EXCERPT FROM SPEECH DAY ADDRESS 2014

There is a theory that if you want to change the world, you start by making your bed. Sounds silly but at the University of Texas Commencement Address this year, the guest speaker was Admiral William McRaven, ninth commander of U.S. Special Operations Command, who was in charge of the Navy Seal team that killed Osama Bin Laden.

Apart from making your bed, Admiral McRaven also referred to having courage, being resilient, taking risks, being strong, getting back up when vou get knocked over, and working in teams as attributes and behaviours required if you are going to change the world. If we make it a little more realistic than changing the world, we could have as our outcome making a difference in your life or to the lives of those around you - your family, friends, teammates. If I asked vou how vou could make difference to others, you would probably refer to a specific action. And rightly so. But for it to be a life changer, it has to be more than a physical action, it has to be based around your attitude. You have to want to do it. And your behaviour needs to reflect this. Admiral McRaven's homily about making your bed highlights 'a sense of pride', the fact that 'doing little things matter' and 'the need for all of us to receive encouragement'.

The slogan of the University of Texas where the McRaven address was delivered is "What starts here changes the world". Whilst it is perhaps a bit presumptuous, the sentiment is valid. Our purpose and our behaviours are formed during our years at school and at home and it is incumbent upon us all to equip the young men who leave school and move into the wide world with the skills, hard and soft, as well as attitudes that will enable them to be

significant in society. I say significant because I love the quote by John Maxwell who said "Success is when you add value to yourself; significance is when you add value to others."

As I wrote this paragraph last Sunday, my attention was drawn to the Redfoot Green where a number of our senior students, including Year 12 leavers, returned of their own volition to devise a pantomime to perform to local primary schools earlier this week.

Drama is just one area where the School's Vision to provide opportunities for every boy to excel, is played out. Further, we must pay special attention to delivering on 'moments of truth'; highly personal events that shape a boy's experience. As we end 2014, I hope every boy here can tell their parents on the way home about an opportunity they have had to excel this year and a "moment of truth" - be it an occasion when you have encountered an academic or personal challenge and have been helped in a manner that builds self-esteem, resilience and character, or perhaps a realisation that you have achieved a personal best in an area, or areas, of endeavour.

There should also be moments of inspiration and aspiration. To be part of one or more PSA trophy-winning sporting teams this year (six in total) should have provided many such moments, as will the production of Godspell early in the year. It set the aspirational benchmark in music and drama for the year. The success of the da Vinci teams in winning the state titles, the Philosothon team's participation in the national finals rounding out a stellar period of success at state level since its inception, involvement in the debating programme - their end of season photograph is bigger than the athletics team, being promoted from the Cs to the Bs in your favourite sport or achieving a mark or grade never seen before on your semester report, each one worthy of celebration or at least quiet satisfaction. Attempting the highest abseil or rock climb on the Exmouth camp or getting to know three fellows in your year group who were previously strangers to you, being part of the Pedal Prix challenge in Busselton, or the ever-expanding Service Learning programme, perhaps

the fun of the Jazz Orchestra with Mr Kerr or the Hale Senior Choir with Mr Venables, perhaps being able to train in the new pool. Or even the satisfaction of surviving the frull cull...

There are myriad state and national level sportsmen in our midst, numerous Duke of Edinburgh awardees, multiple medal and prize winners in national level academic competitions - all young men whose character development is well and truly on the right trajectory and who hopefully provide moments of inspiration and aspiration for others in the school.

And it is vital that as a community we identify ways in which we can enhance our offerings further. The day we become so comfortable in our environment that we can say the way we do it is the only way, is the day we will stop developing; we may continue to achieve but we will not grow.

To that end, this year various aroups throughout the school have been involved in: a pastoral care review group which included a fact finding mission to eight Sydney schools, a Boys' Education research group, a staff leadership development programme, an audit of our IT set-up, a review of Teaching and Learning practices and programmes and the Headmaster's Survey for Parents. All have been worthwhile and I thank staff, parents and students who have been asked to complete questionnaires or attend focus group meetings. Several developments have already been enacted as a result and many more are in the pipeline for 2015.

As for the Parent Survey, the feedback has been very helpful, it enables improvement and provides reality checks. Many parents provided detailed responses with a clear rationale for their suggestions. All that was written proved to be interesting and very useful, both in seeing where we are 'getting it right' and where action is needed to improve.

In general terms, the academic programme, the teaching staff, the culture/Values/community spirit, co-curricular offerings, facilities, and pastoral care



were at the top of the 'best aspects' responses, while certain aspects of teaching, communication, and specific issues in the sport programme were noted as areas in need of attention. Interestingly, when asked three years ago the same questions elicited very similar responses.

Although not at the top of the list in terms of frequency of comment, I was interested to receive feedback from 13 families on the new style of reporting introduced in the past 12 months. Rising school fees were commented upon by eight families while six families tabled their support for the longer mid-year break being introduced at other schools.

As usual, the section which invited extended responses was full of personal anecdotes, blunt suggestions and considered opinions. They were invaluable and have been collated and discussed with relevant individuals and groups throughout the school. One parent provided a graphic comparison between parent teacher nights and speed dating. Whilst not having firsthand knowledge of the latter concept, there is no doubt I will be taking a closer interest in the goings-on at the parent teacher meetings in this Hall next year. Another wrote: "I think the school could be a little more diligent in enforcing the correct uniform and haircuts. Our scruffy Year 12 seems to have gotten away with his ridiculous haircut for way too long ... "

The final question asked families to rate their 'level of satisfaction' with the Hale School experience. 69% of respondents recorded their rating as Very Satisfied, 23% as Satisfied. This is an affirming result but is not one which leads us to complacency. The educational landscape is changing constantly in terms of: curriculum, funding, societal expectations, competing demands and standards of teaching and leadership. We need to be abreast of the developments - prepared to lead in some, deliberately hasten slowly in others - and be mindful of the consequences of our decisions in all cases.

It is not just the educational landscape which is changing. So too are the expectations on parents. In this day and age, it is hard being a parent, it is far easier to be a friend. During the year I referred to a book written by a colleague, Dr Tim Hawkes - 10 conversations you must have with your son'. The 'conversations' are titled: You are loved; Identity; Values; Achievement; and Coping, among others. However, apart from the conversations themselves, it was the rationale for writing the book that grabbed my interest. Dr Hawkes included a section "Why the conversations were chosen" and listed the following:

Telling a son that he is loved. A son needs at least one adult who adores him, preferably two. A son needs to know that he is a priority in someone's life. A son needs to be loved and he also needs to know he is loved.

Encouraging a son to know himself.

A son must develop an understanding of self. A boy needs to understand his body, mind, heart and soul as well as his chemistry, his hardwiring, his character.

Helping a son to choose an appropriate moral code.

In the end, character is demonstrated by choices. There can be a temptation for parents to leave many of these choices to their son... but give no information to help him make his choice. The results of these uninformed choices can be tragic.

Assisting a son to accept responsibility.

A boy hell-bent on acquiring the potent joys of increased freedom with age must be introduced to the reality of increased responsibility and the even less alluring reality of increased accountability.

Instructing a son how to live within a community.

Boys require guidance in how to live within a community. They need to learn the skills of living with people who are different to them. A boy must learn that the inept and indifferent cannot always be removed by the press of a delete button.

In general terms we all want the same things for our sons, so we need to work together to provide the role modelling and the setting of values required.

One of the buzz-words connected with education in the 21st century is innovation According to a media discussion of an OECD report titled Measuring Innovation in Education released in mid-2014, Australian schools lack innovation. The study tracked changes in schools and in teaching practices between 2000 and 2011 in OECD countries. Interestingly, in many countries the school sector is performing better on innovation than many other industries across a range of factors. Innovation usually arises in the context of a shared desire for improvement or change, usually in response to a perceived need for challenge.

So how can a well-established school with a strong learning culture such as Hale School embrace innovation? We value the traditions and find comfort in the repeated patterns that comprise life at Hale. However, we will not be allowed to remain comfortably in that space.

The challenge we all face is the rapidly changing world into which Hale students will graduate. We know that we must assist students to develop agile minds, broad capacity and deep resilience. Some traditional methods will continue to serve this objective admirably - there remains a place for rigour, for intellectual mastery of content, for learning and remembering good techniques in Maths, English and Science. Yet there are countless new possibilities for enriching and enlivening the experience of learning. It is not so much a matter of whether or not to embrace innovation but the discernment to know what is substantial and of value from what is transient.

Where does innovation come from? Some would say it comes from asking the right questions. The only difference between an innovator and anybody else is not that the innovator sees more than everybody else but that he or she asks questions nobody else does.

An innovative school is one in which the question is as important as the answer and where curiosity is celebrated just as readily as achievement.

It is incumbent on all of us who work at Hale to ask such questions.



On that note, I am extremely grateful for the dedication and hard work of the teaching staff. It is a common occurrence to see members of staff engaged in conversations, extra lessons, and tutorials around the school; it would be easy to forget that so much of this time is willingly given above the demands of full teaching timetables to enable the student to grasp the concept, practise another question or unravel the complexities of some theory or argument. To all of the staff, without whom the changes, developments and progress over this academic year would not have been possible, I thank you most sincerely. There have been, naturally enough, moments of frustration but many moments of enjoyment and achievement too. As one parent with children at different schools observed in the parent survey, "The difference with Hale is the dedication of the staff."

I ask you to join me in acknowledging all staff for their efforts this year.

I would now like to announce the School Prefect team for next year. A CONVERSATION WITH JACK

As I sat in the Valedictory service for the Year 12s of 2014 and listened to the reflection of Jack Weston, it not only made me think about what I try to do in Chapel, but also how I never really have a chance to find out what effect this time has on the young men who attend.

This has also made me wonder if my philosophy of Chapel resonates with Jack's reflection on his time at Hale School.

From Father Dougall: "Come as you are!" Isn't that the gospel, the message Jesus Christ preached?

As I contemplate what it means to be the Chaplain at Hale, I think about what I hope to achieve and if it fits with the "Come as you are!" proclamation.

