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THE HEADMASTER

Extract from the Headmaster's address at Senior School Speech Day.

The boys have heard me talk about my recent opportunity to walk the Kokoda Track with some of our boys and girls from St Mary's. It was one of the most challenging and rewarding student tours completed in my career. I loved every minute of it, and I learned a great deal.

Travis Hocart (an Old Haleian himself) led the tour passionately, getting us through the nine days of arduous walking, helping us to manage the challenging climate (relentless rain or what felt like 100% humidity), and teaching us a great deal about the war itself. Of more importance though were the stories he told of ordinary young men, barely older than those here today and, in doing so, illustrating some of their values – some which are relevant for us still today.

Since returning I have shared some of my reflections about that trip with the boys, in relation to purpose and meaning, sacrifice and mateship. You see, I still have not necessarily come to terms with the idea that those servicemen did what they did under extraordinarily trying conditions, and placed themselves in positions where they almost certainly knew that they would die.

A prevailing thought while walking through the scenes of battle was, if asked, would I have the courage to do what they did? Perhaps, back then, their courage was a result of the sense they were fighting for their country. There is no doubt that purpose and meaning in life allow us to do extraordinary things. Those servicemen had that in spades – after all, they were trying to win a war.

Sacrifice had a different meaning back then as compared to our modern lives at Hale, and yet, for me, remains entirely relevant to how hard we are prepared to work for something we believe in. The ability to sacrifice many things, some things, or just one thing, as a way to focus on achieving our goals, is very relevant for all of us. What will we give up, boys, to achieve something that makes our parents proud?

But above all, what I learned and realised was that those servicemen out there did what they did – risked and sacrificed their lives – more so for their mates than just about any other thing. They shared difficult moments and trying times together, which, in the end, allowed them to do extraordinary things together.

In a sense, this is what I love about this school. A virtue of being a boys' school is that we can create programs, challenging moments, aspirational goals (sometimes without the boys even knowing it) that do create adversity along the way – adversity that promotes a sense of mateship and cohesion. Shared experiences like Exmouth, getting set up in Year 7, finding how to manage your nerves when standing on stage, playing in a key game

of sport, or perhaps just performing at your best in a test – these are all moments where you become closer to each other.

What I learned from Kokoda is that young men will make sacrifices when they have purpose and meaning, but they will do something even more extraordinary for their mates. When boys/young men feel like they belong, feel like they are part of a brotherhood of mates, they are more likely to be aspirational in their thinking about the future. For our servicemen, I am sure that many did what they did under the most terrifying of conditions because their love and respect for each other was unbreakable.

Hale is a school that sets high standards and we do expect a lot from the boys. But I am absolutely convinced that the long-term benefits of being part of a busy school – where we all want to sacrifice something to do well – are enormous and will offer a resilience that our boys will need to be successful in their chosen careers and life more generally.

Boys, I would like to congratulate you on another fine year of fun, learning and developing great mates. We are making great strides forward as a school, and at the heart of what we strive to do, as staff, is see you develop further into respectful, responsible and resilient young men.

How great is it to think that over 1300

games of sport were played this year? That we saw 400 boys take some form of tour/camp – in this state, interstate, international – or on exchange? How fun was it to see Redfoot production, *The Laramie Project*? Brilliant to see the Brine House boys and St Mary's boarders take the drama production of *Kicker Thompson* to Beverley and Narrogin?

And the WADL Debating Semi Final: unprecedented that we had two Hale teams battling it out for a place in the final! I won't mention too loudly that Aquinas beat us in the final.

Sporting premierships in hockey and soccer, both undefeated. Beyond the premierships, I thought our volleyball going back-to-back as well as being National U17 Champions was something really special.

Six-hundred-and-eighty-three students enrolled in approximately 700 instrumental and voice lessons, delivered by 49 music tutors every week!

Success for Parry House, who won the Cock House Cup.

The House Arts Carnival – House Choir, Band, Visual Arts and Short Film – being won by the Faulkner boys. Go boarding!

A quite remarkable Year 9 Arts Fest program this year where our boys were inspired by artists and artisans doing things we don't normally see at Hale.

Then there were moments of triumph: everything that was done in support of Ryan Murphy remain some of the most powerful memories I will have in my time at this school. How fortunate are we that we have young men full of such empathy for others?

I make comment on these fine achievements because you, our boys, are, even on your worst days, thriving here at Hale. Increasingly I fear that you are doing so much better than many boys in this country. Articles are increasingly being written about boys in the media, and what they are writing about is the research and data that increasingly points to the thing that, as educators, we know: boys are failing out there in Australia and many other parts of the western world.

When the 2023 NAPLAN results were published earlier this year, it again showed boys falling behind. There is now almost a 10% differential in favour of girls completing Year 12. In Year 12 there has always been a significantly higher proportion of girls studying English than boys, but even in maths and science, girls are now more prevalent. At university, a similar story is unfolding: almost 20% difference in terms of girls attending university.

This is the latest in a long and steady decline in educational achievement and outcomes for boys worldwide. Sadly, this is also just the tip of the iceberg in terms of the challenges facing boys. Think mental health; think his role within the family that must evolve; think also about the incredibly high rates of domestic violence.

As was headlined in *The Australian* just recently, "Boys are still falling through the cracks", which makes it all the more a success story here at Hale. I am quick to say this is not a zero-sum game: I don't want to pull the girls back. It's right and proper that education for girls has made terrific strides forward in the last three to four decades. But I will say this: to me, boys' school are more relevant now than ever before. Our staff know boys, they know how to teach boys, they intentionally design programs for boys. Our male and female staff role-model good values, great ways to be humane and care for others.

For me as a parent of boys living in a boys' school surrounded by boys, it's never too far from my mind the need for the 'best of both worlds', whereby we celebrate the advantages of being single sex but continue to work with our sister school, St Mary's, as well as other girls' schools in a way that supports broader development for the co-educational society we live in.

But I am relieved to say, amongst this serious talk, that some things don't change. Dr Ken Tregonning's comment, made on Speech Day back in 1975, brings a great, big smile to my face: "One of the best things in the world is to be a boy. It requires no experience but needs quite a lot of practice to be a good one!"



This funeral was undoubtedly the hardest thing I have ever had to do as a priest, and I was deeply moved by the outpouring of grief for Ryan and by how our boys conducted themselves during the service. Our hearts continue to be with the Murphy family and, of course, with Ryan.

In term time, the Chapel's main function is to host regular Senior School year group and Junior School Chapels. In these services we covered various themes such as:

- How to drop the mask
- Reconciliation
- · Our School Motto, 'Duty'
- Resurrection
- The whole is greater than the sum of its parts
- · Science versus God
- The afterlife
- Advent

Special mention and thanks must go to the Chapel Prefect, Stefan Madden, who has been a reliable and helpful presence, and to Headmaster, Dean Dell'Oro and Deputy Headmaster, Dr Peter Coutis, who both delivered talks in chapel this year.

During our Staff Eucharist at the beginning of Term 4, I put this question to the staff: "What are we doing here?" I meant that quite literally: What are we doing here in this chapel, engaging with these questions, rituals and traditions? What's the point of it all? In what follows, I'll attempt to give one answer to that question. At bottom, my hope is that the Chapel program will challenge all the young men and staff at Hale School to open themselves up to the deeper questions of life, and to the personal and spiritual growth that that process brings. In short, Chapel is an invitation to think, but not only with part of ourselves, with our whole being.

In his magisterial and fascinating work, *The Matter with Things*, British psychiatrist and literary scholar, lain McGilchrist suggests that humanity is in urgent need of transforming both how we think

about the world and what it means to be human. He notes that at the core of the contemporary world is the reductionist view that we are – nature is, the earth is – "nothing but a bundle of senseless particles, pointlessly, helplessly, mindlessly, colliding in a predictable fashion, whose existence is purely material and whose only value is utility." According to McGilchrist, this view is actively damaging to the physical world and psychologically, morally and spiritually damaging to ourselves.

The thrust of lain's argument comes via his deep study and knowledge of brain lateralisation. He suggests that we live in a world that is dominated by the narrowly focused, grabbing and getting left-hemisphere of the brain. This hemisphere is great at breaking things down to their parts, analysing them and expressing them reductively in language. However, the right hemisphere has a broader, more contextualised awareness of the world, which is excellent at seeing wholes, relationships and making connections between things. Unlike the left hemisphere, it can tolerate ambiguity, and plays a significant part in the use of intuition, imagination, creativity, the capacity for awe, dance, poetry, religion, and the ability to change our minds. In ethical terms, the right hemisphere places huge emphasis on empathy, vulnerability and mindfulness. The left hemisphere is not good at these and is more inflexible, irritable and prone to anger.

