward to working with the Year 8 students again next year and wish the Year 9 boys well in their chosen courses of study in Year 10 in 2023.



Suddenly the horse becomes restless, tossing her head as the man hears a shrill cry and turns to see a blur of movement on the edge of the fog. His rifle is in his hands. Despite his leg, he moves quickly, silently, years of instincts

The man slows, moving carefully he slips from tree to tree barely making a sound, tactically pursuing his prey. A clearing is ahead. The man sinks into a gully offering him an unobstructed view. He leans over the top of the trench, his rifle forward, the stock pressed firmly against his cheek.

As he looks down the barrel a buck moves into a patch of light near the edge of the clearing. His coat is golden in the morning sun, dew droplets cling to his antlers. The man cocks his rifle, the buck looks up. The man's breathing is slow and controlled, his finger tightening on the smooth trigger, time slows. The buck's eyes are wide and dark and in them the man sees the eyes of many others... He puts the gun down and in silence, it stays.

If one had passed by the house the following morning, perhaps they would have smelt the woodsmoke from a warm fire. Perhaps, the soft music from a bright record would carry to their ears. The ones who will never feel mother nature's warmness


We never appreciated our blessing with Gods fascinating creation

The thought of it withering in our hands transforms us.













down together on Brine Oval, dressing up and enjoying fun games and activities.



COCK HOUSE CUP

House Sport remains one of the great points of difference at Hale School and the 2022 edition of the Cock House Cup will go down as one to remember with the day houses again claiming success. For this year, it was Haynes House that finished on top of the ladder.

The first event on the House Sport calendar was swimming. Buntine won the competition with Riley and Haynes finishing second and third respectively. Buntine set up their win with strong finishes in the DF Poake Trophy for freestyle relays. Other trophies were won by Haynes (backstroke relays), Riley (T Hoad medley relays) and Havelock, which again retained the Pritchard Trophy for breaststroke relays.

The summer House Sport season was something to behold. Witnessing 1200 students

participate across such a wide variety of sports in a three-hour window was magnificent. The relationships fostered between boys in different year groups was evident in every event and the healthy rivalry between houses meant that there was rarely a dull fixture contested. It was clear after a few afternoons that each house had their strengths. At the end of the summer season, Buntine was atop the Cock House ladder ahead of Loton and Haynes.

Summer House Sport quickly turned into winter with Round 1 being the Wednesday before the Term 1 holidays. It was also great to see the willingness of our senior students to officiate the junior games, which was another example of boundaries being broken down across year groups. After five preliminary rounds, the

finals were contested on a perfect afternoon in Term 2. The boarders, true to form, were competitive in the sports of football, touch and hockey, but at the end of the winter program and despite the boarders' fightback, Buntine was still on top of the Cock House, above Haynes and Loton, with only two events left on the calendar: cross country and athletics.

Just when we thought the Cock House might be a foregone conclusion, House Cross Country added another layer of drama. The event again took place in superb conditions with over 1000 students tackling the challenging three-kilometre course. The final results saw the two boarding houses take out the top spots with Faulkner claiming the Challenge Cup for the overall champion house for cross country. Cock

House leaders Buntine finished in sixth position, which saw their lead narrow significantly to Haynes, making for an exciting conclusion at the Interhouse Athletics Carnival.

The weather gods again shined on Hale with beautiful sunshine as the battle for Cock House supremacy played out on Craig Oval. The day showed House Sport at its best with mass participation blending with a determination from each boy to maximise his performance to give his house the best chance of success.

At the end of the day's events it was Haynes House that claimed the mantle as House Athletics Champions and, as a result, took out the Cock House Cup for the first time since 1988.

This year's **Visual Art Contest** required each team to produce a unique cushioned seat that is both eye-catching and thought-provoking. The lawn next to the Art Department was a buzz on the day with all teams creating, drawing and painting. With only two-and-a-half hours to work, each house produced remarkable pieces that clearly reflected their inspirations. Congratulations to Wilson House for placing first, with Buntine and then Parry following in second and third places.

The inaugural House **Philosothon** took place in two rooms with a representative from each house contributing to the discussion topic of 'War is immoral'. The boys involved had 45 minutes to demonstrate their critical, creative and collaborative thinking skills. These interesting and meaningful discussions were video recorded and placed online for the Hale community to watch. After careful consideration, Tregonning scored the top mark, followed by Loton and then Havelock.

The **Ideation Pitch** competition required two students from each house to create and present a 60 to 90-second elevator pitch to persuade a new boy to join their house. This brief brought out the best feature of every house in their

presentations. Well done to all boys who presented their house in such a convincing manner. In third place was Haynes, second was Wilson and first was Buntine.

Teams of four to six students from each house were tasked to create and produce a short scene of one to two minutes for the Short Film Festival on the topic of 'House'. This project ignited some varied and interesting ideas that were cleverly written, acted, directed, filmed and edited. All films were uploaded to a platform where our entire school community was able to watch them throughout the week. Students were invited to vote for their top three favourite films to determine the People's Choice Award. Special congratulations to Parry House, which was placed first by the official adjudicators, as well as awarded the inaugural Short Film People's Choice Award. Second place went to Wilson and third place to Riley.