In Chapel and worship I believe we compel the experience and not belief. When boys attend Chapel, they are invited to worship and to pray with us but are not coerced or compelled.

The Chapel service offers a quiet time, an opportunity to worship God, to understand the gift of God in Jesus, to reflect and be still - to explore the inner space, to celebrate all that is good and beautiful, to come to terms with the darker side of life, to express the joy of being alive, and to discover meaning and purpose in living.

Jack's response: As we have progressed through our years at Hale School, Chapel has been a constant presence. I believe that Chapel is unique because each young man may have a completely individual experience in the same 5a period. In this way it varies from almost all other aspects of our school days where we are all learning for the same test or training for the same basic goal - to beat Scotch. My spiritual experience at Hale is likely to be different to yours. For me, like for a lot of us, it has transformed over my time here. In my younger years, there was not a lot of pressure in life and Chapel mostly served as a lucky break from extended maths. But as I have grown, so has the importance of Chapel. As we get busy with school and sport we tend not to stop and reflect on our roles as ambassadors for ourselves, our family, school, community and country. Chapel gives us this opportunity. An opportunity I feel we all need.

From Father Dougall: Chapel gives the boys the opportunity to explore values and beliefs, to understand their feelings and emotions, to explore their own identity and to see how their words and actions impact on others. They learn how to respect and be respected - to understand and respect the difference and integrity of others.

Jack's response: For many, Chapel is a chance to check and refocus our moral compass. For many, it is a chance to affirm that our actions are good in the eyes of God. It is a chance to stop, think, reflect on our actions and make sure that the way we are behaving is in line with our moral beliefs and, if it is not, commit to making a change.

From Father Dougall: We hope that boys will show empathy for those who suffer and those who are less fortunate than themselves. That they will have the courage to defend belief by being able to express their own belief, as well as having the courage to challenge the indifference and apathy which are hallmarks of modern life in the 21st century.

Jack's response: As we know, we are all incredibly privileged to lead the lives we lead, to have the support of our parents, an education second to none, and to have the opportunity to become whatever we want to become. I find that within such a bubble of privilege it can be easy to focus too much on ourselves and our own ambitions.

Embracing spirituality in my life through my reflections in Chapel and through my time as an Anglicare Youth Ambassador has helped to reinforce my compassion for those less fortunate and also enact the responsibility, which I believe we - those who have won genealogical lotto - have to serve our community and those less fortunate.

What makes up your true character is how you behave when no one will see you do wrong, when there is little chance of consequence. I feel that the development of good character is a cornerstone of our development as young men at Hale School.


From Father Dougall:

THE SCHOOL IS VERY PROUD OF THE ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE YEAR 12 STUDENTS OF 2014, 100% OF WHOM ACHIEVED THE WA CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION.

The number of Year 12 students at Hale in 2014 numbered 163. This is the 10th largest Year 12 cohort of the 159 secondary schools with Year 12 students in WA. The total number at Hale with an ATAR was 150 and 13 students received Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualifications.

The median ATAR of 91.10, the sixth highest of any school in the state and the second highest for a boys' school was consistent with the School's exceptionally high ATAR median over the past eight years. Hale's median ATAR has been above 90 every year since 2007 and for five of those years, above 91.

In recent years the School has striven to refresh and renew its culture of good learning and the pursuit of excellence as it applies to each student. The School provides opportunities for every boy to excel, as our vision exhorts us to do. Some of the defining features of the School's culture of good learning are:

- The celebration of academic effort and success.
- Our students' respect for learning and their desire to learn.
 - The pride and determination evident in our students' approach to learning.

- Our expert, passionate teachers.
- The high standards and high expectations, held equally by students, parents and teachers.

OUTSTANDING ATAR RESULTS

The ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank) indicates an individual ranking against all others in Australia who finished or would have finished their secondary education in 2014.

The maximum possible ATAR or 'perfect score' of 99.95 was achieved by two students from Hale School: Andy Wang and Mina Sorsok. In WA as a whole, only 11 students attained 99.95.

13 or 8.7% of our students were in the top 1% of the nation with an ATAR of 99 or above.

47 or 31.3% of our students were in the top 5% of the nation with an ATAR of 95 or above.

80 or 53.3% of our students were in the top 10% of the nation with an ATAR of 90 or above.

Hale School's median ATAR for 2014 was 91.10.

OUTSTANDING BOARDERS' PERFORMANCE IN THE WACE

An outstanding feature of 2014 was the academic performance of boarders. For the first time, the average ATAR of 89 achieved by boarders exceeded the average ATAR of 88 achieved by the whole Year 12 cohort. (There were 31 Year 12 boarders in total and 25 were university-bound students who achieved an ATAR).

Rural educational disadvantage is recognised as a challenge Australia-wide and against that context it can be claimed that the boarding experience at Hale adds significant value to boarders' academic outcomes. Factors contributing include the environment of boarding at Hale, the study routines, the individual support and tutoring, the culture of constant improvement in learning for each boarding student, and the positive role models in terms of approach to study, that senior boarding students provide.

(16) STAGE 3 COURSES WITH THE HIGHEST PERFORMING STUDENTS

Another important measure of a school's academic strength is the number of different courses which are recognised by the Schools Curriculum and Standards Authority as having 'top performing students' (based on the number of students with a WACE course score over 75%). Hale had 16 Stage 3 courses in this category in 2014, the equal highest number in the School's history.

The courses were: Accounting and Finance; Ancient History; Chemistry; Economics; Engineering Studies; French; Geography; Literature; Materials, Design and Technology; Mathematics 3AB; Mathematics 3CD; Mathematics Specialist; Physical Education Studies; Physics; Politics and Law; Visual Arts.

The following is a comment I often hear colleagues and researchers say about schools: "One thing that is constant in schools is change!" To be honest, in January I thought 2014 would be a year of little change, a year when we took time to consolidate. Discussions and work continued to bring the Learning Hub concept to fruition. The process we were led through in the design phase of the Art Room challenged us to define and articulate our vision for education in the future. Once articulated, the redevelopment master plan for the Junior School was drafted by the architects. Within the plan, the Library was to be relocated to the centre or 'hub' of the school. In addition to being a place for books and literature promotion, the 'Learning Hub' is also a place of higher order and inquiry thinking, collaboration, ideas and mobile technology.

Close to two years since its inception, the Learning Hub plans were finalised. Refurbishment of the existing Library started in mid-November, with the goal of the 'Hub' being ready for the start of the 2015 academic year.

Mrs Alicia Chisholm accepted an offer to become the Learning Hub Coordinator. I know Alicia is very excited by the potential of the space, along with the opportunity to work collaboratively with all teachers. New ideas and creativity will be further enhanced by the likes of Mr Danny Parker (Author in Residence), Ms Bronwyn Kay (Enrichment Coordinator) and Toby Trewin (IT Curriculum Leader). I look forward to reporting on the exciting opportunities that have been brought to fruition in the 2015 Cygnet.

The teaching of languages other than English has been a significant offering at Hale School for many years. Spanish teacher, Señora Cecilia Mata, has implemented a programme that is rich in culture, experience and vocabulary. There is no doubt, because of our geographical position, global connections and rapidly growing business interactions with Asia, that we need to prepare our students in a way that will allow them to engage with Asia, in particular China. This year, in partnership with the Confucius Institute. we finalised plans to introduce Chinese into the Junior School from 2015. Commencing with Years 1 to 3 in 2015, the implementation of Chinese will continue to progress through the Junior School year levels during the coming years.

The Junior School continues to be a vibrant place with a busy schedule. In addition to the day to day classroom programmes, the boys were involved in academic competitions and specialised programmes, music lessons and numerous performances, Outdoor Education camps, interhouse and interschool sport, special days devoted to construction, service learning and simply having fun. These events are a part of everyday life in the Junior School, making it a very exciting place to be.

Such co-curricular offerings are only possible due to the continued hard work, dedication and inspiration of the teaching team and support staff. I often find myself in awe of what they are prepared to do to ensure all boys have the opportunity to excel. I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank them for their commitment to the school and the boys.

After 29 years of dedicated service to Hale School and a successful teaching career as Teacher Librarian, Mrs. Marianne Swain decided to retire at the end of 2014. Another 'Pressley / Simpson' production, with the creative assistance of our Art specialist, Ms Lisa Hakkinen, saw a very entertaining assembly dedicated to celebrating Marianne's career and legacy. The farewell function held later in the day, was an opportunity for staff, both past and present, to join Marianne

and her family in celebrating her contribution to Hale life. We wish her the best as she embarks on the next stage of her journey.

On behalf of the Junior School community, I congratulate and thank Mrs Swain for all she has contributed to Hale.

To some extent, 2014 was a year of consolidation. We continued to respond to the external demands placed on us and also to those demands that arose during the day to day life of the School. Much work has gone into preparing for 2015. The move to the seven day timetable in 2015 has required extensive planning and logistical preparation, perhaps more than we were expecting. As we transition to 2015, we do so with excitement and optimism. We have many exciting ideas in place. We have the team! We are excited!

JUNIOR School Events

ENRICHMENT INQUIRY

This year selected Junior School boys participated in a number of challenging and exciting enrichment inquiry programmes. Each was designed to support and enhance the core curriculum and provide opportunities for further practice in using thinking strategies and problem solving methods. The inquiry units were also a wonderful opportunity for boys to develop their skills in collaboration, leadership and creativity with peers in other classes and year groups.

During Term 1, the Junior Programme required Year 1 and 2 boys to be resourceful and creative in their innovation of a piece of hard rubbish from the local tip. During Terms 2 and 3, small groups of Year 1 and 2 boys worked together to recreate da Vinci catapults, digital presentations using 'MakeyMakey' electronics and 'Scratch the Cat' programming software.

The Middle Programme in Term 1 enabled Year 3 and 4 boys to employ strategy and tactics when challenging opponents in complex games. During Term 2, a small group of Year 3 and 4 boys learnt to programme small robots to complete rescue missions, employing an approach of trial and error to increase their knowledge and skills. Term 3 saw the green thumbs of Years 3 and 4 work towards establishing a native edible garden - The Bush Supermarket - in the Hale Junior School grounds.