Interestingly, McGilchrist notes that people who experience strokes or brain injures that lead to diminished left hemispheric function go on to lead fairly normal lives. However, those who, through trauma of some kind, lose right hemispheric function become deluded and highly paranoid. McGilchrist lands his argument by explaining that we need to exercise both hemispheres, but it's the right hemisphere that should be dominant if we want to lead meaningful lives and truly comprehend the cosmos and our place within it.

Why have I gone to the trouble of explaining all this? Well, simply because the implications of lain's argument are highly germane to education. I think it's true that left hemisphere-type thinking has been prioritised in schools for several decades. This is clear in both the overemphasis on assessment and the popularity (and weighting) of subjects like Mathematics and the sciences. Increasingly, subjects like Drama, Art, Philosophy and even History are coming to be seen as 'softer' and thus, less valuable options in the educational landscape. As for Chapel, many schools are either cutting their programs down or dispensing with them altogether.

lain McGilchrist would say that this is a grave mistake that invariably results in students learning to attend to the world with only half their brain. Happily, Hale prioritises educating the whole boy. Drama, Art, Music and Philosophy are highly valued, as is honouring our Anglican traditions via our regular Chapel program.

I said in the beginning, Chapel is an invitation to think, and I want the boys to think deeply. The world needs boys who are curious and passionate about the big questions of life. It also needs boys who are empathetic, vulnerable, mindful; boys who can tolerate ambiguity and who are able to change their minds. Chapel offers an opportunity for the boys to work towards this by exercising their right hemisphere. Hopefully, when their time at Hale is up, they will leave with the feeling that there is much more to reality and being human than they might think.

JUNIOR SCHOOL

At a recent address to prospective Junior School families, our Headmaster referred to a commitment to learning and growing at Hale being one that is not only about their time at school, but a commitment that lasts a lifetime.

How would I explain a start at Hale flourishing into a lifetime commitment? As we celebrate and reflect upon another successful school year, as we encourage our boys to do every day, I thought I might have a crack at it.

Recently, we had the pleasure of joining Year 6 boys and their families at a special service at St George's Cathedral that marked a significant milestone in their educational journey: the end of their Junior School years. After a beautiful service, together we walked the length of St Georges Terrace, tracing in the footsteps of generations of Old Haleians as we visited several key sites in our School's history. At various stops along the way we were met by Old Boys who each shared memories of their days in the old school yard and their ongoing connection with Hale.

It seemed apt that Basil Zemplis (1983-88) was our first speaker, not because he is a media personality and Mayor of the City of Perth, but because at our very first assembly this year, our whole school came together and we heard from our Headmaster, Mr Dell'Oro, who spoke specifically to our School Motto of 'Duty'. So, it seemed fitting, as we concluded the year, that Basil shared his understanding of Duty with our boys.

Our next speaker was Jon Readhead (1954-62). Jon was eight-and-a-half-years-old, or around the age of our Year 3 boys, when he left home and started boarding at the former Hale campus at Havelock Street. Jon shared that he did

not speak to his parents for the entire first term, or 13 weeks. Jon, therefore, was very well placed to speak of resilience and responding to setbacks, cleverly drawing on examples that boys may be able to relate to, such as not being selected in a certain sporting team, or getting the grade you had hoped for.

Lastly, Young Haleian, Chris Ninkov (2001-12), who, as a Year 5B footballer in 2005 lining up in the forward pocket, always used to "clean up" in front of goals – and so was known as "The Janitor" during his Junior School years! A modest, good humoured and kind person, Chris spoke about connection and mateship, and crafted his carefully thought-out words around a simple quote: "It's nice to be important, but it is important to be nice."

What struck me though, from all their words, was that all three speakers shared a common theme: a love for their school that has been forged over time and continues to grow with ongoing connection and opportunities. But how did each of these Old Boys reach the point where they speak of the inevitable twists and turns, the ups and downs, highs and lows of their schooling at Hale with such passion and fondness?

A common practice amongst our team when planning curriculum for the boys is 'backward design', whereby the learning goals are considered first. We then work backwards to design the content. The benefit of this approach being the intentionality during the design process to ensure each lesson moves towards the end learning goals.

So, with that in mind, and the goal being belonging, perhaps we need to continue the walk we started with Year 6 at St Georges Terrace and head up Hale Road, take a turn into Glenelg Avenue, and go back to the start of the 2023 school year, where 42 excited Pre-Primary boys joined Hale for their first day of school.

With the first year of his Hale journey complete, I asked a Pre-Primary student, who quite literally skipped into school with a massive smile on his face every day, "How do you know Hale is the place for you?" Jack Totterdell, supported by his big brother Tom, bravely hopped up in front of our Speech Day audience and shared:

"There is something for everyone at Hale, like Gardening Club, board games, sport – I really like Gardening Club.

We have lovely teachers at Hale. They look after us when we are hurt, and they celebrate when it is our birthday and we wear a funny crown for the day.

The best thing about Hale is I have made lots of friends and I get to go to school with my big brother."

So, from a student's first year at Hale, where we intentionally work hard to establish connection – be it in Pre-Primary, Year 4 or other year level – belonging begins.

Building on Jack's words, this year we have lived some special moments with each other that have created many wonderful memories. You have all participated and done your very best at many terrific sporting events including cross country, swimming, triathlon and another fabulous Whole School Athletics Day. You have shown great character on the sporting field as you have represented the School in JPSSA fixtures and carnivals. We have marvelled as you have taken to the stage performing 'Of Time and Space', and 'Fireflies' and 'Twilight' concerts. We again committed to a Junior School production, The Jungle Book, allowing every student in the Upper Junior Centre to experience a largescale production. We have run plenty of entertaining Friday assemblies that have offered a window into the learning in each classroom. Talk 4 Write, the 30 Days of Service Challenge, Pedal Prix, Chinese cultural immersions, Book Week characters, Outdoor Education camps, Christmas concerts, Lego Masters, a vibrant Art exhibition, buddy programs, gardening and sustainability initiatives, wellbeing focuses that saw all our boys and staff living the dream, arriving at

















School in their pyjamas for the day as we honed in on the importance of sleep.

Of course, there have also been some lighter moments, like the time young Hugh Simm (Year 2) managed to get his finger caught deep in a metal whistle - so deep, in fact, that we had to get out the tin snips to cut the whistle to free his finger! As we were trying to release the finger, I am not sure Hugh appreciated the ongoing guips about his determination in becoming an AFL umpire. We also recall hosting a whole school staff briefing in the Junior School in Term 2, and we included a short advert break for the first time, where, in a scene reminiscent of something out of a Dickens novel, Year 4 students Cody Hardman, William Bird and Riley Crage delivered a highly entertaining pitch to Senior School staff to purchase their handmade tabasco sauce made fresh by our Gardening and Sustainability Club. Few staff were able to escape without making a purchase, such was the level of upbeat entrepreneurship demonstrated. And who could forget the Year 6 monologue challenge where boys courageously presented on topics such as 'Neurodiversity and embracing superpowers' by Jacob Milton and 'Kindness' by Max White, to name but two? Of course, we have also enjoyed excursions, incursions, swimming lessons, chapel services and specialist lessons, including Technologies, introduced as a specialist subject in the Junior School this year. As a whole school, we have connected via barbeques. assemblies, peer mentoring and service learning. All these opportunities and moments to work together contribute to our growth and bank of special memories. And, with that, belonging builds.

This year, once again, we have called on our boys to live our School Values and choose kindness. As Carlton prepared for the AFL finals this year, an ardent Year 5 supporter approached me with stars in his eyes as he shared that he had met Anthony 'Kouta' Koutoufides, former Carlton footballing great. He excitedly showed me the autographed pieces he had obtained. Knowing I am also a Carlton supporter (there are only a handful of us in the Junior School), he then went on to

happily share, "Don't worry Mr Simpson, I didn't forget about you!" And he whipped out a framed, personalised message from Kouta addressed to me. For me, it wasn't about the autograph, and I certainly do not expect gifts. This is about the thoughtfulness and kindness that this young boy exhibited, thinking of others beyond himself and not expecting anything in return.

Through living our values, belonging builds.