Battle of the Bands presented us with an excellent opportunity to video and audio record each House Band performance. An album of the 10 tracks was created and released for the school community to listen to and vote for their top three favourite song performances, determining the People's Choice Award. The quality of performances was outstanding, with each band relishing the recording experience. In the end, the adjudicators placed Parry in first place with their performance of Brandy, You're a Fine Girl, followed by Riley performing Kryptonite in second and Loton with What You Know in third place. 

2022 was the dawn of a new era for Haynes House as Ms Feutrill took over the reins after more than a decade of Mr Cook's leadership as Head of House. Additionally, we were able to raise a total of \$1476 for our house charity, One Girl, thanks to the generous donations from boys, parents and friends of the House.

Despite our great successes, it was the camaraderie and passion both on the field and in everyday Haynes life that made the year one to remember. The year ran smoothly thanks to the immense support from Ms Feutrill and Mr Blake, who genuinely care about every Haynes boy. Hopefully this is only the beginning of a successful dynasty for Haynes House.






























co-curricular activity. This year's debaters were led by Captain of Debating, Akash Tharakan and his Vice-Captain, Abhilash Dhruva. The year began with the largest competition of them all, the West Australian Debating League (WADL). Encouragingly, this was the only online competition debated this year and while it proved to be challenging to maintain momentum in an online forum, the debates offered boys an opportunity to develop arguments, fine-tune their verbal and non-verbal skills, and overcome their fear of public speaking. Hale School had two teams progress to the final series in Term 3. Congratulations to Novice Hale 6 and Senior Hale 1.

The Association of Heads of Independent Schools (AHISA) debating competition saw the return of face-to-face debating. Held in Term 3 at Perth College, it is often a fast and furious competition run over five consecutive weeks. Many students find this weekly debating competition challenging; however, it provides debaters with opportunities to polish and perfect their arguments, to work to a timeline and to communicate well with their teammates. In this round-robin competition that included five straight rounds and no finals, Hale School had two teams win their division, Novice Hale 8 and Senior Hale 1.

House Debating proved to be a popular contributor to the Cock House Cup in 2022. House teams debated some thought-provoking topics that were presented as either normative or empirical debates. Congratulations to Meade House for winning the contest.

The closing competition for the year was the British Parliamentary (BP) debating competition. The seven teams entered were required to display a sound knowledge of current affairs and provide a deep analysis of the topics.

Thank you to the team of coaches at Hale School - your willingness to support and help prepare your teams is reflected in the positive feedback I often receive from the adjudicators. Thank you more specifically to the Hale debaters and parents for your enthusiasm and encouragement of one another. Debating is a wonderful activity that helps students grow in confidence. MATHEMATICS ENRICHMENT CLUB

Over 40 boys from Years 7 to 10 participated in various mathematical challenges and activities this year. We met every week, with Years 9 and 10 meeting before school on Wednesdays and Years 7 and 8 meeting after school on Thursdays.

In Term 1, 16 students took part in the Maths Challenge run by the Australian Mathematics Trust (AMT). Chenghan Lei (Year 8) achieved a High Distinction in the Junior division.

In Term 2, we entered 11 teams into the Have Sum Fun Online competition, in which each team of four competed with schools from across the State. Our team consisting of Ayodeji Oyenaike, Will Rigg, James Spiro and Viha Warusawithana won the Year 9 competition. We also performed strongly in the Year 7 (third), Year 8 (fourth) and Year 10 (second) competitions.

In Term 3, 258 students participated in the Australian Mathematics Competition, which returned some outstanding individual results. Aidan Kwa (Year 8) performed extremely well and was awarded a prize, which placed him in the top 0.3% of all Year 8 candidates in WA. In addition, 29 boys were awarded High Distinctions and 98 were awarded Distinctions.

In Term 3, rescheduled from a COVID-affected Term 1, Hale hosted the Senior Have Sum Fun competition (Years 11 and 12) where teams of six competed in a fast-paced quiz against other schools. Both Hale teams performed well on the night, scoring 32 and 31 (out of 32), but missed out on a top three place on tie-breakers. Three weeks later we also had strong results in the Junior and Intermediate competitions, placing an excellent second and seventh place respectively.

Also in Term 3, 20 Year 8 boys joined a group from St Mary's in the annual Maths Camp at Ern Halliday Recreation Camp. It was a fantastic opportunity for mathematically-talented people to share ideas and experiences with other like-minded students.

On top of his AMC High
Distinction, Eric Xia (Year 10)
was invited to sit the Australian
Mathematics Olympiad
Committee (AMOC) Senior
Contest and achieved a Bronze
Award. This puts him in the top

As usual, the trials were serious with a hint of humour: a case of stolen toilet paper, a dispute over the ownership of a suddenly valuable Nissan Leaf, and a charge against someone creating anxiety on a train after pretending he had COVID-19.