Throughout the year, small groups of Year 5 and 6 boys were challenged to create a three-dimensional structure that could be rotated or transformed in order for it to be perceived differently from three different perspectives.

Term 4 saw Year 1, 2 and 5 boys work as a team to plan and bring to life a Christmas market in the Junior School, while a group of Year 3 and 4 boys formed a Community of Inquiry to explore philosophical concepts and further develop their higher order thinking skills.



Francis of Assisi once said, "Start by doing what's necessary; then do what's possible; and suddenly you are doing the impossible." While I only came across this quote recently, it could easily have been the Middle School theme for this year. It is my firm opinion that one of the best aspects about the Middle School culture is the 'can do' attitude that is shared by the students. The Middle School only encompasses two years. so the journey through it is briefer than any other subschool. However, each year nearly four hundred boys often go way beyond what they or their families thought possible. As a result, they move from 'doing what's necessary' to 'doing the impossible.' With this in mind, I trust that you enjoy the following highlights of the 2014 academic year.

STAFF

The quality of the teachers and the relationships formed between staff and students are the most important schoolbased factors that impact upon student learning. From a Middle School perspective, the Pastoral Care Leaders (PCLs) form the most influential group of staff. In 2014, we welcomed five new PCLs into this critical role. Ms Amber Levien, was appointed on a permanent basis as a member of the Year 8 team and the Art department. Joining her were two existing Hale staff members, Mrs Jenna Roche (who went on maternity leave and was replaced by Mr Byron Northmore in Term 4) and Mr Warrick Nelson. Their addition to the Year 8 PCL team further strengthens an already high quality group. The Year 7 PLC team also welcomed two young and exciting members of staff. Ms Kylie Sandover, who joined us from Penhros College, and Mr Mark Williamson, a highly regarded Old Boy who has spent the last period of his career living and teaching in London.

Their energy, intelligence and highly dedicated approach to

teaching have added much to the Middle School community. Mr Shawn Stone, a foundation member of the Middle School, was farewelled this year. Mr Stone has decided to pursue leadership opportunities beyond Hale School as well as continue his studies. Over the years, Mr Stone has offered much to the School, both as a PCL and as an outstanding basketball coach. We wish him well for the future.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

Once again Hale's formidable academic reputation was on full display. Students across a range of subjects achieved outstanding results. Worthy of particular note are the following achievements across a number of national competitions.

- Australian Mathematics Competition -1 prize - top 0.3% of the state 10 high distinctions and 43 distinctions
- UNSW ICAS Writing -4 high distinctions and 9 distinctions
- UNSW ICAS English -16 distinctions
- UNSW ICAS Science -2 high distinctions and 12 distinctions
- Australian History Competition -2 high distinctions and 7 distinctions
- Australian Geography
 Competition 27 high distinctions and
 10 distinctions
- STEM four Year 7 students won the national competition for their division

While striving for academic excellence should always be recognised and celebrated, in many ways it is the students who work diligently week after week gradually becoming more adept at their studies of whom we are most proud. While their names may not appear on academic lists or be applauded at assemblies, I trust that they take comfort in knowing that their endeavour has been noticed and will ultimately be rewarded as they work towards achieving personal excellence.

At the conclusion of 2013 a decision was made to

introduce a number of new academic leadership positions within the Middle School. Under the guidance of Mr Mark Coombes, Head of Middle School Curriculum, seven curriculum coordinators representing English, Geography, History, Mathematics and Science have been meeting regularly ensuring the curriculum in the Middle School remains engaging, challenging and relevant. Two priorities have dominated their agenda. The first was an exploration of 21st century learning skills. In conjunction with an external agency, the team explored the range of skills required by students to succeed in the globalised, knowledge-based world of today. 21st Century Learning Design, or 21CLD, helps teachers redesign their existing lessons and learning activities to build students' 21st century skills. The second major project was the development of a set of guiding principles around the importance of feedback in enhancing student learning. After reviewing the wellregarded work of John Hattie and Helen Timperley, the team has established a set of principles that will guide all Middle School teachers on the importance of feedback. It is envisaged that these principles will become a significant focus for staff next year.

This report provides only a brief insight into Middle School life. There are numerous other events, performances and achievements that encourage and motivate the students to further develop a strong sense of self-worth, that challenge them to be active contributors to the life of the School and which urge them to become autonomous learners who have a desire to 'be the best that they can be' in all of their endeavours. Finally, I express my sincere appreciation to the parents, grandparents and friends of the School. We thank you for your ongoing support and commitment. Rest assured, we will continue to honour your faith in us as we endeavour to offer an outstanding education to the boys in the Middle School.




The year of 2014 was one that the class of 8.8 will never forget. So many lasting friendships continued whilst we also created whole new ones.

YEAR 8 ANZAC PROJECT AND CANBERRA TOUR

During the first months of the school year, 40 Hale students from Middle School researched the lives of 43 Old Haleians who lost their lives during the Great War and are commemorated in the Hale School Memorial Grove.

This important research was part of the foundation work in preparation for their tour to Canberra which occurred in April. The purpose was to give the students an understanding of what these men went through and to develop empathy and a genuine connection with them. It was also hoped that this research would enrich the students' experiences during their trip, especially at the Australian

War Memorial. The 43 Old Haleians are all on the Roll of Honour surrounding the Flame of Eternity at the Australian War Memorial. This was to be a focal point of the impending tour.

During the two weeks prior to the trip, the boys busily finalised their research on their chosen Old Haleian, gathering vital information from both the Australian War Memorial website and the resources of the Hale School Heritage Centre. They were able to find out about their soldier's life prior to enlistment, the details of his embarkation from Australia, his marriage status, enlistment date, service record, which unit he served in, where he fought, when he died and where he was buried.

The culmination of the boys' hard work resulted in 40 research posters with Mr Bill Edgar and current Hale School Museum archivist Harry Weston selecting three winners. The winners each received a comfort parcel similar to those received by soldiers in The Great War.

This interesting and creative activity was the perfect preparation for the students' visit to Canberra. It enhanced their understanding of the importance of the trip and allowed them to reflect and remember each of their Old Haleians and the sacrifice they made.

The Canberra Tour was very busy and involved but all who went thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

Service Learning can be described as is a method of encouraging student learning and development through active participation in thoughtfully organised service that is conducted in, and meets the needs of, the community.



SUMMER SPORT

2014 has been another exciting and successful year for sport at Hale School. Term 1 saw the opening of the Aquatic Centre and many boys have benefited significantly already from the world class facility. It was also pleasing to see the success that the first group of boys to pass through the Middle School (current Year 12s) had at first team level winning three summer sport trophies (water polo, tennis and swimming).

Basketball continued to be one of the more popular summer sports this year with numbers continuing to rise. The Middle School basketball teams all had successful starts to the year. The 7As won four games and lost two and in what was a great sign of the depth of talent in Year 7 basketball the 7B and 7C sides were both undefeated. The 8As completed a successful Term 1 with five wins and one loss while the 8Bs had five wins and the 8Cs had four wins and two losses. Daniel Rogers (Year 7) was selected to represent Western Australia in the Under 12 Australian Basketball Championships in Townsville.

Middle School cricket numbers were at an all-time high with both year groups able to field three teams each. The 7As won as many games as they lost while the 7Bs and Cs were both able to record more wins than losses. The 8As had a rough start to the year losing every game but were able to make amends early in Term 4 by stringing a couple of wins together. The 8Bs had a good Term 1 winning four games as did the 8Cs who were highly competitive with a couple of wins and a draw

The rowers have been going from strength to strength in recent years as the sport begins to gain ground on some of the more popular summer sporting options. There is always a steady stream of boys signing up for Year 8 rowing and this year was no different with just over 30 boys wanting to get involved. The air-conditioned comfort of the recently fitted out fitness centre has made conditions far more bearable for the boys to train. In Term 4 the Year 8 boys were fortunate enough to be involved in some small regattas aimed at improving the boys' boatmanship and developing the necessary skills to race successfully in the 2015 regatta season.

Championships were held at Challenge Stadium on 13 March. After Hale School's historic win in 2013 training in the old pool the challenge was set to see if the boys could again bring home the trophy in the first year of training in the new pool. Hale School continued to build on the previous year's success finishing in first place (1131 points) ahead of Christ Church Grammar School second (960 points) and Wesley College third place (832.5 points). There were some fantastic performances highlighted by a couple of our Middle School relay teams which broke records on the night. These were the Under 13 200m Medley relay team of Finlay Player, Zachery Chan, Henry Cook and Cooper Brinkworth (2:20:48) and the 4 x 50m Freestyle team of Harry Saggers, Lachlan McKay, Samuel Rowbottam and Joel Hill (2:04:17).

Through the winter season the tennis precinct had the finishing touches put in place to the new grassed bank area and sheltered viewing platform, making the tennis a far more spectator friendly sport. The 7As and 7Bs were outstanding in Term 1. Under the watchful eye of

Mr Mark Coombes, both teams went through the season undefeated. The 8As only lost the one match while the 8Bs and 8Cs each had four wins and two losses.

All 7/8/9 volleyball teams had identical win/loss records at the end of Term 1. All three teams played six games for three wins and three losses.

Water polo numbers soared from Term 1 (57) to Term 4 (75) this year and I am sure that this is in part due to the fantastic new facility that the boys have to train and play in. Another contributing factor is the introduction of water polo into the Physical Education programme across all age groups. Exposure to the game through the PE curriculum has ensured more boys are fully equipped with the necessary skills to confidently play at PSA level. The 7/8/9 As had three wins and three losses for the term. The 7/8/9 Bs had four wins and one loss, while the 7/8/9 Cs won five and lost one.

WINTER SPORT

The junior cross country team finished in fourth place again this season - a fairly consistent placing in recent years. The culture of Middle School boys 'doubling up' by playing in a PSA team sport on Friday afternoons and then backing up and running with the senior cross country boys on Saturday mornings is a pleasing one and one that we hope will continue to grow.