Boys, our Junior School team - comprising of teachers and education assistants, administration and Junior School Executive - are an important part of your lives. They are an incredibly passionate and talented team. As highlighted in many media reports of late, these roles have changed and grown over time, and require many hats to be worn each day to meet the needs of our students. In their care is our future, and I am in constant admiration of the way this team builds positive relationships to create an environment that encourages boys to put their best foot forward.

To the Board of Governors and Mr Dell'Oro, thank you for your ongoing support as you continue to carefully consider the learning and wellbeing of our boys, staff and community. The Junior School extends our gratitude and thanks to Mr Mark Foster, outgoing Chair of the Board, for his strong commitment to the School as a student, Old Boy, parent and in his role in assisting to steer our ship. To departing Junior School team members, Ms Yen Wong, Mrs Clare Edgecombe and Mrs Sue Harvey, we thank vou wholeheartedly for your many contributions and wish you all the very best in your future endeavours. I also thank the outgoing President of the P&F, Mr Peter Pynes and the incoming Rohit Silva and his executive. They and all other support groups give so generously of their time to support our school. And parents, we get the best results when we work together, and I thank you for the trust and confidence you continue to place in us. So, through the support of the Board of Governors, our Hale team and our parents, belonging

Small acts, such as using a student's name to greet and welcome, acknowledging a student's interests, offering descriptive praise for a job well done, collaborating with families to support individual learning journeys, and being willing to engage in those small acts of kindness, all contribute to belonging. These small acts happen daily and the list is endless. All create positive relationships that are built on trust, kindness, respect and safety. With this enabled, not only is there a link to better student wellbeing, but also to better educational performance, and I hope a lifetime of great memories and connections with Hale, be it as student, parent, or team member.

Parents, my sincere hope for your boys is that they not only attain a fine education at Hale and are surrounded by supportive friendships where they can be themselves, but work at their pace to build a sense of belonging with their school that will last a lifetime.

With that, I finish not with a question, but rather a statement: Hale, a place of belonging!

Year 3 has been a fantastic year full of engaging learning, fun and friendship. The year began with great excitement when we welcomed our new Year 3 cohort into the Middle Junior Learning Centre and set off on our learning journey together.

We began with an exploration into the inquiry unit, 'Mini beasts', where we enjoyed spending time studying wildlife all around us and closely observing creatures in the nature play area and gardens. As part of an Eco Action incursion, we discovered that some of the mini beasts we had been learning about were not so miniature! We bravely handled giant burrowing cockroaches, spiney leaf insects and titan stick insects. Our knowledge of creepy crawlies was brought to life in the Art Room as we designed insects and made them pop with contrasting colours, which were displayed at the Junior School Art Show.

Learning about Australia's neighbouring countries and

their cultures was informative and interesting. We will never forget about the Pitohui, a poisonous bird located in Papua New Guinea, or the rafflesia arnoldii stinking corpse lily! Applying our growing understanding of climate zones, we could imagine what life might be like in these regions. Finally, we enjoyed sharing our researched information by constructing a 'triorama' (like a diorama but with three sides), which included landscapes and local flora and fauna.

We travelled back in time to Hale School's previous campus on Havelock Street. We constructed a timeline spanning the decades from 1858 to 2023 and studied the growth of our school, the significance of school names and symbols, and poured over maps of the region. We used this knowledge as we travelled to the heart of the city to explore the Constitution Centre, which was the former Hale campus. Meeting up with our sister school, St Mary's, we learnt about our shared history at St Mary's Chapel and we played vintage games after lunch. To aid our understanding of earlier life at Hale School, a Physical Education lesson at Hale Oval in Kings Park was a fabulous start to the day.

Our learning took off into space as we studied planets, our solar system and the movement of the Earth to create night and day. We took this knowledge with us to Scitech, where we entered the Planetarium to watch *Tilt*, an adventurous movie about the impact of the Earth's tilt on the seasons. We designed, built and tested a prototype moon lander and explored the amazing microscopic world of biology in the *Knowledge by Nature* show.

Our Technology unit on design took us to Brownes Dairy, where we learnt about the entire process of milk production, from farm to fridge. We rolled up our sleeves to milk a cow and make our own curds and whey. We explored scientific concepts like homogenisation

and pasteurisation, which help to keep food safe to eat.

Many boys began learning an instrument for the first time this year, and being involved in the Year 3 Music program and performing in the Year 3 recital program has been an achievement for many.

Another highlight in 2023 were the various interschool sporting carnivals. Playing football, soccer and basketball allowed us to share our skills on the sports field and represent Hale School with pride. Early morning sport training has been another co-curricular option that many boys enjoyed.

Reflecting upon what has been a remarkable journey for our Year 4 boys in 2023, it's evident that this year has been an unforgettable chapter. From the outset, the move from two to three classes fostered an environment where new friendships flourished. A major focus for the Year 4 teaching team was the cultivation of positive relationships and the nurturing of independent learners.

Year 4 Camp became a pivotal experience early in the year. It provided an opportunity for the boys to solidify newfound friendships, engage in various team-building activities and immerse themselves in the great outdoors. The Outdoor Education team designed a diverse program enriched with activities including circus skills, kite making, bush art and orienteering. Based on the book The Lorax by Dr Suess, the focal theme was sustainability, emphasising appreciation and respect for our natural surroundings while being mindful of our environmental footprint.

Part of the Humanities and Social Sciences (HaSS) program was dedicated to exploring the early pioneering days of Australia, along with the lives of Indigenous Australians before European settlement. Learning extended across the curriculum, as we studied the novel Tom Appleby, offering the boys an understanding of historical events from a young boy's perspective. Crafting daily diary entries as the character Tom Appleby provided a poignant context, shedding light on the challenges faced by early settlers. As part of this program we visited Boola Bardip Museum, further delving into the rich and diverse history of the Aboriginal people, prior to the arrival of the First Fleet.

Our Year 4 PSA program offered the boys an opportunity to participate in a range of sports, with optional training sessions that saw enthusiastic participation. Rugby clinics hosted by Rugby WA were a highlight and the boys enjoyed learning the tactics of this sport, and games that assisted their skill development. Having an opportunity to practise their soccer, rugby, AFL, basketball and hockey skills, and then participate in lightning carnivals with Scotch College and Christ Church Grammar School, provided worthwhile experiences and assisted with their selection of sporting choices for Year 5.

The exploration into Earth Sciences was supported with the visit of an Australian Earth Science Education palaeontologist. Engaging in hands-on, interactive activities, the boys deepened their comprehension of fossils and learnt how evidence from the present can provide insights into bygone eras. Witnessing firsthand the utilisation of fossils and rocks to illustrate long-term geological changes contrasted with the more immediate effects of weathering and erosion.

To complement the Year 4 creative writing program, we attended the 2023 Scribblers Festival at the Perth Town Hall. It was a wonderful experience to hear from author Gavin Aung Than as he explained his creative process, including how his two passions - martial arts and scribblings - come together in his work. Illustrator and poet, Amber Moffat shared her poetry and explained how she shapes ideas and observations to craft striking images. Both writers reinforced the importance of students finding their own voice and being able to share their stories in a multitude of ways.

In Term 4, we invited St Mary's Year 4 classes to our Middle Junior Learning Centre for a series of fun-filled tasks designed to strengthen the bonds initiated during previous visits. The day included building spaghetti towers, a 'race

around the school' styled quiz, board games and dance sport. Coming together at the end of the day to perform a flash mob dance in the centre proved to be a big hit with all the students.

Our Open Classroom afternoons are always a highlight of the year. The boys enjoyed sharing many aspects of their school life with family, showcasing their work as well as some of their creative projects. There were many smiles as the boys enjoyed leading tours of their favourite places at Hale Junior School.

The Year 4s of 2023 should be very proud of all they have achieved throughout the year. We thank you for your kindness, mateship, humour and many interesting stories along the way. Here's to an exciting Year 5 ahead!

Hale Junior School's art room has been a dynamic hub of creativity, hosting a myriad of projects across different grades throughout the year.

In Year 1, students embarked on a vibrant journey, transforming ordinary coat hangers into symbolic masterpieces inspired by their individual Noongar birth seasons. This project seamlessly blended creativity and cultural appreciation, exploring fundamental art elements such as line, texture and shape through collages and ceramic hanging owl ornaments.

Year 2 delved into the traditions of Chinese New Year, showcasing their artistic versatility with collaged city scenes, paper-cut lanterns and dynamic lion's head paintings. The exploration extended to precision and creativity in rendering structures, leading to mixed media artworks featuring imaginative treehouses and gingerbread houses. A visit to the Art Gallery of Western Australia provided a guided tour and participation in the engaging Exquisite Bodies exhibition workshop, broadening artistic horizons through sculpture and surrealist drawing.