With the qualifying rounds not being completed until the end of Term 3. finals were not held.

In 2023 we will lose a group of very successful Year 12 competitors. However, judging by the enthusiasm and strategic minds of the Year 10s and 11s, we are in a healthy position going forward.

PHILOSOPHY CLUB

Philosophy Club offers Hale boys a safe forum where meeting and discussing topical philosophical and culturallyrelevant themes in a rational and reflective manner are encouraged. Critical evaluation of ideas is promoted in a community of inquiry setting.

Philosophy Club was promoted with enthusiasm by the effervescent Captain of Philosophy, Thomas Morkell. The thrice-weekly discussions were enjoyed by boys from a range of year groups, led by Mr Tongue, Mr Lamotte and Mr Hodnett

One highlight was a staff and student debate held in the lecture theatre exploring the appropriateness of a portrait of John Bussell that had been hanging in the School's reception foyer alongside past Headmasters. Bussell is said to have played a role in the massacre of dozens of Waadandi Noongar people in 1841. Once the School realised his family's link to this atrocity and investigated his role - to discover, furthermore, that he was not actually a former Headmaster at Hale - his portrait was removed. While all present agreed that such a divisive character should not be revered, there was insightful debate about the need to reflect on history and how best to go about that. Philosophy Club teaches boys to discuss sensitive issues like this in a calm, respectful, but critical manner

A pleasing aspect of Philosophy Club this year was Tom's ability to liaise with the Junior School and encourage senior boys to be rostered to go down and run community-of-inquiry discussions with younger boys. Hale entered teams for the annual state Philosothon tournament held at UWA, as well as the Ethics Olympiad competition. The latter was conducted remotely via video conferencing and involved interstate and international teams. This year Evan Cheng (Year 11) placed third in his respective age division at the state tournament.

The only disappointing feature this year was the late cancellation of our annual Philosopher in Residence. Unfortunately, Dr Suzy Killmister, from Monash University, had contracted COVID-19.

Subi Thomas is to be congratulated for taking part in the state and national finals of the Plain English Speaking Award and was presented with the Perpetual Shield to proudly display at school.

The Rotary Speaking Test held in Term 3, requires competitors to speak on a topic of their choice incorporating the guiding principles of Rotary: Is it fair and truthful? Will it build goodwill and be beneficial to all concerned? Digby House and Xavier Torre spoke with conviction around their perception of the need for women to be treated equally and inclusively in the diverse fields of competitive sport and health.

The Royal Commonwealth Society Speech and Leadership Contest is open to all students in Years 9 to 12 throughout WA. Our school was ably represented by Abhilash Dhruva, the Encouragement Award recipient for both leadership and public speaking; Keshav Dhruva, Sean Dolan and winner of the Public Speaking section, Digby House.

The United Nations Youth Australia Evatt competition is modelled on the UN Security Council. Students work in pairs to represent their member country, aiming to provide a voice for change when speaking on and campaigning for resolutions up for debate. This competition is woven into the fibre of the Public Speaking Club, with many students working together with their partners over several years to hone their diplomatic skills in this immersive experience. OUTDOOR EDUCATION

It seems that in the last five years, every time we think things could not become any more convoluted, our belief is challenged and our metric re-evaluated. 2022 began a little like 2020 with the threat of camp cancellations due to the next wave of COVID – and that is exactly what occurred.

Years 5, 6 and 7 camps became a series of day activities based around Perth. The various coordinators scrambled to build contingency programs while trying to secure suitable sites and facilities. This was hampered somewhat by the fact that every other school had exactly the same idea. What made our lives a little easier at Hale is that we are extremely fortunate to have our very own facility in Cygnet Hall (the rowing shed) at Matilda Bay, which was an ideal and well-appointed place for running water-based activities on the Swan River, as well having close proximity to Kings Park and the river foreshore.

The ever-versatile dory was refurbished, row locks removed, paddles in place of oars, mast stepped, sails fitted and furled, and motor mounted. "Hunky", as she is known, then ventured out from Cygnet Hall and across the river to Waylen Bay where the Year 5 students scrambled to corral giant jellyfish before reboarding for their continued journey to Nedlands jetty. Meanwhile, another scootermounted group wound their way around the Nedlands foreshore for a lunchtime rendezvous and swap. It was perhaps unsurprising on these non-motored scooters how many students struggled with the physical demand of pounding the pavement to propel themselves.

For the Year 6 and Year 7 boys, the experience was similar, though adjusted upwards to suit their age and ability. Hunky was sailed for a full day expedition down to East Fremantle, the scooters were replaced with mountain bikes and the subsequent journey ventured up into Kings Park. The small group games were replaced by a day at Dismantle where the Year 7 boys learned about simple bike mechanics. There was also the opportunity for them to have a go at rowing small training boats and then quads under the careful eye and tutelage of some of Hale's own rowing coaches. With a bit of luck, this may transfer into crews of future oarsmen.