The 7A football team had another very successful season under Mr Chris McClelland with the boys going through the season undefeated on ten wins. The 7Bs were also a formidable team to play against as they compiled eight wins from their nine games. The 8As had an 'up and down' season recording four wins and six losses while it was a similar story for the 8B side that won three games and lost seven. Year 7 students Kellen Johnson and Samuel Smith were both selected to represent Western Australia at the Under 12 Australian Schoolbovs Championships in Sydney.

With the addition of a brand new playing surface this year the profile of hockey at Hale School was further strengthened with the 1st XI side taking out the Ray House Cup as PSA Champions for the second time in three vears. For the first time ever we were able to field three teams in each of the Year 7 and 8 grades. A great test of the depth of our school hockey programme is always the battle for the Tregonning trophy played between Hale School and Christ Church Grammar School in hockey. All teams contribute to the final total and it was again

pleasing to win this trophy for the fifth year in a row. The 7As won six and lost four. The 7Bs were the most successful Middle School hockey team recording nine wins and only the one loss while the 7Cs had seven wins, two losses and a draw. The 8As capped a great season under Mr Ross Barron finishing equal top of the Year 8A hockey standings with eight wins, a loss and a draw. The 8Bs and 8Cs both won four, lost two and drew two. In what is a pleasing sign of some of the talent coming out of our hockey programme Callum Wong, Marcus Jorgensen, Sam Ashton, Mitchell Havercroft and Jack Pearce were all selected to represent Western Australia in their respective age groups.

The rugby programme appears to go from strength to strength each year. The 1st XV took out the Brother Redmond Trophy for the twelfth consecutive year while our Middle School rugby players continue to learn their craft under some very experienced and highly credentialed coaches. The 8A side accumulated seven wins and three losses for the season while the 7As finished with as many wins as losses (five and five).

In soccer the 7As had a mixed year with six wins and four losses. The 7B side were the most successful Middle School team with nine wins and one loss while the 7Cs won seven, lost two and drew one. Mr Ken Moir was a welcome addition to the Middle School soccer coaching team where he inherited a more than handy 8A side guiding them to eight wins, one loss and a draw. The 8Bs won four, lost four and drew two. The 8Cs played ten games - winning four, losing four and drawing two.

The PSA Athletics Carnival was held on Friday 12 September at A.K Reserve. Hale School finished in fourth place (1439 points), behind Trinity College (1494), Scotch College (1593) and winners Aquinas College (1625). Lachlan McKay (Year 7) finished first (75 points) in the top point scorers across all schools in the PSA Under 13 division while Mitchell Georgiades (Year 7) finished in second position in the PSA on 68 points. The Under 13 age group was ranked first amongst all schools and was also the best performed age group in the School.

Finally, sport at Hale School could not happen without the help of our coaches, managers, officials, administrators, kitchen staff and supportive parents and friends of the Hale School community on the sidelines. On behalf of the boys, thank you to all.

You would think that today, as I perform my last official duty as Captain of School, I would be sad, or, at the very least, a little emotional. But you would be wrong. No, I'm over the moon. Not because I'm leaving, in fact I can think of few things worse, but because I never have to say 'SCHOOOL' ever again. Who would've thought that yelling a single word could be so hard! If I were you Huddy (Hudson Delves awarded Captain of School 2015), I would start practising right now. While I certainly struggled with that this year. my other efforts as Captain of School have hopefully been more fruitful, and that is why I leave with great pride today.

This struggle continued for more than a year, and was terribly stressful for all involved, but on a more positive note it allowed Mum to gain arm muscles that Ryan Neugebauer would be proud of.

Eventually I got over my fence-clinging days, and school became a necessary evil, that I just had to put up with. Even as we returned to Australia, and I confusingly found myself at an all girl's school called Iona Presentation College, school was never much more than an annoyance between weekends. That being said, I



left Iona on a high, winning the much-coveted 'Best Christian Boy' award, which I held on to for two years, simply because, being a girl's school, there were no other boys in the year below.

But then, in 2007, I arrived at Hale, excited, nervous, and more than a little intimidated by the fresh start at a new school. Not for one second did I imagine that I would be standing here, eight years down the track. Upon arrival, I quickly realised that this new school was different to any that I'd been to before. I could do Drama, or Music, if I wanted to. There were so many different sports to try. I could learn a Language, or Poetry, or Art. And then came the shocking realisation: there were no girls! For someone who had spent the last three years trying to shield himself from the 'cooties' epidemic at lona, the complete lack of the opposite sex came as a bit of a shock, but before long I settled in, and my Hale life had begun.

The years I've passed here have shaped me as a person, in personality, confidence and respect. Sure, I'm never going to need an understanding of the French Subjunctive again in my life, but I certainly will use the life skills that eight years as a Hale boy have taught me. Respect, for your peers and your elders, Loyalty, to your house and to your school, and resilience, when someone at the shopping centre makes fun of your long socks.

The most important skill, however, in my mind, is authenticity. I have a motto, by which I go about my life, and that motto is: 'Work Hard. Be Real'.

It's very simple, just four words, but it means more to me than anything else. If I were the type to get a tattoo, that's what I would



get, emblazoned across my forehead in big block letters. My motto not only guides me through life, but it encapsulates the beauty of my experience at Hale.

We are a school that's pretty big on 'excellence', which is useful, given that we do a lot of truly excellent things. But there's never pressure to be the best at sport, or the best musician, or the top of the class, only constructive encouragement to do so. There's no expectation to be anything, or anyone, other than yourself. Put simply, we're encouraged to 'be real'

What about 'Work Hard' then? Thomas Edison once said "Opportunity is missed by most people because it is dressed in overalls and looks like work".

That's a statement that I have come to believe over the past few years. No student will ever get out of Hale without doing some sort of hard work, I can guarantee that, and once again the beauty of the School's culture shines through: These twin principles of authenticity and hard work are endorsed and encouraged by the school every single day.

Of all that I've learnt in eight years of schooling, the realisation that nothing can better authenticity and hard work is the most resonant, and it is a lesson by which I will live the rest of my life.

Sadly, my time at Hale is now coming to a close, and it's time for me to say goodbye to a place that I've loved so dearly, for such a long time. I'm not worried though, because I'm leaving this place in very safe hands.

To Hudson and next year's Prefects, congratulations and good luck as you take on the challenge of leading this school next year. My boys have left you big boots to fill, but I have no doubt you'll find a way to prove yourselves better than any year before.

To the staff, know that your impact on the boys is far more than just your teaching and care, but also your advice and guidance. I personally will never be able to forget the time in 1980-something that Mr Lowe hit Mr Henderson for six on Craig Oval, simply because he's told us that story 25 times. When we leave, it's those jokes and stories that we remember.



Some examples include the social event of the Year the Senior 'Rapture' Ball, Year 9 and 10 Socials at school as well at St Mary's Anglican Girls' School, Remembrance Day and ANZAC ceremonies, TedX youth@hale, concerts, student art exhibitions and NAIDOC week celebrations.





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ART

The Art department began the 2014 school year with the Art team consisting of Mr Nick Poole, Mr Chris McClelland, Ms Amber Levien, Ms Philippa Gordon and myself. The aim for the Art department in 2014 was to create a learning environment where the Art student cohort could take personal and creative ideas and develop these concepts into refined artworks displaying a high level of creativity and technical skill.

With the focus on the production of artworks in all Art classes, it was not far into the school year before the creative ideas of the boys were coming to fruition with the production of skilful and creative artworks.

As the artworks by class groups were completed, rolling displays of the boys' work were held in the Forrest Library foyer, the Middle School 'chill zone' and the Art department foyer. These smaller displays of the boys' artworks provided the opportunity for their peers, staff and members of the wider Hale School community to view, critique and acknowledge the efforts of the boys.

As the school year progressed, in Semester 2 the focus for the Art staff and boys switched to the annual Student Art Exhibition. The John Inverarity Music and Drama Centre was once again chosen as the venue, with the exhibition to take place late in Term 3.

The Student Art Exhibition was planned with the main aim to celebrate the achievements of the Year 12 Art students. In the week leading up to the exhibition, the Music and Drama Centre foyer was transformed into an exhibition space of professional standard.

The night arrived with a real sense of anticipation and excitement among the Year 12 cohort. The guest speaker for the night was David Lane (Class of 2013). David spoke about his experience as an Art student at Hale School. He described to the audience, which was in excess of 250 people, the process undertaken by a Year 12 Art student to produce a body of work. David explained the developmental stages each student undertakes: the forming of an idea, the research, the design development, and techniques and processes which need to be applied. David also discussed the constant interaction the Art students have with all the Art teachers in the department throughout the year. Hearing these insights from the perspective of an Art student enabled the audience to view the Year 12 artworks with a much greater understanding of the commitment and effort required for each piece.

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The exhibition was a wonderful success and it was pleasing to see so many parents, relatives and friends of the boys make the effort to support them.

Late in the school year the Art department received notification from the Art Gallery of WA informing Hale School that four Year 12 Art students, Liam Strickland, Oliver Anderson, Jan de Waal and Ben Chevin, were successful in having their artworks selected for the prestigious Year 12 Perspectives Exhibition. This success is a wonderful acknowledgement of the creativity, skill and effort of the boys.

The winner of the Year 11 Art Committee Scholarship was also selected late in the school year. Toby Hills, a Wilson House boarder, was selected as the recipient of the award by the selection panel made up of Art teachers and members of the Art Committee. Toby's skilful and refined production work and his commitment to learning in the subject of Visual Arts made him the standout candidate and a very deserving scholarship recipient.

In conclusion, reflecting on the standard of work produced in all year levels throughout 2014 provides me with great confidence that Visual Arts will continue to thrive as a subject within the Hale School curriculum next year and beyond.



We also asked Mama for a pair of helmets before the third day was through, given the number of grazes we sustained out there.