Year 3 embraced recycling and environmental awareness, crafting intricate dragonfly assemblage sculptures from discarded materials. Their exploration of insect life expanded to a captivating study of black cockatoos in southwestern Australia, refining drawing skills through collaborative foam prints, mixed media paintings and ceramic creations.

Year 4 drew inspiration from artists like Romero Britto, Bronwyn Bancroft and Hokusai Katsushika, reimagining famous landmarks and landscapes worldwide. An arts collaboration day centred around the immersive performance Walking in the Wilderness by Musica Viva Australia, igniting artistic exploration through enchanting sounds and a subsequent visual arts mask-making workshop.

Year 5 mastered spatial illusion and one-point perspective, creating immersive depth in their drawings. Guided by surrealism and René Magritte's artwork, they translated newfound skills into surreal masterpieces. A visit to the Wonderland exhibition inspired a stop-motion animation project, allowing students to craft

personalised journeys into the fantastical realm.

In Year 6, students engaged in an exploration of sculpture, honing skills and appreciation through a guided tour of the Sculptures by the Sea exhibition. This journey extended to creating unique bowls about a goal, inspired by the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, showcasing the intersection of sculpture and purposeful storytelling. A deeper exploration of portraiture followed, with students honing technical skills and delving into the powerful narratives of migration and personal identity in the digital age.

Additional highlights included Language Week, where an interdisciplinary approach immersed students in Chinese culture through language, technology and visual art. Collaborations like the Junior School Music Retreat RoAR workshop further enriched the students' understanding of the symbiotic relationship between music and visual elements, resulting in multidimensional performances with creative props and costumes.

Initially with our twilight meet, which we use to select our interschool swimming squad, followed by swimming lessons for all boys in Pre-Primary to Year 3, Physical Education lessons where boys were timed and stroke development and water safety were reinforced, our much-anticipated Interhouse Swimming Carnival and, finally, the JPSSA Interschool Swimming Carnival at HBF Stadium. The Junior School Interhouse Swimming Carnival was a hugely successful day where all boys could participate in as many events as they wished. We do have some outstanding swimmers; however, it is often the sight of those boys who really struggle in the water that inspires others. Seeing the determination to get to the other end, and seeing the support of their peers on the sidelines, really contribute to the culture of sport and mateship. 2023 saw a changing of the guard when it came to the winning house, with Walker taking the title for the first time in many years. Champion boys were Alexander Taylor (Year 4), Banjo Laurie (Year 5) and Austin Gastevski (Year 6). As always, summer JPSSA sport was a highlight for many in the upper years, whilst all boys in Years 3 and 4 participated in an interschool Cricket Carnival.

Endurance was our focus in Term 2 with the various cross country events. Cross

country is an event where clear lessons are learned, and an understanding of what your body can do under stress are clearly evident. Some boys are striving to place in the top 10, some are trying to run the race without stopping, some are simply trying to complete the course as best they can, while others are still developing their mental strength and desire to do their absolute best. Cross country caters for all. With courses ranging from 600 metres for our Pre-Primary boys to 2.6 kilometres for our Year 6 boys, it was great to see all proudly represent their house. Walker made it two from two with another victory. Winners across each year level were Sebastian Smith (PP), Nyel Bokhari (Year 1), Xavier Mienie (Year 2), Alessandro Rocha (Year 3), Cooper Bernhardt (Year 4), Banjo Laurie (Year 5) and Liam Miller (Year 6). From here, we quickly moved on to training and preparation for the JPSSA Interschool Cross Country, which Hale hosted. All courses involved bush running, with the Year 6s also taking on the infamous 'Chunder Hill'! The Year 3 boys across other PSA schools also had the opportunity to compete in two participation events. Our boys produced an outstanding effort to finish third overall.

As always, these carnivals are combined with weekly JPSSA sport, and the Year 3 and Year 4 carnival program. Our Year 4 boys competed in soccer, hockey and football, whilst the Year 3 boys travelled to Scotch College for their Soccer Carnival.

Term 3 began with our final four rounds of winter sport. Our boys consistently achieved excellent results while demonstrating a determination to put team first. The Year 4 boys were also busily preparing for their Rugby Carnival with help from RugbyWA. It was wonderful to see the boys embrace these sessions with the hope that some may choose rugby as a sporting option in the future.

Very quickly, we moved into

athletics. Our Interhouse Athletics Carnival was another amazing Hale day with many personal bests achieved. The atmosphere out on the track was electric with performances to match. Our Pre-Primary to Year 2 boys enthusiastically participated in their carnival throughout the morning, and it was great to see so many doing their best in their house colours. Turnbull returned to the top of the dais with a resounding victory, followed by Walker, Rosier and Davy. With so many well credentialed athletes among our students, competition was fierce. However, once the race or field event was over, all boys congratulated and supported each other proudly. Those boys crowned as Champion Boys for 2023 were Zach Johnston (Year 3), Lachlan Bourne (Year 4), Banjo Laurie (Year 5) and Finn Minson (Year 6). From this carnival, our interschool athletics team was selected. We took a well-rounded group of athletes with many boys competing across various field and track disciplines. Hale Junior School finished fifth on the day. The term concluded with a Year 3 Football Carnival and swimming lessons for all boys in Years 4 to 6.

Term 4 was all about triathlon. The first event was the Hale Connect triathlon, which, for the very first time, included a few Year 4 girls from St Mary's. The girls trained and competed with students from Hale, Holy Rosary and Woodlands Primary over a five-week program. The interactions from students across all schools, and the enthusiasm from staff ensured that all competitors had a positive experience, whilst challenging themselves completely. Our interhouse triathlon was again a roaring success with a huge number of students completing the entire triathlon, some for the very first time. Watching the Year 2 students transition from swim to bike and then run for the first time was a highlight. Turnbull House were again the eventual winners, followed closely by Walker, Davy and



Rosier. Champion boys for 2023 were Xavier Mienie (Year 2), Zach Johnston (Year 3), Lachlan Bourne (Year 4), Banjo Laurie (Year 5) and Liam Miller (Year 6). Unfortunately, due to a heatwave at the end of November, the much anticipated, inaugural JPSSA Interschool Team Triathlon had to be cancelled. Hopefully this carnival will allow our boys another opportunity to represent our school proudly in the years to come.

The term concluded with basketball carnivals for all boys in Years 3 and 4. With the competition split across two venues, all boys experienced significant game time while having a lot of fun.

2023 has again allowed our boys to further develop their skills and hopefully an understanding of how beneficial physical activity and being part of a team can be. Lessons were learnt from both victory and defeat, and the importance of team before individual continually reinforced.

Thanks again must go to all staff who assisted to ensure that our inclusive carnivals were a success, and who coached with passion through the JPSSA program across all year levels. Special thanks to Mrs Rebecca Greenaway who has worked with our youngest students to develop an outstanding program where fundamental movement skills are at the core of each lesson, and where all boys have the opportunity to grow and develop to the best of their ability.



YEAR 7

Moving into the Senior School marks a significant transition in a boy's life, whether embarking on his Hale journey in 2023 or entering in earlier years. The Year 7 cohort of 2023 has left an indelible mark on the School community, making a lasting impression on teachers, pastoral care leaders and other staff.

Amidst the onset of adolescence and its many impacts — physical, social and emotional — the focus of the year has been on guiding the boys through these changes, whilst also fostering their sense of connection and belonging to Hale and the School community. The aim has been to equip them with the skills and qualities crucial for their future success, and to help them develop positive and healthy attitudes towards wellbeing in its many guises.

Physically, standing at the door and saying farewell to the boys, their actual growth in height never fails to amaze. Boys' bodies change so rapidly at this time of development and the School photographs that compare the start and end of the year are sometimes hard to believe!

Socially, the boys have developed a stronger cohesive feel across the group. They have bonded and matured together. This was facilitated early in the year when they engaged in their Nannup Outdoor Education camp. It was great to be back on residential camps, having had to pause them during the pandemic. Watching the boys switch off from technology and just enjoy being in the outdoors was one of the many highlights.

The willingness of this group to put their hands up and take part in the wide range of opportunities on offer, and the way they also offer the hand of friendship to each other have also been evident. That doesn't mean that everyone gets this right all the time, but individuals and groups have

responded well to the interventions and actions put in place when mistakes and errors of judgement have been made. That is an important skill in the educational journey.