The old adage that "every cloud has a silver lining" was never more aptly applied. In the limitations brought upon us by COVID to remain inside the Perth-Peel bubble, we were forced to look into our own backyard for adventure. The irony is not lost on us that so often as we venture away from Perth for a getaway experience, a coachload of students from our destination town passes us en route as they seek the same in the other direction. Their getaway destination is the same one we have just escaped. We all seem to be in the belief that we must go further afield to find our adventure. How lucky are we then to live in such an amazing city with so much to offer, from a thriving healthy river to hills full of mountain bike trails and inner-city gardens. The start of our outdoor year certainly gave us a fresh view of how much there is to enjoy and experience on our doorstep.

At the other end of the scale and state, despite the threat of another delayed start, the Year 9 Exmouth program began on time as planned. That proved to be the most minor of hurdles.

The Exmouth house had been modified to allow the back half to be blocked off as an isolation ward in the event of an infectious disease outbreak. As we entered Camp 2, we found ourselves with four COVID-positive cases, including two staff and two students. Unfortunately, our plan to drive infected students to Carnarvon to meet parents came unravelled as our required support staff were also suddenly halved.

The three-week break was indeed a welcome buffer before the second half of the Exmouth program, but if we'd thought the worst was behind us, there was more to come. The Department of Parks and Wildlife initiated a prescribed burn across Cape Range, ruling out any possibility of Camp 3 students undertaking the usual walk, climbing and abseiling, or even any of our established contingency walks. Once again, we scrambled to establish an alternative program, this time along the foothills of the range.

2022 has been no less challenging than its recent predecessors. We look forward to a time when the dust settles on all of the developments around Hale School and we can finally enjoy a year of consolidation.

SERVICE LEARNING

During interviews for a Year 11 Service Learning program, some Year 10 boys were posed questions about their suitability for the program, their interpretation of life when living with disability and why they think service learning is important. The responses were, at times, profound and inspiring. Examples include:

"I am blessed!"

"You need to be authentic – Don't put a face on for other people!"

"Always listen - two ways!"

"It would be selfish not to get involved!"

"Don't rush – give guidance where necessary!"

"Elevate others!"

"See it through!"

"Share common ground!"

Whilst soaking in these responses from our young men, I reflected on the positive influences in their lives that have led them to respond in such a genuine manner: family, community, faith, commitment and service. In witnessing these young men serve others men for others

The phrase "men for others" was coined by Fr. Pedro Arrupe, a Jesuit priest. Jesuits are a religious order founded by Ignatius of Loyola. Ignatius says that love needs to express itself in deeds more than words; to look not simply at what we have learned but, rather, who we become. The goal is to become companions and neighbours to those in need. This makes us "men and women for and with others."

Every time we recite the Hale School Prayer, penned by St Igantius, we are called upon to be men for others. Clearly, Hale School believes that service is integral to our students' education. These words are chosen to not just encourage but demand of us to be respectful, resilient and responsible.

Once again this year, the students have been able to put their words into action through our Service Learning program. When our students visit Mount Hawthorn Education Support Centre every Thursday, they gain new and different perspectives around communication, selflessness and flexibility when learning to interact with students with disabilities.

During the winter season, the arrival of our Year 11 students at the Wembley Integrated Football training session is met with excitement as the team exclaim, "Yay, it's the Hale boys!" Our students are simply joining in training, running some drills, having a scratch match, and generally larking about. However, what makes the training special is that our students are joining this community to display that we value that community, and the Wembley players open their arms wide and accept us every week.

'Walking the talk' is much easier said than done. Many are gifted with eloquence and can wax lyrical about the benefits of serving others. In reality, it can be challenging, especially when communication barriers limit interactions. Our students are committed in so many facets of the School, so finding time to commit to service learning can be difficult and a balancing act. This includes missing lunch, giving up free time after school and interrupting study plans. To give up your lunchtime to spend time with an aged care resident who enjoys intergenerational activities and chats each week is a sign of dedication and a desire to live a life of action.

In 2022, our Service Learning program sprung back to life as the COVID regulations eased. With 37 different service learning activities taking place on a weekly or fortnightly basis – which includes 28 different community organisations and charities – we are proud that our students have a positive influence within and outside the Hale School grounds. We are pleased that service learning is embedded into the fabric of the School where we can live our School Prayer, "to give and not to count the cost".



















HALE INSTITUTE

As a school that is invested in research, Hale has continued to initiate and participate in a range of research studies throughout the year. The benefits of this commitment to research have been shown to include an enhancement in whole-school professional development whilst supporting an improved professional culture. They also allow for evidence-informed decisions to provide guidance for the School on the latest developments and innovative ideas.

The Hale Institute has directly supported this investment in research through assistance for colleagues to undertake their own research. The completion of the Innovation Scholarship by Junior School Teacher, Louise Kennedy and her subsequent action research project is an example of this research-focused investment. This project incorporated a study into the benefits of using technology to foster collaboration and improve student understanding. Using the medium of digital storytelling through a project that investigates the migrant experience, Louise was able to incorporate various technologies in conjunction with collaborative activities from students and staff across all sub-schools. The project culminated in an impressive final presentation that demonstrated a blend of technology with personal storytelling to produce an enhanced and refined finished production with visible engagement and deep knowledge from the participating students.