It was a hazy Wednesday mid-morning when I let go of Rose-Anne and she just kept flying down that twenty metre stretch. That was the day I guess I really realised what my Papa had missed out on, and what I had missed out on. Even if I'd never learned to ride a red bicycle until then, I'd learned to ride my own kind of bicycle - the kind you ride every day when gliding through the troubles that life picks up and throws at you.

JAPANESE

This year a newly initiated letter exchange took place between Year 8 and Year 9 students and a Junior High School in Japan, Former Hale School student Duncan Farmer, who is now working in Gunma prefecture in Japan as an Assistant Language Teacher, contacted the School during the year with the suggestion of initiating the letter exchange between the two schools. Around thirty interested students made the commitment to participate and soon received letters from some very keen Japanese girls learning English. The cute and quirky Japanese stationery upon which the first letters we received were written was a particular point of interest. The students have exchanged several letters now, providing an opportunity for real communication using the language they have learned in class

Year 10 and 11 students performed well in the ACER Language Tests this year, with Year 11 student Matthew Gadenne attaining a High Distinction in both the Reading and Listening sections of the test. A number of Year 10 students also achieved excellent results in both the listening and written components of the examination.

In Semester 1, our new teacher Mr Vinko Shain was able to provide one of his Year 8 classes with a special opportunity to learn origami and to see a full traditional Japanese kimono being worn, as visiting professors from Hyogo University visited his class. Mr Shain was a former exchange student at the Japanese university, and his former instructors were delighted to see him and his enthusiastic Japanese language students after enjoying a tour of the spacious Hale campus.

During language week the Year 7 students produced a research project on traditional Japanese crafts, helping them to appreciate that there are many more artistic forms in Japan than just the ubiquitous origami. The Year 10 students created a poster looking at other Japanese arts such as wood block printing (ukio-e) and the manufacture of lacquer ware.

Other cultural highlights included an exciting Language Week soccer match between the Year 12 Japanese students and their French-studying counterparts which resulted in an unfortunate 2 - 0 loss, and the Year 10 Japanese sushi and quiz night. Year 10 students came to Hale one evening in November to enjoy a range of different sushi types and participate in a quiz night. Students enjoyed sampling a range of more exotic sushi combinations and were enthusiastic participants in the cultural quiz.

FRENCH

In order to enhance cultural awareness, French students were asked to look at French art and art movements during Language Week this year and then to produce their own piece of art, a poster about an artist or give an oral presentation about an artist and the movement to which he or she belonged. Teachers were most impressed with some of the pieces presented and the original interpretations of the boys. To finish the term and complete the cultural experience, Year 11 boys enjoyed an evening of French cuisine and conversation with girls from Perth College at Le Bistrot des Artistes in Subiaco.

Term 3 is also a term in which boys sit external assessments

of their language competency. Years 10 and 11 participated in the Australian Language certificate testing programme. Many boys achieved results in the High Distinction and Distinction range. In the annual Alliance Française examinations, Max Anderson-Loake, Julian Atlas and Lachlan Robinson from Year 10 were placed in the top 10 percentile, as were Matthew Gadenne, Qiang Li and Lynden Lodge (Year 11) and Mina Sorsok (Year 12). Qiang Li was asked to present himself for an oral test and, as a result, was placed fourth in the State. Lynden Lodge was awarded the best background speaker prize.

The Year 7 French classes have learnt about the role of the ANZACS on the Western Front and this culminated in a visit to the Archives and the Memorial Grove. Guided by Mr Harry Weston, the boys went on a fact-finding hunt which allowed them to discover which Old Haleians had fought and died in France during the First World War.






By the time the interhouse Athletics Carnival finally


The most notable

We would all like to thank our coaches for doing a sensational


job in coaching our teams to many victories throughout Terms 2 and 3.





da VINCI DECATHLON

This year Hale School entered Junior (Year 8) and Senior (Year 9 and Year 10) teams in the Western Australian da Vinci Decathlon titles at Wesley College.

The Junior and Senior Western Australian da Vinci Decathlon competitions are all day interschool competitions operated in the spirit of the Olympic Decathlon. On each day teams from 28 Western Australian schools compete in ten events of an academic nature. The events included Engineering, Art and Poetry, Science, Cartography, English, Creative Producers, Mathematics, Philosophy, General Knowledge and Code Breaking.

Our junior team comprised Vincent Abbott, Angus Broome, Henry Chen, Giles Hegney, Ashton Lau, Blake Murphy, James Ryan, Andre Smith and the reserve, Lachie Stafford. The boys were very successful, winning by the largest margin ever. They came first in six of the ten events -Engineering, Science, Creative Producers, Philosophy, Cartography and General Knowledge - and second in Mathematics.

Our senior team of Jonathon Battista, Matthew Blacker, Mihailo Bozic, Ashton Brinkworth, James Dingley, Adi Ganguly, Domenic Quail, Haseeb Riaz and reserve David Sciarrone performed very consistently too, winning the Senior division against some very tough competition. They came first in Science and General Knowledge, second in Mathematics and English, and finished no lower than sixth in any event.

As the winning school in each state competition both of our teams were invited to compete in the National da Vinci Decathlon. This is the first time that any school has won both state competitions in one year! Over four days in June the top schools in the country came together to compete in a final decathlon, held at the prestigious Knox Grammar School in Sydney. Hale School has represented Western Australia in the seven years that we have been competing, which is also a great achievement.

On the first morning prior to registration for the competition we had some free time so we caught the train into the Sydney CBD. There we did some sightseeing and also celebrated James Dingley's birthday with a very hearty breakfast at a café in Pitt Street, before returning to Knox Grammar School to prepare for the competition.

There was a new event at the nationals this year called Race Around Sydney. All teams caught the train into Sydney and there were a variety of tasks to be carried out at places of significance in the CBD. We visited the Royal Botanic Gardens, the Art Gallery of NSW and Darling Harbour. Then we caught the ferry around to Circular Quay to check out The Rocks and the Sydney Opera House before heading back to Knox Grammar School in the evening.

Our teams were up against some very high quality opponents from around the country this year. Well over 200 schools now compete to make it into the national decathlon each year and this competition showcased the best of them. We performed very well in both divisions with the junior team finishing fifth and the senior team finishing seventh overall.

The team trained very hard for both the Western Australian and National decathlons, giving up many of their lunchtimes during Term 4 in 2013 and Term 1 this year. DEBATING

Debating was enjoyed by over 150 students in 2014, whether it was with the West Australian Debating League (WADL), Australian Heads of Independent Schools Association (AHISA) or British Parliamentary Debating, there was something for everyone from Term 1 to Term 4. Our venues were Hale School, Shenton College, Christ Church Grammar, Perth Modern School and Perth College. This was the first time Hale School had hosted a season of debates and it worked very well for many of the boarders. This year our Debating Club Captain and Vice-Captain were David Laws and Trayan Politis respectively.

With 30 teams of four to five members entered into the WADL Competition, we saw the novice teams (Years 7 and 8) work hard to begin to learn the skills of preparing some very challenging topics. It was exciting to see the students grow in confidence when speaking in front of others and, by the fifth debate, most were sorry to see the season end because they had enjoyed the camaraderie, as much as anything else; some good friendships were forged. The junior teams (Years 9 and 10) were also very busy. With slightly more contentious topics on offer,

they explored the worlds of politics and science, saving the planet and ethical issues - they did the School proud. Our senior teams (Years 11 and 12) thrived on the addition of points of information and reply speeches to the normal debating process. The effort and energy these boys gave to their debates, win or lose, were fantastic. Seven of our teams made it through to the preliminary finals, five to the octo-finals, and two to the semi-finals. A loss in the semi-finals did not demean the team, only showed the extremely high level of the debate.

Although winning is not everything, it was with great enthusiasm that Max Anderson Loake, Matthew Blacker, James Dingley, Adi Ganguly and Timothy Stoate accepted the shield for winning the Junior Division. A super effort on their part, well-earned.

AHISA is a five week, five debate season, held at Perth College; Hale entered 15 teams of six members each. The speed of this competition is usually a shock to the boys and very challenging, as they have only one week to prepare. As usual, they debated well and we came away with two divisional winners. It should be noted that boarders are transported to and from their set venues in either the old bus or the Mercedes. The older boys often talked about their fond memories of trips to the beach or Innaloo in the 'bone-shaker', as it is affectionately known, and it was their preference to travel in the familiar surroundings of their 'old bus'.

British Parliamentary Debating was introduced this year and was a great success. Instead of debating against one other team of three, the aim of each two person team is to defeat three other teams. This is a most challenging exercise for the students, but exciting to watch. One of our two teams made it to the grand final, an event that was enjoyed by all.

In the middle of the WADL competition, was the allimportant interhouse debating. This competition between houses is taken very seriously. Humour is often the weapon of choice, as each team chooses its words carefully and attacks the opposition with its rapier wit. The deafening cheers of the winners and the just as loud groans of defeat are quickly replaced by the knowledge that it is lunchtime. A most fitting end to such an exhausting activity.

Archie Stapleton deserves a special mention as he not only represented WA in the nationals, but he was deemed one of the best speakers. This was the first time a Year 11 student had been awarded such a prize. In recognition, Archie was awarded both Symbols and Colours this year.

The Year 11s and 12s from debating, mock trial and public speaking had their annual Speakers' Dinner which was a fun night where the boys have the opportunity to thank their coaches and enjoy some light-hearted banter. It is a good way to finish the season and something for the younger ones to look forward to.

The way in which Hale students continue to embrace the many opportunities to be involved with Service Learning is amazingly empowering to see. Students are able to see that by doing even small things that they really can make a big difference to a person's life - for the better. It is also an activity that is proven to enhance resilience, so everyone benefits.

Once again in 2014 there was an increase in the number of student volunteers and there is a continued awareness that participating in Service Learning is a wonderfully enriching experience.

In Year 9 our association with Family Pathways was temporarily disrupted for part of the year, but students were allocated other agencies and willingly helped there. Chrysalis Montessori School, a school many past and present students have attended, was visited each Monday. Mount Hawthorn Education Support Centre for students with special needs is a particularly challenging, but also rewarding, agency visited on Thursday lunchtimes throughout the year. Some students also visited James Brown House, an aged care facility.