Academically, Year 7 teachers in 2023 have carefully designed programs and projects aimed at engaging the boys. Noteworthy examples include authentic projects in Science and Geography, such as the exploration of the Hale Lake ecosystem, the Lego project solving realworld problems, and the water project focused on providing clean water for Yemen. These projects highlight the boys' ability to apply their learning to practical, real-world scenarios.

Collaboration with Young Change Agents, a national organisation empowering young people, resulted in two impactful projects. In the Economics unit, the boys established their own businesses, raising over \$5000 for Anglicare, and another project prompted them to envision a more diverse, inclusive and accessible world for young people.

The value of having the Year 7 boys engage with older boys through several programs has also been recognised this year. In the first few weeks, when the Year 7s were transitioning into the Senior School and feeling the nerves and anxieties that can come with this step up, a group of Year 13 students (boys who had graduated in 2022) were employed

to work

alongside the Year 7 boys' classes. These mentors shadowed each class and could offer support and advice in these important days. Also, throughout the year, each Year 7 boy was paired up with Year 11 mentors from their house. The older boys were given advice on how to guide conversations with the younger students, again passing on tips but also being a support for the boys and someone to talk to. With research showing that, often, to get boys to speak openly about personal topics, it is best to have them occupied in a task the pairs of boys have also learned how to clean shoes, tie a Windsor knot, and even to sew buttons back onto their shirts

The Year 7 teaching and pastoral team is a cohesive, dedicated group of teachers who clearly enjoy working with boys in this important stage. They work hard but they also have fun, and this creates a positive, supportive climate for the team and for the boys.

For the boys, this year has been a journey marked by growth, camaraderie and academic exploration. The cohort of boys – the Graduating Class of 2028 – have set some sure foundations on which to continue to build, and the Year 7 team will watch their continued journey with invested interest.

One of the standout moments in 2023 was the Year 8 and 9 Connections program with St Mary's in Terms 1, 2 and 3. These interactive and collaborative sessions allowed students to interact in a fun, relaxed way and involved problem-solving activities, games and partner dancing. These sessions encouraged boys to step out of their comfort zones and

engage in real conversations, involving interactions with girls of the same age. It was heartening to see students enjoy the opportunity to connect, and there are plans to expand this program further in 2024.

Outdoor Education remains a pivotal part of Hale School's curriculum, emphasising personal and social development, critical thinking and risk management. Hale's unique camp experiences challenge students as they overcome new obstacles, find solutions and cultivate essential life skills such as resilience, perseverance and negotiation techniques. Year 8 students ventured to Nannup, while Year 9 embarked on their camp in the North West Cape region. The Year 8 students are already looking forward to their final camp in Exmouth next year, marking the 36th year of this flagship program. These 14 days of expeditioning provide an invaluable opportunity for students to establish meaningful connections with diverse environments (reef, range and gulf), as well as with themselves and others through their interaction with the natural world. The School strongly believes these connections are vital for the wellbeing of students and sustainability of the environment.

At the end of Term 4, all Year 9 students were once again involved in a two-day Arts Fest, which was a unique opportunity to experience the Arts in an authentic, practical and creative way. Boys selected two artforms from up to 15 options, where they worked with visiting artists. Boys saw performances and engaged with professional artists in the areas of music, drama, visual art and media. The two days opened their minds, push them out of their comfort zones, and fostered a new appreciation of the Arts.

2023 was also the first year AHOHs have worked with Year 9 students on individualised wellbeing plans. This is a guide to help students work on a plan to not only feel good about themselves, but to create a toolkit for when they are faced with life's challenges. The boys responded well to this activity in PD lessons, and parents are encouraged to review these with their sons at the start of Year 10, to best support and equip boys for their academic journey ahead.

The focus over Years 8 and 9 is on character development and all of the programs have this aim. Having effective interpersonal skills, resilience and embracing challenges are crucial life skills for our young men. We strongly believe this helps set the boys up for success in Year 10 and beyond.

The AHOH pastoral care team is an exceptional group of individuals dedicated to supporting students in this age group. YEARS 10 - 12

As we all reflect on another year, there continues to be a lot to be proud of at Hale School. With a focus on the broad education of each student, we continue to offer outstanding programs that seek to engage our students in meaningful and varied learning experiences that cater for the interests and passions within our community. The positive culture within the Senior School continued throughout the year, celebrating successes with humility and showing resilience in the face of challenge.

I spoke at the Valedictory Assembly about the importance of legacy. It is my view that the legacy of our Year 12 group was around their genuine and authentic demonstration of mateship. As staff, we respect how they have treated each other and formed strong bonds. This has set a wonderful example for our younger students. The tone of the Valedictory celebrations continues to be one of reflection and gratitude, led by the entire group of Year 12s. The humility and display of appreciation towards those who assisted them in their time at Hale School should be acknowledged.

The year started well with the Commencement Ceremony under the trees of the Chapel Green. This event brings the entire school together to set the tone for the year ahead, acknowledge our significant student leaders, and welcome new students to the School. The added tradition of processing through the main administration building, as a symbolic nod to our past, is bookended at the end of our Year 12 students' year when they walk out of the same building for the last time. Our new Deputy Headmaster, Dr Peter Coutis spoke of the importance of our School Motto of 'Duty'. He challenged each student "that part of your duty to yourself and to your school is to learn how to think, to solve problems, in and out of the classroom; that your duty includes a

commitment to go one step beyond, to find the limits of your potential by throwing yourself into everything this great school has to offer."

We continue to see great progress in many of our younger students, and our senior students continue to excel in a range of academic pursuits. This has been confirmed by the significant improvement in their NAPLAN results in both literacy and mathematics as the students progress through their years at Hale School. The Year 12 Media ATAR course ran for the first time in 2023 and the media suites in the new Performing Arts Precinct will be a welcome resource to support the growth in this subject. Enrolments in Chinese as a Second Language continues to grow, supporting our well-established French Second Language program, which boasts the highest enrolment numbers for boys in the State. Our students performed strongly in many external academic competitions, including the ICAS English, Australian Mathematics Olympiad Committee Senior Contest, Australian Mathematics Competition and the Australian Geography Competition. Outstanding results have been achieved by our Year 12 senior students, including one student winning the gold medal in VETIS Bricklaying at the 2023 WorldSkills Australia National Competition and another being selected as a finalist for the WA Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Student of the Year at the WA Training Awards.

The co-curricular program continues to provide an opportunity for each student to showcase his talent, and connect with students and staff outside the classroom. Our sporting teams are always highly competitive and in 2023 we have continued to have great success. Just as important has been the attitude and behaviour of our students when playing or supporting these teams. The senior volleyball team won the PSA premiership, as well as the National U17 Championship.

Our 1st hockey and soccer teams won the PSA premiership, completing an unbeaten season. Success was also achieved by the WADL debating teams and the Da Vinci Decathlon team, which qualified for the national finals in Sydney. The Laramie Project was an outstanding success for the senior students and the music program was no different, with highlights including the Garland Concert, Jazz and Rock Nights and the Governors' Concert, which yet again exceeded expectations in the quality of music performed.

This year the student exchange program was in full swing with 21 Year 10 international exchanges completed across seven schools from five countries. These amazing experiences were complemented by 19 tours or camps, with a further nine planned over the Christmas break. This will total approximately 475 students having the opportunity to be involved in these tours, which provide a unique opportunity for life experiences and further connection outside of the classroom.

The Hale School Ball is always a highlight and 2023 was no different. Due to the redevelopment of the Memorial Hall, the location of this event moved to Craig Oval and the adjacent Music and Drama building. With a theme of 'California Nights', this space was transformed to an open-air event on the oval, and the main dance floor and stage inside. The student numbers were the largest we have had, with over 800 attending on the night. What a great night for everyone involved. To see an event of this size go so smoothly is a great reflection on the quality of our students and the attention to detail of the staff involved.

As always, Hale School has a lot to be proud of in 2023. The students, staff and parents form an outstanding school community that seeks to provide each boy with the best education.



SPEECH DAY ADDRESS

The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, who's face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes up short again and again; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least he fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who know neither victory nor defeat."

It's quite a long passage, and I do encourage you to look it up in its entirety. My three main takeaways that I hope you can take from it: 1. Dare to chase your goals – dare to step into the arena.