The Hale Institute partnership with Curtin University to facilitate research projects for advanced teachers was launched this year with some impressive interim results from this initiative. Director of Teaching and Learning, Andrew Manley is currently researching the domain of instructional leadership with existing evidence demonstrating that high-quality leadership within an educational organisation contributes significantly to the overall

progression of a school and of student learning outcomes. His investigation will closely examine the theories of leadership within the context of a school, factors that contribute to the importance and efforts of instructional leadership, and the professional development requirements for academic leaders to succeed at Hale

Concurrently, Assistant Head of Brine House, Heath McCabe is designing an action research study with the brief of improving academic engagement in boarding students. His research will investigate numerous aspects including the effective use of student preparation time, motivation of boarding students and the academic outcomes of these students. The action research will incorporate planned changes to existing processes with new strategies and focus areas implemented as part of the study. Desired results include improvements in effective study time, an increase in self-regulated behaviour and improved academic outcomes. We are excited to see the results from these two research projects and share the findings with the School and wider community.


With a continued global focus on enterprise skills to meet future demands. the Hale Institute has provided multiple opportunities for students to learn, develop and implement these valuable skills in a variety of contexts. This year, new initiatives such as the Youth Innovation Think Tank, Future of Travel Design Challenge and the Arts Cup Ideation Pitch complemented the existing programs available to students. A highlight of 2022 was the Hale58 Academy - Shark Tank eSchool program completed by Year 10 students from Hale School and St Mary's Anglican Girls' School throughout Term 3. This extracurricular activity is designed to develop an entrepreneurial mindset and innovative thinking through a project-based learning program that includes an entrepreneurial process. Students identified real-world problems

and then generated a solution to these challenges. They then designed and tested a prototype, built a business model to support their concept, and finally pitched this idea to a judging panel.

An impressive, high standard of pitch presentations was displayed with two groups progressing through to the semi-final stage of the program. Team 'Future Plan' led by Stefan Helberg, Daniel Popovic and Max Winton proposed their concept of an online marketplace for high school students to connect with university students and people in jobs to gain a better understanding of the career they are considering. Their online solution includes interactive profiling quizzes, chat forums and online connections to a wide range of industries to better inform future career choices and reduce the confusion that young people face when embarking on a new profession. Team 'Crop Sentinel' comprising of Thomas Carter, Louis Kilminster and Stephen Vitsas envisioned a multi-purpose internet of things (IOT) system to improve weed control in agriculture whilst combating crop resistance. With a farming target market in mind, their proposal will aim to reduce the costs of chemical use, provide a consumer insight into farming activities whilst improving overall efficiency. We look forward to seeing the progress of these groups in the next stage of the program.

Our year began with the wonderfully whimsical musical production of *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*. Sold-out audiences fell in love with quirky characters like the ensemble of bubbly and gleeful Oompa-Loompas, Jack Hadlow's rendition of Grandpa Joe and Harry Grove's hilarious Augustus Gloop. Under the guidance and leadership of Mrs Belinda Massey and Mrs Su-Lyn Chong, our cast and crew continued to pull through the changing circumstances and uncertainty, singing the line of the play, "Making something out of nothing" every chance they got.

The new production of *Sherlock Holmes: A Radio Mystery*, showed further success in the creativity and imagination of Redfoot. Staged in the John Cruickshank Lecture Theatre, this new performance type harnessed the talents of guest artist Scott McCardle to teach our actors to create immersive and inventive soundscapes in front of our enraptured audience's eyes and ears. In a series of nuanced improvisation and group-based challenges, the brilliance of the 'Dean's Disciples' team saw Hale take first place for the first time ever!

Throughout the year we were very lucky to take part in new Redfoot masterclasses. They featured guests like Perth-based actor Brendan Hansen – who showed students new avenues of acting through song and creating grounded, engaging musical performances – and performer and lecturer Caitlin Beresford-Ord, who inspired a new love for Shakespeare in our students by teaching them about sub-texts and symbolism.

Redfoot collaborated with the Media Club this year to create *The Vampire Club*, a dark and mysterious short film created from the ground up by students at Hale. This project allowed students to hone new and unfamiliar skills in working on a filmstyle production set. After re-shoots and re-edits, the film's audiences were finally able to appreciate the creativity and hilarity of the successful final product in the latter half of the year.

The abundant creativity of our Drama students continued to shine beyond Redfoot and Media in curriculum-based performances such as the Year 7 Drama night, which saw Middle School Drama students taking to the stage

to recount iconic historical moments with humour and wit. The Year 9 to 11s performance night showcased the range of talents of our senior students, tasked with performing complex, absurdist monologues and brilliantly reimagining Shakespearean texts. SPORT WRAP





The 2021-22 summer PSA season was one full of highlights and excitement for the Hale boys. Despite the everpresent threat of COVID, which forced the reduction in any significant touring plans, the season itself remained uninterrupted. Boys flocked to Hale sport as they have always done, with our fields full of the double blue six days a week. Our Year 7 cohort proved

a talented bunch over the course of the

year with an even distribution of success

and smiles across all teams and grades.