The Quintilian School in Mount Claremont and Doubleview Primary School were visited by Year 10 boys. Mrs Cook, the wife of Mr Michael Cook of Haynes House fame, facilitates our visit to Doubleview. Some boys also visited an aged care facility in Joondanna.

There was a big increase in Year 11 students doing Service Learning in 2014. As well as the Nulsen commitment, a group helped as Big Brothers at Ronald McDonald House. Also many students went on the Red Cross Soup Patrol. Other Year 11 students also continued a close association with Anglicare.

For the second year, all students participating in the Service Learning programme from the Middle and Senior Schools gathered for a special chapel service run by The Reverend Dougall Ethell. He led them through a session where they could reflect on the way in which they might have made a difference. Various boys recounted their experiences and how they felt as a result

Service Learning

VIETNAM CAMBODIA

For the ninth time a group of 16 Year 12 boys, Mr Clark Wight, Mrs Maree Hutcheon and myself set off for Vietnam and Cambodia as part of the Hale School Student Service Learning programme.

The week we spent In Vietnam commenced in the tourist town of Hoi An, with a visit to the Kianh Foundation. Set up by the inspirational Jackie Wrafter, this foundation caters for children with a wide range of disabilities. The Hale boys were given a brief tour of the facilities, then got down to what they did best on the tour - to cause 'mayhem' by playing and bringing joy to the young children. The presentation of the Bill Edgar parachute was a real highlight, as it is sure to be used a great deal. Back in Perth the boys had learnt to sing a Vietnamese nursery rhyme, and this was a real hit with all their audiences.

Visits to two aged care facilities and the government run orphanage in Hoi An followed. The orphanage was visited three times and the Hale boys formed some very special bonds with the disabled children there. So much so, that it was extremely difficult to finally leave. The sense of hopelessness and vulnerability we all felt at that moment was expertly counselled by Mr Wight who left us feeling courageous and positive.

Ho Chi Minh City is the largest in Vietnam with over 10 million people and six million scooters. Simply crossing a road was quite an undertaking! Our three days here were predominantly spent with the Christina Noble Children's Foundation. The Hale boys had activities with the Sunshine School, where impoverished children are given the chance of a normal education. We also visited the Tay Ninh Centre for the visually impaired. Tay Ninh was an area of Vietnam that was bombed and targeted with Agent Orange during the Vietnam War. The ongoing legacy of Agent Orange is an abnormal level of birth defects, including blindness. At Tay Ninh we were impressed by the way the students were able to live almost 'normal' lives and we recognised ABILITY rather than disability.

On the way back from Tay Ninh we had the opportunity to visit

the Cu Chi tunnels. Originally this was an area containing an impressive network of over 250 kilometres of tunnels, built by the Vietcong to evade destruction. Some of these are now open to tourists. The firing range proved to be popular amongst the boys, and it was very clear that few had ever fired a rifle before. The targets were the safest things within the whole complex!! The noise from the guns was deafening, and clearly warranted the ear protection provided.

From Vietnam it was a short 45 minute flight to the neighbouring country of Cambodia. Unlike Vietnam, where an international war had devastated the country, in Cambodia a civil war instigated by the warped concepts of communism of Pol Pot has left an indelible mark. Jen Alderson joined the tour here and as a fifth year medical student her developing medical knowledge was put to good use as many of the group had succumbed to one ailment or another. Some of the boys were particularly happy that she had also brought a copy of the latest episode of Game of Thrones!!

To put Cambodia's history in context our first destination was the Tuol Sleng Genocide Museum - a dark place of torture and cruelty - followed by a short bus ride to the Killing Fields. Both places left us contemplating many things, but perhaps most of all how lucky we are to live in Australia.

In Cambodia Mr Frank Surgener, the founder of the Australian NGO BideAid facilitates our visits to various projects. In 2008 Hale School raised a great deal of money which enabled the construction of a 'middle school' in a village on the outskirts of Phnom Penh. We have visited the school every year since. This year Frank was able to make a very exciting announcement to the staff and students about the provision of some more computers and the connection to the internet. Our Hale boys were also able to make a donation of 150 stationary packs to the students.

That afternoon we visited the New Life Orphanage. The children here have lost their parents through AIDS, although they themselves do not have the condition. We had a great time playing a variety of games including KhlaSiko (Tigers versus Cows) a traditional Khmer board game, which I was pretty useless at!

The next three days were taken up with the 'cultural exchange' at the Les Manguiers (Mango Tree) in Kampot. This was where we met and interacted with a group of 16 young Cambodian men, sharing our experiences and aspirations as young people in the modern world from very different backgrounds. We attempted to teach them how to kick a football and they in turn taught us a fantastic game called 'oooooooo'. Of course we also enjoyed playing soccer and volleyball which we were all familiar with.

On one day a group of us went on a cycling adventure and another group canoed to the 'green cathedral'. We all had a workshop at the Epic Arts centre in Kampot, where we marvelled at the talents of the deaf and disabled dancers. Moving on to Sihanoukville we were able to visit M'Lop Tapang. M'lop Tapang was created in 2003 by a small group of foreigners and locals. What began as a simple initiative to feed and offer safety to six children who slept under a large Tapang tree on the beach every night quickly blossomed into a much wider programme now helping thousands. In 2013 M'Lop Tapang was awarded the Stars Foundation child protection award for Asia/Pacific. Hale is the only foreign group allowed to visit and experience what M'Lop Tapang does. Once again we were unsuccessful in the soccer match, but we were much more competitive than many expected.

For the first time ever the 2014 tour visited Siem Reap and the world famous temples, including Angkor Wat. Seeing the sun rise over Angkor Wat was unbelievable, and well worth the 4.30am wake up call.

The tour members thanked Mr Wight, Mrs Hutcheon, Jen Alderson and myself for all the help and support throughout the tour of Vietnam and Cambodia.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

When I consider how this year compares to any other and every small event which may make it stand out in any way, my immediate response is an impression of elevated enthusiasm from staff and a general good "vibe" amongst the students.


The year had not begun quite so cheerily. The devastating floods of May had resulted in Ningaloo National Park being declared a natural disaster zone and some doubt was cast on the Year 10 camp. For those who have visited the area and can imagine the scene, the floodwaters and debris were above the picnic tables at the information centre at Milyering. The Department of Parks and Wildlife staff who performed the clean-up tell stories of campervans being washed out to sea and complete campsites being destroyed. Mr Tim Harley and I were on our way to do a maintenance and set-up week at the Hale School house in Exmouth at the time when we

found ourselves cut off by the flooded Lyndon River. Bizarrely, one of our tasks that week was to install the rainwater tank which would have filled in under a day!

By the time we arrived again for the Year 10 camp almost two months later, the National Park was operational once again and the ground cover was still thick and lush and green as a result of the flooding rains. Saplings had begun to sprout in ground that had been parched for too long, and in so many directions we could see the remnants of diminishing waterholes.

At a personal level, I may be quoted as saying that I hosted close to my best ever group in Exmouth 2014. A very bold claim indeed, considering the number of groups that I have hosted, and I cannot even count the numbers of boys I have had the pleasure (or not!) of accompanying through this adventure. On reflection, I must admit that perhaps I was a little carried away in my enthusiastic retort; it is so easy to be swept up in the spirit of the moment when the stars all seem to align.

So what made it seem such an extraordinary year for the Exmouth programme, which is the pinnacle of the Outdoor Education camps? Certainly the weather had a part to play; overall the days were beautiful and warm and dry. The instructors were fresh and buoyant. The attitude of the boys was good - no, very good - and the teachers were enthusiastic. In this context, the group that I held aloft in such high esteem was memorable mostly for its upbeat attitude and can-do approach, and because the boys enjoyed a wonderful rapport with staff. The experience was enhanced in no small way by the involvement of one particular member who led by selfless example and made it his mission to keep the spirits uplifted.





Across the range of groups we saw things we had never seen before, like the blue ring octopus photographed in all of its splendour by Mr Tim Parish at Roberts Island, and the whale skeleton washed ashore at our launching area in Exmouth Gulf. There were no significant incidents involving students' safety though the programme itself was peppered with the usual memorable occasions and faux pas. Sea kavaking returned to the Ningaloo Reef where the boys were able to snorkel on pristine coral far from the madding crowds. The 'shipwreck scenario' relocated to the islands of Exmouth Gulf where the fishing and foraging for food were much more in keeping with the theme. Perhaps most significant of all is that it was the 25th anniversary of the Exmouth programme which gave rise to many a trip down memory lane.

While the Exmouth programme may be the pinnacle, the Year 10 experience can only be successful if the camps in earlier year groups have performed their own task in building the students year by year. The Junior School camps coordinated by Mr

Chris Charlton have been increasingly well-received, as Chris has continued to improve the experience for the boys. The Year 6 camp in Pemberton has been a highlight for staff and students alike with a variety of activities and locations and burgeoning mountain biking expertise. Sadly, Mr Charlton leaves us next year for browner pastures. The Middle School camps coordinated by Mr Murray Curran continued to be both popular and rigorous. Ideally situated as they now are in the calendar, with Year 7 in February and Year 8 in May, they provide an important stepping stone into Senior School camps. More importantly, these camps exemplify what Outdoor Education is really about at Hale School with their total involvement of Pastoral Care Leaders in building and growing students and relationships.

The Year 9 camp under the direction of Mr Harley is undergoing change as we speak. 2014 will see the camp in its current format for the last time in what has been a long and slow developmental process. In 2015 the Year 9

camp will follow the example of the more junior years in being in house groups and also concentrated during one time of year in November.

Thank you to all of the teaching staff and students who made it such a memorable and successful year and in many cases volunteered themselves and their time. Thank you particularly to the Outdoor Education staff who facilitated the success of the programme. It is a strong and cohesive team and this bodes well for the future of the programme. May the next 25 years seem as fruitful as the first.