The credit will always belong to the man that has the courage to enter the arena and follow his ambitions. All great things and great people had to start somewhere, so I encourage all of you to find what is great to you, and have the fortitude to advance into the arena and go run after it. The reason why acknowledging and chasing our goals is not as common is because as we do, we open ourselves up, we become vulnerable. We shy away because of the possibility of failure; we shy away because some can think we are not worthy of such great things; and sometimes we even shy away because we worry someone could tell us we're incapable. I think it's important that we remember that these things are unavoidable in the pursuit of personal goals, and are, in fact, natural, common and a shared experience. What I hope for all you boys is that you recognise that starting your journey towards goals of great heights is the first step in the journey to personal fulfilment. Nothing of genuine significance has been achieved by shying away from the battle. Go chase your big dreams and don't let anyone tell you not to.

2. Triumph requires toil.

This is something that I think this school prepares us for in a unique way. Put simply, once we find our true purpose and go chase it – once we enter the arena – we must be ready to work and push ourselves; we must understand that on this journey, our face has to be marred by blood and sweat and dust. To achieve our end goals, we must be willing to spend and dedicate ourselves to its pursuit.

3. We must acknowledge that we will fall.

We must acknowledge that you will
have to take the hits, you will stumble
– and, in some cases, others will point
this out.

True strength is not necessarily standing when the hits come our way,



it's getting back up when we fall. It's getting back up when everyone says we can't. On the path to great things, we are destined to come up short again and again, because we are imperfect individuals. Once we recognise that we will fail, and we accept this, we can focus on how we can get back up – and we can focus on how we can continue our journey.

I want to finish today by saying how excited I am for the future of this school and those who wear the double blue. Our school will always be defined by the people that fill it, and after six years here, I am more than certain that the people here – the mothers and fathers, students and teachers – are destined to do great things, not just within our four walls, but in the outside world, in the arena.

I would like to make special mention today of our incoming Captain and Vice Captain for 2024, Charlie and Harry. I know both well and know they're both hard working, very well respected, and people who I know will lead the School to great places in 2024.

It has been a tremendous honour to be your Captain of School for 2023. It's an opportunity I will always be thankful for. I'd like to thank our Vice Captain, Sam Morison for his work this year. I really could have talked about Sam and the work he's done for hours. I won't, but we are all very fortunate to have had him as Vice Captain.

I am so proud of our school this year and everything it's endured, and I said this in my Valedictory address but I do think what Hale School stands for is stronger than ever before – and the credit really does lie with you, boys.

Thank you for the past year and I look forward to seeing what is to come in the future.

Ready for whatever life lay ahead.









The final house event of the year was the Athletics Carnival where we needed to perform well to lock in the Cock House







MATHEMATICS ENRICHMENT CLUB

Approximately 40 boys from Years 7 to 10 participated in various mathematical challenges and activities this year.

In Term 1, Hale hosted the Senior Have Sum Fun (Years 11 and 12) competition where teams of six competed in a fast-paced quiz against other schools. On an outstanding night for Hale, our team – consisting of Ben van Aswegen, Eric Xia, Vivaan Wagh, Aiden Ahmad, Saalik Khan and Karim Qleibo – finished in second place, and our other two teams

placed eighth and ninth out of 25 teams. The following week we also had strong results in the Intermediate and Junior competitions, placing an excellent second and fourth respectively.

In Term 2, we entered nine teams of four into the Have Sum Fun Online competition, in which we competed with schools from all around the State. Our team – consisting of Michael Cheng, Henry Kalu, Aidan Ung and Jinnry Zhuang – won the Year 7 competition. We also placed third in the Year 8 and Year 9 competitions.

In Term 3, 252 students participated in the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC), which returned some outstanding individual results. Aidan Kwa (Year 9), Taj Siah (Year 10) and Eric Xia (Year 11) performed extremely well and were awarded prizes, which placed them in the top 0.3% of all WA candidates in their respective year groups. In addition, 19 boys were awarded High Distinctions and 109 were awarded Distinctions.

In the Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad at the end of Term 3, Aidan Kwa and Chenghan Lei were awarded Distinctions, and Rob Davison was awarded a Credit. These are excellent results for Year 9 students in what is a tough Year 10 competition.

Also in Term 3, 20 Year 8 boys joined a group from St Mary's Anglican Girls' School in the annual Maths Camp at Ern Halliday Recreation Camp.



MOCK TRIAL

We saw some excellent advocacy by our barristers and passionate performances by witnesses. Solicitors and court officers performed their duties admirably. Even though we missed out on the finals in 2023, we are confident that the competition developed our skills of public speaking, critical thinking and the art of forming a persuasive, cohesive argument while getting a glimpse of the world outside the classroom.

Hale is considered a lighthouse school for the competition, with Dr Hindley and Digby invited to participate in a digital presentation highlighting the benefits of taking part in this historic competition.

During Term 1 we also hosted the Hale-St Mary's Speaking Competition for Years 7 to 9. The boys were ably coached and later judged by Joel Chemmanam, Drew Davison, Keshav Dhruva, Digby House, Alex Jiang, Yash Namjoshi, Xavier Torre and Ryan Wu to develop an engaging and polished short speech.

Term 2 included the Junior School Public Speaking Festival. Supported by their Senior School coaches Drew Davison, Keshav Dhruva, Alex Jiang, Alex Liu, and Ryan Wu, Year 5 and 6 students Vivaan Barbara. Hunter Brand, Alexander Higgins, Ishaan Kariya, Jullien Yadav, Khaleeq Ahmad Khalif and Jacob Milton thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to share their ideas and interests with the audience. The Festival also served as a wonderful practice ground for Khaleeg and Hunter who subsequently took part in the Independent Primary School Heads of Australia Speakers' Challenge, with Hunter coming second in his heat on the night.

The Plain English Speaking Award is an international competition open to senior secondary students across the nation. This year, Drew Davison and Digby House were both successful in initial heats to move through to represent our school in the semi-finals of this prestigious competition.

Term 3 was a very busy term for the Public Speaking Club with four competitions. The Royal Commonwealth Society Speech and Leadership Contest is open to all students in Years 9 to 12 throughout WA, and this year comprised of a leadership interview and a prepared speech on the topic, "If I could change one thing..." In the Junior Division, Daniel Richards nobly spoke about the value of virtue over money, and Oliver Panotidis hypothesised how life would be different if cavemen had read Dante's classic Inferno. In the Senior Division, Drew Davison spoke about the need for young people to engage with representative democracy; Digby House highlighted the importance of co-curricular activity in schools; and Xavier Torre inspired the audience with a rousing call to be their best selves in all situations. Because

the adjudicators were so impressed with their work, the boys each received President's Encouragement Awards. Moreover, they have been invited to join the Royal Commonwealth Society's Competition and Branding Committee, which includes the opportunity to network with politicians and other high-profile members of the community.

The United Nations Youth Australia Evatt competition is modelled on the UN Security Council. Students work in pairs to represent their member country, aiming to provide a voice for change when speaking on and campaigning for resolutions up for debate. Competing against well over 100 other teams, Drew Davison and Ryan Wu, Digby House and Lawrie Jeffs, and Aiden Ahmad and Joel Chemmanam thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to pit their wits against other representatives. Special congratulations to partners Digby and Lawrie, who progressed through to the Grand Finals held at Parliament House. The boys did a wonderful job representing the interests of their allocated country of Switzerland and an even better job representing their school, with Lawrie being awarded Best Negotiator.

Evatt provides an excellent training ground for the invitational PSA Mock United Nations competition. Working in teams of three, students in Years 9 to 11 illustrate what the world can expect from our future global citizens. The first of our Year 11 groups comprised Drew Davison, Digby House, and Lawrie Jeffs, while the second included Lucas Knight and Joshua Moxey. The Year 10 team was made up of Quinn Cumming, Aadil Thekkayil and Keiran Tran. OUTDOOR EDUCATION

One doesn't have to search too far to uncover the positive effects on mental health and wellbeing through immersion in nature and the great outdoors. Having done some tertiary lecturing in experiential learning in recent years, my own search algorithms take me straight to academic papers. A non-academic search by anyone, however, will yield an abundance of palatable and very positive information in layman's terms, with lifestyle advice for healthy mind, body and spirit.

There has certainly been a rapid growth in awareness of the need for outdoor activity in recent years. Much of this is in response to better mental and overall health in the wake of COVID isolation. Interestingly, as far back as 2005, Richard Louv coined the term "Nature Deficit Disorder" to describe the idea that human beings, especially children, are spending less time outdoors than they have in the past. Louv went on to suggest that this change results in a wide range of social, mental health and behavioural problems that we are seeing more and more in the youth of today.