The two highlights of the summer season were no doubt our 1sts basketball and volleyball teams. While both teams may not have suffered defeat, they fought through their own difficulties on the way to the top. Both teams lost significant personnel throughout the campaign with captains Alex Condon (basketball) and Ben Farley (volleyball) departing for the Australian Institute of Sport halfway through the season. It was a credit to the depth of talent that the teams remained undefeated in Term 1.

It was a dramatic four days in the Hale sporting calendar when both the Head of the River and PSA Swimming Carnival were brought forward as COVID began spreading across Perth in late February.

Our 1st VIII had their sights set on victory after winning the previous two races but a lightning start by Christ Church Grammar School proved too hard to run down in the last section of the race. Nevertheless, second place by only a few seconds was a fantastic achievement by a group of boys who have dedicated themselves to the art and craft of rowing for many years.

Only three nights later, our swim team took to HBF stadium with only modest expectations. Those expectations were proven to be too low as our boys won two of the first three races and held the competition lead for the first half of the program. The Christ Church juggernaut clawed their way back in the second half of the meet, leaving Hale in second place, a significant improvement from our 2021 third place finish.

Our senior water polo, tennis and cricket teams also had their fair share

of memorable results. While top two finishes evaded these codes, the progress throughout the year was noticeable. This was most evident in cricket where after a slow start, which saw the 1st XI lose their first four games, they struck a strong patch of form to win six of their next eight fixtures with Jack Foster topping the PSA competition with runs scored (640 runs).

As the weather became cooler and the various goalposts were erected, footballs of all sorts marked the commencement of our winter season. It was a wet and windy season that seemed to get colder as the months progressed.

The one sport to avoid the weather, badminton, had another strong season. Every team won more games than they lost and community events such as the parent-son match and the St Mary's afternoon gave the boys the best opportunity to make the most of their badminton experiences. Our 1st team had a solid season, finishing in third place. They played some nail-biting fixtures against both Christ Church and Wesley, who were the eventual joint premiers.

Our cross country team continued to make solid progress, recording a very respectable fourth place in the competition. The highlight of the season was no doubt their second place finish in the All Schools event at Guildford. The strength of our younger runners made a real difference as the season progressed, with bright things ahead for the future.

AFL continued to be the largest sport at Hale with 400 students taking part from Years 7 to 12. Like previous seasons, talent was plentiful and the culture of the sport at Hale continues to show through each weekend. The 7As, 2nds, 3rds, 10As and 9Cs all only saw defeat once this season with many memorable fixtures. The 1st XVIII started the season brilliantly, winning five of their first six fixtures to be on top of the ladder. The second half of the season wasn't as kind as they slipped to third position.

Hale hockey had another magnificent year with our 1st XI retaining the Ray House Cup from 2021 by finishing on top of the ladder with Christ Church Grammar. Both

fixtures against Christ Church were great games of schoolboy hockey with neither team able to get the better of the other. Down the age groups is an enormous amount of talent with every team at Hale scoring more goals than they conceded over the course of the season.

It had been six years since our 1st XV rugby team had last held the Brother Redmond Cup but 2022 was to be the year that ended that hoodoo after the team won all its fixtures. There were some tricky games along the way but strong leadership at the top and stern resilience from other team members ensured no obstacle was too hard to overcome. Our 10/11 shield team, 8/9A and 7A team also had excellent seasons with exciting rugby being played whenever they donned the double blue.

Finally, our soccer program continued to thrive against stern competition. The 9As were the sole team to go through undefeated, which augers well for our senior teams over the next few years, while our 8C, 7A, 8A and 3rd XI only lost two games. The season of the 1st XI was one of grit and determination. Despite not being the best side on paper, they improved every week and were able to grind out results based on sheer effort and determination. With two rounds to go, they were in the box seat to win the competition, but were unable to overcome a spirited Scotch team in Round 11.

The final stop of the Hale sporting calendar was PSA Athletics at the end of Term 3. Hale finished third for the second year in a row, but it was the last few races of the day that proved to be the highlight for the boys in blue. Hale won three of the six 4x100m relay races (U13, U16 and Open), with all of these victories breaking PSA records. Quite a phenomenal way to finish the carnival.

Overall, it was another busy and productive season, which saw the boys learn and grow from being involved in Hale sport.


win this game, however, Trinity's strong swimming got the better of us. We ended the Term 1 season with three wins and three losses. Overall, five wins and seven losses, similar last year.



We hit the ground running (literally) with the tough challenge we set ourselves for the 2022 season: to better our position of fourth place from 2021.

Despite the water being heavy in the shoes from two river sections, everyone survived and Hale's runners combined well against a rejuvenated Guildford unit, taking the win for 4 competition points. Establishing a high morale early carries through the rest of the season, so round 1 was a good tonic for the many tough fixtures ahead.