SUMMER Sport Wrap

Vince Lombardi The summer season was slightly disrupted in Term 4 due to the aquatic facility construction site. This made for a challenging time for many sports with tennis, cricket and basketball often playing in clouds of dust, not to mention the water polo players honing their skills on Craig Oval! When Term 1 rolled around, the precinct was in all its splendour and the boys could not wait to jump into their new pools.

The new Aquatic Precinct was officially opened in February. The move from the old pool to the new pool was exciting for many reasons but none more so than the flexibility provided by having two (heated) pools as opposed to one. In 2013, the Hale Swim team won the PSA Inters out of the old Hale pool and the team was very determined to be the first team to win the Inters out of the new pool. Not only did the team win and go back-to-back, they won by a considerable margin on the back of consistent performances from the entire squad. Winning the Inters is all about depth and the record numbers of boys 'on the books' says everything about the inclusive Hale swimming programme.

Water polo at Hale has enjoyed great depth in recent years and this has led to Hale fielding the most teams in the PSA competition. The new aquatic facility has come at the right time and caters superbly for all teams, particularly training sessions. The 1st team won the Dickinson Shield for the first time since 2008 after going through the season undefeated Other teams to enjoy undefeated seasons were the 2nds, 3rds, 4ths, 7/8/9Cs and 7/8/9Ds. Across all teams, Hale only lost two games in 41 matches. There is no doubt that water polo at Hale will continue to grow in depth and strength.

Basketball continues to draw plenty of boys with over 180 choosing to play in Term 1. For the first time, the seniors fielded a 6ths made up largely of boys whose priority was winter sport and played purely for their own enjoyment. The new hard court that sits over the old pool site proved to be popular not only for training and games but also for recreation after school and on weekends. All Hale teams won more games than they lost with four teams enjoying undefeated seasons: 9A, 9B, 7B, 7C. Heading into the last round, the 1st V had an opportunity to join Trinity as co-premiers in what was a highly entertaining grand final. Spectators crammed into the senior gymnasium to witness an extremely competitive game played between two welldrilled teams. Boys from both schools displayed wonderful sportsmanship and added to the finals-like atmosphere.

For the 1st XI cricket squad, the season started early with a tour of South Africa in January. Not only was the tour the first by any Hale team to South Africa, it also marked the return of former Australian cricket captain, Kim Hughes, who accompanied the team in his role as Director of Cricket Coaching. The team was fortunate to be invited to a festival at the prestigious Bishops Diocesan College in Cape Town as well as touring Kwazulu-Natal to play three matches. The momentum from the tour was clear to see as the 1st XI returned to win their first three matches before falling away late in the season. The number of boys choosing to play cricket is at an all-time high as all age groups enjoy numbers of over 50, meaning the competition for places is very competitive both at training and in games. This was highlighted by the 2nd XI who were undefeated in Term 1 and included many fringe 1st team players, many of whom would have played 1st team cricket for opposing schools.

The 1st VIII tennis team led the way winning the Corr Cup for the first time since 2006. To remain undefeated was a testament to the culture within the team, led by the Year 12 boys, as they knew they would have their opportunity in 2014 and they certainly took it. For the first time, a 5ths team became a regular feature each Saturday morning as boys voted with their feet and committed to playing regularly, despite the voluntary sport policy. Amazingly, not one senior team lost a fixture in Term 1, including the 10As.

Volleyball did not enjoy the same numbers it has in recent years as a number of boys chose to continue with their original sports. Previously, many boys have chosen to take up volleyball in Term 4 and often continue with it until they leave school. Despite this, a strong core of committed volleyballers has maintained the culture of volleyball within the school and these boys were quite successful in recruiting new players across all grades.

On the back of a momentumchanging season last year, Hale rowing enjoyed its most successful season in recent years, evident by the Hamer Cup results which were very even between 2nd and 6th (Hale placed 5th). There has been a cultural shift in the shed where boys are now driven by success and are determined to improve in order to capture the elusive podium finish. Retention of rowers, particularly when they enter Year 10, has been an issue for the shed in the last few years but that has now ceased with all boys choosing to continue with their rowing. Unfortunately, the blustery conditions at the Head of the River made rowing near impossible in the outside lanes. and many crews suffered as a result. With the combinations of two successful 10A crews joining forces in the 1st VIII next season, there is no doubt they will lead the shed to success



1ST VII WATER POLO

The Hale School Aquatic Centre has transformed the sport of water polo at Hale School. Water polo has always been a popular sport of choice for many boys, but having adequate pool space for each team to train was always a difficult task for the coaching staff.

The new Hale School Aquatic Centre provided the 2014 water polo teams with a training and competition facility of the highest standard; possibly the best aquatic facility of any school in Australia.

Preparation for the 1st VII team players began early in the new year and continued throughout the January holiday period. The school year began in early February with the first PSA fixture against Guildford Grammar School a week later.

Guildford Grammar has struggled to field competitive teams in recent years and their 2014 team was again an experienced line-up. This team struggled from the outset of the game to be competitive and was unable to match the fitness and skills of the Hale School team. The final score of 31 - 1 highlighted the mismatch in skill level of the two teams.

The second fixture was against Aquinas College, traditionally one of the strong teams in the PSA competition. The

Aquinas team was competitive early in the game, but in the second half of the contest the Hale School team displayed superior fitness and ability to make the most of its scoring opportunities. The game concluded with Hale School team comfortable winners 11 - 7.

The third fixture resulted in an easy win over Wesley College. With three fixtures completed in the competition Christ Church Grammar School, Hale and Aquinas were all well placed to challenge for the Dickenson Shield. The back half of the season results would determine the competition winner.

The fourth fixture was the season's block-buster game, with a crowd of 250 turning out at the Hale School Aquatic Centre to watch Christ Church take on Hale. And what a game they witnessed; a classic sporting dog-fight with Christ Church leading throughout the game only for Hale to take a one goal lead with a minute remaining on the game clock. The Hale School team, with victory in their grasp, slipped up and released pressure for a split second. This critical error was enough opportunity for the Christ Church team to seize the moment, counter attack, and score a goal in the dying seconds of the game - snatching a draw from

what was certain defeat only moments earlier. This nail biting result made the remaining two fixtures of the season even more critical to the outcome of the competition.

Game five against Scotch College was a close encounter for the first period of play. However, from that point on the Hale School team picked up its work rate in defence, creating numerous counterattack opportunities and going on to win the game 16 - 7.

The final fixture was against Trinity College. Trinity could only finish third in the competition if they won the game against Hale. Nevertheless, they were highly motivated to cause an upset and break Hale School's grip on the competition.

The game was a close contest until half time. From this point forward, the Hale School team was able to impose its dominance on the contest winning the game 13 - 7. This resulted in Hale School winning the PSA water polo competition and the Dickenson Shield for only the third time in the last 20 years.

History will indicate that the 2014 winter season was a most successful one given premierships were won at 1st team level in football, hockey and rugby. Coupled with the three trophies won in summer, it has certainly made for a wonderful season. However, the success of our winter season, or any season for that matter, should never be measured in terms of trophies at 1st team level. The greatest measure of success should be culture. Boys enjoying their sport, no matter their level, playing in the right spirit, no matter their results, are what we identify as the most important factors in Hale sport. After all, our role as coaches, teachers and administrators is to prepare young men for life outside of Hale. This season, despite our non-compulsory sport

policy in Years 10 - 12, we fielded as many teams as any other school, if not more, which is something we are enormously proud of.

The badminton teams welcomed a new coach this season, Ms Kay Terry. Ms Terry is a former Commonwealth Games badminton player and has a wealth of coaching knowledge which she was able to provide for the boys. Once again, we had two senior teams. The Firsts were 3rd overall which is a fair indication of their season given Wesley College were dominant once again and Christ Church Grammar School were not too far behind them.

Having lost some quality Year 12s from the previous year, the cross country team was able to recruit some additional senior runners to fill the void. Fortunately, the legacy left by the 2013 leaders was one of enjoyment, inclusion and a good work ethic and this was embraced by the leaders of the 2014 team. The 2014 fixture card saw the team run less at Hale which was a shame as the 'chunder hill' home advantage could not be used as effectively as it has been before but there is no doubt it has influence as any training run at Hale is a tough one. As has been spoken of publicly in previous years, there is simply nowhere to hide in cross country which is why we must acknowledge the boys in Years 7, 8 and 9 who choose to run on Saturdays after playing or running on Friday afternoons. Culture at its absolute best.

Hale football is as healthy as ever. The 1st XVIII have won the Alcock Cup for the fourth time in six years after a dominant first half of the season saw them two games clear at the halfway mark. This ultimately proved to be too much for the chasing pack as the team dropped only one game and drew another in the second round. One of the most underrated aspects of the Hale football programme is the coaches in the lower grades, particularly the A teams. Keen observers would note that many losses were turned around in late season re-matches and much of this must be attributed to the coaching staff who continue to coach and motivate right through to the end of the season Whilst it may not be obvious in the current season, it is a feature of teams in the senior grades, all of whom enioved successful seasons this year. Coaches of any code will know that it is easy to motivate early in the season but, as they say, the

hardest part of the marathon is the last few kilometres. With plenty of depth coming through, it is hoped the Alcock Cup will be retained next year and beyond.

One of the largest crowds in PSA hockey history gathered to watch the final PSA hockey game of the season between Hale School and Scotch College which was effectively a grand final on the newly laid Hale turf. The crowd was witness to an entertaining, fast and skilful game where at one point four goals were scored in four minutes in the first half. The Hale team was able to hold on for a one goal victory, much to the pleasure of the Hale supporters, many of whom were from other codes. Hale School hockey is enjoying its healthiest period in the School's history given the 1st XI have now won two premierships in the past three years, numbers are up in all age groups and boys are choosing school hockey as their priority sport.

Hale rugby continues to go from strength to strength. The 1st XV retained the Brother Redmond Cup for the twelfth year in a row despite dropping one game to Christ Church - which was the first time Christ Church had beaten Hale at 1st team level in fourteen years. The success of the team has everything to do with their culture. The squad trains at the same intensity as it plays and are incredibly demanding of each other in both manner and method. This year, a number of players had to play out of position to cover for players on representative duty, or out due to injury or illness and it was these selfless acts that allowed the boys to remain team focused during the tight games. The culture of the 1st XV flows to the teams below them and the results indicate there is plenty of depth coming through in the next few years. In what is always a highlight for the Hale rugby community, we welcomed back the South African rugby team this year as they based themselves at Hale for the week prior to their test match against the Wallabies.