Consolidating the Hale perspective, Headmaster Dean Dell'Oro, in his opinion piece in *The West Australian* newspaper on 8 September 2023 stated: "They (boys) need to be in nature, to have outdoor education, camps and excursions. Boys so often want real-world experience. They need to feel understood and have positive relationships with adults, especially parents and teachers, so they feel confident to ask questions and share challenges."

We – the staff and students alike – are very fortunate that this important part of holistic education is so well supported at Hale, at executive and Board level, as well as by the parent body in general.

I recently heard from a former colleague that up to 30% of parents at his new school had not given permission for their children to attend a Year 9 camp because the students would not have access to domestic bathroom facilities or showers for two nights. In complete contrast, as I attended the Year 12 Valedictory celebrations this year, a number of parents asked me to convey their thanks to the Outdoor Education staff for a program that had helped shape and, in some cases, had been a turning point for their sons. This was particularly in reference to the Exmouth camp: two weeks away from home, salt water bathing, self-reflection and self-management.

Indeed, as I proofread the 200-odd student reports from the Exmouth program this year, I am buoyed with great confidence that, all things considered and inside a very busy timetable, we are close to getting the balance right. Arduous as the task may be for the group leaders to compile honest and personal reflections deserving of a 14-day experience, the majority of students clearly acquitted themselves well, enjoyed their time and have grown from the adventure. It is a robust program and probably the largest of any of our peer schools

To put the time commitment into perspective, a student who spends one period per day over a 10-week term will spend around 37 hours in that classroom subject, face-to-face with their teacher. This is the same amount of time that a student on camp in Years 5 and 7 will spend in activity contact-time with their accompanying teacher. In Year 6 and Year 8 camps, activity contact-time is slightly higher at around 48 hours, and on Year 9 camp in Exmouth, a student who spends 12 hours a day engaged in camp activities (there is not much rest between anything!)

will spend more than four times what they would in a classroom subject for a term.

The unsung heroes of these camps, who often fly under the radar, are the classroom teachers, Education Assistants and medical supervisors who accompany the groups. It is an additional effort, voluntary for many, and at times a difficulty when camp programs are outside their own comfort zone. For the classroom teachers, they not only plan lessons in their absence and leave behind a raft of notes and documents for their stand-by teacher, but many also leave their families behind and need to organise their households. There is usually no phone reception at campsites, while the work emails continue to pile up to be dealt with on return. Regardless of this, for the benefit of their students, these staff continue to support the program and recognise the value of its outcomes, be they pastoral, social or physical. Their input is invaluable, whether it is accompanying Year 5 boys in Busselton or the Year 9 Frontier Group for 20 days in Exmouth.

With the calendar of camps finally back to normal in 2023, on behalf of the Outdoor Education Department and the students of Hale School, thanks to the accompanying teachers and support staff who joined them: overnight at Wembley Downs campus for Year 4, for three nights in Busselton with Year 5, for four nights in Albany with Year 6, for three nights in Nannup with Year 7, for four nights in Nannup with Year 8, and for 13 nights in Exmouth with Year 9.

On Remembrance Day this year, our Nulsen Youth Patrons shared their perspectives with a room full of Old Boys around the opportunity to be a voice for those living with disability. The resounding response from the audience was awe. The Old

Boys were visibly moved by the emotional intelligence of these Year 11 students as they were able to articulate their perspectives on the complexity of disability based on their experience through service learning. During the Havelock Lunch that followed, many of the Old Boys shared their feelings of pride in their school when witnessing this generation of Haleians lead through service. Joy!

2023 saw the return of the Service Learning trip to Cambodia post-COVID. Thirty Year 11 students worked hard on the tools in local villages and gained real-life perspectives around education and the freedom it brings. These young men arrived home just in time for Christmas, now looking at the world through new lenses whereby giving isn't purely a material transaction but the capacity to offer compassion, encouragement, kindness and joy.



At the start of Term 2, we had The Laramie Project, a show which respectfully and realistically captured the events of Matthew Shepard's murder in 1999. Under the guidance of Ms Massey, the cast and crew brought to light issues that still ring true 24 years later, with a number of noteworthy cameo performances from a variety of staff and students. I am incredibly proud of the cast for their mature cooperation in creating a memorably bold production that captivated audiences emotionally. Then we had Kicker Thompson, a brilliant showcase of Brine House boys and their willingness to dive headfirst into all of Hale's opportunities. In collaboration with our sister school, St Marys, the play brought attention to homesickness, an often overlooked topic that all the cast

members have experienced through boarding. The boys successfully expressed themselves in a show that toured the Wheatbelt, bringing the show to their family and friends.

Our first Cabaret Night in July brought new and old Redfoot members together for an entertaining evening of musical theatre. The Year 5s and 6s delighted audiences with their adaptation of The Jungle Book in September. For many of these boys, this was their first time performing to a large audience - a courageous step on stage, which I hope many of them will become confident with over the years. In October, we had our final Redfoot production for the year with The Lion, Witch, and the Wardrobe from our Year 8s and 9s. Headed by Ms Massey, the world of Narnia was brought to life, thanks in part to the assisted direction of some of the Year 11s. Evidently, Redfoot continues to offer a unique opportunity for boys to break year group barriers and develop connections across all ages.

Our curriculum-based Drama performances this year have provided a platform for all boys to engage and learn drama performance skills. The Year 12 showcase nights have been a fitting place to salute our departing alumni, as well as see their acting evolution as performers. The Year 8 to 11 Drama and Media showcases allow for a healthy ecosystem of group performances, duologue and

monologue work. A particular highlight for us this year was the 2023 PSA Theatre Sports competition, which Hale hosted. The cast aren't just actors, they're your mates who have your back and push you to be the best version of yourself. The stage isn't just a bunch of wooden planks, it's a place upon which I reflect fondly for the memories and acting ability I've been able to cultivate. Redfoot is home.

SPORT WRAP

It was another busy and successful year for the Hale sporting program. 2023 was highlighted by the resumption of our touring program, which saw hundreds of students from Years 9 to 12 travel to many parts of Western Australia, Australia and the world. These trips provide great sporting experiences beyond the PSA environment and allows our boys to see how sport is a great connector across the world.

While this brief report will focus primarily on our 1st teams, the numbers and quality across all year groups remain extremely high. It is worth noting that while we continue to have optional sport in the senior years, more than 90% of those students choose to represent the School in either the summer or winter seasons. This is a great reflection on the enthusiasm of our boys and dedication of our staff.

For our senior teams, it was an up and down Term 4 to start the summer season. Our 1sts basketball team finished where they left off the previous season and won their first five games in relative comfort. They then came out second best at Aguinas to finish the term. The trip to USA was amazing on many levels and the boys entered Term 1 hoping to claim at least a share of the premiership. That wasn't to be as a poor performance and the absence of big man Josh Ibukunoluwa saw a two-point loss to Christ Church, which ruled them out of contention. The team rallied to beat Aquinas at home in what was a memorable way to finish the season. Congratulations are in order for Josh Ibukunoluwa who was awarded Honours in basketball.

Our 1st XI cricket team had a strong Term 4 and after a tour of New Zealand, came out of the blocks quickly to take the lead in the Darlot Cup with four rounds to go. A disappointing performance against Christ Church pushed them back to second spot, and some frustrating games against Wesley and Scotch saw Christ Church take top spot for the second year in a row. The depth in Hale cricket continues to flourish with Hale fielding five senior teams and a further 11 junior teams, to have by far the most cricketers in the PSA. At the end of the season, we farewelled our 1st XI coach and cricketing legend Geoff Marsh who retired to live up in Coral Bay.

Hale's tennis program is strong in the middle year groups with our Year 8s and Year 9s again showing both consistency and quality. Our senior teams struggled to match that standard with our 1sts team settling into sixth position.

Coming off a tight second position in 2022, the Hale swim team was full of confidence heading into the Inters Championships. While there were many personal bests recorded, the team didn't manage to win as many races as the previous year with Scotch College continuing to improve to the point where they took out their first swimming title in more than 30 years.

In what was going to be a tough year for our boat shed, there was plenty to be positive about. The Year 10 rowers, both As and Bs, had a strong season with our A crew finishing second in their Head of the River regatta. The senior crews battled valiantly with our 1st VIII finishing in sixth position.

Hale volleyball continues to be the dominant force in the PSA. At the top, our 1st team went through undefeated again to claim their third successive PSA premiership. With two national representatives amongst the team, the boys' consistency and willingness to improve were trademarks of their season. And it was not just at PSA level where they excelled. They also took out the gold medal at the U17 National School Championships in Queensland in December to show their dominance in this sport. The younger teams also had plenty of success, which augers well for Hale volleyball in the years ahead. Honours in volleyball was awarded to Seb Northmore, which was fitting recognition for his contribution to the program.