The rest of the home-and-away season had its ups and downs with the challenges of COVID-19 still lingering. Taking this in their stride, the boys ran hard to pull off some stunning bonus-point results against Wesley and Christ Church, and big wins against Trinity and Scotch College in rounds 5 and 6. These fixtures saw some notable runs by many boys, including Noah Humberston (Year 10), Zac Bryan (Year 11) and Juniors in the form of Cooper Bennett (Year 8), Ben Pidgeon and Keegan Dos Santos (both Year 7).

Training hard through May and June set the boys up for strong performances in the All Schools events. These races involve all PSA schools competing in both relay and traditional 'open race' cross country events, with more than 150 runners competing. Although they can seem chaotic, these races are very exciting and can often decide the season's placeholders in terms

This segment of the season is a great demonstration of the sportsmanship within cross country as runners from different schools greet each other with alacrity during warmups, spur each other on during races, and often warm down together. As the mid-year holidays loomed, we found ourselves nursing many injured or sick runners, so we only had a skeleton squad of 16 at the Aquinas College 3km race in Week 10. This was our lowest ebb of the season, finishing a stony seventh place and dropping quickly down the rankings. Coming back recuperated from the holiday break, however, the team achieved the zenith of its season with an outstanding second place in the All Schools 5km event at Guildford, with strong performances from Year 12s Josh Hantke, Charlie Turner and Amazis Salama, ably abetted by Year 11s Stefan Madden, Connor Kinchin and Tom Alexander. We maintained the rage with an array of third place finishes for the remaining fixtures, just falling short of catching a faltering Wesley College for a podium position for the entire season.



The 2022 1st XVIII squad was an immensely talented group and although it didn't produce another Alcock Cup, we can all be extremely proud of what was achieved in a challenging year.

Planning for our 2022 campaign focused on three key initiatives, including the selection of a larger squad to contend with the potential of further COVID-19 disruption. We played 36 boys, which included 20 debutants. We also adopted a high-possession style game plan to control and improve ball movement, along with a stronger teamwork mindset.

Convincing wins across our first three fixtures established early confidence in the game plan and showed the competition that Hale was a serious contender for the Alcock Cup. Despite 10 debutants in Round 1, our exciting team connection and ball movement produced an 88-point win over Guildford. The return of Darcy Redman after 20 months rehabilitating from ACL surgery inspired us all, but, regrettably, Darcy broke a collarbone and would not return until Round 10. Our unselfish game style delivered a 96-point win against Wesley in our second contest - our most complete game for the year. Our ability to control the game and establish scoreboard pressure over four quarters secured us our third win a week later over arch-rivals Aquinas by 30 points.

The next three games took us into the mid-year break with a 5-1 win-loss record, but we suffered terrible injuries that would

challenge us for the remaining rounds. The PSA Indigenous Round was celebrated on Craig Oval against Trinity with the team proudly wearing a guernsey designed by Conrad Williams and Chargo Loberio. We led at every change and held off a late charge by Trinity to enjoy a strong win; however, we suffered more long-term injuries to our backline. Scotch tested us in Round 6 with its strong defensive pressure. We were unable to get the game on our terms at any point throughout the contest and we conceded by 37 points. We bounced back the following week against Christ Church with a 12-point win and a good team performance. A highlight was the resilience of a new-look backline, which responded well to the opponent's repeat threats.

Persistent poor weather over the next three rounds tested our skills and ability to adapt to the conditions. Guildford, hungry for its first win in 2022, challenged us in Round 8 at home. It was a hard-fought win for Hale with our forwards capitalising on defensive rebounds, which was a game feature. A strong first half the following week against an improved Wesley side put us in front at half time by 3 points, but a determined Wesley performed better in the wet conditions to win by 37 points. Skill errors cost us a win the following week in atrocious conditions at home against Aquinas, who capitalised on an unusually high 83 turnovers for the game, which was stopped before full-time due to a lightning storm.

Our inconsistency and the emergence of competition benchmarks Scotch and Wesley threatened our assault for the Alcock Cup, but we were intent on asserting our competitiveness in the final three rounds. Our four-quarter performance against Trinity in Round 12 produced a convincing win, doubling Trinity's score (57-114). This was an important result to rebuild team confidence before the encounter with competition favourites Scotch. The Scotch game at home the following week lived up to expectations and was a great contest. Neither team had scoreboard ascendancy at any of the quarter breaks, but Scotch used a last quarter wind advantage well, which was difficult to defend, to win by 28. Our final fixture against Christ Church was the most physical game of the year with a very determined opponent taking every opportunity to pressure the contest. Christ Church's centre clearances and early scoreboard pressure fuelled the opponent's confidence, which escalated throughout the game. Hale remained disciplined, but we were unable to reverse the momentum of the game, resulting in Christ Church winning by 47 points.