Finally in soccer, the 1st XI fielded a young side which was far more competitive than their results show. The PSA season comprises of two full rounds yet if there were one more round there is no doubt that the Hale team would have won more games than they lost. The last fixture of the season against Scotch College was 'live' in the sense that Scotch needed a win to secure the Lawe Davies Cup. However, Hale proved too strong in all facets of the game to run out winners, 2-1. The continued issue of school versus clubs remains as our single biggest challenge in the next few years as boys wrestle with the conflict - a battle at all PSA schools. It is hoped that this can be resolved with consultation with the clubs so that boys are afforded the opportunity to play for both school and club and are not caught in the middle. In order for soccer to thrive at Hale, we must have our best players choosing to play for the School as is the case in all the other codes.

ATHLETICS

Preparation for this year's **PSA** Interschool Athletics Carnival began early in Term 3 with pre-season track event training starting on Wednesday mornings before school. There is something wonderful about running around the Hale grounds in the early morning light and watching the sun come up over the Darling Scarp. These sessions provide a great lead in to the short and intense athletics' season as training started immediately upon the conclusion of the winter sporting fixtures. The 2014 leadership group also established itself pre-season, training and leading by example were the captain of athletics, Josh Hopkinson, and vice captains Nicholas Marsh and Connor Augustson.

The first opportunity for boys to showcase their talents this year was the interhouse Athletics Carnival on the Thursday before the midterm break. The event is a great school community day, well attended by parents and participated in by all students. It also provides athletes with their first competition since the previous year's Inters. One of the most memorable moments in recent years took place this year in the Under 17 (Year 11) High Jump competition. A crowd of around 500 students gathered to watch Ben Fitzgerald smash the old school record and win the event with an astonishing jump of 2.08 metres. A remarkable performance indeed!

Due to poor weather the Hale Championships were not conducted as scheduled on Friday August 29 (week 6 of the term), although athletes did get the opportunity to post performances in lunchtime and after school heats.

The following week the Tri-Meet was conducted

on the Thursday evening at the WA Athletics' Stadium. The final opportunity for Inters' selection, the event also provides boys the opportunity for comparison and competition with the lads from Trinity College and Aquinas College. Despite being an informal meet, there were some pleasing signs for our team and again Hale boys enthusiastically ran, jumped and threw.

In contrast with previous weeks, Inters' day, Friday 12 September 2014, was 24 degrees and the sunny West Australian sky was almost cloudless for the duration of competition. A magnificent day for athletic competition, sunscreen and hats were required. The day started fantastically, with Zac Sanderson winning the under 13 1500 and Mitchell Georgiades winning the under 13 Hurdles. The morning's events continued extremely well and we were in second place for a large part of the programme. We seemed to falter in the latter half of the programme and for the second year running we ultimately finished in fourth place.

They were led by extraordinary performances from Lachlan McKay (who amassed 75 individual points competing in the 100, 200, 400, shot put, discus and 4x100 relay), Mitchell Georgiades (68 individual points) and Siddhant Bhat (45 individual points). In the Year 8 Under 14 group. Benedict Wilson (34 points), Henry Fowler (31 points) and Ethan Foggin (24 points) were again strong performers for the School. Callan England led the way in the Year 9 Under 15 group with 77 individual points (100, 200, 400, long jump, shot put and 4x100 relay). Cooper Walawski's off-season work was evident as he dominated the Under 16 Hale rankings with 48 individual points (100, 200, Hurdles, 4x100). It was a pleasure to see Connor Augustson come on so strongly this year as our best sprinter, as our Open first division 100 and 200 athlete, and running the 4x100. To kick the season off, we were faced with the stern reality check of confronting the reigning champions Aquinas College on their home turf. Despite their imposing presence, we relished the opportunity to show we were going to be a competitive team this year. Aquinas, however, proved too strong on the day winning 199 - 268, but we earned our first bonus points of many for the season and were commended for our efforts by the Aquinas team. At home in Round 2 we were given a sound lesson by early season PSA leaders Christ Church Grammar School, losing 183 - 293.

Now we were keen to amass some real points in the away fixture against Guildford Grammar School, despite losing our lead runner Jake Mason to a house football injury, which turned out to be less serious than it at first appeared. Focusing on the task at foot, we performed brilliantly to claim our first win. 181 -307. Year 10 Tom Renshaw stepped up both literally and metaphorically by winning overall whilst Year 9 Isaac Barton also charged home strongly coming in third. Hale's next round saw us competing in the Thursday, First team only round prior to mid-term break. We almost went on holiday early before waking up to defeat a gallant Wesley College 217 - 251. A young man with great potential, Benedict Wilson, was our top runner on the day finishing in second overall whilst Isaac Silbert, James Dingley and Xavier Burton also performed pluckily finishing in the top ten for Hale.

Growing in confidence after a couple of successive wins, we faced another tough challenge taking on Trinity College at their less-thanexciting course (that is almost diametrically opposed to the joys of 'Chunder Hill' on Hale's course). With strong efforts by all members of the team and a strong comeback from Jake Mason we unfortunately fell just short with a 217 - 251 loss. Putting that bitter-sweet result aside, we continued in our stride defeating a big Scotch College team the following week with a stellar win, giving us a symmetrical 3 win, 3 loss, 4 bonus point tally after the Home and Away fixtures.

With the usual change in format, all PSA schools returned to Trinity to compete in the first of the All Schools events, the 5x3km relay. With the four strong teams, inclusive of Hale, all performing well on the day, we maintained 4th position as well as gaining a couple of bonus points. up to the boys in blue. With Scotch a kick up at half time, Hale went to another level in the third quarter, eventually winning the game by more than 30 points. Interestingly, it was our Year 12s who stood up in the second half with the Matthew Taylor leading from the front with a best on ground performance. Four goals from Jy Farrar and a three goal cameo from Troy Culloton proved crucial to Hale maintaining a six game winning streak.

The return clash against Aquinas at home the following week was a reality check for many of the players. In blustery conditions Aquinas played strong, accountable football as Hale struggled to find any rhythm and found themselves two goals down at half time. Regan Smith was playing his best game of the season winning plenty of ball out of the middle. Two goals each during the third quarter meant Hale was in for an epic battle in the final term. With three goals to Hale and just one to Aquinas, scores were level. Hale had one final opportunity late in the game, when Jy Farrar took mark of the year as he climbed on the shoulders of his Aquinas opponent. Matthew Taylor collected the handpass from Jv but the kick, in the windv conditions, was to float out on

the full. The match was drawn. The next two games saw a return to business as usual. with a 79 point win over Christ Church and a 101 point win over the second placed Guildford. Wesley the following week was always going to be tough, with Wesley welcoming back several key players missing from the first round match. And a tough contest it proved to be. In a relatively low scoring match, Hale could not shake a determined Wesley College, who were a vastly improved outfit Hale never gave up and with just seconds on the clock in the last quarter Jye Harris snapped on goal, only to miss by inches, and Hale was to lose their first and only match of the season by just three points.

After a disappointing loss against Wesley the previous week, Hale was determined to get a win against Trinity with the Alcock Cup not yet sewn up. Trinity jumped out of the blocks with early goals as Hale found it difficult to get into the game. A much better second quarter saw Hale start to dominate with big Ashton Williamson winning the hitouts. An injury to Matthew Taylor at half time was cause for concern. The third term was very evenly matched, but with Cam Quenby popping his shoulder. Hale entered the final term nine points

up, but two players down. Coaches Norrish, Wira and Curley swung the changes and managed to rotate players well during a hectic final term. A six goal final term may suggest Hale ran away with an easy win, but that was not the case. It meant, of course, that the Hale team had secured the Alcock Cup for 2014. Cam Wilson played his best game for the season with seven centre clearances. Captain Aden Wilkins played hard, uncompromising football and again led the team well. The two key forwards, Jy Farrar and Jimmy Miller, kicked seven between them. Tate Wyatt also proved handy up forward booting three goals, with Regan Smith landing some brutal tackles on his opponents.

The final game of the season was against Scotch, the team who had beaten Hale the previous year to win the Alcock Cup. Once again, Scotch were determined to upset Hale and they played some very good, team-oriented football. It was a cracking game of footy, with just a kick in it in the dving moments of the game. Fittingly, it was the team's captain. Aden Wilkins (kicking his only goal for the season) who gathered the ball across half forward and launched a kick from 50m to win the game. It was a great way to end a remarkable





season of football and one the players and coaches should be enormously proud of.

Regan Smith won the 2014 Best and Fairest award, with an outstanding season playing in the middle. Small forward Ryan Donaldson finished runner-up and we look forward to his exploits in Year 12 next year. Tom Horsley, Marcus Tsaknis and Aden Wilkins rounded out the top five best players for 2014. Jy Farrar won the goal kicking, with 39 goals for the season. Aden Wilkins was awarded best team man. recognition as much for his positive leadership as it was for his fine performances on the ground.

The success this season was in no small part to the efforts and expertise of the coaching

team. Head coach and old boy Jason Norrish manages, teaches, guides and instructs every boy about all facets of the game and about what is required both on and off the field. With the backing and footy smarts of forward coach Todd Curley and backline coach Brad Wira, it was a formidable coach's box on match day and certainly the envy of many other schools. Thank you to the team's physio Nicole Robb who brought a new level of professionalism to the boys' preparation and recovery programmes, as well as the match day support that is so important to the team. Thank you also to Gary Lamb for his time and efforts as goal umpire throughout the season.

Finally, congratulations to the fifteen Year 12s who played

their final season of football for Hale. It is great to see them leave with an Alcock Cup, and for a couple of boys, their second in three years. The good news is that half of this year's team were Year 10s and 11s. so 2015 is full of promise!