Our senior water polo team had an up and down season, but overall, they were in the battle most weeks and gave their all. Finishing in fourth on the ladder, the team is young and should continue to improve in the seasons ahead.

Moving to winter and 2023 was one of Hale's best winter seasons in many years. From our six 1st team codes, we finished with two premierships (hockey and soccer), three second places (football, soccer, badminton) and one fourth place (cross country). The success was replicated at 2nd team level with those teams winning over 90% of the fixtures

played, which shows the depth that is evident across the senior levels of our sporting program.

Our 1st XI hockey team took the top spot by eight competition points after going through all 12 rounds undefeated. In that process, they scored 85 goals while conceding only 10. It was a remarkably consistent season where all players contributed to Hale's third premiership in a row (2022 being shared with Christ Church).

Not to be outdone, our 1st XI soccer team also went through the season undefeated. Their journey was slightly different, winning only one of their first four games, but three clean sheets kept them in the mix. It was in the second half of the year that they hit their strides, finishing with a six-game win streak to take top spot. It is Hale's fourth soccer premiership since 2018.

Our 1st XVIII had a strong season, finishing in second position to Scotch College. The team continued to improve throughout the season, with decisive victories against Aquinas College and Trinity College securing their spot behind Scotch.

Coming off the back of a premiership in 2022, our 1st XV rugby team ventured to Canada in their first overseas trip since COVID. This saw them start the season in strong fashion. After coming from behind to draw at Scotch, the season climaxed with a tight home loss to Scotch, which saw the team finish second.

It was a similar story for our badminton team, which, for large parts of the season, were in first position. After two strong performances against Wesley, the team could not repeat the results against Christ Church.

Finally, our cross country team continued to grow in both number and quality. The inclusion of several talented Year 7 and 8 runners provided depth to a group that was well led by the seniors. At the end of the season, the team settled into fourth position, their highest finish for many years.

While winter may have been brilliant for Hale, our athletics season didn't match those standards with a disappointing sixth position highlighting an area where we can improve in future seasons.




Heading into the last game against Scotch, we needed an outright win to still be in the



Fortunately, Bart Kelly, who was the last on court, led the team to victory, prevailing with a 100-99 game win at the halfway mark of the season.

After the holidays, which featured a week of pre-season preparation, we came up against Trinity. The temporary loss of their captain to COVID-19 was not enough to

throw off the boys, with an impressive and memorable 19-5 victory. Unfortunately, the rest of the season did not reflect an effort-equals-reward equation, losing subsequent matches to Guildford, Christ Church, Wesley, Aquinas and our last fixture against Scotch. Losing 5-19, it was a bittersweet ending playing on Scotch's grass alongside fellow Year 12 Connor Kinchin, who returned to win one last game for Hale tennis.

The 2022-23 season was a very successful one for the Hale volleyball program across all codes and teams. A record 120 boys choose to play volleyball this season, many for the first time. The squad depth created as a result of an increase of players would pay dividends throughout the PSA season, with the 1st VI, 10B, 7/8/9 A and B teams all recording undefeated seasons. Hale Volleyball's greatest triumph, however, came when the 1st VI became national champions after winning the Year 11 Honours division at the National Schools Cup on the Gold Coast.

Coming off two premiership seasons, a greater sense of importance was placed upon the 1st VI boys this year to achieve a rare 'three-peat'. After pre-season trials, a core group of experienced volleyballers were chosen to play the first fixture against a skillful Wesley side, a team that had taken us to five sets in the final fixture in the previous season. An air of excitement filled the Wesley gym as both sides took to the court. A tight first set win was followed up by a decisive second set victory, setting the team up for the third set, which was won comfortably. A commanding 3-0 conquest of a title-contending team would assist in laying down the foundation for what was going to be a triumphant season.

Our next fixture was against a rapidly improving Christ Church team, proving a tough team to side out against efficiently. However, a comfortable 3-0 win would further reinforce the boys' confidence leading into fixtures against the traditionally weaker teams of Trinity, Scotch and Guildford. Straightforward wins against these sides built a great sense of confidence heading into our biggest

fixture of the season against Aquinas. Significant hype surrounded the game. In front of a packed Hale gymnasium, close first and second set wins were followed by our first and only set loss for the season. A loud chorus of Hale voices joined together to rally the boys, loudly continuing throughout the fourth set, while Hale built a commanding 24-17 lead. A demanding serve from Will Busby was met with a weak platform, shanking the ball outside the court and into the crowd. A barrage of Hale supporters ran onto court, embracing the 1st VI who had now secured one hand on the premiership.

After a successful summer holiday Gold Coast trip, where a 3-1 win over Queensland GPS champions Nudgee College secured a national championship, an overwhelming sensation of domination fuelled the remainder of the PSA competition. After 3-0 wins against Wesley and Christ Church came and went, Hale reached the pointy end of the PSA season.

Successive victories against Guildford and Trinity again led us into another Aquinas fixture, but this time playing away. A large crowd of noisy Aguinas boys filled the back of the gym, creating a tense atmosphere that was bound to erupt at the culmination of every point. A tightly fought first set win was followed by a decisive second set that saw both teams surpass the 25-point mark. At 26-25, Sebastian Northmore would swing high off hands, winning the set. A deafening ruckus echoed from the back of the gymnasium; a sea of blue jubilant and sensing a big win. A quicklywon third set saw us win the Brother Carrigg Shield for the third successive year and also marked the first time a Hale VI team had beat an Aguinas team 3-0.

Reflecting on the successes achieved throughout the volleyball season, it is important to recognise the efforts of the three 1st VI coaches. Mr Cranely's guidance and expertise transformed us into a formidable team over three seasons. Jed Walker's role as an assistant coach saw him mentor the 1st VI boys, using knowledge learned from his season playing for the WA Steel and injecting it back into the team. Lastly, Mr Northmore, who has been the backbone of the Hale Volleyball program for the last 10 years, tirelessly devoting himself to the meticulous planning of volleyball -related events and providing unwavering encouragement.



A convincing opening fixture against Guildford set us up for the strong season ahead. Forming the foundations for the games to come, we defined ourselves as a team that wins the ball at the contest, uses the first option, and moves the ball with dare. Our blistering ball movement helped us catch Guildford off guard and allowed our key forwards to get on the end of some quality passages of play. Our pre-season started with the resumption of our bi-annual Melbourne Hockey Tour where we participated in the Melbourne Grammar International Schools Cup. Over the course of four days, we played seven games against other schools from around Australia. With convincing wins against Melbourne Grammar School (5-3) in the semi-final and St Peter's College, Adelaide (9-2)) in the final, we won the cup for the first time, from three previous attempts!

Having won the previous two Ray House Cups and with a large contingent of returning, experienced Year 12s forming the nucleus of our side this year, we knew that if we played anywhere near our potential as a group, we would be very hard to stop in our quest to achieve something that no other Hale School hockey team had been able to do in the past: win three consecutive Ray House Cups.

Our first fixture of the year was a home game against Guildford Grammar where we continued our red-hot tour form, hitting the ground running with a comprehensive 23-0 win. This was followed by another huge win (10-2) against Wesley College. Wins against Aquinas, Scotch and Trinity would see us head into the last game of the round, a top-of-the-table clash against an also undefeated Christ Church Grammar School. As has been the case for the past three years, the Hale versus CCGS fixtures have been season defining, with the victor almost certainly getting one hand on the Ray House Cup. This game was a typical arm wrestle, which produced a very high standard of hockey. We were able to score two early goals to gain ascendency of the game, controlling the

midfield and not giving up any chances in defence. CCGS scored in the final minute to leave the result 2-1 in our favour, greatly improving our chances of completing the three-peat.

Second round highlights included another comfortable win against Guildford, and hard-fought tussles with both Wesley (4-3) and Aquinas (2-0) before arguably our best team performance of the year, an 8-0 win over Scotch. These results combined with CCGS dropping some points to Aguinas and Wesley meant that the Ray House was secured before the final round game against the former. A draw in that dead rubber saw us win our third consecutive Ray House Cup with our best-ever winning season with 11 wins and one draw (33 points). This is the School's sixth Ray House Cup win in the past 12 years and the eighth in the history of the School.

Combined with a strong 2nd XI team, there is a very talented group of Year 8 and 9 boys who will be pushing for selection next season.