A powerful first half of the season positioned Hale at the top of the competition, but regrettably we were unable to maintain our command for the Alcock Cup, finishing a respectful third behind Scotch and Wesley. Although we didn't get the prize we desired, we can

MR DAVID BEAN

David Bean concluded his formal career as an educator at the end of 2022. Over 38 years he has touched the lives of so many boys, parents and staff in a way that has been life changing for us all. In turn, this has allowed them to make an even greater and more profound contribution to our society.

The values that David Bean represents are the values of this school and mean that there are many men in the world now making good decisions for our society at a time when there are sometimes few external markers to guide people to do the right thing. Indeed, so many people who have been touched by David feel they have made good decisions as a consequence of simply knowing him.

David Bean's legacy will continue because of his work in these areas:

1. As an educator.

David has been an outstanding teacher of Literature and English for 38 years.

Awarded a Rhodes Scholarship in 1976, David may be one of the few Scholars to become a school teacher.

David has provided outstanding teaching to students at this school. Old Boys speak of David's passion for his subject, brilliance in his understanding, and willingness to do anything he can to support.

David has mentored hundreds of students to apply successfully to universities, for scholarships and postgraduate places all over the world.

2. As an educational leader.

Perhaps not surprisingly, David has had many leadership roles at Hale, none more signficant than Deputy Headmaster and his most recent combined role of Director of Curriculum. In this latter role, David has masterminded, role-modelled and compelled the School to equip itself with the very best programs and staff. This has resulted in Hale consistently being one of the highest-performing academic schools in WA and Australia.

David's role in Hale's cultural change from a traditional boys' school to one that embraces the arts cannot be underestimated. While successive Headmasters have come and gone, it's David's steady hand and broader understanding of the value of the arts that have ensured boys from Hale receive the broadest of educations. In any normal year now, there are over 700 boys taking music tuition, as well as eight different performing arts productions. The design and construction of key buildings to support these programs are also a result of David's work.

Another area of the School where David has provided significant leadership is in the library. In a time where many schools have moved to 'learning hubs' and 'information resource centres', David has championed the importance of books.

3. Indigenous affairs.

At the beginning of 1997, David commenced the groundwork to establish an Indigenous Scholarship program at Hale School. David believed Hale should provide opportunities for Indigenous boys to experience a first-class education, broad co-curricular activities, quality pastoral care, leadership skills and mentoring. Before the program commenced, David forged a strong relationship with the Warmun community and took Hale boys on cross-cultural training courses in the Kimberley, spending time walking the land with Elders.

Since the program began, there have been well over 100 Indigenous students who have attended Hale, moving onto further study or traineeships. Hale has seen its

Indigenous graduates become teachers, doctors, artists and businessmen.

The program that David has developed remains a proud element of Hale School and has taught all students, their families and staff much about the culture of our First People.

Perhaps of most significance is that David – because of his service to the communities in the north – received a 'skin name'. He is a *Gnang-gala* man.

4. In rowing.

David's association with rowing has endured for over 50 years as an athlete, coach, administrator, publicist and mentor. David has coached Hale crews for 38 consecutive years.

In the Hale boat shed, David is a muchloved figure, providing guidance and mentoring in a wise and gentle manner, often encouraging and enabling boys who want to further their rowing to join clubs through the off-season and to see rowing as a lifelong sport.

So in conclusion, Mr David Bean has demonstrated extraordinary service to young people at Hale School.

David's view on humanity is one of positivity: he believes every person has a contribution to make and always sees the best in people. David turns negative conversations into positive ones and never, ever talks poorly about another person.

David is an unassuming and modest man, who has enjoyed a varied career at Hale School with now four different Headmasters over 35 years. As Deputy Headmaster, it is he who has carried the culture of the School and ensured it has been passed correctly and approprialy from one to the next. It is David who has done so much to ensure this school has become what it is today.

What defines Eddie's teaching career is the fact that he does everything for the greater good: it's not about him, it's about the School, his classes, the boys, the subject and the department. There is no greater example of this than Eddie's influence and contribution to Engineering Studies. He has taught it from the beginning, been the Chair of the SCSA Course Advisory Committee, as well as an ATAR examination writer and marker. He has spent many holidays writing exams, producing work samples and running PD days to equip teachers from other schools with the skills and knowledge to be able to teach the course. He selflessly shared all the resources he developed with other teachers to the point that most schools teaching Engineering Studies in the mechatronic context are using Eddie's program.

In 2007, Eddie was awarded the Design and Technology Teachers' Association of WA Award for Teacher of the Year and in 2021 he was awarded a Life Membership to the Design and Technology Teachers' Association of WA in recognition of his significant contribution to Engineering Studies. Eddie is an outstanding teacher who has left a legacy to education in WA.

rigour. He was also innovative in attracting students to his subject areas. His development of four new subject options at Year 9 and 10 level – Ancient Mythology and Weapons and Warfare in Year 9, Hannibal and Rome and International Affairs in Year 10 – were very well received. He has been a tremendous mentor to so many History teachers throughout his time in the profession. His humour and camaraderie will be sorely missed.
